

## Councilors laud rally

The Golden Aspen Rally got a round of applause and a vote of thanks Tuesday during the Ruidoso Village Council meeting.

The mayor and councilors took turns praising organizers for bringing an event into the village that boosted the economy by as much as \$500,000.

"We had a tremendous turnout," said Dan Watkins of the Golden Aspen, who went on to thank the many businesses, clubs and individuals who helped make the event so successful. He had special thanks for the Ruidoso Police Department.

Councilor Al Junge promised Watkins and co-organizer Councilor Ron Andrews that next year the village won't have rain. He said the people he met at the motorcycle rally are the best he's met.

"Come back," said Junge, before

Mayor Victor Alonso and Councilor Jess Stinson added their thanks and described the benefits the rally provided for their individual businesses. Alonso owns and operates Don Victor's restaurant and Stinson is part-owner of the Winner's Circle.

Andrews said the turnout was lower than expected because of a major event earlier this year, but went on to say that surveys indicate motorcycle hobbyists spend more than other travelers because they can't "carry it with them."

He said the Golden Aspen Rally organization spent \$35,000 in town.

Councilor Junge went on to praise the Lincoln County Humane Society and explain a bar chart that shows that village taxes have gone down since last year. He said assistant village manager Leon Eggleston prepared the chart.

Junge said the village reduced the mill levy and the council hopes

to reduce it even more next year.

According to the chart, the overall residential tax rate was \$37,489 for 1989-90 and is \$39,322 for 1990-91. State debt service went down .622, county levies went of \$1,556, Ruidoso taxes went down \$1,628, school taxes went up \$1,971 and hospital taxes went up .556.

Commercial rates went up from \$39,769 to \$41,618 in spite of the village decreasing its levy by \$1,839. State debt service went down .622, county went up \$1,661, school went up \$2,021 and hospital commercial rates went up .628.

"The school is responsible for the biggest tax increase," said Junge, predicting that, with business on the upswing, the tax rate will continue to go up.

He said the school taxes went up almost \$2, and recalled that school officials, during the most recent

## Transportation District plan gets the go-ahead

Train service bypassed Capitan early this century, but the town was dealt another chance at it Monday by the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners.

A transportation development district was created and a higher county sales tax was approved during Monday's scheduled meeting in Carrizozo. The board also set some of the guidelines that the new district will be working under.

Monday's formation of a Transportation Development District enables the county to appoint a transportation board that will perform administrative duties over any proposed or actual means of public transportation.

The transportation board will be chosen on October 2 during a scheduled work session of the Board of Commissioners.

Support for the move was unani-

mous, although District III Commissioner Karon Z. Petty made it clear that the proposed board will be working under the county commissioners, and that the board will not be able to obligate any county or state funds without the permission of the said governing bodies.

Commissioner Rick Simpson was absent from the meeting.

One point that seemed to sway the two commissioners in favor of the formation of the board was the money-saving assistance promised by New Mexico State University. District II commissioner Bob Hemphill said the school will assist with bid preparations and feasibility studies, should their bids be accepted. They will not, however, work on the feasibility studies if their bids are not accepted.

Commissioners have a number of names to consider for membership on the Transportation District board.

Lincoln County merchants will be collecting an extra one-eighth percent on their sales beginning January 1, 1991. The extra revenue generated by the levy, which will appear to consumers as additional sales tax, will be used primarily for the acquisition, construction, operation and maintenance of solid waste facilities in the county. Water, wastewater, and sewage treatment facilities will also be funded by monies collected with the new tax.

With the levying of the gross receipts tax, Lincoln County becomes the first in New Mexico to earmark funds for solid waste management. Several other counties in the state are in various stages of similar propositions.

The higher tax rate will by law effect only businesses located in unincorporated areas of Lincoln County. Merchants located within the municipalities are being hit with only a one-sixteenth percent

increase in their tax base, the maximum amount allowed by the state.

In other moves made by the board, exempt employees of the county have until tomorrow, September 28, to decide whether they would like to use backlogged vacation time or be given vacation pay instead. The decision, which affects seven county employees, allows the county to make a single transfer of money from general funds to make any payoff during the second pay period of October.

Several bids were awarded during the course of the meeting, including the acceptance of a bid by Synergy Gas Corporation of Ruidoso to supply an indefinite amount of propane gas to the county at the cost of .5319 dollars per gallon. The price to the county is contingent on the price charged by the refinery to the distributor.

