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## Lawmakers to hear Ruidoso's request for civic center funds

Ruidoso's freshman state representative reports on the first three weeks of his first term. He reports that Ruidoso's request for funds to build a civic center is set for hearing this Tuesday.

State Representative John Underwood is hard at work in Santa Fe during his first 60-day legislative session.

"I'm just having a great time," said Underwood, a Democrat representing District 56, which includes Ruidoso and Artesia.

Underwood could be seeing a lot of the home folks this week, as a funds request for the Ruidoso civic center is set for a hearing on Tuesday.

"We're going forward with hearings on both the civic center and MainStreet (fund requests)," said Underwood. He said that funds are

short this session, but they'll be looking for alternative funding sources for the close to \$1 million that Ruidoso is requesting.

"It's kind of nice to see the fiscal conservatism of the Democratic leadership," noted Underwood. The State Legislature has \$40 million projected for capital outlay, but with uncertain economic times, those funds may fall short.

House Bill 167, relating to Ruidoso's civic center funding request, is scheduled for a hearing before the Taxation and Revenue subcommittee at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, February 12, in room 103C.

Underwood, as a member of the Rules Committee, is currently drafting enforcement provisions for the Ethics Rule adopted this session by the House.

The Constitution calls for the House and the Senate to be their

own enforcers, said Underwood.

"They don't want us simply to take a Boy Scout oath of always being prepared and not have a way of enforcing it," he added.

His draft, which he expects to present on Tuesday, will provide for complaints and due process.

Underwood, along with Lincoln County's other two representatives, Paul Harrington and Richard Knowles, also presented House Memorial 28, calling for the state to create a task force to study alternative uses of Fort Stanton.

A federal court order may result in a reduction in the client population at Fort Stanton, and the memorial calls on the state to look for uses that will make use of the facility and the staff to protect the economy of Lincoln County.

The memorial calls for the task force to report to the governor and

the Legislative Finance Committee before September 1.

"We're wanting to make sure we get another program to take up the slack," said Underwood. He said he wants to make sure people are not displaced because of the court order.

He added that any changes should take into consideration the skills of the current staff and those changes should be phased in.

Underwood is a party to House Bill 284 asking for severance tax bonds to be issued to pay for phase 1 in the MainStreet redevelopment plan.

Next on Underwood's agenda are video gaming bills he plans to introduce this session. One of those bills would set up local option video gaming parameters and the other calls for a constitutional amendment.

Historic Lincoln has maintained the look and feel of the days of Billy the Kid and the Lincoln County Wars. It hasn't always been easy, and the efforts are continuing.

People who buy property in the settlement of Lincoln are buying more than just land, brick and mortar.

They're also buying into history and at times, the pricetag comes high.

It carries restrictions that grate against some land owners sense of independence and what they perceive as their property rights.

But to the Lincoln Historic Preservation Board, the preservation ordinance approved by the Lincoln County Commission in 1972 is one of the most valuable tools at its command to safeguard the future of the historic town.

"If people move into the Lincoln district, they are moving into a zoned area," said Bob Hart, board chairman. "We try not make it draconian. We are just trying to maintain the character of the community. We want to try to keep and maintain the appearance of the past."

The past covers the colorful days of the Lincoln County wars and Billy the Kid, and the community's heyday as the Lincoln County seat.

The preservation ordinance has been controversial since it was first proposed in 1968.

Nora and Walter Henn, a histor-

ian and artist, respectively, were there at the beginning of the community's preservation effort.

"About 1968-69, some people decided some type of protection was needed for the area because it was boom times and people were moving in," Mrs. Henn said. "It took about four years, many town meetings, lengthy discussions, and some hard feelings, but the majority of residents voted to pass an ordinance in 1972."

It was a close vote and some longtime residents still don't agree the ordinance was necessary.

In line with the local vote, the county commission approved a preservation ordinance, a blanket of protection for the 10-mile by one-mile historic district of Lincoln.

As Henn explained, before the preservation ordinance could be approved, the commission had to approve zoning for the entire county.

Lincoln was too small — less than 70 residents in the core and another 20 outside — to incorporate.

