New group takes on garbage duties

The Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority, a group formed to operate garbage pickup and disposal for the entire county, had its organizational meeting Friday. Members elected officers and set forth qualifications for an authority and director. Funding will come through an environmental gross receipts tax and user fees.

Garbage history was made Friday with the formation of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority during a lengthy meeting at Cree Meadows Country Club.

The 11 members, attorneys and other of-

ficials reviewed the history of Lincoln County solid waste, before Ruidoso Mayor Victor Alonso was voted chairperson of the new board. Frank Warth, mayor of Capitan was voted vice-chairperson and Stirling Spencer, Lincoln County Commission Chairman, was voted secretary-treasurer.

The first course of action for the new authority was to approve an Open Meetings Resolution, similar to that already in force for the county and village commissions. Alonso said anytime six members assemble for a solid waste meeting, the press would be notified.

Al Junge, authority member and

Ruidoso village councilor was asked to arrange surety bonds of \$100,000 each for the three officers and a solid waste manager.

The group spent considerable time determining the qualifications for the new solid waste superintendent.

The authority was concerned that the pay be high enough to attract qualified individuals. Initial salary recommendations ranged from \$30,000-\$50,000. Junge suggested a manager who excelled in his work could receive a \$25,000 raise.

The authority wanted a degreed person or a person with a minimum of five years experience in a related field, who was

strong in a variety of management skills.

The authority agreed that initially all residents of Lincoln County should be billed by the LCSWA. They then would be eligible to be exempted from the program with an individual request.

A rough draft of the authority's joint powers agreement was submitted by Robert Beauvais, county attorney. Alonso led the group in a page by page examination of the document.

The district was created under provisions of state statutes. Beauvais cited the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas and the Eagle Creek Water Association as two

similar districts.


The joint powers agreement spells out how the various political entities will operate the district.

Under the agreement, the authority can issue revenue bonds.

Once the various county municipalities and the county sign the joint powers agreement, only the special district commission would have the power to remove them from their obligation to the authority.

The new environmental tax will not be collected for two months. With no up front

School bus drivers celebrate another safe year

Ruidoso school bus drivers got together Friday to celebrate another safe year.

Donnie Weems, superintendent for the school bus program, thanked the bus contractors, drivers and aides for all their hard work and complimented them on a continuing safe driving record.

The 21 buses that transport about 1,600 students a day logged more than 330,000 miles on their daily rounds last year, according to contractor Rick Simpson, who operates 18 of those buses. Simpson said the local bus drivers have gone five or six years in a row without having even a fender bender.

"We've never had a major injury or fatal accident," said Simpson.

That safe driving record extends to contractors Jack Kannady, Irene Nosker and Earl Allison who operate one bus each.

Weems said Nosker has maintained her safe driving record throughout her 37 years as a school bus driver. Kannady has been driving for 17 years, Allison for 15 years,

and Imogene Miranda has been driving one of Simpson's buses for 12 years.

"I feel you're just as important a part of this school system as any of us," said Weems. "When the system works like this, it's because of you — the workers."

"You're doing a great job," said Weems, who went on to say that he and the drivers are always on the lookout for ways to improve the system.

"We want to ensure that every child has a safe and quiet ride home," said Weems.

He noted that people are especially aware of the way the drivers operate their buses, and once in awhile he gets a call from someone concerned about the way a school bus is being operated. He investigates every complaint.

"People recognize the school bus as a vehicle that should be safe," said Weems. Simpson described the qualifications and training of school bus drivers.

"They have to prove to me they are upstanding citizens and good drivers before we'll start training them," said Simpson. Applicants for the driving jobs must already be qualified to drive a vehicle.

The drivers are then trained a minimum of 40 hours before they are licensed as school bus drivers.

After Simpson hires a driver, that person has to be approved by the Ruidoso School Board and the State School Board before they may begin driving the school route.

Besides the drivers training, school bus

drivers and aides are trained in first aid, defensive driving and assertive discipline.

The first year a driver is hired, that employee is required to attend a one-week school bus driver training session in Silver City. That training is then required once every three years.

Simpson said drivers also are required to take part in eight hours of in-service training.

On a recent snow day when the students got the day off, Simpson and his drivers located the iciest, worst roads they could find to practice driving on uncleared snow roads. Simpson said that kind of in-service is particularly important here in Ruidoso because snowstorms often hit in the middle of the day after school is in session, and the school bus drivers have to get their riders home in spite of the snow.

Simpson said he and his drivers discussed each and every obstacle they encountered during that snow driving session.

"Each and every driver can install snow-chains on their bus," said Simpson.

Child dies in stabbing

The FBI is on the scene today on the Mescalero Indian Reservation seeking information in the apparent stabbing death of a nine-year-old boy.

