Chino defends study

Mescalero Apache President Wendell Chino appeared before the

"We never said we were going to put it on the reservation," Chino said. "We never said we were going to put it at the back door of Ruidoso. Because a feasibility study has to be done."

Concentrate winter advertising of Ruidoso and Ski Apache in Texas, Texas, Texas, two ski shop owners advised at a special meeting called by a promotion committee, Thursday.

And, let people know where Ruidoso is and how to get there, Robert Donaldson, owner and operator of Pro Ski Sports added.

"Put dollars where they do the most good. Spend in Texas, Texas, Texas," he said of advertising dollars.

This was reiterated by Stan

Cape of Skier's Choice Ski Rentals

and A-Frame Ski Rental.

On a recent extensive trip to Texas, Cape said the most frequent question asked was, "Where is Ruidoso?" He said that nine of 10 students on college campuses had never been to Ruidoso.

—If you tell them, they will come—

The Visitors Promotion and Service Committee of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce had called the meeting to get input into advertising the winter season from ski shop operators and others interested.

Donaldson said advertising should include information that Ruidoso is accessible from most points in Texas on four-lane high-

ways.

"Publicize where we are," Pat Morrison, marketing director of Ski Apache, said.

Bonnie Mattox, who owns Great Southwest, a gift shop, said winter advertising should include more than skiing.

Donaldson said winter advertising could advise people to bring their golf clubs, that most of the

time, visitors can play golf in the winter. He said that not all visitors are skiers.

Lodger Dick Weber said half of his winter visitors do not ski — they come to see the snow, sit before a fireplace, etc.

He said visitors from the Austin area are increasing.

The ski shop owners said more advertising should be aimed at the

greater San Antonio area. Cape said San Antonio is one of the 10 largest cities in the country.

Donaldson said any money earmarked for winter advertising in California might as well be flushed down a toilet.

Morrison said Ski Apache's best market is Texas, followed by Mexico.

Joan Bailey, visitors promotion chairperson, said that Ruidoso's market is Texas.

"We're not going to advertise in California, but may advertise in Arizona," Bailey said.

Morrison said Ruidoso must let people know that the "town doesn't close up in winter."

She noted major changes at Ski Apache. One is that three-day (consecutive days) lift tickets will be available.

Also, TNM&O buses now will travel up the ski road. And snowboards will be allowed.

Ban on vicious dogs possible

A request for an ordinance to ban pit bulls in Lincoln County is on the agenda of the County Commission meeting at 9 a.m. Tuesday in the county courthouse in Carrizozo.

But since the initial request was submitted by gallery owner Barbara Westbrook following a fatal attack of her son's Doberman by two pit bulls, the proposed ordinance has been generalized to cover all dogs shown to be vicious by their actions. It would require relocating or killing the dogs, depending on the severity of their actions. Other provisions mentioned by Westbrook include requirements for owners of female dogs in heat to keep them in inaccessible areas and more stringent safety measures for owners of higher risk dogs such as pit bulls.

Commissioners also will review the annual civil emergency preparedness budget submitted by Maggi Bohks, Emergency Medical Services Coordinator, will take action on a resolution opposing an inequitable price increase in hydroelectric power and will amend a series of ordinances to spell out requirements for residency and attendance.

Ruidoso educator racks up honors

The honors keep rolling onto the shoulders of Mike Kakuska, principal of Ruidoso High School.

Named Principal of the Year by the New Mexico Administrators Association, he also has been asked to join other top national educators for a celebration in Washington D.C. and is one of four selected to testify before the U.S. Senate Committee on Labor and Human Resources.

Burger King has taken the principal and teacher of the year from each state and has developed a four-day program to salute them," he said. "It's just for fun. We'll have dinner with country singer Randy Travis in Washington D.C."

"It's a chance to get to talk to other principals about what they're doing."

But what started out as simply a "fun" trip, already has turned into a working session, he said.

A few years ago, Kakuska was a member of the Governor's Briefing Council for President George Bush's Education Summit and made several presentations. The feedback was favorable and apparently Kakuska left a lasting impression.

Scott Thomas of the National Association of Secondary School Principals asked Kakuska to be the national spokesman for all principals during a Friday meeting in Washington.

"I'll be starting the program," Kakuska said. He'll be followed by NBC television's national news anchorman Tom Brokaw and possibly by President Bush.

"I'm flattered," Kakuska said.

In addition, 30 educators around the United States were asked to respond to the President's America 2000 (education) plan and four were picked to testify in front of the U.S. Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee. I have to go up and meet with (the committee).

"I just spent last Wednesday evening with Gov. Bruce King, who got a copy of the testimony."

As a result of all the national attention, Kakuska won't be around his office at the high school much for the next three weeks.

The thrust of his remarks is that while Bush's goals — total literacy, pre-school preparation, new heights in mathematics and science, drug-free schools — are "very laudable," they are not very realistic without a united national

effort by business, government, schools, churches and families.

"We should be grateful to the President for putting education in the forefront and I applaud him for it," Kakuska said. "But at the same time, we need to look at what's going on in schools."

For example, Ruidoso High suffers from an attendance problem.

That's not an administration problem, but that's a symptom of bigger problems. Even if the students are skipping just to enjoy a sunny day outside, they're telling you that they value that more than education," Kakuska said.

The breakdown of family and church values also have impacted schools, he said.

"When I started in administration 10 years ago, I was a hardnose, especially with latchkey kids when I couldn't get their parents to come in for conferences."

