ATV crash kills rider

A Roswell man was killed Sunday in an accident near Baca Campground.

Shane Lancaster, 22, was pronounced dead at the scene after he was ejected from an all-terrain-vehicle (ATV) he was driving about 3.6 miles north of Baca Campground on Forest Road 57.

Lancaster, while going around a corner, lost control of the ATV as it went into a broad slide and struck a tree. He was thrown from the ATV.

State Police officer Michael Howard was the investigating officer and reported Lancaster was wearing a helmet.

Two other persons were riding another 4-wheel ATV behind Lancaster and sustained injuries when they also ran off the road.

The two other riders were with Lancaster and were wearing their helmets as well, said Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane.

The Ruidoso ALS and the Fort Stanton EMS units responded to the accident. The other two riders, also from Roswell, were taken to Lincoln County Medical Center.

In other accidents, a 72-year-old woman was shaken up, but not badly injured, in a two-vehicle accident Sunday on U.S. Highway 70 about two miles west of the Lincoln County line on the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation.

A car and a small pickup collided when the car hydroplaned on the wet road and sideswiped the pickup that was headed west on the two-lane road.

Sergeant Bill Hanson investigated the accident. He said Laura Cox of Roswell was the driver of the car, and she was cited for going left of center.

New Mexico State Police officer Mike Howard investigated an accident with injuries on Alpine Village Road. A nine-year-old boy, Raymond Smith, was injured when the car he was riding in collided with a car that went left of center on a curve.

The child was treated and released at Lincoln County Medical Center.

Construction begins on a new home for state Social Services

Ground was broken Friday morning, September 14, for a \$90,000, 1,500 square foot building to house the local office of the Social Service Division of the New Mexico Human Services Department.

Abraham DeLeon, who heads the division, said employees in the division provide an adult protective service for all of Lincoln County. For children, foster care and day care are furnished

along with informational and referral services.

The building will be on a lot, already partially leveled, next to the Fina service station on Mechem Drive.

The building is being built by Whitfield Enterprises of El Paso, Texas, and will be leased to the State of New Mexico.

Actual construction is by Eagle Creek Construction Company of Ruidoso. David Smith of

Ruidoso is the architect.

Completion date for the structure is mid-December.

The offices have been located further out on Mechem, but, DeLeon says the planned widening project mandated a move.

Mayor Victor Alonso wielded the shovel during the ground-breaking ceremony.

Feds indict local man

A Ruidoso area businessman was indicted Thursday by a federal grand jury on charges linked to the largest cocaine seizure made in U.S. history.

George F. Lore was arrested at his home in Glencoe Thursday and was taken to appear before a federal magistrate judge in Las Cruces where he was charged with 15 counts of structuring transactions to avoid federal reporting procedures, Lore told *The News* Friday.

Speaking freely, Lore said all the counts were the same but referred to different dates.

"I am not guilty," said Lore.

The charges, which were handed down by the grand jury in Albuquerque, stem from Lore's alleged involvement with Hector Tapia Anchondo, who was previously charged along with five others on charges of conspiring to import and importing multi-ton quantities of cocaine into the U.S.

After his appearance and arraignment, Lore bonded out for \$50,000, he said.

Representatives of the U.S. Attorney's Office were unavailable for comment.

Lore found himself in what he previously described as a "nightmare" after approximately 20 tons of cocaine were seized at a Los Angeles, California, warehouse.

The alleged leaders of the cocaine cartel, which apparently had connections with Colombian growers, included Hector Tapia Anchondo and his son Carlos Tapia Ponce.

Lore had conducted business with Anchondo, who purchased the Bear Ranch in Glencoe from Lore. Through this association, and one with Ponce's son, Carlos Tapia Anchondo, Lore found himself under the scrutiny of the Internal Revenue Service.

Shortly after the seizure in Los

Angeles, the IRS seized six properties in the Ruidoso area, claiming they were purchased either with drug money or with transactions designed to avoid federal reporting procedures.

These properties included a house Lore's company, Ruidoso Building Corporation, was building for Carlos Anchondo in Glencoe. Carlos Anchondo has not been charged.

Other property seizures include the Bear Ranch in Glencoe, a house owned by James Romero McTague on Hull Road in Ruidoso, other lots in the Glencoe area and a house and lot in Camelot Crown Estates.

