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Council sets the stage for civic center

The Ruidoso Village Council voted Wednesday to issue \$935,000 in revenue bonds to construct and complete phases one and two of the municipal civic event center.

The council also authorized the architect to design the largest facility possible with the funds available.

It will cost the village 20 percent as per square foot for complete and construct of both phases of the civic center at the same time, said Mayor Victor Alonso.

Alonso opened the special meeting by discussing the village's plan to use the

funds available for the civic event center because so many things hinge on the building's design.

Councillor Al Jungge presented a proposal for financing the civic center through the lodgers tax funds.

Under Jungge's proposal, the village would issue \$500,000 in revenue bonds. The interest on the tax free bonds, based on a rate of eight percent per annum for 10 years, would be \$40,000. A \$50,000 principal reserve would be required. Annual funds of \$90,000 would be required to liquidate the bonds in 10 years.

The \$500,000 in revenue bonds, added to

the \$800,000 already in the bank for the civic center project, would give the village \$1.3 million to build both phases.

Charles Casey of Ribic and Associates in Albuquerque told the council pleading the bonds from the 1.35 state share portion of the gross receipt tax would enhance the salability of the bonds to provide a lower interest rate. He said even with the bonds pledged from the 1.35 portion of the gross receipt tax, they could still be paid from the lodgers tax funds.

Casey explained that by pleading the full amount of the 1.35 portion, it would give the village \$935,000 in revenue bonds.

The revenue bonds are against an existing tax, therefore there will be no additional taxes to Ruidoso residents. The bonds will be paid for with the 50 percent of the lodgers tax funds not pledged for advertising and promotions. Some money may come from the village's matching fund to the lodgers tax which is part of a building fund.

Mayor Alonso said in his understanding the village had a minimum of \$1.3 million and a maximum of \$1.7 million to spend on the civic event center.

The mayor and council then asked the rate center, architect, R41 Sabatini to

discuss what the village could afford to build within those two figures.

Sabatini gave the council a breakdown of figures for the 12,500 square foot maximum of the civic center. The cost of \$1,168 included the building, site work, site preparation, exterior site work, site lighting, construction, mechanical systems, site work, site general conditions, special site work, site work, project overhead, office overhead, profit, contingencies, and gross receipt tax.



According to Ruidoso meteorologist Bill Hostetter, the weather for today will be partly cloudy and warmer with decreasing chances of a few light showers, westerly winds to 15 mph by afternoon. Tonight will be clear to partly cloudy and a little colder. Friday should be partly cloudy and warmer.

Precipitation probabilities are 30 percent for today and 10 for tonight and tomorrow. Precipitation totals year to date, 5.42 inches, 1.12 inches above normal for month of May, 0.71 inches, 65 above normal for the month. The May snowstorm resulted in an lack of snowfall bringing the season total to 86.2, 7.0 below normal for the winter season.

The total does not include a \$91,000 operable wall system for the main meeting area. Sabatini told the council, he felt by going to bid on the wall system that figure could go as low as \$80,000.

He then reviewed with the council a series of figures for the construction of both phases at the same time. According to Sabatini's figure, the village could construct a 34,554 square foot civic center for \$1,703,923. Sabatini said this figure does not include any site work on the project.

Alonso asked village consulting engineer John Shaw about any additional site cost. Shaw said some of the additional site costs had been negotiated between the village, the golf course and the hotel. He said some things, like the percentage of lighting and electricity for the parking lot, and the curbs and gutters for the entrance road and parking lot, had yet to be negotiated between the three parties.

Sabatini told the council through discussions with the hotel people, they had said they would like a more direct access to the civic center from the hotel. He said currently there are service entrances on the north and south side of the center. He said these could be redesigned.

Mayor Alonso told Sabatini to leave the design the same.

"It's the consensus here that the civic events center is not to be for the exclusive use of the hotel," he said.

Sabatini then asked about where the exact location of the civic events center had been settled on. Alonso said the civic center would be located in proximity to the hotel with the distance between the corners of the buildings set at 30 feet.