Roswell Ford will provide the county two F350 model pickup

trucks at a cost of \$16,532.00 each. The trucks bid met or exceeded all specifications set by the county.

Bonnell Sand and Gravel was awarded a contract to provide the county with base course materials for road work. According to County Road Superintendent Tommy Hall, the county will save a considerable amount of money by using its own vehicles to pick up the material at the crusher instead of having it delivered to the job site on County Road C-005 in Carrizozo.

Valley Transit Mix submitted the lowest price for concrete and will deliver the material to the job site on County Road B-010 in Alamo Canyon.

McCarty Paving Company was awarded the contract to lay down reinforced concrete curbs and gutters on Spring Road in Ruidoso Downs.

Also, the Sun Valley Sanitation District renewed its mill levy tax at

the rate of 6.15 percent.

During reports made by boardmembers, County Manager Nick J. Pappas detailed progress on the formation of a county-wide fire board. Twelve of the 16 fire services in the county were present at a recent meeting, and bylaws were established. Support of the board by the various departments was reported to be enthusiastic, as it will allow for better coordination between the fire services and make it easier for them to pool resources.

In other business the commission:

—Approved the minutes of a regular meeting September 10 and a telephone conference, September 14.

—Approved a third amendment to the disclosure statement of Mountain Lakes Subdivision.

—Tabled a request for proposals on a survey of emergency radio communication systems.

## Public hearing on environmental tax is scheduled for 6 p.m. today

The Ruidoso Village Council has scheduled a public hearing at 6 p.m. today (Thursday), September 27, in council chambers of Ruidoso Municipal Administrative. The purpose of the meeting is to hear public input on a proposed 1/16 of a cent environmental gross receipts tax.

## Downs Trustees OK a lodgers tax

Visitors using commercial lodging facilities, primarily motels, in Ruidoso Downs will be paying a five percent surcharge after passage of a Lodgers Tax Ordinance, Monday night. Village trustees passed the ordinance unanimously at a regular meeting.

State statutes spell out how income from a lodgers tax can be spent.

Funds can be used for advertising, promotion, financing new facilities, attracting conferences, conventions and meetings of commercial, cultural, educational and social origin to the village.

Next step will be appointment of a Lodgers Tax Advisory Board which will make recommendations to the trustees on how funds can be expended.

Trustees heard Ruidoso Mayor Victor Alonso outline the plan for a county-wide Lincoln County Solid Waste District.

The move will take villages out of the garbage business, Alonso said.

Under the plan, the district would purchase garbage trucks, dumpsters and equipment from municipalities to create a central collection and handling entity. Financing for capital investment would be from revenue bonds. The bonds would be backed by collection fees. A fee schedule is yet to be established.

Alonso said it would be "awkward" if not all municipalities opt to join.

"We think a solid waste partnership is the best way to keep costs down," said Alonso.

He said that no layoffs are anticipated when a district is formed. Sanitation employees would be integrated into the county wide operation.

Purchase of a suitable landfill site would be necessary, Alonso indicated.

Business licenses were approved for a veterinary clinic and for Gateway Lawn Furniture.

The veterinary clinic request was by Dr. Warren Franklin through his agent, Doug Siddens. Bob Walter spoke on behalf of Gateway Lawn Furniture.

Both individuals are interested in the same C-1 (commercial) building which is under control of the FDIC.

Franklin has made an offer on the structure.

After a presentation of recycling by trustee Jackie Branum, trustees voted to apply for a grant to expedite a recycling program for the Downs.

Trustees approved expenditure of up to \$12,000 to purchase surplus state equipment at an auction in Santa Fe. The money is earmarked for a snow plow, five-yard truck, street sweeper and salt spreader.

The village-sponsored picnic will be 1 to 5 p.m. Sunday, September 30, at the park. All village residents are invited.

school bond election, said some bonds were expiring and that even with that bond issue taxes wouldn't go up.

However, during that bond election the superintendent of schools, Sid Miller, in written and oral presentations, told voters that the school rate would go up about \$2 for a year, and then drop. The voters approved that bond issue.

Junge, as usual, went on to lambast The News, reading aloud a letter to the editor and agreeing with the writer that the editor should leave town. Junge said he is a member of the board of directors for the Ironhorse Railroad and went on to criticize an editorial dealing with a proposed transportation district.