McTague is also one of the defendants indicted in Los Angeles.

Although none of Lore's personal real property was seized, the IRS did take a Cadillac he purchased.

Since the seizures were made, the property has been forfeited. However, Lore has continued to maintain the house under construction and has filed liens on the property as he continues to dispute the forfeiture.

Lore said he was aware of the grand jury indictment. In fact, his attorney attempted to negotiate with the U.S. Attorney to allow Lore to give himself up. However, the U.S. Attorney's Office refused the offer and arrested Lore at his residence instead, said Lore.

No trial date has been set. The charges allege Lore structured transactions to avoid federal reporting requirements that transactions of \$10,000 or more must be reported to the IRS.

Lore has told *The News* that not all the transactions he conducted were in amounts less than \$10,000. Also, although he was aware banks are required to report these transactions, he was unaware a private citizen was required to as well, said Lore during a previous interview.

Dial 911 in this county and get a recording

Prime time television has tuned in everyone, especially children, into dialing 911 whenever there's an emergency. But if you dial that number in Lincoln County, you will reach a dead number and someone may die.

Several Lincoln County municipal leaders, along with county manager Nick Pappas, met Friday with a representative of the Department of Finance and Administration to learn more about the enhanced version of the 911 emergency service.

What they learned can make this emergency telephone service more understandable and more acceptable to Lincoln County residents.

The 911 service is available in many communities nationwide, and allows an individual to contact emergency services by dialing three easy to remember numbers.

The enhanced 911 (E911) not only brings you into contact with the police, ambulance or fire department, but while on the phone the dispatcher automatically knows the exact location of the telephone you're calling from.

This means a small child can dial 911 and not have to be able to tell the dispatcher where the emergency is located, because the address of the phone will flash up on a screen in front of the dispatcher's face.

Robert Gunter, of the Department of Finance and Administration, told Pappas, Ruidoso Mayor Victor Alonso, Capitan Mayor Frank Warth, Carrizozo Mayor Cecilia Kuhnel and Ruidoso village manager Charles Norwood that it is

the state's intention to have all of New Mexico connected to the E911 service.

To qualify for the service, local governments must pass a resolution opting in to the system. The next step is to have the phone companies add a surcharge of 25 cents to each phone line each month which goes into a state pool to purchase the equipment necessary for the system.

Gunter suggested it is a good idea to include another 25 cents in the surcharge so an area will have money available to pay for the trunk line installation when the system equipment is purchased.

As long as this 50-cent surcharge is kept in place and collected by the county, the money will always go to the state pool and any time it is needed for equipment purchases or for trunk line maintenance, the state will request bids and how the money is spent will always be accounted for.

If, after a system is in place and all trunk lines are installed, the surcharge is dropped, then the phone companies are free to raise rates to cover their equipment and line maintenance, said Gunter.

An E911 system in Lincoln County is preferred to be county-wide, with each community in on the program, said Gunter.

Two options outlined would have either two dispatch centers (one in Carrizozo and one in Ruidoso) or three dispatch centers (the third in Ruidoso Downs).

While some counties have a centralized dispatch, Gunter said more than one is better in the event major damage is sustained at the dispatch office causing the entire system to go down.

The Ruidoso Village Council at one time approached Ruidoso Downs with the idea of combining dispatches, providing a savings to both communities, but the offer was turned down, said Alonso.

Issues of jurisdiction over a community's own area are real issues and must be treated with sensitivity, said Gunter.

He suggested a board be created so that each law enforcement or emergency personnel is under the direction of the same entity in a combined dispatch area.

It is important to have every community involved in the program because if one opts out, then there will be no 911 service in that area, meaning a person with an emergency situation will have to dial seven digits instead of three.

To accomplish the E911 system, the entire county will have to have rural addressing, something the county commission has already begun.

When completed, dispatch personnel will automatically know the location of the phone and which emergency services are the closest.

Having 911 services available is becoming more and more critical, especially in light of the television series by that name, said Gunter.

But presently, if a visitor with 911 services in their home community comes to Lincoln County and dials that number during a critical event, they will receive a dead number that will continue to ring but without answer.

In other business, Warth, Alonso and county commissioner Rick Simpson met together after Gunter finished his presentation. The three elected officials selected state rep-

resentative Ben Hall to be the fifth member, and chairman, of a special district commission.

