Shooting leaves one dead, one arrested

Responding to an early Saturday morning emergency gun shot victim call, Ruidoso police officers rushed to 114 Willow Street to find a mortally wounded Kenneth L. Crenshaw, 44, lying in the front entrance of the residence occupied by Mark Simpson and another unidentified male. A loaded 38 caliber pistol was found next to the victim.

Police said Simpson admitted shooting Crenshaw and stated that Crenshaw had illegally entered his residence and had beat him severely with a pistol in the head while he was sleeping.

According to Detective Lanny Maddox and Sergeant R.S. Swenor, investigating officers, the incident apparently was prompted by a dispute over some type of relationship that allegedly happened 18 years ago.

"It appeared that a struggle occurred between both subjects," Maddox said. "It appeared Simpson was struck in the head numerous times by what he (Simpson) described as a 38 caliber revolver. Simpson was observed to have suffered severe head injuries to his head and face."

Maddox said subsequent to the struggle, shots were allegedly fired by both Crenshaw and Simpson. Crenshaw was apparently struck in the upper torso and leg by three 270 Winchester caliber bullets and died approximately three hours later in surgery at the Lincoln County Medical Center as the result of those gunshot wounds, he said.

Maddox said Crenshaw's body was sent to the Office of the Medical Investigator in Albuquerque where a complete and thorough investigation on the gunshot wounds is being conducted.

Detectives said the one Smith and Weason 38 caliber revolver and one Remington model 700 270 caliber rifle were recovered from the scene.

Maddox said Simpson was booked by Ruidoso Police and the case was referred to District Attorney Bert Atkins in Alamogordo. The case will be sent to a grand jury.

Maddox said Crenshaw's address was listed as Carrizozo general delivery. He lived near Carrizozo all of his life and he was well known in the White Oaks area.

Crenshaw, a marine in the Vietnam War, will be buried at White Oaks Cemetery.

Partnership, patience and a positive attitude about Ruidoso and Lincoln County's future was the order of the day Thursday at Cree Meadows Country Club during the Community Update '90 luncheon.

The event was sponsored by MainStreet Ruidoso and The Ruidoso News.

Partnership was a theme oft repeated throughout the program. Community involvement with many of the organizations and offices represented was described as a key to the growth of the area economically.

Lincoln County Commissioner Karon Z. Petty put it very succinctly.

"The more people Lincoln County has serving in government, such as on the transportation district board, the more state and federal money will be available to us."

Petty said Lincoln County has a hard time getting state and federal funds at the moment because the county isn't taxed enough to receive aid.

"We've one of the lowest tax-bases in the state, and our gross receipts tax is also one of the lowest. We don't owe enough money to get state or federal aid."

Petty remarked that partnership was instrumental in the county's progress toward a solid waste disposal authority. The authority will consolidate resources from all the communities in the county to form a single waste-disposal entity solely for the benefit of Lincoln County residents.

"I'm real proud to have served on the trash program," said Petty. "Everybody got together on this project."

Partnership in another form was the topic discussed by Smokey Bear District Ranger Jerry Hawkes.

Hawkes maintained that in the face of a struggling economy, the forest service has faced several cut-backs, and the need for outside help from the community is greater.

"Fortunately, we're no stranger to assistance from Lincoln County organizations," said Hawkes. "In the last year, there has been over 5,300 hours of volunteer labor donated to the service by way of cleanups, trail construction and other projects adopted by local groups."

"Our major program right now is watershed management. By thinning out piñon pines and junipers, we can promote the growth of vegetation that helps retain water so that it can be absorbed into the soil and not run off."

Hawkes said that the trees are being stripped down with chains first, and then the public is encouraged to take what they want. The excess is burned off, and then

reseeded with grasses and trees that help prevent runoff.

While Hawkes maintained that the forest service would be eligible for more funds as a result of community-involvement programs, funds are being generated through the grazing programs and the new hunters' use stamp. Sales of the \$5.25 stamp have collected more than \$1,000,000 for the forest service.

Hawkes said that six goals are laid out in the new program devised by the forest service.

"We want to find more ways to work with the community and get the public interested in the wildlife living in the district. Also, we want to educate the public to all the recreation uses of the forests and get feedback from them on the job we do for them. Along with the watershed program, we also want to stress the work we do toward fire control. This is very important because Ruidoso is right in the middle of the forest and a large fire could be catastrophic. We would like to build some fire breaks in the village to help achieve this aim."

Col. John Stewart, vice-commander of the 479th Tactical Training Wing at Holloman Air Force Base near Alamogordo mentioned the partnership between the area communities and the base.

The fat lady sang and after November 9, she'll have to drive back to Albuquerque. That's the last day Mesa Airlines will be flying into Ruidoso.

Village Manager Charles Norwood said a letter has been sent notifying Mesa that Ruidoso's contract with the Farmington based airlines has been cancelled.

Norwood said the \$75,000 seed money to subsidize the flights would run out about that time.

According to Norwood, the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, which last May urged the village to sign an agreement with Mesa, created a special committee to solicit for money to pick up the slack after the village's budgeted subsidy was exhausted.

The chamber pushed, pledged, but didn't come through.

Ronnie Paulger, president of the First National Bank and past president of the C of C, who headed the

committee, said no one had been solicited.

"We never got to that point," Paulger said.

The only money in the chamber fund for the subsidy is \$1,000 that was contributed at the outset of the program by C.R. Hicks, a part-time Ruidoso resident.

The Mesa Airlines project began with a special meeting of the Village Council on May 18. Tim Morris, who was then Sierra Blanca Regional Airport manager and Ruidoso Transportation Division head, introduced Larry Risley, president and chief executive officer of Mesa.

Two hours later, the council had agreed to a 90-day contract and \$75,000 subsidy for service to begin Memorial Day weekend.

Although Mayor Victor Alonso said he preferred to "sleep on" the proposal, the council moved ahead with the agreement after receiving

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Community leaders speak during Update '90

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The big news out of Holloman is the impending movement of the

Stealth program from the remote Tonopah Test Field in Nevada to the local base. Tonopah is located approximately 200 northwest of Las Vegas.

A budget of \$36 million has been planned for the construction of facilities and the support of the 58 aircraft that will be transferred. Engineers are already drilling sample cores for the construction of the special hangars required by the planes.

The Stealth program comes at a good time for Holloman. The 479th Tactical Training Wing and its supporting personnel will be reduced by 60 percent by September 30, 1991. This move will affect nearly 1,000 civilian and military employees of the program.

Holloman Air Force Base creates an economic impact of \$330 million per year and employs 5,300 civilian workers.

Colonel Stewart also described Holloman's role in the current Desert Shield operation unfolding in Saudi Arabia.

"We have at the base the equivalent of one square mile of supplies for the support of troops out in the desert. From all this war reserve, over 5,000 tons of tents, portable electric systems and other goods have been shipped by our Mobility Support Squadron. This works out to about 300 major cargo loads flown over to Saudi Arabia since

August 2."