The mayor thanked Junge for his remarks, and then described why he, too, supports the Ironhorse Railroad. He said the Lincoln County Commission had approved the resolution dealing with the transportation district.

Alonso, saying he wants Ruidoso represented on the transportation district, said he is offering four names for consideration as members of the board. He is nominating Jim Paxton, Don Shaw, Mike Ruch and Junge for that board.

Councilors also heard from Jim Edwards of the village Recycling Committee. He and his committee have put together a recycling plan and acquired a state grant to implement that plan in Ruidoso. The council approved an amended budget for the recycling project that includes \$100,000 from the state and just \$4,288 from the village.

Edwards, who presented his figures on recycled paper, explained that the amendments were needed because the grantor, the Department of Energy and Minerals, cannot fund the purchase of a storage building as included in the original budget.

The state share remains the same, but the village share was decreased by just over \$75,000.

In other regular business Tuesday, the council:

—Approved an adjustment to

the 1990-91 budget as required by the Department of Finance and Administration. The adjustment was to correct a clerical error in a transfer of \$10,374.

—Approved a budget adjustment to provide about \$30,000 to allow the purchase of a new ambulance. The motion approved to provide for the new ambulance stipulated that the funds from the sale of the old ambulance go into the village general fund. Emergency Medical Services director Jim Stover, who described the need for the replacement ambulance during the last council meeting, said it could be some time before the old ambulance is sold, but he estimates it will bring in from \$5,000 to \$10,000.

—Heard from assistant village manager Leon Eggleston that he will be presenting for council action the following budget adjustments that will decrease the estimated cash balance from \$427,218 to \$373,244:

- DFA correction—\$10,374
- Ironhorse grant—\$4,900
- Drainage study—\$4,200
- Golf course fencing—\$19,000
- Grindstone fencing—\$15,500.

—Awarded the bid to sell the D8 Caterpillar bulldozer to McCarty Construction Company for \$63,100. The cat has been used at the county/municipal landfill, and the county offered \$60,000 for the equipment before the village solicited bids. The county was among the six bidders, still offering \$60,000 during the formal bidding process.

—Authorized village staff to go out for bids on a scraper. It was noted that the scraper can probably be sold, eventually, to the Solid Waste Authority.

—Instructed attorney David Thomsen to draft a resolution asking the State Highway Department to provide the manpower for local businesses to meet its requirement for a traffic impact analysis on property that is bought or sold along state roads.

—Heard a report from Thomsen on ways to improve the village's collections on past due lodgers taxes. He recommended implementing, through ordinance, a lien process.

will be building a float for the Aspenfest Parade, October 6, in Ruidoso. It will feature "the world's richest horse race" at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

Trustees OK'd the attendance of Mayor Bonnie Addy at an Economic Development Forum in Albuquerque, October 17-19.

Resolution 90-09 was adopted to increase the water department budget for fiscal 1990-91. The budget will be increased from \$57,954 to \$83,115, to accommodate the salary of Dennis Riddle, superintendent.

Operating conditions have necessitated a supervisor position in the budget for 1990-91, the resolution states.

Mayor Addy reported that the village can no longer employ Camp Sierra Blanca workers.

Village clerk/treasurer Maurice Gudel in a notice said, "Due to our outside maintenance personnel

needing to be bonded, this program can no longer be used. Our personnel are required to be bonded, and the camp workers cannot be bonded under our bonding insurance."

In other action trustees: —were notified that a special meeting will be conducted September 28 to adopt an ordinance adopting a city environmental services gross receipts tax.

Ordinance 90-08 was repealed because of a technical error. A replacement, 90-07, will be adopted to correct errors in the original.

—Voted to instruct village attorney Gary Mitchell to settle a lawsuit involving the village and the county. This action was taken after an executive session.

—Approved commendations for superior work by maintenance department employees Davis W. Weihbrecht, B.J. Montano and Billie Joe Page.

# Lodgers group looking for retiree promo funds

Delving into "creative financing," the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and the Lodgers Tax Advisory Board will be getting their retirement services ducks in a row during the next four weeks.

The LTAB Tuesday at a regular meeting in Village Hall heard a proposal by Jerry Watts, Chamber executive director, on how to provide some matching funds for the retirement division of the Chamber.

