## Gambling bill is back in the game

State Representative John Underwood (D-District 56) is taking another gamble on a proposal to place video gaming on the ballot in three state resort areas.

Underwood, who represents Ruidoso, said he introduced a bill basically the same as the one passed last year but vetoed by then Governor Garrey Carruthers. That bill called for local option video gaming in Ruidoso, Angel Fire and Taos.

Several amendments are being considered for the bill that is set for a hearing this Saturday in the Business and Industry Committee. Among the possible changes is removing the limitation that originally tied the gambling to one large hotel.

"I'm not in favor of limiting the industry to one hotel in one location," said Underwood. "This way more people would have the op-

portunity to be players."

Another option would tie the gambling industry into other regulated and licensed industries in the state. That provision could allow for anyone already approved for a liquor license to be eligible for the gaming.

Underwood said he made it clear during his campaign that he doesn't want this to be a "John Underwood bill," but rather the people's bill. That's why he wants the issue of gambling to go to the voters.

Underwood said he researched similar gaming operations in South Dakota, and using New Mexico population figures, came up with possible revenues of \$155 million to operators and as much as \$31 million to the state.

The bill before the House Business and Industry Committee will call for allowing all gambling up to and including video gaming, said Underwood.

## Electrical short is the cause of sawmill fire

The State Fire Marshal's office and independent engineers have pinpointed a short in a breaker box as the probable cause of a fire which destroyed a sawmill on the Mescalero Apache Reservation, February 22.

"It was an electrical fire," Carl Monroe, manager of Mescalero Forest Products, told *The Ruidoso*

News. Monroe said the facility was insured, but it will take eight months to rebuild it.

He said earlier that Forest Products has two months of sawed lumber on hand to plane.

The sawmill is located just off U.S. 70 about two miles west of Mescalero proper.

## Crimestoppers sets "child ID" program

Child and senior citizen's identification, a service handled for several years by Crimestoppers, is scheduled for Saturday, March 9, at Wal-Mart.

The announcement was made by Ruidoso Police Detective Lanny Maddox to the Ruidoso/Lincoln County Crimestoppers at the regular meeting last Thursday at Cree Meadows.

Maddox said that a child must be accompanied by a parent with documents of the child's vital statistics, social security number and doctor's name.

Maddox said a color photo and a fingerprint will be taken and the picture, fingerprint and statistics will be placed on a laminated card and given to the parent.

The program is to assist parents in locating a missing child and the names will not be put on any list, Maddox said.

Maddox said the program averaged 400 persons a day last year, courtesy of Crimestopper and Wal-Mart.

## Council vows to check out Mechem redesign project

Members of the Ruidoso Village Council admitted Tuesday they don't know much about the new plans for widening Highway 48, but they promised concerned property owners along that route they would attend today's workshop meeting.

Phil Davis of Casa Blanca Restaurant, Stan Cape of A-Frame Cabins and Mike Steed of Steed's Ski Sports led off Tuesday's meeting demanding the council champion their cause to curtail current Highway 48 construction plans.

"We're concerned because we don't feel the council has done anything to protect our interest. We asked for alternatives, we bitched and moaned; the plans are exactly the way they were," said Davis.

He asked the councilors if they are for this type of highway.

"I for one am aware that the State Highway Department is coming down here to make these presentations, and I'm not up on it," said Mayor Victor Alonso.

"We're here to get you guys to

help us fight this thing," said Davis.

He said the new highway plans on view at the village are just as bad as the original plans of a year ago.

He said he was concerned how Ruidoso was going to look with a huge highway going through town.

Davis said there are plans for 15 to 20 percent grades up and down Mechem. He was afraid that today's meeting is the only other public meeting on the highway.

Some members of the council were unaware of the plans in the Planning and Zoning (P&Z) administrator's office.

Stan Cape said he was told by officials of the highway department that the two alternatives were the five lanes or nothing at all.

"When I hear those kind of alternatives," Cape said, "I'm not very comfortable with them."

Cape said 60 of the 105 driveways or streets will be at a grade of 10 percent or more.

P&Z administrator Cleatus Richards said the average grade is six percent.

Cape said plans show 31 streets are a 15 percent grade or more.

"To pull off the highway to get to your house or place of business, you've got to go down an incline or up an incline. To me that's unacceptable," Cape said. "At my place, it's 20 percent."

Cape said the current grade of his driveway is around three percent.

The council vowed to look at the plans before Thursday's workshop meeting at 3 p.m. and most will attend the session.

Alonso said he would hate to see the project delayed again.

Also Tuesday, Councilor Al Junge, reading from a prepared text, accused *The Ruidoso* News of creating an interview that didn't exist.

Junge repeated several of the questions asked of former village manager Charles Norwood in the February 14 issue of *The Ruidoso* News on the opinion page under the title "Mr. Norwood, we hardly knew you."

The questions, asked by Ruidoso News village beat reporter (and

sports editor) Charles Stallings, were generally critical of the council for acting as managers instead of policy makers.

Junge said the fault belonged to Norwood.

"Had the reporter interviewed others involved here he might have learned the truth. Mr. Norwood was burned out before he came to Ruidoso. He just couldn't face the challenge here."

Junge said Stallings' article accomplished nothing but to continue *The Ruidoso* News' destructive reporting toward the present council.

"No reputable newspaper would follow this course," Junge said. "The *News* who lost the election are looking forward to the election in 1992. Let's wish them the same success that they had in 1990. They made no interviews. They just shoot from the hip."

Contacted by *The Ruidoso* News Wednesday night at his home in Slaton, Texas, Charles Norwood confirmed that he was interviewed by Stallings in his city manager's office the day after he

resigned. Norwood said he was asked every question in the column.

In council business, Councilor Bill Karn was concerned that the water committee has not yet delivered its report the council requested several meetings ago regarding a water treatment plant at Grindstone Dam.

Karn said he was also concerned about a water rate increase study that was under way and he expressed disappointment that he wasn't told of the study. He was concerned that those rates were "quite hefty."

"It upsets me. You work hard to do a good job and lower people's taxes and then you turn around and raise the water rates because certain responsibilities weren't taken by a previous administration."

Karn said if a water rate increase coincided with MainStreet's project manager Mary Maul's request for funding. He said Underwood felt that it looked to the legislative body like the newspaper was champion-

quite awhile and we may not need a rate increase."

"If we're treating water that is flowing away, then we are spending dollars we don't need to be spending," Andrews said. "I submit this rate increase study is somewhat premature."

Councilor Barbara Duff suggested the department immediately start to repair the worst cases of water loss known with the equipment the department has on hand.

Councilor Karn requested an editorial in *The Ruidoso* News similar to one that was favorable to the village's MainStreet project.

Karn said State Representative John Underwood told him of senators and representatives that were from other areas, but owned houses in the Ruidoso area and read *The Ruidoso* News.

