Injuries, 'Cats wear down the RHS Warriors

In the season opener the Ruidoso Warriors stunned Artesia by returning the opening kickoff 99 yards for a touchdown with only a few seconds gone in the game. In the second game of the young season last Friday night in Lovington, the Warriors again received the opening kickoff, but the result was quite different.

Lovington lined up in a regular kickoff formation, but the kicker seemed to strike the side of the ball, which spun like a top and took a funny bounce when it landed just across midfield. The unintended result was the same as an onside kick.

The ball bounced off a Warrior player and into the arms of a Wildcat player at the Ruidoso 42-yard line. Four plays later Lovington scored to take an early lead and control of the game. The strange kickoff and the quick drive were omens of things to come.

When the long night was over for the Warriors, the final score stood at 42-7 in favor of Lovington, the team currently ranked first in New Mexico AAA football. The injury-plagued and depth-deficient visitors fought gamely throughout, but superior size and numbers, as well as a devastating Wildcat rushing game, proved too much for them to handle.

Lovington suited out 63 players, while Ruidoso had only 21 young men in uniform. Currently there are five Warrior starters who are out of action due to injury: Kief Johnson, Shane Eidson, Abel Montelongo, Keith Henson, and Ryan Wright.

Wright was injured in the second quarter of last Friday night's game. He suffered a neck sprain. He was placed in an ambulance at midfield and taken to the hospital for x-rays. Thankfully, his injury was found not to be serious.

Four of the injured players were two-way starters. This means that nine of the twenty-two starting spots on offense and defense for Ruidoso were filled by backup players Friday night.

The game statistics are as one-sided as the score. Lovington led in first downs (17-3), total offense (434-33 yards), offensive plays (77-39), and time of possession (31-17 minutes).

The Wildcats' ground game was awesome. They have a great one-two punch in big fullback Chad Rogers (a 6'0" 206-pound senior)

and speedy tailback Ricky Session (a 5'11" 160-pound junior). Both gained big chunks of ground behind a large and potent offensive line for the home team, which rarely needed or tried to pass the ball.

But this game was about more than statistics, size, talent, or even points on the scoreboard. It was about pride and courage in the face of adversity. The Warriors were outscored, but not beaten.

After the game Warrior head coach Mike Speck pointed out that, through it all, his players "never quit." He recalled the two second-half goal-line stands the Warrior defense made, one of which included four big stops after the Wildcats had a first-and-goal at the 3.


Speck was impressed by the senior leadership he saw on the field. He commended Steve Dankert, Jamie Candelaria, Heath Huey, Chris Salas, Chris Torres, Pierre Shield and Ryan Morgan for refusing to let themselves or their teammates give in to despair or disappointment or disunity, those companions of defeat that demoralize most teams.

As Lovington's lead mounted, Speck and defensive coordinator Lynn Weiland continued to exhort their players from the sideline, to coach in a positive manner, and to correct and encourage their players, who responded with gutsy effort until the game's final snap. In short, the Warriors lost, but they did so with poise and class.

After recovering the initial kickoff, the Wildcats gained 19 yards around left end on their first play from scrimmage. Then Rogers drove straight ahead for six yards, and Sessions gained six more on the right side for a first-and-ten at the Warrior 11. On the fourth snap of the game Session again attacked behind the right side of his line and found lots of space. He blazed into the end zone for the first Lovington touchdown. The good point after touchdown (PAT) made the score 7-0 with only two minutes gone in the game.

Huey caught the first Lovington kickoff and gained 8 yards to his own 28. A pitchout play lost one yard on first down, but on the second snap Warrior quarterback Manny Guardiola passed to Huey for a 7-yard gain. On third-and-four, Guardiola hit Jose Marquez for a 14-yard completion and a first down at midfield. The Warriors were on the move.

Ruidoso Council favors a "trash tax"

The Ruidoso Village Council, during a special meeting Friday morning, voted unanimously to implement a 1/16 of a cent gross receipts tax designated for solid waste expenses.

"We're on our way," said Mayor Victor Alonso after Councilor Al Junge made the motion, seconded by Councilor J.D. James. Councilors Ron Andrews and Bill Karn were absent from the meeting which started a half hour late after municipal clerk Tammie Maddox rounded up a quorum by telephoning Junge.

Both the county and village attorneys, John Underwood and Robert Beauvais, reminded the council that the New Mexico Legislature allowed for counties and municipalities to impose this tax to pay for the expensive rules and regulations established by the Environmental Improvement Board. When those regulations were announced, a number of counties and towns entered into a lawsuit asking the state to provide funds for the

required changes in landfill operations.