Bearing stab of Calvin Ray Davis, a search team early Sunday in a remote housing development on the reservation, according to FBI Agent Frank S. Quijada. Quijada is a supervisor out of Albuquerque.

The agent said the boy was at home Saturday night with several siblings. But when the mother or parents returned to the residence later Saturday night, the Davis child was found to be missing.

Police were called, and a search was instituted. The body was found, apparently, hours later.

The Davis boy is the son of Zandra Smith, Quijada said.

"We're just trying to determine what happened," the agent said.

He asked that anyone with information on the crime, call the FBI in Albuquerque at (505) 247-1555 or call the Mescalero police, at 671-4451.

School ski days are over & out

With Capitan not sending any students to Ski Apache for "school days" there, the school days program apparently is dead, at least for this year.

Dr. Scott Childress, Capitan superintendent, was notified by Roy Parker, Ski Apache director, that the program is canceled.

Parker told *The Ruidoso News* that Capitan was the only school in the area which was still planning to participate in the program.

At the direction of Wendell Chino, president of the Mescalero Apache tribe, Ruidoso and Tularosa were ruled out of the program back in December.

Since Hondo was on a four-day schedule with Mondays off, Hondo said it wasn't going to participate this year. Carrizozo schools had dropped out earlier.

Chino said in December that he canceled the program for Ruidoso and Tularosa because the two school districts and the state had refused to provide books and equipment to what is now considered by the State Department of Education as a private school on the reservation.

The friction between the Apaches and the school systems stems from a Tularosa School District directive that Mescalero students be bused in Tularosa following a fire that destroyed the Mescalero school last February.

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Fort Stanton facing losses of 24 clients and \$1 million

Fort Stanton will lose \$1 million under a court order that requires the Lincoln County facility, which employs 230 people, to move 24 clients out into some community based program. The court decision leaves a lot of unanswered questions, like where will these clients go and who will make up the difference in the hospital's \$7 million budget.

A federal court decision that could negatively impact Fort Stanton Hospital and Training Center will not be appealed, state officials decided Friday.

"The Governor and Attorney General decided not to appeal," John McKean, press secretary for Gov. Bruce King, said Monday. "Instead we will attempt to comply with U.S. District Judge James A. Parker's order and, if at some point, we are not able to reach an agreement acceptable to the judge and us, we could take that part of the case to a higher court at that time."

Parker ruled last December that Fort Stanton and Los Lunas Hospital must develop plans for the

transfer of some of their developmentally disabled clients to community programs. He gave the state until April 1 to develop a transfer plan and until September to address other cited deficiencies.

The state decided not to pursue the appeal for several reasons, McKean said, including the high cost of continuing litigation. "Just filing would cost \$100,000," he said.

But the main reason is that King basically agrees with Parker that clients should be moved into community-based programs, McKean said. "It was something the King administration wants to do anyway. If we appealed, we would have been arguing against ourselves. Large institutions are not necessarily the best or only solution to the problem, that's not to say they still won't be necessary."

The only problem is the tight timeframe imposed by Parker, McKean said. "It has come at a time when the state has relatively little to spend and it will cause us to move faster than we would have otherwise," he said.

The suit filed in 1987 against the state by Protection and Advocacy Systems Inc (PAS) asked for the closing of the Los Lunas and Fort Stanton facilities. The organization contended the state had failed to comply with the law that requires education and training in the least restrictive setting. The case went to trial last June.

Fort Stanton Administrator Ervin Aldaz said Saturday he is reviewing clients and working on a plan to comply with Parker's order.

The transfer of a possible 24 clients could cost Fort Stanton \$1-million of its annual \$7-million budget, which is financed through payments from Medicaid, Aldaz said. The hospital receives \$40,000 annually for each client.

"That's the biggest impact," he said. "We need to know what adjustments we have to make and how much the State Legislature will pick up in general appropriations."

Even though the number of clients would be reduced, the cost of

Ranchers are hit with hefty hike in grazing fees

Public lands account for about a third of the land in New Mexico and how that land is maintained and used has a major impact on the state's economy. Grazing fees are going up and that's going to affect ranchers in Lincoln County as well as the rest of the state.

For 96 years, the Pfingsten family has been grazing their cattle on federal land north of Bonito Lake.

Fred Pfingsten, 78, took over the permit from his father in 1942 and he's watched

"All increases, fees and taxes, hurt the ranchers," he said. "The way they determine the fee is to say that the cost of leasing private land is higher, but they aren't looking at the fact that with private land, the feed is always there because the cattle are only in one spot a short time. It's real good grazing."

"The land owner has to keep up the fences and water. But on government land, we have to pay a fee whether there is water or not, or feed or not. They're trying to compare, but the two are far from being equal."

Bureau. "The cattle industry is doing better and therefore, we're paying more for our grazing."