The Chamber is asking for \$6,000 for retirement services to tide that division over until another proposed source of permanent financing can kick in early next year.

The retirement division of the Chamber in order to obtain some state funding must have matching money. Some \$11,000 total is needed, Watts said. The Chamber would have to raise an additional \$5,000 even if the \$6,000 is obtained.

The Village of Ruidoso has \$10,000 in its budget for the possible purchase of "Ruidoso pins."

Watts suggested that the \$10,000 be given to the Chamber to provide the \$6,000 needed by retirement services. The additional \$4,000 would be a "loan" to the Chamber which would buy Ruidoso pins from a manufacturer, it is hoped, at a reduced rate.

"They are a salable item," Watts told the LTAB. The Chamber, under the plan, would sell the pins and pay back the \$4,000 from proceeds over a period of time.

The LTAB in essence agreed to suggest to the Village Council that the plan is a good one. In the meantime, Watts will be checking

new sources to obtain Ruidoso pins at less than the almost 90 cents each they cost last year.

The polished plan will be presented to the Village Council in a month after all the ducks are lined up.

Craig Rawlings, chairman of the Chamber advertising committee, at its last meeting proposed that proceeds from the 1991 Connoisseur Classic and future ones be split between two charities and the retirement division.

Because of what Chamber president Ron Wall called miscommunication and a tight budget, the retirement services division of the Chamber was not allocated any funding by the ad committee for 1990-91. That division is headed by Roy Crocker.

The LTAB voted to provide the Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium with \$2,500 to add to its advertising budget.

Frank Potter, representing R.D. Hubbard interests, requested the funds and said the October 12-14 event is expected to draw 5,000 new people to the area each day of the event.

Potter said that symposium backers, Lincoln County Heritage Trust (Robert O. Anderson) and the Hubbard Foundation (R.D. Hubbard) have set aside \$68,000 to promote the event.

Actual expenses are expected to far exceed that amount, Potter said.

LTAB chairman Ed Hyman said that he thought LTAB previously has pledged \$3,000 toward a Tour de Ruidoso bike race which was sponsored this year by MainStreet Ruidoso.

Member Mark Doth pointed out minutes which showed no promises

were made concerning the 1991 race and that no plan for the race had been presented to LTAB.

LTAB had only \$5,400 to provide seed money for such events before the \$2,500 was earmarked for the Cowboy Symposium.

LTAB approved paying two bills incurred by the sponsor of the Aspenfest chili cookoff. These were for advertising and for printing, in the amount of \$892. Requests for a subscription to a magazine and for postage were disallowed.

A \$100 payment of a bill incurred by the White Mountain Challenge Cup was approved.

Members agreed to request that someone from the civic events center architectural firm be present at the next meeting, October 23.

LTAB members have been charged with investigating various forms of construction, checking civic centers in other areas and with making recommendations about what facets of a pending civic center here will best serve the community.

"We may need another meeting to avoid errors made in other parts of the state," Hyman said.

Kathleen Michelena, director of the Convention and Visitors Bureau of the Chamber, reported that a recent trade show trip to Monterrey, Mexico, was highly successful.

Nine boxes of Spanish language brochures about Ruidoso vanished, in a hurry, she told LTAB members.

Nationals primarily are interested in skiing, she said.

Board member Pat Morrison said that some ski days, nationals from Mexico far exceed Americans on the ski slopes.

# Band parents get the word on music program

Ruidoso High School band parents were called to a special meeting Monday by superintendent of schools Mike Gladden regarding the recent suspension of band director Tad Haynes.

Haynes was placed on a paid administrative leave after alleged incidents of impropriety surfaced while on a band trip to the State Fair in Albuquerque.

Gladden told an audience of 75 parents and students in the school's band room last Monday that the investigation is not complete, but an acting band director is in place.

"The situation has not been resolved," Gladden said. "I know that you're attending tonight hoping that I can give you some insight that it might be resolved in the next few days. I feel each day we're getting closer."

"There are a lot of things that cannot be discussed tonight because of the confidentiality that we must adhere to at this point," Gladden said.

Gladden said when allegations of improprieties are made, written statements are collected from as many people involved as possible. These statements are reviewed for any substantiation of the allegations.

Gladden said if the allegations have been substantiated, the superintendent can give a letter of reprimand to be placed into the file of the staff member involved. If a reprimand is not acceptable, resignation by the staff member, if they admit to the wrongdoing, is an alternative.