"The county had to be zoned so Lincoln could fit into it," she said.

The concept of architectural control was not new in the state, board members say. Old Town in Albuquerque, the city of Santa Fe, the Mesilla settlement of the Las Cruces area and portions of the towns of Roswell, Las Vegas and Socorro have historic districts with restrictions.

## Fast Texas skiers win Lubbock Cup

A little more than a second separated the top three individual finishers of Sunday's 14th annual Lubbock Cup at Ski Apache.

Rob Efal streaked to his first place finish in the expert division in 31.28 seconds.

Spyder Montoya, in 32.21 seconds, edged by Terry Su Tankersley in 32.4 seconds to take second and third.

In the intermediate division, Bill Murphy, Robbie Chance and Mark Forrester came in first, second and third in 41.22, 42.42 and 43.47 seconds, respectively.

J. Gilliland and Jo Beth Bates shared top honors in the beginners division in 50.98 and 56.22 seconds.

In team competition, Extremeties' combined time of 141.14 seconds beat Texas Twisters Gold's 142.35 and Texas Twisters Black's 144.55 for first, second and third.

Teams consisted of four racers, male and female. (Team member names were not available.)

A field of 39 entrants race on a 13-gate dual slalom course on Capitan. Each race ran both courses with the better time counting.

Although named the Lubbock Cup, competition was open to all.

"We just want to have a good time and raise a little money," said Patrick Cohoon of Alpha Tau Omega, a social fraternity at Texas Tech University in Lubbock, Texas. It sponsors the race as a fundraiser for Lubbock State School, a mental-retardation facility.

The Lubbock Cup was the first of three races planned this February at Ski Apache.

The Cross Your Heart Cup will run on Valentine's Day, Thursday, February 14. That race is for women, or ski racers dressed like women, and registration is open now by calling the Ski School desk at Ski Apache, 336-4356 or 336-4357.

The Texas Cup, open to all skiers from the Lone Star state, will run February 15-17, at Ski Apache.

## '90 Census shows state is growing

New Mexico's population jumped 16.8 percent over the past 10 years, according to figures released last week by the U.S. Census Bureau.

The population of New Mexico, counted in the 1990 census, is 1,521,779. That figure includes New Mexicans leaving overseas.

Despite that gain, New Mexico did not gain any new seats in the House of Representatives and continues with three representatives when the 103rd Congress convenes in January 1993.

Lincoln County's population is 12,219 in the 1990 census. That includes 4,600 for the Village of Ruidoso, 920 for Ruidoso Downs, 842 for Capitan, 1,075 for Carrizozo and 215 for Corona.

Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation has a population of 2,695 in the new census.

"The census is very important. Please see Census, page 2A

# Four-day week is a big hit in Hondo Schools

Hondo and Corona schools have switched from five-day to four-day schedules, and the experiment is getting good reviews from Hondo administrators, teachers and students.

Last August, the Hondo school system launched a one-year experiment with a four-day school schedule and two months ago, the Corona system followed suit.

The verdicts aren't in on either of the local districts. Statistical data won't be gathered until the end of the school year. But five months into the new schedule at Hondo, reactions from teachers, parents, school officials and students are generally favorable.

It's not a new or revolutionary concept. The first New Mexico school district switched to a four-day week nearly 20 years ago. And it's an alternative only open to districts with 1,000 students or less.

To date, 11 out of New Mexico's 88 school districts have converted to a four-day schedule, said Jack McCoy with the Learning Services Division of the New Mexico Education Department. More than 30 Colorado school districts are on four-day schedules.

The advantages realized by the

districts include reduced teacher and student absenteeism, some increases in academic achievement scores and a small reduction in operating costs, McCoy said.

Hondo Board Chairman Albert Montez was skeptical at first that a four-day schedule would benefit the 159 students in his system.

"I had reservations," he said. "I was concerned about what the kids would do on their day off, whether they would be running around. There aren't a lot of jobs in our valley. And I worried that the elementary kids would be too tired at the end of the day because of the longer hours."

Under the four-day week, the school session starts about 15 minutes earlier than last year at 8:05 a.m., and ends about a half-hour later at 3:50 p.m. Students spend as much time in class as on a five-day week, but within a compressed timeframe of four days.