The Legislature responded by passing a law that allows counties to impose a 1/8 of a cent gross receipts tax and municipalities the 1/16 tax. Lincoln County and every municipality within the county have opted to impose that tax.

"We're somewhat obligated and reasonable in spreading this tax across the board," said county manager Nick Pappas. Beauvais said that the 110 entities in the lawsuit have all signed off on dismissing the case, mainly because of this taxing authority.

Although the tax is not subject to a referendum, the ordinance will be the subject of a public hearing at 6 p.m. Thursday, September 27, at Village Hall.

Councilors also heard a presentation from the mayor on the Solid Waste Authority plan that was approved by the Lincoln County Commission. After hearing from Mayor Alonso and county manager Nick Pappas, councilors authorized the mayor to enter into discussions with the county and

Alamo architects win civic center design contract

An Alamogordo firm got the go-ahead Friday to design the Village of Ruidoso civic events center.

During a special meeting Friday morning, the Ruidoso Village Council voted to hire Nolan and Associates on the recommendation of a selection committee that reviewed the 11 proposals for the job.

Mayor Victor Alonso advised the council that state laws require that actual negotiations and submittals not be made public. He said he and all six councilors graded the 11 proposals and then handed them over to the selection committee made up of the mayor, State Representative Ben Hall, village manager Charles Norwood and councilors J.D. James and Al Junge.

The committee compiled the ratings to come up with the top three candidates, and selected Nolan and Associates after the three finalists were interviewed.

David Smith and Jim French, of Ruidoso, and Leeds Hill Herkenhoff of Albuquerque were the other firms in the top three.

Alonso said a contract was negotiated for \$90,000 plus tax.

"As of now we have an under-

standing and an agreement," said Alonso. The council accepted that agreement by voting to accept the committee's recommendation.

"I think the decision was primarily based on the vast amount of experience the firm had in building convention centers," said Norwood. He said all three finalists were impressive.

Nolan and Associates is part of a joint venture with Garland and Hillis of El Paso, Texas, a firm that has been involved in designing that city's convention center.

All the councilors thanked the firms that participated in this, the village's third, search for a civic center designer.

The first time the village requested proposals, all were rejected. The second time, the village hired Holmes, Sabatini and Eeds, but later negotiated out of that contract and paid the firm a little over \$61,000.

Mayor Alonso said he'll meet with the architects Wednesday to help put together a program as quickly as possible.

"We'll give them their marching orders," said Alonso.

other municipalities over forming the county-wide authority.

Pappas said there will be a special point be a public hearing over the entire plan.

The authority, as described by Alonso, will have the authority to collect, transport and dispose of solid waste. Members will include Lincoln County and the villages of Ruidoso, Corona, Carrizozo, Capitan and Ruidoso Downs.

"It's for solving regional problems through joint efforts," said Alonso, noting that such group efforts are done all the time.

"The authority will be in the garbage business," said Alonso. And that will get the county and the municipalities out of the garbage business. He said the preliminary plans call for the authority to purchase the landfill and solid waste disposal equipment from the villages and county.

The Solid Waste Authority can be formed, according to state statutes, by creating a special district. The county already has set that process in motion. The County Commission will elect two com-

missioners, the municipalities will elect two elected officials and then that four-member special commission will elect a member at large to chair the chartering commission.

"This is the generic commission that will have the express authority to ... merge, consolidate or dissolve (the authority)," said Beauvais.

Ruidoso village manager Charles Norwood said this group will have nothing to do with the actual operations of the authority.

To explain why the village is so interested in joining in this group effort, Alonso used a chart that showed how Ruidoso solid waste revenues have remained at around \$600,000 for the last few years, while the costs have been climbing. The chart showed how the costs will surpass the revenues very soon.

The escalating costs are related to landfill fees, that Alonso said were born in 1989. Everyone agrees that the 60 cents per cubic yard fee being charged in Roswell will be going up very soon to \$1, and per-

County reviews transportation district

A public hearing to discuss a new ordinance defining a transportation development district will be one of the agenda items during a regular meeting of the county commission today (Monday).

The regular meeting is scheduled for 4 p.m. today at the commissioners meeting room of the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

The commissioners will also consider appointments to the board of the Lincoln County Transportation Development District which was previously created through resolution.

The commissioners are considering an ordinance to provide more specific guidelines regarding the powers and authority the local transportation district is to have.

Discussions of the district were first initiated with the commission by Dick Weber, representing the Iron Horse Railroad Foundation.

Forming a transportation district would assist in implementing an historical railroad in Lincoln County as a tourist attraction, al-

though the district board can choose whatever project it wishes to support, said Weber.

