Center inches forward

The Ruidoso Civic Events Center inched its way forward in a special Ruidoso Village Council meeting with architects Nolan, Garland and Hilles.

The architects used the four-hour session to explain the design development of the floor plan, roof plan, building elevations, building sections, reflected ceiling plan, foundation plan, roof framing plan.

They are due to present their construction documents on June 4.

The construction schedule for the center includes advertisement for bids on June 11; receive and open bid proposals on July 2; start construction on July 23 and complete construction on February 19, 1992.

An increase of architectural fees was presented totaling \$15,420. The architects presented a document listing the various additional structural design for support from roof members; ceilings; construction

administration; mechanical systems; make-up air and exhaust design; lighting and power due to increased spaces; power due to increased mechanical systems; construction administration and insurance.

"We also request payment of the one percent late payment interest on our first invoice," Nolan wrote, and then pointed out additional alternates would cause additional costs.

Councilor Al Junge, after the meeting, said that the council had relied on counsel of Nolan and also of Lamb, R.D. Hubbard's architect.

Junge told Nolan that his people were professionals. He said the village had been talking with two sets of architects and should have received proper guidance from them. He said he would have liked for them to have a firmer command of construction and costs.

"I did not feel that the changes

made of the village's plan for the civic center were directly the responsibility of the council because changes had to be made for the benefit of the hotel," Junge said after the meeting.

"There was an agreement between the hotel's architect and our architect. We followed their lead. Now we find they want an additional \$15,000 architectural fees for a long list of things that they've done," Junge said.

"Hubbard may owe part of it, but as far as Ruidoso is concerned, I don't think we owe any of it."

Mayor Pro-Tem Barbara Duff asked the village lawyer David Thomsen to write a letter to Hubbard explaining the extra costs and asking him to pay all or a portion.

"The thing that worries me," Junge said. "We left the idea open that if Mr. Hubbard didn't pay it, that we thought we would have to pay it. That's where I disagree."

Cleanup continues in Ruidoso Downs

Ruidoso Downs Mayor LaVonne "Bonny" Addy is calling on the people of her community to pitch in and clean up the town during the annual spring cleanup that has been extended through April 26.

"Once again it is spring time," says Addy in a written invitation. "The Village of Ruidoso Downs is extending its clean-up time to cover from April 15 to April 26."

"I would like to request all of our citizens extend that 'extra' effort to pick up and clean up our community," invites Addy.

"The Village of Ruidoso Downs is the entrance to this mountain resort and we should

make every effort to create that first 'good' impression to visitors and make them welcome and want to return to our community or even move here," she continues.

"Within the next 60 days, Ruidoso Downs will have a new Senior Citizens Center, a clean and partly renovated park, and municipal offices in a clean and larger building."

"This is a great opportunity for the Village of Ruidoso Downs to show just how much pride and effort the citizens are willing to put together to improve their community."

"Be a good neighbor — let's all work together."

Mayor asks for help

The Village of Ruidoso Downs is in the midst of a strong spring clean-up campaign.

Mayor Bonnie Addy at the last trustees meeting urged citizens to spruce up their yards and get rid of "raw trash."

She said such a clean-up doesn't involve expense for residents, just the expenditure of a little energy and time.

Village sanitation crews will pick up bagged leaves, clippings and pine cones if residents will deposit them near their polycarts.

Small burnable items may be

left near the polycarts, also.

Heavy items such as discarded appliances and such should be delivered by residents to the north side of All American Park. Signs point the way.

Large burnable items also should be delivered to the north side of the park, according to village hall.

Trustees approved a clean-up campaign to last from April 15 to 26.

Mayor Addy urged residents to take pride in the appearance of their village.

Pipe directs oil to Rio Ruidoso

For years and years, oil spilled out of an eight-inch pipe just outside the chain link fence of the Ruidoso Street Department's maintenance yard.

If that wasn't illegal enough, the oil was aimed toward the Ruidoso River, a hundred feet away.

Ron Wicker, new village manager, said it was from floor drains located in the maintenance barn.

Wicker said he did not observe that the oil had traveled a great distance, in the neighborhood of 50 feet.

"What I'm going to do," Wicker said. "As soon as Charlie Armstrong gets back, we're going to clean the area up and try to put in a grease trap."

The oil dumping was discovered by accident.

Bob Arnold of Safety Counseling Inc. out of Albuquerque, is hired by the village to survey vehicles.