The 16-cent increase, a hike of 8.8 percent, was the result of higher beef prices and higher grazing fees on private lands, he said. It will remain in effect through February 29, 1992. Fees on private land run from \$4.50 to as high as \$12 per animal unit month.

Recent attempts in the U.S. Congress to raise the grazing fees to what McIlhenny characterized as outrageous levels for political rather than sound economic reasons were blocked, he said.

"But we anticipate this issue will surface again," he said. "This latest fee increase for grazing shows the current formula is sound and working."

In the last five years, the fee has increased by 45 percent, according to information from Skeen's office.

The Congressman has supported legislative efforts to lock in the formula as the standard for setting the fee.

In 1990, he also successfully fought against an attempt led by U.S. Representatives Mike Synar (D-OK) and Buddy Darden (D-GA) to raise grazing fees on federal lands by 50 percent over five years.


"Those individuals who are advocating higher grazing fees will be back," he said. "Just because we beat them last year, doesn't mean they will back down from their efforts."

Proponents of higher fees argue that the Western rancher is subsidized by the taxpayer at the same time he is destroying public rangeland. They contend the fees do not cover the cost of land management and haven't kept pace with fees on private grazing land.

But Skeen, a rancher himself, is convinced that grazing lands have been improved by the presence of the ranchers and their livestock, especially in the essential area of water availability, which also promotes the welfare of local wildlife.

Gerald Henke, director of rangeland management and ecology for the Southwest District of the U.S. Forest Service, agrees with Skeen.

"Many eco-systems are improving or improved by grazing that is scientifically managed, not just putting the cattle out in

the fee for grazing his livestock on 6,000 acres of public land steadily increase along with the other costs of operating the ranch.

He wasn't happy to hear about the latest jump in the federal grazing fee from \$1.81 to \$1.97 per animal unit month, effective March 1.

But he believes the current formula being used to determine the fee is fair and would like to see the government adopt it permanently.

"I feel we can live with this even though this is the highest grazing fee we've had in a long time," Pfingsten said early one snowy morning recently before leaving to check his livestock.

"This formula works real good. I'm happy they've got it this way," he said.

Capitan rancher LaMoigne Peters isn't quite that enthusiastic.

If the government drives the fee up too high, it could force some ranchers not to renew their permits, Peters said.

"A lot of land could be left idle because ranchers can't pay that much," he said. "They'll lose on the land because it can't produce income if it's vacant."

Keeping the land vacant is just what some environmentalists have in mind. They contend public land is overgrazed by domestic cattle.

More than one-third of New Mexico, nearly 23-million acres, is owned by the federal government. About 3,700 New Mexico ranchers depend on federal leases to provide a viable base for their livestock operations, according to the office of U.S. Rep. Joe Skeen (R-NM).

In Lincoln County, 114 ranchers graze their livestock on the 500,000 acres supervised by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM). Another 90 ranchers hold permits on two-thirds of the 250,000 acres managed by the U.S. Forest Service.

The grazing fee is charged for each animal unit month, which is defined as the amount of forage consumed by one cow and one calf, one horse, or five sheep or goats in one month.

"The grazing fee is established on a yearly basis through a formula which adjusts the fee up or down taking into account beef prices, production costs and forage values," said William McIlhenny, president of the New Mexico Farm and Livestock

spring and locating them again in the fall," Henke said. "That type of management will not be acceptable in the future."

"Certain plant species need grazedown by a certain percent of the annual growth and they thrive."

He compared grazing to lawn mowing. "A lawn does better under regular mowing as long as you don't get down into the root crown or cut at the wrong time like during a drought," Henke said.

Consideration also must be given to whether foliage is adequate, if there is good cover for wildlife and watershed protection.

"Many people not trained in the art and science of range management need to see a lot of growth to think an area is healthy," he said. "It's hard for them to understand."

The grazing fee formula, first instituted by the Congress in 1986, has been based on the ability to pay concept, Skeen said. When beef prices are low and production costs are high, the fee adjusts downward. But when beef prices are high and the cost of production remains stable, the fee goes up.

Barry Herd, Lincoln County agricultural agent, said he sympathizes with the plight of area ranchers and farmers.

"Any time there is an increase in anything that adds to the cost of operation, it's going to hurt," Herd said. "It's hard to com-

pare the use of public land with private leases where the owners care for the water, repair the fences and bear the other costs. When you lease federal or forestry land, they don't take care of it for you."

"I still don't think you can beat ranchers as stewards of the land. If this or later increases run them out of business, is the forestry going to hire someone to check every day on the water and fences?"

Joe Zilincar of the BLM said about 18,000 ranchers and farmers graze livestock on BLM administered lands. Most of the permit holders have small to medium livestock operations of from 100 head to 500 head, Zilincar said.

About \$18-million in grazing fees was collected in 1990, Zilincar said.

