## Chamber votes to keep director

The full board of directors of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce voted by secret ballot Wednesday to accept the recommendation of the executive committee that Jerry Watts remain as executive director of the chamber.

The vote came after a closed session of the board lasting about one hour when a discussion session was conducted by Ron Wall, chamber president.

At the same meeting, Craig Rawlings, board member and chairman of the advertising committee, resigned from those positions because of criticism of his actions at a recent village council meeting.

Rawlings had publicly asked for Watts resignation at the village council meeting and, at that time, said:

having, made "some valuable contributions and for hard work" on behalf of the chamber.

That feeling was expressed by several board members.

Board member Mary Noltensmeyer said she didn't think Rawlings should be asked to resign because of his work for the chamber.

Board member Clark Carpenter said he had several phone calls after Rawlings statements before the village council concerning Watts.

The callers, he said, expressed shock.

Ron Andrews, ex-officio member of the board and a member of the Ruidoso Village Council, said he can understand "Rawlings' ego because I have one to."

But, he said, he was offended by Rawlings remarks before the village council.

President Wall said he hopes the chamber can "go forward" now that the two issues have been resolved.

He appealed for future "in-house" consideration of problems which arise.

Joan Bailey said chamber board meetings are open to the public.

She said she doesn't feel that members and other residents of the village "feel comfortable" about coming to the chamber board with concerns.

"I would like to see that changed," she declared.

Bailey was named by President Wall and Paul Crown, vice president of advertising and promotion, to serve as chairman of the ad committee at least until July 1, when Tony Wilcoxson becomes president and when five new board members start their terms.

The results of a board election were announced early in the Wednesday meeting of the board.

Coming aboard or re-elected are Valerie Miller, Tom Rigsby, Frank Sayner, Joan Bailey and Jim Bassett.

Watts came aboard as executive director of the Chamber in December of 1989. He was director of member services for the El Paso Chamber of Commerce until he accepted the Ruidoso position.

## Citizens put brakes on Highway 48

Ruidoso residents overwhelming expressed their displeasure for a five-lane highway design that would allow 40-mile per hour plus traffic along Mechem Drive.

After a 40-minute presentation that ranged from describing the merits of a sidewalk to condemning property, the State Highway Department staff members could no longer delay meeting their public.

Critics of the highway design team complained that no alternatives were given to a lesser ambitious project that would offer a compromise, such as a four-lane highway. Engineer Allan Whitesel to fuel those fears.

"We analyzed statistics based on low growth projections and asked could we make a two-lane facility work," he said. "We could not. It's a level of service that causes congestion. When we found that didn't

work, we designed to the high projection."

Bill McCarty, local contractor, colorfully compared the project to "placing five pounds of manure into a three pound bag."

"Trying to build a 76-foot wide highway down a country village like this, is just a little bit of an overkill," McCarty said.

He said it would cause drainage problems as well as put people out of business.

"I think you should pay more attention to redesigning, possibly to four lanes," He said.

McCarty said the highway could be built for \$3-million instead of the proposed \$8-million at a savings to the taxpayer.

Ruidoso's past mayor Dan Swearingin questioned the integrity of the department's surveys.

"Where do you people get this

"If Mr. Watts does not resign or the directors of the chamber do not remove him, then I will resign because I refused to work with him because I don't want to stand in the way of progress and do not want to be a part of the problem."

Rawlings, during that public speech, compared Watts to the chief of the Los Angeles Police Department who has been heavily criticized nationally.

The executive committee of the chamber, April 15, after much discussion voted to vote at the full board meeting whether to retain or terminate Watts.

The committee also agreed to vote at the full board meeting whether to ask for Rawlings' resignation.

As it turned out, that vote was not necessary because Rawlings last evening kept to his resolve to resign if Watts was not terminated.

The board was preparing to vote on whether to ask for Rawlings' resignation when member Greg Masters asked Rawlings for comment and said that Rawlings had said he would resign if Watts was retained.

Rawlings was commended by board member Mickey McGuire for

## Taxable values up in Lincoln County

After two consecutive years of falling taxable property and livestock values, Lincoln County saw a slight upturn in 1991.

County Assessor Patricia Serna said Wednesday that taxable values were up \$1.6-million over last year, hitting a total value of \$243,851,703. The figures are preliminary until all protests are settled, some corporate values are established and construction projects accomplished without permits are tracked down, she said.