One-third of Holloman's hospital staff and supplies has also been deployed to the desert bases for air/mobile support of the troops according to Col. Stewart.

Patience was the order of the day for several other of the speakers at the luncheon.

State Representative Ben Hall believes that road construction and improvement is the best investment of tax dollars in Lincoln County, and detailed what the next five years will bring in the way of highway improvements.

Hall said that over \$44 million has been budgeted for work in the county, representing six percent of the state highway budget for the state.

In the next five years, \$6.3 million in improvements will be made to a 5.8-mile stretch of Highway 48 near the ski area, with another \$2.2 million to go toward right-of-way purchases. The plans for work on this stretch of road have had to be redesigned twice since the need was originally assessed, but Hall claimed that consultants are working on the plans again and that letting will begin next November with contractors starting on the work in January or February of 1992.

A second phase of the same project will see \$4,000,000 spent on the

Warriors forfeit Silver win

The final score read 52-18 in favor of Ruidoso over Silver on Friday, October 26. It should have been the first victory ever for the Warriors in that city, but the score didn't count on that day.

Ruidoso High School (RHS) principal Mike Kakuska issued a news release last Friday that school officials had notified the New Mexico Activities Association (NMAA) and Silver that Ruidoso had to forfeit the Silver game because an ineligible player had entered the game.

The release said that even though the player was not a starter and played very little in the Silver game, according to NMAA rules Ruidoso was in violation.

Kakuska said that on October 19, the school's nine-week grading period ended. He said there is a 5-day period by the NMAA to rectify grades for eligibility.

He said on October 23, Coach Lynn Weiland checked several students whose eligibility was in doubt. He said the student in question was tentatively passing at that point, but needed to bring in some unfinished work to bring his grade to a "D."

Kakuska said that on Thursday, October 25, the student had failed in a class for his second failure of the term. He said the student picked up his eligibility form and falsified five of his seven grades and took the report to the coaches.

Both Weiland's initial report and the student's report showed eligibility.

Kakuska said last week, Warrior head coach Mike Speck reviewed the report card, not eligibility form, and found two F's.

"Speck reported the error immediately to me," Kakuska said.

The principal said that he and Speck, along with Athletic Director Ronny Maskew and the teachers involved, reviewed the grades and how they were conceived.

He said he, Speck and Maskew then reached the decision to notify the superintendent.

"We are changing procedures to collect grades today," Kakuska said. "We will be making recommendations for change of eligibility reporting and the faculty will solidify those changes next week."

Kakuska praised Speck for his integrity in coming forth immediately with the violation. He said no one but Speck knew of the error.

enthusiastic endorsement for the service from R. D. Hubbard, Ruidoso Downs Racetrack owner, and other area businessmen.

Hubbard said that at the end of 30 days, the passenger rate would be up to 50 percent capacity and after 60 days the rate would be up to as high as 75 percent. The passenger rate never did meet those predictions.

That failure was due in part to the disruption of regular service after the plane serving the village was damaged in a landing mishap.

Risley expressed concern about promoting public awareness of the new service. Hubbard and Jack Valliant, representing the Inn of the Mountain Gods, offered to include mention of the Mesa service in their advertising. John Hall, manager of the Hubbard Art Museum, said holders of tickets for the annual Hubbard art award in early June also would be notified.

During that meeting, Paulger

read letters of support for subsidizing Mesa from Apache Futures, Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County, Ruidoso Convention and Visitors Bureau, Avis, Rent-A-Car and Vance and Associates.

The unanimous vote to commit to Mesa was given a standing ovation by members of the audience.

But things didn't run smoothly from the very beginning, Paulger said.

The airline was inconsistent in providing connecting flights to the business community. Mesa was unable to provide good communications with its customers and automobile rental charges at the airport were too costly, \$60-70 a day, he said.

"It became evident that Mesa was not the airline service for Ruidoso," Paulger said. Committee members were reluctant to approach businessmen given the level of service, he said.

But Alonso said that all of those problems were discussed when he

met with chamber officials two months ago. He left that meeting with assurances that the chamber would raise the money to subsidize Mesa when the village's subsidy ran out and that a questionnaire would be completed to determine the air transportation market of Ruidoso.

At that August meeting, Alonso suggested that an approach for year-round backing should include the ski area, the racetrack, the hotel-motel industry and local businesses.

Businessmen who committed to help financially at the meeting included Don Victor's restaurant owner Alonso, West Winds Motel owner Ron Andrews, Shadow Mountain Lodge owner Dick Weber and McCarty's Construction owner Bill McCarty.

"I was disappointed to learn last week, two months after that meeting, that neither assurance had been accomplished," Alonso said. "We (businessmen) made the offer and it appears the chamber turned

their back on us," Paulger said the questionnaire has not yet been finished.

"We're still working on it," he said.

The chamber never asked Hubbard for backing because he already had given enough in advertising, Paulger said, referring to Hubbard's mention of Mesa in his racetrack advertising.

Wendall Chino, President of the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe, which operates Ski Apache, was never asked to help.

Jerry Watts, who oversees all chamber committees, said he felt a nine-passenger plane could not substantially impact Ski Apache to the extent that Chino would be encouraged to offer subsidy.

Mesa officials disagreed.

Jonathan Ornstein, vice president of planning and scheduling for the airline, said that the ski town of Telluride, Colorado, started with one flight and has worked its way to seven flights a day. More flights are booked with increased partici-

patron, he said.

For the last 90 days, Mesa's flight completion factor in Ruidoso has been 96 percent, Ornstein said. Cancellations were primarily due to no passengers, he said.

Afari Travel booking agent Jody Mowell gave a different account of the service, noting one client became so disgruntled over a series of cancellations that he drove his employees to Albuquerque.

Mowell, a Ruidoso resident of 10 years, said Mesa's attitude has always been, "As long as you pay for it, fine." That also was the airline's attitude several years ago when the service was subsidized by the chamber, she said.

Despite the fact that her business accounts for a large percentage of the passengers who used the airlines, Mowell said no one from the chamber has contacted her about the service or the subsidy.

Norwood said there appears to be no other option open for the continuation of service by Mesa and no other airline has expressed interest

in coming to Ruidoso.

"We don't have the numbers," he said.

Norwood said he has heard of communities offering an airline service for a few months each year to take advantage of their prime tourist seasons. But in Ruidoso, tourists are drawn to the area in the summer and in the winter.

"We ought to be able to keep something going," he said.

But before the village would consider getting involved with an airline again, "There are going to be some hard questions to ask," Norwood said.

Alonso said, while he would be reluctant to deal with an outside airline service again, another possible avenue would be for a local corporation to be formed to purchase a plane and start a small service. He said McCarty had approached him with the idea.

"Then we would get the kind of attention and service the community deserves and demands," he said.

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ski run road and a like amount spent on a redo of the ski area road.

