Council creates convention sales department

In a surprise move, all proposals submitted for the management and marketing of the new Ruidoso Civic-Events center were rejected by the Ruidoso Village Council Monday.

The village decided to handle the management of the center in house, and that move set off a series of actions that rocked the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

A special committee of the village met with the chamber, which was the front runner of the three bidders to handle the new center's marketing. But no agreement could be reached to the satisfaction of the council.

For months, Councilor J.D. James has been asking the rest of the council to allow the village to form its own department.

James said control in sales, marketing and advertising for the center should be with the village, accountable to the village manager. The council finally agreed.

Village council action shifts \$46,000 of Convention and Visitors Bureau (CVB) money, and perhaps personnel, to a new arm of the village under village manager Ron Wicker.

Lodgers tax money previously handled by the chamber through a contract, about \$100,000, also would be handled through requests for proposals.

Mayor Victor Alonso said these changes would provide the accountability the village council and community need.

"It's not our intent to make progress in one area at the expense of another, but rather create a new market," Alonso said.

Alonso said the \$100,000 advertising budget that the council already has committed to the chamber will remain intact.

The mayor said the advertising has continued three years under the same contract. Village attorney David Thomsen said the village should request proposals.

Chamber director Jerry Watts said the

chamber had depended on that money to serve six identified areas of the chamber that assisted people new to Ruidoso.

Alonso said that because the village didn't have a convention center to market, the chamber used CVB resources to market the town.

"Now three years later, what they're saying is this is going to impact them adversely if we pull the entire funds. They've created a good effort in marketing the town. But it's our money. We could pull all of it."

"I think there is a legitimate need to market the town better than we have been," Alonso said. "We're going to market the convention center ourselves. The question is, does this body want to leave a total void in the chamber?"

James said the existing contract with the chamber called for \$105,000 in advertising and \$46,000 for the CVB. James said in the RFP the chamber submitted to manage the center, it added \$157,000 for

the first year.

"That's a total of \$308,000 in payments for the village. That's nearly a third of a million dollars," James said.

Watts said the chamber submitted a maximum plan to market the facility. He said he indicated to the negotiating team last week that there were certain economies that could be considered. The first year, however, would be more expensive to market, he said.

Alonso said the council is going to have to be very cognizant of the total impact of marketing and operating the center.

"If you look at the chamber's proposal that says this marketing in personnel salaries is \$157,000. Then you look at the plan our previous manager put together that says operation and maintenance was over \$100,000. If you add technicians, you're talking a total impact of a quarter-million dollars, easily," he said. "I think we need to look at the bottom line."

"It's going to cost the village, just like it

would cost the chamber," Alonso said. "But we're going to have accountability and direct control. That's my motivation for letting the village manage it."

The mayor said logistics, catering, transportation, are considerations tied to a successful convention. He said the best way to ensure a smooth operation from marketing through cleanup is to keep everything under one roof.

Alonso suggested that the chamber might want to downscale its operation.

Councilor Bill Karn indicated that the CVB and its small budget appeared to play a greater role in the chamber's business than the rest of its activities.

"Before the village ever thought of having a CVB, the activity of the chamber was not that much different then it is today," said Councilor Barbara Duff.

EDC faces funding cuts

One topic will dominate the agenda of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County board meeting, Thursday night.

"It's funding," Anita Sanders, acting executive director of the EDCLC, said. Last week the Lincoln County Commission tentatively voted to drop a quarter-mill levy which has been a main source of revenue to keep EDCLC in business.

That levy has provided about \$60,000 of the EDCLC'S \$169,000 budget.

The county's total contribution for the fiscal year has amounted to \$86,973, Sanders says.

Ronnie Paulger, president of EDCLC, said that without the county support, "we'll probably have to shut down." Options will be discussed Thursday, Paulger indicated.

He is drafting a letter to the county commission which, if approved by the board of directors, will be mailed Friday.

It will ask for reconsideration of the funding cut.

Paulger told The News that some statements made at the county commission meeting by Commissioner Monroy Montes painted a distorted picture.

Montes, the commission representative on the EDCLC board, said at the commission meeting:

"Up to this point, the county has put \$200,000 into the EDCLC operation, but how can anyone say they've done a good job or a bad job when they haven't presented figures to prove either way."

Paulger maintains such statistics have been furnished the commission.

"We've had lots of success. It's a long-range project," Paulger said after the commission meeting.

The EDCLC meetings are open to the public.

The Thursday meeting will be at 7 p.m. on the third floor of the Stroud Building, 1096 Mechem Drive in EDCLC offices.

NM State Police search for two missing NMSU coeds

As of Wednesday afternoon, two New Mexico State University students were still missing after they failed to return from a weekend camping trip near Cloudcroft, State Police said Tuesday.

There have been no new leads, according to Martha Julian, State Police dispatcher at Alamogordo. Julian said it has been suggested the FBI enter the search.

Leonda Wisdom Armstrong, 21, of Clayton, and Kathleen Ford, 21, of El Paso, Texas, planned to camp at Silver Lake in south-central New Mexico, but police said there was no indication the women registered at any of the area's campgrounds.

Ruidoso Detective Sergeant Lanny Maddox said Ruidoso is participating with the attempt to locate order.

Avis Knapp of El Paso, a

friend of the Ford family, said Ford's father, Wayne, was searching the area. Knapp said workers at a Cloudcroft grocery store reported seeing the women Saturday night and Sunday morning.

"It's not a search and rescue because there's a whole mountainside to cover. We need a more definite point to start," Julian said.

The women were driving a faded beige 1978 four-door Ford with Texas license plate 826KVR.

Ford is described as a slender, 6-foot, blue-eyed brunette. Armstrong is a 5-2, blue-eyed blonde with a heavy build.

Anyone with information on the whereabouts of the women is asked to call the State Police in Alamogordo, 437-1313.

Governor, mayor commend state's municipal clerks

Gov. Bruce King and Ruidoso Downs Mayor Bonnie Addy both have proclaimed May 5-11 as Municipal Clerks Week.

Mayor Addy in her proclamation said, "... and further extend appreciation to our Municipal Clerk, Maurice Gudgel, and to all Municipal Clerks for the vital services they perform and their exemplary dedication to the communities they represent."

The president of the International Institute of Municipal Clerks says, in part: "The municipal clerk is the secretary to the city council. He or she prepares the agendas, takes the minutes and maintains the ordinance and resolutions file. The person usually records the actions of the various commissions and committees appointed by the council."

"The municipal clerks keep the record of the municipality and serve as the clearinghouse for information about the local government."

Over three-quarters of the municipal clerks administer part or all of the local election function. Nearly half served as finance officers or treasurers. Many, especially in smaller communities, are the chief administrative officer."

She said there has always been a confusion between the CVB and the chamber. She said people think they are overlapping when they are really two separate entities.

"What has been the function of the chamber all these many years before CVB came along?" she asked.

Watts said there was an overlap. Without that CVB support, the chamber only generated 15-20,000 inquiries.

The CVB budget paid for the director's salary, two receptionists and rental services of a small bureau room within the chamber building.

The room and use of the chamber's accountant pulled \$600 per month from the CVB budget, which was spent for other chamber projects. The CVB's receptionists were the chamber's receptionists.

The receptionists were a major part of the inquiry system.

They accepted calls and punched a manual counter on each incoming call.

Watts said over 50,000 inquiries were made to the chamber last year. He admitted some of those inquiries were overlapping. If someone called in, that was an inquiry. If a mailing was to that same person, that was a separate inquiry.

All calls are counted as inquiries, even business and personal. A reported past problem with the counting system was children who liked to punch the button on the manual counter near the telephone.

Watts said there were 8,998 calls so far this year. There were 4,328 walk-ins and 2,709 mailings.

Duff said there was a time when the chamber supported itself through fundraisers and membership.

"The village is now supporting you with subsidy. Is there that great a difference in the activities as far as the chamber is concerned?" Duff asked.

"Sure," Watts said. "That's the numbers I was telling you earlier," he said referring to the increase in inquiries.

After the proposals were unanimously rejected (councilors Ron Andrews and Al Junge were absent), James made a motion for the village to form its own department to be answerable to the village manager. The motion passed unanimously.

Councilor Jess Stinson asked if the chamber would have to come to the council for the \$100,000 in advertising money.

Village attorney David Thomsen said if the village is going to spend \$100,000 it must request proposals.

Tune in for a Mother's Day reunion

Mother's Day has always been a special occasion for former Ruidoso resident Carla Trapp Beasley.

But this year will be the one she's been waiting more than a quarter century to celebrate.

Beasley, who now lives in Dallas, Texas, will be reunited with her 27-year-old daughter, Friday on CBS-TV's morning show. She and Linda Elliott, the daughter she hasn't seen since giving her up for adoption 27 years ago, will meet for the first time on that show.

And Ruidoso residents who remember the vivacious Beasley, won't be surprised to learn that she wants her friends to share her happiness by tuning in to CBS at 8:40 a.m. Friday.

Beasley handled public relations duties at First National Bank of Ruidoso before moving to Dallas for her health.

She and her two daughters lived in Ruidoso for several years, and Laura, who is now 25, graduated from Ruidoso High School. Beasley's younger daughter, Paula Trapp, attended Ruidoso schools before moving to Austin.

What most of Carla Beasley's friends didn't know then was that she had one more daughter, the one

Beasley said she lived in Tennessee and was engaged to be married 27 years ago when she found out she was pregnant. At about that same time she learned that her fiancé was already married.

"I went to Dallas, had my baby and gave her up for adoption," said Beasley in a telephone conversation earlier this week. "She was just beautiful," she added.

"It was the hardest thing I ever had to do."

Over the years, raising her other two beautiful daughters, Beasley wondered how life was treating her firstborn. And when she moved to

Dallas, she contacted Hope Cottage.

Beasley, who has Multiple Sclerosis, wanted her medical records and information on her daughter's birth father (who has died) available in case the young woman ever needed it. And she wanted to be available if, by any chance, her daughter wanted to contact her.

Linda Elliott was also contacting Hope Cottage in search of her birth mother.

What with changing rules and regulations regarding adoption records, the two were unsuccessful in their quests — until two weeks ago.

That's when the rules changed once again, and Hope Cottage released telephone numbers so the mother and daughter could meet by telephone.

"It was like we'd never skipped a beat," said Beasley, adding that she and Elliott both talked a mile-a-minute catching up on the 27 years they had missed.

During that conversation, Beasley and Elliott, who lives in Knoxville, Tennessee, and sells computers, discovered that their paths nearly crossed in the '70s in Dallas.

"All the time we lived in Dallas, Linda was carpooling to school with the people who lived next door,"

said Beasley. "She may even have played with Laura."

That telephone conversation just wasn't enough for mom and daughter, and the two began trying to figure ways to afford a reunion.

Meanwhile, a reporter happened to overhear Linda Elliott's story, took an interest and contacted CBS.

The time was just right — Mother's Day — and CBS made arrangements to fly Beasley to Knoxville where she'll meet Elliott before the two fly to New York for their television appearance.

Beasley, whose bout with MS has been an up and down one, just got out of the hospital, and is making plans to move to a cooler climate for the summer — perhaps to Ruidoso.

"I do pretty good most of the time," said Beasley. "I have to go in the hospital every now and then for steroid treatments. The heat is hard on me," she added.

But for today, she's feeling good and looking forward to celebrating Mother's Day with all three of her daughters.

Beasley said she always loves to hear from her Ruidoso friends, and provided her address: 7019 Clayton; Dallas TX 75214.

Capitan trustees face tough tax decisions

Capitan Village Trustees face some tough decisions about taxes for 1991-92.

The state intends to cut its gross receipts tax distribution to municipalities by 1/8th of a percent, from 1.35 percent to 1.225 percent starting July 1, 1992.

But the same legislation that will reduce the gross receipts allocation also authorizes municipalities to enact their own "Municipal Infrastructure Gross Receipts Tax" in two increments totaling 1/8th of a percent.

The first 1/16th percent (.0625 percent) can be imposed by ordinance without a referendum.

