Aspenfest blows into the village

Aspenfest, starring the golden aspen trees that dot the mountains around Lincoln County, is blowing in for a big weekend.

The Golden Aspen Rally, the huge motorcycle event that leads off Aspenfest events every year, is history, and Aspenfest weekend is next up with events starting with the opening Thursday of "Count Dracula" at Cree Meadows Restaurant.

Aspenfest Weekend will include the parade that will roll down Sudderth Drive beginning at 10 a.m. Saturday, October 6. Today is the deadline to enter that parade, and entry information is available from Mary Seelbach, parade chairman, at 258-4014, or from the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, 257-7395.

The Arts and Crafts Fair, sponsored by Ruidoso Gymnastics Academy, will be set up on the lot across Sudderth Drive from the Gazebo, and will be open all day Saturday and Sunday.

Food booths and exhibits will be set up all along Sudderth Drive as part of the Street Festival, and a Street Dance is planned.

The New Mexico State Chili Cookoff will be staged in Tall Pines RV Park next to Ruidoso State Bank. The big cookoff includes food, drink and plenty of entertainment.

The Tri-Cities Rod Run will have headquarters at School House Park so that everyone can check out the fancy cars after Saturday's parade.

Music lovers should stop by W.D. Horton Stadium on Saturday afternoon to see and hear the area bands compete in the annual marching band contest.

The White Mountain Challenge Cup, a speed and endurance bicycle race up Ski Run Road, will be Saturday's first big event, starting early in the morning.

A new event during this year's Aspenfest, is the square dance festival planned at Carizo Lodge.

Council OKs environmental sales tax

The Ruidoso Village Council, during a special meeting Saturday morning, approved a 1/16 of a cent environmental sales tax.

The council advertised and conducted a public hearing on Thursday, but postponed final action until the Saturday meeting.

The council originally was scheduled to take action on the proposed tax last Thursday, but the meeting was recessed because councilors William Karn and Ron Andrews were absent.

Passage of a new tax requires a "yes" vote of five of the six council members.

Mayor Victor Alonso said he interpreted the fact that not one person attended the hearing Thursday as an endorsement of the taxing

measure by business owners and residents.

Councilor Al Junge said the tax would be used to help finance the formation of a countywide solid waste authority.

"It would be set up just like a company or corporation and would take all of the responsibility away from the cities and county and so forth," he said. "In order to start up, you must have cash in the cash box."

After imposing new tougher regulations for solid waste disposal and the operation of sanitary landfills, the state granted Lincoln County and its five municipalities the authority to levy a tax to offset some of the associated costs of meeting the more stringent stan-

dards, Junge explained.

The county would be imposed a 1/8th of a cent sales tax. The cities were restricted to 1/16 of a cent.

The only alternative to a gross receipts or sales tax would be to impose a higher rate for the collection of garbage, Junge said. The last increase of 50 percent was approved in 1982 when the rate was increased from \$4 to \$6 a month for residential service, he said.

A more equitable approach is to levy the 1/16th of a cent sales tax that would apply to all visitors as well as residents, he said.

"I like the 1/16th because it means even a group of people coming in from Texas for a weekend who don't stay here and don't do

anything except generate trash, but if they buy something, they will be paying a little bit into this account," Junge said.

The other cities in the county also are in the process of passing the tax, Alonso said.

The current sales tax in Ruidoso is .00675 cents on each dollar, he said. The additional tax will increase the amount to .00681 per dollar. Junge estimated it will cost residents about 50 cents more a month. Most business cash registers are calibrated to automatically calculate the tax.

The tax will take effect in January and revenues should start flowing to the city after a 60-day period. The city projects the tax will generate about \$67,000 the first year.

The next step is to pick out a site for a new landfill, Alonso said.

He assured Councilor J.D. James that city solid waste employees would not lose any accrued retirement benefits by transferring to jobs with the proposed solid waste authority. They would still be public employees. The city will try to find other positions for employees whose jobs would be phased out because of the creation of the countywide authority, he said.

Although the city has pledged the use of the tax initially to the solid waste authority, the wording of the new ordinance also would allow the city to use the money to buy, construct and maintain water and sewer facilities.

MainStreet plans are moving right along

To tree or not to tree, this is but one of many, many questions involved in redevelopment of downtown (Midtown) Ruidoso.

The biggest bugaboo seems to be the parking dilemma facing city planners and merchants and other citizens who gathered to hash out and rehash concerns about redevelopment.

Carter & Burgess, Inc., engineers, landscape architects and planners spent last week walking Sudderth Drive, side streets, alleys and the river to see what problems the village of Ruidoso faces in dealing with redevelopment.

Friday morning a public meeting was conducted at Cree Meadows Country Club for public input into a redevelopment plan.

MainStreet Ruidoso and the village of Ruidoso were successful in obtaining \$36,000 from the 1990 Legislature to hire a planning firm. Carter & Burgess, which has its main offices in Fort Worth, Texas, was successful.

Parking, auto traffic flow, trees, public restrooms, a park-bandstand area, possible museum, lighting, other utilities, sidewalk improvement and widening and some other considerations were considered during the week's analysis of problems by Carter and Burgess.

Right-of-way problems also have

reared their ugly heads in the overall planning.

Carter and Burgess apparently will recommend two more traffic lights in the area to slow down traffic. Two additional crosswalks are suggested, also. Some "green areas" are desirable, the planners suggest.