While on a routine survey in the barn, Arnold became curious about the three traps on the floor that collected water, oil, sawdust and any other liquids dealing with garage maintenance.

Arnold wanted to know where

the traps drained. The pipe path led him to the back of the barn, under the fence and to the 8-inch pipe protruding two feet out of an embankment on a very steep slope that led to the Rio Ruidoso.

No report has been turned into the village.

One of the older employees at the barn said he had been working there for 14 years and it was there when he got there.

Frank Potter past assistant manager and manager for the village expressed surprise at the revelation and said he was unaware of any such pipe that existed.

Street supervisor Charlie Armstrong was in Albuquerque and unavailable for comment. Armstrong has been with the village 10 years.


Workers indicated that the cleaning practice had become so routine over a number of years that no one was aware of even the possibility of a violation.

No one knew for sure how many years the pipe had been there nor what the regulations might have been at the time the pipe was installed.

"We are now aware of the problem and we want to correct in compliance with current regulations," Wicker said.

With only mild opposition from a few spectators, the Lincoln County Commission Tuesday approved an ordinance that will expand the board from three to five members.

The passage, coupled with the a redistricting plan for voting precincts due for review next month, will pave the way for the election of two more commissioners in 1992. It also will expand the terms of elected county officials from two to four years.

Four people spoke in favor of enlarging the board and two opposed the move.

Bill Hays from Ramon in the far northeast corner of the county urged a change to five members.

"It may be a small county in population, but not in geography," he said. "Those in the northeast are not represented by a three-member commission and never have been," Hays said. "Under a five-member board, we'd at least have one member from somewhere near our area."

"Drive to Ramon and you'll know it's a long way. I live on Roadrunner Range and to my knowledge no commissioners have ever set foot there."

Hays said that in selecting commissioners under the existing sys-

tem, his area is outvoted by the more densely populated communities in the southern portion of the county.

Instead of commissioners being elected at large, he would like each district to elect its own commissioner, the system that will be used with a five-member board.

"I don't care how much taxes you pay, without votes, you have no power," Hays said.

Yvonne Lanelli from Alto told the commissioners while she was sympathetic with the burden of having to run for office every two years, she feared that electing commissioners by district would lead to

parochial thinking on the board.

"Now, although Commissioner (Monroy) Montes is my district representative, he's a long distance away and I call (Commissioner) Bill Elliott, who is closer," she said. "Each of us wants to vote for all of you. I feel you should represent all of us."

She added that under a four-year term, commissioners could become less answerable to their constituents.

Orlando Montes of Glencoe criticized the commission for conducting two public hearings on the issue during the day when many working

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County votes to expand board to five

County Solid Waste group vows to hold the line on garbage fees

The goal of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority should be to keep monthly garbage collection fees from skyrocketing once it takes over the system, members agreed Monday.

But they acknowledged that may mean the authority will have to postpone owning and operating its own landfill.

"We have to do what is best for the county," said County Commissioner Chairman Stirling Spencer. The county is one of six members of the authority. The others are the villages of Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Corona, Capitan and Carrizozo.

"If we have some population growth and reach 14,000, then it may pay to get total involvement," Spencer said. "It would give us control over our own destiny. To get in on the front end helps down the road historically."

Until that time, it may be better for the authority to join with the private sector to provide collection service in some portions of the county and to utilize existing landfills elsewhere, he said.

Another way to bypass some of the heavy costs would be to create a landfill in conjunction with another county, Authority Chairman Victor Alonso said. Alonso also is chairman of the Ruidoso Village Council.

He had prepared a chart using Ruidoso's costs for operating its collection system as a base for figuring what it would cost the authority once it accepts countywide responsibility.

The village anticipates bringing in \$626,420 in revenues and spending about \$448,359 to operate its collection system this year. Another \$125,000 has been set aside for

depreciation of equipment.

The village serves 6,500 customers. To break even while including the depreciation, the council would have to charge \$5.20. However, it charges residential customers \$6 and commercial customers up to \$9 a month, earning an annual profit of about \$170,000.

The picture doesn't look as rosy for the authority, Alonso said. But he emphasized, his figures are only speculation.

"When I get off from known data, I'm uneasy because there is no way to get from the known to estimates," Alonso said. "I call these figures scientific wild ass guesses, but it's better than starting from scratch."

He based his figures on the authority's ability to issue revenue bonds of about \$1.2-million.

Authority attorney J. Robert Beauvais cautioned members that bond underwriters may consider that amount too high to be repaid by the authority through its annual environmental gross receipts tax, which generates about \$125,000 a year. The figure may have to be scaled down to \$1.1-million. The money is to be used for purchase of equipment and for other capital outlay.