This commission's role will be to review and approve or disapprove proposal for the creation of a community services district for the collection, transportation and disposal of solid waste in Lincoln County.

Commissioner Karon Z. Petty is the other member of the special district commission but was not present Friday. She previously indicated her support of Hall selected as the fifth member and the chair of the commission.

The creation of the special district commission is one of the first steps to creating the community services district which local leaders have been discussing as a cooperative solution to the solid waste issue.

The members of the special district commission hope to meet as soon as possible, but Hall is presently busy in Santa Fe with a special session of the legislature.

Ad committee looking for funds to recruit retirees

A tentative plan to provide funding for the retirement services division of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce was outlined by the new chairman of the advertising committee, Friday afternoon, September 14, at a regular meeting.

Craig Rawlings, who was elected committee chairman after Mickey McGuire resigned as chairman be-

cause of "over commitments," told of plans.

The plan is tentative because all entities involved were not aware nor have they approved all details as of Friday.

The retirement services division was omitted from the ad committee's budget for this fiscal year because of what was called "miscommunication."

Rawlings said that under the proposal, the annual Connoisseur Classic Chamber of Commerce event in February would split its revenue between two local charities and the retirement division.

And the Ruidoso Board of Realtors will be asked to co-sponsor the Connoisseur Classic, Rawlings said.

Rawlings said the board of realtors benefits from such events.

The Lodgers Tax Advisory Board will be asked to provide some interim funding for the retirement division until income can be generated for that division in February.

The Village of Ruidoso apparently has \$10,000 in lodgers' tax funds which has been tentatively earmarked for "Ruidoso pins."

Rawlings said that fund could provide some advertising money for the retirement division.

The retirement division advertises the advantages of Ruidoso living in magazines which reach retirees of all ages.

Two representatives of Camp Enchantment, an annual camp for children with cancer, asked for the ad committee's cooperation in providing two days of care for such children next July.

The children attend camp at the New Mexico School for the Visually Handicapped, but branch out for other experiences. This year a campout for a week out of Cloudcroft occupied the children.

The ad committee voted to assist next year with finding housing and with planning special events such as a "jockey breakfast" for the 125 or so children who attend camp

Speaking on behalf of the camp were Donna Largent, R.N., of Albuquerque, program director for the American Cancer Society for the state of New Mexico, and Adrian Guerrero, volunteer director and detective in the Alamogordo Police Department.

Members voted to retain the present "900" number telephone service at the Chamber rather than switching to AT&T. They learned that there would be considerable cost to switch over to another company.

The committee voted to purchase a foldout trade show booth to be used to promote Ruidoso at trade shows. It will be taken to Albuquerque for a Ruidoso booth at the balloon fiesta in October. The Chamber is involved in other trade shows throughout the year.

Convention and Visitors Bureau director Kathleen Michelena will be leaving this week for a trade show in Monterrey, Mexico.

Don't throw that away! Recycle!

What shall we do with all that household junk and garbage?

This is the second of a four-part series on reducing the amount of solid waste one pays to have hauled off. The previous installment offered recycling options for the most common item in household or business garbage-packaging-in the form of glass bottles and jars, aluminum and tin cans, cardboard and plastics, as well as newsprint and scrap metal. This installment suggests utilizing local resources to re-use plastics, newsprint, food waste and household discards.

Jacqueline Bentley showed her receipt from the recycling center.

"Look, there's 136 pounds of glass that didn't go in the landfill." Bentley lives on several acres in Nogal and keeps 55-gallon drums outside to collect all her recyclables. What doesn't get trucked to the out-of-town recycler gets re-used, even supermarket shopping bags.

"I take those to the used paperback store or to the hospital's thrift shop. Nothing gets thrown away."

Turning in garbage for cash appeals to some area residents who, like Bentley, cheerfully truck their cans, plastic, glass and paper to either Alamogordo or Roswell. This has reduced by as much as three-fourths the amount of household or business trash usually thrown away.

But what about the rest? Food waste

accounts for about one-fifth the average family's trash — and more than that for a restaurant. Used furniture, appliances, household items and old clothing have to go somewhere, but it doesn't have to be the dumpster. These items can be re-used rather than recycled, but the end result is the same: the landfill is not filled.