The "green areas" would be places with benches and plantings for pedestrians, perhaps, to rest their feet and regroup for another assault on area retail establishments, restaurants, lounges and such.

John H. Mason, senior vice president of the company who has a summer home in Ruidoso, said, "We would like to think we are partners."

"We are here to help improve your business," William O'Brien, Carter and Burgess project manager, told an audience of mostly merchants who would be affected by any changes downtown.

Apparently any plan to remove parking completely from the MainStreet Ruidoso project area would meet with some firm opposition.

Enhancement of the appearance of that area by tree plantings is not universally thought to be a good idea.

Phil Neeley, landscape architect with Carter and Burgess, told those present that the planners spent the early part of the week "trying to un-

derstand the complexity of the downtown area."

Landscape architect Brad Weisenburger said that after a parking analysis "we feel it is increasingly important to increase the efficiency of present lots and to designate future lots."

He said there are many "safety issues" in the pedestrian areas of Ruidoso.

Police Chief Bill Newman said Ruidoso's downtown is safe for pedestrians but that more lighting is needed "to solve perceived problems."

He said many visitors to Ruidoso come from areas where walking at night is not safe and indicated that improve lighting would enhance pedestrian traffic.

"We have to make it look safe," he said.

Eddie Fowler, owner of Win, Place and Show, said that trees require too much care.

"I am against trees... trees have to be taken care of. I feel (more) lighting is OK."

Fowler said planners should "keep all the parking you can."

Marion Treat agrees. She and her husband, Ralph, who own a curio and gift shop in Midtown, are opposed to trees and removing parking from Sudderth.

"Fix our sidewalks but don't take away parking," Treat said. She said public restrooms and fixing

sidewalks would be her two prime priorities.

The landscape architects and other Carter and Burgess people apparently immediately homed in on a large expanse of vacant land at Country Club and Sudderth and across from the Gazebo Center.

If the property can be purchased, the planners suggest a bandstand for public performances, a park, an "overflow" parking area, benches, and a possible museum utilizing a house on the back of the property which already has historic significance.

Ralph Treat asked, "Who is going to finance all of this?"

"This is one of the most difficult chores. Everywhere money is tight," Mason said.

He said the goal will be to tap every source imaginable. He said there are various programs which could help and that civic minded local citizens may contribute because of "love of community."

Another issue covered at the meeting was whether merchants should stay open in the evenings. Most apparently close up at 5 or 6 o'clock currently.

With evening shopping, it doesn't take so much parking, Mason said.

Stan Cape, who operates a ski shop, said he is asked by skiers

Mayor Alonso reports Mesa Airlines subsidy will continue into December

The transportation committee of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce has pledged Chamber support in seeking private sector funds to continue a subsidy for Mesa Airlines after mid-December.

Mayor Victor Alonso at a Chamber board meeting outlined Mesa's track record during a 90-day test period from June through August to determine boardings potential.

The Ruidoso Village Council has agreed to continue a subsidy to the airline for another 90 days which would result in reduced service at the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport until mid-December.

Some \$38,000 was left in a subsidy fund from the first 90 days trial period, Alonso told Chamber of Commerce board members at a regular meeting, Wednesday afternoon.

The mayor said the village will negotiate with Mesa to get the subsidy reduced for the first 90-day period because of a forced landing which reduced service for part of a month because of lack of a replacement aircraft.

A subsidy formula is based on the village picking up the tab if revenue to Mesa falls below a certain figure.

Board member Mark Doth said he feels that Ski Apache, which he says would be a direct beneficiary of continued service, should pick up part of the subsidy tab.

Alonso told board members Mesa is going to "maintain a lower level of service to get us into the beginning of ski season."

The mayor said July was a good month with boardings averaging 20 per day. Total boardings for Mesa

during the first 90 days were 1,177. June and August boardings were considerably less than in July.

Using a formula he devised, Alonso said he figures the airline would lose \$119,000 if service were provided for a full year.

New board member Valerie Miller said "connections" are the big problem with Mesa's service. She said the Lincoln County Medical Center and its parent organization would be heavy users of the airline if connections were better.

The desired situation is an early morning flight to Albuquerque and a late afternoon return flight the same day, she said.

Alonso said the aircraft servicing Ruidoso originates in Farmington, flies to Albuquerque, then to Ruidoso and finally to El Paso. The return flight to Farmington reverses that schedule, he said.

Mesa can't provide the "one day up and back" service because of scheduling problems in other cities being served, Alonso said.

Ronnie Paulger, chairman of the Chamber's transportation committee, said the village should "find a player who will give us what we need." That might require additional money.

Alonso said Mesa is not interested in the present time in additional flights in and out of Ruidoso or in improving connections. He said the reason is the scheduling problem on the entire Farmington to El Paso and return routes.

Chamber directors approved a motion by Doth for a committee to prepare a questionnaire to be sent to airline users.

Three questions would be paramount: How was the initial service used, what is your reaction to the

service and how would you have used the airline if connections had been better?

Paulger, Doth and Miller comprise the committee to develop the questionnaire.

Alonso said the additional 90 days will give the Chamber time to "see where we're going after December 14."

Board member Greg Masters said promotion of airline service must accompany airline service.

Several board members said they were disappointed because, they said, Mesa did not properly promote the Ruidoso service.

"The ball is in your court," Alonso told the board.