Gladden said with serious charges, after substantiation, the school can seek to discharge that person. Discharge is by board ac-

tion. Gladden said that Haynes has not asked for an open meeting regarding the allegations.

"We have a lot of information, to be honest with you, that is strictly hearsay," Gladden said. "We have a lot of other documented information."

Gladden said statements collected are from band students, parents and people who were on the trip.

Gladden asked those attending to submit any pertinent information.

"I would ask you as you leave tonight, if there are things you feel need to be said, in support of Mr. Haynes or concerns that you may have, that you write these down and sign your name to it. These too, will be kept confidential," he said.

Gladden asked for the continued support and patience from parents

as the school administration works through the process.

"We are taking particular care that we not destroy someone's vocation. At this time that's about all I can say," he said.

Susie Rhodes has been made the acting band director pending the results of the investigation.

Rhodes has a bachelor's degree in music from Hardin-Simmons University and is certified in all levels of music. She has nine years band experience.

Rhodes recently moved to Ruidoso from Tahoka, Texas. Her husband, Carroll, is the new Minister of Music and Youth at the First Baptist Church.

Rhodes will be working with the band to prepare the Warriors for all upcoming functions.

Gladden and high school principal Mike Kakuska also discussed the school's role in transportation.

"It's the sponsor's responsibility to arrange the transportation," Gladden said. "We need to know how many are going and if there are special needs. We need that information and we hadn't received it when this incident occurred."

"I will say again, transportation is not a problem," Kakuska said. "Any activity at the high school that our students are involved and transportation is needed, transportation will be provided by the schools."

Kakuska said several parents called him regarding policies during activity trips.

Kakuska said every school has a strict policy against the use of drugs, tobacco and alcohol while on any activity trip.

"It's not going to happen (drugs, alcohol or tobacco)," Kakuska said. "If it does happen, according to policy, we're going to call that

parent up and say, 'you either come and get your kid or we're putting him on the bus to go home,' we're not going to tolerate it."

A number of students expressed concern about uniform and instrument purchases that were ordered, but as yet undelivered. Students and staff were unable to locate the paperwork of the vendors to check the status.

Gladden said under state statutes, the staff is required to leave a paper trail with every thing they do in the school system.

"All of us should know that," Gladden said.

Gladden asked students to help compile a list of undelivered items for Ronny Maskeu, the school's activities director. Maskeu said he had already telephoned several area music stores.

## BLM invites input into resource management planning process

The Roswell Resource Area of the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) has started the Resource Management Planning (RMP) Process, which is scheduled for completion at the end of 1993.

The plan will include Curry, Quay, Guadalupe, Lincoln, Chaves, Roosevelt and DeBaca counties.

"The resource area encompasses about 14 million surface acres, 1.6

million surface and subsurface acres and 2.4 million subsurface (mineral estate) acres in federal ownership," said Roswell Resource Area RMP team leader Pat Kelley in a news release.

BLM Roswell District manager Francis R. Cherry Jr., along with area manager Sandy Porenta and Kelley, will brief county commissioners and municipal officials

in meetings scheduled between now and December.

BLM representatives appeared before the Lincoln County Commission last week, and will be scheduling other meetings in this county.

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


with Olivas' third touchdown of the night.

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

## Warriors to chase Rams in Portales

The Ruidoso Warriors continue their early season brutal schedule when they attempt to corral the Portales Rams at Greyhound Stadium this Friday at 7:30 p.m.

The Warriors will be facing a Ram team with a new look from first year head coach Ron Rogers, who replaced Bob Crane.

The Rams were a mediocre 6-4 last year, having enjoyed a sensational '88 season, beating Ruidoso for the state championship.

"Rogers has made a lot of internal changes," Speck said. "Within a few years, Portales will be the contender to beat. His adjustment in

the coaching staff and commitment to hard work is already paying off."

Portales has played a relatively easy schedule to date. They lost to power house Clovis 52-0, beat Espanola 26-0, tore up West Las Vegas 48-0 and handled Moriarty 28-0.

By contrast, the Warriors have played a strong 2-A team in Tularosa and the three toughest 3-A teams in the state in Artesia, Lovington and Goddard.

Rogers said he is not without problems.

"We have a rough road ahead with a rugged nondistrict and district schedule. A lack of quickness

is our biggest concern," he said.