But I found out that we mostly were talking about single mothers with poor education, working for minimum wage, living in a trailer, holding down two jobs and giving most of what they made to their kids. They were doing everything they possibly could for the kid," he said.

But the type of support the child needed the most was the type the parent couldn't deliver, supervision and educational emphasis.

"I'm asking, what are you going to do to enable this lady to get a better education, to enable her to take a school interest in the kid," Kakuska said.

School staff members are turning into social service people instead of educators, he said.

"Everybody says it's a school problem, educators say it's a problem of parents and society," Kakuska said.

I think we're doing some good things," Kakuska said. "Let's build on that, not throw out the baby with the bath water."

In his written testimony for the Senate, Kakuska said secondary teachers are frustrated.

"Teachers are finding less and less time to do what they were best trained to do, teach subject matter," he wrote. They must counsel, intervene in crisis situations, keep a volume of records, raise money and sponsor activities. "And they are being asked to do more in the fields of science and technology, but are not being given the tools with which to do the job."

Good teaching is the product of well-trained, good teachers who are eager to do their jobs, motivated to work with students and able to

communicate with them, he said.

"Although important, money, longer school days, enriched curriculum and all the new concepts for education will not enrich our educational system unless teachers are willing and able to make them work," Kakuska wrote.

One of the major frustrations facing the system today is the inability of many of our students to focus on academics," he wrote.

While 50 years ago most students came from two-parent homes and did not use drugs, the opposite is true today.

"Fifty years ago, these and many other social ills were dealt with by agencies other than our public schools," he wrote. "The church and family were foremost in the battle," but many of those traditional institutions are absent today and we find that the public schools are being asked to shoulder the main body of the social responsibility.

Fifty years ago, the students termed "at risk" were in the minority, he said.

"Today, we are finding that they may be the majority in many of our schools and may be heavily influencing our traditionally stronger students in an adverse way."

The term "at risk" also has been expanded to include unwed mothers, the homeless students, those from broken homes, abused children, suicidal students, neglected students and students from single parent homes.

"No longer can we take only a traditional view of how we will teach our children," Kakuska wrote.

Schools must become relevant and inviting to all students, he said.

"We cannot pattern an educational system that has roots in the 1930s for today's students," Kakuska wrote.

Curriculum must change to stay relevant. In conjunction with that, Kakuska sees a need to lengthen the school year and to free time for teachers to learn different teaching techniques and strategies.

By lengthening the school year, the time at home alone for latchkey students would be reduced and teachers would not have to take up to six weeks for remediation in the fall to gain back what students lose over the summer.

"This (traditional school year) is antiquated and it dooms our educational system to mediocrity," he said, recommending a longer

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in the closet. I'll guarantee you that."

Chino said the state also could apply for the grant so that they could track any plans.

"We will not say we're going to do this until we have in hand a report that would have involved scientists, nuclear experts, who can give us the kind of a report that we expect to receive from the grant," he said.

"We're interested in involving some of the individuals who have influence, reputation and the knowledge and technology to tell us about the feasibility of the project."

Some guests were concerned that there is no current data available that could accurately assess probable impacts of nuclear waste storage over 40 years. This level of waste has never been stored that long before.

They also expressed doubt that once established, a storage facility would be dismantled by the government.

Miller Hudson of Pacific Nuclear Systems, which builds the storage containers for spent nuclear fuel rods, was asked about the history of nuclear waste storage.

"Nuclear waste storage has been a problem since the Manhattan project in the early 1940s," he said.

"I think it would be fair to say that during the 1940s and 1950s these materials were not handled as well as we might like. You only have to read the stories about the canyons in Los Alamos where materials were dumped."

Hudson said the creation of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission was really the first occasion where the federal government said we just can't leave this for everybody to make up their own mind on how they are going to dispose of these materials.

"Nuclear power reactor materials have been safely stored for almost half a century," he said.

He did not say how long this high hazard type of nuclear waste has been stored.

Village deputy manager Gary Jackson asked when the tribe would receive an answer to their request for a grant application.

Hudson said in a few weeks.

"Is there any formal or informal

process where the state is involved in endorsing the plan?" Jackson asked.

"No," Hudson said. "That's why we recommended the governor make this own application with \$100,000 and then (the state) could track the work the Mescalero Apache tribe is performing. We would welcome that."

Councilor Bill Karn asked why the nuclear waste wasn't stored at White Sands with its millions of square acres and its history of nuclear research.

Hudson said White Sands is one of several options under consideration.

One spectator asked if the federal government could bypass the state by dealing with the sovereign Mescalero nation.

He replied that was a definite possibility.

Chino said recent articles in *The Ruidoso News* implied that he alone was making plans to pursue the high hazard nuclear waste project.

"I don't know what Mr. Peto from the tribal council said, but it is 100 percent supported by the tribal council," he said. "Vendell Chino is not the lone duck."

"The most important thing that the tribal council is interested in is the feasibility study."

"If the feasibility study does not conclude that it's going to be a safe project, we're just going to drop it."

"We're just as concerned about our community as you are about your community," he said.

Members of the village council did not ask Chino if he had considered what impact such a storage facility would have on the tourist industry of Lincoln County or to the tribe-operated Inn of the Mountain Gods and Ski Apache.

Chino also said the feasibility study is a business proposition and not a political consideration tied to an upcoming tribal election.

Chino clearly outdistanced his opponent in a recent primary election and is expected to win reelection easily to his post as president, a position he has held for more than 35 years.

There was speculation among those attending that the temporary storage facility could be a trade off for the casino Chino has been trying to get approved for the reservation.