The second 1/16th percent also can be levied by ordinance, but only if Capitan sets a property tax rate of not less than one-half of the remaining property tax millage authority allocated to it.

The village currently levies 1.842 mills for operation of the village, which generates about \$9,574, according to the county treasurer's office.

(One mill is equal to \$1 on each \$1,000 of taxable property value.)

Mayor Frank Warth said that leaves the village's unused taxing authority of 5.425 mills.

"We'd have to levy an additional

2.712 mills to qualify (to impose) the second one-sixteenth percent tax," he told village trustees Monday during a special budget workshop.

"The boys in Santa Fe have been looking to see who's not taxing to the max," Warth said. "They want us to tax the maximum before we come to the state asking for money."

Without the infrastructure money, the village can't keep pace with improvements and maintenance of its streets and other facilities, he said.

"I'm in favor of adding the first one-sixteenth," Warth said. The village now charges a 1.56 percent gross receipts tax that generates about \$41,500 a year.

"We're going to tax ourselves to death," said Trustee Norm Renfro.

"Or we can slowly shrivel up and die," Warth said. The state must be notified by July 1 whether the village has elected to increase its property tax and to impose the full 1/8th percent gross receipt tax that would be earmarked for infrastructure expenses.

The village now collects about \$58,700 annually from its share of the state's gross receipts tax.

Trying to come up with a preliminary 1991-92 budget is an exercise in imagination, Warth

said.

"We generally picked up the same amounts as last year because we have no better method of forecasting," he said. "When we get the final figures on expenses and revenue June 1, we should be in a better position to come up with a final budget."

That final budget is due July 20, but the preliminary must be submitted to the Department of Finance and Administration by June 1.

The preliminary lists \$876,717 in revenues, plus a cash carryover balance of \$318,898. Expenses are estimated at \$911,148.

Action on the preliminary is scheduled for the board meeting at 7 p.m. Monday in village hall.

Warth said by pledging \$20,000 of local money, materials or labor, the village could receive \$30,000 from the state for road improvements. The village failed to take advantage of the cooperative program for the past few years, he said.

The budget for the street department will have to be cut by \$11,000 unless the village opts to take the first 1/16th percent tax, Warth said.

The village received \$41,544 from its share of state gross receipts taxes for 1990-91.

The preliminary budget contains no merit or cost-of-living raises.

"You can see how tight it is," Warth said, adding that raises will be considered when drawing up the final budget. "The preliminary is to help the state get a rough estimate of what the counties and villages are doing."

The amount budgeted for law enforcement was reduced from \$50,000 to \$44,000 to cover two officers, instead of an officer and police chief.

In a related matter, the trustees interviewed four candidates for the position of village police officer.

They narrowed the field to Charles White of Roswell and Rudy Saiz of Fort Stanton. A final decision is scheduled for the trustee's next meeting after a background check of both men by Sheriff James McSwane.

According to his resume, White is an accredited law enforcement officer who has worked for the Village of Ruidoso, the Chaves County Detention Center and the Roswell Police Department. Saiz worked with the Smokey Bear Hotshots and is a forestry technician.

Village officer Tom Hammonstre has been patrolling the village by himself since March with help from the Sheriff's Department.

County lines out commission district lines

A final decision on the alignment for Lincoln County's five commission districts probably will be postponed until after new state legislative districts are in place, commissioners said Tuesday.

The County Commission won't know for sure if precinct lines can be altered or precincts split until after the special session of the Legislature set for September.

If legislation is approved to allow changes in precinct lines, the four maps now being reviewed in public hearings may be obsolete, county officials said during the commission meeting attended by a handful of spectators.

The five districts are being designed in response to the commission's decision to expand from three to five members, effective in 1992.

That also means all elected county officials will serve four year terms instead of two year terms.

County Clerk Martha Proctor said the only rules set in stone is that the population in the districts must be balance, census blocks cannot be broken and precincts cannot cross legislative district lines.

Under the five-member commission, each commissioner will be nominated and elected within separate districts.

Proctor said under almost any arrangement two districts will be concentrated in Ruidoso.

Ruidoso Downs planners ponder village business regs

Ruidoso Downs feed and hay dealers were out in force Monday night to state opinions on what might go into a proposed Ruidoso Downs ordinance regulating itinerant sales people.

The occasion was a regular meeting of the Ruidoso Downs Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z), conducted in the spacious public meeting room at the new village hall. Debbie Sturdivant is chairperson of the newly formed P&Z.

Also hearing arguments were members Ronda Dvorak and Robin Surguy.

Village trustee Karen Stevens has resigned from the P&Z commission, Sturdivant announced.

Mayor Bonnie Addy had asked Gary Mitchell, village attorney, to draft an ordinance "before summer" spelling out rules and regulations concerning itinerant and seasonal people who often sell directly out of trucks or in parking lots along the highway.

Of particular concern to the permanent feed dealers are hay haulers.

Mitchell said he will have a draft copy of an ordinance available Monday night, May 13, at a regular meeting of the Ruidoso Village Trustees.

Expressing opinions at the P&Z

meeting were three men who either have feed lots or who rent space to people who bring feed and hay into the area to sell to trainers and owners at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

Speaking were Charlie Borchart, Johnny Burke and Tom Freeman.

Each of the men said they'd be satisfied with about any rules if they are fair to everyone.

The basic issue, apparently, is one of competition when itinerant feed and hay haulers compete with business people who have heavy investment in property and service.

Mitchell indicated that an ordinance will be forthcoming requiring anyone to operate out of a permanent structure with restrooms available and with no threat to safety.

Mitchell said it is perfectly legal for hay and feed buyers to contract, say, with an El Paso feed company and have hay delivered to the track.

Or, a Ruidoso Downs property owner can allow sales off of private property if the business is transacted in a permanent building of some kind which meets state codes including adequate parking.

Mitchell also said that the ordinance he is drafting must encompass all types of sales operations, not just hay haulers.

He said special "picnic license" provisions probably would be included.

Otherwise tent sales at the Art Festival this summer at Ruidoso Downs might be prohibited.

In a business session, P&Z mem-

bers will recommend to trustees that a sign application by Pappy's Diner, requested by C.F. "Pappy" Bell, be approved.

Also, the commission will recommend that an application by Wayne's Gold Rush to set up shop in a parking lot be denied. Wayne Watson had asked for such permission. He sells jewelry and leather goods.

Bill Heineken, code enforcement officer, has been working with Mitchell in drafting a suitable ordinance to control itinerant merchants.

Mitchell said that under the constitution, ordinances can't restrict competition.

But, villages, he said, can establish rules.

Burke rents space to seasonal people who sell hay to track people. Mitchell said that is legal as long as business is conducted in his home which is on the property and as long as state code is followed.

He said there is no law against selling out of a home in Ruidoso Downs.

"It is illegal in Ruidoso," he said.

Superfund site cleanup gets under way in Carrizozo

The clean-up of the Cimarron Mining Superfund site is expected to start in August, according to Roger Meacham from the Dallas office of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

Meacham said Tuesday that EPA project manager Paul Sieminski was in Carrizozo last week with representatives from the Bureau of Reclamation to inspect the contaminated Cimarron site and a second related site called Sierra Blanca south of Carrizozo.

"They were there to find appropriate locations for wells that will be installed by the bureau for the recovery of ground water," Meacham said. "And they were planning tie-in locations to the (Carrizozo) sewer lines."

The total clean-up of con-

taminated water is estimated to take about 13 months at a cost of \$95,000. To date, \$551,000 has been spent on investigating the site and designing a clean-up method.

Under the remedial plan selected by the EPA after public hearings in Carrizozo last year, water contaminated with cyanide will be pumped into the publicly-owned Carrizozo sewage treatment system.

The Cimarron site is about one-quarter mile east of Carrizozo on the north side of U.S. 880. Originally owned by Zia Steel Inc. and used to recover iron from ores transported to the site, most of the activity took place between the late 1960s and 1979.

Cyanide was not used in that process. But in 1979, the operation was sold to Southwest Mineral Corporation, "which apparently began

using cyanide process to extract precious metals from ore," according to an EPA summary.

Southwest Minerals, a subsidiary of the Sierra Blanca Mining Company, operated without the required state discharge permits necessary for conducting cyanide processing at the site, the summary stated.

The facility used a conventional agitation mill, "which resulted in unpermitted discharges of contaminated liquids."

A sample analysis report in 1981 by the New Mexico Environmental Improvement Division noted the presence of cyanide contamination.

Cyanide is a poisonous compound commonly used in mining to leach gold from the bearing ore.

In the middle of that same year, the operation was expanded by adding several large mixing tanks,

cyanide solution tanks, thickeners and associated pumping and conveying equipment.

Two years later, the state sent a notice of violation to Cimarron for discharging into a non-permitted discharge pit.

But by that time, the operation had been closed down by the company and the court had appointed a bankruptcy trustee.

State field inspections from 1980-84 revealed the presence of cyanide and other metals in shallow ground water, soil and mill tailings, according to the EPA summary. The EPA became involved in 1987, the site was proposed for the Superfund National Priorities List in June 1988 and was included on the list in October 1989.

Levels of cyanide at some of the onsite wells were as high as 4,440 ppb (parts per billion), according to

the EPA. Cyanide levels considered safe by the Safe Water Drinking Act are 200 ppb or less.

The remedial plan calls for the sewer lines to carry the Cimarron water several miles to the treatment plant.

"The discharge will comply with all pretreatment standards, and sampling will be conducted onsite before entering the public system," the summary states.

Pretreatment should not be necessary, the EPA has concluded. Biological activity within the existing treatment lagoons, coupled with plant effluent chlorination and the decomposing effects of sunlight, should reduce the concentration of cyanide.

"The treatment plant effluent and sludge will be monitored to avoid adverse impacts on the pro-

cesses of the sewage treatment plant. Ground water at the site also will be monitored to insure that the remedy is effective," EPA officials say.

Meacham said the installation of the wells will take six to eight weeks. The pumping and treating of the contaminated water at the old mining operation will take about one year.

About 3-million gallons will need to be treated.

Meacham said his department also should have a recommendation on a remedy for the Sierra Blanca site by Oct. 1.

The same owner that operated Cimarron also owned Sierra Blanca.

"We expect a decision on a remedy for the Sierra Blanca site by Oct. 1," Meacham said.

Fire destroys home of Capitan schoolteacher

The home of Capitan high school teacher Jim Fowler burned to the ground Tuesday despite efforts to save it by firefighters from five local departments.

It's the second major blow to Fowler in the last month. Just a few weeks ago he learned that the Capitan School Board would not renew his teaching contract for 1991-92. The board later accepted his resignation. But Fowler said he planned to stay in the area and teach somewhere nearby.

Dave Cummins, a lieutenant with the Capitan Fire Department said Wednesday that his office received a call about the fire at 7:45 a.m.

"But, by the time we arrived the fire was extremely hot and the house was totally engulfed," he said.

The fire was reported by Ruidoso Police Officer Randy Spears who was on his way home and spotted the smoke.

Fowler, his wife and two sons,

already had left for work and school when the large wood frame house in Turkey Creek Estates caught fire. Firefighters from Capitan, the U.S. Forest Service, the Bonito Fire Department, the New Mexico Forestry Division and the Lincoln Fire Department unsuccessfully fought the blaze.

Capitan firefighters finally left the scene about 3:30 p.m., Cummins said.

The cause of the fire has not yet been determined.

Capitan School Supt. Scott Childress said Fowler is staying at the T.L.C. Recreational Vehicle Court outside of Capitan.

"The house was huge, at least four bedrooms," he said. "When you lose a home, you lose everything you own."

Lincoln County Fairgrounds get a facelift; can't get insurance

As much as 600 yards of sand has been donated to the arena at the Lincoln County Fairground, but the fair board needs help getting it there.

The County Commission Tuesday told new Road Manager William Cupit that he could use his department's equipment to load, haul and deposit the sand.

However, the \$1,700 cost will

have to come out of his budget.

"We're trying to give the fairgrounds (in Capitan) a facelift," said Jody Roberts, fair board vice president. "It's as hard as cement in places now."