## Underwood takes top spot for a day; keeps looking for civic center funds

State Representative John Underwood, serving his first term in the House of Representatives, got a chance to serve as Speaker of the House one day this week.

Underwood, a Democrat who represents a district that extends from Ruidoso to Artesia, said he was honored to be asked by Speaker Raymond Sanchez to fill that top spot for awhile.

That honor was sandwiched among a full schedule that is keeping Ruidoso's freshman representative busy during this 60-day session in Santa Fe.

Underwood's constituents, including Ruidoso leaders, have spent some time in the Roundhouse this session in search of funds for several projects.

"I'm up here kicking over every rock," said Underwood in a telephone interview Wednesday. This session may be best remembered for belt-tightening as the money picture becomes bleaker each day in the state's capitol.

Ruidoso leaders made a presentation last week in an attempt to get funds for the civic/events center, a project that's pricetag keeps getting bigger and bigger.

Underwood said that presentation, made before the Taxation and Revenue Committee, was among the best that committee has seen this session. The proposal was tabled, as are all money proposals, until the end of the session when it's clear how much money is available.

"Every day gets gloomier rather than brighter," said Underwood. "We're working very hard on finding funding, but all indications are that there ain't no money," he added.

But Underwood was able to come up with a plan to free \$130,000 to help construct the \$1.5 million-plus center. That money, approved during last year's 30-day session, was allocated for site-dayings, but Underwood proposed a bill to reallocate the money for construction.

"It would give us a leg up," said Underwood, noting that getting the money for furnishings before the building is finished could be "putting the cart before the horse."

Underwood said he met Tuesday with State Highway Department staff in an effort to identify funds for the MainStreet Ruidoso project requests. MainStreet is looking for funds to improve sidewalks, parking and lighting in Midtown Ruidoso.

Because the project area is in state rights of way, Underwood believes the state will come up with matching funds, from 50 to 75 percent.

Through the Municipal Arterial Projects fund, Underwood said Ruidoso will be able to enter into a 75-25 cooperative project for some of the project, with the state paying the larger share.

Representative Underwood also reported that he talked with Governor Bruce King and Attorney General Tom Udall about concerns

over the future of Fort Stanton Hospital and Training Center.

A federal court order has placed the future of the facility in question since that order calls for removing a number of clients from the center that employs 230 people in Lincoln County. The concern has been for the residents of the center as well as the economic impact on this area.

"Everything within the state's power will be done to keep Fort Stanton operating," said Underwood, noting that both the governor and the attorney general gave him their assurances on that.

"The battle is not over," he added.

Another project that Underwood has been working on is an ethics rule for the House. Underwood, at the request of Speaker Sanchez, drafted enforcement procedures for the ethics regulations.

He said he drafted the procedure and they were passed out of committee, but he plans to redefine some portions and take them back for further review.

## Council sets hearing

The Ruidoso Village Council has scheduled a special meeting to conduct a public hearing to consider approval of a dispensers liquor license.

The hearing will take place at 1 p.m. Tuesday, March 5, in the council chambers.

The Village of Ruidoso will lease the liquor license to AllHub Inc., to be used at The Links of Sierra Blanca golf course located off Sierra Blanca Drive.

That golf course will open with a tournament at 9 a.m. Friday, March 1.

## State plans hearings on Mechem redesign

The New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Department will conduct a property owner workshop open to the public from 3 p.m. to 8 p.m. today (Thursday), February 28, at the village council chambers.

The purpose of the workshop will be to discuss the widening of Highway 48, Mechem Drive, from the corner of Sudderth and Mechem to Ski Run Road.

Planning and Zoning administrator Cleatus Richards said interest in the road improvement has been high with many residents stopping by his office this week to view the new proposed plans.

Several businessmen attended the council meeting Tuesday to lodge their protests over the new proposed construction. They said the plans called for severe grade changes that would cause a hardship to everyone using side roads and driveways in the area. Others complained that they were never notified as the state requires.

The consulting engineer for the project is Boyle Engineering Corporation located out of Albuquerque.

The existing two-lane roadway is to be improved to four travel lanes with a continuous left turn center lane. Concrete curbs, gutters, storm sewers, retaining walls, sidewalks, and other accessories have been incorporated into the project.

Preliminary plans are available for viewing at the village offices.

## PBS kicks off Festival '91

Eastern New Mexico University's public television station is slated to begin its most important fundraising drive of the year on March 1.

Festival '91 will continue through March 18, with goal of generating \$55,000 or programming on KENW-TV.

The televised pledge drive will feature special programs as well as standard PBS series. Upcoming programs range from big band and country music concerts to documentaries about Wyoming's Grand Tetons and human birth. In addition, the PBS series "The Civil War" will air at 7 p.m. March 10-14.

Two New Mexico musical groups will also perform in live studio concerts as part of "KENW Presents!"

"The Retreads," an award-winning barbershop quartet from Roswell, will be featured at 6:30 p.m. Saturday, March 2, while "Timbrelaine," one of eastern New Mexico's most popular country music bands, will play at 6:30 p.m. Saturday, March 9.

About 250 community volunteers are expected to participate in the 18-day pledge drive, working behind the scenes, answering pledge phones and making on-air appeals during this 15th year for on-air fundraising for KENW-TV.

In addition to evening programs for adults and families, KENW-TV provides a full educational schedule during the day for use in area schools.

KENW-TV Director of Development Glenda Balas notes that the station's programming priorities are quality and diversity.

"We realize that all of our programming may not appeal to every viewer living in our region. We do try, however, to offer something for everyone. That's why we provide classical, country, folk, and big band music, as well financial coverage, science documentaries, and children's programs, among many others."

## Feds survey farms/ranches

Local interviewers are currently knocking on the doors of New Mexico farms and ranches for the seventh annual Farm Costs and Returns Survey.

According to a news release, this major, nationwide survey on costs of production and financial conditions throughout the farm/ranch sector is conducted by the state offices of the National Agricultural Statistics Service, part of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Across the nation, 24,000 farmers and ranchers will be contacted for survey interviews.

In New Mexico, the survey started on February 11 and is expected to continue until the end of March. Most of those selected for interviews have already been notified by letter.

Interviewers are collecting data on farm/ranch expenses, finances, capital purchases, and costs of production for 1990. The information will be used to determine farm/ranch production expenditures, measure farm/ranch income, and assess farm/ranch sector debts, assets, and cash flow—key indicators of the economic well-being of farmers and ranchers.

Survey findings will also be used to estimate costs and returns for producing individual commodities.

USDA will publish the results of the survey in various reports scheduled for release beginning next summer.

The New Mexico survey is being managed by the New Mexico Agricultural Statistics Service in Las Cruces, headed by Charles Gore.