Sabatini then asked about the exterior appearance of the center and whether it would look like the hotel. He was told by the mayor and council that the civic events center was to be compatible with the hotel but with a distinction of its own.

"If we don't have to match the hotel, we can save money," said Sabatini.

He said currently the plan was for the building to be constructed with a steel frame, a skin over that and then a stucco type system for the exterior.

Mayor Alonso asked local resident Dick Weber to speak about an alternate proposal he had for using prefabricated walls for the civic center.

Weber said there were certain steps in construction which could save money but he didn't feel this was the meeting to talk about those savings. Weber said he would like to address the council.

Weber appealed to the councilors to take the least expensive route in building the civic center and build the absolute optimum convention center for the money. He said this is a one shot lifetime building which has to serve the vil-

lage's needs for the next 50 years. He said, by necessity, we are having to build a civic events center smaller than our local Wal-Mart. He said with future developments, Ruidoso may need the largest convention facility possible.

"We have to believe in ourselves and believe we deserve the best convention center in New Mexico," Weber said.

After a discussion, Mayor Alonso said he would like to recommend to the council not to go after the minimum or the maximum amount, but instead plan for \$1.5 million to construct the civic center, with expected additional expenses.

Councillor Ron Andrews made a motion for the village to issue the bonds necessary for the \$1.5 million to construct the civic center. During a discussion of the motion, interim village manager Leon Eggleston told the council he would recommend issuing bonds to bring the amount up to \$1.7 million because there are always extra expenses involved in construction.

Andrews amended his motion to state that the village would issue \$935,000 in revenue bonds for the construction of the civic events center. The motion carried unanimously.

Casey indicated to the council Riley and Associates would customize the bonds at whatever interest rate and however many years to make the village annual debt service on them \$90,000.

Andrews then made the motion to instruct Sabatini to build the largest building possible for \$15 million, instructed him to work with Weber and other individuals to accomplish this. This motion also carried unanimously.

Economic Development Advisory Board member Bill Hirschfeld reminded the council that even though they may have the largest building possible, they don't have any furnishings. He also said the advertising committee of the Chamber of Commerce felt it would take an additional \$80,000 to \$100,000 to promote conventions in Ruidoso and not have to cut existing promotions for tourism and visitors.

Alonso told Hirschfeld that he did have a good answer to his concern. He said the additional \$200,000 would be used to handle problems and that if any is left over, it could be used for purchasing furnishings.

During the meeting, the councilors also approved the final plat for the hotel and civic center site as 12.334 acres. According to planning administrator Cleatus Richards, the additional acreage over the original 11.8 acres came about as a result of negotiations between the village, the hotel and golf course.

The councilors also unanimously approved a motion to amend and renegotiate the village's architectural contract with Sabatini. The architectural firm will have to do some extra work in taking the civic center design past the schematic stage.

designed to provide the best of known educational experiences.

"My attitude is aggressive toward effective and efficient curriculum development. The structure must be supportive, and all parties that have a vested interest must be included in such components as needs assessment, ranked needs, goals, activities, budgets and evaluations.

"Education of children is much too important to be left in the hands of a few. Parental involvement is to be protected and cherished.

"My administrative philosophy, succinctly stated, is that the superintendent of schools is an educational leader who coordinates, orchestrates and supervises the people and the resources that are made available to achieve the highest degree of excellence in the educational program.

The superintendent recommends policy developed in cooperative ventures with the staff and others. The Board of Education adopts policy and gives direction to the superintendent.

The professionalism of the staff is to be both encouraged and protected to carry out the educational program as approved by the Board of Education.

There is responsibility in school administration to make the most out of the limited dollars that are available to education. A structured plan that encourages input from those with an interest is an absolute necessity. The planning must be coordinated with the development of curriculum and staff.

LaValley lives in Shawnee, Oklahoma, where he is presently the

assistant superintendent for Shawnee Public Schools.

He earned a bachelor of science at Northwestern State University in Alva, Oklahoma, in 1972, where he also earned a master's in counseling in 1976.