Once the sand is down, the arena probably could be functional in the future by just adding a 100 yards every few years, he said.

"We have people on the board now that are dedicated to making the fairground an asset and to build

it up," Roberts said.

The Smokey Bear Stampede on July 4th has been expanded and may be covered by television as well as some national publications, he said.

But it isn't all good news for the fair board.

The commission still has not been able to secure liability insurance for participants in arena events, county manager Nick Pappas said.

"We need to re-evaluate the entire arrangement, the 99-year lease and who's responsible for what," he said.

The county owns the fairground but leases it back to the fair board for \$1 a year. That arrangement originally was created to provide insurance protection for activities at the fairground under the county's umbrella policy. The fair board handles management of the facility. But that is no longer sufficient,

Pappas said. It might be better to come up with an entire new approach, he said.

"We're very much liable if a participant in the arena is hurt. We have insurance for everything around the sporting event, but the events themselves are strictly excluded from coverage."

Pappas said he met last Friday with the county's insurance agent Al Berryman, Fair Board president Jack King and other county and

board officials to discuss the situation.

None of the other counties he contacted have arena insurance, Roberts said. "I've never heard of anyone suing and I've witnessed deaths and injuries involving paralysis."

Inspections of the facility prior to an event and other precautions would show that the county was not negligent, he said.

The little orphan lamb, Abraham, journeyed with Mary and John and Jim and Krista Cooper, from the Cooper Ranch near Arabella, for the services.





Leaders take a stand for accountability

When we elect people to represent us, we expect them to be accountable in every way — over finances, personnel and services.

It was refreshing to hear Mayor Victor Alonso, the Ruidoso Village Council and the Lincoln County Commission all speak out in the past few days for accountability. In Ruidoso, the mayor and council took steps to regain control of tax money used to promote this area as a tourist attraction. On the county level, commissioners indicated they'll save money by cutting funds to the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County.

In both cases, those elected officials had passed on responsibilities of spending tax dollars for specific tasks. They didn't always have an easy time tracking those funds, and commissioners and councilors say they want to be sure they're serving the people who elected them.

Money is scarce, and it's good to know that the leaders in this county take their responsibility to the taxpayers seriously.

Nothing but the best for elected officials

New Mexicans, like taxpayers generally around the country, have been outraged at the expensive vacation flights of John Sununu, the White House Chief of Staff, Sununu, who always goes first class in government-owned planes, is taking the rest of us for a ride.

But New Mexicans don't have to look to Washington DC to find some uncalled-for expenses. You only have to see as far as the Capitol in Santa Fe.

Several years ago, state government officials decided that asbestos, which as we all know by now can cause cancer, should be removed from the Capitol building.


In addition, the building had developed structural cracks, the committee rooms were too small and stuffy, and handicapped people couldn't open some of the doors.

So far, so good. Big committee rooms, to be sure, won't solve all the problems of public access to the Legislature so long as lawmakers continue to exempt themselves from the state's open meetings law. But adequate, comfortable rooms are a must.

And while experts disagree on whether removing asbestos is the best way to deal with the problem, enough knowledgeable people say it should be removed to warrant taking it out.

The problem with the Capitol renovation is that the Legislature, in deciding how fancy to make their home-away-from-home, didn't know when to say when.

The lawmakers decided to go first class. The renovation, for example, calls for some \$5.5 million to be spent on new furniture, painting and other interior fixtures and decor

of the building.

Well, not ALL the furniture will be new. About 20 percent can be refurbished.

The other 80 percent, according to a state official, will be replaced, with the old stuff going to various state agencies. Apparently it's still good enough for them.

The walnut doors around the Capitol are too dark, an official explained, so they will be replaced by a lighter-colored maple.

Colors were on the mind of Wayne Lloyd, a Santa Fe architect who headed a design session on the Capitol back in 1989. "Part of the problem now is that everything in the rotunda is just about the same color," he said.

The governor will get a new desk, which is intended to be a showpiece for New Mexico craftsmanship and no doubt will be. Legislators also will get new desks, though, apparently they won't be as unique.

when the renovation is completed — probably by late this year — the new interior design

of the building will be "an exciting mix of the old and the new," an architect predicted early in the renovation process.

How will we pay for this? A cranky taxpayer might wonder about the need for those new maple doors when he or she starts, on July 1, paying a five percent governmental gross receipts tax on the sewer and garbage bills.

These taxes, which will hit some fixed-income residents hard, were enacted by the 1991 Legislature.

*the tax increases passed by this year's legislative session will also require residents to pay the five percent on visits to zoos and swimming pool use in at least some municipalities.

The gross receipts tax, usually called the sales tax, is, as everyone knows, one of the most unfair taxes of all. Middle- and lower-income residents pay a greater percentage of their income in sales taxes than wealthy people do.

A showcase Capitol would be a welcome attraction if New Mexico didn't have so many pressing needs in health care, education, roads and services for people who can't make ends meet. There's a time and a place for everything — and now doesn't seem the time to pay for a lot of conveniences for our part-time legislators. Our legislators are travelling first class while most state residents are riding coach, if they can afford to board the plane at all.

Village's future depends on the State Highway Department

TO THE EDITOR:

This is a copy of the letter I sent to the State Highway Department on May 3. I hope its printing will encourage more Ruidoso residents to speak up by mail and at the next hearing. The future of their town depends on it. This is their last chance.

I am shocked at the total disregard for citizens' constitutional rights in this country. Supposedly, this is a government of the people, for the people, and by the people! Why, then, is it so hard for the Mayor, Council and the citizens of Ruidoso to be heard by their State government and its subsidiaries?

For several years, you have heard our objections to a major freeway through Ruidoso, a small mountain tourist town. Nevertheless, you have persisted in your

plans in spite of hearing from the very people who have to live with the consequences of your actions!

We moved here to get away from freeways and traffic running amok.

My husband and I have lived here for almost four years, and have observed three tourist seasons. Never have we seen traffic jams or traffic difficulties on Mechem Drive. The traffic moves comfortably and quite leisurely along, even in the peak seasons, and there are no long lines of traffic stalled or backed up anywhere in this town — ever!

No one is in a big hurry here, nor do we want them to get in a hurry. The idea is to allow them to see the charming shops along the main thoroughfares, since we are a town of only two main roads, and all the shops and restaurants are

on them, with very few exceptions.

Forget your paper statistics and listen to the 'natives' who know how those statistics manifest. If you're not here to 'crum the project down our throats' as Lou Medrano states, then listen to the project we want. It shouldn't have to be either do it your way or nothing! It should be a compromise that addresses our concerns.

A four-lane road without bicycle lanes or sidewalks would be quite ample for our needs, with a 35-mile per hour speed set in town, and 45-miles on the outskirts. I have never seen a bicycle on Mechem Drive, so if there are any, they are few and far between. Most people get their exercise in the subdivisions or on the back roads. It is not a road that people walk on, since the shopping areas are widely dispersed and re-

quire automobile transportation, so sidewalks are totally ridiculous.

In the winter, the merchants don't plow their entrances, so it is already difficult to get into stores in bad weather. Why make it worse by increasing the grades — or by eliminating businesses altogether?

Our main roads are the lifeline for our businesses — we can't afford to lose any territory to your 'city-sized' plan! Let us use the money saved to build proper sidewalks on Sudderth Drive, our main shopping district. We beg you to help us preserve our charming, safe, provincial environment — but to improve it wisely at the same time. Why should that be too much to ask?




Gardenia is an easy plant to grow

DEAR SALLY,

Gardenias are my very favorite flower. I recently purchased a real beauty, loaded with blooms and buds.

Actually, on the way home, the buds began to droop; soon the blooms had turned brown and all the buds were gone. Now it is only alive. Please help me.

DEAR KELLY'S MOM,

Given all the proper growing conditions, the Gardenia (*Jasminoides yitchii*) is an easy plant to grow. However, providing all the right growing conditions is the hard part. They are outside plants and unfortunately, not an easy plant to grow inside, still, if you can master the technique for growing, you will have gloriously scented, waxy white blooms with handsome, glossy green leaves.

Since you say there are no pests or diseases, you can find on your new plant, the problem, no doubt, is where and how the plant is grown. I will give you some basic rules to follow to grow a healthy gardenia plant.

Soil: Fast drainage is absolutely essential but also retain moisture. The roots need lots of freedom for air circulation to allow oxygen to get to the roots. I suggest you report your

plant immediately to a five-gallon size pot. Add plastic chunks about six inches deep in the bottom and use a mixture of a third peat moss, a third sharp sand and a third regular potting soil and add some vermiculite to provide a means for oxygen to get to the roots.

Water: Soil must be kept moist at all times — never soggy. Never allow the soil to completely dry out — better to use distilled water or leach salts by monthly flooding. Small frequent waterings are best and spray plant often with room temperature distilled water. The air near the plant should be kept warm and humid. Keep the plant on a tray of wet pebbles and a bucket of fresh, clean water near the plant for extra humidity.

Light: Indoors, gardenias bloom in a location with at least four hours of direct sunlight and 50 percent humidity. So give your plant a

south or west exposure with a grow bulb mounted on the ceiling directly above the plant. This plant must have proper light. The overhead light is an absolute must, plus your gardenia will love the little extra warmth from the light.

Temperature: For success, two levels of temperature must be a part of growing conditions. Plants fail to grow and bloom well without summer heat and the coolness of winter. Don't let temperature fall below 60 degrees in winter and up to about 85 degrees in summer.

Fertilize: Feed every three or four weeks during the growing season, with ACID plant food, fish emulsion and/or bone meal. If pale green, treat this iron deficiency with iron sulfate or iron chelate. Old plants frequently fail to bloom and are best discarded and replaced with new nursery stock, but do not fertilize new plants for about six months. Prune faded flowers and scraggly branches.

Pests: Aphids and those creepy little cotton headed mealy buds need to be checked for at daily watering time. It is safe to use an all-purpose spray or dust to control these pests.



Kansas Futurity time trials kick off 79-day racing meet

The only juvenile quarter horse Grade I winners in the nation—Special Task and Steppin For The Moon—both drew into Thursday's first day of Kansas Futurity time trials as this 79-day summer meeting begins with the first of two consecutive days of trials.

A total of 217 2-year-olds are set to contest the trials in 11 different heats on both Thursday and Friday. The 10 fastest qualifiers advance to the May 26 Kansas Futurity, a Grade I test at 350 yards.

Defending training champion Jack Brooks, who set a Ruidoso Downs record last season by saddling 57 winners, is represented by 26 Kansas hopefuls.

Brooks' best known entrants, however, are Special Task and Steppin For The Moon. Special Task, a brown son of Special Effort, captured the \$172,747 West Texas Futurity by a nose on March 17 at Sunland Park. Special Task drew into Thursday's second race, and should be a prohibitive favorite with leading quarter horse jockey Jacky Martin in the saddle.

Steppin For The Moon, a chestnut son of Moon Lark, was equally impressive capturing the \$167,233 Sun Country Futurity on April 21 by a half-length against the previously undefeated Sis Special Heart. Steppin For The Moon drew the 4 post position in Thursday's third race. Martin is the rider.

The third heat also drew Driftin Tellsack from the barn of Brent Davidson. The son of thoroughbred sire No Drift was quite impressive while defeating Special Task in his trial heat for the West Texas. He finished fifth in the finals after a horrible break.

The fourth division of trials is headed by another Brooks' trainee, first-time starter Pullasix. Brooks is quite high on this full-brother to multiple stakes winner Pullastreak. Martin gets the riding assignment.

Another first-time starter with impressive credentials surfaces in the fifth heat—Dashes Bandit. The colt is owned by James Helzer and trained by Dwayne Gilbreath, who teamed with win last year's All American Futurity with Refrigerator.

Capitan

These horse lovers like seeing spots

On a plateau overlooking the small Village of Capitan, Nell and Ed Davis are trying to fulfill a family dream of operating a successful horse boarding, breeding and training stable.

The dream nearly turned into a nightmare last July 3 when Davis lost consciousness and fell 16 feet, suffering a concussion and multiple broken bones.