Food preparation waste

Potato peels, wilted lettuce, table scraps and the like are among the easiest household and restaurant items to recycle. If they don't go in Fido's food dish, grind them up in the kitchen sink's garbage disposal unit or make a compost heap for the garden or flower bed.

To compost, simply take any organic waste-vegetable peelings, eggshells, coffee grounds, fruit rinds-but not meat scraps or bones-outside to the flower or vegetable garden. Cover the food waste with earth, freshly pulled weeds, leaves, grass clippings or pine needles. Add water and turn it over every week or so. In a few months the organic substance becomes soil conditioner, ready to fertilize garden plants.

Properly covered and maintained, compost has no "garbage-y" odor.

If one chooses to dispose of food waste via the kitchen disposal, be aware that this process can introduce solids into private septic tank systems. Over time, this may cause the system to need more frequent pumping.



Newspapers, used carpet, furniture, appliances and household discards

Instead of piling these cast-offs next to a dumpster, recycle them by re-using. Many local businesses buy second-hand items or clothing or accept them for donation. By utilizing these, a person not only saves space in the landfill, but also supports a local business or charity.

Bought new rugs, towels, or bedding? Give the old ones to the Humane Society of Lincoln County. Your worn-out carpet, faded towel or threadbare sheet becomes a warm bed for orphan puppies and kittens.

Don't want to truck your newspapers and plastic out-of-town? The Humane Society might use it. Yesterday's newspaper lines animal cages. Shallow plastic food containers such as margarine tubs become their food and water dishes. There is always a use for these items, says manager Randy Basch, because once a sick animal has used a product, it cannot be

used again.

The Humane Society is located on Gavilan Canyon Road, telephone 257-9841.

Both the Humane Society of Lincoln County and the Lincoln County Medical Center Auxiliary operate thrift shops to generate funds. Both accept on a donation basis "nearly everything, from clothing to household items such as dishes, toys, books, shoes, and so forth," say spokespersons.

Also, both accept small furniture, but only the Humane Society's shop, Kits and Kaboodles, accepts appliances, which must be working. All items donated to both thrift shops must be in good condition.

Kits and Kaboodles is a white stucco building on Sudderth Drive near Arby's restaurant, telephone 257-5463. They open Wednesday-Friday from noon to 4 p.m. and will open Saturdays if they can find a volunteer.

The hospital auxiliary's store, a Pink Shop, operates in a pink building at 140 Nob Hill Drive Monday-Saturday from 10-4 p.m., except Tuesdays when it is closed from 10-1 p.m., telephone 257-7051.

If you have furniture or appliances which you would rather sell than donate. Joyce's Junque & Antiques on Sudderth Drive near the Chamber of Commerce building buys them outright. Hours are 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday-Saturday, tele-

phone 257-7575. Items must be in good-resalable condition.

Mail, junk and otherwise

This is one of the tougher solid wastes to re-use; however it can be done. Junk letters, cut up, make scratch paper for memo pads, grocery lists, or game scorecards. Newspapers and correspondence can start fires in your fireplace or wood stove. Some wood stoves will burn cereal boxes and the like. (And one, the wood pellet stove, burns recycled material. More about that in a future installment.)

Clothing catalogs can be cut up for a child's paper dolls.

To best reduce junk mail that fills your box, cut it off at the source. Write to Direct Mail Marketing, Inc., 6 E. 43rd St., New York, NY, 10017 and request your name be removed from their lists.

Now that bottles, cans, plastic and glass are on their way to the recycling centers out of town, kitchen scraps fertilize rose bushes, and newspaper and old rags keep puppies warm, your household may be as trash-free as Jacqueline Bentley's or Nita Wheeler's from the previous installment.

But, is it feasible for you to transport these items to the recycler or thrift shop? For whatever reason, your family may need to join an organized group or neighborhood effort.

County economic development board supports Business Assistance Center

The Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County has passed a resolution which in effect supports the establishment of a Business Assistance Center in Ruidoso. EDCLC will sponsor the center.

Roy Seay, chairman of the business retention committee of EDC, outlined plans for the center and for setting up SCORE and ACE organizations in Ruidoso.

The presentations were part of a regular meeting of EDCLC, Thursday.