Montez said he has been impressed with the results.

"It seems to be working," he said. "I see more positives than

negatives. In fact, we have not received one negative from parents yet."

Cecilia Sanchez, who teaches seventh and eighth grade home economics, mathematics and algebra, is extremely enthusiastic about the new schedule. She believes it provides a continuity that was lacking under the five-day week when students were pulled from classes for field trips, extra-curricular activities and appointments with doctors and dentists.

Under the four-day schedule of Tuesday through Friday, appointments and extra-curricular activities are arranged on Mondays.

"My seventh period classes used to be cut in half all the time," she said. "Now they can't do that. I love it. I feel all the teachers are for it. I feel I cover as much or more material."

Since the students are absent less, there isn't as much catching up to be done and the class can move ahead in unison, she said.

Her daughters, who are on the basketball team, practice on Monday and don't have to stay as late after school on the other days.

"I really like it," Sanchez said. "With a five-day week, sometimes the kids and the teachers get burned out. I feel this works."

When Maria Fuentes-Leas was hired two and a half years ago as Hondo school superintendent, she was empowered to look into the four-day week, said information officer Lynda Sanchez.

Surveys were run, public meetings conducted and guest speakers brought down from districts already under the four-day schedule. More than 75 percent of the parents, teachers and students surveyed in Hondo favored the new approach, Sanchez said.

Money always is a problem for small rural school districts, she said. Residents want to hold onto the school as a symbol of local autonomy.

"A community that loses its school is a tragedy," Sanchez wrote in a news release for one of the public hearings. "Statewide, several small districts may be looking at either consolidation or even closure. The four-day week is a positive

alternative."

Jerry Burchett, vocational-agricultural teacher at Hondo, was then president-elect of the Hondo Association of Classroom Teachers. He gathered much of the research material for the school board and he met with superintendents of the Grady and Dora school systems, which are on the four-day schedule.

"They said that taking Monday off under normal conditions and depending on the amount of cold weather, saved 2.5 percent to 4 percent on the operating budget," Burchett said.

"I decided it was a good idea," he said. "But what turned me on the most was the improvement in state academic achievement comparison tests. That's the bottom line. If you can save money along the way, that's fine."

It's too early to tell how Hondo students are doing academically. The comparison tests aren't administered until March, Burchett said. "But I don't feel we have lost anything," he said. "I'm holding my own at the least. The adjustment has been harder on teachers. I think it didn't take long for the kids."

R.L. Richards, who has worked as a teacher and superintendent in four-day districts, also did his doctoral dissertation on the subject.

In an eight-year comparison of academic scores on state tests involving fifth and eighth graders, he found that 99 percent of the time the students in a four-day system scored significantly higher than comparable students in a five-day system.

"That's not what I was trying to prove and I was surprised," Richards said. "I was trying to show that they would score about the same."

He credits the four-day system with making teachers more aware of the time they have with their students. "Classes are longer for teachers to be sure their students have comprehended or not," he said. "And teachers must be better prepared to conduct a class of one hour and 15 minutes than they would a 45-50 minute class."

McCoy said state research has found that on the average, teachers

end up working as many or more hours on the four-day schedule as they did on five days. Many come to school on Mondays for planning, grading and in-service training.

"But every once in a while, they get off for a three-day weekend and that's a good psychological reward," he said.

The first year for any district on a four-day week is a trial situation, he said.

"We ask them to apply to the state for permission annually, but after about three years, they don't need to submit as much evaluation criteria," McCoy said.

The first district to convert was Cimarron in 1973, a rural area in north central New Mexico. Prior to McCoy joining the division, one district tried four days and went back to five days, he has been told. However, for the last 10 years since he has been on board, only one district has left the program and that was because it grew too large for the criteria. At the time, the maximum enrollment was limited to 500 students. The top figure was increased in the 1988-89 school year to 1,000 students, McCoy said. That figure takes in about half of the school districts in New Mexico, he said.