In 1980, LaValley obtained his secondary principal certificate at the University of Oklahoma, as well as his superintendent certification in 1988 and Doctorate in General Administration this year.

He has been with the Shawnee district since June 1978, where he began as the Title IV C Project Director. Title IV is a federal project that provides money for Native American education. Development of the program is done with direct input from the tribe involved in the district.

From June 1979 to February, 1988, he was an assistant principal in Shawnee, and from February, 1988 to September 1988, he was the interim superintendent for the district. Since then he was the assistant superintendent for the district.

LaValley was an elementary school counselor in Blackwell, Oklahoma, as well as the head football coach there and a biology teacher. He was a science teacher and coach in Saint Francis, Kansas, where he began his career in education in 1972.

In Oklahoma, LaValley has credentials as a school superintendent, secondary principal, school counselor and as a biology teacher. In Colorado, he has credentials as a secondary principal.

He is a member of the Cooperative Council of Oklahoma School Administrators and of the Oklahoma Education Association of the National Education Association. He has also been a chamber of com-

merce member and is a member of the Kiwanis Club.

Gladden has been with the Ruidoso School District since 1973 when he began as principal of White Mountain Elementary School.

He earned his bachelor of science degree from Eastern New Mexico University in Portales in 1966. He then earned a master's in science in 1988 from the University of Southern California.

Gladden has done post-graduate classwork in multicultural/bilingual education, mediation training, special education administration, educational administration, curriculum design/development and participatory management in public schools.

He presently has a New Mexico administrative license and a New Mexico teaching license.

Gladden was the elementary principal for the Ruidoso district from 1973 to 1983, when he became the assistant superintendent. He accepted the additional role of middle school principal in 1988.

He began teaching in Ojai, California, in 1966 where he taught fourth, fifth and sixth grades until 1970. Gladden was then an elementary teacher in Portales. After that he was an elementary teacher and principal in Gallina.

Gladden listed as his professional accomplishments being the principal of the New Mexico Middle School of the Year for 1990, assisting with the district facilities development program, such as long range planning, bond issue election, mill levy passage, building design and development, construction supervision and building occupation.

He has also directed the development of kindergarten through 12th

Economics vs. Environment Hazardous waste is a threat to water

The Waste Isolation Pilot Project (WIPP) is at the center of the controversial issue of hazardous waste disposal.

The site near Carlisbad is being developed for disposal of transuranic waste from the nuclear energy and weapons industry and a small portion of a proposed transportation route goes through a corner of Lincoln County.

But hazardous waste isn't limited to industrial solvents and radioactive material. In fact, almost every New Mexico household has material that qualifies as hazardous.

Any waste that is flammable, corrosive, reactive or contains one of 17 water soluble toxins above a specified level qualify as hazardous wastes.

This includes household cleaning agents, gasoline, kerosene, white gas, household insecticides and herbicides as well as the other items more commonly associated with hazardous waste, such as industrial solvents, medical wastes and radioactive waste.

Irresponsible hazardous waste disposal first hit the public eye with the discovery of Love Canal near Niagara Falls, New York. This event, and others, led to the enactment of the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act of 1976 (RCRA).

The primary goals of the act were to define and control hazardous waste and its impact by prohibiting open dumping, promoting environmentally sound disposal practices, encouraging the reduction or recycling of toxic materials and to provide penalties for non-compliance.

Although many household materials qualify as hazardous waste, they are not specifically identified by the RCRA.

In 1985 the nation produced 266 million tons of hazardous waste. New Mexico pro-



duced about 8,000 tons of this total, with 43 percent of that generated within metropolitan Albuquerque.

None of this estimate includes household materials. The average household is estimated to produce between 55 and 60 grams of hazardous waste each week. There are approximately 21 grams to the ounce.

In spite of attempts by cities such as Albuquerque to devise and implement programs encouraging the proper disposal of household hazardous waste, participation is estimated at only one percent.