Construction is scheduled to begin this year on a five mile stretch of Highway 380 west of Carrizozo across the Malpais. This improvement project is budgeted at \$7,000,000.

Highway 70 from the Inn of the Mountain Gods turnoff to the Highway 48 intersection is scheduled to begin sometime late in the next five and possibly six years, according to Hall. The project will make the road four-lane throughout the stretch.

Median repair and highway repavement is also scheduled for Ruidoso Downs and Glencoe.

With all of the construction plans for the area, Hall foresees a better thoroughway for tourist traffic into the area, and therefore, a boost to the economy.

Barbara Willard, president of the Ruidoso Board of Realtors, also had a message of patience for the residents in the area.

Noting that the county sales have fallen across the country, Willard sees a promising future for the Southwest.

"Sales volumes over the last five years here have remained steady," Willard said.

Willard encouraged her associates to work with the community

Downs residents can expect in the future.

In explaining her acceptance of the post, Addy presented several goals.

"We're going to patch our own roads and replace many of the traffic signs. City Park will be renovated, and Ruidoso Downs will be cleaned up."

Addy has several tools she plans to use in carrying out her plans.

"We're forming a planning and zoning board and revamping the lodgers tax."

Addy mentioned that there are four new businesses either open or scheduled to open soon in Ruidoso Downs, and said that economic development in the area would improve the lifestyle of all the people. Addy also acknowledged the assistance provided by the racetrack.

"An attitude of cooperation is the best support of Ruidoso Downs."

R.D. Hubbard, owner of the Ruidoso Downs Racetrack, has promising news for area residents, and looks for local businesses and banks to kick in and help.

Hubbard called the 1990 season at the track successful, noting that the single-digit increases in attendance and the handle were fine considering the gains made the year before. In 1989, attendance increased 30 percent while the handle rose 40 percent.

"This increase contributed \$120 million to the economy of the State of New Mexico," said Hubbard. "This is an increase of \$10 million to \$20 million over 1989."

The June art show was called a success as well. Hubbard said nearly two million dollars of art was sold during the show that was attended by 800 or 900 people. Already, 50 artists have been scheduled for the 1991 show.

Hubbard also reported on the status of the Hubbard Collection, currently traveling in the Soviet Union and Europe.

"The Collection is currently being displayed in Moscow," said Hubbard. "People are standing in line for two-and-a-half hours from

New Mexico," said Hubbard. "It will be on par or better than the Cowboy Hall of Fame on Oklahoma City. I expect the first year's attendance to be around 100,000."

Hubbard also had something to say about the resort development on municipal land in the Village of Ruidoso, in particular the planned Radisson Resort Hotel.

"We're still looking for financing, and that's not an easy thing right now," said Hubbard. "With the

bank and savings-and-loan failures and rising oil prices, investors are a little leery of building a hotel in the mountains of New Mexico right now. We need to get some of the local banks involved to help out."

Hubbard expects construction of the hotel to begin during the second quarter of 1991, with an opening target date of April 1, 1992.

Hubbard, who had just made a check presentation at the Space Center in Alamogordo, chastised area promoters for not having Ruidoso attraction's promotional literature available in that facility. He said even Ruidoso Downs Race Track literature wasn't there.

Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce President Ron Wall reported on the functions and activities of the five divisions making up the 15 members of the board.

The five divisions were created for a more attentive response to several areas of importance and possible revenue for the community. Leaders for five groups spearhead efforts for improvements and ideas on tourism, economic development, organizations, community development and special events.

Wall showed the crowd the new Apache Trails brochure that was formulated by Mescalero Apache Tribal President Wendell Chino. The map ties together many of the region's attractions in hopes that visitors will make a circuit and not a pass straight through.

The Chamber is also conducting an air need survey to find out the travel needs and desires of Lincoln County residents. This is quite important in light of the Mesa Airlines development.

Ruidoso's attractions are being spread a little further, according to Wall, through presentations at travel agent shows. Among the coming events is the "Connoisseur Classic" and an Aspenfest-type celebration in the spring similar to "Springtime in the Rockies."

Ruidoso Mayor Victor Alonso reported that while recent years of village government have been trying, the old and new factions of the governing entities are well on their way to "harmonious co-existence."

"After the elections, I felt the idea of change for the village was needed," said Alonso. "My goal was to make the changes as quickly and merciful as possible."

"Over the last seven months, there have been some serious changes in the personnel and local

government. These changes were made with a minimum of turmoil and controversy. Now, the old and new members of the council are working well together, and one result of this cooperation is the reduction of costs to the taxpayers in the form of a two mil reduction in property taxes."

Alonso said that in light of the unpredictable economy and source of revenues for the village (gross receipts tax revenues were up in June, even in July, and down in August) the council will continue to work in a conservative manner. One of the bright spots was a report that construction costs to the tune

and government in creating package deals on rental properties as well as sales.

"A tourist bargain still exists here," she said. "The rentals help with property management."

While feeling that the fast-buck scene in real estate is going away, Willard expressed optimism for the '90s.

"People are trying to enjoy their lives in this decade; they're buying a quality of life by purchasing in this area. We can keep in mind, also, that other businesses can benefit from real estate sales here."

Willard provided one catch phrase for buyers in the market.

"Don't wait and buy. Buy and wait."

Ruidoso Downs Mayor Bonnie Addy, who was appointed to the post earlier this year when the elected mayor resigned, made a report of several changes that

open to close, so I'm viewing it as a success. From there, the show moves to Berlin."

More than 5,000 people attended the Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium early in October, said Hubbard, "and it was the one of the best times available here."

While admitting that the event wasn't financially successful, Hubbard said it did come in on budget and provides even more activity in the area during the fall. Hubbard anticipates attendance of 10,000 for next year's symposium.

Two projects with tremendous potential for the area are also Hubbard-led. The Anne Stradling Museum of the Horse is currently being moved to the area, with an inventory of up to 10,000 articles related to the history of horses. Hubbard anticipates that it will be three years before the museum is complete, but that it will open in stages. Set up costs for the opening of the first phase could reach \$2 million.

"This will be the best museum in

of \$8.4 million had been started to date, whereas last year's totaled only \$7 million.

Mayor Alonso expects the year-end increase to be at 30 percent.

Mayor Alonso also reported that the civic events center is coming along. The 32,000 square foot facility will be the bait to lure conventions to Ruidoso as well as provide a larger venue for civic events. An estimated economic impact of \$2.5 million will be generated in the area by the center, according to

Alonso.

"We want business year-round," he said.

Alonso mentioned some frustration with the Highway 48 project, noting that the grand jury investigation of top highway department officials is delaying a procession of plans.

State Senator James L. Martin wrapped up the luncheon by discussing a proposed windfall profits tax for the State of New Mexico. Martin feels that there are some short-term profit-makers leaving the state without turning back some of their profits to the state.