He told the commission the Iron Horse Railroad wishes to establish a "living museum" railroad line in the county, similar to railroads operated in Chama and Durango, Colorado.

A representative of the State Transportation Authority also visited with the commission to present more information on a transportation district, its powers and authority and the philosophy behind forming such districts.

Literature provided by the state representative indicated the system of the districts was created to meet the state's needs for transportation improvements.

"These needs may include the development of coal or other natural resources, the transportation of agricultural products or to transport passengers by the development of transportation facilities or projects," stated the state's literature.

However, when asked by commissioners how a tourist railroad can qualify as a passenger service

line, as well as one to transport goods and materials, neither Weber or the state representative could answer.

Also, a tourist line in Lincoln County would have very little in common with other tourist lines, such as the ones named by Weber.

The Durango-Silverton railroad, and the Chama-Toltec lines were both already in place as historical railroads before their conversion to tourist lines.

Any such railroad in Lincoln County would have to begin from scratch and would cost in the millions of dollars.

Presently, only one freight line goes through Lincoln County, the right of way of which is owned by the Southern-Pacific Railroad. The line runs from El Paso, Texas, through Carrizozo and Corona.

According to reports in newspapers published in Lincoln County during the early 1900s, a railroad line was expected to link Capitan with major routes out of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. This was to transport coal reserves which at the time were considered large enough to turn Capitan into a major coal

producing city on the same lines of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

However, by the time the railroad reached Capitan, the coal mines had shut down and the railroad line was later abandoned.


In order to finance the construction of a new railroad in Lincoln County, the transportation district would have the power, according to the ordinance under consideration, to sell revenue bonds at either public or private sale.

Revenue bonds are paid off with the revenues generated by the project, unlike general obligation or municipal bonds which are paid off by taxation.

According to the ordinance under consideration by the commission, the sale of these revenue bonds could not be done without prior approval from the county commission.

Earlier concerns about the transportation district included whether or not the district would have the power of eminent domain to acquire rights of way.

haps as high as \$3 by 1992, and even higher in years to come.

"Because of EID regulations, it's going to be much more expensive to get rid of garbage," said Alonso, noting that the Village of Ruidoso, on its own, would be looking at increasing fees or increasing taxes.

With the special gross receipts tax, added to collection fees and transfer/tipping fees, the authority is expected to be able to maintain the services without huge increases. The authority, by state statute, also will have a taxing authority not to exceed 10 mill.

Alonso described how the authority can work through the villages and other utility companies to bill for garbage collection. He said in the future, the authority would be free to buy a computer and do its

own billing. He also said the authority will oversee the exception/exclusion procedure that allows ranchers and some others to opt out of the service.

Among the many issues to be decided if and when the authority is actually established, is the value of the assets it will purchase from Ruidoso and the county. Alonso said three appraisals will be obtained on the village's solid waste equipment, and the authority will then negotiate a price and write the village a check. He expects that to be from a half to one million dollars.

"Then we'll have to problem of what to do with the money," said Alonso.

During discussions over the 1/16 gross receipts tax, all agreed that it is a fair and equitable way to pay for solid waste disposal.

"Everyone who comes to the county generates the garbage," said Pappas. "(This way) they're paying their fair share."

In discussions over the representation on the authority board that will be formed after the generic commission establishes the commission, Alonso said he's looking for about a 50 percent representation. It was agreed that Ruidoso produces close to 50 percent of the garbage and represents right at half the county population.

Another point that was stressed was the importance of continued cooperation among the various governing bodies. Alonso said once the authority is established, it will be important for all its members to continue until the organization is debt free.

The state representative of the transportation authority said only the state has that power.

The state also has the authority to issue revenue bonds to provide additional assistance with revenue generation for a particular project.

The district also has the power to hire appropriate administrative, research and planning staff to achieve its purposes. This means the district board will require a budget to pay staff salaries.

Revenue bonds would be sold and paid by whatever service was developed, but it is unclear how staff salaries will be paid before the issuance of any bonds.

The commission will also consider nominations to the transportation district board. This seven-member board was to be established within 45 days of the original resolution, however there were no nominations received by that deadline.

The commission then amended the ordinance to allow it more time to receive nominations to the board, with a minimum of 10 to be received.

Twelve nominations were submitted by a single person, Larry Goodman, who is the president of the Iron Horse Railroad Foundation.

These nominations include Robert Finley, Paul Vordermann, Ronnie Paulger, Gerry Jordan,

Richard Stegall, Ronnie Hemphill, Ernest Joiner, Nancy Radziewicz, David Harding, Pete Thompson, Paul Westbrook and Jerry Watts.