Out of 24,834 valuation notices sent by her office to the county's 25,163 property owners, only 12 protests have been filed.

"Last year, it was much higher because we had a mass re-evaluation," Serna said. "But this year, we could only change the valuation on homes and buildings with improvements and additions. The other major area of change was with dairy farms."

"A lot of ranchers complained be-

cause their values doubled or tripled based on a study by the State Livestock Board in Santa Fe on dairy farm values," she said.

The taxable value of dairy cattle went up, not the value of the land, she said. The taxable value of grazing land is \$1.65 per acre, the lowest value under land use categories.

From 1988-90, the county lost \$38-million in taxable value primarily because the market in Ruidoso was slow, Serna said. "We picked up a lot of new homes, but not enough to offset the down market," she said.

Of the total \$243.8-million taxable value for the county this year, \$63.7-million represents lots and acreage, \$149.3-million is houses and condominiums and \$6.3-million is mobile homes. Another \$22.8-million comes from railroad, utilities, telecommunication, pipelines, equipment and machinery. The taxable value of personal property is \$3-million and value of cattle is \$4.9-million.

Breaking down the figures for municipalities and surrounding areas, values for the Village of Ruidoso crept up from \$118.7-million in 1990 to \$120-million this year. The area around Carrizo dropped slightly from \$7,330,957 to \$7,193,914.

Values in Ruidoso Downs barely moved from \$12.3-million to \$12.4-million. It was about the same situation in the area from the Downs to Glencoe where values only inched up from \$10.8-million to \$10.9-million.

The village of Corona experienced a drop from \$877,063 in 1990 to \$860,167 in 1991. Taxable property values outside of the village also dipped from \$10.8-million to \$10.7-million.

Following the trend in outlying areas, the town of Carrizozo saw values decrease from \$4.4-million to \$4.2-million, although property outside of the town increased from \$7.49-million to \$7.6-million.

Taxable values in the village of

Capitan slid downward from \$4,791,632 in 1990 to \$4,734,792 in 1991, as did those in Hondo, from \$9,389,872 to \$9,275,122.

The taxable value of the area around Lincoln reflects more expensive land and development. In line with Ruidoso, it edged up from \$54.9-million in 1990 to \$55.8-million this year.

Serna said exemptions also hurt the county's taxable value.

"Exemptions for head of the household nearly doubled from \$1,356,422 last year to \$2,364,902 this year," she said. "Five years ago, the exemption was \$200, it was increased to \$800 four years ago, then to \$1,400 this year and will be \$2,000 in 1993."

That means many older mobile homes in some of the villages will not be taxed at all because they're valued at \$800. Serna said, "In another two years, a lot of people won't be paying any property taxes, the \$2,000 head-of-household exemption will cover it all."

Meanwhile the police radio tower will be relocated to the new location. Today and Friday the physical move is expected to take place.

Carpenters were partitioning off an area for the mayor's office. Owners were cleaning out the kitchen area of the spacious old night club, which will serve as a village hall.

The old municipal building has become uninhabitable as it stands because of structural and sanitation problems.

## Lincoln town shows off its historic homes

Five historic adobe homes in the settlement of Lincoln will be open over Mother's Day weekend for public tours in celebration of National Historic Preservation Week.

The first annual tour of Historic Homes in Lincoln is being sponsored by the Lincoln County Hospitality Group in the picturesque village once known as Las Placitas del Rio Bonito.

The tour on Saturday, May 11, will be from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. The hours on Sunday will be 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Tour tickets are \$3 a person, children under 12 are free if accompanied by an adult. Tickets may be purchased at the Gallegos House on tour days.

The tour will cover the home of Dr. Woods, the Sandoval House, Casa de Patron, the Old Ellis Store and the Gallegos House. A guide at each of the houses will explain the history of the building and the role it played in the history of Lincoln.

In addition, all of the village's museums will be open.

Food services will be available at the Wortley Hotel Dining Room and new Eatery. Overnight accommodations are offered at local Bed and Breakfasts and at the hotel.

The homes and many other buildings look much as they did during the Hispanic village's early days as the Lincoln county seat and the center of the notorious Lincoln County War that spawned the legend of Billy the Kid.

