We're talking trash!

About 40 area leaders got together Friday to talk about trash.

Municipal and county officials agreed they want to work together for a county-wide solution to the solid waste problem, but time is running out.

The lawsuit filed by New Mexico Municipal League against the state Environmental Improvement Division (EID) is expected to be settled by July 1, and that's when the new regulations will go into effect.

County manager Nick Pappas said the county landfill will have to close when those new regulations are implemented.

"We can't afford to keep our landfill," said Pappas during the meeting initiated by Lincoln County Commission Chairperson Karen Z. Petty.

Representatives of local and state government's various agencies and businesses discussed joint solutions for the solid waste disposal.

The Solid Waste Act, also known as Senate Bill 2, recently passed by the state legislature, was also described.

The bill promotes regional landfills, integrated waste management plans, source reduction and recycling through gross receipts taxes and grants.

Ralph Fresquez, Roswell city manager, and Steve Massey, director of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, invited area towns to join in a feasibility study on a regional landfill for the district. Massey said it would cost the county about \$2.500 to participate.

Ruidoso Mayor Victor Alonso said he is open to all alternatives and wants a landfill in Lincoln County only if it is economical.

"I'm really concerned we can't afford one in Lincoln County," he said.

The mayor also invited Ruidoso Downs to use Ruidoso's transfer station for hauling garbage to Ros-

well. Ruidoso Downs is hauling its garbage to the county landfill, and will be left without anyplace to go when that site closes. That could happen soon since a settlement is expected soon in the Municipal League lawsuit.

Whatever solid waste disposal system is eventually used, the Ruidoso transfer station could be used by the whole county as a central transfer point, said Alonso.

Another alternative suggested was to create a Class C landfill in the county for use by contractors and residents to dispose of non-household waste.

The landfill presently operated by Capitan could be such a site, as well as a location for another transfer station, said Dr. Bernhard E. Reimann of the Capitan solid waste committee.

Several factors affect where, how, and with whom a landfill will be operated. Public education is essential because trash disposal is an

33 apply for top school job

Three local school administrators were among the 33 applicants for Ruidoso Municipal Schools superintendent.

Deadline to apply was Friday, April 13, and the board officially accepted the applications during a special meeting Monday.

Board president Stormy Edwards said the three local applicants are Donnie Weems, principal of White Mountain Inter-

mediate, and Hester, principal of Ruidoso High School, and Mike Gauder, principal of Ruidoso Middle School. Gauder is also the assistant superintendent.

Applications were received from candidates in Colorado, Oklahoma, Texas and New Mexico.

"We are very pleased with the number of the applicants," said Edwards.

The board will now conduct

interviews and select a superintendent. The search is expected to be completed by May 15.

The superintendent will be responsible for the day-to-day operations of the district, which includes 10 schools and 1,500 students. The position is a full-time, year-round position with a salary of \$50,000 per year.

Millionaire champion Strawberry Silk gets set for another sweet racing season

Mac Peckhan, assistant trainer for Jack Brooks, had to laugh when he unloaded Strawberry Silk off the van early this week at Ruidoso Downs.

"When we unloaded her off the trailer, her ears pricked up and her eyes started shining," Peckhan said. "She knew where she was."

In case anybody had forgotten, Strawberry Silk was back at the scene of her greatest triumph, the 1989 All American Futurity.

Strawberry Silk, who won nine of 11 starts and earned \$1,235,166 including the winner's share of the \$2.5 million All American in 1989, was full of life and curiosity Wednesday morning in Barn 7.

The gorgeous gray filly, a daughter of Beduino, immediately poked her head out of her stall at the sound of a visitor arriving.

"She has quite a personality,"

Peckhan said. "Although when she's really fit and ready to race, she can be a little ornery."

Strawberry Silk is expected to make her 1990 debut in the Kansas Derby Trials May 17. The Grade I \$250,000 (est.) Kansas Derby will be run June 3.

"She's been at the ranch in Jones, Oklahoma, all winter," Peckhan said. "She's really been doing

good. She's grown two or three inches and filled out a lot, too."

Owned by Jacqueline E. Spencer of Alto, Strawberry Silk was named Champion 2-year-old and Filly in 1989.