The proposed windfall profits will impose a higher percentage tax on excessive gains earned by businesses. Martin claims the tax would protect long-term business interests in the state from the short-term profit makers. The levy wouldn't affect the average taxpayer, either, said Martin.

Mescalero Apache Tribal President Wendell Chino was scheduled to speak at the luncheon, but was unable to attend.


This was the first Community Update for Ruidoso. Organizers of the event are looking forward to next year's edition, and hope for it to be as successful as last week's.

Ruidoso schools are outgrowing buildings

A growing student body in the Ruidoso School District may invite the construction of new facilities in the near future, according to Joseph Baca of the New Mexico Department of Education.

Baca led a team of evaluators from the department in last week's review of Ruidoso facilities, staff, and curriculum.

Baca cited an overload of students at some facilities in the district as the basis for his view.

"You have some lovely facilities here, but you're outgrowing them rapidly," said Baca. "I don't know how long it will be before you grow out of space. I invite serious thought as to a solution in the next five years if enrollment continues to grow. I encourage the district to begin looking now for where they would house additional students."

Baca also suggested that the district improve and expand its administrative facilities.

Overall, the district received high marks from the evaluation team, particularly in areas where the district received citations in the last review three years ago.

Baca evinced high praise for the board of education, remarking that it is well-organized and has developed and implemented an excellent set of policies. He also found cause to commend the practice of in-service sessions for the staff that improve the duties and functions of

the teachers. "Also, the state requires, and the district sees to it, that the staff receives training in recognizing and dealing with students suffering from physical abuse or substance abuse."

Baca also praised the district for the amount of community involvement and support evident, listing the approval of bond issues and mill levy elections as signs of support.

Most of the citations Baca issued came from deficiencies in written support of curriculum and policies.

"While the delivered curriculum in health education classes is there, written curriculum and dockets do not meet state education standards. What is evident might be considered minimal, and perhaps someone to oversee and develop curriculum might be missing."

Baca remarked that there is some question as to whether or not the physical education classes are co-educational. He also found that guidance and counseling services in the district are not designed to meet the assessed student needs.

Baca maintained that the library media was not staffed and open throughout the day, again not meeting the need of the students adequately.

Baca remarked that he did notice improvement in several areas since the last evaluation, but some of those mentioned were still not up to standards.

Baca also made citations on

some minor physical problems at several of the campuses. School Superintendent Mike Gladden said that these and other record-keeping related citations would be addressed immediately.

Dr. Bill Blair reviewed the health services programs of the district, finding them to be in very good shape. He was pleased to find that the district had purchased a computer for the use of the school nurse, noting that it is a big boost to the office. He also mentioned that the number and quality of student activities and clubs available was good, with weekend scheduling of athletic events a real plus.

Dr. Blair did however find that there is need of a review of policy and procedures relating to who would provide emergency aid in the absence of the nurse. He also suggested that the district provide a better working facility at the elementary schools for student counselors.

Mary Jane Vinella, who reviewed the libraries in the district, was quite pleased at the changes made over the last three years, citing the improvements made in areas suspect after the last review.

"The teacher support plan, or 'buddy-system,' is very good," said Vinella. "Programs addressed to students deemed at risk are also very strong. Historically, the library hasn't been supported as well as now. I see that the computerized

library file is a very good tool in skills development for the students."

Penny Bird inspected the Indian Education program of the district and also came away pleased. While not at the exit conference, she left these remarks for the audience.

"We have much appreciation to express to the district for their work with the Indians. Space is a little constrictive, but overall the program is very good."

Catherine Hill remarked that her review of the programs and curriculum in the elementary schools went well. Strongest points for the district was the finding of a true caring atmosphere provided for the students. She found the classrooms stimulating for the children, and noted positively the display of student's work in the classrooms.

Hill commended the rapport between the staff and administrations of the schools, finding the weekly staff meetings and parent/teacher conferences to be a bonus.

She did, however, remind the district that the non-English speaking program could be adjusted.

Roscoe Vaughn expressed his enjoyment viewing the vocational facilities by giving high marks all around. But like Baca, he did note some minor safety problems in some of the shops.

Vaughn applauded the vocational teachers for their willingness to give extra time to the students, and found the coordinator of the

programs to be doing an excellent job.

Baca concluded the presentation with a few personal oversights. He detailed citations for staff teaching in areas where they are not licensed or accredited, and that teacher records did not in all cases show transcripts. He also remarked that it was not acceptable for students to be receiving physical education class credit for participating in athletics.

Mike Gladden addressed some of the issues in a statement at the end of the conference, and challenged the opinion that the elementary schools are overcrowded. Gladden maintained that the elementary school is not overloaded, and feels that discussions on the interpretation of some of the state regulations and standards with the department need to be continued. Gladden did allow that the middle school is at its limits for student capacity.

Gladden remarked that the majority of the citations issued were

"black and white" issues in the curriculum and written statements, and would be addressed immediately.

He said the evaluation team pointed out strengths that the school is proud of, and that the district appreciated the guidance and assessment received over the course of the week.

Vandals destroy political signs

Destroying and tearing down signs is an act of vandalism subject to a fine and/or time in jail. It's a crime.

At least two candidates in Tuesday's general election have had a number of signs destroyed in what appears to be intentional acts by vandals.

Benny Coker, Democrat candidate for magistrate judge, Division I, said his losses, just in the materials used to build and place his campaign signs, are close to \$400.

Coker said C.O. "Chuck" Rominger, a Democrat candidate for county commission, also has lost signs valued at around \$300.

"I'm not going to accuse anybody," said Coker. But he is convinced that the destruction is personal, rather than random, since it is just his signs rather than the signs of many candidates.

Coker said he had one especially big sign destroyed. He said that sign was mounted on metal bars in a location near Sierra Blanca Motors, and it appeared that the person or persons who tore it down ran over it several times with a vehicle.

"It's expensive, and it's not fair," said Coker.

Several other candidates were contacted, and indicated they were having no such problems.

Trash commission is now established

Lincoln County witnessed the birth of yet another governmental entity Thursday evening when the Special District Commission adopted a proposal made by the Lincoln County Solid Waste Committee, creating the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

The adoption was made at the conclusion of a public hearing in the Ruidoso Village Council chambers.

The creation of the authority provides the county with the vehicle to go into the business of collecting, transporting, disposing, recycling and composting of trash generated by residents and businesses of Lincoln County.

Ruidoso village manager Charles Norwood reviewed the proposal, explaining the key elements.

Legal structure of the authority is provided under the Communities Service Act and under the creation of a Joint Powers Agreement between the municipalities of the county.

The 11-member authority will be comprised of five members representing Ruidoso, two representing the county, and one each representing Capitan, Carrizozo, Corona and Ruidoso Downs. Board makeup was determined by population, the amount of solid waste generated, and the potential number of customers.

A majority of votes must be evident in the setting of rates and any further changes.

Financing for the board will come from the environmental services gross receipts tax, user fees, revenue bonds and tipping fees. Tipping fees are collected each time a load of waste is dumped at the landfill.