When the railroad pumped life


into town along other major routes, Lincoln was replaced as county seat by Carrizozo and started a slow, but gentle decline.

For years, only an unpaved road wound through the community. But

Lincoln's slide into oblivion was halted when people with an appreciation of history and of the beauty of the valley began moving into Lincoln. In 1972, the first Lincoln Historic Preservation or-

dinance was enacted.

bicycle stuff from," he said. "I don't know. I haven't heard one blessed word about that," Swearingin said.

Swearingin doubted the safety factor of the highway.

"You can kill people by just widening the road," he said.

Ray Bell, gasoline distributor, said he could name 10 projects that the Village of Ruidoso has been trying to get money for 20 years. He said he couldn't understand why the money couldn't be spent for things the people wanted instead of something not wanted.

"They're talking about 12 months," Bell said. "Multiply that by three years."

"And all the businesses along that route? You might as well close them up because they will all be broke, I assure you," he said.

"I don't know why you want to put a freeway through this town," he said. "I think you should slow traffic down instead of speeding it up. You should put some curves in."

"Look on the interstates. They're designed for 55 mph. They're going 90. And they're passing up every little town, because we had stations on them that are no longer there. They're closed."

Bell told the public that they better get their promises from the public because "the highway department's promises are not very good."

Stan Cape, owner of A-Frame Cabins, said past projections were made with inadequate samplings.

"On October 5, 1989, we had 75 people here at a highway meeting," Cape said. "There were only 10 people whose comments were taken into consideration."

Cape said he doesn't see how steep grades and five lanes in snowy conditions could be considered a safety improvement.

One person in the audience asked the average daily traffic count that could have justified a 5-lane highway.

Whitesel said the average daily traffic count in 1988 was 9,329 cars per day.

Gary Lynch, Realtor, said tourist areas don't need fast traffic lanes. Lynch said California's Napa Valley is still a two-lane road.

"Napa Valley has more traffic than we'll ever have," he said. "They won't let a four-lane come through there."

Lynch said Alto to Ruidoso in the busiest seasons would only take a driver three to five minutes longer.

Phil Davis, owner of Casa Blanca, said since 1984 the highway department has had two meetings. He said at both meetings there was negative input regarding the new road construction.

"It didn't seem to make any difference at all what we had to say," he said. Davis said the only two alternatives given the first meeting was a 35 mph and a 45 mph plan.

Davis said he had been told the highway construction was a political decision that he could do little about.

Lou Medrano, cabinet secretary of transportation, said he was accepting the constructive criticism to the proposals.

"Contrary to rumors, we are not here to cram the project down your throat," Medrano said. "If, in fact, the impact of this project is too great for the community we will have to back off," he said.

Medrano said the decision regarding Highway 48 would come shortly after the night's meeting.

John Colligan, representing the Links at Sierra Blanca golf course, said the amount of acreage in new impervious surface would impact the golf course and many people who currently have a drainage problem.

Mayor Victor Alonso said that Ruidoso has been down-sizing since 1986 and hasn't hit bottom yet. The mayor said it was difficult to think so positively given the current economic conditions.

He said he would hate to see the project drop and is in favor of compromise.

# New campsite opens on May 18

A series of three rustic pavilions patterned after a 1930 model are the centerpiece of a new group camping area being unveiled by the U.S. Forest Service in Cedar Creek the weekend of May 18-19.

Forester Peg Crim proudly showed off the group campsite last week. Her office is accepting reservations and wants the word spread that groups as large as 240 people can be accommodated.

The complex is situated about a mile west of Mechem Drive (Highway 48) on Cedar Creek Road just west of the original pavilion constructed by the Civilian Conservation Corps 60 years ago. However, that older pavilion is restricted only to picnics, no overnight camping is allowed.

The idea for a large group campsite has been in the works since the 1970s, said Forester Sam Tobias, who with Crim supervises recreational development and programs within the Lincoln National Forest. But construction didn't begin until the spring of 1990.

"It was finished last summer, but we weren't ready to open it yet," Crim said. Signs still have not been erected.

The forest service office regularly gets requests for group use areas with shelters. The private and public campgrounds in the area are mostly geared to families and small groups, Crim said.

"We expect the new Cedar Creek Group site to be used by Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts, by church groups, school groups, family reunions and company picnics.