"Those who participate in this state will represent New Mexico farmers and ranchers in the national sample," said Gore. "We are asking for their time and cooperation so that the survey can present an accurate, up-to-date picture of economic conditions and the diversity of New Mexico agriculture to policymakers, university and extension people, and farmers and ranchers themselves."

# Downs joins forces with the state to repair village roads

The Village of Ruidoso Downs trustees have approved a cooperative agreement with the State Highway Department for street improvement to 2.5 miles of village streets in fiscal year 1991-92.

The action came at a regular meeting, Monday night, in village hall, a village hall the village may vacate very soon.

Trustees agreed that the village will have to vacate the municipal building and find new quarters either temporarily or permanently.

Broken sewer pipes under the solid concrete floor of the building have prompted the village to consider several alternatives to solve the problem. One is moving out of the old structure which apparently is in a state of disrepair.

Mayor Bonnie Addy will appear before the Department of Finance and Administration in Santa Fe the morning of March 5 to seek emergency funds which would be used to primarily to move the radio tower and communications equipment.

The village must decide whether to do a major overhaul of village hall or find space to lease elsewhere either temporarily or longer.

Mayor Addy told trustees Monday night that the village can't afford to build a new building and doesn't have the bonding capacity to pay for a new structure.

Addy said she has investigated several properties which the village might lease for a period of time until a master plan can be devised to take care of the problem.

The current situation apparently is creating a health problem for village workers. Village attorney Gary Mitchell said the village must provide a safe workplace for employees. Methane gas is causing a problem.

One possible location would be the old Fantasy Mountain property. Even if the present structure is not abandoned, it wouldn't be occupied if trustees decide that renovation and repairs to the old building is the way to go.

Addy will ask for \$15,000 which could be used, in part, to pay rent until a solution is found. Trustees said that because of extensive contamination, a great deal of soil must be removed from beneath the present village hall.

"The EID is not going to wait ... they want it cleaned up and cleaned up now," Addy told

trustees.

Dennis Riddle, maintenance superintendent, has worked up a street improvement project which would cost \$119,000, Addy said. It would provide 2.5 miles of base course.

Under the plan, the state would provide 60 percent of the funds or \$71,000 and the village \$47,000. Some of the village contribution could be in man hours and equipment, Addy said.

She said she hopes the cash outlay for the village could be brought down to about \$20,000.

Application will be made to the state to improve 11 unpaved roads within the village.

On another front, the Senior Citizens Center RFP (Request for Proposals) has been published and the on-site visit was a success on February 19. Five different companies were represented, Addy reported.

A total of 10 different companies have purchased bid packages. Sealed bids are due in at 4 p.m. March 11 and will be opened at a regular council meeting that evening.

The mayor announced that a

matching fund application to LWCF (Land and Water Conservation Fund) is being written for fiscal year 1991-92 funds to develop a new softball field and to further extensive park renovation.

A grant bill which would help make Ruidoso Downs a museum center has been put into the legislative Christmas Tree Bill, Addy reported. Thus, there will be no hearings to attend.

Trustees voted to favor Gem Insurance Co. for village health insurance. It provides for a \$100 deductible, \$1 million lifetime maximum, 80-20 co-insurance, employee rate of \$85.35, family rate of \$246.62 and a two-party rate of \$184.35.

Trustees approved the village clerk attendance at a "Clerk's Program Committee" meeting in Albuquerque, March 1.

Approval was given for purchased of a Computer Data System.

The fire department was given permission to run a water line from a fire hydrant to the fire station. It will allow loading of fire trucks indoors in cold weather.

Cost is expected to be only \$211 for materials. The village will dig the ditch and lay the line.

## Ruidoso Downs forms two new boards

The Village of Ruidoso Downs now has a Lodgers Tax Board and a Planning and Zoning Board.

Village trustees were introduced to members at a regular meeting of trustees, Monday evening.

Also, Trustee Margie Morales agreed to be the village liaison person to the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County, replacing Mayor Bonnie Addy who said she was "up to her ears" in meetings.

Named to the Planning and Zoning Board were Debbie Sturdivant, Ronda Dvorak, Karen Stevens, Robin Surgey and Shelley Barns. Village staff people

are Maurice Gudel, village clerk, and Bill Heineken, code enforcement officer.

Named to the Lodgers Tax Board were Trustee Karen Stevens, Tony Wilcoxon, Shelly Barns, Mike Warren, Camille Mansell and village clerk, Maurice Gudel.

During the meeting three village employees were recognized for exemplary service. They are Oscar Hoffer, of the sanitation department; Billy Page and David Weibrecht, both of the water department.

The citations had to do with rebuilding and replumbing a pumphouse.

## Lore trial is rescheduled to March 18

A new trial date of March 18 has been set for George Lore of Ruidoso on charges relating to bank transactions.

Lore is charged with structuring bank transactions to avoid federal reporting procedures. He is a former director of the now defunct The Bank of Ruidoso.

According to the U. S. District Court clerk in Las Cruces, a hearing was conducted February 19 before U.S. District Judge Howard Bratton in Las Cruces. The attorney for Lore under Rule 41E filed a motion regarding return of property and to suppress evidence.

Judge Bratton, the clerk said, requested a letter to that effect to be submitted by next Monday, March 3.

The motion to suppress evidence will be taken under advisement upon receipt of the letter, the court clerk said.

Federal law requires that transaction of \$10,000 or more must be reported to the IRS.

According to the indictment against Lore, he conducted a series of 15 such transactions at The Bank of Ruidoso between November 14, 1988, and September 22, 1989.

Maximum penalty for each of the 15 counts is a fine of up to \$250,000 and five years imprisonment.

Back in September, Lore said of the indictments, "I am not guilty."

The Ruidoso man is free on \$50,000 bond.

The IRS began looking at Lore's activities when Ruidoso Building Corporation, Lore's company, was building a house in the Glencoe area for Carlos Anchondo.

Carlos Anchondo is the son of Hector Tapia Anchondo, an alleged leader of a cocaine cartel.

Hector Tapia Anchondo was charged last year, along with five others, of conspiring to import and importing multi-ton quantities of cocaine into the U.S.

Some 20 tons of cocaine were seized at a Los Angeles, California, warehouse.

Lore had conducted business with Anchondo who had purchased the Bear Ranch in Glencoe from Lore. The Bear Ranch was among properties seized by the IRS.

Although none of Lore's personal property was seized, the IRS did take a Cadillac he purchased.

tips to the FBI on the homicide at Mescalero.

A reward was paid for information on the return of a stolen truck worth in excess of \$15,000.

## Police study the media

Police officers will study media relations during a two-day program at the Ruidoso Police station that started Wednesday and continues through today.

Nineteen police officers from the southern part of the state will take part in the program sponsored by the New Mexico Department of Public Safety.

The Department of Public Safety has contracted with Ernie Watson owner/president of Video Images, a consulting firm, to teach the course.