In other business, the Chamber president, Ron Wall, said approval of new people to head divisions and a committee was needed.

Approved were Doth who will head the advertising and promotion division after Mickey McGuire resigned. Craig Rawlings has been appointed chairman of the advertising committee.

Brenda Butler has agreed to head up the community development division which Rawlings formerly headed.

Mary Maul reported on the MainStreet Ruidoso program to revitalize downtown Ruidoso.

Masters said the Aspenfest is on track for October 5-7. He said the Oktoberfest also is shaping up with about the same groups of singers and performers as last year to appear.

Doth reported on plans for the Chamber to be represented at the Albuquerque Balloon Fiesta. He said additional staffing of a Ruidoso booth may be needed. The Chamber advertising committee has ar-

ranged for a self-contained vehicle to house volunteer workers for the period of the Fiesta.

Doth said a new Ruidoso promotional sign at the "Y" will be up by September 29.

Board member Ron Andrews, one of the sponsors of the Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally, thanked board members for their support of that event. Board members and Chamber greeters appeared one evening with refreshments for the more than 1,700 motorcyclists attending the event.

Andrews said the rally brought some \$500,000 to \$900,000 into the Ruidoso economy.

The board agreed to provide \$150 to help with expenses for a balloon flight over the area including the ski area. Video footage will be shot on the trip. The race track is picking up part of the tab also.

The footage will be used by various entities in promotional videos of the area.

An activity report prepared by Kathleen Michelena showed two inquiries from people in Iraq.

Walk-ins, phone calls and mail all have increased dramatically this year. Combined they total 34,954 for the first seven months of 1990.

Jerry Watts, Chamber executive director, said the Lincoln County Lodgers Tax Committee, has provided \$250 in Chamber support and \$1,000 for retirement services.

It was noted that the Lincoln County Hospitality Association is interested in a workshop in November to determine how that organization and the Chamber can better work together to promote Ruidoso.

why stores aren't open in the evening. They ski all day and have no time for shopping during regular business hours.

Capp said many downtowns have died over the country. He said downtown redevelopment is important. He would favor later hours for businesses.

Margaret Lahey, who with Cape works with MainStreet Ruidoso on planning along with Alden Deyo and Dean Fowler, said Ruidoso is not competing with Roswell or Alamogordo for tourists.

"We are competing with other ski towns, not Roswell or Alamogordo," she declared.

Lahey said Ruidoso needs to improve downtown.

Frankie Jarrell, editor of The Ruidoso News, asked if a previous master plan by BRW and a study by University of New Mexico students have been utilized by Carter and Burgess as they consider options.

"I hope you aren't going to redesign the wheel," Jarrell said.

Mason said both BRW and UNM findings and recommendations have been looked at and will be part of their study.

Barbara Westbrook, of California Colors, said she and her family

moved here to get away from parking meters and \$20 fines and dirt.

Planners outlined goals are maximizing off-street parking, integration of public areas, develop access to the river, create green areas and increase the attractiveness of the downtown.

Mason said Carter and Burgess will take data back to Fort Worth to rehash and rework.

"There will be another review session with MainStreet," he said. He said that perhaps there will be another public meeting, also.

Carter and Burgess hopes to have a "conceptual master plan" by mid-March. He said there are many steps remaining to be taken in creating a redevelopment plan.

One problem which Lahey said came to light when Carter and Burgess started to ask the right questions concerns right-of-way.

Mary Maul, MainStreet Ruidoso project manager, said two surveyors with the highway department had quit because of the difficulty of determining right-of-way boundaries on Sudderth in Midtown.

Sudderth also is State Highway 48 and is under the wing of the New Mexico Highway Department.

County commission candidates discuss their views

Note: The county commission candidate interviews were conducted over a period of several weeks. Since the time of the first interview, the present county commission has taken action on a number of subjects, in particular, solid waste. Some candidates were interviewed prior to this action and responses reflect only general thoughts related by each candidate.

Bill Elliott is the Democratic candidate for county commission in District 3. He has previously been a county commissioner, as well as the Lincoln County Sheriff.

Solid waste: People need to pay for a service and Elliott believes that county residents are willing to pay for solid waste disposal and collection.

Elliott was a member of the commission when the decision was first made to place the green dumpsters throughout the county for household waste collection and he still believes this is a service that can continue.

The candidate said he was appalled when the present commission took action to remove the dumpsters, but is now supportive of the present direction to establish a special district to handle solid waste.

Water: The county needs to be careful with industrial development because of potential impacts on water resources, said Elliott.

Economy: Elliott said he favors economic development, that local communities need their economies boosted, possibly with light indus-

try. "We have the work force," he said.

But development needs to prove itself, rather than fund economic development year after year without showing anything.

He has no problem with the present mill levy for economic development, but wants to see better accountability for the money.

"I am not in favor of giving them a blank check," he said. "They need to seek private funds."

Taxes: Improvement of the District Court facilities is something the county will have to face, and this may include a new court complex, said Elliott.

This can also allow for county expansion, he said.

While people need to pay for a service, Elliott sees no need for immediate tax increases.

Health care: Elliott sees health care in Lincoln County as a priority.

"Without a hospital, Lincoln County would be in dire straights," he said. "I think we're pretty fortunate to have what we have."

While a commissioner in the past, Elliott also served on the board of Lincoln County Medical Center. He believes the interest collected from the mill levy to support the hospital belongs to the hospital and would like to see it returned.