Along with her All American triumph last year, Strawberry Silk also won the Grade I Sun Country Futurity at Sunland Park. She was second last year in both the Grade I

Rainbow Futurity and the Grade I

Kansas Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

In order to have her fit for the Kansas Derby, Brooks began putting long gallops into Strawberry Silk shortly after the first of the year.

"It's hard to say that she could be better than last year," Peckhan said. "But I feel she's better. Everything about her is better—her size, her weight, her attitude—and she was darn good last year."

Brooks, last year's leading trainer, is expected to haul the remainder of his stable to Ruidoso Downs on Monday.

Brooks qualified seven horses for Sunday's Sun Country Futurity at Sunland Park.

Ruidoso Downs' 78-day meet opens May 10 and continues through Labor Day, September 3.

emotional issue.

"All you have to do is say landfill," said Pappas.

A major factor is the impact Senate Bill 2 will have on municipalities and counties.

The Solid Waste Act will eventually replace current EID regulations. It includes timetables for meeting recycling goals and for developing an integrated solid waste management plan, said Dave Duran, of the state EID office.

For example, by 1995 25 percent of solid waste should be recycled and by 2000, 50 percent should be recycled, said Duran.

The Solid Waste Act also encourages regional landfills. Geologic and hydrologic surveys indicate that several areas throughout the state are suitable for large regional landfills that will not pose a serious threat to groundwater, said Duran.

Maps presented by Massey and Frazier indicate such suitable areas exist in the north and extreme western portions of Lincoln

County.

Economics is a primary reason for regional landfills. Communities with populations less than 3,000 can expect to pay between \$26 and \$96 per ton for solid waste disposal, while operations serving a population more than 100,000 can expect the cost to be between 20 cents and \$9 a ton, said Duran.

The Solid Waste Act provides for gross receipts collections to fund solid waste disposal, but the amount Lincoln County is able to generate may not be enough, said Pappas.

If the county and all its municipalities pooled together their gross receipts, about \$125,740 can be generated.

This alone will not cover the development costs of a Class A landfill in Lincoln County even if the site is ideally located, said Lynn Stokes of Joab, Inc., a solid waste disposal enterprise.

The county still has its mill levy monies available from a tax passed this fiscal year for solid waste dis-

posal. The monies have not been used at all, said Petty.

According to figures Stokes presented, it would cost about \$195,000 to develop a Class A landfill on a site not requiring a synthetic or clay liner. Annual operations of the same site could be expected to run about \$262,500.

If a site, because of geology or

hydrology, requires a liner to protect from potential groundwater pollution, the development and operations costs go up substantially.

By October, EID will have the new management plan developed, which will increase the amount of paperwork demanded of the counties, said Duran.

Local governments will be required to submit descriptions of how solid waste is generated and how it is expected in the future, the quantity of solid waste now and in the future, the composition of the waste, and what composting and recycling programs are being conducted.

This paperwork will be required to be eligible for grants, said Duran.

In any event, local officials appear willing to work together to solve the problem. And everyone agrees the days of cheap garbage disposal are over.

Economics vs. the environment What shall we do with all that trash?

More garbage is generated every year, while there's less land to dump it in.

Solid waste has been a major media topic since early last year, and while some New Mexicans are tiring of the issue, important facts are emerging that will impact every person in the country.

We've learned that how solid waste disposal is managed will have a direct impact on groundwater quality in the state and that the amount of solid waste generated will have to be reduced.

"Water is life to New Mexico," states the background report for the sixth Town Hall meeting sponsored by New Mexico First. "Currently, 87 percent of the state's population relies on groundwater for water supply and 83 percent use public systems."

LEE ACRES LANDFILL

Mismanagement of a landfill operation can spell disaster for a community's water supply. As far as the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is concerned, all landfills will leak eventually. A glaring example is the Lee Acres landfill near Farmington.

In 1985 the National Guard sealed off access to the Lee Acres landfill after a caretaker was burned on the face and hands by unknown gases emanating from the lagoons. An investigation at the site discovered local businesses from Farmington and Bloomfield had been dumping industrial solvents there for at least five years.

Further tests discovered the contamination moved off the site that was operated by San Juan County under a lease from the Bureau of Land Management (BLM). The plume of contamination invaded the groundwater supply of a nearby subdivision, resulting in 12 families being placed on municipal water supplies.

The EPA is considering the Lee Acres landfill for the National Priorities List, making it a Superfund site, but the EPA is locked into a battle with the BLM which doesn't consider the site a serious enough health threat for Superfund designation.