An amount equal to half of the grazing fees collected may be used for appropriation by Congress to the BLM to be spent on range improvement projects in districts where the fees are collected, he said. The remaining fees are divided among the states from which they are collected and the U.S. Treasury.

"Many rural communities are heavily dependent on grazing on public lands as an important part of their tax base to provide revenue for roads, schools and other services," Zilincar said.

operating the hospital would not go down accordingly, he said. The savings would amount to no more than \$100,000 to \$150,000, he estimated.

"We would still have 125 individuals to care for," he said.

McKean said the Department of Health and Environment has just started to work on a transfer and correction plan, "so we don't know what the impact will be on the two institutions. We have 200 days to comply" after the plans are approved by the court.

"It's possible that at some point they will need fewer people working at Fort Stanton, or at some point, it may not be needed for its current use at all," he said. "But no immediate change is contemplated."

He defined immediate as a matter of months. The major financial impact on the state may not be felt until 1993, McKean said.

"We are looking at using Fort Stanton for some other purpose so the economic impact will not necessarily be negative," McKean said. "We certainly hope that we can find a role that will assure its permanent presence. But over the long term, we feel by complying, the state will be able to serve the developmentally disabled better and probably more cheaply."

Aldaz said the most difficult part of the situation is that all potential community placement destinations are at capacity.

"So we have three main concerns: is there any space available throughout the state, who is going to pay for development of community programs if none are available and what about the relatives who prefer that their clients stay at Fort Stanton?"

Ina Cooper, chairman of Families for Fort Stanton, is one of

those relatives. Her son Calvin, 29, has lived at Fort Stanton for 11 years and she is convinced he has received excellent care.

"We felt very disappointed that the suit was filed without PAS being more considerate of our facility," she said. "They don't accept it as an adequate facility, but it is."

"In my opinion, what the judge said was that the programs statewide should be more geared to the needs of the clients. I feel the clients at Fort Stanton have been discriminated against by community programs, because they don't want (the clients). Programs need to be developed as we already have at Fort Stanton."

Cooper said, "The PAS should have taken the money they used to sue us and developed those programs with it. They spent millions trying to close Fort Stanton."

The 177-member families organization for Fort Stanton and Los Lunas was formed to protect the rights of the clients, Cooper said.

Aldaz said he is scheduled to meet this afternoon with the State Senate Finance Committee. He should have a good idea about the fate of the facility after the meeting, he said.

Concern over the possible closing of Fort Stanton is evident throughout the nearby community of Capitan.

During a school board candidate forum there last week, school officials said the district could lose 150 students if the hospital closed and jobs were eliminated. The hospital employs about 230 people.

Capitan School Board member Tom Trost said he is optimistic the hospital will remain open.

"For the 12 1/2 years I've been here, I've been hearing that they were going to close it," said Trost, who is director of social services for Fort Stanton. "Right now everything still is up in the air."

Five candidates vie for three slots

Flanagan, owner of the El Paisano Restaurant and a school bus driver, said Friday he withdrew because to continue as a driver while serving on the board would constitute a conflict of interest and would be against state guidelines. "I found that out after I signed up," he said.

That leaves Air Force retiree Robert Sims, 72, to face Jack King, 35, a former teacher and president of King Construction.

Incumbent board member Kenneth Cox, 44, maintenance supervisor for the Department of Corrections and owner of K.S.J. Construction, is unopposed for Position 4. His brother Terry L. Cox, 41, village water department supervisor, is trying to unseat incumbent Thomas R. Trost, director of social services at Fort Stanton Training School, for Position 3 on the board.

Robert Sims

At the forum Thursday, Sims said he entered the race because he thought it would be a challenge.

"I'm way too old to be in this, I'm told, but I think it's an opportunity to do something for the community. I want to stay active," he said.

Until he has time to "sift fact from fiction," Sims, who has no children, said he could not recommend changes or priorities for the school district.

Asked whether he would support the recommendations of School Supt. Scott Childress, Sims said, "I certainly would. He appears to be a pretty nice old boy. I would support him until I found out some reason I shouldn't."

"When you hire someone, you should let them do the job. If they don't do it to your satisfaction, they should be replaced."

The other candidates agreed with that stance. In line with that philosophy, Sims said he would support hiring decisions by Childress, even if he had reservations about the choice, as long as he felt the superintendent knew all the facts.

King and Kenneth Cox differed slightly from the other candidates on that point. They both felt it would be proper for board members to help the superintendent in hiring decisions by informing him about the philosophy of the community.

"Because the superintendent more than likely will not be from this area," King said.

Tom Trost

Trost, 42, has served on the board six years and would like to continue to monitor improvements in classes like computer lab, he said.

His top priority is to provide a viable education for the children of the district. One of the major changes he would like to see is construction of a middle school.