If possible, he would favor separating the hospital mill levy funds so that interest can remain in that same pool.

"Hospitals are going broke everywhere and have to be subsidized," he said.

Continued improvement of emergency medical services is also essential he said.

He said he is very much in favor of the enhanced 911 project, noting visitors to the area are already familiar with the 911 service.

Zoning: Elliott said he is not interested with trivial matters in the comprehensive zoning ordinance and believes land use issues can be dealt with more specific ordinances.

Roads: The county should not be the road builder for subdividers and Elliott believes better guarantees from subdivision developers is necessary to insure roads are built to specifications.

However, Elliott expects to see fewer subdivisions in the future.

Regarding other issues, Elliott sees law enforcement as a fairly high priority. Although he does not envision re-arranging the Sheriff's Office, he does want to work closely with whoever is the next Sheriff of Lincoln County.

Elliott also said he wants commission meetings to be conducted during the day, and feels once every three weeks is sufficient.

Tommy Valliant

Thomas Valliant is the Republican candidate for county commissioner in District 3. Valliant said he is open to all ideas on economic development, but believes we need to concentrate on the assets we have and that includes the county's natural resources and tourism.

Solid waste: Everyone needs to begin taking responsibility for their own trash, said Valliant. For recycling to succeed, trash separation must begin in the home, he said.

"If you recycle two thirds of the garbage, there's no solid waste problem," said Valliant.

General reports indicate that solid waste disposal is going to cost everyone more and most seem willing to pay the extra cost. But Valliant cautions this will hold true only to a point and consumers will refuse to pay more.

Water: Valliant believes the county could work more closely with the City of Alamogordo and with Holloman Air Force Base on

water issues at Bonito Lake. Excess runoff can be made available locally, said Valliant.

"There's not a whole lot of water to talk about," he said.

Water usage must be evaluated ahead of development with those who benefit weighed against the losers, said Valliant.

"The good of the most must outweigh the good of the few," he said.

Economy: Tourism is economic development, said Valliant, and a cooperative effort between the county and Ruidoso can benefit both.

Valliant suggested the county have a parks and recreation department to work with Ruidoso to develop, for example, a softball tournament to use the fields on Ski Run Road throughout the season.

Softball is big time, he said, and can attract a new population of visitors to the area to spend their money.

"Lincoln County is tourism," said Valliant. "We need to stick with what got us here and that's tourism."

Taxes: With increased tourist development, money can be generated for services without raising taxes, said the Republican candidate.

"People come here because of the natural beauty."

Health care: The county needs to stay involved in health care to avoid losing control over the services provided, said Valliant.

The quality of health care

depends on what people are willing to pay, he said.

"If we're willing to pay for the schools, why not medicine?"

More and more retirees are moving into the area and the general population already here is aging. The services will be needed and possibly day care can be incorporated as well, said Valliant.

Zoning: Zoning is a low priority for Valliant. Although zoning is a good idea to protect the area, the process needs to proceed slowly.

More control over subdivisions may be necessary because too much speculation is bad for the area.

"Half of Ruidoso is for sale," he said.

Roads: County roads will need continuous up-grading, especially if recreational services are expanded.

Valliant believes most roads in the county are pretty good, but planning for the future in terms of increased visitation is important.

On a personal note, Valliant said he has lived in Lincoln County since he was four years old.

He said he will serve for everyone's benefit, noting some previous government in the area was not always done with the best interest of the residents in mind.

Opponents meet again

Commission candidates Bill Elliott and Tommy Valliant are foes of a sort for the second time.

Presently, both are seeking the county commissioner position in District 3; Elliott as the Democratic candidate and Valliant as the Republican.

But in 1977 the two men were also in opposing positions when, as the Lincoln County Sheriff, Elliott arrested Valliant on charges of possession of marijuana with intent to distribute. Ten pounds of the controlled substance were involved in the incident.

Valliant was later found not guilty by a jury in District Court.

During the candidate interviews, both men were questioned about the incident. Elliott refused comment, other than to say Valliant was found not guilty on a technicality of entrapment.

"You can also quote me saying that I have never smoked pot in my life," said Elliott.

Valliant, on the other hand,

said his trial was the first time a jury ruled on an entrapment case, which meant law enforcement officials went out of their way to create a situation in which Valliant would violate the law.

"That was no mere technicality," said Valliant. Republican candidate Valliant freely admitted to his mistake.

"I made a mistake before," he said. "I believe people can understand when someone makes a mistake. I have nothing to hide."

When the charges against Valliant were being considered, other authorities in the case allegedly suggested they be dropped before going to trial because of the entrapment issue, said Valliant.


However, Elliott insisted on filing the charges and going through with a trial, said Valliant.

Valliant went on to say he has been a law abiding citizen of Ruidoso since that experience.

"Everybody makes mistakes," he said. "I still believe I can serve the people of this county."

This new wire takes a licking and keeps on ticking

"This is the kind of industry we want," Don Shaw, president of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County, said of Precision Wire, Inc., a new business in Lincoln County.

Precision Wire, Inc., is a rather unique business and involves custom Nitinol wire fabricating.

Nitinol wire is not really a wire but has many of the same qualities. It has some very unusual qualities, and applications of this strange wire still are being sought.