The cost to clean up the site and the groundwater supplies is estimated between \$2 million and \$6 million.

EID REGULATIONS

New regulations governing the operation of landfills in New Mexico were announced in May 1989. Developed by the state Environmental Improvement Board (EIB) and enforced by the Environmental Improvement Division (EID), the regulations were designed to protect groundwater resources.

Local governments and municipalities that had been operating local landfills realized a hefty price tag was attached to compliance with the new regulations which led to 108 landfills closing before the regulations took effect.

Prior to the new regulations there were, for all practical purposes, no regulations overseeing landfills. What went on at some of these now closed landfills before the regulations is unknown in many cases. The impacts are yet to be realized.

In Lincoln County, the landfill jointly operated by the county and the Village of Ruidoso on Fort Stanton mesa was closed in early May 1989. Part of the reason was poor management techniques at the site led to a shortened useful lifespan of the facility.

SOURCE REDUCTION & RECYCLING

New Mexicans generate household garbage at about four pounds a day, slightly more than the national average of three and one-half pounds each day. This generation rate is expected to increase by 20-25 percent by the year 2000.

Source reduction and resource recovery (recycling) will have to be seriously considered, states the Town Hall background report. Some local governments are already taking action.

Albuquerque has had a city-wide recycling program for some time but its future isn't certain. A large portion of the program was to be funded by recycling aluminum cans, but consumers tended to recycle the aluminum on



their own and gave to the city only those recyclables that do not generate as much income, such as newsprint, plastics and glass.

Durango, Colorado, recently began a new recycling program and experienced a 33 percent participation rate the first week.

Suffolk County, New York, passed a resolution prohibiting the sale of many polystyrene foam products within that county. Polystyrene foam comprises a significant amount of the bulk in household garbage and its production is linked to the depletion of atmospheric ozone. And Denver, Colorado, is considering its own ordinance similar to the one passed by Suffolk County.

By showing greater discretion in the purchase of various products, a significant reduction in non-degradable materials going into landfills can be achieved.

For example, bleaching paper with chlorinated compounds forms dioxin, a known carcinogen and considered one of the most deadly chemicals known to man. When bleached paper is landfilled, the minute levels of dioxin have an opportunity to collect into larger volumes, posing a threat to groundwater. Simply avoiding bleached papers helps a great deal.

While there are certain short term costs to recycling, the long-term benefits are enormous.

Recycling one ton of scrap steel prevents the production of 200 pounds of air pollutants, 100 pounds of water pollutants, about three tons of mining waste, and saves 25 percent of the water used. The use of one ton of recycled paper as opposed to virgin paper saves 17 trees. And the production of recycled paper results in 74 percent less air pollution and 35 percent less water pollution than the production of virgin paper.

Also, according to the EPA, the process of de-inking paper for recycling is cleaner than the process to produce virgin paper.

Significant recycling can be achieved. During World War II the country recycled 25 percent of its waste stream. The amount today is paltry in comparison.

Nationwide, only 10 percent of the waste stream is recycled, and New Mexicans recycle only about three percent of a volume that is potentially 75 to 80 percent recyclable, according to the EID.

In Japan residents in some cities are required to separate household trash into 20 categories and a total 50 percent of municipal waste is recycled.

By volume, paper comprises 50 percent of all solid waste and 40 percent of the weight. Plastic, glass and metal take up another 30 percent by volume, but only eight to nine percent by weight.

Currently, any attempts at recycling are largely voluntary. But considering a population of 10,000 consumes one acre of land in a landfill each year, recycling may become law in many municipalities.

REGIONALIZATION & PRIVATIZATION

Regionalization of landfills is an option considered by many local governments, and is a technique encouraged by the new EID regulations.

The larger the operation, the lower the costs to consumers. Presently, the average cost

for collection and disposal in New Mexico ranges from \$6 to \$15 each month. This is expected to increase to \$12 to \$18 each month for a household of five.

While residents may complain of the eventual high cost of solid waste disposal, the Bureau of Business and Economic Research predicts the costs will eventually save \$14 to \$18 million each year in terms of reduced drinking water pollution.

Some cost savings can be realized by increasing an operation's size; hence the favoritism toward regional landfills. But some counties may be unwilling to give up local control of waste disposal, which also raises questions about privatization.