The Warriors' offensive line will have a new look according to Speck. "We've tried new combinations ever since the season started," he said.

Speck said Abel Montelongo would be back, but Ryan Wright, Shane Eidson and Steve Dankert are out.

Richard Rippy will start at left guard. Keith Henson is in the center slot. Montelongo moves to right guard. Ryan Morgan shifts to right tackle which is a new position for Morgan. Tight end stays with Mario Sanchez. The rest of the

backfield will remain the same.

Speck said the Warriors will stick with their base offense and run the ball more than past games.

"We'll show a new formation," Speck said. "And come off the ball better than last week."

Greyhound Stadium is one of the best looking football stadiums in the state and is home to Eastern New Mexico University. For Ruidoso fans, the field is located on the other side of Portales on the road to Clovis.



Fall Is Here  
With Early Colors

This is being sent to you just after high noon on September 24, the second day of fall. The first day of the golden season came in quietly on a cloudy misty day with rain falling here and there throughout the day and on into the night -- as if the summer rains were continuing into the first days of fall to give a running start to what surely will be one of the finest harvest seasons we have seen in many a day.

Today, after several days of steady rain, the Vale is sparkling in early fall colors under a clean-washed sky of light blue. The air is so clear that you can see every detail of the mountain land -- all the trees, cliffs and upland meadows. The hills seem closer to you today, in this clear air, as if all the world were gathering together in a fond celebration.

The fall flowers have come out in full color -- the purple New England aster, and the golden daisies on tall stems blend their bright radiance in the gold and purple colors of the harvest season.

All in a day the box elders along the river have added a brighter touch of light gold and amber, joined with the light crimson of the woodbine climbing the oak and walnut trees, and the walnut leaves just barely beginning to turn lemon yellow, with a few leaving the

branches and drifting in the light breeze, and landing in the river, beginning the leaf-boat parade down the stream which continues all fall.

In the higher reaches of the valley you can see where the oak trees have joined the walnut and box elder and Chinese elm by adding a tint of bronze to their leaves. And their little brothers all along the heights of the mountain sides, the oak brush, have responded to the signal by showing just a light coloring of sunlight yellow and pale orange, only now beginning their vast tapestry of autumn colors all among the evergreens.

The aspens have just begun to turn in the higher places, pattering their little leaves together in the breeze, flashing sunlight among their branches and muttering a little leaf-song of mountain happiness.


## Editorial

## Capitol Comments

# So you think you want a revolution

### The New Mexico Legislature...

...Last week passed a bill to reform the state's workers' compensation system that one sponsor rightly termed a "revolution."

If—and it's a big if—the provisions of this bill are implemented with firmness and resolve, the state should stop the upward spiral of premium rates. In fact, within a few years, the rates for businesses with clean records should begin to go down.

The bill's passage is an accomplishment, but it's just a beginning. Right now, all we've got is a lot of promising words on a lot of paper...

### One of The Most Promising Parts...


...Of the new bill is that it increases the deductible a business can take on its workers' comp from \$2,500 to \$10,000, once the employer shows financial capability to assume that risk.

That provision could immediately reduce premiums, of course.

It's something the National Federation of Independent Businesses, the small businesses, have struggled for a long time, NFIB/New Mexico Executive Director Jerry Walker of Aztec told me.

And it's a case study in that "big if" I was talking about, implementation.

You see, the Legislature allowed a deduct-

ible on workers' compensation insurance premiums in legislation passed two years ago. But it was this spring before the Insurance Department got the rules in place to let it happen.

Now the law will allow an even greater deductible, and Walker said it shouldn't be another two years for that to go into effect...

### As The Special Session Was Getting Started...

An unusual government-to-government visit was taking place in Santa Fe.

Led by state Rep. Leo Watchman, D-Navajo, a delegation of officials from the Navajo Nation met with their state counterparts to learn more about how the State of New Mexico performs certain functions.

The delegation included Navajo Nation

Tribal Council Speaker Nelson Gorman Jr. That's a new office, Watchman noted, created "under the beginning of the separation of powers concept for us." Navajo Nation Internal Auditor Danny Robertson was along, as was Tribal Council Legal Counsel Claudine Bates Arthur and Legislative Interpreter Larry Foster.

The last office is the Navajo counterpart of a legislative chief clerk, and one of the New Mexico officials they met with was House Chief Clerk Steve Arias, who explained how his office organizes its temporary (only during the session) operations.