This means the majority of household hazardous waste is going into landfills or into sewer or septic systems.

The disposal of industrial waste is another matter. Worst case scenarios are most often associated with eastern states, but in 1979 New Mexico had its own.

That was when the Church Rock uranium mill tailings pond broke and released millions of gallons of contaminated water into the Rio Puerco, the only source of water for livestock for miles around.

The river was also used by local children for swimming and drinking.

The state now has 10 Superfund sites, one within Lincoln County at the Cimarron Mining and Milling site in Carrizozo.

At any given time, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is investigating between 30 and 40 additional sites for Superfund designation. The EPA is currently investigating another site in Carrizozo as a possible Superfund site.

"Proper disposal of hazardous waste is vitally important," states the background report for the sixth Town Hall meeting sponsored by New Mexico First and Phelps Dodge Corporation. "Lapses that occurred in the past must not be repeated."

The WIPP site has generated so much controversy largely because one side contends the site will not represent proper disposal of radioactive waste.

The Environmental Improvement Board recently extended the deadline for public comment on the proposed transportation routes to WIPP.

Thursday, May 17, is the new deadline for written comments submitted to the Environmental Improvement Board, 1190 St. Francis Drive, Room S.4100, Santa Fe, NM 87503.

Most of the material to be deposited at WIPP is called "contact-handled" material because it can be handled by crew members without additional shielding.

This is because the type of radioactivity emitted by the material is so low level that it can be blocked with a sheet of paper.

However, if the material is ingested or inhaled, problems can occur.

High-level radioactive waste originally considered for WIPP will not be deposited there and, instead, will go to a site in Nevada.

Hazardous waste will be just one of the topics during the Town Hall meeting.

struction than it did for the average.

Donaldson said the fees derived through the valuation data were a little on the conservative side and would probably be less than the actual construction cost.

Councillor Ron Andrews asked about some kind of wording in the ordinance to cover circumstances where the actual construction cost is below the valuation data. Andrews said in some cases the increase in a building fee, based on the valuation data, would be as much as 600 to 800 percent. Andrews said the higher fees would invite people who do their own work to cheat.

Planning administrator Cleatus Richards said that valuation data in cities like Roswell and Tucumcari are twice as high as the ones in Ruidoso.

In the end, the councillors told Richards and the commission to go back and work with the builder's association again and try and come up with an alternate system.

Councillors suggested a package of minimum inspections for a set fee. Each additional inspection of a construction site would cost an additional fee.

Donaldson said the proposed valuation data was needed as an interim measure until a new system could be developed. Richards said during this time, he would strike the good construction valuation figure and only use the average figure.

The council had no problems with the proposed amendment dealing with the requirement a mobile home or manufactured home moved into or within the village be placed on a permanent foundation or sup-

port system within 30 days. Donaldson said this would prevent someone from hauling a building onto a lot and leaving it there.

Councillors reviewed a number of new hearing procedures the P&Z must use in conducting public hearings as a result of a Court of Appeals ruling. They also requested the P&Z scratch a section dealing with required conditions of a variance.

Councillors told the commission to totally scratch a section of the proposed ordinance which would have allowed bed and breakfast homestays in a R-1 residential district, under a conditional use. Councillors felt such an operation might increase traffic patterns in a residential area. They also felt that there were plenty of commercial lots and areas available for such operations and that the village should not try and customize its ordinances.

Councillors also told the commission to scratch a proposed amendment which would have prohibited commercial vehicles and equipment or recreational vehicles from being parked in a public right of way or unimproved residential lot, and being used as a living or sleeping quarters.

Councillors felt the amendment would allow people to go after family members who visit relatives in Ruidoso and stay for a time in a motor home next to a residence. Councillors asked the commission to research other resort communities and find out how they handle such recreational vehicles in neighborhoods.

The proposed ordinance, 90-4, will be the subject of a public hearing at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, May 7, during the regular council meeting.



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



Oryx numbers are down

Oryx numbers are down on the White Sands Missile Range, according to an aerial survey flown a week ago by the Department of Game and Fish.