Ruidoso, as the largest customer of the authority, will undergo the greatest number of changes. Currently, the village owns its own equipment and compacting facility. This equipment will be appraised and sold to the authority.

The funds generated from the sale will be budgeted by the village council, and Ruidoso will be out of the solid waste business.

Escalating landfill fees make the consolidation proposal economical and provides the county further expertise in large operations. With state and federal regulations on the subject becoming more stringent, it also gives the county an edge in dealing with tighter regulations.

Mike Randle of the Hondo Valley presented several concerns to the commission about the formation of the authority during the public hearing.

Randle wanted to know how much service would be provided and at what cost.

Asking if the county was not creating another level of bureaucracy, Randle was very interested in the powers of the authority to change ordinances already on the books.

He was also concerned about the numerical makeup of the authority.

Election day is this Tuesday, November 6

New Mexico voters will go to the polls Tuesday, November 6, to elect a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, attorney general, senator and congressional representatives.

State representatives, county officials and judges will also be on the lengthy ballot that will include five amendments and several bond issues.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Tuesday.

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

J.R. "Jim" Wheeler is seeking another term

(EDITOR'S NOTE: In the special voting edition published last Thursday, the story on Republican candidate for magistrate judge, Division 2, James R. "Jim" Wheeler was accidentally omitted. As a matter of fact, the story on his opponent was placed under Wheeler's name in that section. The News regrets the error. Here is Wheeler's story.)

James R. "Jim" Wheeler, 57 years old, is a native of New Mexico, born in Albuquerque and a graduate of Albuquerque High School.

Wheeler is the incumbent Magistrate II judge, who has based his past reputation on a belief that toughness should be buffered with reason and compassion.

"It's not that I'm not tough," Wheeler said. "I just judge every case on its own merit."

Wheeler began his military career with the U.S. Navy in 1950, and was discharged in 1953.

The judge joined the Albuquerque police department in 1954 and worked on the police department until 1971. He attained the rank of detective lieutenant, supervising 115 detectives.

Wheeler said he quit the department to come to the mountains of Lincoln County and get away from the problems of Albuquerque.

"I ran my little store and restaurant here for five years," Wheeler said. "But I couldn't stand it out of the legal system."

The judge first ran for Magistrate II in 1976, and the voters have kept him in office ever since.

Wheeler is very proud of his

time spent on the bench.

"In my 14 years as magistrate judge I have been to 13 New Mexico magistrate colleges. I have been sent to the National Judicial College at the University of Nevada in Reno, two different sessions, two weeks a session," he said.

"This was a very valuable training experience to me. You studied under law professors as well as deans of law schools all over the country. It was a tight 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. work schedule every day, very thorough, extremely educational."


Wheeler married his high school sweetheart, Juanita, in 1951. They have two children, Gregory, an attorney in Roswell, and Roxanne, a physical therapist who is married to a retired state police captain.

For recreation, Wheeler likes to pistol shoot in the forest above his home on Bonito Lake. He also has a billiard table in his home and loves to shoot pool. Even away from Ruidoso he still likes to camp and fish.

"Last February I went to Harlingen, Texas, visited the ocean, did a little fishing and ate fresh shrimp. From looking at me, you can see I like most foods. I've been on a diet for 30 years. I like anything but liver."

Wheeler is firmly committed to the mountains.

"There is no prettier area in the world than Lincoln County and Ruidoso," Wheeler said. "Any life long native of New Mexico has a special affection for the mountains. I'll be here when I die."

After one of the longest spells of blue sky Indian Summer weather, all the children of Mother Earth joined on the 31st in celebration of one of the most beautiful Octobers in memory.

All along the hillsides the tapestries of oak brush turned their most brilliant orange Halloween orange of many shades, mixed and blended with sunlight yellow, light crimson, lavender, purple, orange and pumpkin yellow.

The large apricot tree out near the bluebird tree had waited all fall before turning its leaves. And then on the morning of the 31st it shone forth in the morning sun as a tree of gold with the sun's rays shining through the gently-moving leaves.

I have watched this tree grow to 20-foot tall from a tiny sapling six inches high for 45 years. In other words, that is more than half my life, and the tree is more than half my age. And I have never in all these years seen the tree as in such radiant color. There it stands like a tree of sunlight, with the innermost leaves catching the sunbeams, so that it is lighted from the inside.

In 1945, a fire destroyed a cedar tree where this apricot now stands, and down hidden at the trunk of the cedar near the ground was this tiny apricot tree.

The small apricot tree near the sun room is no longer small — it must be about 20 years old. It now spreads its branches around an entire corner of the room, so that with the orange leaves, thick upon the branches, it was like being inside a leafy jack-o-lantern.

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



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

Free trade with Mexico will benefit border states

New Mexico, and Southern New Mexico in particular, is poised for a period of unprecedented growth. There is little public realization of what is about to happen; but this is a biggie, folks.

Free trade with Mexico. It's already in the mill and gaining momentum rapidly. Some of the Mexican laws have already been altered to accommodate the flow of investment dollars. The projected date for signing of a trade agreement is 1992, but the truth is, there will be informal but effective free trade far in advance of that date.

All of the border states stand to benefit substantially. Millions of potential consumers living in Mexico will draw a lot of attention from industry in the U.S.

Logically, manufacturing and distribution facilities will be located near the border. Some will, of course, locate in Mexico but there will be plenty of managers who will prefer to keep facilities on this side.

El Paso stands in a position to become the center of free trade activity. It is the largest

city—postured geographically to be a logical port of entry to Mexico for most of the United States. This in turn means that surrounding communities stand to benefit from a sort of trickle down (or trickle up in this case) effect that will benefit New Mexico.

Certainly, the recreational facilities in New Mexico are a significant drawing card; but the excellent college level facilities, good climate, and abundant supply of dependable labor place the state in an excellent position for competition with other border states.

The actual impact in terms of both quantity

and location is yet to be determined. It is clear, however, the growth potential is substantial for communities located within reasonable driving distance of a major port of entry.

No one knows at this early date exactly what posturing would be appropriate in order to gain advantage over the situation. It is, however, a force for major economic growth and deserves high priority attention.

Opportunities such as the recently approved new crossing at Santa Theresa should be watched closely. It is clearly an important element in the new free trade environment. The almost overwhelming problem of infrastructure on the Mexican side will be its critical path.

It seems to me that Lincoln County is in a logical posture to benefit greatly from the proposed new agreement. After all, we own a substantial portion of near-border recreational facilities.

Anybody out there think we could stand another stroke of good fortune?

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



Warriors clobber Socorro in the rain

An emotional Ruidoso Warrior squad, sullen from its forfeit to Silver, clubbed a Socorro team into submission in the rain at W.D. Horton School Friday, 34-14.

The contest was virtually over by the first half with Ruidoso leading 20-0. It wasn't that close. As the second quarter ended, Socorro didn't look like a team that wanted to come out for the second half.