Alonso's chart also assumes that the authority will buy its own landfill in 1992.

But that's where the picture gets darker. In a worst case scenario, he projected a loss of up to \$275,000 in 1993 and rates that could soar as high as \$12 a month.

It's not a question of whether the authority could afford to operate a landfill, said Authority Vice President Frank Warth, who also is chairman of the Capitan Board of

Trustees.

"We can afford anything we can pass on to our customers," Warth said. "But it scares me that the charges may not be reasonable with only 12,000 people in the county. People who have given a lot more thought than we say that it takes a population of 100,000 before an area should buy its own landfill."

James Edwards of the local office of the State Environment Department, said people across the state are getting by with paying too little for collection and disposal of garbage.

"The problem is that anywhere in New Mexico, people have been paying substantially below the cost of running a good operation," he said.

"I hear what you're saying," Alonso said. "But political reality is that we have to have rates with some semblance of what's in place today."

Putting the option of a landfill aside, Warth said the rates should go down once the authority takes over collection, because of economies of scale. The more people served, the more savings, he said. And the authority only wants to break even, not make a profit, Warth emphasized.

"I'm not convinced of it," Alonso said. "The economies of scale are not obvious to me."

Rates may vary depending on where a customer lives in the county, Alonso said. The rate may be lower in Ruidoso because it has highest density and service may be more expensive in outlying, sparsely settled areas.

Newly hired Solid Waste Manager Gene Green was directed to put together a more exact projected budget for the authority within the next month. It should delineate the

different rate categories, members said.

With an unsure future ahead for the authority, member Al Junge, a Ruidoso councilor, questioned whether the board should move ahead with the sale of the environmental gross receipts tax revenue bonds.

But Alonso said even if the entire project "blew up," the authority would have the money generated by the bonds in the bank. It would draw interest and could be used to repay the bonds if necessary, he said.

"Even after we sell, we are still not committed to going through with it," Alonso said.

In a related matter, authority members selected Eppler, Guerin and Turner Inc. of Albuquerque as their first choice for underwriters on the anticipated \$1.2-million environmental gross receipts tax bond issue.

Three companies submitted bids for the work. Eppler was recommended by Warth and Spencer based on ranking criteria that was part of the advertisement for bids.

Eppler had previous experience with a similar bond issue in Dona Ana County last year. The firm estimated total expenses as \$39,650, including their fee of \$18,400.

The other companies submitting bids were Zahner and Co. of Albuquerque with expenses of \$35,250 and Hanifen Imhoff Inc., also in Albuquerque, which estimated expenses at \$57,650.

A representative from Eppler will attend the next authority meeting at 9 a.m. May 9 in the new administration office of Ruidoso Downs.

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people cannot attend. He suggested a weekend hearing.

Genevieve Sewell of Ruidoso pressed for passage of the ordinance, saying more members would provide more alternatives to problems facing the board.

County Attorney J. Robert Beauvais pointed out that the ability for Lincoln County to enlarge its board was based on a constitutional amendment approved by the majority of voters in the state.

Previously, a county had to at-

tain a certain population or taxable valuation that would have excluded Lincoln County.

For the ordinance to pass locally, all three commissioners had to cast an affirmative vote and they did, but not before offering their reasons.

Elliott said the vote was difficult and that he had friends on both sides of the issue.

"I agonized over this for weeks, the pluses and minuses," he said. "But a four-year term is important. As it is, you are no more than elected and you're out campaigning

for the next term."

Montes said he felt he was following the wishes of the majority of residents within his district.

Commissioner Chairman Stirling Spencer, who offered the motion for approval, said, "I polled my district as much as I could and the consensus is that the economics would be more than offset by the benefits."

He was referring to the commission salaries and other expenses connected to enlarging the board. Commissioners are paid \$10,003

annually, but it was pointed out previously that existing board members could agree to a salary cut to keep that cost down. The state only sets a maximum salary figure.

The ordinance takes effect in 30 days. Within that time period, Beauvais said the commissioners should approve a plan setting up five commission districts instead of three based on population.

County Clerk Martha Proctor said she will prepare several alternate plans for the new district alignment at the next commission meeting.

Public hearing set on 48

A public hearing on the proposed widening of Mechem Drive (State Highway 48) from Sudberth Drive to White Mountain Drive is scheduled for Wednesday, April 24, in the cafeteria of White Mountain Elementary School.