MainStreet maps out Midtown plans

Surveyors are setting the stage to implement Ruidoso's master plan for Midtown.

George Radnovich and Jim White of Bohannon-Huston, the Albuquerque firm contracted to do the engineering and planning for the Midtown project, met with village officials Thursday and then gave an update to MainStreet's board.

Radnovich and White will work closely with village officials until final streetscape improvement documents and planning are completed by April of 1992. A timeline was outlined Thursday to board members.

Project manager Radnovich, a landscape architect, said plans should be 60 percent complete, down to some fairly solid cost figures, by January when the New Mexico Legislature meets. State funding will be sought at that time.

Bohannon-Huston is charged with providing engineering design services for improvements to storm drainage, sidewalks, curb and gutter, landscaping, lighting and signalization along Sudderth Drive from Mechem Drive to Carter's Lane, in three phases.

The first phase covers from Fern Avenue, where the telephone company offices are located, to Country Club Road.

A public meeting has been called for 9 a.m. Nov. 14 in council chambers at Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center for input into the planning.

In the meantime, Bohannon-Huston will be meeting with individual shop owners along the route for input and to deal with special problems if they develop.

Radnovich said the present power poles will be removed and that wiring will be underground. Brackets for MainStreet seasonal banners will be designed into the new lighting plans, he said.

One board member warned the architect and engineer that some shop owners will resent any interruption of business during the construction phase of the project after funding is found.

He said not everyone is in favor of the project because of business interruptions.

The project will be designed and implemented to conform to and be consistent with the New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Department's co-op program guideline requirements. Sudderth Drive is a state highway.

Two additional reviews during the engineering phase will be scheduled, when plans are 80 percent complete and when plans are 100 percent complete.

Public input will be sought all along the way, the project manager indicated.

In other business, member Herb Brunell said he has been asked by

Mayor Victor Alonso to serve on a committee to decide on what events the village should seek when the civic events center is built.

The committee also would analyze and make recommendations concerning the future of the annual Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally. The rally this year was marked with controversy after a shooting at Winner's Circle involving bikers who apparently were not registered for the official rally.

Brunell said he hadn't decided whether to accept the committee assignment and asked if MainStreet Ruidoso wanted to take

a stand on how the influx of motorcyclists can best be handled in the future.

Member Don Dutton said it is his opinion that the sponsor should provide "rent-a-cops" and porta potties for downtown during the rally.

Board members said MainStreet would help with "any survey" seeking opinions and advice regarding future motorcycle rallies, but that involvement as an organization will be restricted to that.

A second bid will be sought on the providing of 26 "winter banners" to grace power poles in the area.

The nation also must look at the role of local school boards. In many communities they exercise too much power in the areas of employment and everyday running of schools, Kakuska said.

The ramifications of such an approach can be, and

in many cases, are devastating," Kakuska said. "This is especially true when considering the need for consistency in educational programming. In New Mexico this past year, 33 of 88 local superintendents of schools were replaced."

Kakuska also was critical of an education system that rewards students who live in prosperous states.

"No one should be penalized just because he or she comes from a poor state," he wrote. "We have non-

educational national programs that recognize the need for financial assistance. Why don't we see the need in education as well?"

Better pay and benefits are needed to attract the "brightest and best" to education, he said.

"In business, we always hear the adage that you get what you pay for. Why does that suddenly seem inappropriate when discussing our educators and their compensation?" he wrote.

"I applaud our lawmakers for making education more than just lip service," he wrote. "I applaud our president for bringing education to the forefront. I ask that we do not look at quick fixes that will leave education in its present condition, but rather that we make the hard choices to remedy the concerns that are so easily recognizable if we look inwardly at the strengths and weaknesses that our schools have today."

You better shop around

Not all hospitals and clinics are created equal

A large segment of the public appears to be under the impression that all hospitals are the same by general definition.

Nothing could be further from the truth. They differ in the kinds of services offered, in costs and in levels of delivery.

And the simple fact is that the marketing of a hospital is no more complicated than a hardware store which primarily relies on what the market will bear.

Over the centuries, people have developed a reverential attitude toward hospitals because their lives often depend on them.

But in today's world, hospitals are a business. The traditional public hospital owned by local government and accountable directly to the voter is disappearing, to be replaced by privately-owned, profit-making corporations. That business atmosphere often affects the types of service offered and the level of hospital charges.

Cost is not necessarily the only consideration in choosing a hospital.

Other factors are the range of services available, the average cost per patient day, the number of employees for each patient bed, the cost of key services, the location of the facility and its overall comparison to other hospitals in the area are all important.

The Lincoln County Medical Center compares favorably in services with other hospitals of equal size and is a source of community pride.

However, a recent letter to the editor at *The Ruidoso News* once again points out the consumer frustration over spiraling medical costs.

Every consumer has the right to make an informed decision on hospital care and the availability of that information is woefully inadequate.

The statistical data to make such decisions is available, but it is primarily aimed at medical personnel, written in medical jargon and costly.

LCMC, a 38-bed hospital with a 105 employees, compares very favorably to other

hospitals

The number of services it offers is small because Lincoln County's population base is small and some services couldn't generate enough patient use to warrant that service's cost.

There are no Rolls Royce dealerships in Ruidoso for much the same reason.

The hospital does offer: ambulatory services, ambulatory surgery services, blood bank, combined intensive medical-surgical coronary care unit, CT scanner (on the way), emergency services (24-hour coverage with on call physicians only), mammogram, obstetrics, physical therapy, skilled nursing care, certified Medicare-Medicaid, social work services, speech-language pathology and ultrasound. There may be other services.