# Injured hawk settles in rehab center

The red-tailed hawk was sitting on a stump as David Tremblay and his wife drove by on their way to their home near Fort Stanton Road. They knew something was wrong right away.

"It was just sitting there and wouldn't fly," Tremblay said. "When it spread its wings, it was obvious that it had been shot."

He found a knit cap and covered the bird's head to calm it, then called the Ruidoso Police Department to help track down State Game and Fish Department officer Ron Moore.

"But that was Friday afternoon (about two weeks ago) and we were afraid the bird would never live through the weekend," Tremblay said.

The bird was accepted by local veterinarian Lynn Willard of the Ruidoso Animal Clinic.

"The hawk was in good condition except for the gunshot wound," Willard said Wednesday. "We cleaned the wound, trimmed around it and medicated it for one week until Moore was contacted. He had been out of town."

With a wing span of four feet, the red-tailed hawk "was probably the most beautiful bird we've ever had here," Willard said. "You have to be careful of the talons, but it was almost like she knew we were trying to help her. She was never aggressive."

It's the first time Willard has been involved with wildlife rescue.

"When someone calls who has found a baby deer, hawk, eagle or other wildlife, we know Fish and

Game doesn't have any money, so we take care of them until they decide how to handle the animals," Willard said. "It's a public thing we just feel we should do."

Moore doesn't know who shot the hawk. Unfortunately, wounding and killing of animals in rural areas is not uncommon.

Just a week before Tremblay saw the hawk, a neighbor's pet dog was found fatally shot. A calf's head was lying in the road one day and another time, Tremblay saw the slaughtered remains of a bull elk. All that was left were the legs and head — with antlers sawed off.

Fortunately for the hawk, it now resides in a flight cage at the rehabilitation operation of Steve Patterson, manager of Bottomless Lake State Park near Roswell.

"It can move around, but its wing still is splintered," he said. "The wing was severely broken. I think it was a .22-caliber rifle and it left a pretty big hole near the bird's wrist joint. When it heals, the joint may calcify. If that happens, it wouldn't be able to fly."

But the hawk has gained weight since it arrived and, barring some unexpected turn, should survive just fine, Patterson said. Right now, he only has one other red-tailed hawk — also a shooting victim — and a Mississippi kite in residence. The kite is used in educational programs under the auspices of Wildlife Rescue of New Mexico, a nonprofit group whose motto is to "raise, rehabilitate, release and educate," he said.

"The kite is real good with kids and the program creates an environmental awareness early in

their lives, then maybe we won't find so many animals shot," Patterson said. The kite, called Woodstock, spends much of the day perched behind Patterson's desk.

The wildlife rescue group hand-

les all types of animals, but Patterson, who has a degree in wildlife science, only takes birds.

He has completed training required to be licensed by the state and federal government for hand-

ling protected wildlife.

"You learn how to handle the animals because they can be dangerous," he said. "They go over therapy, splinting, medication and hydration. Dehydration can be a real risk for wounded wild animals."

The Roswell community has been extremely supportive of Patterson's work. He receives assistance from the Roswell Audubon, the Science Club at Eastern New Mexico University and the Chaves County Veterinarian Association. Dr. Gary Dameron of the Country Club Animal Hospital has performed all the necessary surgery on the animals and never charged the program a penny for his services, Patterson said.

"Quick treatment is real important," Patterson said. During the summer, he may have as many as 50 birds at the center from as far away as Hobbs and Santa Rosa.

Patterson said he's been involved in rehabilitation about one year. Most of the rehabilitation for other types of animals is handled in the northern part of the state, although two mule deer fawns from Ruidoso now live at the Spring River Park and Zoo in Roswell.

"We have real success with pronghorns and deer fawns," said zoo director Elaine Wiser. "But people don't feed the fawns correctly. They can't tolerate cow's milk. Some arrive here suffering from diarrhea and very dehydrated."

When fawns are hand-raised, they can never be released into the

wild, but they adapt well to zoo life, she said.

She cautioned good samaritans not to pick up small animals they think are abandoned, however.

"In the case of deer, for instance, the fawns stay at home alone while the mother wanders looking for food," Wiser said. "Too often, well-intentioned people remove the babies when they haven't been abandoned at all."


The same thing occurs frequently with birds. Even if they have fallen from a nest, if they are uninjured, they can be returned to their mothers.

Ron Moore said the success rate for younger animals is greater than for adults, especially in deer and elk.

"If they are mature, the stress is so high, the success rate is very low," he said. "Usually we have to destroy them and try to salvage the meat."

Moore said Dr. Kathleen Ramsey in Espanola is the main treatment center for injured wildlife in the state. She became involved a couple of years ago when there was widespread poisoning of the raptor population, he said. Raptors are birds of prey such as the hawk and eagle. Ramsey will work with almost any type of injured wild animal, he said.



### Traylor presides over Capitan Bear's Den of Old Things

The shop's name, The Bear's Den of Old Things, only tells half the story.

It's true that Herbert Lee Traylor, a local historian and former teacher, has assembled a museum of artifacts from early Capitan in the store at Lincoln and First Street.

But the shop also is stocked with unusual craft work, books on local lore and charming ceramic pieces created by residents of nearby Fort Stanton Hospital and Training Center.

How unusual? How about necklaces crafted from the vertebrae of rattlesnakes, delicate beaded earrings using porcupine quills, walking canes from dried cholla cactus limbs and candy baked with cactus extract and piñon nuts?

"I started this last spring," Traylor said during a recent tour of his shop. He looks at home in the Bear's Den with its wood-burning stove and collection of horseshoes from animals of local fame.

"All of the crafts are supplied by local individuals, even the books are mostly written by local authors," he said.

Displayed in cases and on the walls are handmade dolls, quilt wall hangings, pot holders, graceful birds cut from cow horns and whittled cowboy boots by former rodeo rider Jack Forrester.

One local resident even spins her own wool to create shawls, scarves and vests.

Visitors also will find wooden cows and coyotes, red pepper necklaces and earrings and decorated sweatshirts and aprons.

But perhaps the most valuable treasure in the shop is Traylor himself. A resident of Lincoln County since 1914 and Capitan since 1964, he knows the history behind each item in the museum, each craft creation on his shelves. And he

The dress code at Capitan Elementary School most certainly was broken last Thursday, but nobody seemed to mind.

The 39 students in the second grades classes of Laura Jones and Mary Shanks were bedecked in costumes and accessories of foreign lands as part of the Love to Chil-

"It's part of a social studies unit," Mrs. Shanks explained. "We started it several years ago to illustrate to the students that all children basically are the same whether they eat or dress differently."

Besides their costumes, the children brought traditional foods from

the countries of their choice.

The menu in Mrs. Jones' class included sweet and sour pork, crepes, polish sausage and egg rolls. The fare on the table in Mrs. Shanks' room featured fortune cookies, sushi, borscht, Gouda cheese, spanish olives and dates.

seems to enjoy telling his customers about that history.