Mike Robertson, area game manager, said about 368 oryx were counted, compared to an estimate as high as 600 two years ago. He said the survey included most oryx in the area.

There are few oryx in the Small Missile Range area, where stepped-up hunting has lowered oryx numbers, as intended there. The Stal-

ion and Rhodes Canyon area have good numbers of oryx.

Based on hunter surveys and harvest data from the field, it is possible that fewer oryx licenses will be issued in the future, Robertson said.

Oryx in New Mexico are the only free-ranging herd outside of their native Africa. They were first released on White Sands in 1969, and thrive there. They do not require freestanding water to survive, and have no lethal predators except for regulated hunting.

At maturity oryx weigh 400 to 500 pounds. They have long, straight horns that can measure more than 40 inches on trophy animals.

The desired number in the Small Missile Range area was about 75; the estimated population was 200 three years ago.

In the last year, a few additional oryx have been shot by hunters during special depredation hunts, as well as during the regular seasons.

One Slick One eyes Kansas Futurity

Trainer Roy "Cotton" Barrington, a slow-walking, slow-talking native of Lubbock, Texas, wouldn't say mad if he stepped in a puddle of it.

Then again, when Barrington does talk, people listen.

Richard Parrish, of Meadow, Texas, is certainly glad he listened to Barrington at last summer's Ruidoso Horse Sales. During the sales, Barrington had his eye on one colt in particular, a powerfully-built son of Dash For Cash.

Unfortunately for Parrish, by the time the colt reached the auction block, he had already spent half of the \$30,000 limit he set for himself on two other horses.

"When the bidding got up to \$15,000, Richard quit," Barrington said Thursday from his Lubbock training center. "I told him to go ahead and buy the colt."

Parrish bid again, but bailed out again when the bidding reached \$20,000. Somebody finally bid \$21,000 for the colt.

"I told him (Parrish), don't quit now," Barrington recalled. "Go ahead and buy him."

In, quite possibly, his final bid, Parrish offered \$22,000. The colt was his, despite a price well above

what he had planned to spend. In retrospect, that extra \$7,000 was probably the best investment Parrish ever made.

The colt, of course, was One Slick One, conqueror of last week's Grade I Sun Country Futurity at Sunland Park. One Slick One's victory was no surprise. After all, entering the race, he had won three of four lifetime starts and had finished third by a head in the Grade I West Texas Futurity at Sunland Park.

The real surprise was that the victory was the first ever Grade I triumph for veteran trainer Barrington.

Barrington is pointing One Slick One toward the Kansas Futurity trials, opening day, May 10 and May 11, at Ruidoso Downs. The Grade I Kansas Futurity will be run May 27.

"He's nominated for all the Triple Crown races," Barrington said. "But I'm not going to say he's going to win that. This is a good horse, and with some luck, we'll win some more races. If he doesn't have any physical problems, we plan to run him in all the Triple Crown races (the Kansas, the Rainbow and the All American).

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County planners ponder Scenic Drive access

The county planning and zoning commission (P&Z) discussed for more than an hour whether or not to grant access from Airport Scenic Drive to individual private property.

Finding no other alternative, P&Z will recommend to the county commission that the fence along Airport Scenic Drive be cut to allow access to lots owned by the Greater Southwest Development Corporation (GSDC) in the Pine Point subdivision.

P&Z members want to make sure the action will not be interpreted as a precedent to allow anyone who wants a private drive or turnout off the new county road, said P&Z chairman Patsy Sanchez.

Greg Masters made the request for GSDC, noting the property had no easement or access since a replat was approved by the previous P&Z in August 1988.

P&Z also will submit recommendations for policy regarding future requests for private access to the Airport Scenic Drive, said Sanchez.

Member Audean Franklin abstained from the vote because she owns property in the subdivision.

P&Z heard discussion only on

the topic of a vacation of a part of Deer Park Meadows subdivision.

Bob Scribner made the request to return the undeveloped parcels of land back to pasture, taking them out of the subdivision process.