The hospital doesn't offer: burn intensive care, cardiac catheterization laboratory, coronary care unit, emergency services (24-hour physician coverage in-house), medical-surgical intensive care unit, megavoltage radiation therapy, neonatal intensive care unit, occupational therapy, open heart surgery, organ bank, pediatric unit, pharmacy-full time regular pharmacist, psychiatric acute care, rehabilitation care, renal dialysis-inpatient or outpatient, residential care, substance abuse unit or X-ray or Cobalt therapy.

Information of this kind is valuable not only to review costs and services, but in making informed decisions for people traveling in unfamiliar territory when a medical emergency arises.

A hospital's delivery of services also is an important consideration in choice.

Is it a separately organized, staffed and equipped unit of the hospital (discrete)? Or

are the services maintained in the hospital, but not in a separate unit (nondiscrete)?

Is that service contracted, but hospital based?

Is that service not maintained in the hospital, but available from an outside contractor?

Is that service shared under an agreement? Are clinic services commonly provided in the emergency suite to non-emergency outpatients by hospital based physicians or residents?

The average cost per day for LCMC is \$1,200 which would be considered high if it were not for the average length of stay which is 3.3 days, on the low side of average for most hospitals.

The ratio of employees to patient bed is 4.2 at LCMC. That is excellent if you are a patient. As a comparison, profit-oriented and highly successful Humana hospitals have a ratio averaging slightly over three employees to a patient bed, not as good.

However, hospitals that exceed a ratio of five employees to a patient bed, except for psych hospitals, usually are hospitals in financial trouble.

Hospital costs evolve around illness categories called Diagnostic Related Groups (DRG).

Complications during treatment may affect the average costs of a hospital for DRGs if there is a limited number of admissions under that category.

DRG costs include: hospital services ordered by your physician, such as X-ray and lab charges, tests, drugs and hospital room. It also includes medical supplies used in your treatment and personal care items, such as surgical gowns.

These figures do not include fees for ser-

vices which will be charged directly to you by your physician.

DRGs can vary by thousands of dollars and sometimes for no other reason than whatever the market will bear.

Hospitals are very conscious of what their neighbor is doing. If the cost to you is thousands of dollars, then it may pay to search around even in a different state.

An example of a DRG that merits looking around is normal childbirth for the mother. This DRG is considered a vaginal delivery without complicated diagnosis that includes single and multiple delivery, eclampsia, breech, face and other positions. It can vary as much as \$5,000 from hospital to hospital.

You can help contain your own hospital costs and help the hospitals too.

If tests have been recommended, call both hospitals and independent laboratories to compare prices for their services.

Regular checkups with your physician is preventive medicine. Use health-screening services (often free) from hospitals or county health departments, such as blood pressure, diabetes or cholesterol testing. Detect problems before they become serious and more expensive to treat.

Don't demand that minor surgical procedures be done in the hospital if they can be easily performed in your doctor's office. Outpatient care may be more economical.

If you are not really sick, don't demand that your doctor hospitalize you.

Don't use hospital emergency rooms for non-emergencies.

When hospitalized, don't demand extra, needless convalescent days.

Superfluous costs also are an obvious key reason for higher insurance rates.

Insurance companies have become the diagnostician for the hospitals today. Case in point:

In the early Betty Ford days it became fashionable for celebrities to stand on the stump next to their publicists and profess they had a drug problem.

That problem, like alcohol, cocaine, and the food addictions of bulimia, anorexia and what appeared at times as narcissism, cost about \$16,000 for a six-weeks stay in a clinic in the early eighties.

Some insurance companies paid and the psychodemography of various locations were targeted for states with those insurance companies.

Ripoffs occurred. One doctor in the New Jersey area networked personnel directors in search of alcoholics and drug addicts within huge resorts. Those addicted personnel would be sent to a well-known clinic and the doctor would receive a handsome consultant's fee.

If a hard core addict skipped the program at one clinic, he would be transferred to another clinic for another handsome fee.

The addict was paying nothing. Insurance companies were bearing the entire cost and they were getting pasted with these fashionable diseases.

Not being fools, they decided six weeks was too long. They would pay for 28 days.

Concurrently, clinics decided they could treat that person in 28 days and adjusted their programs.

The whole addiction program began a series of mini adjustments resulting in declining insurance premiums.

Clinics that demanded inpatient services only, found it lucrative and necessary to offer an outpatient service.

It became harder to collect 100 percent from the insurance companies, so the blossoming of so many addiction clinics hit it's peak on the bell curve.

The fact is most addiction clinics are a modification of Alcoholic Anonymous's 12-step method offered in many areas throughout the United States.

The bottom line is that the consumer needs to be better informed.

Some states have cost containment boards where data is collected so that the public can make informed decisions, but those states are few. And hospitals shouldn't be left to be their own watchdogs.

All animals adopted from the shelter must be spayed or neutered to prevent the production of more unwanted litters and the heart-breaking prospect that they might be abandoned or have to be destroyed.

The shelter in the last few weeks has begun to fill up again and that's when Basch has to make life and death decisions for the animals brought there.

If you've been thinking about adding a cat or dog to your family, now would be a good time. The shelter houses tortoise shell, tabby, black and many other varieties of cats.