President of Precision Wire, Inc., is David L. Tremblay of Rancho Ruidoso where he draws the wire in machines he has invented.

He markets the very thin wire to orthodontists who use the wire for braces. A peculiar quality of the Nitinol makes the use of the wire preferable over stainless steel for braces.

Nitinol wire has a shape-memory effect. It is extremely flexible when cool or cold. It hardens when heated.

A person can bend a piece of the wire and then heat the bend until red hot. Cool the wire in a glass of ice water or air. Bend the wire into any different form while it is cold.

Then if the wire is placed into a glass of hot water, the Nitinol wire remembers the trained shape and snaps back.

The value in orthodontics is that when used in braces, the wire exerts a constant pressure on teeth, realigning them.

With stainless steel wire, braces must be tightened periodically by the orthodontist. Not so with Nitinol.

Nitinol wire has other medical

applications. It is used in angioplasty where a thin wire is inserted into an artery. As it travels within the artery, a balloon on the end clears the artery of plaque.

Nitinol wire is non-toxic in human tissue. Titanium neutralizes harmful effects of nickel in the wire. It has been used in China to straighten spines, Tremblay says. The process involves major surgery and utilizes the "shape-memory" quality of the wire which is surgically attached to a curved spine.

The wire has catheter applications, also.

Long-time Lincoln County resident Scott Tremblay, a cabinet maker and David Tremblay's brother, is vice president of Precision Wire, Inc. Dee Maynard also is involved in the business.

David Tremblay is training Scott Tremblay in wire production.

"If anything should happen to me, every orthodontist would suffer," Tremblay said. "I needed to cross-train someone."

Tremblay buys raw Nitinol ingots from a man in California. The wire can be drawn as much as 75 feet a minute, Tremblay says.

The wire is "the most pure product on the market at one-half the price," Tremblay says.

"The Japanese would 'love to know how I do it,'" he said of his production process.

Tremblay formerly worked for a company in Michigan. He was involved in developing amalgams for fillings. He also developed an interest in orthodontics. He decided to go on his own.

That's how Precision Wire, Inc., came to be. Tremblay considers himself a metallurgist, primarily.

He first came to Ruidoso in 1979

on a ski trip from Michigan with his brother. Six months later he moved here, but later went back to Michigan to finish his education and to go to work.

Early in 1990, he came back to Lincoln County and looked for houses. He found one he liked in the Rancho Ruidoso area. He has a son, Charles, 15, who is in school here.

Tremblay says his fledgling company will do about \$100,000 in gross sales this year. He says he will finance expansion "as we grow" and expects to add four or five employees in the future.

Precision Wire Inc. does research for universities, also. Tremblay mentioned the University of Iowa, Michigan State, Virginia Polytechnic, University of Florida and Berkeley.

Such research provides a quarter of his income, he says.

Tremblay in a paper explains how alloys that change shape with shifts in temperature came to be utilized. He says: "Objects made of these memory metals are formed, heated and cooled. Next they are bent or pressed to another shape and will return to the original shape when heated. Some of these alloys can do this trick at room temperature which allows for many technical applications..."

"It was not until 1962 that his phenomenon came to worldwide attention when the U.S. Navy Ordnance Laboratory developed the nickel-titanium alloy called Nitinol," he said.

He notes that common brass, gold-cadmium, iron-platinum and some other alloys show the "shape-memory" effect so some degree. But, he says, Nitinol's temperature-

induced motion is 1,000 times greater and provides a force 40 times larger than that of a bimetal. Considerable work can be done by the material as it "snaps back" to its original shape.

Nitinol has been used in many biomedical applications such as plates and clamps to attach arti-

cial limb joints, reinforce fractured bones and to help straighten crooked spines.

Nitinol also has many useful industrial applications such as couplers for high pressure pneumatic and hydraulic lines, heat engines, machines which use waste and solar heat to change the

shape of Nitinol wire to produce force.

"These applications have already been commercially realized. The Nitinol shape memory phenomenon is a solution looking for problems. Can you provide a problem for this solution?" Tremblay asks.

Repeated attempts by The News to reach Haynes for comment

were unsuccessful. Gladden said acting band director Susie Rhodes will be hired for the remainder of the year pending approval by the school board which meets at 7 p.m. Tuesday, October 9.

Rhodes recently moved to Ruidoso from Tahoka, Texas, with her husband, Carroll, the new Minister of Music and Youth at the First Baptist Church.

Rhodes has a bachelor's degree in music from Hardin-Simmons University and is certified in all levels of music. She has nine years band experience.

Rams win in defensive jewel

The Portales Rams trudged their way through an inspired Ruidoso Warrior defense for a 27-14 victory at Portales last Saturday.

With many of the Warrior regulars on the sidelines with injuries, head coach Mike Speck fashioned a stubborn defensive line that raises Warrior hopes for the future when a healthy team takes the field.

Craig Turner and Jamie Ordorica each turned in spectacular defensive plays for the Warriors. Turner breached the Portales line at will to dump Ram backs with echo smacking sacks.

Ordorica had two fine interceptions. The first was a 34-yard pass that he swiped out of the hands of the receiver at the goal line to prevent a touchdown.

Chris Salas was voted offensive player of the game for his fine blocking that helped free Jose Marquez for much of his 96 yards in rushing.

Junior Richard Rippey won defensive player of the game honors for his big play stoppers including 14 tackles.