But the Davises and their 22-year-old daughter, Susan, are gambling that the fates are with them this time.

And it looks like their bet is starting to pay off. Munching oats in his stall down a small dirt road from the apartment they lease on the G.D. Draper ranch, stands a stallion Appaloosa appropriately stable-named Gambler.

He's a two-time world champion and the centerpiece of High Mesa Ranch.

But it wasn't his bloodline that interested the Davises when they bought Gambler in 1986 as a yearling in Carlsbad. They were trying to fill the empty space in their daughter's life left by the death of her first Appaloosa, Pistol, who was struck by lightning.

"It was a black and white Appaloosa and we've never been able to find a black and white again," Davis said.

The descendants of horses brought to the new world by the Spanish, the Appaloosa is described as a rugged saddle horse.

Its hooves are striped vertically, but it's the Appaloosa's mottled skin markings that distinguish it from other horses. It's character-

ized by a patch of white over its rump that is blotched or dotted with a darker color.

Originally from Oklahoma, Davis taught most of his life. Mrs. Davis also was a teacher for about eight years.

They were teachers locally in 1984-85. But it wasn't until they moved from Ruidoso that they bought Susan her first horse.

"It always was Susan's dream to have horses," Davis said. "It gets into the blood."

When Pistol died, Susan said she wasn't going to give up. She already owned three mares and the family started looking for a stallion.

They checked out an Appaloosa in Carlsbad, but it was so muddy, they could tell if he was spotted or not.

After they saw videos of the big blood bay with the blaze and a blotted rump, they thought "this could be the one," Davis said.

"Originally, the owner wanted an outrageous price (for Gambler), but she needed the money for a filly she was running and kept coming down," he said. "We paid in dollar bills we had earned operating a municipal swimming pool the previous summer."

"It definitely was cold cash, because we stored it in the freezer."

Susan also handed over the paycheck from her summer job.

"The horse had never been loaded into a trailer and I was ready for a real battle, but he just turned in and loaded. I couldn't believe it," Davis said. That was just a preview of Gambler's unexpected good nature.

"From the beginning, people noticed him," Mrs. Davis said. He

qualified for world champion by his second show, yet he was never shown or trained by anyone before.

"We didn't realize what we had stumbled on," Davis said.

"We didn't realize the star background until the 1986 National Horse Show in Albuquerque."

A trainer from Arizona saw the impressive bay with a blanket (a term used to describe the solid color up front and spotted back) and wanted to handle him, but the family couldn't afford the steep \$400 a month fee.

"He started asking about Gambler's blood lines. We really didn't know, but so many people wanted to train him, we went back and pulled his pedigree," Davis said. Gambler's real name is Banner Bright's Joker.

"It turned out the horse that starred in the movie, 'The Appaloosa,' was Gambler's great grandsire Cojo Rojo, who had received \$10-million worth of training."

"Gambler looks so much like him it's unreal," he said.

The Davises began to realize that with Gambler's bloodline and his fine showings at competitions, hefty stud fees were possible.

They discovered that another great grandsire was Banner Bill, a well-known California race horse.

Susan joined the Marines in May 1988. She asked her parents to care for the horses while she was gone.

By this time, Davis had unsuccessfully tried operating his own business. It was difficult to line up a job where he could use his master's degree. They moved to Sherman, Texas, where he worked

at whatever type of job he could find.

Meanwhile Gambler was piling up the honors and siring a whole new generation of little Gamblers.

The first time he competed in the two-year-old halter division in 1986, he finished in the upper bracket as world champion.

Then on July 3, Davis fell 16 feet while working in an attic in Texas.

"It was full of fiberglass and very hot," he said. "I think I must have passed out. I apparently bounced and hit my head three times. I don't remember anything. I was in intensive care for three days."

Davis fractured his hip, suffered a brain concussion, his teeth were loosened, and his retina became detached.

"I never had been to a doctor before," he said. Mentally, it was hard to adjust to the limitations and inactivity.

"The only thing that has helped keep my sanity is the horses," he said.

Then on August 15, while Davis was in the hospital for the second time recovering from a collapsed lung, severe infection and pneumonia, he received a job offer from Ruidoso High School Athletic Director Ronny Maskew.

"I told him he was hiring a cripple," Davis said. He arrived in Ruidoso using a wheelchair and walker.

It was five months before he could get out with the horses again, Davis said. In November, Gambler won a world champion designation again, this time in suitability dressage.

The next month, Susan was shipped to Saudi Arabia.

By the time of her father's accident, the family's horse stock had grown to 24. Before she left, she asked her parents to try to hang on to as many horses as possible.

"But we had to sell a bunch off to survive," Davis said. "If it hadn't been for friends, we would have lost everything. As it was, we sold 11 horses, including the colts."

Today, Davis still bears a great deal of pain, but he walks without aids.

And the family has started to rebuild its stock by breeding Gambler with well-chosen mares. The only problem is that there aren't many Appaloosas in the area.

"A lot of people still think of them as a jugheaded ugly horse that Indians used to ride," Davis said. "But once people see Gambler, they change their minds."

and has a following including ranch owner Draper, who leases the stables and stream-crossed, 64-acres to the Davises.

The couple had been living in Ruidoso. They kept their horses in Ruidoso Downs and at a stable in Texas.

"Some people who knew our circumstances talked to (a local real estate broker) who had friends in Capitan," Davis said. "The price for buying land was too high and this worked out perfectly."

"They've done everything in the world to help us."

Gambler's been having the time of his life being used for stud with other mares as well as the Davises stock.

Roman Val, one of Gambler's mares that recently delivered a foal, is one-half thoroughbred, the granddaughter of Kentucky Derby winner Tomy Lee.

"Gambler really was bred to be a racehorse," Davis said. "He's been clocked (in a three-quarter mile race) at 37 miles per hour with saddle and a 200-pound man on his back."

Gambler's first offspring, Candy (real name Banner Bright's Quavo), was named the 1989 National Champion of the Indian Horse Association in Marshall, Texas, beating out several stallions, Davis said.

The two-year-old also is considered to be promising racing stock.

Davis said he was approached by a prestigious training outfit that wanted to handle her. "But her knees were still open and I decided to just show her and wait" instead

of taking a chance of injuring her, he said.

Another of Gambler's offspring, Quavo-Deck-Bar, currently is leading in the national competition for most colorful at halter.

Painted Cloud, a red speckled mare (called a red leopard) that stands 16.1 hands high, is a favorite of Mrs. Davis. The mare was named 1990 World Champion at halter in Appaloosa competition and was reserve champion at a Fort Worth show.

"I was offered \$5,000 for her, but I just couldn't sell her," she said.

In another pasture patiently tending her colt Banner Bright's Dust is another national champion, Ima-K-Bar. A traditional gray Appaloosa, the mare "throws pretty foals. They look like Gambler," Mrs. Davis said.

In the stable, is a yearling called Banner Bright's Star, Gambler's son.

"One of our major goals is to breed champion horses," Davis said. And the family appears to be well on its way.

"People don't understand that we don't have \$200 and \$300 horses," he said. "They run from \$1,500 up, depending on their credits."

High Mesa now is ready to accept other horses for boarding, training and breeding.

And the Davises are looking forward to their daughter returning from the Middle East. They're sure she's going to feel right at home, Davis said.

"She told us that the first thing she's going to do is ride."

The premier attraction at Mescalero is the Inn of the Mountain Gods, a 230-room world-class resort hotel with a panoramic lakeside

and mountain view.

The championship golf course challenges golfers. Guests have a choice of recreational activities, including swimming, tennis, paddle boating, fishing, big game hunts and video gaming.

Right down the road from the Inn is Bingo of Mescalero where players compete for big cash prizes.

Powwows and other events are staged regularly at the Community Center, and the public is invited to a number of activities during the annual Fourth of July Rodeo and festivities.

God's country is outdoors, any and all the time. Sitting on a park bench and just enjoying the Rio Ruidoso and nature's wonders is good enough for many Ruidoso lovers in the summer time.

The younger set, however, demands more action and that is also available in this resort community.

Every age can enjoy horseback riding. The Ruidoso area offers a choice of five private stables and thousands of different trails and scenery, including a view of Bonito Lake and Sierra Blanca.

Most stables offer rides from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. and range in price from \$7.50 to \$8.50.

A carnival atmosphere invades this tourist town in the summer, especially with the heavy Midtown traffic and the two arcades on Sudderth.

Fun Tracksters is a top of the line go-cart track complete with overpass. This training ground on a miniature highway is designed to save the family car at a low cost. Tickets are \$250 for about six minutes and about 20 laps.

Small carts are available for ages 3-9, and larger carts for 9 and up. An arcade is inside the waiting building. Call 257-7081.

Indoor bumper cars at the Y-Knot Park at the intersection of U.S. 70 and Sudderth Drive are an attraction. Race cars will whiz around outside. Also, an indoor 18-hole carpet golf course is in sight at that location along with a video game setup and snack bar.

The most sophisticated miniature golf course anywhere is Pan-O-Rama Mini-Golf located on Eagle Drive on the banks of the Rio Ruidoso.

This course combines miniature golf and a walk through a plush park at the same time. Open from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. seven days a week, this town favorite costs \$2.80

for adults, \$2.50 for kids and senior citizens. Dogs are free. Call 257-7164.

Holiday Carpet Golf is located on Sudderth Drive, across from the Lincoln County Medical Center.

Holiday accommodates its customers from 10 a.m. to 11 p.m. or until the people are all gone. A round costs \$2.75 for adults and \$2.50 for kids.

A step up from miniature golf is the Executive Golf Course at Rainbow Lake. This course features roughs and water hazards. A round of Executive Golf will cost \$3.

and one hardball cage help sharpen your skills. The hardball cage is not for wimps. Taken for the batting cages are \$1 and that buys you 18 swats.



This undulating course with tall pines, a picture perfect lake and breathtaking vistas is operated by Jim Colbert Inc. If you walk away with a good score, you've earned it.

Check it out, 7,003 yards from the blues. The toughest hole is the number seven's monster 581-yarder. Rated 72 on this par 72, Dode Forester is the golf pro. Economically priced with a variety of options, call 258-5330.

Cree Meadows Golf course and Country Club is a forgiving course, excellent for walking, and remains the most popular golf course in the area.

Cree's course is 5,766 yards long, is rated a 67.9 and plays a par 71.

The 348-yard, par 4, eleventh hole is rated as the number one handicap hole on the course.

P.G.A. Professional Jack Warlick oversees the course and a full-line pro shop. For tee times, call 257-5815.

The Alto Lakes Golf and Country Club is a private course for members and their guests.

One of America's most scenic courses, the 6,059-yard course is rated at 68.5 for the regular men's tees and plays to a par 71.

The 523-yard, par 5, fourteenth hole is rated as a number one hand-


icap hole. Alto's course pro is P.G.A. Professional Chuck Dunn.

The Hubbards present a world class art show

The Second Annual Hubbard Art Award for Excellence will bring together this nation's finest realistic artists May 31 through June 1, in Ruidoso Downs.

When Joan Dale and R.D. Hubbard presented artist Howard Terpin with their quarter of a million dollar art award last June, it was the culmination of countless hours of work and preparation.

It started with the Hubbards' dream which came true through their dedication and support, backed up with lots of hard work.

The First Hubbard Art Award for Excellence fulfilled the Hubbards' goal of recognizing the finest of America's representational artists.

"The show and gala were met with even more enthusiasm than expected," reads a news release provided by the Hubbard Museum.

Masters in the genre of realism will be arriving in Ruidoso from all over the world to exhibit their works created especially for the purchase award of \$250,000. The Hubbards will present the award during a gala on June 1.

The art will be on display throughout the weekend, and that exhibit will include works of five artists from the Soviet Union.

One piece from each participating artist will be displayed from mid-June through Labor Day weekend in the Hubbard Museum's Turf Club Gallery at Ruidoso

Downs Race Track. Hundreds of volunteer and staff hours have already contributed to the coordination of the project which promises to be even more extraordinary than the last, continues the release.

In addition to the individual volunteers serving on the Hubbard Museum Art Council, the museum is asking the real estate community to contribute three host homes for the artists visiting from the Soviet Union.