New Mexico Legislative Council Service Director Paula Tackett showed the Navajos around her domain and explained the functions of that agency.

And State Auditor Harroll Adams discussed his department's constitutional role in keeping the financial wizards of state and local government on the straight and narrow.

"We've met with state officials in Arizona, too," Watchman told me. "In Arizona, the state auditor is an appointed official. In New Mexico, he's an elected official. Studying those two types gives us an interesting perspective."

When he's not a state legislator, Watchman heads the Navajo Nation's Government Development Office. He and his aide Benny SilverSmith, also in the delegation to Santa Fe, have been working on this study trip for a long time.

May I suggest that fruit owners contact the Lincoln County Food Bank if they'd like to share their surplus with those that cannot pay? And since we'd expect some fruit



**The Plant Corner**

## What do the numbers mean?

**DEAR SALLY:**  
Seems I'm the only person who does not understand what those 3 numbers on fertilizer packages really mean. Would you please tell what these numbers mean? Thanks, love your Columns.

Wanda

**DEAR WANDA:**  
O.K., one more time. The numbers tell the percentages of nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium the particular package of fertilizer contains. A package of fertilizer with the numbers 5-10-5 contains 5% nitrogen, 10% phosphorus, and 5% potassium; the remaining 80% is inert, or inactive properties, filler. When the first and third numbers equals the same as the middle one, it is considered a good general type fertilizer. Determine your plants needs and buy the fertilizer with numbers to the needs. Your nurseryman will be glad to help you when selecting your fertilizer.

The first number, Nitrogen is necessary for foliage and stem growth.

The second number, Phosphorus is for root development and flower production.

The third number, Potassium is for plant metabolism and for the production of food.

It is important to have a soil of good texture to allow the fertilizer to spread evenly to reach

all areas of the root system and, as I have said so many times, good drainage.

To improve soil texture add peat moss, leaf mold or compost. Mix into soil before repotting or planting. Be sure to put plastic chunks about 3" deep in the bottom of the containers before adding soil mix.

To improve drainage, add perlite, vermiculite, or sharp or coarse sand to the soil mixture. What I usually mix is 1/3 regular potting soil, 1/3 peat moss and 1/3 river or builders sand for the general container-grown plants. To this mixture I add vermiculite to ensure good drainage and air circulation to the roots. The roots must breath, so never allow the container to stand in water in the drip tray, or allow the bottom drainage holes to be-

come clogged. Should the drainage holes become clogged a quick fix is to take a long screw driver and ream all the drainage holes; however, this usually means its time to repot. The plastic chunks in the bottom of containers will prevent drainage holes from clogging.

It is important to understand all your plants and their specific needs. Be able to recognize signs of each plants nutrient deficiencies. Again your nurseryman will be able to help you. Generally speaking signs that Nitrogen is lacking are slow growth, stunting and smaller than normal leaves.

Phosphorus deficiency can show up as a reddish color on the leaves, especially the undersides, and in the veins and stems.

Potassium, or potash, deficiency will first show-up on the lower plant leaves. They will turn a gray-green and will begin to show yellowing or mottling. They later turn brown and appear to be scorched. A quick-fix is to apply fish emulsion.

I do hope I have helped you. Fertilizer is a very complicated subject. My advise, to buy books and continue to ask questions.

I've received many questions recently from customers who are worried about keeping milk fresh during hot and humid weather. Milk will always be a perishable product, but there are many things you can do to help insure a longer shelf life.

The key thing is to keep milk under refrigeration at all times. This means you should get your milk home and in the refrigerator within 30 minutes after you purchase it. This is especially important during hot summer weather. When the temperature of fresh milk is increased by just one degree it can cut an entire day off the milk's expected life. At forty degrees, fresh milk should last ten days. At forty one to forty five degrees that figure is cut in half. At higher temperatures things get even worse. Milk stored at fifty degrees will keep for only two days. And at sixty degrees, the milk will go bad in a single day!

That's why we all need to be more aware of how we handle milk. When you take it out of the refrigerator in the morning to fix breakfast, be sure to return it immediately. Every extra minute the milk is left sitting on the counter can shorten its life. With proper care and refrigeration milk can last up to four or five days past the "Sell by" date on the container. And it will, with proper care from you.