Other outstanding Warriors included defensive whiz Mario Portillo and rough as a cobb Kief Johnson who amassed 21 tackles.

The Warriors outgained the Rams on the ground 250 yards to 207 yards. The Rams gained 50

yards with one run.

The Warrior offense has established a pattern for coming on late. Even so, coaches were happy to see quarterback Manny Guardiola come on strong to lead the Warriors to the two fourth quarter touchdowns against the Ram's first stringers.

Speck said the team support from the sidelines couldn't be better.

"We all knew we lost a hard fought ball game," he said. "And we definitely knew we had improved. It was especially obvious after viewing the game films. Now the kids can see how all this experience from the younger players is going to give us a deep, fast team."

The Warriors travel to Albuquerque Friday to meet St. Pius.

SUMMARY

The Rams received and returned the ball to the 30-yard line from the 15. After working their way deep in Warrior territory, the Rams threw a long pass into the double coverage of Ordorica and Louis Jimenez. Ordorica intercepted at the goal line. Warriors started on the 20.

Marquez followed a Johnson created hole for 16 yards. Marquez swept the left side for another 10 yards and a first down.

The Warriors stalled and were forced to kick.

Portales inched its way forward as the quarter ended 0-0.

The Rams stalled on the 28. Marquez ran two sweeps for 18 yards. The Rams stopped Johnson on a fourth and two effort at midfield.

Starting from good field position, the Rams nickled and dimed the Warriors into the endzone for a touchdown. The point after split the uprights and the Rams led 7-0.

With 3:40 remaining in the half, the Warriors were unable to move the ball except for one 10-yard sweep by Marquez and the half ended 7-0, Portales.

Marquez took the second half ball into Ram country with an 18-yard run. The Warrior drive stalled. A fake punt on fourth and forever fell 11 yards short when Guardiola was tackled chugging somewhere along midfield.

The Warrior defense stopped the Rams cold.

The Warriors, operating from the nine, go nowhere and kick.

The Rams slowly chewed their way downfield for another Ram touchdown. The extra point failed and the Rams led 13-0.

The Warriors, buried deep in their own territory, couldn't connect by air and kicked. The Rams took over field position on the Warrior 29. Two plays and a penalty later the Rams scored. A two-point conversion made the score 21-0, Rams.

The Warriors again started from poor field position in the fourth quarter. On third and long, Guar-

diola threw a long pass that was intercepted and brought back to the Warrior 20. After a short gain, a Ram pass near the goal line was again intercepted by Ordorica.

The Warriors failed to move the ball and were forced to kick.

The Rams took a quick opener through the center and away from the secondary for 63-yards and a touchdown. The PAT failed and the Rams led 27-0.

Guardiola threw a strike to Heath Huey who ran the ball to the Ram 38. A fake punt on fourth down worked as Guardiola hit Johnson for 11 and a first down. The Warriors work their way to the one where Marquez drove it home for the score. The 2-point conversion failed and the Rams led 27-6.

The onside kick failed and the Rams were at midfield. The Rams failed to move and were forced to kick.

Guardiola found Johnson for a pass and run good for 25 yards. Guardiola hit Huey in the flat who ran the ball down to the Ram 27. Guardiola hit Huey again to the 15.

After a holding penalty sent the Warriors back to the 30, Guardiola found Marquez on the one who took it in for the TD with nine seconds left in the game. The 2-point conversion was successful and the Rams led 27-14. There was no further scoring.

This is your brain on drugs...

Drug education took a different course Wednesday evening.

Ruidoso High School parents and instructors were treated to a guided tour of the brain and its functions by educator and consultant Tim Burns. Burns, who calls Santa Fe his home base, directs seminars and training sessions for teen counselors and instructors throughout the Southwest.

Burns provided the crowd of 80 to an in-depth look at the human brain, its development, and the effect of chemicals on its growth and responsive functions. A guided tour of the brain formed the basis of his instruction.

"A computer capable of duplicating just some of the thought processes of the brain would be huge," Burns said. "If one were built that could perform only the functions of the brain stem would take up five square blocks and would be five stories high."

The evolution of brain study in the last 40 years has enabled scientists to understand more the effects of chemicals on the different

sections of each human brain center.

The brain stem, according to Burns, is the root of human sensory response, and also contains the base survival instinct. This "oldest" section of the brain is partially surrounded by the limbic brain, which dominates the human function from the second year up to age six.

Discovered by Wilder Penfield, the limbic brain was found to contain sensorial memories. Studies showed that when certain portions of the area were electrically stimulated, the subject would experience vivid recalls of smell, vision, or hearing. It was concluded also that the emotional receptors of the brain are found in this region.

Burns then went on to detail the makeup of brain cells and how different chemicals found in alcohol and marijuana effect the transfer of signals between individual cells.

Considered the drug of choice among teens, alcohol is the first step toward the use of other illicit drugs. Whereas the onset of alcoholism was at 16 years of age several years ago, the average age of today's beginning alcoholics is 11

or 12 years old.

"Of the 89 percent of high school seniors that are problem drinkers, 70 percent are using other drugs as well," Burns said. "And the potency of drugs over the last few decades has increased dramatically."

This increase in the potency of drugs not only causes greater damage to the developing brain of a teen or young adult, but puts even the casual user at greater risk.

Burns pointed out that the human brain is not fully mature until somewhere between the ages of 21 and 25.