SCORE is a Service Corps of Retired Executives, while ACE is Active Corps of Executives.

Seay says SCORE in Roswell would sponsor the SCORE and ACE operations here.

Those organizations utilize the experience of retired persons to help people in business or planning to be in business who hit snags or who lack expertise in some areas of business operations.

The plan is to house those groups in space in a building on Sudderth Drive made available by Ethel Olson, who would act as coordinator.

The Business Assistance Center apparently is a separate deal. EDCLC would like to see it housed next door as an adjunct to EDCLC operations in the county.

The Business Assistance Center is a child of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District. There is a grant which would provide \$30,000 per annum for its operation in Lincoln County. It involves hiring a director.

These projects are aimed at

reducing a high level of business failures in Lincoln County, Seay indicated.

On another front, EDCLC board members heard progress reports from the president, Don Shaw, and executive director, George Puckett.

A one-man "dental wire" manufacturing operation at Rancho Ruidoso was reported. And there is a new business in the Stroud Building. It is Micrographics.

Puckett mentioned several "hot prospects" with whom he is working.

Mayor Victor Alonso queried members on their feelings about Mesa Airlines which just completed 90 days of a "test service" to measure boardings in Lincoln County.

EDCLC will contact the village of Ruidoso Downs on the possibility of holding its next meeting at the Downs.

Board members have been concerned about communities which do not provide representatives who attend EDCLC board meetings.

Bylaws which were revised at Thursday's meeting says the board can terminate members who fail to attend three consecutive meetings.

Shaw told board members he has been concerned about the lack of a quorum at some recent EDCLC meetings.

Board members authorized the EDCLC staff to purchase a copier and a laser printed plus providing \$300 to match \$300 which could be obtained for developing a long-range economic development plan for the county.

Equipment purchase will amount to \$7,000.

Board members also passed a

resolution supporting the Village of Capitan in plans to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the U.S. Forest Service fire-fighting program.

In part, the resolution states, "The Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County is in agreement that such endeavor would indeed bring attention and

tourism to the county, both at the time of the celebration and afterward, and pledges its support of the 1993-94 Smokey Bear Celebration in Capitan.

Capitan is angling for a national "Forest Service Fire-Fighting Museum.

1 Goddard rocks Ruidoso 48-13

The injury plagued Ruidoso Warriors scored first on the gifted Goddard Rockets before miscues turned the tide in favor of a 48-13 Rocket romp at the Wool Bowl in Roswell last Friday.

The non-district game marked the second week in a row that the Warriors faced the number one Class AAA team in the state. Last week Lovington was number one before Goddard's win over Roswell pushed them to the top spot this week.

The Rockets were flat from the start and the Warriors missed several opportunities to build a lead because of key penalties, a blocked kick and an interception.

The Warriors' misfortunes began after a clipping penalty nullified an early touchdown run by Jose Marquez.

Both teams suffered from first half fumbles from strong hitting defenses.

It wasn't until the start of the second half that the methodical Rockets bullied their way down the center of the field to show why they are a power in the state.

Ruidoso head coach Mike Speck said he didn't mind playing tough competition this early in the season.

"Every coach wants to play quality teams in the pre-season to tune themselves for the district. It's the best way to better yourself," Speck said.

"The first part of this game showed what kind of football team we can be," Speck said. "Our young players are beginning to mature. We came out strong, running our game plan as expected, both offensively and defensively. Our offense moved the ball extremely well. The big turning point came with about three minutes to go in the half when Goddard blocked our field goal attempt, capitalized with a touchdown and then intercepted a pass for another touchdown. We walked off the field at half time with our heads down, and we didn't move the ball again until late in the fourth quarter."

The Warriors have suffered early season injury problems, but were relatively unscathed after the rugged Rocket battle.

"This is the first week an injury will not prevent a player from returning to play next week," Speck said.

Of the injured players, Speck said Keif Johnson saw limited play this week and should be back full strength for the Tularosa homecoming contest. Ryan Wright will see limited practice Monday. Abel Montelongo is still several weeks from playing. Tight end Shane Eidson is four weeks from returning. Nick Herrera will return to practice Monday.

RUIDOSO SCORING SUMMARY

Steve Dankert returned the opening kickoff to the 35-yard line. Jose Marquez burst through the line for a 27-yard run to the Rockets' 37-yard line. Quarterback Manny Guardiola, under heavy pressure, is intercepted.