"Sixth to eighth graders are too mature for elementary school but they're not ready for high school. It's a tough age to teach," Trost said. "Times are rough and it may not be the right time for a bond issue, but I feel whatever we put in, we'll get back. It's up to the board to put the issue in front of the people."

Like most of the other candidates, Trost said he had reservations about year-around school. In a small rural community many students need summer jobs to help their families or they must work on family ranches, he said.

Jack King

King, a former vocational-agriculture teacher, said he could bring a combination of perspectives to the job of board member.

"I've been in education and I feel I understand the teachers' point of view," he said. "And for the last eight years, I've been on the outside, raising children."

To build the morale of students who do not like going to school, King suggested talking about life after school.

"With our kids, we never talk about anything but going to college," he said. "If you start them thinking

about what they will be when they grown up, it gives more incentive."

Terry Cox

Terry Cox, a volunteer assistant basketball coach for the past two years, said he hopes he has been of some benefit to the students he has touched.

"I want to ensure that each child has a chance to be active in something extracurricular," he said.

He would like to see more community support for the school and more school support for the community.

"It seems when I first got here, plays, games and all events were packed," he said. "You don't see that anymore. We need something to bring back the camaraderie."

Kenneth Cox

Kenneth Cox, who has a degree in marketing and business administration and has served four years on the school board, said the district needs to continue to upgrade its educational equipment. He would like to see more continuity among the faculty and to develop more high school spirit.

The candidates took similar approaches, with slight variations, on how they would handle complaints from parents.

Complaints and punishment

Kenneth Cox and Trost said that after listening to a complaint, they would ask the parent to talk to the teacher first.

"A lot gets blown out of proportion and can be handled by just sitting down," Trost said. If the issue still is not resolved, it should then be referred to the principal, and then the superintendent.

Terry Cox added that the sequence should be documented. "I would want Dr. Childress to report back to me and other board members in writing," he said.

The candidates all said they would support corporal punishment to aid class control. Trost added, "I believe we're here not to punish, but to try to change the (undesirable) behavior. We need to find out how we can do that."

Teacher pay, academics and athletics

The candidates said they don't believe good teaching hinges on high pay.

"But if teachers are not worrying about their bills, they can keep their minds more focused on the class-

room," Trost said.

The candidates concurred that academics should be the first priority of the board.

"Academics is what we're here for," Kenneth Cox said. "It's the bottom line."

But along with King, he would like to see a broad educational approach including vocational-agricultural classes, drama and mind-expanding programs like mock trials.

King went a step further.

"Each student and program needs to be given consideration," he said. "Athletics is as important a part of education as English and computers. A strong athletic program helps with discipline. If a school is doing well in athletics, the students are proud and it builds school spirit."

Terry Cox said athletics can be used "to motivate these kids. Athletic competition is a privilege that they earn through good grades," he said. Those with lower grades need some kind of motivation and the district should design extra-curricular activities to meet their needs too, Cox said.

Academics always should be the board's first consideration, Trost said. "I don't know anyone from Capitan who makes a living out of sports," he said. "Not everyone is a jock" and attention also should be paid to other extra-curricular activities such as band.

Teachers should be certified in their respective fields, all the candidates agreed, although they allowed for emergency situations.

"There have been occasions when an individual is hired with a waiver based on the fact the individual looks as if he can meet the basic criteria and is going in the direction of accreditation," Kenneth Cox said.

King pointed out that Terry Cox, who is not certified, was hired as a volunteer coach, but he does not teach.

"Just because you're a good coach, you don't have to teach," King said.

Trost said small schools are unique because they may have an opening for a mathematics teacher who also would have to teach history and coach.

"Our priority is teaching, but if he's a good teacher, he should be a good coach too," Trost said. "Sometimes you have to juggle and (Childress) is a good juggler."

Governor names Sanchez to state education board

Governor Bruce King has appointed educator J. James Sanchez to the New Mexico State Board of Education, District E. This includes districts 8 and 9 or most of southeastern New Mexico.

He will be replacing John Bassett of Roswell.

According to a news release,

Sanchez is a 25-year veteran in the field of education, having worked as a teacher, counselor and Vocational Education Director. He also serves as a trustee for Lincoln County Medical Center and as vice chairman of the Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Board.

At present, Sanchez is a college

adviser and affirmative action officer at New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell.

Sanchez, who also ranches, lives with his wife, Lynda, in historic Lincoln town.

He previously served as a member of the State Board, and is currently a member of Senator Jeff

Bingaman's Border Business Task Force that encourages better relations with Mexico.

"Public service has always been a major part of my life," said Sanchez. "I am honored by the many, many people throughout the state, as well as District E, who have supported my appointment."

The State Board sets policy and direction for all primary and secondary public schools in New Mexico. The Board also approves public school finances which account for more than half the billion dollar state budget.