Chuck Rominger and Dick Weber are two others that would like to be considered for the board, although they have not been formally nominated.

Other items on the agenda include: —A presentation from a representative of the Bureau of Land Management.

—Final road acceptance at Mountain Lakes subdivision.

—A resolution supporting road construction on Highway 48, from Ski Run Road to Sudderth Drive in Ruidoso.

Escapee is captured in Capitan as a result of Crimestoppers tip

A man who escaped from the Sheriff's Department and the Ruidoso Police was captured Saturday in Capitan and is now in the Lincoln County Jail.

John Culley, 19, of Carrizozo, was captured at an apartment in Capitan through a cooperative effort involving the Sheriff's Office, the Capitan Police, the State Police and the Ruidoso Police.

Culley was wanted on two warrants of escape, a fourth degree fel-

ony which can carry a potential sentence of 18 months for each count.

Information on Culley's whereabouts was received by the Ruidoso Police, said Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane.

Detective Lanny Maddox of the Ruidoso Police said that information came through a Ruidoso/Lincoln County Crimestoppers tip.

Culley first escaped from the Ruidoso Police in March after being

arrested on charges of violating a judge's order. He was later apprehended by the sheriff on Friday, March 30, but escaped again when he ran from the patrol car at the junction of Gavilan Canyon Road and Highway 48.

McSwane said Culley claims he is claustrophobic and escaped to avoid incarceration. Jail personnel have observed Culley experience both physical and emotional reactions to incarceration, said McSwane.

Retiree marketing could be left out in the cold

Miscommunication and "a new game plan in Ruidoso" may have left the Retirement Services Division of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce partially out in the cold.

Partially because of an extra tight budget, the advertising committee of the Chamber didn't allocate any funds to the retirement division for advertising and promotion.

Roy Crocker, chairman of the Retirement Services Division, evidently has expressed his displeasure over the "oversight." The Chamber of Commerce board of directors took steps at a meeting Wednesday to rectify the situation if possible.

Last year the ad committee had an \$8,500 item in the budget for retirement services. The year before, the amount was more like \$10,000.

The "new game plan" mentioned by board member Ronnie Paulger referred to a new city administration and a change of direction on the Lodgers Tax Advisory Board (LTAB) which, to a large extent, controls the purse strings regarding

special events in Ruidoso and special events of the Chamber of Commerce.

The LTAB has made it clear that emphasis in funding special events will be to provide seed money for organizations which later will be expected to stand on their own two feet financially.

That philosophy apparently was part of the reason the Retirement Services Division didn't get funded by the ad committee.

Crocker did go to the LTAB for financial help and was allocated \$5,000 by that board. He has access to some funds from private sources and some matching funds from the state.

The Retirement Services Division mainly advertises Ruidoso as a retirement center in such magazines as The Rotarian and magazines which cater to retirement age people.

Jerry Watts, Chamber executive director, told directors that seven property sales in Ruidoso have been traced to the retirement division efforts over two years. Sales to those couples or individuals amounted to \$750,000. Also Crocker has access to water meter hookup information and has matched another three

names with those appearing on inquiries to the retirement division resulting from national advertisements.

"We have a problem. The problem is we have no money," Wall told board members.

A plan of action was devised after much discussion.

The advertising committee under Mickey McGuire, chairman, will be directed to see if it can come up with some token funds by advertising budget revision.

For any budget revision, permission under "the new game plan" must be obtained from the LTAB and ultimately the village council.

A delegation will go to the next LTAB regular meeting on September 25 and ask for a budget revision plus making a request for extra funds to fund the Retirement Services Division.

Lodgers tax funds come from a special tax on lodging within the confines of Ruidoso. It's expected that the amount of income from that source may have been underestimated for this year.

If so, the Chamber would like a piece of that pie for Crocker and his committee.

In other matters, the Chamber

board learned that the Octoberfest (Bavarian Bash last year) will be staged at The Barn on U.S. Highway 70. Board member Craig Rawlins said he recently gained a half interest in The Barn; he has donated its use for that Chamber special event.

Wall reported the Art Festival, a major Chamber fund raiser held in July, was a success.

Rain opening day and flies were two minuses mentioned, but, overall, he said, everyone was pleased with the event held near the Sports Theater at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

Income to the Chamber from the event is shown in a balance sheet as \$25,909. The Chamber rents booth spaces, concession space and has a drink and hamburger setup at the event.

Proceeds from hamburger sales go to a scholarship fund which approximates \$2,000 each year.

Greg Masters reported that plans for the Aspenfest are on schedule under chairperson Ann Bolton Underwood.