The project has sparked the concern of some business property owners along the route. They say they may lose land as well as potential business if the road is transformed into a super highway.

Police called to bizarre events

Two bizarre incidents last week found their way to the Ruidoso police blotters. A young Ruidoso Middle School student in a girls physical education class was shot in the hand by a pellet gun while jogging on the streets adjacent to the middle school last Friday. The Ruidoso police logs indicate the shooting took place around 1:34 p.m. near Service Road and Reese Drive. Two male juveniles, playing hooky, were arrested across the

The meeting was conducted two days early because Miller was leaving today for a two-week visit to her native country, Scotland, where her mother lives. Miller reported that for the year ending April 1, the hospital was \$243,986 in the black, "or a \$677,427 turn around from the \$433,441 loss last year." A financial report shows the

Carrizozo Health Center lost \$3,811 for March and a year-end loss of \$34,717 despite \$158,042 in mill levy funding. The ambulance company shows a loss of \$4,909 for the month of March, and nine months year-to-date figures show \$16,929 or \$60,938 ahead of budget. LCMC lost some \$2,730 for the month of February. At the trustees meeting, trustees heard that five high school students in the county have applied for a LCMC scholarship.

During Hospital Week, starting May 13, the Medical Center will stage an open house for the public from 2 to 4 p.m. May 15. During the meeting, the new director of nursing, Jule Duffalo was introduced. She is serving as acting administrator in Miller's absence. "It was a pretty routine meeting," Miller said. Trustees went into executive session to discuss the quality management annual assessment and report.

County lines out utility firms

The battle lines were drawn Tuesday between utility operators and the Lincoln County Commission, but no shots were fired. In less than an hour and with attempts at intimidation kept to a minimum on both sides, representatives from Zia Natural Gas and the commissioners worked out a tentative agreement on a new utility franchise. The agreement will include a fee for the utility's use of county right of way.

County attorney J. Robert Beauvais is to come back at the next commission meeting with a draft of the franchise ordinance containing some wording changes and with other sections deleted. In return for the commission extending the length of the franchise from five years to 25 years, Zia president David Hamilton said the for-profit company would agree to periodic renegotiation of the franchise fee.

"We want to protect our investment so we are looking for a longer period of time," explained Thomas Olson from Santa Fe, the attorney representing Zia. The company wants a 25-year term because it is hard with the uncertainty of a short-term franchise to arrange long-term financing, he said. Olson said Zia objected to a two percent fee based on a percentage of the company's gross sales as proposed by the county. But he said the company would agree to a flat fee tied to the actual cost of supervising the use of right-of-way. "I believe it has to be justified by the actual costs, not a tax-type fee,"

Olson said. The company will just pass the cost through to its customers, he said. Hamilton suggested an annual fee plus a licensing charge for any new construction, "like if we wanted to extend a pipeline say the distance of four miles, you would determine a reasonable fee for a mile and that would go on top of an annual fee," he said. Beauvais and company officials are to meet with county manager Nick Pappas to settle on exact figures.

The arrangement appears to clear the way for commissioners to approve a franchise fee ordinance that would set the parameters for all upcoming right of way agreements. A public hearing on that ordinance also was scheduled for the commission meeting in early May. Commissioners postponed action until the next meeting on a franchise for Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas, a publicly-owned, not-for-profit company. Both Zia and the Capitan company were granted 45-day extensions on their existing franchises that expire in May. Commissioner agreed to delete or modify sections in the Zia franchise that duplicate jurisdiction of the State Public Service Commission.

The county also eliminated a portion that appeared to Zia officials to mandate that they sell their utility lines within one year if the company violated the franchise and failed to make corrections within a specified period of time. Beauvais said his intention was to give the utility one year to arrange another right of way. "We

recognize that we couldn't stop them from operating, we could just stop them from using our right of way after one year," he said. After discussion, both sides agreed that realistically, county right of way would be needed in any utility operation. They acknowledged that an attempt to exclude Zia from that right of way would result in litigation. But the county hung onto a stipulated time period for correction. "It's in everybody's interest to reach a stipulation short of court," Beauvais said. "If we don't, everyone loses except Mr. Olson and me. But if we can't work it out in 180 days, we might as well go to court. If we don't tag a time period, it (corrections) could go on forever."