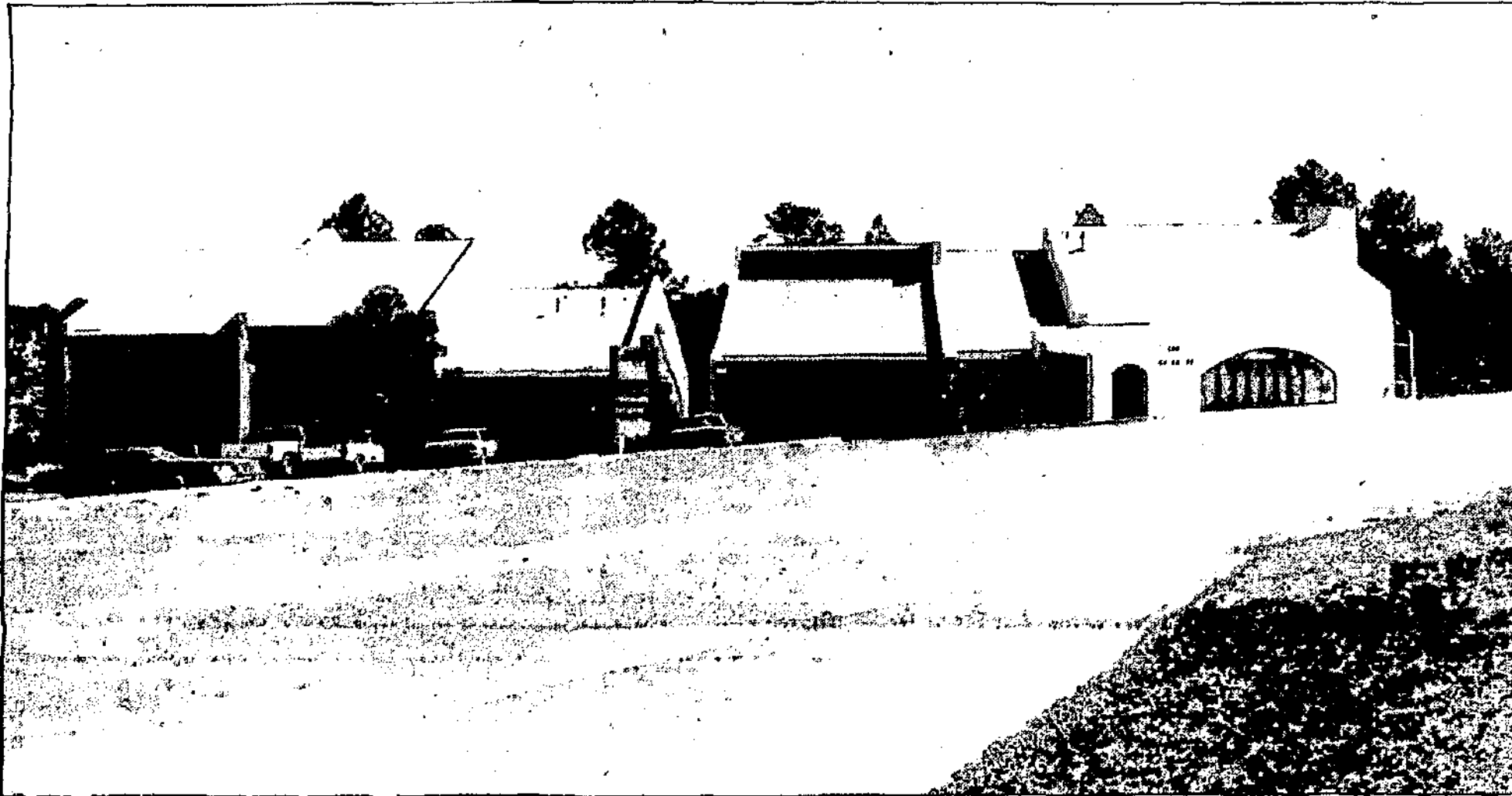

The meeting is open to the public.



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

This is the bright blue weather that welcomes in the favorite season of Indian summer; and year after year I have seen these special days welcome in my birthday.

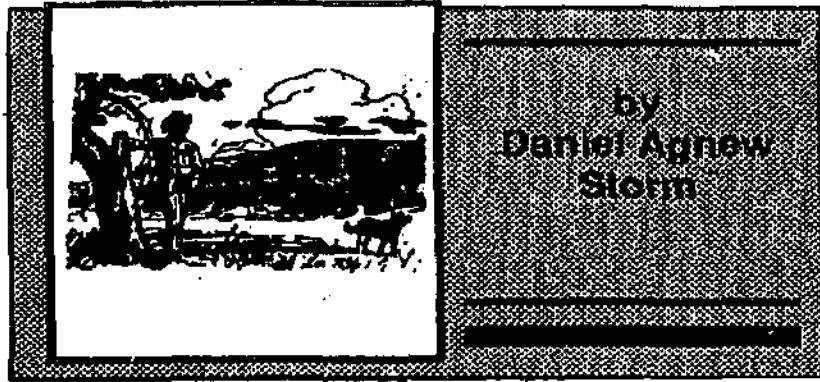

Inside the Outdoors

Bring wildlife into the classrooms

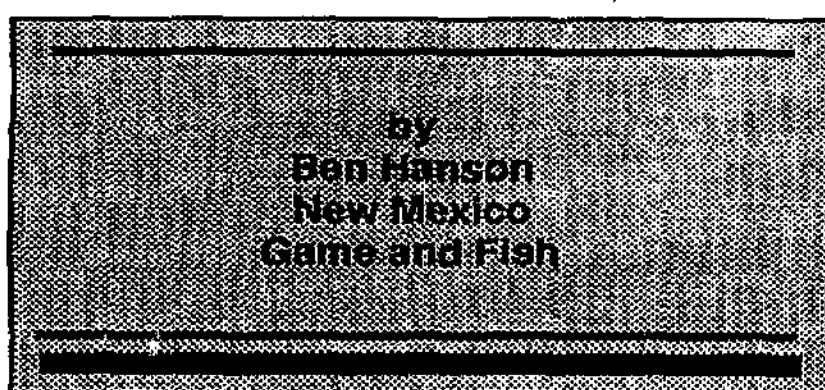
The number of people living in New Mexico is increasing every year. As more and more people move into the state, our cities and towns expand, leaving less room for wildlife.