"This is something that was not offered in the area before," she said. Cloudcroft has a group camping site but without a pavilion.

Each of three sites features parking spaces for recreation vehicles (RV), picnic tables, grills, a fire ring, water faucet, a restroom and a pavilion with lights. All units are wheelchair accessible.

No electrical, water or disposal hookups are available for RVs. Tents may be staked in most sections of the sites, but the forest ser-

vice prohibits trenching for drainage because it would encourage erosion.

Designed for a maximum of 60, 80 and 100 visitors, respectively, the three sites together offer 20 spaces for recreational vehicles and 40 parking places for regular vehicles.

Richard Carlson, a landscape architect for the Lincoln National Forest which encompasses Cedar Creek, designed the area. Carlson lives in Ruidoso, but works out of the Alamogordo office.

He has spaced the pavilions far enough apart for privacy and blocked from direct vision by trees, but close enough for interaction if one large group reserves all three. The fire rings invite late night songfests and storytelling.

Barney Rue of Ruidoso completed the earth work and road construction.

"We like to use local people and companies as much as possible," Crim said. ESA Construction Inc. of Albuquerque and El Paso acted as contractor. Wayne and Paul Dacy of D&D Construction in Capitan built the pavilions and restrooms and installed the water line.

The railroad ties that serve as steps and retaining walls to stabilize the sites were put in by the Smokey Bear Hotshots, a 20-person Forest Service firefighting crew stationed in Ruidoso.

Hiking trails will be one of the next additions to the site.

In line with the government's push to get fair market value for use of the land, Crim said the service has established a fee system for the group sites, which are kept locked when not reserved.

The charge roughly equates to about \$1 a person.

The fee is \$60 for up to 60 people, \$80 for 61 to 80 people and \$100 for 81 to 100 users. The entire site may be reserved for \$240.

To reduce the forest service's waste disposal costs and to lessen the impact on the environment, Crim said small trash bins will be set up for aluminum and glass, with dumpsters for garbage.

The group sites will be open

from May 15 to September 15. The season may be extended through the fall depending on the weather. For reservations, call, write or



A total of 165 high school students and school personnel were chosen from their districts to be part of the exposition. To date,


more than 1,200 have participated.

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
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# Capitan School Board rescinds previous action

In a surprise compromise Monday, the Capitan School Board voted to rescind its previous decision not to rehire teacher James Fowler for the 1991-92 school year.

And Fowler, who has taught for the past three years in Capitan, agreed not to file a protest of the board's action two weeks ago.

Instead, Fowler agreed to resign, effective at the end of the current school year, and the board accepted his resignation.

"I was very angry for quite some time," said Fowler, who has 31 years of teaching experience.

On April 11, the board ignored recommendations from both school superintendent Scott Childress and high school principal Bill Stowe that Fowler be reemployed for the next school year.

"I talked to Dr. Childress and decided that if I won an appeal, I could not work for those people (the board)," Fowler said. "The process could have dragged on during the summer and I can't wait that long

to apply for another job.

"A bunch of people wanted to support me, but I was afraid it would tear up the school. Capitan is my home and I'm not going to do that."

The special meeting Monday was called in response to Childress' recommendation that the board accept Fowler's resignation.

Fowler said he still believes the poor win record of the football team he coached last fall prompted the board to let him go.

"It comes down to the coaching in the fall, but they couldn't fire me for that," he said.

Fowler's teaching evaluation does not list any significant problems or complaints.

"If there were complaints, the board didn't follow its own policy which requires that any complaint must be filed in writing through the principal," Fowler said. "That just didn't occur."

Fowler said he wanted to talk to the board face-to-face about the situation, something he would

never have a chance to do once a protest was filed and attorneys took over. He was given that opportunity Monday. For a half-hour, the board closed its meeting to the public to listen to Fowler.

Ruby Johnson, president of the Capitan Classroom Teachers Association, said the board's apparent disregard for policy worries teachers.

"We all work hard to make good evaluations, but it seems evaluations make no difference. We feel our jobs are in jeopardy whether we have good evaluations or not."

Johnson said the organization wrote the board last year after members were cited by the state for interfering in the administration of the school system.

"The board certainly has not followed its own policies," she said. "They have gone about doing their own evaluations. We've called their hand on that before."

Childress agreed that the board had not followed its own policy.