"Because education is a major portion of our state budget, we need

to be concerned in continuing the quest to attract and keep qualified teachers," said Sanchez in his news release.

"Without excellence in our schools we cannot have excellence in our society and mediocrity will prevail."


Workshops show how to sell to feds

War has effect on investors' attitudes

Military strategists rely heavily on historical patterns in their decision-making processes, so it was really no surprise to me that Israel wants to make its own decisions without the influence of our government. After all, the last time the Jews listened to a "bush" they wandered in the desert for 40 years.

War does have an impact on economic development. Typically everyone but defense contractors put all their expansion plans on hold.

Unlike previous major wars, this one is expected to be of short duration, which leaves all new economic development projects waiting in the wings. We have difficulty enough in predicting which way the economy is going to go in peace time. At this juncture we have no idea which way interest rates, the price of oil, the deficit, and inflation are headed.

Investors do not like to make decisions in times of uncertainty, and this is clearly a time of uncertainty.

Carlsbad has been a vortex of activity for the last three years. The "WIPP" (Waste Isolation Pilot Plant) has consumed a large part of the total effort by the city's non-profit Economic Development Department. The economic development group is funded by both the city and the county.



The project has been the subject of statewide and, indeed, national controversy. However, the jobs created and the spin-off activity, have already created significant economic activity including the development of specialized waste containers that may ultimately be manufactured in Carlsbad.

In spite of the distractions caused by the project, Chuck Bernhardt, executive director of EDD, has been successful in recruiting some exciting companies to locate in the community. Mayor Bob Forrest has taken an active role in the pursuit of new companies and has made several recruiting visits to California.

During the last three years the community has been able to revitalize the potash mine operated by Mississippi Chemical Company. An

in-plant training grant was secured from the state for \$464,000 for the company in its restart up phase resulting in approximately 200 jobs.

Three small but significant companies have been recruited:

—Celtech, a 15-employee company engaged in Jet Engine Test Cell Instrumentation began operations a year and a half ago.

—Altek, a manufacturer of electrical components and wire harnesses for mass transit applications, has grown to a total work force of 35 and has been in operation for a year.

—Edcor is currently in the hiring phase after their location in the city in January of this year. The company manufactures transformers and other specialized magnetic and audio products. Expected employment is 15.


Carlsbad has targeted hi-tech companies because of the desirability of the jobs such companies generate. The strategy employed is much the same as that implemented by the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County.

The city is no stranger to economic development and has had an active program for many years, but has only become a viable entity since Chuck Bernhardt arrived on the scene with his emphasis on hi-tech recruitment.

Farm Bureau lobbies against new taxes

More than 150 resolutions have been adopted by the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau aimed at guiding the organization's lobbying and program activities in 1991. The Farm Bureau is New Mexico's largest agricultural organization. It is focusing its efforts on 30 issues that may be debated in the current session of the State Legislature. Of primary concern to New Mexico farmers and ranchers is the possibility of a gross receipts tax on farm produce or livestock sales, according to Erik Ness, director of information and public relations for the bureau. Agriculture now is exempt from that type of tax and producers point out that they sell most of their products at below wholesale rates, he said. Other areas of concern for agriculture in this session include the strengthening of the "right to farm" law, taxation of agricultural land, the payment of future water debts, livestock theft, ground water protection and multiple use of public land, as well as the reauthorization of the state Beef Council.

State lawmakers consider a bill to limit legislative terms to 12 years

Legislation calling for a constitutional amendment to limit terms in the New Mexico State Legislature to 12 years is scheduled to be introduced during the current legislative session by State Rep. Mark Caruso (R-Albuquerque). Caruso is serving his first elected term in the legislature. Although the governor and other statewide elected officials already are limited to eight years in office, there is no such limitation on mem-

bers of the legislature. "We have limited the terms of our governor and our President to eight years to prevent them from assuming too much power and to infuse new blood into their offices," Caruso said. "It's time to limit the term of state legislators for the same reasons."

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Healthy Living

Cold and flu season has arrived

Flu and cold season is here. We all have favorite remedies for treating and preventing colds and flu. In spite of all the theories, we really do not have any cure for the common cold. Flu, or influenza, is a viral illness that can be prevented by the flu vaccine (as will be discussed in a different column), but the flu vaccine must be given before exposure to the virus.

What can be done after exposure? If the illness is influenza, a medication called amantadine is effective. However, the medication must be started early in the course of the illness to be effective. It is only useful for influenza, one of many strains of the influenza virus.

For all the other varieties of flu and colds, we simply do not have effective medication to cure them. Common sense remedies like fluid, acetaminophen for fever, and rest seem to work as well as anything. Antibiotics do not change the course of the illness, unless a secondary infection (a bacterial infection) has occurred as a complication of the cold.