In other business, the commission: —Approved a resolution in favor of a senate bill that would increase the amount of payments in lieu of taxes for federal land in New Mexico. The bill proposes an index for inflation that could double the amount of money received locally, about \$370,000 a year. The rate has not been adjusted since 1976. —Approved an ordinance setting the fees for liquor licenses in the county based on existing rates. —Rescinded a \$20,000 budget increase for the Sheriff's Department for food at the county jail. The county finance officer determined that the department could merely transfer the money from another portion of its budget since there is \$60,000 left.

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Capitan

Budget belt is tightened

The Capitan school district is going to have to tighten its belt in the 1991-92 school year because of a decrease in the per student reimbursement by the state.

"Next year, the amount will drop to \$1,866 (per student unit) and it's going to be tough," Supt. Scott Childress told the school board last Thursday. "We will have some serious budget decisions to make."

The news is a little brighter for this year, he said. A few months ago, the state indicated that it planned to reduce the reimbursement to counties that ended up with higher enrollments than initially projected.

The counties had planned on \$1,883 per unit and the state proposed to pay only \$1,869. That translated to a \$14,000 loss for Capitan.

But the state was the beneficiary of a timely windfall and things changed.

Childress said the state usually

receives money in lieu of property taxes for government-owned land in May and the money is funneled into the next fiscal year's budget.

But this year, about \$8-million arrived in April and was added to the distribution to the counties with higher enrollments than anticipated. That boosted the per unit reimbursement back to \$1,883, Childress said.

The higher figure should cover line items in the budget that now show red instead of black, he said.

In another financial issue, Childress said the board may be asked to help out the junior class with the cost of the junior-senior prom.

"Just as it negatively affected our athletic fund, the decline in gate (at sporting events) meant that the juniors didn't earn as much from their concession stand as they have in the past," he said. "They may need some help."

In other business:

—the board approved a policy spelling out the procedures for students caught with drugs or alcohol


on campus and for employees who may have problems that interfere with their job performance.

Childress said the state considers Capitan's policy an excellent

model for other counties to follow. It requires due process for a determination of probable violation, conferences with the student and parent/guardian, the signing of a contract by the student and parent/guardian and provides for long term suspension and expulsion.

—Recognized the efforts of Troy and Rudy Padilla to raise money to pay summer basketball camp tuition for members of the Capitan boys and girls teams. They raised \$700 as a result of a recent basketball tournament and are involved in a similar promotion of a volleyball tournament this weekend.

—Expressed appreciation to part-time coach Terry Cox for donating his pay increment to the basketball camp tuition.

Teacher may protest firing

Ignoring the recommendations of its school superintendent and high school principal, the Capitan School Board last Thursday unanimously voted not to reemploy teacher James Fowler for the 1991-92 school year.

The decision followed a one-hour personnel session that was closed to the public.

Fowler told *The Ruidoso News* Friday he was surprised by the move and that he feels "small town politics" and disappointment in the football team that he coached may be involved.

Specific problems areas in his teaching performance have not been cited, he said. "So I'm rather confused and surprised."

Fowler said he intends to contact a lawyer and may request a hearing on the board's decision not to employ him next school year. Meanwhile, he said he won't let the decision get him down.

"I feel like I'm a good teacher," he said. "And I hope to find a job nearby."

He's disappointed that board members did not speak to him personally if they had problems with his teaching, Fowler said.

"I would think they should come to you and tell you why (before a person is fired)," he said. "I was recommended for reemployment by (Supt. Scott Childress) and principal Bill Stowe. None of the school board members came to me and indicated they weren't going to support me."

"This is the first time I have ever been fired" and it really hurts my feelings," said Fowler, who has 31 years of teaching experience, three in Capitan. The other years primarily were spent in two Texas school districts.

Board member Tom Trost said the decision was a difficult one for him.

"Jim is a good man, but you have to separate your feelings from what you think is best for the school," Trost said.

Board President Preston Stone,

said he it would have been inappropriate for any board member to contact Fowler about his job being in jeopardy.

"That would be totally out of procedure," Stone said. "He's recommended for hiring by the administration, which works directly with the faculty and should have done any informing (about job problems). When a board member starts calling in reference to a teacher's job, he's opening himself up to lawsuits."

Childress said in view of the possible protest by Fowler, it would be inappropriate for him to comment.

However, a review of the only performance evaluation in Fowler's file shows that he was given the second from top rating in December 1990. Fowler said he has never been called in by his principal or Childress to discuss his teaching technique.

But Fowler on his own asked for a critique of his utilization of a specific teaching approach after a seminar by Dr. Iles Lee Hannel in February.