In the case of alcohol, chemicals are released into the brain cells that cut short memory capabilities. According to Burns, students could drink heavily enough over a weekend to wipe out much of what they may have learned the previous week, frustrating teachers and parents when they try to figure out why some students cannot retain material for even short periods of time.

Marijuana, on the other hand, leaves traces of aluminum carbonate that jam up chemical transmissions in the brain cells, thereby

slowing up the ability to react or emotive feelings. Four times more dangerous than cigarettes, the chemical makeup of the herb has recently become more potent.

Over the past 20 years, drug producers have bred strains of marijuana with much higher concentrations of THC.

"The level of THC in a joint has gone from about one percent to anywhere between four and 11 percent in the last 25 years," Burns said. "It is taking far less exposure to drugs for the brain to be damaged than it used to."

Before the meeting, Burns took the time to comment on the growing problem that drug and alcohol abuse has become.

"The school systems have been put in the place where they are expected by many parents to 'fix' their kids. This is not, however, a school problem. The difficulties lie in the community itself."

Burns pointed out that the habits of many addicted youngsters are learned at home.

"Some of these kids are coming from homes where one or both parents are alcoholic. In many

cases, the parents themselves are drug abusers."

Even teens from supposedly "stable" homes are using drugs as a release from emotional abuse or a total lack of validation from their parents. These kids are using drugs to give themselves some sort of feeling, as they have "shut down" their emotions at home.

"I encourage parents to check in with their kids, see how they are really feeling," Burns said. "Open lines of communication are extremely important."

The task ahead for many parents and school administrators is one of identification. Once teens are discovered to have substance abuse problems, the next step is to counsel and provide alternative methods of dealing with their feelings and their problems.

Burns, in town for a two-day training seminar with the Region IX Cooperative's Drug Free Schools Advisory Board, has been consulting for 20 years. He gained his interest in the field teaching in secondary schools, with his last four years spent at Los Alamos schools.

ENMU plans courses here

Ruidoso taxpayers will get a chance to bring college courses to town soon.

Eastern New Mexico University plans to offer two-year community college courses, possibly as soon as July 1991, pending the approval of the state Commission on Higher Education and village taxpayers.

Ruidoso's school board is expected to approve the project at its next meeting, then ask village voters to approve a one mill levy for the program, according to Chester Haughawatt. He is director of ENMU's planning and analysis services.

Plans for the satellite campus call initially for academic courses to be offered, then for later expansion into vocational classes. The program was approved by ENMU regents on Friday.

The Ruidoso Board of Education will meet at 7 p.m. Thursday, October 5, in the school administration office.

TeePee Lounge to open

The 1990-91 food service class of Ruidoso High School, otherwise known as Tee Pee Lounge, will have its season grand opening on October 11.

"For those of you who don't know about Tee Pee Lounge or our purpose, it is a restaurant run by the students of Mrs. Durham's food service class," explains a news release provided by Rebecca Durham.

The idea of this program is to introduce students to the world of restaurant management, food preparation, and business skills. Each student invests a \$25 fee at the beginning of the year and receives

their share of the year end profits, which has been as much as \$165 per student.

The restaurant is open every Thursday from 12:20 to 1 p.m., and requires reservations which can be made by contacting secretary Deanna Swanner or Durham at 248-4910.

The food service students would like to thank the community for their support in the past and encourage everyone to stop by and try the Tee Pee Lounge, located in the home economics room of Ruidoso High School, 100 Warrior Drive, Ruidoso, continues the release.

"Across-the-creek-man" as the Mescalero Apache Indians call him, along with some of his other nicknames such as "Wood Chopper" and "Wild Mule Rider."

The sky is pure blue above a sunlit mountain land bright with colors of the ripening season and fragrant with the aroma of purple and gold autumn flowers mingled with the incense of many a medicinal and health-giving herb and evergreen tang - all baked out by the warm freshened by the cool nights.

Looking forward to October's "bright blue weather" Mother Earth is dressing her children up in their best. The mountain meadows have been tinted with light crimson sunlight yellow, and pink, all among the emerald green of the grass and herbs.

The orchards are pictures of a bountiful harvest, with the apples shining in gold and all shades of red, bending down the branches and sending their flavor out into the sunny air.

All the many kinds of grass are ripening - wild grain for grazing creatures and birds. The sunflower seeds are more abundant this year than in many a season. The acorns have all been stowed away for the winter. In the higher reaches the wild cherries on trees, and bushes large and small are turning dark maroon and are larger than in most years. The elder berries in larger clusters with berries twice average size flow out the design of this Golden Year in the mountain land. Here along the river the wild grapes show you their large pur-

ple bunches on their vines climbing high in the river trees and bending down over the flowing stream.

A Season of Hope And Inspiration

All through the land there is a spirit of uplift to your spirits, a season of gratefulness to Our Lord for blessing - a sense of the season's promises coming true together with the heavenly beauty of the fragrant life-giving air, all bring a lightness to your step and a joy to your heart that are some of life's greatest treasures, special to this beginning of the harvest season.

The fall season is a time when the creatures of the wild are provided with strength to carry them through the winter.

Therefore, does this golden year harvest mean we will have a snowy winter? The old-timers used to say that a heavy crop of Cedar berries was the sign of a snowy winter. I notice that these berries are unusually heavy and numerous on the cedars this fall. Heavy hair on cattle was the other sign that a hard winter was in store for us. This sign usually appears late in the Autumn. Some of the grass stems that are usually two feet tall, this year are

four and five feet. Is this so that in deep snow there will be feed for the children of Mother Earth, extending above the snow?