Currently there are 12 privately operated landfills in New Mexico. The operators cite lowered costs and more efficient collection as benefits to privatization.

But the risk of a de facto monopoly created through privatization is one some government officials may be unwilling to take. While utility rates are regulated by the Public Service Commission, there is no regulatory body or legislation controlling collection rates charged by private solid waste operators.

LITTER

"Public awareness campaigns have been ongoing for many years," states the Town Hall report. "Unfortunately, people still litter and alternative solutions to this continuing insult must be sought."

More than \$545,000 was spent for litter pick-up along New Mexico highways during fiscal year 1988-89. That involved about 41,000 labor hours.

Most penalties for littering throughout the state are lenient; however, Lincoln County recently passed an ordinance that provides for stiff penalties for convictions of illegal dumping. Littering along New Mexico highways is presently a petty misdemeanor with a maximum fine of \$500 and up to six months in jail.

Many states have passed bottle bills, the most famous being the Oregon bottle bill passed in 1972. After Oregon enacted its bottle legislation, which required a deposit on non-returnable beverage bottles, roadside litter was reduced by 39 percent by item count and by 47 percent by volume after the second year.

A study in Iowa after that state passed its own bottle bill in 1979 showed a 76 percent reduction in roadside trash during the first year of implementation.

"Littering represents a blatant mismanagement of solid waste and total disregard for the environment at the individual level," states the background report.

Attempts to pass bottle legislation in New Mexico and in neighboring Arizona have failed, partly because of strong lobbying by the recycling industry which claims jobs are lost.

MINING WASTE

Mining is an important industry in New Mexico in spite of fluctuations in the market. Mineral production amounted to more than two million tons of material valued at \$570 million in 1988. Severance and excise taxes reaped by the state from this industry came to more than \$2.3 million dollars in 1987.

But the lack of state reclamation laws has allowed the industry to leave behind massive piles of waste material that have been, and are still, polluting both ground and surface water.

Unless a mining company or individual operates on federal land or under federal lease, there are no laws requiring operators of non-coal mining activities to remove waste materials or reclaim the land after operations cease.

New regulations are being considered by the Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department in New Mexico that hope to encompass all mining operations not now covered by existing laws.

But unless these laws are enforced and mining activities supervised, slipshod operators can still get away with contaminating water sources.

New Mexico's air is another asset being threatened. Issues surrounding air pollution will be addressed in the next article in this series.



It's planting weather Or then again, is it?

The sunny warm days of April, with the greening grass, blooming fruit trees and explosion of dandelions, inevitably stirs the instincts of Ruidoso gardeners, but weather records strongly indicate that caution should be used.

Ruidoso temperature records since 1947 support the idea that these days would be better used preparing your garden for later planting, attacking the dandelions, or fertilizing your lawn.

Killing freezes and spring thunderstorms with the chance of hail remain a definite possibility in our unique mountain village. Both have decimated most of our fruit blossoms and early gardening attempts during the last two years.

The average date of our last spring freeze is June 3, and there is a 10 percent chance that it could freeze as late as June 28. In 1974, 31 degrees was recorded on July 24, and in 1978 it froze on August 7.

indicates a warmer than average MAY and JUNE. The outlook issued April 15, is somewhat more favorable indicating above average precipitation over most all of New Mexico for the 30-day period through May 15. It also predicts temperatures near to a little below normal for Southeastern New Mexico which can be interpreted as an indication that freezing is possible into the latter half of May 1990.

Regardless of the weather outlook, following is an adaptation of "The Old Farmer's Almanac Lunar Planting Guide for 1990."

It recommends the planting of corn, spinach and other leafy bolting vegetables between April 24 and May 1, with the best dates of April 25 and 26. If you are a gambler, you might try planting your peas and beans between May 1 and May 9; the best days are May 8 and 9. Conservative almanac gardeners will wait until the period of May 31 to June 8, the best days are June 4, 5 and 6.

The Almanac also recommends the planting of below-ground crops such as beets, carrots and potatoes between May 9 and 17, best on the 13th and 14th; also between June 8 and 15, best on the 9th, 10th and 11th.


If you are dedicated to the influence of the moon, do not plant anything between April 18th to the 24th, May 17th to the 24th, and between June 15 and 22.