"It's not unusual that after the first nine weeks, they temporarily panic and start asking why they ever changed," McCoy said. "But we usually recommend they bring in personnel from another district on four-days to help, and the panic passes."

Districts on reduced number of days don't save huge amounts of money, he said.

"The major part of any district's budget is personnel and there are no savings there, because teachers are working comparable hours," he said. Principals and superintendents stay on a five-day schedule.

"There are incremental savings only," McCoy said. "It's hard to predict the savings on utilities because the weather is such a variable, but districts in the past have reduced their costs by from 5-20 percent in that category."

Savings in transportation don't really benefit the districts because the money comes from the state based on the number of miles

traveled, except for extra-curricular travel, he said. To some extent that holds true in the operation of the cafeteria.

But some districts save up to 20 percent in purchase of supplies and materials, McCoy said.

One of the biggest operational savings historically has been in pay for substitute teachers, he said.

"The pattern has been that the teacher absentee rate decreases and consequently, the districts are not paying as much for substitutes," McCoy said.

Although he was hesitant to say test scores improve on the four-day week, McCoy said his division "has not seen any declines in student achievement, and in some cases, there have been increases."

"It seems to me because teachers like the schedule there is a real incentive to see it work," he said. "And I think uninterrupted instruction also has a big impact on student learning. One of the requirements of the four-day week is that classes go without interruption."

Hondo Athletic Director Merced Gonzales said the four-day week has been no problem for the athletic program.

"Now we have a day off on Monday and we use it to practice," he said. "The kids haven't had to leave school early during the week. The Friday games are close by and, if we're playing a team further away, we schedule it on a Saturday."

Sanchez said teacher morale is high under the four-day schedule. "They have more time to spend with their families and for planning," she said.

Some parents with children in kindergarten, which went from three days to a two-day schedule, objected, she said. And there were some complaints about child care.

"I think a lot of our families have both parents working, but this is a close-knit community and usually the grandparents or other relatives will provide the necessary care," Sanchez said. "I think too many parents look at school as a babysitting service. We're fed up with that attitude. It's time they took responsibility."

The students seem to like the new schedule. Questioning several groups last week, they unanimously endorsed the idea.

"The week goes so quickly," Sanchez said. "The kids seem to be more enthused."

In 1984, the ordinance was amended to be more specific. Some residents believe the amended version prevents misinterpretation and abuse of loopholes from the original broad terminology.

Others say the amended ordinance created too many compromises. Where mobile homes were forbidden before, they now are permitted outside the core of the community if they are either hidden or disguised by appropriate period facades.

The ordinance spells out acceptable types of architectural styles from the late 1800s to 1920, the kinds of building materials and accessories permitted in the district. It contains pages of drawings detailing the acceptable window, door, roof and fence designs.

"The styles allowed are indigenous to this valley," said board member Cleis Jordan.

The preservation board, which acts as the review board for construction, renovation and demolition proposals, has been expanded from five to seven members. In addition to community residents, there are representatives on the board from the State Monuments Division, which is caretaker for the state-owned buildings in town; and from the Lincoln County Heritage Trust, which owns about one-eighth of the property. The rest of the buildings are privately owned, according to board member Jack Rigney of the state monuments division.

The board hears about two cases a month, he said. Some deal with minor items, others cover new homes and the board must review all design aspects.

"The board wants to avoid that image that it is antagonistic," Rigney said. "We are willing to compromise, but we have to keep the integrity and atmosphere intact. Unfortunately, some people don't want to cooperate and we have to draw the line. We're a recommendation board, the county takes any necessary action through its planning and zoning board."

The preservation board's job is much easier when proposals for new construction come from people

who are attracted to the community because of its history and have a stake in preserving that atmosphere, Rigney said.

"Some build and have no idea of the history and that's where the problems start," he said.

And many oldtimers don't appreciate or see the need for an ordinance, Jordan said.

"People see the ordinance and are scared to death," said board member Beverly Hammond. "They don't want their home to look like everyone else's. But the interior design is up to them and there still are a lot of choices in the exterior."

The ordinance specifies that "All exterior construction shall be earth color, constructed of adobe, appearance of adobe, plastered, stuccoed, rock or of wood construction, with the architectural style being that of the frontier period or territorial period."