"The whole thing is about the

good old boy network" he said. Board members may be listening to complaints from a small but influential minority.

"If we weren't delivering the type of program the community wanted, we'd have the house filled every board meeting," Childress said.

But board member Jack King, elected last February, said he has a child in Fowler's class and had complained to the administration about the teacher. Other people have told him that they wrote letters about Fowler.

"Letters were written and we can't seem to find them in his file," King said. "I talked to the administration about what I could do. I visited with Childress at length way before the rehiring situation."

At the meeting on April 11, "there were people who talked to us at break and (board president) Preston (Stowe) was handed a copy of a letter (a parent contended had been sent). We feel we had justification."

## Capitan school chief resigns

Dr. Scott Childress Monday announced his intention to resign as superintendent of the Capitan school system.

He'll be heading south to serve as superintendent of the Animas school district, which is slightly larger than Capitan with an enrollment of 600 students. Childress declined to comment on his decision to leave Capitan after four years at its helm.

"I had not discussed my resignation with the school board president (Preston Stone), but I had talked to board members Jack King and Tom Trost," Childress said.

At the tail-end of a special meeting of the School Board Monday, Childress told board members he will submit an official letter of resignation as soon as he receives his employment contract from Animas. He probably will stay in Capitan until June. The Animas board is scheduled to meet tonight to vote on hiring Childress.

Locally, board members' reactions varied. "I hate it," said member Tom Trost. "I hate to see him go. He's done a lot for the school system. He's been a great superintendent as far as I'm concerned." Jack King said he was a little surprised at the timing. "But I semi-expected it because he was looking and I think he was ready to leave Capitan."

Ron Roysal, who voted against extending Childress' contract earlier in the year, reserved comment until a written resignation is filed. Ken Cox wished him well. Stone could not be reached for comment.

Ruby Johnson, president of the Capitan Classroom Teachers Association said most teachers "are very disappointed he's leaving. He's been a superintendent who supports his teachers and under his leadership, our state evaluations have been excellent."

Steppin For The Moon's victory gave trainer Jack Brooks and jockey Jacky Martin their record sixth Sun Country Futurity win.

The son of Moon Lark looked like he was in trouble before the start.

Jockey Jacky Martin said, "I wouldn't have given 10 cents for his chances before the break."

Trainer Jack Brooks explained, "My colt had his foot up over the gate, and I was worried. He could have been much better in the gate. He was lucky to get away from the gate as he did."

Steppin For The Moon collected

\$66,970 for his third straight career win. The unbeaten colt is owned by Jerry Wells of Sulphur, Oklahoma and Joan Crews Hoyt of San Angelo, Texas. The winner's time with a tail wind was a fast 17.47 seconds, only 20 hundredths of the track record for 350 yards.

Brooks qualified 5 finalists. The winning trainer was thrilled with the win. "Anytime you qualify a horse for the Sun Country, it's a big deal. This race sets us up perfectly for a strong start going to Ruidoso Downs this summer leading up to the All American Futurity."

Brooks also saddled Special Task to victory in last month's West Texas Futurity.

Both Special Task and Steppin For The Moon are early favorites for the Kansas Futurity in May at Ruidoso Downs.

Jack's brother, Monty Brooks, saddled two finalists in the Sun Country. His Sky High Lady took

an early 1 length lead at the halfway point but seemed to lose her best strides near the wire. She checked in third place. Monty Brooks' Sis Special Heart broke slowly in the fifth place position but closed gamely to notch second.

Sis Special Heart collected a \$30,615 paycheck for finishing second.



# Spring cleanup turns into trash nightmare

The little dump that wouldn't quit next to the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce became a nightmare for village officials.

Even with "no dumping" signs warning of \$300 fines, contractors still said, "I think I can, I think I can."

The story of how best intentions can go awry started several weeks ago with the annual spring cleanup of Ruidoso by residents and community volunteers.

Over the years, residents routinely have taken their junk before tourist season to a designated spot to be hauled away and, therefore, help keep Ruidoso beautiful.

Several community organizations always participated and it ran as smooth as the mayor's proclamation that read in part "whereas, we can keep New Mexico beautiful by encouraging each other to improve our surroundings locally."

This year was different. Something happened and the flow of trash wouldn't stop.