Co-author of "The Saga of Sierra Blanca," a collection of vignettes of early life in Lincoln County, he also has assembled a booklet detailing the history of each horse represented in his 1900-1940 horseshoe collection. The tales include information about Old Dogie, a horse known throughout the county for his use in fighting forest fires; Preacher Prior's Mule that toted the minister on missions from Hondo Valley to Jicarilla; and Flying Dutchman, the steer roping horse of well-known rodeo roper and Glencoe resident Gerald Tully.

Traylor and his wife, Alice, came up with the idea of the cactus candy.

"Every spring of the year when the cactus gets new shoots, we burn the spines off, grind the pulp and run it through a sifter or cheese cloth," Traylor said. "It takes two days to strain because it's very slimy. We cut it with water, freeze it and use it as needed with piñon nuts."

The recipe is similar to peanut brittle, he said.

The Bear's Den is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. seven days a week.

### Birthday Of Our Brother Joe

This is being sent to you on February 25, and will reach you on February 28, the birthday of our brother Joe.

Joseph Duffield Storm was born February 28, 1913, in Denver, Colorado, to Lynn Whipp Storm and the former Bertha Catherine Kennedy.

With the family he traveled to Alaska, Oregon, California and Mexico and then to the Ruidoso Valley. Here he spent some of the happiest days of his life riding his horse, Buttermilk, visiting his countless friends up and down the valley and learning the history and lore of Lincoln County firsthand, from the old-timers.

When we began spending the winters in Austin, Texas, Joe and his brothers, John, Daniel, Marcus and Lynn, attended The University of Texas.

Here Joe ran the mile on the track team and was co-captain of the team his last year in school.

### Newspaper Career

In 1936, Joe was editor of the University of Texas newspaper, The Daily Texan. Here Walter Cronkite worked with him. There is a photo here in the house of Joe and Walter at the Daily Texan office.

Later Joe was editor of the Sweetwater Reporter, San Angelo Times, two west Texas newspapers. Later he worked for the United States Department of Agriculture under the Franklin Roosevelt Administration.

Before going to the Army in World War II he had his own small crusading newspaper in Washington D.C. entitled "Spade."

### In World War II

Like so many who later take part in war, things military and war were as far from Joe's nature as night is from day.

Yet as a boy he was a protector of small children from bullies, like our Uncle Frank Agnew Storm, a lad with a soft heart and fists of iron.

Joe was an infantry scout with the Timberwolf Infantry Division in Europe in World War II. He fell in battle in Germany, February 25, 1945.

Today, on the 25, I send up a very special prayer for our men and women in our armed forces in the Desert Storm War. And I feel the spirit of our brother Joe, very fondly close, visiting me from Heaven on this beautiful day, on the approach of his birthday.

### "A Man Must Fight"

After reading that one of my favorite athletes of early days, Red Grange, the great football player of the twenties, had been called Home by Our Lord, my thoughts drifted back to other sports heroes of the day, Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig, Jack Dempsey and Gene Tunney.

Gene Tunney has been on my mind especially. He won the Heavyweight Boxing Championship from Jack Dempsey in 1928 while still in the United States Marine Corps.

Gene was everything a true sportsman should be, an inspiring role model to youth of the day. He gave talks on clean living, sportsmanship and patriotism to young people.

He wrote a book which was widely read in those days entitled "A Man Must Fight." He brought out that from our beginning our men have fought to protect the family from any harm from evil men or wild beasts—fought against tyranny and oppression for freedom and liberty.

Also in a higher sense that a man must fight against himself—that is to keep his courage, to resist temptation, and to remain true to himself and to God.

I wish Gene would answer me from Heaven when I might ask him what he thinks of women fighting in our armed forces—something unheard of in his day.

He would probably say that "Men Must Fight" all the harder to keep the women soldiers from harm.

Cliff and Irene Sommerfeld, from Halstead, Kansas, stopped in Ruidoso for a day or two visit on their way to Tempe, Arizona, where Cliff will attend the mid winter reunion of the Rainbow Division held in Tempe.



## Spotted owl pinpointed for protection

The Mexican spotted owl, which is a resident of the Lincoln National Forest around Ruidoso, is scheduled to be proposed for protection under the Endangered Species Act, according to John F. Turner, Director of the Interior Department's U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

A distant cousin of the northern spotted owl, the subspecies is found mainly in Arizona and New Mexico and has been the object of an intense surveying effort over the last few years.

The service's decision was based on a status review conducted during the last year that concluded the Mexican spotted owl is threatened by destruction and modification of

its habitat.

More than 60 percent of the identified habitat sits on lands managed for timber production and includes many areas with steep slopes and mature mixed conifer forests that have not been logged.

"The Mexican spotted owl is limited to parts of five states in the Southwest, favoring canyon habitat and mature forests," Turner said. "It suffers from loss of suitable habitat, the same situation for most of the 600 listed species."

In December 1989, the service was petitioned to list the Mexico spotted owl as a protected bird. The service subsequently initiated a for-

mal status review of the species and now proposes to list it as a threatened subspecies under the Endangered Species Act. A period for public comment will be announced.

The Mexican spotted owl is one of three spotted owl subspecies, Turner explained. It is distinguished from the northern and the California spotted owl subspecies by its distinct coloration and geographic distribution. Its range extends from the southern Rocky Mountains in Colorado and the Colorado Plateau in southern Utah south through Arizona, New Mexico and western Texas, and into Mexico to the mountains at the

southern end of the Mexican plateau.

It is most abundant in New Mexico and Arizona. Three regions in these two states account for about 85 percent of the owls currently known to exist and the Lincoln forest is one of the prime areas.

Several federal agencies have conducted surveys to locate the owl on the lands they manage. The most extensive surveys have been done by the U.S. Forest Service. About 70 percent of the bird's habitat occurs in national forests. To date, these surveys have located 798 owls, Turner said. The forest service's current estimate of the bird's population is 1,965.






## Editorial

### TO THE EDITOR:

Once again big labor has struck down proposed changes in the States "Public Works Minimum Wage Act" which if passed, would have resulted in substantial savings for all our public schools and local governments. Testimony by union officials before the House Labor Committee resulted in "Do Not Pass" votes on four bills addressing this subject.

HB 107 (Harrington) Would have repealed that section of the law requiring schools and local governments to pay "prevailing wage rates" on construction

projects (including painting and decorating) on all contracts in excess of \$20,000.

HB 362 (Harrington) Would have increased the exempted minimum contract amount from \$20,000 to \$100,000 for local governments.

HB 394 (Barber) Proposed to eliminate the requirement for all public schools and institutions of higher learning.

HB 467 (Harrington) Raised exempted amount for public schools from \$20,000 to \$400,000.