P&Z took no action, but did request Scribner return with representatives of the United New Mexico Bank, which owns the contiguous parcel that has platted roads from the subdivision.

P&Z also granted provisional approval to a replat of Tract 1-Block J in the Middle Cedar subdivision.

The approval was granted pending P&Z inspection of the area and approval of a septic permit from the state.

The P&Z reviewed maps prepared by Tim Collins which had public lands shaded in throughout the county, indicating those areas the P&Z has no jurisdiction to zone in the process now under way.

There was no report on an Attorney General's opinion yet regarding ETZ zones and property annexation by a municipality.

The P&Z also approved the minutes of the March 22 meeting as amended.

The Plant Corner

Graceful plant grows well anywhere.

DEAR SALLY:

Do you think I could grow Podocarpus in containers in the Ruidoso area? I have seen them growing in El Paso and love their graceful look. If you think we can grow them here, please give us some necessary growing instructions. I enjoy your Column, keep it up, I save all the columns in a special notebook.

DEAR Charlotte:

I agree, they are a most graceful plant, and also one of the hardiest I know of for almost anywhere. This particular Podocarpus (macrophyllus), is more tolerant of heat, drought and cold, but if left out on the deck or patio, should have some shelter from wind, hot sun, and prolonged deep snow. With common sense, the Podocarpus can be grown in containers both indoors and out, in pots or open ground. Generally narrow and upright, but limber enough to train to grow flat against a wall or trellis, also easily pruned to shape, (with lots of staking and trimming), screens topiarys and clipped hedges.

Outside, with proper conditions, this beautiful plant can grow to 50' high. With bright green leaves about 4" long. They are rather slow growers, but will grow for many years in pots. Inside they grow to about 10' high and the leaves will be lighter in color.

Soil—If growing outside, provide a raised bed to allow for fast drainage, which is essential for this plant, but will grow very nicely in

ordinary garden soil. Growing inside use my favorite mix of 1/3 sand, 1/3 peat moss and 1/3 regular potting soil mix, and I think best to add some perlite for faster drainage.

Water—Best with regular year-round watering system. Keep roots just slightly moist between waterings, never completely dry and never, never soggy wet. Let the water flow through to the drip-tray each time you water, let the water stay in the tray about 5 minutes and then promptly empty the tray and don't water again until the top of the soil is dry 2" or 3" inches down, this will leave a slight moist root system.

Light—Outside, needs some shade in very hot weather. Inside never place container too close to a west or south windows, or other glass that causes extra heat. This will scald the plant and stunt growth. Place it under sky-light or place a grow-blub on the ceiling above the plant to help keep the plant growing

up-right and provide even color.


Temperature—Indoors this plant's ideal temperature is a constant year round 55 degrees to 75 degrees. Keep away from heat-vents or other direct heat in Winter. It likes cool better than too warm.

Fertilizer—Feed established plants twice a year in spring and summer; wait at least 4 to 6 months before feeding newly purchased or potted plants. The podocarpus can grow years without being repotted, but overcrowded, coming out drainage holes and pushing out the top, repot in early spring before new growth starts. Use a 5-10-5 fertilizer cut to one-half label recommended use in pots.

Pests—Practically pest free; sometimes troubled by chlorosis in poor conditions such as, cold, soggy or poorly drained soil. Chlorosis is a yellowing or bleaching of plants and may be correctly by providing proper growing conditions as listed above. Propagate from stem cutting in fall. If you want a thicker plant do a lot of pinching off the tips and don't be afraid to give this beautiful plant a try, it is rather easy to grow and will give years and years of pleasure.

P.S.—I have three large Esiphyllums, orchid of the cactus, pink, red and yellow blooms, all are now in full bloom and a prettier sight you have never seen, come see for yourself, but you must hurry.

Retirees committee shares information on prospects

The Retirement Services Division of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce has announced that the 1989-90 program drew more than 5,300 replies.

Chairman Roy Crocker, pleased with the success of the program designed to attract retirees to this area, said the advertising and promotional efforts have brought in 10 to 15 new families to date.