Leonard Corona of the Sanitation Department said a truck was placed in the chamber's parking lot. People traditionally fill the truck, the department hauls it away. Everything remains sanitary.

Only this time, when the truck driver arrived the next day, there was nothing in the truck, but it was

surrounded with trash on the ground. From there, things went down hill.

No one expected trash to be piled high along the banks of the Ruidoso River.

No one knows why the trash wasn't picked up regularly for two weeks instead of piling up at the river's edge. But once that dumping pattern was established, others followed suit and things soon got out of hand.

Ron Wicker, new village manager, said he didn't anticipate all the construction debris.

Village front end loaders began loading village trucks with a 20-yard capacity to haul the debris to the landfill. But no sooner would they haul away a load, than a new batch of trash would mysteriously appear in its place.

"Even though we allowed this to happen," Wicker said. "It's not going to continue." He posted a "no dumping" sign that warned of a \$300 fine. The dumping continued anyway.

Tuesday afternoon, a man drove up in his truck, jumped on the back of the bed and started furiously pitchforking tree limbs from the back almost hitting the "no dumping sign."

When he left, another man drove up in a maroon vehicle at the same time as a giant blue dump truck. The blond-haired man left his car,

opened the gates of the dump truck. The hydraulic powered bed lifted and the roofing contents slid off onto the tree limbs. The man shut the gates and hopped back in his car. The whole process took no more than five minutes.

Wicker, new to the community, said a better location needed to be found.

Chamber director Jerry Watts said using the chamber's parking lot started as an "oh, sure" item that had been done in the past.

"There's never been that much garbage before," he said.


Mayor Victor Alonso said if it was worked the way it was planned, without contractors, it would have worked well.

Corona agreed. He said contractors were taking advantage of the situation so they would not have to pay the high Capitan landfill costs.

Alonso said, "I'm sure that we'll learn from this year and makes some changes."

Councilor Al Junge said the problem appeared to be no custodial help.

"Fire or Street Department personnel has time to patrol the dumping area," Junge said. "In the end we would have saved money, been orderly and turned away inappropriate trash."



"The best laid plans ... oft go awry" might have been the theme for the Village of Ruidoso's spring cleanup campaign. As mountains of trash and garbage grew and filled the space from Sudderth Drive all the way to the edge of the Rio Ruidoso, it became that something had gone awry.

"Over-success" was the way some village officials described it. We agree that it was great the way folks got into the spirit of cleaning up the town, but it's too bad that the whole thing got out of hand.

For next year, how about putting all that trash somewhere else? Old discarded furniture and trash on the doorstep of the Convention and Visitors Bureau isn't the most welcome sight to greet visitors. Placing dumpsters on the edge of the Rio Ruidoso wasn't our idea of the best way to celebrate Earth Day. Even though the Chamber of Commerce parking lot has been used in past cleanup campaigns, the dumpsters weren't placed so close to the river in past years. Maybe we could use the "Free Parking" area next year?

Another complication that nobody could have predicted was the way contractors and businesses made use of the dumping area. Construction materials really added to the bulk of the garbage, and perhaps the cleanup dumpsite should be limited to residential garbage. And, it became clear this year that strict time limits are needed, and they should be enforced by stationing a staff person at the dump site.

It's clear that with the new and complicated regulations for trash dumping, more and better planning will be required for future cleanup campaigns. Dumping trash on the banks of our most valuable natural resource — the Rio Ruidoso — defeats the whole purpose of conducting a cleanup campaign.

port was handled. A \$76,000 well was drilled on the Mesa, with little water to show for the money spent. Yet a well capable of pumping well over a thousand gallons a minute lay idle a few miles distant. Capacity 1,000 gpm at 45 feet. Nosker made the statement that it was too expensive to push water, you must pull it. You will pardon me for laughing. My little fruit sprayer will push water 700 feet high and at little expense.

As to the capabilities of the at-

torneys, Wesch, Caperton and Trimble. We water users in this area owe these attorneys a vote of thanks for their untiring efforts in the protection of our waters. And we come out on top in the Indian suit in our local court. And this landfill that they did away with would have put the finishing touches to us. That was Justice.

### Is planned \$8.5 million superhighway through Ruidoso overkill?

#### TO THE EDITOR:

As a subdivision planner and developer with many years of experience in Ruidoso, I feel the proposed widening of Mechem Drive to five lanes to be "overkill" in design and that the eight-and-a-half million dollar projected cost is too an expense.