"I asked him to evaluate some video tapes I made for myself using (Hannel's approach)," Fowler said.

In a letter to Childress regarding that evaluation, Hannel referred to Fowler as an adequate teacher and as an average teacher with the potential to improve. But Fowler pointed out that letter was in reference only to one particular teaching concept and was solicited by him.

Fowler said the real problem may have been the poor performance of the football team last season under his coaching.

"They needed a coach and I took football when they asked," he said. "We didn't win many games and I suppose that made some board members mad."

"I resigned as coach, but I thought I had a teaching job. I feel academics comes before athletics. I expected to teach a few more years."

But Stone told *The News*, "I don't feel any decision made by the board was based on athletics or

coaching. When a school our size hires a teacher/coach combination, it's the quality of the teacher we look at foremost."

Fowler, who teaches seventh grade mathematics and science and eighth grade science and algebra, said he recently was selected to participate in the program called Teachers Opportunity to Promote Science. He was in Albuquerque being briefed on the program when the board voted not to rehire him.

"I push my students and I guess that may have made some parents angry," he said. "At the very first parent-teacher conference, one man was so angry he said he was going to get rid of me. In a small town, I guess you have this kind of politics."

Fowler said he is disturbed that the board failed to follow the recommendation of its administrators.

He noted that during an appearance in front of the Capitan Classroom Teachers Association before board elections in February, three of the men now on the board (Kenneth Cox, Jack King and Trost) said they would support personnel decisions by the superintendent.

He added that the board last year also was criticized by the state for interfering in the administration of the system instead of sticking to policy-making and budget-setting.

After Fowler receives official notification of his termination, he has five days to file for a hearing before the school board and/or to ask for the reasons the board voted not to rehire him.

If he still is not satisfied, Fowler can appeal to an independent arbitrator, whose decision would be binding.

Fowler said he has not yet received notice in writing. Childress said that state law requires the termination notices to be in hand at least two weeks before the end of the school year or an employee automatically is rehired.

Baseball grabs bat on school field

A baseball diamond is scheduled to be created out of an abandoned football field in the Capitan school complex.

The School Board last Thursday approved a recommendation from Supt. Scott Childress to prepare a diamond that could be used this summer.

"I think the time has come when we need a recreation program for kids in the summer. There's not much here for them now," Childress told board members. "We have no money to spend, but Terry Cox is willing to take the blade out there and do the work."

Once the field is available, board member Kenneth Cox said he believes local groups would spring up to form a league or to start a school program for boys and girls. "But at this point, we're just fixing a field for people to use," board member Tom Trost emphasized.

Randall Robbins said about 26 local children participate in the

Ruidoso Little League. They practice and play on a field at Fort Stanton Hospital and Training Center.

"But after they're 13, they can't play in that league," he said. "All we're looking for is the school to provide a place to play."

Childress said the district's blanket insurance policy should cover any activities on the field, just as it would in the school gymnasium.

In another matter, high school principal Bill Stowe said his students placed ninth in the state out of 88 districts in the ranking for ACT (college entrance) test scores in 1989-90. The scores for 1990-91 are not yet available, he said.

The board postponed action on appointment of a boys basketball coach. Ventura had been listed, but members said they felt responsible for three sports would be too demanding.

—Accepted the recommendation of principal Jerry Newsom for reemployment at the elementary school of Dottie MacVeigh, Linda Turnbow, Rebecca Ferguson, Mary Shanks, Laura Jones, Bobbe Fowler, Joanne Washburn, Kit Hall, Amy Riddle, Idy Schweitzer, Mary McIlwain, Ruby Johnson, Mecca Aldridge, Mary Lee Daniel and Tommie Neal.

CofC officers vote to retain exec., oust board member

Mighty strides were taken Monday evening to get the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce (CofC) "back on track." Dissension recently has wracked the organization.

Jerry Watts, chamber executive director, has been under fire from a segment of the chamber hierarchy. Craig Rawlings, chairman of the CofC advertising committee, has been a subject of controversy since he made a public attack on Watts at a recent village council meeting.

Executive committee members took action Monday to address those two areas of concern.

After much debate about Watts' job performance, the executive committee will recommend that the CofC board of directors vote at a regular meeting, April 24, on whether to retain or terminate Watts.

The executive committee members voted to recommend to the full board that Watts be retained in his position.

Members also voted to recommend to the full board that Rawlings be asked to resign from the board of directors and as chairman of the advertising committee.

Executive committee members voted to recommend so that the full board of directors can be involved in deciding the issues.