Emphasis this year will be on expanding the parade and generating more income for the Chamber. Fees for commercial floats and

political entries in the parade have been increased, Masters said. More bands have been invited this year.

He also said there will be a special fundraiser during the Aspenfest period. Aspenfest will be October 5, 6 and 7 this year. It is comprised of a number of special events including a chili cookoff, art show, street entertainment and other events.

Kathleen Michelena, chair of the Convention and Visitors Bureau of the Chamber, reported inquiries about the area at the Chamber are ballooning.

August saw 1,181 more persons walking into the Chamber office for information over last year. Telephone inquiries were 2,224 more than August of last year. Mailings increased by 82.

The Chamber is now open on weekends; this accounts for much of the increase.

Asked if the Chamber will be marketing the projected civic events center, Watts said he believes the Chamber will be the marketing agency. He said he feels the CVB is headed in the "marketing direction."

Board member Ronnie Paulger said he hopes the village council

has or will have in the future a "performance clause" in any contract with an airline.

Mesa Airlines, which was flying in and out of Ruidoso for 90 days as a test of boardings, reduced flights after an emergency landing in the area which damaged one of its carriers.

The village had promised the airline a subsidy if revenues fell below a certain level.

Board member Ron Andrews who also is a village councilman, said as far as he is concerned "there is going to be some serious contract discussion (about the subsidy)."

Andrews, principal sponsor of the Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally which brings thousands of bikers to Ruidoso, asked board members to greet motorcyclists opening evening September 20.

The rally is staged in the old Gibson building at the "Y" at Sudderth-U.S.70.

Mary Maul has resigned from the Chamber board; Valerie Miller, administrator of the Lincoln County Medical Center, will be her replacement.

County candidates visit Historic Board

Some county commission candidates were present at a regular meeting of the Lincoln Historic Preservation Board to discuss preservation issues that may be relevant to their campaigns.

All but one candidate were either present for the meeting or had submitted a statement in their absence.

Democratic candidate Charles "Chuck" Rominger III was the only candidate absent and who did not send a written statement, said board member Bob Hart.

Commission candidates present for the meeting included Democrat Bill Elliott and Republicans Stirling T. Spencer and Monroy Montea. Montea is also a member of the historic preservation board.

Democratic candidate Ralph Dunlap was out of town and Republican candidate Tommy Valliant was unable to attend, but both candidates sent statements to be read at the meeting, said Hart.

The board conducted an informal discussion with the candidates on topics such as certified local governments, budgets, pedestrian safety and building damage from speeding vehicles and interpretation of the Lincoln Preservation Ordinance.

Very few residents of Lincoln attended the meeting, said Hart.

No earth shattering statements were made by any of the candidates, but consensus seemed to be reached that "reasonableness" should be the guiding factor in enforcing the historic ordinance, said Hart.


One question that was raised was if Montea was elected, would he, as a commissioner, still be able to serve on the preservation board?

The board also heard a presentation from Buddy Guthrie, a representative of Otero County Electric Cooperative. Guthrie reported on the pros and cons of underground electric power lines.

The board is evaluating whether or not it may be desirable to bury future lines to help maintain the historical integrity of the area, said Hart.

Underground lines put in 20 years ago in the Alto area are now in need of replacement, said Guthrie. This information may or may not indicate the lifetime of underground cable.

Maintenance problems can occur with underground cable, especially if the contractor burying the cable does not do a professional job.



Mountain world responds to rains

The Mountain World Responds To Rains With Colorful Display

This is being sent to you just before noon on September six, and Mother Earth is smiling under a sky of blue and gray and white, as the clouds of yesterday's wonderful rains still float overhead in the Heavens above a Mountain world of shining green touched with flower colors of every hue.

Yesterday, the fifth, rain began in the early morning true to the promise of our old friend, the East wind which had been moving through the vale up toward the mountain for three days.

The rain was slow and quiet, sending the world into a dreamy lull with its pitter-patter tattoo on the roof and softly rushing sound through the apricot leaves. You could see the black and purple clouds up the valley to the west and hear the rumble of the thunder after the lightning flashes. So you knew that the rain was even heavier in the high country.

Toward evening the rain the clouds drifted away and the rain drops faded to just a very light shower, about sundown you heard the rushing sound that has given our river its name. You knew the river would be on a rise from the heavy downpour on high, and now the flood waters had arrived sending their soft and mellow roar through the river trees and

up along the hillsides, to be heard all the way to the tops of the hills.

The river was up, true enough, yet not nearly as high as you would think, and the water gap was still holding fast in the swirling torrent.

You could see the answer to the puzzle why the river was no higher in its flood, by looking around you this morning down by the river-side. The stream was down almost to normal. And all along the river bank way, the flowers and grass and herbs in greater abundance than I have ever seen them in the seventy five years I have lived here.