What does the future hold for wildlife? I don't have an answer for this question, but I do know one thing. The future of our wildlife depends on the value placed on it by our young people. The more knowledge and appreciation youngsters have for wildlife the better it's chance for survival.

This is the reason the Department of Game and Fish began an environmental education program in the state. The program is designed to help learners of all ages develop an awareness and appreciation for the wildlife resource. It is called "Project Wild" and so far almost 8,000 educators in New Mexico have gone through the program.

The program was developed for use by educators who work with kindergarten through high school age youth. Although primarily designed for use by school teachers, the materials can easily be used by other youth leaders including those who work with Boy and Girl Scout troops, 4-H groups or FFA clubs.

The heart of the Project Wild instructional materials are two manuals which contain about 140 wildlife related activities. There is also an "Aquatics" Project Wild manual available which contains another 40 activities deal-



ing with our precious water resource.

They may be used to help teach all subject and skill areas from kindergarten through the twelfth grade. The manuals are not a full curriculum, but are individual activities that are intended to supplement and enrich, not replace, educational materials teachers are already using.

Perhaps the greatest asset of the program for teachers is the fact that it is based on wildlife. Children of all ages are naturally interested in wild critters. Using wildlife to teach other subjects increases student interest and participation while at the same time giving the youngsters some basic wildlife principles. The activities may be used to teach a wide variety of subjects including math, reading, language arts, history, biology and even music.

Project Wild may just be the way to add a

little extra zest to a normal teaching technique.

There are three other qualities of Project Wild that make the program attractive to educators.

First, each activity contains a section with all the necessary background information on the wildlife concept involved. In other words, busy teachers will not have to do additional research in order to be able to perform the activity.

Second, most of the teaching activities do not require expensive or elaborate materials or preparations. And last, most of the activities may be easily conducted in the classroom or on the school grounds eliminating the need for expensive and difficult to arrange field trips that are normally associated with nature study.

Teachers and other interested educators that wish to participate in Project Wild can do so by attending a workshop coordinated by the Department of Game and Fish. To set up a workshop in your area contact Heidi Solper at 827-7867. Workshops can be either a normal six hours in length or a longer 16 hours that earns the participant one hour of college credit.

If you are a teacher, think about Project Wild. The future of our wildlife depends on our youth and without knowledge and understanding sound decisions on questions concerning wildlife cannot be made.