Director Paul Crown, who is vice president of advertising and promotion, moved that Rawlings be removed as chairman of the advertising committee and that Joan Bailey be named chairman.

President-elect Tony Wilcoxson said that Bailey hasn't been very active in the chamber since 1986, that he would rather see someone named chairperson who has worked hard on the committee if Rawlings is asked to step aside.

Rawlings, who was present at the executive committee meeting, was chastised by several members for using an "inappropriate forum" to request Watts' resignation as ex-

ecutive director.

The pitch was made by Rawlings at a village council meeting where marketing of the pending civic events center was being discussed.

The chamber is one entity being considered as the marketing agent.

Member Don Dutton said that the President's Club of the chamber had called for Rawlings' resignation from the board of directors.

"I feel Craig has done a fine job. I am opposed to asking him to resign from the board," Dutton said.

Dutton also said that since Mayor Victor Alonso had allowed Rawlings' remarks, "I felt it was a proper forum."

Greg Masters, on the other hand called Rawlings' remarks to the village council "terrifically inappropriate." He also said that Rawlings has worked hard as advertising committee chairman.

Masters, referring to recent "bad press" for the chamber, said "we can expect no less until the nine of us vote as a group."

"I believe we are to blame for what went on," Masters said. He said the advertising committee is "not happy with the situation as it exists. We have to get a grip on the way it is supposed to work."

Mike Seelbach said Rawlings has been frustrated with the executive committee over "decisions we should have made."

"No one could operate with the adversities he's had to face," Masters said of Watts.

Dutton asked if Watts can operate effectively in this (Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce) setting.

Dutton said he thinks Watts could function well in Dallas or Houston. He said he hasn't seen any improvement in performance here.

"He's not a promoter," Dutton said, citing Ruidoso as a "tourist community."

Masters cited Watts' assistance to him when Watts first came aboard in early 1990.

"Anyone has strengths and

weaknesses ... once he knows what is expected, then he can focus," Masters said.

Brenda Buckner cited Watts' hard work at the Art Festival last year and at the Octoberfest.

Dutton had said Watts is "not a special events person."

Ron Wall, chamber president, said he takes full responsibility for "the very unfortunate situation." He said he hadn't been able to "keep his finger on the pulse."

"I've tried to interpret what I heard and tried to keep on an even keel," he said.

"Not one of us needs to back off now," Masters declared.

"I do want to be fair," Wilcoxson said.

Watts told the board that to "paint me as having driven a wedge in the organization is a bit severe. I think a respectable job has been done. I am ready to get on with my pursuit one way or another."

"If the vote by the board is to terminate me, then so be it."

"If the vote is to retain me, I commit to you (Wilcoxson) my full support because it is in the best interests of the organization."

"If retained, I would like to sit down with fair people to discuss issues," Watts concluded.

At one point it was pointed out that Bill Hirschfeld, board member, had been working for Watts dismissed almost since Watts was hired.

Hirschfeld's wife, Sunny Hirschfeld, left the Chamber staff when Watts was named executive director.

Members of the executive committee agreed among themselves that they wouldn't lobby other board members between Monday and when the full board votes.

In other action, the executive committee named a "negotiating committee" to deal with the village on the proposal to market the civic events center.

Named were Watts, Wilcoxson, Crown and Buckner.





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Lodgers Tax Committee says yes, no, maybe to requests

Lodgers Tax Committee members, three of the five, agreed to recommend to the village council that the Blue Grass Festival be supported to the tune of \$2,100 from lodgers tax funds.

The reason for the \$2,100 is that \$2,100 is all that is in this fiscal year's lodgers tax kitty, although the end of the fiscal year may find more money in the pot depending on collections.

Jerry Perry, who requested \$5,000 for the festival, was assured

by LTC chairman Ed Hyman that possibly a budget resolution for more funding could be requested from the village.

LTC members Hyman, Rex Beatty and Slover Cape heard a number of requests for funding from representatives of several organizations. Member Mark Doth had to leave the meeting because of some emergency.

Tony Wilcoxson, incoming president of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, made the request for \$137,610 for support of the Convention and Visitors Bureau of the

Chamber of Commerce for next year.

That request was tabled, as were several requests until LTC members can review details of each.

Advertising bills were approved for payment from Apache Trails, Aspenfest, Oktoberfest and for the promotional sign at the "Y."

For next fiscal year, the All American Festival was approved for \$5,000 pending approval by the village council, Billy the Kid Outlaw Gang event, \$2,000; Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally, \$2,500, and Cowboy Symposium, \$5,000.