Mid summer and early flowers were growing side by side on stems twice their normal height, and flowers half again as large as normal. The gamma grass waved its purple banners fringed with golden pollen, sacred to

the Apache Indians, on stems two feet tall — twice normal height.

White clover was six feet tall, wild hollyhocks blooming on stems waist high; autumn goldenrod was shoulder high and some of the taller grass over your head. All this massed together in a green and flowery jungle of the mountain land.

The Message Of The Golden Year

What does all this mean — this vitality and strength of all the growing things in our mountain land?

The ground cover — grass, herbs, moss, bushes, young trees, — and the hosts of other plants that have sprung up already abundant at the beginning of the season — and have been added new strength by the best rains in many a year — all these you see, hold back the sky water to that it goes into the ground to replenish springs, and underground streams and underground water storage systems of all kinds.


At the same time, the flood waters are held back again helping the rains go into the ground.

It is five till one and the rain has arrive in the vale, traveling down from the high country. I need to take this message up to you through the glorious rain. Let us thank God for all our blessings.

The drive stalled, though. Three incompletions in a row brought up a punt situation, but when Marquez kicked the ball it hit blocker Guardiola in the back. The ball bounced backward, and Lovington recovered on the Warrior 20. For the second time in minutes, a strange kicking play turned into a golden opportunity for the home team.

Lovington wasted no time in capitalizing. Session gained 8 yards and Rogers rambled for 8 more. On first-and-goal at the 4, Wildcat quarterback Abrian Barela faked a straight dive to Rogers and handed to wingback Octavio Aranda for a sweep to the left. He scored, but the PAT was blocked by the Warriors, leaving the score 13-0 with 4:46 left in the first quarter.

The Lovington kickoff was fielded at the 10 by Chris Torres, the return hero in the Artesia game. This time he faked a handoff, split the defense, broke free, and rambled to the Lovington 35 for a 55-yard gain. It was a big play for the visitors.

On second-and-ten, Guardiola passed to Candelaria at the line of scrimmage and Jamie carried for 8 yards. A third-down dive lost two yards, so on fourth-and-four Guardiola dropped back to pass. He found no one open, so he broke straight upfield and appeared to have gained a first down at the Wildcat 25. But the measurement was short by an inch or two.

The Wildcats took over and soon faced a fourth down of their own. Though still on his own 34, Lovington head coach Jerry Brown confidently decided to gamble. Needing one yard, Session gained 9 for the first down. Moments later, Session broke loose on a 26-yard jaunt to the Warrior 19.

But the visitors stiffened and

stopped the drive on fourth down at the 16 as the first quarter ended. Then, following a sack of Guardiola at the 10, Marquez was forced to punt from his own end zone.

Lovington took over at the Warrior 46, but once again came up short on a fourth-down play when Session took a pitch on a halfback option and threw an incomplete pass.

The Warriors took over on their own 40. On first-down Guardiola hit Torres on a short 2-yard pass, but Chris took a hard hit and fumbled. Lovington recovered.

Once again, though, the Warrior defense held and forced the Wildcats to "go for it" on fourth down at their own 46. When Barela dropped to pass, Craig Turner put heavy pressure on him and forced a risky throw. Marquez stepped in front of the intended receiver and intercepted at the 35. He returned the ball 65 yards for a stunning touchdown that silenced the home crowd and gave the visiting team and fans something to cheer about.

When Marquez, subbing as place-kicker for the injured Ryan Wright, put the PAT through the uprights, the score was 13-7 with 6:31 left in the first half.

The Warriors had new life. Had they held on until halftime, the final outcome might have been at least less one-sided. But Lovington took a short kickoff and drove relentlessly downfield. A big reception by Chris Garcia produced a 29-yard gain to the Ruidoso 3.

On first-and-goal, Barela faked a dive to his big fullback and then hit tight end Paul Brown in the end zone to increase the Wildcat lead to 21-7 following a successful conversion run.

Ruidoso received the kickoff but failed to get a first down. Lovington took the punt and moved again into

scoring range. But when Barela passed from his own 25 into the end zone, junior cornerback Louis Jimenez intercepted to stop the threat.

The Warriors took over at their own 20 with 0:16 left in the half. But when Guardiola threw deep, the ball was intercepted by Brown at the 45 and returned to the Ruidoso 12.

With two seconds left before halftime, Lovington lined up for a field goal attempt from the 12. When a Warrior defender jumped offside, the ball was moved to the 7. But the snap was fumbled. Brown, the kicker, picked up the ball and ran it to the 5, where he was tackled to prevent another touchdown and end the first half.