In my opinion, widening Mechem only to a four-lane surface

would avoid much unnecessary environmental damage, reduce the detriment to local businesses during construction, reduce the extent of utility removal and replacement, and reduce the extent of drainage problems which would result from the extra amount of paving.

Also the project, as planned, would involve extending the Mechem speed limit to 40 to 45

miles per hour, which, as you know, would tend to lead some drivers to exceed this limit by an additional five to 10 miles per hour causing greater endangerment of pedestrian and motor traffic. A five-lane highway would be destructive to the image of Ruidoso as a rustic haven from the pressures of big city life.

I have suggested to the State

Highway Department and elected officials of the Village of Ruidoso that they reconsider the proposed widening to five lanes and reduce the scale to four lanes. A four-lane highway would save the taxpayers about five million dollars.

Local man writes special song

A song written in 1981 by a Ruidoso man will be featured during the Jerry Lewis Muscular Dystrophy Telethon over Memorial Day weekend.

District Coordinator Marlene Winters said a video of "A Gift for the Children" performed by Steve Lovell is scheduled to be aired during the telethon, but no definite time has been set.

Lovell, 39, is from San Diego. His parents are musicians and his mother also sings.

"I wrote my first song in fifth grade," Lovell said. He plays

acoustical guitar.

Since moving to Ruidoso five years ago to get away from too much traffic and too many people, Lovell said he has been working as a technician for the Fireplace Center and for Parsons Productions Inc., often filming the Ruidoso City Council meetings.

He wrote "A Gift for the Children" following the death of his cousin from amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), a rapidly progressing, deteriorating disease of the muscles.

"I watched him suffer over the years and then I saw one of Jerry Lewis' telethons and wrote the

song," Lovell said.

The lyrics exhort people to give and put an end to the need for a Muscular Dystrophy Association.

Lovell credits his friend, Nino Desnoyers, with prodding him into filming a video of the song at Parsons Productions.

Winters said Roy Seay of First National Bank of Ruidoso mentioned the song to her.

"I told him I'd love to hear it," Winters said. But it wasn't until a recent Bowl-a-thon benefit for MD that Lovell approached her and introduced himself.

"We sat down and he told me about his cousin and how it affected him," Winters said. "He gave me the tape and I told him we couldn't guarantee anything but that we like local performers. I listened to the tape in the car and felt it was good enough. You can tell he puts a lot of emotion into words that really hit home."

Winters' supervisor agreed to include the video on the telethon. Photographs of children with muscular dystrophy may be spliced into the video.


Lovell said his parents "are real happy that the song finally will be heard."

"If it makes anything at all, I will donate it to MD. The important thing is that it might touch someone and they may give," he said. "It's my gift."

### Check out the ion propulsion engine at the Space Center

The Space Center acquired an engineering model of an ion propulsion engine from NASA last week, as well as a Power Conditioner Model, which comprised the electrical system used with the ion engine. Equipment modeled after these prototypes was launched in the Space Electric Rocket Test (SERT-2) lofted February 3, 1970, by a Thor Agena launch vehicle. That payload remained in orbit after an unsuccessful mission.

Ion rockets expel positive particles at high velocities by accelerating these particles through negative electrical fields. Electrostatic, or ion, rocket propulsion technology has been considered as a relatively low-cost, long-lived form of propulsion, especially for use after escape from the earth's gravitational field, when little force is required for maneuvering in a space environment.

"We will eventually incorporate the Ion Propulsion Engine into Gallery 3A, 'Rockets,' in which we already have information on various types of propulsion, including this system," stated Curator George House. "The Space Center is constantly expanding its artifact collections, for use as we update and upgrade the exhibitions, as well as for scholarly research."

## The Plant Corner

# Save those ashes for green gardens

Be very careful where and how you store those ashes. Store them in a metal can with a tight fitting lid for at least a couple of weeks before using them in your beds or containers. The ashes can remain hot and ready to start a fire for days.

Tragically, every season, many people learn just how long those hot coals can remain alive. Every year there are a few people who dump ashes, thinking all chance of fire is dead, into the dumpsters causing fires in the dumpsters, so do be very careful.