The thousands of replies and requests for information have been made available to real estate agents through the Ruidoso Board of Realtors. Crocker said the program has resulted in real estate sales of several hundred thousand dollars.

The 1990-91 advertising appeared in March 1989 magazines, and more than 2,800 replies already have been received. Crocker said the responses are coming

much more quickly this year. Some confusion has arisen over distribution of the lists of names of respondents.

Crocker said the replies are being entered into a computer system which yields statistical information. Of the 2,800 replies, more than 1,400 have been printed on lists which have been furnished to the Board of Realtors. That board, in turn, has sent a copy to each real estate office.

A copy of the list is also on file at the Chamber of Commerce, and is available as a reference source to anyone.

Crocker said the procedure apparently has left some people out.

From now on, Ron McWilliams of Ruidoso Printing Company will print, without charge, several hundred copies of the lists. The first printing will combine the first four

lists released this year. That includes more than 1,400 names and addresses.

As the data entry is completed, more lists will be published, with a supply available at the Board of Realtors and the Chamber of Commerce.

Crocker said the lists are for the use of the persons picking them up, and not to be sold or circulated beyond the county.

In addition, the lists are used by a staff of volunteers to mail a packet of information to each person who inquires.

"This is a tedious and time-consuming task, and the retirement services committee expresses its gratitude to the volunteers who make the program possible," said Crocker. He listed a number of businesses who have helped make the program possible.

Once in this column I wrote about his many professional achievements, and got in the mail a short personal note thanking me for my "generous assessment."

If anyone else had written those comments I would think they had been too generous; but I know that no one in State Government can mislead Kate McGraw," he wrote.

It was a typical "gotcha" from Steve Reynolds. He paid me the honor of believing I would understand and enjoy it. Small wonder that note is framed on my wall... Anyone Who Wanted To Use Water...

...In New Mexico soon became convinced Steve Reynolds was a

real menace. I have heard his name cursed by acequia association members, golf course developers, white-water rafters, fishermen, boaters and pecan farmers.

According to each of them at one time or another, Steve Reynolds was the sole obstacle to their ditch/fairways/river rapids/lakes and trees getting the water they "had a right to have."

What they didn't realize — or maybe in their hearts of hearts, they did — was that Steve Reynolds was the reason we have water at all. And we will have it, into the future, because of him.

The environmentalists, whom Steve considered too sentimental about free-running water, thought he tried to impound and control too much of the Southwest's water.

Steve Reynolds Understood Better Than Anyone...

...That water is scarce and always will be in the desert Southwest. He also knew that what is necessary and scarce becomes a valuable commodity.

And in a capitalist society, a commodity that is not regulated for the public good becomes the property of the people with the capital to buy it up.

"Water," he used to growl, "will flow uphill to money."

Steve Reynolds kept the water flowing downhill for all of us.



PROPERTY TAXES DUE
Notice is hereby given that 1989 Property Taxes became due November 10, 1989, and will become delinquent December 11, 1989. Taxes may be paid in full by December 10, 1989, or in two equal installments, with the second half becoming due April 10, 1990 and delinquent if not paid by May 10, 1990.
Purquant to Section 7-31-50 of the New Mexico Property Tax Code, a minimum penalty of five dollars (\$5.00) or one percent per month must be charged on all delinquent taxes, and purquant to Section 7-31-49, one percent per month must be collected on all delinquent accounts.
Purquant to Section 7-30-53, property taxes are the personal obligation of the owner of the property and the sale or transfer of property within that tax year does not relieve the former owner of personal liability for property taxes in that year. Failure to receive a bill is not sufficient cause to ask to have penalty and interest waived.
Owners of personal property, such as mobile homes or office equipment, who have allowed taxes to become delinquent more than two years will be served with a demand warrant for collection of those delinquent taxes, purquant to Section 7-30-53 of New Mexico Statutes Annotated 1976, if delinquent taxes are not paid in full by May 10, 1990.