When the Wildcats took the second half kickoff and drove to a first-and-goal at the 3, it looked like a sure score. But the Warrior defense, rested following the halftime break, rose to the challenge and stopped three straight rushing attempts. A fourth-and-one pass attempt into the end zone was incomplete. It was an inspiring goal-line stand, sustained by pride.

But Lovington held and forced Marquez to punt again from his

own end zone. The Wildcats took over at the Warrior 30. Session carried for 5 yards, and then Barela found Brown open in the end zone for a 25-yard touchdown pass. The PAT increased the Wildcat lead to 28-7 and frustrated the Warriors, whose goal-line heroics were so quickly negated.

A Ruidoso penalty on the kickoff moved the ball back to the Warrior 12. Then Guardiola was sacked at the 6. For the third time, Marquez punted successfully from his own end zone.

Chris Garcia returned the punt to the Warrior 20, where the visitors once again had their backs against the wall. Barela ran a keeper for a 15-yard gain to the 5. Then Session carried it in for the touchdown, raising the score to 35-7 with 1:19 to go in the third quarter.

Following the kickoff, sophomore fullback Wally Murrillo carried on a sweep for 10 yards and a first down. It was the longest run from scrimmage of the night for the Warriors. But a third-down fumble soon gave the ball to Lovington at the Warrior 40.

Fatigue had taken its toll on the Warrior defense. Aranda broke four tackles on a 27-yard gain up the

middle. A few plays later, backup tailback Aaron Alvarez drove in from the 2 for the final touchdown of the game. The 42-7 score stood for the final eight minutes of the game.

The Warrior defense was on the field for 77 plays. They never let up, and the experience gained by the sophomores will soon pay off. True to his philosophy, Coach Speck maintains a positive attitude despite the lopsided score. The injuries, while disappointing, have afforded younger players the chance to get extended action and have challenged the team's sense of purpose, he says.

The Warriors have not lost sight of their long-range season goals, and they firmly believe they can win their district race and enter the playoffs. And when the injured players all return to action, their replacements will have gained valuable experience against top competition.

A sage once wrote, "People who willingly risk failure and learn from loss have the best chance of succeeding at whatever they try." Warrior coaches and players understand this and believe it.

RHS competes in two states

Ruidoso High School athletes saw action in two states over the weekend.

The varsity and junior varsity volleyball teams opened the season at home by defeating the Artesia Bulldogs; the cross country team traveled to Brownfield, Texas, for a meet; and the varsity football team faced off the Lovington Wildcats in Lovington for a disappointing loss.

Head volleyball coach Jodie Blanton and her volleyball teams tamed the Artesia Bulldogs Saturday afternoon at Ruidoso High School. (Details of the volleyball game will be included in Thursday's edition.)

In Brownfield, Texas, the cross country boys placed and the girls placed fourth out of the 20 teams at the meet.

Athletic director and cross country coach Ronny Maskew was pleased with both his teams, noting that only 16 teams at the meet were able to score. He said scoring was limited to the top 125 among the 150-plus runners.

"Both the boys and girls teams did exceptionally well," said Maskew, noting the Ruidoso runners beat a lot of big Texas schools.

In the girls division, the girls were fourth place, with 177.

RHS junior-Luisa Tam was first. She was beaten by two girls, but both of them were college girls just running in the race, but not eligible for competition, said Maskew.

He said Tam beat the second place runner by 13 seconds.

The boys team finished third, with Gilbert Kayitah a standout at seventh in the three-mile course with a time of 18:02.

Other girls placing at the meet included Yvette Maldonado-27; Rachelle Holstein-33; Katrina Gabaldon-39; and Missie Godin-77.

Members of the boys team who were among the ranked finishers were: Kayitah at 7; Nick Nanz-21; Faustina Miranda-25; Jeremie Livingston-54; and Eric Evans-56.

Economic Development, By George!

What is economic development? Read on

This column, written by your erstwhile executive director of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County, is intended to be educational. Whether or not it succeeds depends on how well it is written and whether or not you read it.

Therefore, it is my intent to make the column as entertaining as possible, in the hope that you will indeed read it. If some of my comments seem irreverent or less than serious, it does not mean that I take the subject of economic development lightly.

Indeed, economic development is the future of this county. It is the business of every citizen to ensure that our children have a place to live and work that is healthy in every aspect. Quality of life, a clean and moral community, adequate educational facilities,

preservation of the ecology, a healthy business climate, and plenty of good jobs at every level of skill and education are the elements of economic development. To overemphasize or overlook any of these elements is to fail, because the result will be a community that is lacking in desirability.