Two items that have sparked many of the most heated debates are mobile homes and satellite dishes.

The board essentially has said that outside the center of town, they are all right if owners hide them.

"The ordinance disallows mobile homes within the center of town, one of the two zones that constitute the Lincoln Historic Preservation District," Hart said. "In the outlying section, mobile homes are allowed if they were in place before the ordinance was passed in 1972 or if they conform to Lincoln architectural standards."

"The problem is a mobile home looks like a mobile home."

In an attempt to work with mobile home owners, the board has suggested two approaches aimed at preserving the nineteenth century atmosphere in the town.

The owners either can add architectural features to disguise a mobile home or erect a stockade-type fence to hide it, he said.

"We on the board are dedicated to try not to get into a third world war over this," Hart said. "We're trying not to be confrontational."

But violations don't last long without being noticed and called to the attention of the board, he said.

"It's a small town and most folks have served on the preservation board," Hart said.

Hammond said residents of the community appreciate its peace and quiet.

"There are no neon signs or rubber tomahawks," she said.

"Most agree that Lincoln has not been commercialized because it was largely owned by one family for years and because the town nearly died, it was passed by," Jordan said. "The main road was dirt until the 1940s and there was no electricity until then."

The first attempt at restoration occurred in 1934 when the Chavez County Historical Society utilized the WPA program to restore the Torreón, a circular fortification used by earliest Hispanic settlers as protection against raiding Apaches.

As a young girl, Hammond said her father would send her to the Lincoln area to visit relatives.

"I would think to myself these poor people have to live in mud houses," she said. "It was my personal crusade to get them into something else. Then I came back here and built a mud house myself."

To alert potential buyers ahead of time to the architectural restrictions, the board is trying to arrange for a notice to be attached to every property transfer within the district.

"We're also thinking about making a simple brochure for real estate agencies so people looking here realize this is a unique area with an ordinance," Hammond said.

Money would become available for printing of the brochure if Lincoln County receives a preservation-related designation as a local certified government, Rigney said. The county commission voted at the urging of the board to apply for the designation last month.

The board doesn't just buck private landowners: It's also zeroed in on the state.

As a result of a letter writing campaign, the State Highway Department agreed to replace metal posts in the community with wooden posts, Hart said.

On a monthly basis, the board also is recognizing construction and renovation projects that further create the picture of a nineteenth century town.

## County commissioners will consider 5-member board

Lincoln County Commissioners are looking at the possibility of increasing the number of members on their board from three to five.

They'll be discussing that proposal during the regular 9 a.m. meeting Tuesday in the commission room of the County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

"This is the very first step in determining whether we should go this route," Commissioner Bill Elliott said. "We have been contacted by people who are concerned that there should be more representation on the board. We have until February of next year to do it."

Elliott said it's too early to favor or oppose the plan.

"I have mixed feelings about it personally," he said. "These discussions will be training sessions for the commissioners because we don't know all the ins and outs."

"It would be more expensive with two more commissioners, but

there would be better representation because the commissioners would be nominated and elected within separate districts."

Commissioners now are nominated within districts, but elected at large.

In other business, the commission's selection for new county road manager also may be announced Tuesday. Commissioners met last week to narrow the field of applicants from more than 20 down to five for personal interviews.

Elliott said the last set of interviews is scheduled for today. "We don't want this to drag on. We need a road manager," Elliott said.

Early last month, commissioners voted not to reappoint former road superintendent Tommy Hall to his post.

If potholes on the highways are jarring your car each morning, you may want to attend the scheduled

discussion of road priorities for the New Mexico State Highway Department, which also is on the commission agenda.

Ervin Aldaz, administrator of Fort Stanton Training Center and Hospital, is scheduled to detail that facility's economic impact on the county. Fort Stanton, which employs more than 200 people, is under a court order to transfer some of its developmentally disabled clients to community-based programs and possibly may be phased out by the state.