Tickets are now available for the Second Annual Hubbard Art Award for Excellence.

Tickets are \$185 per person and may be purchased by contacting the Hubbard Museum.

Camp, hike, fish and be happy

Rising out of the Tularosa Basin, the Sacramento Mountains offer an inviting refuge from steaming temperatures in the summer and transform into a skier's delight during winter months.

As the crown jewel of the Sacramentos, Ruidoso is surrounded by outdoor recreational opportunities in the Lincoln National Forest, White Mountain Wilderness and nearby Capitan Mountains Wilderness.

Activities may be tailored to an individual's physical condition. High ridges and peaceful meadows may be reached by hiking or on horseback. Fishing lines can be cast into tranquil lakes or fast-running streams.

Camping overnight can be as simple as driving to a campground or throwdown area along one of the forest roads. For rugged adventure and backpacking, more than 200 miles of trails crisscross the remote White Mountain Wilderness and other mountain ranges in the Smokey Bear Ranger District.

Camping

In addition to numerous private campgrounds in the area, six campgrounds and one picnic area have been developed in the Lincoln National Forest within an hour and a half drive of Ruidoso. They are supervised by the Smokey Bear Ranger District, which is headquartered at 901 Mechem Drive and can provide waterproof maps of the wilderness area and other useful information.

Situated off U.S. 54 between Carrizozo and Alamogordo, Three Rivers Campground is the farthest from Ruidoso. Lying at the base of the White Mountain Wilderness, its lower elevation allows the campground to remain open year-round while the others at higher elevations only are open during the summer season.

Visitors can connect to U.S. 54 by driving west from Ruidoso on State Highway 48 and 37 to Carrizozo and then turning south, or they can take U.S. 70 to Tularosa and head north.

The campground features six campsites. Trailers under 16 feet are permitted. Campers should bring their own drinking water, but restrooms are available. The maximum length of stay for all campgrounds is 14 days.

An interesting stop near the campground on Forest Road 679 is Three Rivers Petroglyphs Park managed by the Federal Bureau of Land Management.

After munching picnic snacks, visitors can climb a panoramic ridge etched with more than 5,000 figures and symbols left by the Jornada Mogollon people, descended from the nomadic tribesmen who inhabited south-central New Mexico from 6,000 B.C. No one is sure why the Indians created the figures or what they mean, but the park presents a unique chance to sit among the ancients under the imposing gaze of Sierra Blanca peak.

South Fork Campground, with 60 camping sites, is the largest of the six campgrounds in the Smokey Bear District. Located near Bonito Lake, it is the only one that requires a fee, \$6 payable at the gate.

Drinking water and restrooms are available. Trailers under 22 feet are allowed. The campground usually is managed between May and September.

But this summer, South Fork is scheduled to close early on July 22 for reconstruction work.

South Fork may be reached from Ruidoso by taking State Highway 48 north to Highway 37, then turn-

ing on Forest Road 107 leading around Bonito Lake.

Monjeau and Skyline campgrounds offer campers a taste of high altitude at 9,500 and 9,000 feet respectively. To reach those campgrounds, take Highway 48 north from Ruidoso to Ski Run Road. From there, follow the signs to Forest Road 117.

Skyline, about nine miles up the mountain from the turnoff, has 17 campsites. Trailers under 16 feet are allowed if they can navigate the sometimes bumpy and rock-strewn road, which can be tricky.

Monjeau, about one mile farther up, has four campsites and trailers under 16 feet are allowed. Campers should bring their own drinking and washing water. Vault type restrooms are available.

Once settled in at the campgrounds, visitors should venture a bit higher up the rocky road to Monjeau Lookout. The platform below the fire spotting tower affords an awesome view of the Sacramentos and of the Capitan, a unique range of mountains that run east to west. The Capitan rises nearly 50 miles of wilderness trails.

Ladybugs also seem to favor the lookout area, congregating so thickly that at times they blanket the rocky outcrops of the mountain.

Located just off Ski Run Road on the way to Ski Apache, Oak Grove Campground is situated at an elevation of 9,000 feet above sea level.

Oak Grove has 29 campsites. Trailers of less than 16-feet are allowed. Campers should bring their own water, but restrooms are available.

If a picnic is what you're after, a large group shelter and more than 20 scattered single tables are just a short drive from the middle of Ruidoso at the Cedar Creek Picnic Area behind the Smokey Bear District Ranger station on Mechem Drive.

Opened officially from May through September, the picnic area is a favorite of year-round residents, who often stop by on lunch breaks even in the middle of winter. Drinking water and restrooms are available, but overnight camping is not allowed.

Just up the road from the picnic area, the Skyline Campground has three large shelters. They are handicap accessible with water and restrooms. The large shelters are separated by natural landscaping, creating privacy but also allowing later access for groups that may use all three areas. Up to 30 people can be accommodated at one time.

Fire rings have been created and grills have been erected for cooking. Parking places are sized for motor homes and trailers as well as cars.

Tents may be set up at random, but no trenching is allowed.

The group campsites may only be used by reservation. Contact the ranger station on Mechem or call (505) 387-4305.

Forest Ranger Sam Tobias said Memorial Day, the Fourth of July and Labor Day are the busiest times of the year at the campgrounds. He recommends checking with the ranger station about the campgrounds on those holiday weekends.

People unfamiliar with Ruidoso also should check with the rangers for camping information. The



Angling for fish

Smokey Bear Station is open from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on weekdays from Memorial Day through Labor Day. It is open on Saturday from 8 a.m. to noon and from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m.

Maps of the Lincoln National Forest and its campgrounds are available at the station for \$2.

Hiking

More than 300 miles of trails in the Lincoln National Forest offer chances for hiking, horseback riding and motorcycling.

Many of the trails, as well as miles of old railroad grades, are used by cross-country skiers and snowmobilers in the winter.

About 83,000 acres of wilderness are available for users who wish to experience the ultimate in getting away from it all.

The White Mountain Wilderness and the newer Capitan Mountains Wilderness are located on the spines of rugged mountain ranges, and offer spectacular views to those willing and able to work for them.

Travel in the wilderness is restricted to foot and horse traffic. No motorized vehicles or mountain bikes are allowed.

Nine major trails tread the ridges and valleys in the White Mountain Wilderness. They range from less than one mile to more than 21 miles. Some climb only a few hundred feet while others entail climbs of more than 3,000 feet. The top elevation is over 10,000 feet.

The Mills Trail, number 22, is a 4.7 mile long trail that climbs 2,560 feet above Bonito Canyon to Monjeau Lookout. The trailhead, which marks the entrance to the trail, is accessible from Forest Road 107.

The South Fork Trail, number 19, climbs 2,880 feet from South Fork Campground to Crest Trail. A stream near the six mile long trail invites hikers to stop and enjoy its cool waters. The trailhead is accessible by Forest Road 107 and 107C.

The Bonito Trail, number 36, and the Argentina Trail, number 39, both leave the Bonito-Argentina Trailhead and break in different directions along mountain streams.

The Argentina Trail provides the shorter of the two, going 2.5 miles and climbing 1,280 feet to Crest Trail. The Bonito travels 4.6 miles and climbs 1,600 feet, also to Crest. The two trails may be reached by



Museum of the Horse offers sneak preview

Anne C. Stradling could have had her pick of spots when she looked for a new home for the Museum of the Horse.

But, what better home for a horse museum than Ruidoso Downs, home of the world's richest quarter horse race? She thought so, and her entire museum has been transferred from Patagonia, Arizona, to Ruidoso Downs.

Gary Miller, director of the Anne C. Stradling Museum of the Horse, and his wife, Dee Miller, couldn't be happier.

Stradling had talked to several nationally-known museums before she was contacted by R.D. Hubbard's representatives and settled on the Hubbard Museum as a home for her collection of carriages and sleighs, saddles, paintings, photographs and other items relating to the horse.

The collection, with its 10,000-plus items, is one-of-a-kind and is expected to draw visitors from all over the world to this mountain resort.

The Millers, Ron Smith and Bill Jones are hard at work preparing a small part of the exhibit to be on display in the Hubbard Museum at the Turf Club on opening day at the

aces, Thursday, May 9, and through the end of May.

The exhibit will be open to the public from 8:30 a.m. to 10 a.m. on racedays and from 10:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. on non-racedays until the end of May.

"We really want the community to have a chance to see this collection," said Dee Miller. This small preview will give area residents an idea of what an impressive display will be gathered in the Anne C. Stradling Museum of the Horse when it opens in 1992.

Coordinating the transfer of the museum items, planning and coordinating the museum and overseeing the refurbishing of displays is a piece of cake for the Millers.

Gary Miller worked for 14 years on the Lincoln project where he created a museum from the ground up for the Lincoln County Heritage Trust. He was at the helm as that historic town was restored as a tourist attraction and a state treasure.

Miller was nominated for a President's Award for his achievements in Lincoln.

He said this project is pretty parallel to the Lincoln work.

Forest Road 107.

Crest Trail begins at two different locations and travels 21.7 miles through the width of the White Mountain Wilderness from Tanbark Canyon to Monjeau Lookout. It provides some of the most panoramic views available in the wilderness. The two trailheads are accessible by either Forest Road 108 or Forest Road 117.

Nogal Trail, number 48, is relatively short at 1.2 miles and climbs 780 feet from Nogal Canyon to the Nogal/Tortolita Trail, number 54. The Nogal trailhead is accessible by both Forest Road 108 and 400.

The Three Rivers Trail, number 44, logs more feet in elevation than any other trail in the wilderness. It climbs 3,440 feet in 5.6 miles from the Three Rivers Campground to Crest Trail. The trailhead is accessible by U.S. 54 and Forest Road 579. Hikers should have an adequate water supply since no source of drinking water is available at the campground or on Crest Trail.

The shortest of the major routes is Scenic Trail, number 15, which leaves the Ski Apache parking lot at a marked trailhead and goes less than a mile in its 300 foot trip to Crest Trail.


In addition to the trails in the White Mountain Wilderness, there are 11 major trails in the Capitan Wilderness; three in the Patos Mountains, three in the Carrizo Mountains and Vera Cruz Mountains and three in the Jicarilla Mountains, all in the area around the small community of White Oaks.

More than half of the trails in the Smokey Bear District are non-motorized. Off-road and off-trail travel is not permitted by vehicles in the Lincoln National Forest. The restriction is necessary to protect soil and water, vegetation and wildlife, Tobias said.

Vehicles must remain on roads and trails marked by numbered signs. These signs are located at intersections and other prominent places. Most closed roads and trails are physically barricaded or gated, but others are identified by the absence of a sign.

Roads may be traveled by any vehicle; motorized trails are open to hikers, horses and vehicles less than 40 inches wide unless otherwise restricted. Vehicles may travel up to 300 feet from open roads to reach primitive campground sites,

unless doing so would result in damage to the resource, Tobias said.



A travel map showing what trails are motorized and those that are not, is available at the ranger station for \$1. For people who are backpacking or who want to locate the more obscure trails, pick up a waterproof map for \$4.

Riding

White Mountain Wilderness visitors may choose to use their own saddles and pack stock or those of an outfitter for a daytime or overnight trek into the wilderness. If properly managed, use of a horse can be a rewarding experience without harming the surrounding environment.

Pack animals and saddle stock will be limited to 15 for any overnight party entering the wilderness. Proper planning and use of lightweight food and equipment can reduce the number of animals necessary for carrying supplies.

Horseback riding stables include: Cowboy's in Ruidoso Downs, Buddies on Gavilan Canyon Road, Bonito Stables, and Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Fishing

While local fishing holes are not abundant, they are available if you know where to find them.

Bonito Creek, Bonito Lake, Eagle Creek, Alto Lake, Grindstone

Lake and the Rio Ruidoso all offer excellent trout fishing opportunities. They are stocked annually by the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish with up to 2,000 rainbow trout measuring 10 1/2 inches in length.

Salmon eggs, power bait and worms are the most popular baits. Minnows are prohibited in trout waters of the area.