Considering all of the greenhouse publicity, perhaps we should just begin planting when our backs can take it, and hope for a long, mild and wet season.

Since the average date of the first fall freeze is September 19, our normal freeze-free growing season lasts 107 days. Since 1979, it has been 118 days with the longest 141 days in 1963, when the last spring freeze occurred on May 13, and the first of the fall was not until October 1. 1989 was the second longest with 140 days of above 31 degree temperatures.

Ruidoso's average minimum temperature since 1947 is 32 degrees or below through May 11, a record 11 degrees was measured on May 8, 1975.

On the optimistic side: the National Weather Service Extended Weather Outlook issued April 1, in-

Warriors qualify for state meet

The Ruidoso Warriors boys and girls track teams took a couple of steps closer to the state track meet on Friday with some qualifying performances at the Artesia Track Meet.

The boys 400-meter relay team of James Atwood, Chris Torres, Ryan Kerr and Jose Marquez finished third at the meet with a time of 44.41 seconds, which qualifies the team for state. Atwood was substituting for senior Ira Sago who Coach Ronny Maskew held out another week because of a leg injury he sustained in the 100-meter dash during last week's Ruidoso Triangular Track Meet.

In other running events at Artesia, freshman Eric Evans finished fourth in the 110-meter high hurdles with a time of 16.9. Jose Marquez finished fourth in the 200-meter dash with a 23.23. In the 3,200-meter run, Ruidoso had two runners place. Nick Nanz was fourth with a time of 10:43 and Gilbert Kayitah was fifth with a time of 10:58.

The boys 800-meter relay team of Chris Torres, Shane Wells, Steve Dankert and Jose Marquez was third with a time of 1 minute 35.2 seconds. The 1,600-meter medley relay team of James Welch, John Perkins, Rick Ragsdale, and Eric Evans finished fifth with a time of 4:06.

Steve Dankert was the only Warrior boy to place in the field events. He finished second in the javelin with a throw of 156 feet.

Coach Maskew said both James Atwood and Ryan Wright had their personal bests during the meet. Atwood cleared 11-8 in the pole vault and Wright threw the javelin 139 feet.

Overall the boys team finished fifth out of a six-team field.

The Warrior girls continue to improve and placed second out of a six-team field. Lovington was first with 112 points, Ruidoso second with 94 and Goddard a distant third with 33 points.

In the field events, senior Chantel Bowen qualified for the state track meet by winning the high jump with a leap of 5-2. She also finished third in the long jump with a jump of 14-9.

Freshman Monica Martinez was the other Warrior girl to place in the field events. She finished fourth in the shot put with a throw of 30-6.

In the running events, the girls 400-meter relay team of Missy Gosdin, Nanette Boyd, Natasha Mulqueen and Rachelle Holstein finished second

with a time of 52.72. The girls were just one-hundredth of a second behind first place Lovington.

In the 100-meter hurdles, Chantel Bowen was first with a time of 16.47, while her teammate Missy Gosdin was second with a 16.53. Both qualified for the state track meet. Sophomore Betsy Cull ran her best time of the year in the race, finishing sixth with a 17.54.

In the 100-meter dash, Rachelle Holstein was fourth with a time of 13.59. Nanette Boyd was fifth with a time of 13.63 and Adell Caranta was sixth with a 16.68.

Amy Wishard ran her best time of the year in finishing second in the 400-meter dash. Wishard ran a time of 63.77, while her teammate Catrina Gabaldon was third with a 64.05.

Missy Gosdin won the 300-meter hurdles with a time of 50.10. Sophomore Becky Benson was fourth with a 54.87.

Defending state champion Ardena Comanche won the 800-meter dash with a 2:34. Yvette Maldonado was fifth with a time of 3:00.58.

The girls 800-meter relay team of Adell Caranta, Nanette Boyd, Natasha Mulqueen and Rachelle Holstein finished first with a time of 1 minute 71.27 seconds. Holstein finished second in the 200-meters dash with a time of 27.70.

The 1,600-meter relay team of Boyd, Wishard, Gabaldon and Comanche was third with a 4:44.18. The 1,600-meter medley relay team of Kerrie Cumberly, Bowen, Gabaldon and Cristy Jacobs was third with a time of 4:44.18.

Sophomore Luisa Tam continued to show her mastery of the 1,600 and the 3,200-meter runs. Tam finished second in both events, qualified for state in both events, and set Ruidoso High School records in both events.