Economic development is not: a new macassar shop on Sudderth, a rubber tire incinerator next to the new golf course, a red light district in the Upper Canyon or a pig farm on the lot next to the Ruidoso State Bank.

In the event that the reasons for the above exclusions are not clear, the following explanation applies:

The incinerator, while giving a certain aromatic ambience to the golf course and surrounding neighborhood might generate enough smoke to obscure all visibility of Sierra

Blanca.

The red light district would, no doubt, attract a certain kind of tourist and therefore fulfill the qualification of strengthening the business climate. However, some of the wives in town might give pause to such an enabling action by the Village Council.

It is equally true that when the little pigs go to market (going oink, oink, oink all the way) they will bring outside dollars into the county. Yet, the directors of the bank might wonder if anyone would come to their bank to deposit any of the newly generated funds.

Any plan of action to bring in outside dollars must be viewed in the light of its effect on the county as a whole. Will it block out the sunlight, smell to high heaven, or increase the divorce rate?



Lincoln County and the various municipalities within this county are taking steps to increase our gross receipts taxes to pay for the increasing costs of disposing of our trash. Lincoln County is implementing a 1/8 of a cent tax and the towns are implementing 1/16 of a cent taxes.

We don't usually applaud or thank our elected officials for increasing taxes, but in this case we do. We agree that their actions are in the best interests of everyone. They really had no choice. The Legislature, after allowing a state agency to impose strict rules for landfills, responded to a loud outcry by providing this taxing authority to provide funds to comply with those regulations.

Public hearings will be scheduled over the next two weeks, and we believe citizens should support this way of paying for solid waste disposal. County and local officials have opted to spread the cost among all the people who generate trash, that includes visitors as well as property owners, and we believe it is a fair and equitable solution.



Capitol Comments

Workers comp worries legislators, lobbyists

As The Legislature Swings Into Action...

...This week (well, it's a concept), the draft legislation to be proposed by the workers' comp task force has been improved.

The task force last week added a competitive state fund proposal to the bill and strengthened the medical review committee provision.

The larger newspapers have claimed the \$10 million state fund proposal would be financed by direct payment from the severance tax permanent fund, but that's not accurate.

The task force proposal provides for the state fund to be financed with revenue bonds. The bill would allow the state to buy the bonds with severance tax permanent fund money, but the bonds would still have to be repaid, with revenues from the state fund...

The Bill...

...Still is administratively costly, but it might make the system fairer and provide some competition for the private insurers.


In my opinion, the key is the state fund, and that's the part of the bill in most jeopardy. That's the measure over which the battles will be waged...

Speaker Raymond Sanchez...

...Was doing a lot of brave posturing about, "not allowing" any amendments to the bill, which is basically baloney. Whistling in the dark.

In the first place, it's not up to Sanchez to allow or not to allow lawmakers to amend any legislation.

In the second place, Gov. Garrey Car-

ruthers was talking about amendments HE wants even as he called the special session.

And if that weren't enough, the covey of lobbyists who've been circling around the task force (and who will be circling around the Legislature) is mute testimony to the fact that it ain't over 'til it's over, especially in the legislative process...

The Insurance Industry, Of Course...

...Can be expected to work long and hard to kill the state fund proposal, because that's a big threat to the industry's stranglehold on workers' comp insurance in the state.

Other lobbyists are there to make sure if any group has to sacrifice, it's not THEIR clients.

Thus, the chiropractors have a lobbyist. The lawyers have lobbyists. The unions, needless to say, have lobbyists. The employers have lobbyists...

The Governor...

...Says he's not crazy about the state fund idea. In fact, many business people are on the anti-state-fund bandwagon, and the curious thing is, it seems to be mostly ideological.

Or they've been bought. Quien sabe? It's just not good on principle, they say, for government to be competing with private industry. Too much regulation and interference in free enterprise, etc.

What's interesting is that many of these folk have been battered by spiraling insurance rates. They want government to bring rates down, but they don't want government to threaten their ideology...

Some of These Same People...

...The ones in the construction industry, for instance, have long used state government to keep tightening the screws on any new competition through licensing laws.

They've lobbied for and gotten in-state preferential bidding for state construction contracts — arguing, ironically, that the high cost of workers' compensation insurance in New Mexico makes it essential for them to get that break to be competitive.

Meanwhile, the insurance industry is one of the mostly lightly-regulated industries in the state.

What makes the insurance industry so sacred? Nothing that I can see, except its money.

And money can be spread around, especially in an election year.

Expect a lot of lawmakers to suddenly demonstrate an over-developed sensitivity to the sanctity of free-enterprise-system ideology...