Although we do not think that getting the

feet wet will cause a cold, you will undoubtedly hear many theories about how a cold was caught, and what to do about it. The best advice however, is to eat right, get plenty of rest, and exercise in moderation so as to keep yourself healthy and best able to fight off the cold if you are exposed.

With the cold and flu season has come a rise in the incidence of sore throats. While a sore throat may be nothing more than a symptom of the cold or flu, or may be a simple allergy, the possibility of strep throat should not

be overlooked.

This country has seen a dramatic rise in the incidence of strep throat and in the complications of strep throat. Among the complications of strep throat are rheumatic fever, which can damage the heart and kidneys, and even cause death. Prevention of Rheumatic Fever requires 10 days of antibiotic therapy.

Several decades ago the incidence of rheumatic fever had declined, so that many doctors in training through the 1970s and '80s rarely saw cases of it. However, in the past it was the major cause of heart disease in this country.

Rheumatic fever can damage the heart valves, causing significant scarring and narrowing of the valves.

Because of the possibility of strep throat, any sore throat, especially if accompanied by a fever or swollen glands should not be ignored. See your doctor, and ask for a strep screen. (strep throat cannot be identified without one.) Most offices can do a strep screen in five to ten minutes or will send you to the hospital to have one done.



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
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Elusive spotted owls turn up in the Lincoln National Forest lands

The search for the elusive Mexican spotted owl, which became a prime focus of the U.S. Forest Service in New Mexico and Arizona in 1988, already has resulted in the identification of 710 owls in regional national forests.

Slightly under half of the owls were found in New Mexico, 140 of them in the Lincoln National Forest, a portion of which surrounds Ruidoso.

The Coconino National Forest in central Arizona, the Lincoln and the Gila Forest in southern New Mexico have yielded the most owls so far, with more than 94 territories identified on each forest, according to statistics released by the agency.

Six years ago, the Forest Service classified the bird as "sensitive," designating it for special manage-



ment attention. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is in the process of determining whether the Mexican spotted owl should be considered for listing as threatened or endangered based on information collected over the past few years.

From 1984-88, the forest service financed the first scientific study of

Mexican spotted owls in cooperation with the Arizona Game and Fish Department. During the same period, the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish also launched a study of the owl's habitat.

In 1989, special guidelines were adopted to protect habitat when owls were found until more was learned about the species. Since that time, the national agency has established 517 specific owl management territories and estimates that nearly 1,300 may eventually be created.

About 40 percent of the targeted forests have been surveyed.

"We have made a big commitment to locate and learn more about the Mexican spotted owl," said Southwestern Regional Forest-

er Dave Jolly. "Based upon the information collected so far, the owl is not dependent on old growth forests as is the northern spotted owl found in the Pacific Northwest."

Biologist Keith Fletcher, who has been compiling information from the 11 national forests in Arizona and New Mexico, said Mexican spotted owls have been located in many types of habitat.

Nearly 70 percent have been located in "mixed conifer" forested areas.

The owl also appears to do well in pine/oak habitat and in many types of vegetation associated with steep, rocky canyons. They are found in low numbers in ponderosa pine forested areas, which is the bulk of the region's forested area available for timber harvest. Owls

rarely are found in piñon/juniper areas except in proximity to steep, rocky canyons.

The lowest densities occur on the Carson National Forest in northern New Mexico and the Kaibab National Forest in northern Arizona. The northern portions of both states appear to be what biologists call the "fringe" of the species' range, Fletcher said.

The current agency guidelines require intensive searches for Mexican spotted owls in the 11 national forests before ground-disturbing activities can take place such as timber cutting or camp-ground development.

When an owl is located, biologists establish a minimum 450-acre or three-fourths square

mile "core" area that consists of the best suitable owl habitat. Within the core, potentially disturbing activities are not permitted. In an additional 2,000-acre or 2 1/2 square mile management territory, limited timber cutting, road building and other ground-disturbing activities may take place. Minimum management territory size on the Lincoln and Gila forests is 1,500 acres rather than 2,000 acres as for the other nine forests.

Fletcher pointed out that the territories are not just squares or circles drawn on a map. "They are formed according to what is believed to be the best suitable habitat surrounding areas where owls were found during our surveys," he said.

Looking for a reason to quit smoking?

Last year at this time, I decided that I would never again take so much as one teensy, tiny drag of a cigarette. I had "quit" smoking some time earlier, but had allowed myself the margin of a few after-dinner cigarettes, or a smoke when I went out for drinks with friends.


I knew the habit was stupid, but I figured the amount I actually smoked was "statistically insignificant" — two or three cigarettes a day during bad times, two or three a week during not-so-bad times.

However, there's this daughter in my life who has been raised with 13 years of non-smoking messages. On television, in school, in magazine ads — the kid culture these days is permeated with the idea that smoking is stupid, dangerous and unhealthy. Lydia has taken these messages to heart and nagged, insisted and begged me not to smoke.