Although we were successful in obtaining a House floor vote on the "Do Not Pass" recommendation by

the Labor Committee, it too failed by a vote of 44-26. (A yes vote was in favor of the union officials—a no vote against).

It seems more than ironic during this current financial crisis that so many legislators are "turning over every stone" looking for more money for more projects, then summarily rejecting proposals which would save money for our public schools and local governments. Could it be that political pressure and campaign contributions cause the "tail to wag the dog?"



## The Plant Corner

# It's time to get set for spring planting

If you plan to have a salad barrel this summer, it is just about time to get the containers, such as half-barrels or equivalent size, ready for planting. To be safe, I recommend using fresh, new soil mix for each new planting. Simply dump all the tired, old planting material. It can be used in ground beds or on lawns. Next drill five or six one-inch holes in bottom if using a half-barrel, install five good casters or make a dolly if using plastic containers of equivalent size. Five casters give a better balance making containers easier to move about.

Select a warm, sunny place inside to start the seeds or plants. Almost all veggies do best when started from seeds but nursery plants may be transplanted. These salad barrels are truly a treat and will assure you of a delicious fresh salad all summer.

Soil—Mix your own with one-third cow manure, one-third peat moss or finely ground bark and some sharp river sand and one-third regular potting soil. Be sure to keep the mixture light for good air circulation and fast drainage. Some added vermiculite does wonders for air circulation as well as good drainage. First place a few inches of plastic ready

peanuts, then fill the barrels to approximately three inches from the top with the fresh soil mixture.

Light—Bright light and warmth are essential. You must have the equivalent of a very minimum of four hours sunlight each day. This can be done with grow-bulbs placed overhead and on all sides plus locating container in sunny south or west window. Don't forget to put a tray under the pots to catch drip water.

Temperature—The temperature should never fall below 60 degrees, they can tolerate, indeed really enjoy, heat up to 90 degrees as long as the soil is kept moist. When containers are moved to decks or patios, filter or shade with a sun-screen if temperature gets over 90 degrees and try to protect from strong, harsh winds.

Water—Water often to keep the soil moist. Daily watering is really best. Never allow the soil to completely dry out and worse yet, never let the soil become soggy—to let the pot stand in drip tray water can only be instant death.

Fertilizer—Dilute the fertilizer to one-fourth the package direction and mix with each watering during the entire growing season. Use Miracle-Gro for veggies or liquid manure.

Pests—Now-a-days the seeds are treated for pest resistance, especially Wilting. Plant Wilting is one reason for using fresh new soil each planting.

You can help prevent mildew by providing good air circulation and dust once a week with ashes from the fireplace.

Brown leaves can be caused by too much or too little water, too much or too little light, sunscorch, too little humidity and from bruising. For individual servings plant Tom Thumb lettuce, some green and ruby lettuce and some spinach. Plant cherry tomatoes on the outer edge of pots and allow them to trail over the edge of the barrel. They take up very little space planted this way and look so pretty. Also plant some carrots, chives, onions, cabbage and whatever is your favorite salad mix.

### II. PROCUREMENT CODE

The award made pursuant to the RFP will be governed by the provisions of the New Mexico Procurement Code, Section 13-1-1 et. seq., NMSA 1984 Supplement, although such compliance may not be required. Please note that Section 13-1-199, NMSA 1984 Supplement, imposes civil and criminal penalties for the violation of the provisions of the Procurement Code. New Mexico criminal statutes impose felony penalties for illegal bribes, gratuities or kickbacks.

### III. SCOPE OF WORK

The Authority contemplates issuing revenue bonds that will be repaid from recently enacted environmental taxes that are expected to generate approximately

\$125,000 per year to retire the bonds. The proceeds of the bond issue will be used to capitalize a county wide solid waste collecting and transportation system. The winning respondent or contractor will be expected to provide the following services plus any other services necessary to complete the underwriting of the bonds in a timely manner:

a. **SURVEY OF FINANCIAL RESOURCES** The contractor will make a survey of the financial resources of the Authority and provide advice regarding the size, maturities, security and timing of the proposed bond issue.

b. **PLANNING** The contractor will prepare a complete timetable for the proposed bonds. The timetable will be responsive to the needs of the Authority.

f. **MARKETING** The Contractor will use its resources to successfully market the proposed bonds at competitive, market interest rates. The contractor will present the Authority with a final structuring of the bonds, complete with interest rates, for final approval.

g. **CLOSING** The contractor will schedule and coordinate a timely closing of the bond issue.

### IV. TERMINATION

This request for proposal in no way obligates the Authority to eventually select a contractor and, if selected, to ultimately engage the services requested. Champions were chosen in each age and sex category, and from those champions, an overall division champion was selected.

Because none of the nominated 3-year-old fillies received 51 percent of the votes from the committee, a runoff between leading vote-getters Sweet N Special and Moons High was needed. Those who voted for the other nominated fillies were asked to cast a second ballot, for either Sweet N Special or Moons High. Because neither Apprehend nor Special Project garnered 51 percent of the votes to be named the Champion Three-Year-Old, a runoff was also held to determine the recipient of that title.

The jockey, trainer and a co-breeder of Dash For Speed all garnered champion horsemanship honors for 1990. Those awards, as well as the honor for the Champion Owner, are determined by a point system that awards overall performance, with an emphasis on performance in stakes.

In addition to riding Dash For Speed, Champion Jockey Kip Didericksen rode Refrigerator, the Champion Two-Year-Old and Champion Two-Year-Old Gelding, and Taken On the Cash, the Champion Two-Year-Old Colt, in 1990.

Didericksen became the first jockey to win the All-American Futurity G1 and the Champion of Champions G1 in the same year when he rode Refrigerator to victory in the former and Dash For Speed to win the latter.

**Jockey Kip Didericksen, trainer Blane Schvaneveldt and breeder B.F. Phillips Jr. were named the 1990 champions in their respective professions.**

The Idaho native also established a single-season earnings record for jockeys when mounts he rode earned \$2,812,004. Didericksen rode 238 winners to lead all jockeys in that category. He received the Champion Jockey title for the second consecutive year.

Dash For Speed was trained in

1990 by Blane Schvaneveldt, who was named the Champion Trainer for the sixth consecutive year (the honor was begun in 1985). In 1990,

Schvaneveldt led all trainers in races won, with 178, and purses earned, with \$1,711,665. The late B.F. Phillips Jr., who bred Dash For Speed in partnership with McRae Interprises, was named the Champion Breeder of 1990 for the fourth consecutive year.

Horses bred by Phillips, founder of the famous Phillips Ranch in Texas, earned \$644,175 in 1990.





# Speed index measures horse's performance

A great part of any publication that features racing, specifically Quarter Horse racing, is made up of advertisements about horses that are either for sale, have done marvelous things in their careers, or are standing at a particular farm for breeding.

And usually within the midst of the rhetoric about the great things a given horse may have done, or will hopefully do, there is usually a number preceded by the letters SI — an abbreviation for speed index. What exactly does that mean?