All in all, we are in wonderful good fortune with our great fall season, with bright promise of autumn, Indian summer and winter.

The Apple Picture

The apples are better flavor and more full of health qualities this season than in many a year. We can go into this later, but for the time begin start making plans to visit the orchards and get a bushel or two of some of the world's finest apples.

We have gone over some of the main varieties of apples; now let us say some words about the Rome Beauty. This is one of the latest to ripen, along with the Winesap and Black Twig. The Rome is wonderful for baking, and good also for apple sauce. Besides eating out of the hand, apples can be fried, baked, made into cider, apple sauce, apple candy, cobbles, pies, and salads.

Storing Apples

In the old days folks used many methods of storing apples as well as potatoes, turnips and other vegetables. Apples are about the only fruit you can keep through the winter just as it is. An old time method was to put time in straw in the cellar or barn.

The best way nowadays is to put them in a wooden box in which the air may circulate, because an apple "breathes," and need air. Do not put apples in an air-tight container, place them in a room that is cool and yet not freezing.

Any time now you may begin visiting your friends, the orchard people. Let us thank God for October, the apple month, and the season of golden harvest and happy days, and all our many blessings.



Never, never let them see you sweat

Two sayings keep running through my mind this week.

"Never start an argument with someone who buys ink by the barrel," is one and "Never, never let them see you sweat" is the other.

For years Councilor Al Junge has taken every opportunity to verbally attack The Ruidoso News and its editors. He does this in open meetings, especially when those meetings are being taped for television play.

Former editors Tim Palmer, Darrell Pehr and Al Stubbs, as well as a whole list of reporters, have all been through meetings where Junge has made his verbal assaults. We usually sit quietly, sometimes take notes and very seldom respond.

When I was a little girl, if I got hurt, I would run all the way home, from wherever I was, before bursting into tears. It was pretty weird.

And last week, after all these years of Junge's speechifying, I couldn't take it anymore. His first personal cut came during the workshop session. "Why are you in such a good mood; is your husband out of town?" asked Junge. And he went on from there.

One good thing, I don't see Mr. Junge anywhere except at public meetings. We just don't have the same interests. Maybe Mr. Junge should get involved in community service and get his mind off negative thoughts.

Like, when I helped form the Family Crisis Center and the Lincoln County Food Bank, I

spent a lot of time with the people involved in those two charitable organizations. Over the past few years, a group of us have designed training programs, trained volunteers, raised funds and worked with law enforcement agencies.

Family Crisis Center helps victims of domestic violence with emergency food and shelter, and also provides counseling and advocacy through the legal system.

Paul Vordermann, Dr. Arlene Brown, Reva Tallman, Jennie Dorgan, Lila Goodman, Birgit LaMothe and I are on the Family Crisis Center board, but this cause has involved hundreds of other people over the past few years, including Father Burdette Stampey, now deceased, and Betsy Seiler.

Betsy and Burdette, along with Phyllis Boverie, Rigo Chavez, Sara Jackson, Vernell Hightower, Dorothy Bell Knapp, Father David Bergs and I, were among the group that founded the Lincoln County Food Bank. It couldn't have happened without Pat Ciraulo and the First Presbyterian Church.

But, it didn't happen without lots of hard work, and over the years the people, churches and clubs in this area have supported the Food Bank and continue to feed the hungry of this community.

The Food Bank really started as a small dream, and its making all the difference now.

I've also served with great people dedicated to a number of other good causes. For instance, I was a part of a group led by then councilor Dub Holt who started the Welcome Back Horsemen free barbecue honoring those who work in the horse industry each summer.

Holt, Barbara Downs, Cal Cowden, Carolyn

Henson, Nancy Radzewicz, Mac McLwain, Bill Elliott (and a lot more great folks) and I had a great time putting together those first couple of barbecues.

It's kind of interesting to note, that there are some people who get involved in more than one cause, but many key in on just one thing for their community service.

The American Heart Association board introduced me to a whole different group, as did the Warrior Booster Club.

If it weren't for the Booster Club, I might not have become such good friends with Peggy McClellan and Karen Morris. These two women get involved with all kinds of good works, especially the causes that help young people. Karen's also the one who persuaded me to spend the best part of two football seasons cooking hot dogs in the concession stand at Horton Stadium.

It was great fun, and I met yet another group of good-hearted people that I never see in the council chambers at Village Hall.

When Bethany got involved in the gymnastics program, it was time for me to get involved in that booster club and help raise funds and sponsor gymnastics meets and trips. For a year, I volunteered an afternoon a week at the gymnastics building.

That added a whole different dimension to my life — rushing from the newsroom to the Activities Center just in time to meet the little ones as they piled off the school bus. I made some new friends that I see pictured in the paper now and then as good citizens and school athletes.

The summer I taught a class at the Ruidoso Public Library I met yet another group of people who aren't seen often at council meetings. Village employees Mary Lou Gooch, Ingrid Schmitz and their crew just spend their time running the best little library in the state.

And the kids I met in my class were the kind of bright youngsters that I hope will be running this town in years to come.

I'm looking forward to still be sitting on the front row and covering Village Council meetings when those bright young up and comers grow up and take over the town.