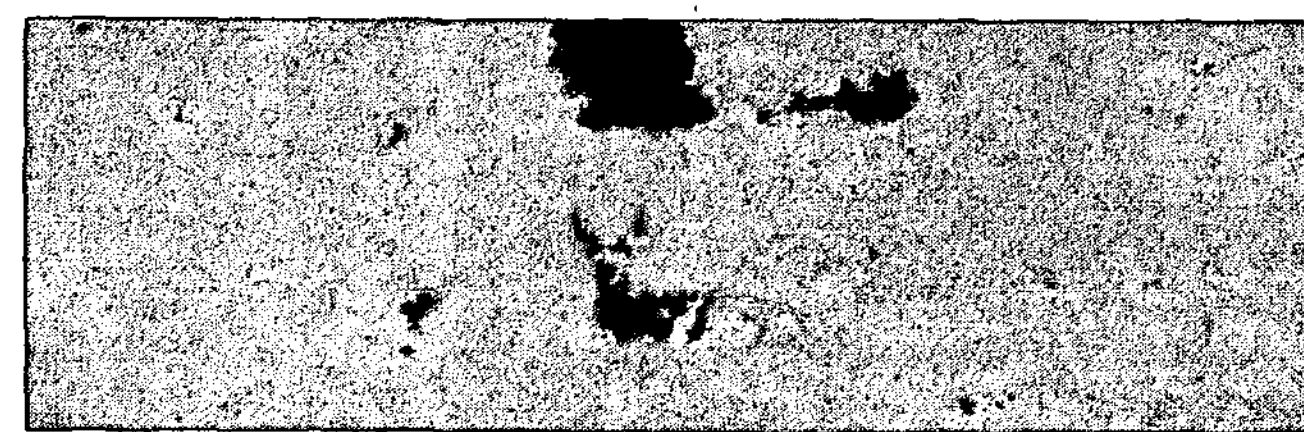

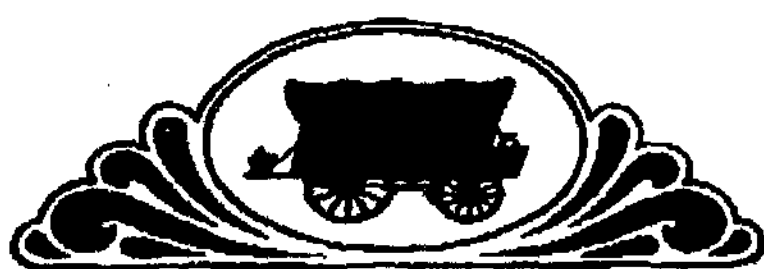

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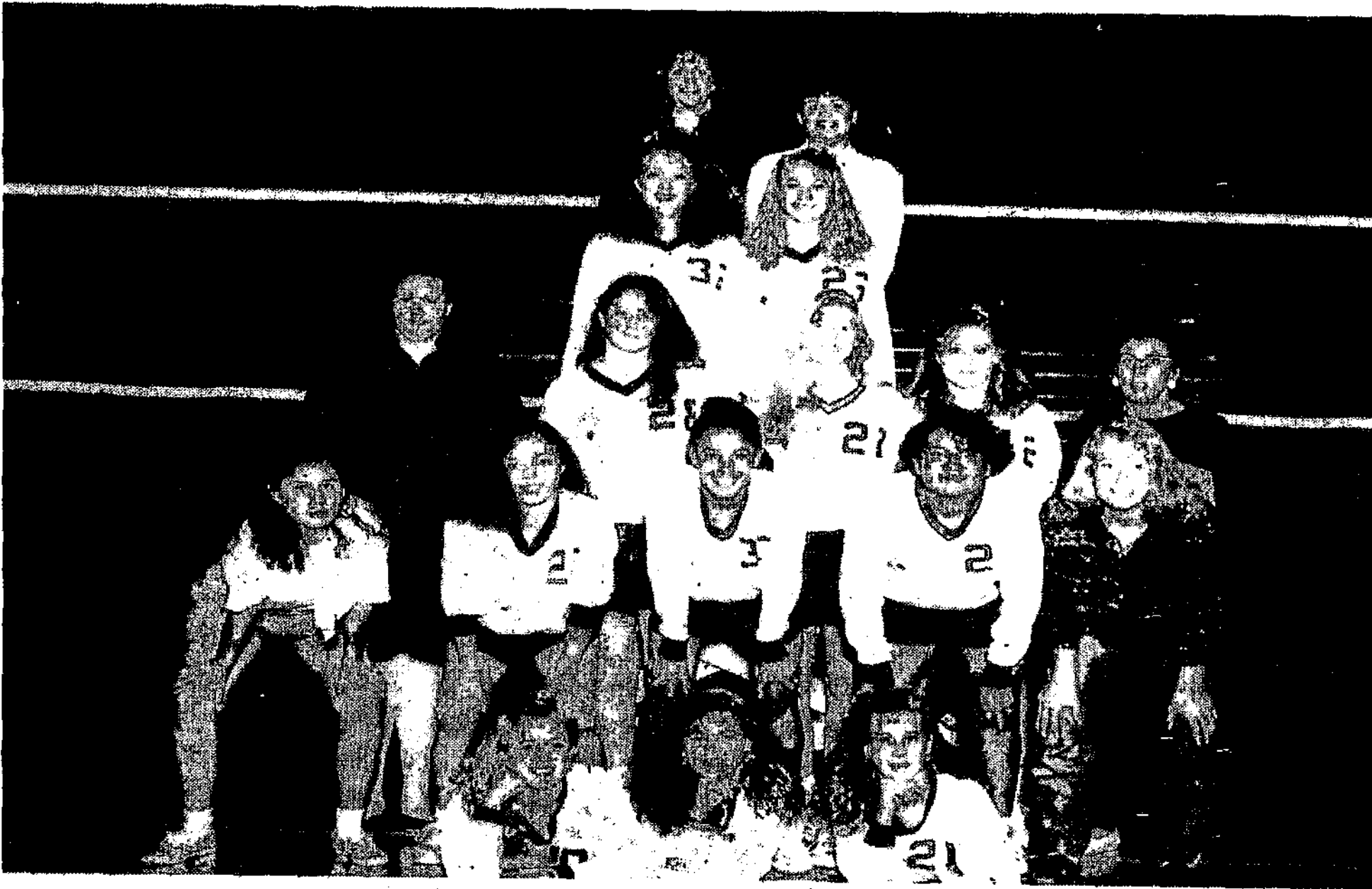

Take the tour to Lake Lucero

An auto caravan to White Sands National Monument's Lake Lucero, the source of the white sands, is scheduled for Sunday, Oct. 27. Reservations are required, and can be obtained by calling Monument Headquarters, at 479-6124. The caravan is limited to 30 vehicles.

Each person should have sufficient drinking water, a snack if desired, sunglasses, stout walking shoes, and suitable dress for the weather. Cameras may not be used while passing through the Missile Range, but are encouraged for use while at the Monument lake area.

All persons will need to be at the Small Missile Range Gate intersection by the departure time of 2 p.m. No vehicles may join the caravan once it leaves for the lake.

Nob Hill overflows with more and more students

Since Roger Sowder took over as principal at Nob Hill Elementary School, he can remember only one year when the faculty and students had breathing space.

The consistent growth at the lower grades levels initially kept pace and then outdistanced renovation and expansion projects.

Five classes and special education are conducted in three portable units, the multi-purpose room/cafeateria is too small and there is a critical need for additional space for storage, special education and ancillary services.

Sowder's dream is to see Nob Hill evolve into a school that focuses entirely on early childhood education, from pre-school programs through kindergarten.

A proposed \$5.5-million bond issue being presented to voters by the Ruidoso School Board Nov. 12 would be a giant step toward that goal.

HISTORY

"I came here eight years ago and the building was in transition then," Sowder said.

"The district was encapsulating asbestos and was in the process of building the new high school. A section of the lobby was walled off and we were housing students there and in a portion of the multi-purpose room.

"There were exposed shelves in that area and up and down the hallway. The special education sessions were conducted in the custodian's room. We were very overcrowded."