Tam ran a 5:41.81 in the 1,600-meter run. Her teammate Yvette Maldonado was fifth with a 6:39. Tam then went on to shatter the school record by 23 seconds in the 3,200-meter run with a time of 12:11.18.

"She ran by far the best times she's ever run in the 1,600 and 3,200," said Maskew.

Coach Maskew said both the boys and the girls teams showed some improved performances. He said the Warriors got a lot more people into the finals of the Artesia meet than they have in past meets.

The whirrrrrrr of speeding bicycle wheels filled Midtown Saturday as more than 100 cyclists sped through town during the first Tour de Ruidoso bicycle race.

By the time the final race started, 109 racers from 30 cities in the United States, Mexico and Canada had registered for the MainStreet Ruidoso event.

Riders came from all across New Mexico, Texas, Arizona, Washington, Nevada, Wisconsin, Illinois, Juarez, Mexico and Winnipeg, Manitoba. The City of Albuquerque provided the most riders, with 29 Duke City two-wheelers. Team El Paso cycling club brought a strong contention of 18 riders.

Roy Lewis, 13, of Silver City was the youngest rider, Thomas Roberts, 44, of Roswell was the oldest rider.

Tour de Ruidoso was sponsored by Mainstreet and a number of local financial institutions and businesses.

Traffic along a stretch of Mechem Drive and Sudderth Drive was reduced to two lanes for most of Saturday as racers used the westbound lanes of Sudderth and the northbound lanes of Mechem.

The start and finish line for the races was at the corner of Center Street and Sudderth Drive, near the Mainstreet Ruidoso offices. From the starting line, the race headed west on Sudderth Drive and then turned north on Mechem Drive. Racers then turned onto Lower Terrace Drive and traveled down to Eagle Drive. Racers traversed Eagle Drive and then turned back on Sudderth Drive at the Midtown traffic light.

Members of the Ruidoso Police, the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office and the White Mountain Search and Rescue were stationed at various intersections throughout the course to assist local residents in traveling through the area.

Tour de Ruidoso consisted of six races with different age groups and cycling experience levels in each race.

The women's race began bright and early at 7:30 a.m. Molly Taubeneck, 26, of Tucson, Arizona, won the women's race.

Following the women's race, it was time for the juniors racers to take center stage. Racers ages 15 and 16, as well as ages 17 and 18, competed in the next two races. David Glass, 16, of Los Alamos showed everybody he had what it took on the two-mile course as he finished first in both the juniors 15 and 16 race and the juniors 17 and 18 race.

Cliff Loucks, 35, of Cedar Crest won the masters race for men 35 years and older.

Following the masters race were two races for the more serious younger racers. Ruidoso's Scott Pilgreen won the seniors category four race and Desi Brown of Albuquerque won the seniors category two and three race.

Race organizers had to do some improvising on race day when the race numbers didn't come in. Mainstreet director Mary Maul said they made their own numbers out of some convention and visitors packets.

Most all of the racers had nothing but praise for the race organization and the course itself.

"It's a tough course," said Tim Schoeny, the New Mexico District representative for the United States Cycling Federation. "A little too tough for me, but other than that it was a really good event." Schoeny finished third in the masters race.

Schoeny said the races went very smoothly for a first-year event and he credited cooperation from the city and good volunteers for the success.

"This is a good race course," said race official Galen Farrington. He said the racers liked the course because it had a lot of ups and downs in it, but it was not a hill climbers course.

Women's race winner Molly Taubeneck said the course was both strenuous and challenging. She said the altitude of Ruidoso was the only thing which bothered her.

"Being from the lowlands, the altitude was really hurting for me," she said. Taubeneck also said the prizes and the free merchandise at the race added to her enjoyment.

"It was a really professional run," Taubeneck said. The masters race winner Cliff

Loucks said the race and the course were exciting, although he admits to being apprehensive beforehand.

"I was apprehensive being it was two miles, but I was surprised it was really nice," he said.

The two-mile course took its toll in several places. Some of the racers from lower altitudes were out of breath by the time they reached the race courses high point at the intersection of Rowan Road and Lower Terrace Drive. The spot which caused the most problems for racers was a sharp right hand turn on Eagle Drive. After picking up speed on the long down hill stretch of Eagle Drive, several racers took the corner too wide and lost control in the loose gravel and grass. As many as five racers wiped out on the right hand turn. None were seriously injured.