What it means on paper is very different from what it means on the track. The speed index is the tool which the American Quarter Horse Association's Racing Department uses in order to determine if a horse receives his Register or Merit or if he receives his permanent registry number, should the horse be by or out of a Thoroughbred. It is also an indication of how fast a horse is.

And that is exactly what it is — an indication. The speed index can really be very misleading if a person is not aware of how the horse has performed in the past and where.

Dan Fick, Director of Racing and the Racing Council, explains:

"The speed index is a representation of a horse's performance

over a specified distance at a specific race-track in relation to time," he says. "It's supposed to be an evaluation in that case of what the horse's speed is."

Fick says that speed is probably one of the most inheritable traits in the Quarter Horse, and the speed index gives potential breeders and buyers an idea of how fast they should expect a horse to run. But, if they are not properly schooled on the use of the speed index, and where and how a given horse ran at a given track, then the speed index is really of little use.

Tom Hagadone, assistant director of racing, says that, if used properly, the speed index can be a useful tool.

"A speed index is useful because it tells you speed over a given distance," Hagadone says. "But, it only tells you how good a horse is if you know the difference in tracks. That's the only difference in the system — the speed of the track and the quality of horses which run on that track."

Now that's getting down to the nuts and bolts of the speed index — how fast the track is and what kind of horses are being run there. AQHA has established minimum standard times at which a certain speed index is determined over a certain distance at a certain time.

New tracks that are just opening will have their speed indexes determined against those minimum standard times, and then as the track continues to have meets, those minimum standards will change for that track as AQHA determines the track's minimum standard from times run for the past three years. So each track in the country that runs Quarter Horses has got its own minimum standard time, which tells racehorse owners how fast that track is.

"One factor here that is very important is the fact that when a new track opens, it runs against our minimum standards," Fick says. "As it obtains three years of times, we take its three fastest for each year and adjust the speed index for that track."

But when considering a horse that is running at a given track, it is important to take into consideration how many times he's run there, the conditions of the races in which he's run, and the geographical area in which the track is located. Altitude, wind, whether the track is fast or muddy, and human error have a very significant effect on the times run in races, and, consequently, the speed index of that horse.

Hagadone says there have been instances at particular tracks

around the country where reported speed indexes have been so unlikely that an investigation of those track's timing systems was necessary. Or, if it was clear that the reported speed index was not possible at the track, the track is notified that that particular race will not be assigned a speed index.

So, a speed index is not that useful a tool in determining how fast a horse really is, if that is the only thing a potential buyer is looking at. What it really should be used for, says Hagadone is just in determining a Register of Merit for a horse and in handicapping races.

"If you are using a speed index to buy a horse, I would not place a whole lot of importance on it," he said. "If there are two horses out there and one horse ran a 91 speed index at, say, some track in the northeast area of the country that doesn't have a lot of Quarter Horse racing, and another horse ran a 91 at Los Alamitos, these two facts would be very unimportant. You need to look at how many times a horse ran, who he outran, how consistent he was and what his breeding is. There is a tremendous amount of importance put on the speed index that there should not be. The speed index for what it is, what it would be used for, is a good tool."

Handicappers use the speed index in order to handicap a race. With the speed index, along with the information they have about the horses on different tracks, handicappers are able to determine which horse would be the likely favorite in a given race. Since the handicappers are schooled in the probable conditions of each track the horses were running on in relation to the single track they are running against each other on, they are able to make an educational estimate about how each should perform that day.

"A speed index in and of itself is not a good judgment of a horse's ability," said Hagadone. "You have to look at how the horse performed at several distances and several races. One speed index is not a good judgment of that horse's capabilities."

Fick concurred, "If you are going to buy a horse, request a copy of its race record from AQHA. Look for consistency rather than one high speed index. Money earned is the real bottom line of the racing industry. Can a horse pay his way at the track? Remember, you can't take a speed index to the bank."





## AQHA lists members in Mideast

While American Quarter Horse racing is not known to exist in the Middle East, where the United States military currently is involved in the war with Iraq, the American Quarter Horse Association is represented in the region.

### In 1990, 16 Quarter Horses from Israel were registered.

Of the association's 269,770 members (19,637 of whom live outside the United States), 19 live in Israel. In 1990, 16 Quarter Horses from Israel were registered with the association. Of the other Middle Eastern nations, one Kuwaiti citizen registered a Quarter Horse in 1990, as did one resident of Iran. In 1989, one resident of Saudi Arabia registered a Quarter Horse with the association.

Interestingly, Arabian racing is a thriving sport in the Iraqi capital of Baghdad, where some 10,000 fans attended the city's racetrack, the Horsemanship Club, just hours before the city was bombed on Jan. 16, according to "USA Today."



# Cutting: 4th richest of sports

Riding a cutting horse is often referred to as having "the best seat in the house." Cutting horse competition is becoming more irresistible to people of all ages and all walks of life.

Active cutters in New Mexico run the gamut from business owners, corporate executives, ranchers, secretaries, school students, and the strictly "weekend" cutter, who doesn't haul as far or as often, but does it for personal fulfillment and recreation, their love of the sport and the challenge involved.

Because the bottom line in cutting is, not who hauls the farthest, who has the most horses or money, but who, in the two and one-half minutes before the judge, can get a clean cut, a smooth appealing run and score the highest.

Today, cutting has emerged as the fourth most lucrative sport in terms of monies offered ... behind PGA golf, men's international tennis, and cutting's sister sport, rodeo; with record purses topping the \$2 million mark, and close to \$19 million awarded annually.

The parent association, The Na-

tional Cutting Horse Association (NCHA) based in Fort Worth, Texas, has 15,000 members in 50 states and 13 foreign countries, and sanctions 1,500 competitions a year.

In New Mexico, the NCHA affiliate is the Greater New Mexico Cutting Horse Association, itself having 300 members in 10 states. Last year the GNMCHA sponsored 22 cuttings within the state, with an average of 100 entries per day, and an average purse per day of \$10,000. The finale of the cutting year in New Mexico is the GNMCHA Futurity, limited age and non-pro events, held at Farmington's McGee park the last week in Sept. The purse at the

1990 Futurity totaled \$71,699 with 173 entries.

The NCHA Futurity, held in Fort Worth in December offers a purse of \$1.5 million, nearly double that of the Kentucky Derby.





# AQHA lists show rules

Due to the overwhelming input from AQHA members, the AQHA Executive Committee has contacted all AQHA judges regarding the appearance of some horses being shown in the western pleasure class at AQHA-approved shows. The letter reiterates several faults and disqualifications included in Rule 455 of the 1991 Official Handbook of the American Quarter Horse Association.

All judges have been instructed to penalize the following faults as severely as a horse on the wrong lead, bolting or bucking.

- Horses which carry their heads such that the point of the ear is lower than the wither.