The Rockets moved the ball to mid-field on their first play before fumbling to Ruidoso on the Warriors 47-yard line.

The Warriors punched holes in the line while Steve Dankert picked up 20 yards on the next four plays. Walberto Murillo broke tackles for two hard runs and a first down at the 30-yard line.

Jose Marquez skirted the right end, broke free and cut back to the left side of the field all the way for a touchdown. A clip nullified the TD.

The Warriors failed to convert on four downs and the Rockets took over on the 35-yard line.

A Rocket flip by Ricardo Martinez to Chris Montero is booted in the air and intercepted by Steve Dankert who returned the ball to the one yard line.

Marquez bulls across from the one for the TD and converts for a 7-0 lead.

The Rockets quickly worked their way down field with off center runs met by hard Warrior tackling, especially by Dankert. The Rockets were on the five when the first quarter ended.

Goddard scored on the first play of the second quarter, but Dankert

blocked the extra point attempt to preserve a 7-6 Warrior lead.

The Warriors were hit with a 15-yard penalty that pushed the ball back to their own 22. The center snap was then fumbled and Goddard recovered, scoring on the next play. A two-point conversion try was successful and the Rockets moved out to a 14-7 lead.

Dankert returned the kickoff to

the 27 and after the play, Dankert is slapped with his second personal foul and is ejected from the game.

With the Warriors on the 16 and facing a first and 25, Guardiola hits Heath Huey who takes it up to the mid-field stripe for a first down.

Marquez, showing flash, eats up 15 yards to the 35. The Warriors are stopped and boots to the five.


Mario Portillo put a powerful pop on Rocket's Joe Saucedo, causing him to fumble and the Warriors recovered on the 13.







RHS teacher is accused of misconduct; on paid leave

Accusations of improprieties while on a band trip have been leveled at Ruidoso High School band director Tad Haynes confirmed high school principal Mike Kakuska.

Kakuska said he is unable to comment completely about the alleged incident because of a state law demanding confidentiality of school personnel matters. Haynes has been placed on a paid administrative leave.

Contacted by The News, Gary Mitchell, counsel for Haynes, said, "First of all, we deny any drinking by anyone. Secondly, we deny any improprieties whatsoever."

"It's really tragic that this young teacher who has worked against some pretty impossible odds, like money for the band program and lack of proper and adequate transportation, would now have such allegations made against him," Mitchell said. "We regret that the school has allowed this thing to become public without adequate in-

vestigation." Mitchell said he felt the incident was blown out of proportion and added that neither he nor his client know who complained to the administration.

Mitchell said that a 66-seat bus proved inadequate for the band and its instruments on a playing trip to the State Fair. He said four seats were removed from the bus to accommodate members. Some members sat on the floor.

Mitchell said one student took instruments in his own pickup and to his understanding, gas for this truck was paid for by the Band Booster Club.

Mitchell said that while the band was staying at their designated motel, Haynes was tipped off to possible drinking by some members. Haynes, acting on the tip, found and did away with the beer.

Mitchell said motel management said the students behaved in an excellent manner with respect for the school.

Kakuska said that the allegations were made after an activities trip to the New Mexico State Fair last Friday and Saturday.

Kakuska said all of the allegations are being reviewed, including comments by parents, students and sponsors. He said a determination will be made as soon as possible.

"We don't want this thing to drag on," Kakuska said. "And we want to protect Tad's rights as well as everyone else concerned."

"All my client wants to do is to get back to teaching," Mitchell said. Gladden told The News this morning that the matter was confidential and he was not free to discuss it at this time.

Gladden said to his knowledge no Ruidoso teacher has been previously placed on a paid administrative leave.

Gladden said the investigation would be concluded very soon.

"I just want to do what is in the best welfare for our students," Gladden said.

By the Wayside

As I mentioned last time, the vegetables of our farms and gardens may be found growing in the wild all around us. The same is true of course for the fruits.

Throughout our years past we have taken these vegetables, grains, fruits and flowers into our gardens, fields, and yards, improving them with cultivation and selection. They are our old, old friends. These wild children of Mother Earth, remembering also the medicinal herbs. Sometimes it seems that our cultivated things make a break for freedom and begin growing

out in the wild and along the roadsides. You have noticed peach, plum, apricot and apple trees blooming along the right of way. Some grow also away out in the hills.