All anglers over the age of 11 must have a current fishing license. A year-long license for residents of New Mexico is \$8.50 and \$14 with a trout validation.

You may buy a trout-water validation at the time you buy your fishing license, but if you buy without validation, then later decide to fish in trout waters, you must buy a trout stamp, which runs \$5.75 for residents and \$7 for non-residents.

For non-residents, a year-long license runs \$18.50 and \$25.50 with a trout validation.

Junior-senior and temporary licenses also are available. Junior-senior licenses are for youngsters 12-13 years old and for those anglers over 65. They cost \$1.50 for warm waters and \$4.50 with trout validation.

Temporary licenses are good for one and five days. A one-day license is \$5.25 for warm waters and \$8.50 with trout validations; five day licenses are \$10.50 and \$15, respectively.

tively. Those fishermen who cast their lines in the Lincoln National Forest and surrounding Bureau of Land Management controlled water also will have to purchase a Wildlife Habitat Improvement Stamp.

The \$5.25 stamp is required for Eagle Creek, Three Rivers, all waters within the White Mountain Wilderness, certain sections of Bonito Creek and all waters in the Capitan Mountains. It is not required to fish Bonito Lake, Alto Lake or the Rio Ruidoso.

Money derived from the sale of the stamp will be used to complete habitat improvement projects to benefit all types of wildlife. The state daily fishing limit is eight.

Fines for fishing without a license may run from \$50 to \$500 and up to six months in jail.

Fishing opportunities also are available on the Mescalero Apache Reservation on Eagle Lake, Silver Lake, the upper Rio Ruidoso and Lake Mescalero.

Mescalero Apache Reservation fishing permits cover all seasons. The charge is \$4 for all but Lake Mescalero, which is \$8.

For those who don't want to work too hard for their fish, Conley's Trout Lake is located four miles east of the Ruidoso Race Track.

The walk begins and ends at Eagle Creek Sports Complex just off State Highway 48 near Junction 532 up Ski Run Road. Registration is available at the start/finish point from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. both Saturday and Sunday. Cost to register is \$6 to earn a medal or just \$1.50 for IVV credit. Walkers may also walk free, but only those who pay the registration fee will be eligible to receive an award.

This event is open to everyone, but children under 12 must be accompanied by an adult. Dogs must be kept on a leash.

Free tea and water will be provided at the start-finish point and

at checkpoints. German sausage, rolls and other goodies will be sold at the start/finish, and snacks will be available for sale at the checkpoints.

Mountainmarschers, a member of the American Volkssport Association, is an organization of Volkssport walkers that has members all over the world.

Volkssporting evolved from running races in Germany when those events became too competitive and the clubs changed the events to be non-competitive.

In Volkssport, which means the sport of the people, everyone is a winner.

People of all ages join in Mountainmarscher events — from grandmom and grandpop to the baby and even the dog. Volksmar-ches are organized to appeal to everyone.

All participants walk the established course at their own pace and everyone who finishes is a winner and receives a medal, patch or other award.

Celebrate National Fitness and Sports Month this May by walking in the Mountainmarschers spring volksmarch.



But, there are other forms of entertainment, available under roof, for vacationers, summer residents and permanent residents.

From tuning in to a country western band at a night spot in Ruidoso or Ruidoso Downs or visiting the Flying J Ranch in Alto for a meal and western show, to a bridge game at the Ruidoso Woman's Club, long-term or short-term visitors have a number of options.

They can even join a bowling league if they're going to be around for awhile.

Or, Silver Fox Aerobics is offered at the Senior Citizens Center which is located in School House Park behind the library. Ceramics for older Americans is an option at the Center.

And around the county . . . — Smokey Bear Country —

Welcome to Capitan, birthplace of Smokey Bear.

From the time the orphan bear cub was found clinging to a burned tree in the Capitan Mountains in the 1950s, this close-knit community has taken pride in being the keeper of his tradition and memory.

Read Smokey's story on official historic markers on New Mexico 48 from Ruidoso to Capitan. Your first stop in Capitan will be the Smokey Bear Historical State Park at 118 First Street.

The Park features indoor displays of the origins of fire prevention, the concept of Smokey Bear and other related displays.

Outside, walk the self-guided nature trail featuring native plants, rocks and plaques explaining flora and fauna. A prominent stop on the nature trail is the grave of the original Smokey Bear.

In addition, the Park maintains a children's playground and tennis courts.

A short walk down First Street brings you to a small log cabin nestled behind a rock wall. This is the Smokey Bear Museum, the first repository of Smokey memorabilia. Built in 1960, the Museum operates independently of the Park and was built with donated land, materials and volunteer community labor.

Find such treasures as original photos of little Smokey, personal accounts of his discovery, and even the baby bottle that fed the orphan cub. The Museum also sells officially-licensed Smokey souvenirs.

Summer hours for the park are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. seven days a week and for the Museum, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. seven days a week beginning May 27. Before May 27, the Park is open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Friday through Tuesday.

The Park charges nominal admission; the Museum is free. Both have handicapped access.

Continue walking along First Street and find craft shops, lodging,

an RV park, restaurants, a gas station, bank, post office and other visitor amenities.

In addition to its Smokey Bear connection, Capitan also typifies small-town Americana. For example, the entire town turns out for Fourth of July festivities including a three-day rodeo, barbecue, dance and parade in which the entire county participates.

Then, in early August, the eyes of the entire county center on the Lincoln County Fair, located near the county's geographical center, Capitan.

Crafts, art, canned goods and fresh produce combine with 4-H exhibits and livestock displays to produce an old-fashioned, blue-ribboned, down-home event.

Only a few short years away is the 50th anniversary of finding Smokey. Already Capitan folks are starting to celebrate with dinners, craft fairs and other events.

Visit Capitan now and join in the fun!



Smokey Bear Country

Relive old Lincoln's colorful history

Visitors step back in time in the quiet historic community of Lincoln.

Except for the paved highway

lined with shiny cars, Lincoln doesn't appear to have changed much in the last 100 years.

Footsteps still echo on wooden

porches, thick-walled adobes cool summer visitors, and hoop-skirted women smile from shaded doorways.

For Lincoln is a town so steeped in history that it became living history through the efforts of its residents and others. Preservation ordinances guide its future so that visitors who want to experience life in the 1880s need only park their cars and walk its tree-lined paths.

"Our chief commercial attraction is our non-commercialism," says a State Monument Ranger at the old Courthouse, one of Lincoln's many restored buildings. "This is the authentic Old West. You won't find rubber tomahawks or sidewalk Coke machines here."

Lincoln attracted 50,000 visitors last year, said the ranger, who expects a 25 percent increase this year.

In this computer age, why does this remote community fascinate the public?

Two reasons, say its fans.

First is Lincoln's connection with Billy the Kid, the young outlaw whose legend and popularity fan popular imagination. Held prisoner in that same Courthouse, Billy escaped by killing two deputies. Those bullet holes are still in the walls.

Locals have performed the "Last Escape of Billy the Kid" every August for nearly 40 years.

Second is Lincoln's role in the Lincoln County Wars of the 1880s. Roadside plaques outline the story of the feud based on business and greed. A 12-minute slide presentation at the Historical Center down the road at the opposite end of town from the Courthouse fleshes out the story.

By now the visitor feels "beamed down" to the 1880s, so walking to Dr. Woods's house to view his surgery or over to Tunstall's Store stacked with shelves of original merchandise seems in step with the era.

But don't let turn-of-the-century feeling fool you. Lots happens in

Lincoln.

The Historical Center and several historic buildings and museums are open to the public from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily. A \$4.50 ticket provides admission to all attractions open that day for self-guided tours. That ticket also includes two options, a guided walking tour with a costumed interpreter at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. and a narration of Billy's escape at the Courthouse at 10 a.m., 2 p.m. and 3:30 p.m.

In addition, on selected weekends beginning in June, the Historical Center presents special events that include story tellers, living history performers, Apache dancers and more. Call the Center at 653-4025 for details.

Visiting Lincoln is easy. From Ruidoso, take NM 48 north to Capitan, then US 380 east to Lincoln. Expect visitor amenities but without an 1880s flavor.

For example, spend the night, not at a chain motel, but in an 1870-ish hotel or a bed and breakfast.

The Wortley Hotel's eight rooms have brass beds, private baths and antique furniture.

The Wortley was built in 1960 to replace its burned predecessor.

Bed and breakfast patrons sleep in historic buildings that date from the turn of the century, the Ellis Store and Casa de Patron, or at Sally Black's.

From its newly-remodeled kitchen, the Wortley serves lunches and breakfasts seven days a week and dinners Thursday, Friday, and Saturday evenings. Expect homebaked breads and desserts prepared and served by period-costumed cooks and waiters.

"We'll even serve historical menus," says the hotel proprietors, the Newells.

"Robert Ollinger was eating a roast beef sandwich with mashed potatoes right before Billy shot him, and that dish is on our menu!"

Other visitor amenities in Lincoln include a campsite three miles west of town, a post office and one pay phone — and it's only a dime.



Old Lincoln

'Zozo combines old with new

Where can you golf, bowl, visit a lava flow, ghost town and historic buildings or examine the roots of ancient cultures?

Surprise — in and around Carrizozo, county seat of Lincoln County, approximately 45 minutes from Ruidoso.

Located at the intersection of US 54 and 380, Carrizozo is a hub for many visitor activities.

Approaching 'Zozo from Ruidoso, look for the public Carrizozo Recreation Area just east of town on 380. Open seven days a week from dawn to dusk, its golf course offers nine holes for \$7, 18 holes for \$12; cart rentals for \$5 and \$10 for 9 and 18 holes, single; rental clubs and refreshments. Nearby is a children's playground.

Continuing on US 380 through town and three miles west, find the Valley of Fires Recreation Area. Here one may picnic or camp amid ancient lava flows that stretch south and north for 44 miles and cover 127 square miles. Numerous scenic markers explain the area's volcanic origins.

Additionally, one learns native geology and botany on a self-guided nature walk that begins at the picnic area. Wear sturdy footwear and sun protection.

Now administered by the US Department of the Interior's Bureau of Land Management, Valley of Fires Recreation Area offers shaded picnic areas, an open-air pavilion for large groups, as well as primitive and developed campsites, some with electrical hook-ups, all open seven days a week.

Fees are posted at the entrance and Golden Age Passport discounts apply.

Carrizozo itself offers more activities.

Like to bowl or swim? Head for Spencer Park on Eighth and H streets. The Carrizozo Recreation

Center offers bowling on newly-resurfaced lanes, rentals, video games, pool tables and a snack bar. Summer hours are 4 p.m. to 10 p.m. seven days a week.

Also at Spencer Park is the Carrizozo Municipal Pool. Call 648-2331 after May 31 for hours and rates.

Looking for historical interest, refreshments or a comfy bed? Find all three at the south end of town.

Walk through the heavy doors of Roy's Gift Gallery on US 54 south, and you've really entered old Doc Paden's drugstore, a 'Zozo landmark. High ceilings and heavy molding testify to its early century heritage.

Owner Roy Dow kept the green marble 1930s fountain, the antique rosewood mirror from the turn of the century and Doc Paden's apothecary cabinets when he restored the building and re-opened it as a gift shop and soda fountain.

As you sip Roy's original cherry-lime soda, ask him the stories behind Doc Paden and his antiques. It's a real slice of early Lincoln County.

Next door to Roy's on Twelfth Street is the Old Adobe Inn, now a bed and breakfast. Owner Harold DesJardins lovingly restored the historic building when it was faced with condemnation. He tells good stories, too.

In Carrizozo, one finds numerous visitor amenities such as: lodging, gasoline, banks, restaurants, groceries, a drugstore and airport. Approximately 10 miles south of town is an RV park.

If 'Zozo is the hub, choose a northern or southern spoke next. To the north lie a host town and keepsakes; to the south, ancient and modern Indian cultures. Please consult related articles on White Oaks and Ancho; on Three Rivers and Mescalero.

Picnic at the Petroglyphs

For a glimpse of ancient and modern Indian culture, visit the Three Rivers Petroglyph area west of Sierra Blanca Peak and the Mescalero Indian Reservation.