Quarterback Manny Guardiola, throwing in the rain, had one of his best nights, on target with touch in the 10-15 yard range.

Jose Marques and Kief Johnson displayed their one-two punch running ability again, each blocking for the other to open holes.

Warrior head coach Mike Speck said Johnson's mom flew in from Buffalo, New York, just to see her son play in the last home game. Speck said Johnson delivered with his best performance of the year.

Speck said it was difficult to single out anyone on the offensive line because the total performance was outstanding. He did mention Chris Salas, Ryan Morgan, Keith Henson and Richard Rippey as having their best games.

Speck said Marquez's blocking was outstanding. The two Warrior backs were a balanced attack. Johnson ran for 103 yards, Marquez for 106.

Speck said the defense keeps getting better. Jamie Candelaria intercepted a pass and recovered a fumble. Brook Henderson was unstoppable when he blocked a kick.

The defensive line and special teams were solid with Steve Dankert, James Atwood, Mario Portillo and Keith Henson.

Sophomore kicker Sam Gumbert displayed talent that will make him big time college material. Small, but powerful, and a cool head under pressure, Gumbert wreaks with confidence.

Speck said Richard Rippey was named Offensive Player of the Week. Mario Portillo was named Defensive Player of the Week. The Golden Helmet Award was given Kief Johnson. Kicking Game Player of the Week was Sam Gumbert and Scout Team Player was Brian Skinner.

Summary

Jose Marquez runs from the Starburst formation and brings the ball back to the 21. On second and 10 Marcus picks up 14 to the 35 on an end run. Marcus jams the middle for five before Kief Johnson pounded through the middle off a Chris Salas block to the mid-field stripe. Johnson and Marquez combine for another first down with short yardage gains to the 38. Johnson then cuts the corner for 15 to Socorro's 23. Guardiola finds Shane Eidson with a short pass over center and Eidson bowls over the Socorro unit to the 3-yard line. On second and three Torres takes the ball across for a touchdown. Gumbert kicks the extra point and the Warriors lead 7-0.

Gumbert kicks a rocket to the four and it was returned to the 19.

Socorro fails to move with Mario Portillo, James Atwood, Johnson and Jamie Candelaria making the key tackles.

Brook Henderson shoots the gap to block Socorro's fourth down kick and Brian Skinner covers the ball on the 17.

On the next play from scrimmage, Marquez blocks as Johnson slips through the lane for the 17 yards and a TD. Gumbert splits the uprights and the Warriors lead 14-0.

Socorro returns the kickoff to their own 39. A strong defense stops Socorro cold. On third and five, Candelaria intercepts.

Ruidoso stalls for the first time and is forced to kick. Steve Dankert downs the ball on the 15. On second and nine, Socorro fumbles and

Candelaria recovers on Socorro's 24. Guardiola throws a strike to Huey who flips the ball back to Candelaria who takes it to the 6-yard line. The quarter ends.

Johnson starts the second quarter with a short run over center for the TD. The Warriors fake an extra point kick that fails and the Warriors lead is 20-0.

Gumbert's kick is run back to the 20. On third and long, Socorro picks up their first, first down of the game on a reverse. Socorro shows some success running and takes the ball to the Ruidoso 20. Socorro fumbles and Ruidoso's Johnson recovers.

Guardiola finds Eidson for 10 yards with a sharp 10-yard pass. The Warriors fail to move the ball and Marquez boots the ball to Socorro's 41.

Huey fumbles the return, fumbles again while trying to scoop the ball and finally loses the ball to Socorro on the 23-yard line.

With 3:44 in the first half, Socorro hits a man on the Warrior 12-yard line. Portillo, Johnson, Morgan Candelaria, Dankert and Atwood sticks Socorro runners for no gain. Socorro forced to pass throws incomplete on fourth down and the Warriors take over on the 13.

Guardiola fades back for a long pass and is hit by Socorro causing a fumble. Socorro takes over on the 15.

Socorro passes incomplete for three downs. A fourth down pass is complete but short of the TD.

Guardiola tries a Hail Mary that is intercepted as the half ends. Warrior's lead, 20-0.

Gumbert's kick sails to the end zone where it is returned to the 16. Atwood and Dankert make the tackle. Henson nailed Socorro for no gain on the first, Johnson hits Baca for a 5-yard loss. Baca was hit again to the five by Henson. A short kick is returned by Huey to the 29.

The ball is handed to Marquez and he jukes his way around the corner 29 yards for the TD.

Gumbert's kick rattles the goal post and bounces away, no good. Warriors lead 26-0.

Socorro marches down the field and is aided by a personal foul — the ball is placed on the 9-yard line. Ruidoso is called for pass interference and the ball was placed on


the five. Skinner and Candelaria stop Socorro on two downs. Socorro fumbles the ball losing yardage, but retains possession. On fourth and goal from the 21, Socorro passes incomplete.

Sophomore Walberto Murillo shows some power and speed on an end run good for eight yards. Guardiola hits Chris Torres with a per-

fect throw, but Torres can't find the handle. Marquez finds a hole and races to the 26. Guardiola drifts right and hits Huey coming across in the end zone for a touchdown.

Warriors lead is 34-0 with three minutes left in the third quarter.

There was no further Ruidoso scoring. Socorro scored twice and the score ended 34-14.



Spikers win, showdown at Oñate

The Ruidoso Warrior varsity spikers blasted the Silver Colts in three, 15-9, 15-4 and 15-6, but it is not enough to salve their anger.

Because of vague rules and an arbitrary decision by one Oñate athletic director who interprets league rules, the Warriors are forced into a playoff with the Deming Wildcats at Oñate High School Tuesday at 7 p.m.

The Warriors and Wildcats met twice in district play. The Wildcats won the first match in five games.

Since both had equal records, the return match at Ruidoso had the district championship on the line. The Warriors had to win in four to be ahead of the Wildcats in common games played.

Losing the first game, 15-3, the Warrior spikers won the next three, the last in the most dramatic fashion of any sports event this year, 16-14.

After the match, Deming called Ruidoso to tell them they wanted a different interpretation of the rules

and sought advisement from the Oñate athletic director in charge of rules interpretation. He acknowledged the vagueness involved, but ruled in favor of Deming and giving the Warrior girls all the motivation they need to beat the socks off the Wildcats Tuesday.

Under New Mexico's Constitution, each District Judge will assume the bench following a partisan political election. Thereafter, the Judges run for retention. Judges are retained for six (6) year terms, the same terms they have always served. Are Judges allowed to make campaign promises concerning what they would do in certain situations such as the war on drugs? No! After the Constitution was amended, the Supreme Court of New Mexico amended the Code of Judicial Conduct which governs the conduct of Judges and which prohibits Judges from making promises or pledges of conduct other than the fair and impartial performance of the duties of the office and prohibits them from announcing how they rule on any given issue that might come before them. Judges can not advertise their political party affiliation. Judges can not personally solicit campaign contributions and any Committee that raises contributions can not advise the Judge of the source of the contributions. Are the three Twelfth Judicial District Judges running against each other? No! Can we vote in each of the three divisions? Yes, there are three separate divisions and each Judge is running for retention in his or her own division.