Also on the agenda is consideration of an ordinance that would set fees for use of county rights-of-way, a resolution to remove members of appointed boards who miss three meetings in one year and a request for \$10,000 from the County Solid Waste Authority as temporary operating money until tax revenues are available to that board.

for the United States and directly to New Mexico since government representation, appropriations and programs can hinge on a state's population, said Senator Pete Domenici after the figures were released.

"These counts are our first official numbers for the state. There will, of course, be more in-depth information gained from the census count in New Mexico," he said.

Ruidoso's new population is barely over the 1980 census figure of 4,260, and down slightly from the special evaluation in 1986.

Nearly a third of the state's population is concentrated in Bernalillo County, which has a population of 480,577. Of that total, 384,736 live in Albuquerque.

Lincoln County's nearest neighbors are Chavez and Otero counties.

of 57,849, with 44,654 in Roswell.

Otero County has a population of 51,928, with 27,596 in Alamogordo.

The population counts provided by the U.S. Census Bureau are subject to possible corrections, with those corrected figures to be distributed no later than July 15.

When preliminary census reports showed basically no growth, or even a loss of population in Ruidoso, village planning administrator Cleatus Richards questioned the process used during the 1990 census.

"I had expected the population to go up," said Richards, who also was the official liaison with the Census Bureau.

The Census Bureau's early report showed total housing in Ruidoso at 6,656, vacant housing at 4,769 and group quarters population at 75. Richards said the group quarters number is a count of residents of Ruidoso Care Center.

"I feel it's understated," said Richards, who has good reason to

question the entire census report.

"I was the liaison, and I had trouble getting information," said Richards.

"I called the census contact person and I was never able to get very accurate information," said Richards, recalling all the confusion that surrounded the entire process.

Over the past few years, the schools have experienced some growth, housing starts are up, building activity is on the upswing and there are a lot of indications that Ruidoso is growing at a greater rate than 300 people over the past 10 years.

Mary Wimberly of the Water Department said that the Village of Ruidoso had 6,710 water customers (meters) as of the end of November. Of that total, 6,237 are residential and 473 commercial.

Those figures aren't necessarily indicative of growth or no-growth, since many homes are owned by part-time residents. Wimberly said 67 to 70 percent of the water bills are mailed outside Ruidoso.

# Golfing is a long-time Ruidoso area tradition

Fifty years ago, customers sipping their coffee and munching a morning sweet roll in the Daylight Donuts shop on Sudderth Drive would have been sitting on the number nine green of a golf course that was the granddaddy of Cree Meadows, Alto and Sierra Blanca.

"My father, George McCarty, and his brother-in-law, Joe Palmer, decided Ruidoso needed a golf course," said Bill McCarty, owner of McCarty Paving Co. "Neither knew how to play, but Joe was determined to have a golf course."

Palmer and McCarty were partners and owned much of the land from what is now the town library to the junction with U.S. Highway 70, McCarty said. Both men were pioneer developers and McCarty was the second mayor of Ruidoso, serving from 1946-48.

"Originally, the land was used as a horse pasture, but a few years before World War II, they created the golf course," he said. "They used native grass. The (putting greens) were made with sand mixed with motor oil to give them a darker appearance."

The Reverend Wayne Joyce of Ruidoso Baptist Church recalled the days he worked as a caddy at the course and how the holes were prepared for the players.

"They used a three foot board on a handle and dragged it around (the hole) to smooth down the sand," he said. "We dragged it in the direction of each ball in a three foot wide path to the hole. They

couldn't miss by more than 18 inches if they stayed in the grooves."

Money always was scarce and there were few jobs in Ruidoso in the late 1930s and early 1940s.

"No matter what a person's profession, there only were odd jobs available," Joyce said. "We (the children) didn't know any better. We thought the whole world was like that."

The young boys in town scrambled to grab jobs as caddies at the golf course because even the lowest paid received 25 cents for carrying clubs the full nine holes.

"I'd take five cents after a round and buy an RC Cola, another five cents for a Mr. Goodbar and then go out on another round," Joyce said. "That night, I'd spend 11 cents to see a movie."

The higher paid caddies with the most experience earned up to 45 cents a round.

The golf course only lasted two or three years, McCarty said. Shortly after the beginning of the war, the project was abandoned.