This year you may see several tree of apple ripening along the highway — and this something about the story of apples and other fruit.

The Stark's Delicious Apple

Years ago the Stark's Delicious Apple took the lead among all other varieties for its special flavor which made it a great favorite.

Years ago, Mr. Lawrence Stark of Stark brothers came to visit the Ruidoso Valley and told me the story of this apple. At Stark's Brothers Nurseries of Louisiana, Missouri, a tree sprung up all by itself on a hillside away from the orchards.

It was seedling, and no one paid any attention to it, until one day when it grew up, somebody took a bite of one of the apples. A high guard fence was immediately built around the tree, the Stark's people went to work developing the apple that became the world's favorite. Many of our favorite varieties in fruits were discovered this same way.

So if there is a fruit tree of any kind growing around you, be sure and see if it is one of Mother Nature's masterpieces.

We will have more on the products of the field, the orchard and the wild next time or so.

Meanwhile, let us thank God for a wonderful late summer, and all our other many blessings.

Ranchers disagree over wilderness policies, issues

Ranchers appear to be split on their attitudes toward wilderness areas in New Mexico.

A report released by the New Mexico Department of Agriculture shows statewide 17 percent of the ranchers responding had highly positive experiences with wilderness areas, 46 percent were neutral and 37 percent were extremely negative.

"The report concludes that ranchers reporting favorable to neutral wilderness attitudes and experiences hold small grazing permits and often derive the bulk of the income from outside employment," stated a news release from the state department of agriculture.

The Lincoln National Forest and the Santa Fe National Forest reported the most ranchers with positive attitudes and experiences toward wilderness. Reasons for this were believed to be the terrain often imposed natural boundaries on allotments and most of the allotments were small.

Also, grazing in these wilderness areas is often seasonal, which means the ranchers had other areas to graze their livestock.

The Lincoln reported 33 percent in each of the three categories, positive, neutral and negative. The Santa Fe reported 25 percent with positive experiences, 52 percent neutral and 23 percent negative.

The most negative responses came from ranches in the Gila National Forest where 90 percent reported negative experiences and none reported positive experiences.

"There, grazing is mostly year-long, natural waters are scarce, extensive fencing systems are required and motorized access is necessary due to the physical expanse of the allotments," said the release. "For New Mexico ranchers in this category, wilderness designation has added costs to their livestock operations."

The report is titled Special Report No. 7, The Wilderness Experience.







Editorial

We hope that common sense will prevail, and the Lincoln County Commission will not enact an ordinance giving the force of law to the transportation district already created in a resolution. The last thing we need in Lincoln County is another group trying to dip into the taxpayers' pockets.

The Ironhorse Railroad folks are working on a multi-million railway plan, and we wish them well in their endeavors. We believe the group should continue as a private corporation and seek private funding for its dream. To do that, a transportation district is not needed.

We've heard the proposed railway compared to Chama and Durango, but there's no real parallel since those two tourist attractions were started in areas where the railways, including the track system, were already in place. That, and the difference in economic times, gave those railroads a good start. That's not the case in Ruidoso, where there is no historic basis for a railroad.

Although a resolution was passed forming the transportation district, the commission hasn't yet enacted an ordinance, and hasn't appointed a board. Commissioners still have time to stop opening what we believe could be a Pandora's box.

You see, once the County Commission puts its stamp of approval on a transportation district, that group would surely use that information to head to Santa Fe looking for money. And we know what that means — hitting up the taxpayers. The group already hit up the Village of Ruidoso for planning funds. With estimated costs in the range of \$100 to \$200 million, we don't need a crystal ball to see that taxpayers could be hit pretty hard as the planners, administrators and others all get on board.

The transportation district would have the authority to sell revenue bonds, but would not have the right of eminent domain in acquiring right of way. But, just imagine the cost of acquiring the right of way needed for a route from the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport to the Ruidoso Downs Race Track or wherever the group decides to go? It would be astronomical.

If the railroad is such a great investment, the planners will be able to sell stock and find a way through private sources to put it all together. So, let's keep the railroad plans in the hands of the private sector, and lets keep those hands out of the taxpayers' pockets.