- Horses that are flexed behind the vertical. (The above two rules are the extremes. Ideally, a horse should carry his head no lower than level, and his nose should be in front of the vertical.)

- Horses which are excessively slow (any gait).

- If light contact with reasonably loose rein is not maintained.

- Horses that appear sullen, dull, lethargic, emaciated, drawn or overly tired.

Regardless of how the horse moves, if it commits one of the above mentioned faults it is not to be placed any higher than a horse on the incorrect lead or one that is bolting or bucking.

# Jacks Dash takes win in Los Alamitos race

Alvin Ely's Jacks Dash captured his sixth consecutive victory when he won the Jan. 18 Corona Del Mar Handicap at Los Alamitos.

The gelding's win streak began last November, when he won the Quarter Horse Breeders Classics Freshman Classic G3, and he later won the Ed Burke Memorial Futurity G1 and the Golden State Futurity G1. After compiling a 1990 race record of seven wins from 13 starts and earnings of \$293,228, Jacks Dash finished second to Refrigerator in the voting for the Champion

Two-Year-Old Gelding honors. Making his 1991 debut in the Corona Del Mar, Jacks Dash carried top weight of 124 pounds and defeated My Escalon by a neck. Miss Strikin Jet finished third, followed by Tolls Touch, Make It Known, Tolcat, Reeds Signature, Send Me Satin and The Louisiana Girl. Ridden by Henry Garcia, Jacks Dash ran the 400 yards in :19.76 and earned \$16,050 for the victory. Jacks Dash, a son of Dash For Cash out of the Mr. Kid Charge mare Kid's Rib, is trained by Rodney Hart, who claimed the gelding for \$12,500 in July of 1990.

### Statement of Position

The American Quarter Horse Association's mission is to record and preserve pedigrees of American Quarter Horses, while maintaining the integrity of the breed. Further, it encourages American Quarter Horse ownership and participation. AQHA actively protects the American Quarter Horse by establishing and strictly enforcing rules which govern AQHA-approved event in order to reflect the natural ability of the

animal. To that end, AQHA is committed to the following beliefs:

- Every American Quarter Horse shall, at all times, be treated humanely and with dignity, respect and compassion.

- Stringent rules established and enforced by AQHA demand that American Quarter Horse breeders, owners, trainees, and exhibitors are continually responsible for the well being and humane treatment of any American Quarter Horse entrusted to their care.

- AQHA makes every effort to ensure that all breeders, owners, trainees and exhibitors are fully aware of rules regarding drugs and humane treatment of the American Quarter Horse, while allowing the horse to perform within its capacity.

- Above all, the American Quarter Horse's welfare is paramount to other considerations and the continual development of procedures which ensure humane treatment of the breed and fair competition supersedes all other concerns.



### Appaloosa museum plan OK'd

Plans for a 3,000 square-foot addition to the Appaloosa Horse Club Museum were approved recently. With the Museum Board of Directors' Dec. 4 meeting, the Appaloosa Museum became the Appaloosa Museum and Heritage Center Foundation.

The expansion project was first considered in July 1988. The Board of Directors allocated \$25,000 to begin start-up phases of the new museum complex. Architectural blueprints and renderings were completed, and a model of the addition is now on display in the current Appaloosa Museum. The model and a small traveling exhibit will be on display in March at the APHC's Expo '91 in San Diego.

Approximately \$350,000 will be raised through private contributions for the construction of the expansion, with groundbreaking ceremonies scheduled for the spring of 1993. The Museum and Heritage Center Committee, chaired by Lew Eklund, will work on financial support for this project.

The museum addition will be located on

the west end of the APHC headquarters building. It will feature exhibits tracing the Appaloosa's origins presenting its current status as one of today's most popular horse breeds. Visitors with little prior knowledge of the Appaloosa, as well as those who are seasoned riders and owners, will find the displays of the Appaloosa's history and development fascinating.

A gift shop, auditorium and storage area for artifacts will adjoin the museum. Also included will be a library and archives, where books, photographs, periodicals and other documents will be maintained for use by persons wishing to research the Appaloosa in greater detail. A western art gallery depicting the Appaloosa by historical and contemporary artists will complete the project.

An exciting part of the expansion project will be the construction of a stable paddock and viewing area where visitors will experience the color and disposition of Appaloosas first hand.

### Quarter horse standards

**Stance** - The American Quarter Horse normally stands at ease with his legs well under him which explains his ability to move quickly in any direction.

**Action** - The American Quarter Horse is collected in action enabling him to turn or stop with noticeable ease and balance, with his hocks always well under him.

**Head** - The head of an American Quarter Horse reflects alert intelligence. He has a short, broad head topped by small ears; kind wide-set eyes; large nostrils; short muzzle; and firm mouth. Well defined jaws give off an impression of strength.

**Neck** - The head of the American Quarter Horse joins the neck at a near 45-degree angle, with a distinct space between jawbone and neck muscles allowing him to work with his head down without restricting his breathing. The medium length, slightly arched, full neck blends into sloping shoulders.

**Shoulders** - The American Quarter Horse's good saddle back is created by medium-high distinct withers, extending back and combining with deep sloping shoulders. This helps keep a saddle in the proper position for balanced riding.

**Chest and Forelegs** - As shown by his heart girth and wide-set forelegs, the American Quarter Horse is deep and broad chested. His smooth joints and short cannon bones are set on clean fetlocks, and medium length, pasterns are supported by healthy hooves. The powerfully muscled forearm tapers to the knee, whether viewed from the front or back.

**Back** - The short back of the American Quarter Horse is full and powerful across the kidneys. The barrel is formed by deep, well-sprung ribs which extend to the hip joints. The underline, or abdominal area, should rise cleanly to the flank.

**Hindquarters** - Viewed from either side or the rear, the hindquarters are broad, deep and muscled fully through the thigh, stifle and gaskin down to the hock. The thickly muscled hind leg indicates the American Quarter Horse's great power and speed. When viewed from the rear, there is great width extending evenly from the top of the thigh to the gaskin. The hocks are wide set, deep and straight.

**Bones, legs and hooves** - The flat, strong bones are free from fleshiness, puff and injuries. The hooves are well-rounded and roomy, with deep open heels.

"America's Horse," AQHA's monthly one-hour television program, is scheduled to air Sunday, March 24, at 1 p.m. eastern, on the cable sports network ESPN.

Highlights will include the NCHA Championship from Fort Worth, Texas; Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Quarter Horse Show; 1991 AQHA Convention, including the induction of four individuals and four horses into the American Quarter

Horse Hall of Fame, from Hilton Head, South Carolina; and Quarterama, the second largest horse show in North America, from Toronto, Ontario, Canada.

Regular features will include "Taking the Reins," as well as racing highlights from around the country.

The show is scheduled to repeat Thursday, March 28, at 9 a.m.