I would trot out my "statistically insignificant" defense to reassure her. Then one day I saw her watching me smoke and I knew, instantly and absolutely, that "statistically insignificant" wasn't a hill of beans up next to the powerful image of her seeing her mother with a cigarette in hand.

So one of the Christmas presents I gave Lydia was my most solemn, serious, heart-felt oath that never, as long as I lived, would I ever again take a drag of a cigarette. I set a date to stop, gave myself a couple of weeks to say good bye and then I did it. I quit.

And I've stuck to it for more than a year



now, discovering in the process that I was significantly more addicted than I believed and that much of my excuse-making was merely justification for my habit.

But I also discovered that I cared more for Lydia than I cared for my habit. And during the tempting times, I put it to myself in exactly those same terms: I promised my daughter I wouldn't smoke and I care more about my word to her than anything else. Very simple.

I'm counting on that simplicity this year as I look at other promises I want to keep, to myself, to my children, to my community. Most of human life exists within the framework of the habits we keep and the behavior we tolerate in ourselves and others. The only way I know to change a habit is to make a promise and to keep it.

I've noticed lately that I have some habits that are inconsistent with what I stand for and what I believe in. I believe, for example, that human beings should live gently on this

earth. I care that we live at peace with our environment and with other beings, human and beastly.

And I know that my habits of wasteful consumption are at odds with those commitments. I am absolutely convinced that we have to quit going around devouring, discarding and emitting so much or we are going to choke, gag or drown in our own by-products. If we keep galloping down the road we're presently on, this planet, ain't gonna be a pretty, or even a healthy place in a couple of decades.

However, I have the paper towel habit. And the paper napkin habit. And the automobile habit. And the chlorine bleach habit and all those other habits that are contributing to the poisoning of our environment. And it's time for me, personally, to stop being so damned unconscious.

I would like to wave a magic wand and suddenly leave a healthy, safe legacy to my children and grandchildren. But magic wands are definitely an extinct species. And I can drive myself crazy imagining what it's going to be like if some changes don't happen. So I have to do what I can.

All I can do is promise them that I will change my own habits, and know that if I can change, anyone can. I am as wasteful, slothful, selfish and unconscious as anyone on the planet. I'm convinced that if I can turn me around — just me — the future will be assured.

Zia manager objects to story

TO THE EDITOR:

I wish to take exception to your most recent story concerning the Alto utility line project, "County Plays Hardball With Zia," January 21, 1991. Your reporter either did not understand the proceedings of the Carrizozo meeting or just took quotations out of context. If she had referred back to your original story of December 24, 1990, she could have done a whole lot more justice to the parties involved and presented a more accurate picture of what actually happened.

I have to agree with Paul Crown, Lincoln Cablevision manager, in that this incident has been blown way out of proportion, for whatever reason I don't understand, and the manner of reporting makes Zia Natural Gas look like the bad guys.

To set the record straight, Lincoln Cablevision contracted with CATV to excavate for the purpose of laying and upgrading cable television transmission lines. Knowing that Zia had planned to go into Alto at some date (natural gas was not previously in the area), Cablevision invited Zia to share a common ditch and expenses. This was to the advantage of both utilities.

However, Zia did not contract with CATV to install its gas lines, only to dig the ditch. Zia installs its own lines and is licensed to do so. We have the manpower and the expertise, so it just doesn't make sense that we would hire someone else to do the work that we do day in and day out. And, we don't do slovenly work. Our reputation is on the line here.

As was pointed out in both stories, Albino Zuniga, pipeline safety engineer with the State Cor-

poration Commission, found only two incidents where the installation did not follow regulations, and of these, no hazardous conditions existed. Incidentally, Zia, not Otero Cooperative, asked Zuniga to inspect the work.

And, that's another thing, saying that as a condition to our being reissued a permit to complete the work, we have to agree "to allow random inspections by Zuniga of all installations underway and completed" is redundant. All New Mexico gas utilities owned by corporations operate at the pleasure of the State Corporation Commission and that body's inspectors are free to come and go as they please, at any time they do so choose.

I find it amusing that Alto Lakes Water Corporation complained about the workmanship, while that same utility doesn't even know where its water lines are and has to depend on memory to locate same — sometimes digging on one side of the road only to have the lines turn up on the other.

My supposed quote, "They're (water lines) supposed to be four feet deep and if we're only 16-24 inches deep, there is no problem" simply doesn't make sense. From a natural gas standpoint, why would there be a problem with water lines anyway? It's the electric lines that have to be four feet deep.

So as far as I can see, for whatever reason, about all that's been accomplished here is to throw a monkey wrench into and delay cable TV and natural gas service to the residents of Alto.