The ashes are very valuable for spring planting. They may be used as a light dusting agent on tomatoes, peppers, just about anything planted in the Salad Barrels. The ashes are particularly good to keep flea beetles off the plants, but will be most effective against root maggots, discourage white flies from laying eggs, also mites, aphids and mealy bugs are smothered.

When the plants are larger, five or six inches tall, dig a trench three or four inches wide to encircle the plants, taking care not to allow ashes to touch the stems, sprinkle a couple of handfuls of wood ashes around the base of each plant and this will keep the pests, such as cut-worms, from crawling over the ashes to cut the stems. For best results, raise the plants, making the plant sit upon a mound and place the ashes at the lower level around

the plants.

I'm telling you, these wood ashes are great, cheap, easy and no poison chemical insecticides have to be used.

Wood ashes contains nutrients, too. Un-leached ashes have two percent phosphorus, four percent to 10 percent potash and zero nitrogen. The lime in the ashes is in the oxide form but is converted to the hydroxide and carbonate forms when exposed to weather. How do I know all this good stuff, you ask, just read it in a book, that's how.

More stuff I just read, ashes may contain 20 percent to 50 percent lime. Ash of hardwoods, such as maple and oak contain a third more calcium than ash of softwoods.

It takes about 4,000 pounds of wood ash to equal a ton of calcium carbonate which is the lime you buy. So figure twice the wood ash to

the lime you need.

Ashes unlock all the nutrients in the soil and make them available to the plants. That is why I used ashes in my compost pile. Don't use ashes around acid loving plants such as gardenias, rhododendrons, azaleas, etc.

There was an article by Dr. Al Page, soil scientists of U of C warning us not to use sludge or sludge based fertilizers on or near our veggies or other eatables. The organic fertilizer made from sewage sludge may be adding an unsafe amount of cadmium to our diets, thus increasing the likelihood of us developing heart and kidney disease. So just be sure to use sludge-based fertilizers only on grass and shade trees away from all eatables.

Our Ruidoso water is "hard" and contains harsh chemicals that will spot the plant leaves is the reason I keep saying to you to use distilled water to mist plants. For the same reason, plant directly in plastic pots, the salts and chemicals eat away at clay pots causing them to disintegrate much too quickly, and place the planted plastic pots inside a more decorative pot or basket.



# Students Against Driving Drunk meet at RHS

The Ruidoso High School S.A.D.D. (Students Against Driving Drunk) sponsored a S.A.D.D. conference on April 12 and 13, for numerous schools around New Mexico.

During the conference the national speaker for S.A.D.D., Rob Aptaker, told the students about how and why S.A.D.D. began. The story of how a teacher and some

students came up the the Contract for Life.

A contract that the students and their parents sign that says if the student ever feels that he or she has had too much to drink, or is with someone who has had too much to drink they can call their parents for a ride home. Aptaker told the students this was a way of opening up communication between them and their parents and safety net in case they ever found them-

selves in trouble.

However, he told them it was not to be abused to where the students were calling every weekend. Aptaker having lost a friend in high school to a drunk driving accident, spoke to the students about the affects of losing a friend. He told the students the number one killer facing them today was driving drunk, and that one person every hour dies in a drunk driving accident.

He also warned students that with prom and graduation coming up to be especially careful.

Another speaker at the conference was a New Mexico M.A.D.D. (Mothers Against Driving Drunk) spokesperson named Karolyn Nunnallee. Nunnallee told the students the tragic story of her daughter Patty who had been killed in the Kentucky School Bus accident. The accident took the lives of 27 children, Patty being the youngest at

age 10.

She showed the students a picture of Patty and told them she wished she knew what Patty would have been like during her high school years. She told the students that Patty was dead, but that they could live for Patty and make the difference that Patty cannot make.

Other speakers at the conference were Gerald Ames, Ruidoso S.A.D.D. sponsor; Magistrate Judge J.R. "Jim" Wheeler, Police Chief

Richard Swenor, Brian Richardson for the EMT's, and the Ruidoso High School S.A.D.D. group.

Ames said "the conference went real well," and wanted to thank the School Administration for bringing the National speaker from Boston.

Ruidoso High School S.A.D.D. will have an assembly the Friday before prom to remind the Ruidoso students not to drink and drive. Because as Ames says, "Let's not have it go prom, funeral, graduation."