Twenty-seven miles south of Carrizozo on US 54 is the Three Rivers Petroglyph area. Turn left and follow the paved road five miles to the petroglyphs and picnic ground.

There, signboards tell the history of the rock pictures, or petroglyphs. A short walk takes you to the unusual drawings done by the Indians of the Jornada branch of the Mogollon culture about 1400 AD. Bring your camera, sturdy walking shoes and sun protection.

You may picnic in that same parking area or proceed ten miles farther on an unpaved road to the Three Rivers Campground and

White Mountain Wilderness Area maintained by the US Forest Service.

From Three Rivers, one can view the "back side" of Sierra Blanca by looking eastward.

Returning to US 54, turn south once again to Tularosa, left onto US 60 east to the heart of Mescalero Apache country.

Round Mountain

A few miles east of Tularosa on the right is a mountain with a white cross on top. This is Round Mountain, site of the last battle between Apache and white settlers. The cross commemorates the event and gives mute testimony to lasting peace.

St. Joseph's Mission

In Mescalero, an immense stone structure on the right dominates the landscape. This is St. Joseph's

Apache Mission, architectural testimony to faith. Visitors are welcome in the church, and, if the pastoral staff are about, will be graciously guided to areas of interest. Brochures just inside the door explain the history of this unusual and special building.

St. Joseph's was the cherished goal of Father Albert Braum, a Franciscan who arrived in 1916. Inspired by Gothic cathedrals in Europe in World War I, Braum resolved to build a magnificent house of worship dedicated first to the Apache warriors whom he admired, then later to the soldiers of both world wars. He himself served in both those wars, surviving the infamous Bataan Death March in World War II.

The Church took almost 20 years to complete, with volunteers using

native limestone and timber. Then, as now, altar decorations and furnishings were contributed by local families and artisans, many well-known.

Regardless of one's faith, the visitor cannot help but be moved by the sense of peace pervading the immense stone structure.

All is not history in Mescalero. Modern celebrations blend with tribal traditions every Fourth of July weekend. Coming of age ceremonies for young Apache women, rodeos and Indian dances attract visitors from all parts of the country.

Meet the modern Indian in Mescalero, only a few minutes' drive east from Ruidoso.

Visit ghosts of the past

Lincoln County's visitors and residents are heirs to its rich history. To seek the roots of that history, go no further than the old towns of White Oaks and Ancho.

Nestled between the Capitan and Jicarilla mountains, White Oaks today is home to only a few families, a far cry from its glory days at the turn of the century. Then, gold mines in the surrounding mountains enriched the town's 2,500 citizens who established churches, schools, literary societies and dramatic clubs.

But the mines played out, a railroad was built elsewhere, and gradually, White Oaks faded to almost a ghost town.

But dedicated volunteers, many of them descendants of White Oaks heydays, formed the White Oaks Historical Association to preserve a bit of that glittering past. Their first project is restoring the White Oaks School, a sturdy two-story

brick building on a hill overlooking town. Pupils attended classes there from 1895 to 1947.

Downstairs, one room is set up as an old classroom, complete with teacher's desk on a raised platform, welded children's desks and old globe. Former students' and teachers' pictures on the walls remind visitors that this room is more than a museum — it's a record of Lincoln County families and memories.

Upstairs are two rooms filled with artifacts, books, tools, furnishings and other remembrances of the past. An old prescription book is filled with unfamiliar, old-fashioned names for medicines. One of these rooms is still used today for family gatherings and reunions.

White Oaks School is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays. Admission is \$1.

The curator explains how to get

to White Oaks School: "When you get to White Oaks, turn left by the old brown building and go across the creek. Go halfway up the hill, turn right and cross the culvert. Look for a big brick building with a bell tower."

Ancho

Ancho is also a former glory town whose spirit survives because someone cherishes the past.

Early in the century, the railroad and a thriving brick plant enriched the little community across the mountain from White Oaks. As times and the economy changed, the town declined.

But one resident, Jackie Straley Silvers, was compelled to preserve the past.

In 1983, in the now-empty railroad depot, she assembled family heirlooms and keepsakes. Friends contributed mementos and pictures and the result was the Ancho Museum My House of Old Things.

"She wanted to have something where the younger generation could go and learn about the way things were done in their grandparents' day," explains the founder's daughter, Sara Jackson. She and her husband, L.V. Jackson, now own and operate the museum, lovingly carrying on her mother's tradition.



Antiques and "just plain old things" from the turn of the century through the '40s are carefully and tastefully arranged in eight sun-filled rooms including parlor, kitchen, dining room and boudoir. Thousands of items are displayed, including the pencil and arrowhead collections, the family's china and crystal, even a baseball uniform and ball gown.

"Yes, Ancho had a baseball team that played all the other towns," explains Jackson.

"There's a story behind every piece," she adds.

R.D. Hubbard and Ed Allred purchased Ruidoso Downs just two years ago, and this will be the track's third season under their leadership.

The sweeping changes implemented by Hubbard and Allred have paid off during the past two years in attendance and handle figures. The millions invested in refurbishing the track, barns and grandstand areas have been a drawing card that contributed to a 30 percent increase in attendance and handle in 1989, and a 39 percent increase in 1990.

Ruidoso Downs, the home of the world's richest quarter horse race, has returned to its former glory as the premier track in the Southwest.

With the advent of inter-track simulcasting and mutuels in June 1989, the Sports Theater was opened so that racing fans could enjoy the Sport of Kings all year long.

But, racing is only the beginning.

The Hubbard Museum was added last year to showcase R.D. and Joan Dale Hubbard's multi-million dollar collection of realistic art.

The Museum is tucked away in a corner of the Turf Club and draws racing fans and art fans throughout the season.

Some of the priceless art objects from the Anne Stradling Museum of the Horse will be on display in

the Hubbard Museum during this season's opening weeks. That collection, with its 10,000+ items, is probably the best in the world, and won't be displayed in its entirety until the Museum of the Horse opens in Ruidoso Downs in 1992.

The Turf Club exhibition will provide a preview. The Hubbard Art Award for Excellence, with its \$250,000 prize to one artist, will be staged Saturday, June 1, and work by that award's world-class artists will take over the Museum in June.

Besides the award-winning Art Award work, the works of five Soviet artists will be on display at the Hubbard Museum this year.

Continuing a tradition of bringing music to the mountain, Ruidoso Downs Racing will present Highway 101 in a charity benefit concert on Saturday, May 25.

The track has planned a dance Fourth of July weekend festivities, Friday, July 5.

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce will present its annual Art Festival at Ruidoso Downs Racing this year, under the big tents next to the Sports Theater.

All American Festival activities, all planned for the week following the All American Futurity, will include square dance competition, a fiddlers contest, a photography contest, a street dance, a Charity Celebration and much more.

The race season will end on Labor Day when the world's fastest two-year-old quarter horses speed down the track in the All American Futurity, the world's richest quarter horse race.

It all begins at 1 p.m. Thursday, May 9.



On The Track

Gambling on a great racing season

RUIDOSO DOWNS-Nobody can accuse this turf writer of wiling away his winter. No way. While most of the home folks were testing the slopes at Ski Apache or simply hibernating, this seasoned scribe was busy gathering vital information for the upcoming summer horse racing season.

Horse racing is a game of statistics. In California, where I had the misfortune of spending several months this winter, those people are so crazed about statistics that they can tell you Charlie Whittingham's win percentage on Saturday's that he's hungover.

The Southwest racing fan is far more relaxed. He shrugs off the the idiosyncrasies of the sport, often unconcerned about the consequences of post position 1 as opposed to 8 in an 870-yard event.

But I guess there's just enough California left in my blood that I truly do care which post positions are more favorable and whether or not frontrunners fare better than closers on Ruidoso Downs' tight turns.

So, God bless me, I saved all horseplayers a lot of work by spending considerable time and energy researching everything you wanted to know about Ruidoso Downs but were afraid to ask.

Since 870 yard races were already mentioned, try this statistic on for size: There were thirty 870 yard races contested at Ruidoso Downs last summer. Twenty one of those races, or 70 percent, were captured by horses breaking from post positions 1 through 4.

Suddenly boring old statistics start looking a little more interesting, don't they? Take a gander at this one: In races contested at 5 1/2 and 6 furlongs last summer at Ruidoso Downs, 67 percent of all winners were front runners. Think about that for a minute. That means nearly 7 of 10 winners in sprint races were either on or very near the lead. Horses coming from behind captured only 3 of 10 sprints.

Of course, that means that two-turn races were also dominated by front-running types, right? Wrong, backstretch breath. In races contested at 7 1/2 furlongs or longer, 54 percent of all winners came from off the pace. In the first month of the season, when the track is still a bit cuppy and tiring, come-from-behind horses fare even better in two-turn races, winning nearly 80 percent of the time.

Some statistics, however, make little or no sense. In 5 1/2 furlongs races here, inside post positions would seem an ideal place to break from, considering the track's bias toward

frontrunners in sprint races. But quite the contrary was true. Post positions 5 through 10 accounted for 65 percent of all winners in 5 1/2 furlong races. For some reason, post position 10 was two times better than any other post at 5 1/2 furlongs, accounting for 16 winners in 66 starts.

Why ask why? Just keep those facts in mind before plowing down on a 3-to-5 favorite buried in the 2 hole in a 5 1/2 furlong dash.

Post position studies, however, produced few cement facts. These are the noteworthy post position stats:

1. Be wary of horses in 1 mile races breaking outside the 7 hole. Only six percent of horses in posts 8-12 in mile races came home victorious.

2. At 7 1/2 furlongs, post position is virtually no factor. Be warned, however, that not a single horse in 23 tries overcame the outside or 10 post position in 7 1/2 furlong tests.

Probably the most important fact uncovered in my laborious research involved races on sloppy racetracks. If you bet come-from-behind horses on a sloppy racetrack at Ruidoso Downs, check into Lincoln County Medical Center and ask for an x-ray of your head. Tell them you want to make sure there's something in there. In 43 races at all distances which were contested on a sloppy track, 36 (or 83 percent) were won by frontrunners.

I certainly hope you have enjoyed this stroll through statistics. If you didn't, you should have. Next winter I'm hitting the slopes.

Refrigerator is still hot to race

Last year's All American Futurity winner Refrigerator heads a large cast of stakes stars — both quarter horses and thoroughbreds — set to showcase their talents this summer at Ruidoso Downs.

Refrigerator, sidelined since his smashing 1 3/4-length victory in the All American Futurity, has been training well for conditioner Dwayne "Sleepy" Gilbreath and is scheduled to make his 1991 debut in the May 16 Kansas Derby trials.

The 3-year-old quarter horse division looks especially strong this year, and Refrigerator should have his work cut out for him with the likes of Quick Fun, Strait To The Bank, See Me Gone and Pieyeu all pointing toward the major derbies this summer. Takin On The Cash, the 1990 Champion 2-Year-Old Colt, and Jacks Dash, recent winner of \$334,000 Golden State Futurity at Los Alamitos, are also headed to Ruidoso Downs for action this summer.

Trainer Jack Brooks shoots for his sixth All American Futurity victory and once again holds a strong hand in the 2-year-old ranks with

talented runners such as West Texas Futurity hero Special Task and the speedy filly Sixadoll.

First Down Kelly, an impressive winner of the Grade I Blue Ribbon Futurity, and West Texas Futurity runnerup Disco Sheza also have their sights set on Ruidoso's 2-year-old Triple Crown races. Other promising youngsters expected to contest the May 9-10 Kansas Futurity trials include Sky High Lady, Facination Pie, Steppin For The Moon and Cut The Buffer.

See Me Do It, the 1989 World Champion, who won four consecutive races at Ruidoso Downs last summer including the World's Championship Classic and the All American Gold Cup, both Grade I races, is expected back. Her seasonal bow is expected in the July 18 World's Championship Classic trials.

Brooks reports that 1990 Champion 3-Year-Old Filly Sweet N-Special is rested and ready to tackle the aged horse stakes races at Ruidoso Downs this summer. The late-blooming daughter of Special Effort captured six of 12 races


in 1990 and earned in excess of \$150,000.