Cowboys convene here

It was a time when the cowboy and his horse were making history in the west.

Chuckwagons cooked sourdough biscuits and entertainment centered around campfires and the telling of stories and singing of songs.

On October 12, 13 and 14, those days were revisited at the first Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium in Glencoe.

Sponsors R.D. Hubbard and R.O. Anderson declared the symposium a tremendous success, according to a news release.

"I was extremely pleased by the tremendous turnout," said Hubbard, who is co-owner and operator of Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

"We undertook this project as a way of continuing the traditions of the cowboy and promoting the area. I remain committed to the continuing development of this area."

Hubbard said he and Anderson will again sponsor the symposium next year.

"It was wonderful to see the local residents and visitors alike gather for such an event," said Anderson, a well-known New Mexico businessman with interests in oil and cattle.

"I felt that with the uniqueness of this gathering and all the different events and trail rides, Lincoln County is finally being recognized. There is no other place in the United States to relive western history in an environment such as Lincoln County. It is truly Horse Country USA!"

Anderson, a long-time resident of Roswell, has also been a primary supporter of the National Center for the Western Horse.

"We were extremely grateful for the tremendous support of the symposium. Any proceeds benefit the National Center for the Western Horse," said Anderson.

The Center is called a Western Heritage Recreation project and is situated on land which surround Fort Stanton. Currently at the Center, there is an area for parking, hitching rails for horses and a directional map of designated trails.

Proposed projects include a

Living History Ranch, which will show what life was like during the early ranching years in New Mexico, and a cowboy and cavalry memorabilia museum. Organizers will submit a master plan on October 30 to the Bureau of Land Management.

According to the news release, more than 5,000 people turned out to witness the three-day Cowboy Symposium celebration. It included everything from a chuckwagon cookoff, team roping, trail rides, horseshoe pitching, cowboy poetry and singing to performances by Mescalero tribal dancers, Hondo Fiesta dancers and Johnny Gimble and several musicians who are former members of the Texas Playboys.

More than 200 people participated in three different trail rides that left from Glencoe and Fort Stanton each day. Each ride traced a different aspect of the historic Lincoln County area, home of Billy the Kid.

A dozen chuckwagons from Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico competed in a cookoff to determine who could cook the best beef, bir-

chuits and beans. Symposium visitors had a chance to taste that old-fashioned cooking.

Long X Cattle Company of Buffalo Gap, Texas won the competition, with the Prude Ranch second and W F Bar Wagon, third. Goldsboro Land Cattle won fourth.

The roping events drew more than 500 entries and featured ropers from as far away as Alaska. By far the most popular events were the Friday and Saturday night dances which drew 2,200 people.

Johnny Gimble, recently chosen Instrumentalist of the Year by the County Music Association, gathered some former members of the Texas Playboys and the musicians raised the rafters with the sounds of classic country swing.

The last day of the symposium featured the Mescalero and Hondo dancers, a Mariachi band and a Flamenco dancer.

Symposium organizers are tentatively planning the second annual Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium for the first part of October 1991.

"We encourage all who are eligible, to request a ballot by calling Karen Barrow at 257-7777," continues the release.



Last Monday, Cesar received a letter from a man who found the balloon and note — in Saffell, Arkansas.

Following is the letter that Cesar received from Thomas C. Whitlow of Saffell:

"Hello Cesar,
"I found your balloon about a mile from my house in a wooded area 10-23-90. I am a farmer. I am 43 years old, my name is Thomas Whitlow. I am drug free. I don't smoke or chew or drink. I have three kids and two grandkids. I hope you stay in school. I quit in the ninth grade, but I wish I had stayed in school. Saffell, Arkansas is located in northeast Arkansas on Highway 25 about halfway between Batesville, Arkansas and Walnut Ridge, Arkansas.

"Hope this finds you well. Sincerely, Thomas C. Whitlow."

"I thought it was real neat," said Cesar, a seven-year-old second grader. "I felt real good to have everyone in the classes hear the letter when the principal read the letter."

Cesar took note of Mr. Whitlow's remarks about school in the letter, also.


"I'll stay in school. I'll finish all of it. I want to be a doctor and take care of sick kids."

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
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
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

Sheriff James McSwane has done a good job in the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office, and he deserves your vote on Tuesday, November 6. He's our choice for another term as sheriff.

When Sheriff James McSwane took over the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office two years ago, he had a big job just getting the administration end of the office up to par. He came in after the office, along with several areas of county government, had undergone some difficult times — times that had plummeted sheriff's department morale to the lowest possible levels.

McSwane has turned that around, and has improved the office administration and the staff professionalism by 100 percent in just one term. We think the way McSwane, a Republican, turned things around in the Sheriff's Office was good for the entire county. He's been cooperative, open and accessible, and he has dealt honestly with the people of this county.

Vote Tuesday to keep Sheriff James McSwane in office.

The Amendments:

We're opposed to amendments one and two because we think the State of New Mexico should be conservative in the way it invests and handles state funds. Amendment One removes language which requires all losses to be reimbursed by the state unless the proceeds are immediately reinvested in securities with higher yields. Amendment Two deletes requirements that investments in permanent funds be restricted to U.S. corporations listed on the national stock exchange that have paid dividends for the last 10 consecutive years.

Those two amendments, if passed, would remove some controls that we believe should remain in place. We believe the state should be prudent in its investment of permanent funds, and invest in the stock of corporations with solid track records.

Vote "no" on one and two.

We're in favor of Amendment Three that calls for increasing the per diem we pay our legislators from \$75 to \$100 a day, and also calls for paying the previously unpaid lawmakers up to \$500 a month. We agree that legislators should be paid, but we believe the pay should be increased even more to open those legislative slots to more working people. How many people can afford to donate two months to that unpaid position? There's a danger in an unpaid legislature becoming an elite club for the wealthy. There's a further danger that if we, the people they serve don't pay them, some special interest group might.

Vote "yes" on three.


We're against Amendment Four. That amendment would allow municipalities and other political subdivisions to enter into debt beyond one fiscal year without going to the voters. The Constitution protects the citizenry from such long-term debt by requiring those obligations be incurred by passing an ordinance that specifies how the debt will be repaid. If the municipality doesn't have the funds, then a bond issue can be issued and taken to the voters. The constitution's debt restrictions have served the taxpayers well, and we want to keep them in place.

Vote "no" on four.

We're in favor of Amendment Five, which clarifies the authority of the commissioners of public lands to exchange lands. This state has a lot of public lands, and the money earned on those lands goes into public education. We believe this amendment would help state officials make the most of public lands.

Vote "yes" on five.