Nob Hill is the oldest school in the district, built in 1955. It was followed quickly by a high school that was converted to Ruidoso Middle School when the new Ruidoso High School was completed in 1983.

At that time, Nob Hill was home to kindergarten through second grades, but with the opening of the new school, second grade was moved to White Mountain Elementary with third grade. Fourth and fifth attend White Mountain Intermediate.

"But today we're back at about the same space situation with the portables, although we don't have the overflow into the hallways," Sowder said. The current school enrollment stands at about 370 students.

"We've always had portables, except for one year right after the 1985-86 bond issue when a five-classroom wing was added," he said. "We moved the kindergarten down there and renovated the old building. For one year, everybody was under the same roof and we used the portables for storage."

But the next year, one class had to be moved back outside to the portable and the trend has continued.

"We failed to create enough storage space then (1985-86) and that is one of the critical needs now," he said.

SPACE DEMANDS

While the overall district saw no

growth for three consecutive years from 1985-88, the grades at the elementary level continued to add students and new programs that also demanded space.

About the same time, the mandate for maximum class sizes of 20 students or less was handed down by the state and that triggered the need for more classrooms.

For the last two years, the district has seen a growth spurt of 11 percent, further straining its physical facilities. A major portion of that growth has taken place at the elementary and middle school levels.

Growth aside, new emphasis in education has created new programs that require room, Sowder said.

"With education changing, we need space for small pull-out groups such as a the bilingual program, the developmentally disabled, any "at risk" students or those sent out with an aide for special work," he said. "We need space for conferences, screening and meetings with parents, occupational and physical therapy, for the counselor and for the physical education teacher."

Hovering on the horizon also may be state mandated full-day kindergarten, which would place an additional burden on Nob Hill. This year, two new teachers had to be

hired to accommodate a ninth first grade class and one additional half-day kindergarten class. The rest of the kindergarten teachers handle morning and afternoon sessions.

The possibility of a Headstart program for economically disadvantaged pre-school children has been discussed.

"Even with the bond issue, those additions would bring us up to maximum space almost immediately," Sowder said.

BOND ISSUE

The proposed bond issue would not add rooms at Nob Hill, but the first grade would be moved to a new \$3-million school that also would house second grade, freeing some classrooms at White Mountain Elementary.

That would bring the kindergarten classes and the developmentally disabled group back into the main building.

But four additional classrooms would be required if all-day kindergarten is approved, and that would eat up any gains at the portables.

"Basically, this building remains in good shape," Sowder said. "When it was renovated everything was tailored for early childhood students, the sinks and commodes are lower."

Voters will cast their ballots from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 12, in the gymnasium foyer at Ruidoso Middle School. All registered voters in Ruidoso Municipal Schools District 3 will be eligible to vote in the election.

would pay for minor repairs at the school such as roof leaks and cracking seams. The remainder slated for Nob Hill would be used to upgrade its computers.

Sowder said he enjoys his role and his mini-sized students.

"I absolutely have a special feeling for the little ones," he said. "I see this as so important, the foundation for the rest of their lives."

"High schools draw a lot of public attention, but the attitudes that are formed here last a lifetime."

The young children are "so positive and can be influenced so easily. It makes out job extremely important."

Sowder would like to see a very broad early childhood program in Ruidoso. That would include a Headstart program and expansion of the program for three- and four-year-old children.

"I would like to broaden the pre-school screening program so we can further remediate those children preparing for school," he said. "Nationwide, there are studies showing that children are coming to school not ready for school."

He also would like an expanded parental in-service program with emphasis on nutrition from birth to three-years-old.

"This type of approach is the trend nationwide," he said. "We need this for Ruidoso to keep up."

What's the point?

We have a councilor who likes to ask, "What's the point?"

When some were critical of Councilor Ron Andrews' for-profit motorcycle rally being subsidized by lodgers tax funds and costing the village no telling what for security, traffic control and cleanup, Andrews commented that he made a profit, so "what's the point?"

That's a \$2,500 question — or maybe a \$2,000 — or even a \$1,500 question depending on whether you're promoting a bikers rally or you're concerned about animal control for the village or even if you're promoting Christmas Jubilee, a non-profit Christmas event sponsored by the Ruidoso Valley Greeters. There are several issues here.

First the \$2,500 question: we join Andrews in standing up for the right of any business person to make a profit. Such free enterprise is what makes America great. But, we don't believe that tax money should be used to assure a profit for a private enterprise. That's one point.

Second: the \$2,000 question: we differ with Andrews and the council on refusing to increase the monthly contract with the Humane Society and then forcing the Society to spend \$2,000 for workmen's compensation insurance. Since that requirement is over and above state and federal regulations, and since the village usually doesn't dictate such requirements to a contractor, we question why it's being done this time.

This village used to spend much more for animal control than is currently being expended under the contract with the Humane Society, and still councilors are asking the society to open its books regarding funding sources in addition to the village contract. It's unusual for a contractor providing a service to be required to open its books regarding other sources of incomes.

Seems that Andrews, who happily takes tax money to support his for-profit venture, is taking the lead on keeping the Human Society's contract at last year's level and adding additional expenses. He also was a party to approving a Lodgers Tax Committee budget that gave the Christmas Jubilee just \$1,500. That's a lot less than the Greeters, a volunteer, non-profit group, requested, and they had to go back twice to even get that much. It's also \$1,000 less than Ron got for his own event.

We have to ask, "So, what's the point, Ron?"

A. Your question is incredibly timely, Tom.