A Bit Of Style, who dominated the thoroughbred handicap division at Ruidoso Downs last summer with wins in the Ruidoso Budweiser Breeders' Cup, the Governor's Handicap and the Ruidoso Sprint Championship, has been in top form this spring and should be ready for another banner season at the mountain top oval.

Grey Bed, who ran dismally in last year's Budweiser Breeder's Cup, later turned the tables on A Bit Of Style and scored an easy win in the Ruidoso Mile Handicap. He has since won five races, including two stakes. Grey Bed and A Bit Of Style should be among the highweights in this year's renewal of the \$75,000-added Budweiser Breeders' Cup May 25.

Fierce competition is expected in the 3-year-old thoroughbred ranks this summer. Next Step, Cagney And Lace, Combate and Lobo Lobo ran 1-2-3-4 in last year's Ruidoso Futurity and they should all be back to battle it out. Other top sophomores include last year's

Kachina Stakes winner Jerrico Miss, New Mexico-bred star Diamond Ego and the fast filly Roses For Roxanne.



These two keep beating the odds

RUIDOSO DOWNS—When jockey Jos Martinez booted home a non-descript quarter horse winner on Aug. 17 last year, few people paid

much attention to the race.

Just another winner for Martinez.

It was, however, not just another winner for Martinez. It was his 91st winner of the meeting, eclipsing the 19-year-old record of 90 set by Larry Byers in 1971.

Martinez, 29, had a sensational meeting. He led the thoroughbred standings, booting home 78 winners in 364 mounts for a solid 21.4 win percentage. Martinez showed his versatility by finishing third in the quarter horse jockey standings, guiding home 25 additional winners. His combined 103 wins for the meet is a record that could be hard to surpass in the future.

Martinez, a native of Mexico City, began riding at Ruidoso Downs in 1979. Martinez won three thoroughbred stakes races at Ruidoso Downs in 1990, including

the Kachina Stakes aboard Jerrico Miss, the Ruidoso Oaks Handicap aboard Piel Canela and the Hondo Valley Handicap aboard Dart.

Doyal Roberts notched his third consecutive training title here this summer. Roberts, 53, saddled 37 winners, four more than runnerup Bob Arnett. Roberts, who began training at Ruidoso Downs in 1973, saddled A Bit Of Style for three stakes victories last summer, including wins in the Budweiser Breeders' Cup, the Governor's Handicap and the Sprint Championship.

Not surprisingly, Jack Brooks and Jacky Martin repeated as leading quarter horse trainer and jockey, respectively.

Brooks, 55, saddled 57 winners during the 78-day stand, while Martin rode 54 winners. Both of the marks surpass last year's totals of

46 and 44, respectively, which also led the meet.

Brooks, whose most notable accomplishment last season was probably finishing 1-2-3-4 in the Kansas Derby, won with 27 percent of his starters at Ruidoso Downs in 1990.

Highway 101 rolls in for concert

Ruidoso Downs — continuing a tradition of music in the mountains — for the third consecutive year has lured a top country music band to perform this summer.

Highway 101, nominated for a Grammy Award as "Country Group of the Year" in 1989, will highlight a big Memorial Day Weekend of racing at the mountain top oval by performing May 25 at the Ruidoso Convention Center.

Highway 101, which exploded on the Country Music scene in 1987 with three Top 10 hits, including the #1 hit "Somewhere Tonight," follows on the heels of other top performers to visit Ruidoso Downs. The Charlie Daniels Band performed in concert last year, and Waylon Jennings and Michael Martin Murphy were featured in 1989. Highway 101 was put together by Denver promoter Chuck Morris in 1986 and has enjoyed tremendous success in a relatively short period of time. The group has already recorded five albums, and has twice been named Academy of Country Music "Group of the Year."


Highway 101 reached the lofty status of #1 on the Billboard country charts for the second time in 1988 with the song "Cry, Cry, Cry." In 1989, the song "Who's Lonely Now" became the group's third #1 hit in as many years.

SEE ME DO IT

Those star-studded sophomores are back

RUIDOSO DOWNS—By the time the All American Derby rolls around on the first Sunday in September, there should be little doubt about which quarter horse is the top 3-year-old in the country.

Nearly every big-name sophomore in the nation is expected to make at least one appearance here during this 79-day stand, which opens May 9 and continues through Sept. 2. Perched on his pony horse in front of an immaculately manicured stable area, trainer Don Farris confirmed Thursday morning that the fast filly Quick Fun is set to contest all three derbies here this summer — the Kansas, the Rainbow and the All American.

Quick Fun, reigning Champion 2-Year-Old Filly and a winner in five of six lifetime starts, figures to have plenty of elite company in that trio of Grade I races.

Trainer Dwayne "Sleepy" Gilbreath has already indicated that Refrigerator, Champion 2-Year-Old and hero of last year's All American Futurity, has the same three races on his agenda.

Strait To The Bank, winner of last year's Rainbow Futurity, is working well for trainer Jack Brooks, and most likely will contest all three derbies.

California trainer Rodney Hart revealed recently that Jacks Dash, winner of the Jan. 19 Corona Del Mar Handicap at Los Alamitos in

his only start this year, is also being pointed toward the Kansas and Rainbow derbies.

Takin On The Cash, Champion 2-Year-Old Colt, is gunning for the Golden State Derby at Bay Meadows on June 22, and then will head to Ruidoso Downs for a shot at the Sept. 1 All American Derby.


"Everybody says California horses can't win at Ruidoso," said Caesar Dominguez, trainer of Takin On The Cash. "I'm going to prove them wrong."

Other derby hopefuls expected here this summer are Piebyeu and Go Go By Yawl, who finished noses apart in the recent Grade 2 West Texas Derby at Sunland Park.

Despite the rugged competition, Quick Fun, who has not raced since a sharp runnerup effort behind Refrigerator last Labor Day, appears on edge for a big summer. She logged a bullet gate work of 11.74 for 220 yards earlier this week at Sunland.

"She's been working real well," said Farris, who finished fourth in the quarter horse trainer standings here last summer. "You always hope that they will be better as a 3-year-old than they were as a 2-year-old, but you never know until you run them."

The contentious derby action gets under way May 16 with the Kansas Derby trials. The \$250,000-estimated Kansas Derby will have its 17th-renewal on June 2.

Watch out — here comes See Me Do It

RUIDOSO DOWNS—Jean Dillard's See Me Do It, campaigning exclusively at Ruidoso Downs last summer, captured the imagination of the racing fans once again en route to her title as Horse of the Meeting in the quarter horse division.

See Me Do It, trained by Robert Turner and ridden by Larry Layton, was flawless in her final four starts of the summer. The 1989 World Champion captured both the All American Gold Cup and the World's Championship Classic by daylight.

Her victory in the All American Gold Cup was especially impressive, as the sleek daughter of On A High shattered the stakes record for the 440-yards by logging a final time of 21.26.

Special Project swept 3-year-old honors by capturing both the Kansas Derby and the All American Derby. He was trained by Jack Brooks and ridden by Gary Sumpter.

One of the closest votes occurred in the Older Horse/Gelding of the Meet category. Aloulou pulled off a narrow victory in the division by capturing the closing-day Ruidoso 550 Championship. Aloulou, a consistent performer all season, was trained by Dwayne "Sleepy" Gilbreath and ridden by Larry Payne.

Six Shooter Tex, from the stable of Arnold Simmons, sewed up Distance Horse of the Meet by winning both the Fine Loom Stakes and the Gene Hensley Handicap. Six Shooter Tex, who was ridden by Wesley McDaniel, also finished third in the Los Alamitos Marathon in Southern California this summer.

Refrigerator, from the stable of Gilbreath, locked up 2-Year-Old honors by winning the \$2.5 million All American Futurity on closing day. Quick Fun, from the shedrow of Don Farris finished second.

Ruidoso Downs grad retires with honors

For the first time in three years the World Champion Racing Quarter Horse did not compete at Ruidoso Downs en route to its prestigious title.

Dash For Speed, however, who captured the Champion Of Champions at Los Alamitos in the final start of an illustrious career last November, certainly made her mark at the mountain top oval in her three previous racing seasons.

In 1989, the brilliant mare became the first horse ever to sweep the Rainbow Silver Cup, the World's Championship Classic and the All American Gold Cup, all Graded I events contested at Ruidoso Downs.

The previous year, Dash For Speed swept the Ruidoso Downs 3-year-old Triple Crown with victories in the Kansas, Rainbow and All American derbies. The only other horse to accomplish the rare sweep was the speedy My Easy Credit in 1977.

Dash For Speed, who retired with earnings of \$1,225,337 to rank eighth on the all-time list, scored the biggest victory of her 2-year-old season with a win in the 1987 Grade I Rainbow Futurity.

Although Dash For Speed campaigned elsewhere during the 1990 season, several of the other champions were regular runners at Ruidoso Downs.

Refrigerator, a convincing winner of the 1990 \$2.5 million All American Futurity, was named both champion 2-year-old and champion 2-year-old gelding. Refrigerator, who streaked to a 1 3/4-length victory in the All Amer-

ican, shattered the stakes record for 400 yards with a sizzling 19.39 clocking.

The champion 2-year-old filly, Quick Fun, campaigned exclusively at Ruidoso Downs. She completed a superb summer, which included four wins in five starts, with a runner-up effort in the All American Futurity. Quick Fun is co-owned by R.D. Hubbard and Ed Allred, who was named quarter horse owner of the year in 1990.

One of the most impressive horses to compete at Ruidoso Downs last summer — Special Project — also walked off with 1990 championship laurels when he was named champion 3-year-old and champion 3-year-old colt. Special Project captured both the Rainbow Derby and the All American Derby in 1990. Special Project's time of 21.37 for the 440-yard All American Derby was the fourth fastest in the history of the race.

Sweet N Special, the champion 3-year-old filly for 1990, never captured a major race at Ruidoso Downs last summer, but her runner-up efforts in both the Kansas and Rainbow derbies contributed greatly to her honor.


The 1990 champion breeder — B.F. Phillips — was once again represented in the world's richest quarter horse race, the All American Futurity, by Opportunity Streaks, who finished ninth.

Kip Didericksen, the leading quarter horse jockey in the nation last year and honored as champion jockey, guided Refrigerator to his stunning victory in the All American Futurity.

RUIDOSO DOWN-Carl Davidson's A Bit Of Style, proving not only his abundance of class but also his extreme versatility in 1990, captured three different stakes races at three different distances last summer to lock up Horse of the Meet honors in the thoroughbred division.

A Bit Of Style, who was trained expertly by Doyal Roberts and ridden confidently by Mike Lidberg, won the Budweiser Breeders' Cup at 1 mile, the Governor's Handicap at 7 1/2 furlongs and the Ruidoso Sprint Championship at 6 furlongs.

Probably A Bit Of Style's most dramatic victory came in the Sprint Championship — which, by the way, was voted Best Race of the Meet — when he closed between horses and won a three-horse blanket finish.

In the 2-year-old division, Talent Connection, a double-stakes winner at the meet, and Dawn Street, powerful winner of the Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity, were selected 2-Year-Old Colt/Gelding and 2-

Year-Old Filly, respectively, of the meet. Both horses were New Mexico-breds, and both were sold at last year's Ruidoso Horse Sales.

Talent Connection, owned by Richard Parrish and trained by Roy Barrington, won both the Norgor Futurity and the Rio Grande Futurity here this summer. He was ridden on a regular basis by Glen Murphy.

Allred & Hubbard's Dawn Street was trained by Don Farris and ridden by Jerry Nicodemus.

In the 3-year-old division, San Rama, from the shedrow of Roberts was named top filly. Ruidoso Derby winner Adios Mundo, from the stable of Brent Davidson, was selected as top colt or gelding.

Foreign Fella, who started the season in the \$3200 claiming ranks and finished the season by drawing away to victory in a \$10,000 claiming race, was named Claimer of the Meet. Foreign Fella was trained by Bill Thompson.

Leading jockey Joe Martinez was his regular rider.