Polls will open at 7 a.m. Tuesday, November 6, and will remain open until 7 p.m. Be sure and vote!






State voters will decide Tuesday on proposed constitutional amendments

The following amendments were proposed at the November 5, 1990, general election. The amendments are listed in the order in which they appear on the ballot. Amendment 1
The following amendment amends the same section of the constitution as Constitutional Amendment No. 2. Language deleted in this amendment remains in the constitutional amendment proposed as Constitutional Amendment No. 2. Thus, if the public votes for both amendments, two versions of the same constitutional provision will exist. It is unclear what effect this will have.

Amendment 2
3. Under the existing constitutional provision, bonds can be sold at a loss only if the proceeds can be reinvested at a gain. To remove this requirement, as this amendment proposes, would permit the sale of bonds at a loss, thus making it acceptable for the state to lose money on a regular basis.

4. While it is important for state investment officials to be able to "unload losers," it is future costs that really matter. A buy-and-hold strategy for quality bonds in the 1990s is recommended. The key is to avoid the lower quality bonds initially. The amendment could tempt state investments, knowing they can sell them at a loss when they go sour.

Amendment 2

No. 2. Management of the permanent School Fund and other permanent funds.
Brief analysis: Constitutional Amendment No. 2 deletes existing requirements that investments of the permanent funds in corporate stocks be restricted to those stocks of businesses incorporated within the United States that have paid dividends for the last 10 consecutive years and are listed on the national stock exchange.

Arguments For
1. The amendment will not change the requirement that the state investment council invest state permanent funds based on the prudence of the investment according to current standards. However, it will remove investment standards that may have been appropriate precautions in 1958 when the provision was first adopted, but which are no longer useful or appropriate. Times change and so do investment opportunities. To tie the state investment officer's hands in such a changing environment may well not be prudent and may result in reduced income for the permanent funds.

2. The amendment would give the state investment council and state investment officer greater flexibility to respond to current market conditions and changes.

3. Restricting investments only to domestically incorporated companies that have paid dividends for at least the prior 10 consecutive years and that are listed on the national stock exchange unduly restricts the state's opportunity to invest in growth companies that can maximize capital appreciation and consequently the state's total return on investment. This proposal thus allows the state to diversify its stock investment in both domestic and foreign companies that offer higher returns through a mix of dividends and capital appreciation.

4. National exchange companies incorporated in the United States that have paid dividends for at least the past 10 consecutive years should be one part of a state's investment portfolio. Another part should be allocated to small, rapidly emerging companies. These small growth companies have the potential to produce significant returns through price appreciation.

5. The language presently in the constitution restricts the ability of the state investment officer to invest in foreign businesses and in small capitalization companies that have the potential for a higher return through rapid growth.

6. The 1990s saw the globalization of the securities markets. Two-thirds of the world's corporate securities are traded on foreign exchanges. Many other states are moving to "internationalize" their portfolios. New Mexico should follow this trend.

Arguments Against
1. Removing this restriction will allow for investments with a higher yield but also a higher risk. Recent financial failures emphasize the need to restrict state investments only to companies with proven record of performance — which is exactly what national exchange

companies with 10 consecutive years of dividends are.
2. The state's investments have worked well over the years and have grown with the existing standard in place. Why is it necessary to discard them? As the saying goes, "if it ain't broke, don't fix it."
3. The constitutional change would eliminate a standard that has been in use to guide investments since 1958. As Wall Street veterans put it, "There are old pilots and there are bold pilots but there are no old, bold pilots." New Mexico should stick with sound tried-and-true domestic investments.

4. The requirements that a business has paid dividends for at least 10 years and that it is listed on a national stock exchange are criteria that produce predictable long-term growth and income from state investments. To remove such criteria opens the door for investment in foreign corporations, which exposes the state to new risks, including currency fluctuations, nationalization attempts and a less degree of protection offered by foreign securities regulators.

5. This constitutional amendment amends the same section of the constitution as Constitutional Amendment No. 1. Thus, if the public votes for both amendments, two versions of the same constitutional provision will exist. It is unclear what effect this will have.

6. The trend by state pension funds and other public fund managers to diversify into small capitalizations stocks and international stocks is new, and its downside risks have not been shown. Let other states invest overseas or in start-up ventures; New Mexico will do well enough with domestic blue-chip companies.

Amendment 4

No. 4. Financial obligations of the state or its instrumentalities.

Brief Analysis: Constitutional Amendment No. 4 creates a new section of the constitution of New Mexico to allow the state and its political subdivisions, agencies or instrumentalities to undertake financial obligations that extend beyond one fiscal year. The amendment states that such obligations are not debt, indebtedness or borrowing and, therefore, are not subject to limitations imposed by other sections of Article 9 of the constitution of New Mexico, particularly those requiring a public debt may be undertaken. The provision applies to obligations payable out of general revenues but not obligations to purchase or improve real property, unless provided by law.

Arguments For
1. This amendment was passed in response to a recent New Mexico supreme court decision, *Montano vs. Gabaldon*, prohibiting the use of lease-purchase agreements to finance long-term financial obligations from general revenues. The court found that, in some instances, the use of lease-purchase agreements to finance long-term financial obligations from general revenues. This constitutional amendment alleviates the burden that decision has placed upon state agencies and local governments that, prior to the supreme court decision, were able to secure needed facilities and equipment over a period of time that they would not necessarily be able to purchase in full within one year.

2. The language of the constitution, as it is presently interpreted by the courts, is out of touch with current business practice. Without this constitutional amendment, state and local governments will be seriously handicapped. Financing capital purchases would be come difficult, if not impossible, for many agencies and local governments. This amendment solves that problem. Its real effect is to continue what was acceptable business practice before the *Montano* decision, i.e., to enter into lease/purchase agreements for the purchase of equipment and other small capital needs.

3. This amendment will make it possible for state agencies and local governments to continue to use lease/purchase agreements and be assured that they are not subject to limitations imposed by the constitution of New Mexico regarding public votes, ordinances, notices and areas in which contracts for long-term obligations can be incurred.

4. While this amendment would permit certain long-term financial obligations to be paid with general revenues without voter approval, it does not permit such obligations to be incurred to purchase or improve real property unless the legislature enacts a law to permit and control such debt. Thus, this amendment will not permit the state or a local government to go into debt for large purchases or improvements of land or buildings without voter approval, unless legislation is passed permit and determine the conditions for any such debt.

5. Long-term obligations of a city, town or village may be incurred without passing an ordinance that specifies how the city, town or village will repay the obligation. Thus, voters will not have as much control over debts they will eventually, as taxpayers, have to pay.

6. This amendment contains two provisions that appear to help, but probably won't: 1. The obligations are contingent upon annual appropriations and 2. The legislature may, but is not required to, by law permit the state, its agencies and local governments to go into debt to buy or improve real property, not subject to current constitutional limitations. This means the legislators, not the taxpayers, will decide how much money will be appropriated and what limitations will govern real property debt.