"They plowed it up and planted beans in about 1944. The course was quite premature it turned out," McCarty said. "But they didn't give up on the idea. They took more good ranch land and built the Cree Meadows course in 1946. It was laid out by Ralph Petty Sr."

Although no photographs of the Gateway golf course survive in the McCarty family, Joyce has a few old pictures with the clubhouse barely visible in the distance.

"The clubhouse was across from the library land," McCarty said. "It

was just a little slab-sided frame building of about 1,500 square feet, kind of a temporary thing."

Amenities such as a lounge, a lunchroom or pro shop were lacking.

"It was not a high dollar course at all," McCarty said. "Golf hadn't come into its popularity then." He doesn't remember who designed the course for his father and uncle.

As Joyce recalls, the golf course sprawled northeast of Junction Road, which was then a dirt road and the only access into town from the two-laned U.S. Highway 70.

"Sudderth Drive didn't exist back then, there was just a dirt road, a fence and nothing else," Joyce said. "As I remember it, the first green went down by the Shell gas station and across the middle school land, then the greens either crossed or skirted the river and came back up toward where Baskin Robbins sits today."

Sierra Blanca Motors now stands on what was one of the greens and the Presbyterian church on another.

"Greens number seven and eight ran along (Junction) road, ending up at Gateway for the number nine green," Joyce said.

Most of the players were tourists, he said. Not many people in town had the money or the time to play golf.

Bill McCarty is carrying on the family tradition today. Although he is not the developer, his company has worked on the Alto Village and the Sierra Blanca golf courses.

# Former publisher heads company

Ken Green, president of the newly organized Safety Assurance Corporation, has announced the company will begin manufacturing its first product.

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

Other prizes include dinner for two at Mountain Bayou Cafe and private ski lessons donated by Ski Apache instructors.


Women may compete for fastest times in one of three age groups: 21 and under, 22-35 or 36 and older. Little girls compete in their own Ity Bitty T— Division.

# Americans are proud of Honest Abe

### Lincoln's Birthday

This is being sent to you on February 10, a still and quiet day overcast with light clouds, and will reach you on the eve of the birthday of Abraham Lincoln.

Our sixteenth president was born February 12, 1809, in a log cabin in Kentucky. Though born and raised in poverty and rustic toil, he rose to hold a favorite place in the hearts of all mankind for all time.

His life has special meaning for us today. Altogether he had about one year of schooling, and yet through an inborn desire to learn, he became a master of words.

His Gettysburg Address is recognized as one of the classic utterances of all time, and is inscribed in granite at the Lincoln Memorial in Washington DC.

The address which has become one of the central themes of American ideals ends with the words:

"...It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us — that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion — that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain; that this nation under God shall have a new birth of freedom, and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

It speaks to us today, with our libraries, schools and universities; when we remember that Abraham Lincoln, studied by the light of the fireplace writing with a piece of wood for a slate. He traveled miles on foot to borrow some of the few books that were treasured in the homes of his wide frontier neighborhood. Among the books which had a deep influence in his early life were: "The Bible," "Pilgrim's Progress," Aesop's fables, "Robinson Crusoe," the poems of Robert Burns, "Mason Weems," "Life of Washington" and the "Autobiography of Benjamin Franklin."

### Honest Abe

Lincoln held a fond spot in the hearts of his neighbors who knew him as Honest Abe on account of his legendary honesty. One time he walked miles in a blizzard to repay a lady a few cents he accidentally overcharged in a store.


He was a giant in physical strength, with mental and spiritual qualities to match. Next to George Washington he was our tallest president at six feet three, tied with Lyndon B. Johnson at this height.

He was the champion wrestler of his region, yet was gentle by nature, careful not to hurt his opponents. As a rail-splitter he required three blows with the axe to make four rails out of a log a foot and a half in diameter.

One of the guiding traits of his character was compassion. The story is told of how he dismounted in the mud with his Sunday clothes, to put a young bird back in the nest.





A House memorial has been introduced this week by the three area representatives requesting that a study be initiated to determine alternative uses for the facility so that the economy of the area will not be damaged and our friends and neighbors who are currently employed there will not be displaced.