Tabled for study were a request from the Ruidoso Little Theatre, \$2,000; Lincoln County Heritage Trust, \$1,500 and the CVB request.

LTC voted to deny recommendations for funding the Retirement Services Division of the Chamber of Commerce and for the Ruidoso Valley Greeters' Christmas Jubilee.

It was pointed out that Retirement Services is in the chamber budget for more than \$13,000.

The Retirement Services Division requested \$23,600 for advertising Ruidoso as a retirement haven; the Christmas Jubilee request was

for \$1,500.

Paul Crown, vice president of the chamber advertising and promotion division, asked for funding to attend four more trade shows this fiscal year.

That request was tabled. Kathleen Michelena, CVB director, outlined to LTC members what trade shows would be covered.

The Blue Grass Festival is a part of the Springtime in the Rockies promotion designed to fill a time when little is happening to bring visitors to this mountain community.

Perry explained that Blue Grass Festival sponsor Rocky Mountain Music Enterprises will bring in one or more "headliners" for the two-day events set for June 15 and 16 at a campground above Bonito Lake.

Projected attendance is 2,000; the South Plains College at Levelland, Texas, which offers a degree in Blue Grass music, will be involved.

Perry said an admittance fee of \$20 for the two days will be charged.

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



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

The Plant Corner

Easter lilies can have second chance

DEAR SALLY:
Last year, about this time, you wrote a column on how to rebloom the Easter lily. I did keep the article but we have moved since and it is not to be found. Please do us a favor and tell us one more time how to rebloom the Easter lily. I won't promise to find it when I need it next year but I will memorize your instructions. Thanks for your help.

DEAR BETH:
Thanks for telling me you had moved. I thought I had lost you. It has been a while since I've heard from you and because you are a special plant lover I will do my best to help you. These lilies are my favorite. Remember what "Milton" said of the lily, the lily represents freedom. "None can love freedom heartily, but good men and women," so explains the actions of our troops fighting our master spoke of the lilies of the fields? Now let us all get out there and rebloom those Easter lilies.
Lilium formosanum, Easter lilies, are tender and virus prone. One reason to plant bulbs about 6" deep to allow for a healthy root and stem system.
Lilies have three basic requirements: a deep, loose, fast draining soil; constant moisture year-round because they never completely stop growing; shade and coolness at the roots, with sun at the tops where the flowers form.
Because lilies never go completely dormant, when the foliage turns yellow after

you have cut the spent flowers, withhold water a bit but do not let soil become bone dry. Wait for foliage to turn yellow before you cut them back as the bulbs are restoring necessary nutrients for the coming blooms. Should your containers become too small as the bulbs multiply, they can be divided at the time you cut them back.
Place one bulb about 6 inches deep in a 14-inch pot. Fill pot with 3 or 4 inches of plastic chunks for fast drainage, sprinkle sand over the plastic chunks before adding fresh potting soil over chunks and sand about 1/3 up in the pot, then place the bulb with the roots spread and pointing downward; cover the bulb only with about 1 inch of potting soil. Water thoroughly and place in a cool place away from frost, a north exposure would be fine. During the root forming period, keep the soil slightly moist. When the top growth appears, add more potting soil, gradually filling container as stems grow. Leave about 1 inch space below the pot rim for easy watering. Move the pots to

a partially shaded terrace, patio or deck during the blooming period. Lily bulbs have contractile roots that draw them down to proper depth, so if in doubt, plant more shallow rather than too deep.
Soil—Fast draining using regular potting soil and sharp sand. Before planting, carefully trim injured portions of bulbs and dust with an anti-fungus disinfectant.
Water—Maintain a moist condition, small, frequent waterings are best.
Light—Cool shade at the roots and sun, but not scalding for the tops. The tops must have sun to make flowers.
Temperature—Lilies thrive at 45 degrees to 90 degrees, but will tolerate a little wider range.
Fertilizer—Use a complete balanced formula and once-in-a-while add some bone meal. Follow label directions.
Pests—Virus or mosaic infection is a problem. No cure is known. Best to destroy pots and plants showing mottling in the leaves or stunted growth. Use an appropriate fungicide to control aphids, your nurseryman will be glad to help, these little fellers really spread the virus.
If you have the time and are completely determined to bloom Easter lilies, go for it, otherwise consider tossing the plant when the flowers fade and but new ones next year, just don't say I didn't try to help. Good Luck.