Ruidoso Police reported there

were no problems with crowd or traffic control during the almost six and one half hours of racing.

After the conclusion of the final race, an awards ceremony was conducted at Ski West Center on Sudderth. In addition to a cash prize, the winner of each race received a trophy and a Tour de Ruidoso race jersey.

The first 20 places finishers in the seniors categories two and three race split \$1,600. The first 15 places in the seniors category four race split \$580. The first six places in the masters race split \$600. The first five places in the womens split \$400. The first five places in the juniors 15 and 16 year old race split \$250, while the first five places in the juniors 17 and 18 year old race split \$370.

Following the awards ceremony, Farrington was ecstatic over the

day's success.

"It ran flawlessly because we had a lot of help from people in the MainStreet project," he said. "The racers came, they enjoyed it, they're going to be coming back, the altitude, the course, everything was fine."






tect the water? That "extra mile" may seem unfair to Mr. Nosker, but there are hundreds of other people who depend on the unspoiled nature of the Rio Ruidoso/Hondo for their livelihood.

3) To date, there has been no formal action taken by the County Commission regarding Mr. Nosker's proposed landfill. If the present County Commissioners are asked to make a decision regarding Mr. Nosker's proposed landfill, (wherever it may be), Mr. Simpson may need to refrain from voting as I understand he is personally indebted to Mr. Nosker.

It's unfortunate that the public has to be exposed to these "hissing contests". I'm not sure anyone ever really wins. But so far Mr. Nosker has attacked the Bank of Ruidoso, the Sheriff, the EID, and now, Mr. Hemphill and myself. Who's next?

Governor says he'll call special session

The Governor Says...

...He definitely, absolutely will be calling a special session of the New Mexico Legislature after the June 5 party primary elections.

Sez Grinnin' Garrey, the lawmakers are just going to have to roll up their sleeves and do something about the high and rising workers' compensation insurance rates in this state.

Good idea. In fact a long-overdue idea. Let's, by all means, do something....But what?

Ah, Well, Therein Lies The Rub...

...For the Governor and Legislators alike. This is a hot potato, and not just for Democrats. (What? You mean you didn't think the sudden intense GOP fervor in a special session was political at all?)

The lawmakers have tried a whole lot of stuff, from cutting benefits to limiting lawyers' fees to revamping the whole claims administration process, over the past several years.

Every change just seems to give the insurance companies another excuse to ask for more money.

It's a puzzle, and one not likely to be solved by the I-Got-It! Folks...you know: "I got it! We need to cut the benefits for anyone left alive".... "No, no, I got it! We need to cut the number of weeks we pay out".... "No, I got it! Let's limit the doctors' fees and select the prac-

tioners they can go to"...

More Than Likely...

...The pinch will be eased by a combination of the above I-Got-Its, plus think about this one-Plus a state insurance fund to provide a little competition.

The Governor says, and he's right, that the high workers' compensation insurance rates are running small firms out of state or out of business.

That's because the insurance companies are refusing to insure most of the employers of 100 or fewer workers, not because of bad injury records or high risk, but just because they're small.

According to Insurance Superintendent Fabian Chavez, the assigned risk pool, which is supposed to be for high-risk employers, is swollen to more than three times the size it should be here in New Mexico, just because

there is no other for the businesses to get insurance.

But if there were another source...

Carruthers said this week...

...He wants the Legislature to consider only one bill—his bill—when it comes in for this special session. Sez he's personally having a bill drafted "out of state" (?) and that's the bill he'll put on his call.

It will be interesting to see how the guy thinks he'll prevent lawmakers from introducing other workers' compensation bill, once he's opened the subject....

Look For At least Two Other Bills:

1) The one being drafted by the association of Commerce and Industry, and

2) The one being drafted by former UNM Law School Dean Robert Desiderio for an ad hoc "Task Force" on workers' comp assembled by Speaker of the House Raymond Sanchez. Who is of course, a Democrat....

Final note: I'm told that the bill from the Association of Commerce and Industry is basically being drafted by a Santa Fe attorney who works most of the time for the insurance industry.

Probably I just don't understand all the exquisitely sinuous nuances, but - um - isn't that a little like putting the fox in charge of the henhouse? Just asking...


