U.S. Forest Service celebrates

As the sun set between the tall cool pine trees at the Cedar Creek Campground, local area residents participated in a very enjoyable history lesson.

The Smokey Bear Celebration celebrated an open house celebrating the centennial of the National Forest System and the opening of the campground, Thursday night.

The open house included information about wildflowers, displays of burning forest photos and a presentation of the birth of the Lincoln National Forest.

Standing in front of a healthy crowd of about 50 people, dressed in dark brown tie-up pants and a matching jacket, Fred Roeder of Tularosa, gave his eighth presentation of the forest's birth.

His outfit was complete with

black, knee-length, tie-up boots, a light brown hat and one of the original Forest Ranger pins.

Roeder is the land officer for the Lincoln National Forest, and he loves history.

In February, he was informed of upcoming events for the centennial celebration.

Because of his love for history he decided to research the beginning of the Lincoln National Forest for a presentation.

Then an ex-forest ranger in Wyoming, who makes buckles out of old Forest Ranger Pins, said he would make Roeder an original Ranger outfit. Roeder couldn't resist.

For four months he researched documents and letters at court-houses, libraries, and newspapers in the Socorro and Carrizozo area.

His hour-long presentation, started just after 7 p.m., two hours

after the open house began.

One of the other two main attractions of the open house was to the right of the main ceremony.

The smell of wildflowers displayed by the Native Plant Society of New Mexico filled the air in a five-minute walk up the trail.

The group displayed the many types of flowers found in the Lincoln National Forest and sold books and pamphlets describing the origin of the flowers.

To the left, was the Smokey Bear District's Hot Shot Crew, displaying vivid fire shots portraying the reality of the horrors of forest fires.

The crew also had their trucks for people to climb up on and take a look at.


The Hot Shot Crew is a specialty firefighting crew that travels across the United States, helping put out fires.

Also, in part of the centennial, New Mexico Volunteers for the Outdoors (NMVFO) came down from Albuquerque recently to join the forest rangers and a few local volunteers in cleaning up the trails.

NMVFO is a non-profit, action-oriented organization dedicated to the preservation, upkeep and improvement of New Mexico's public lands.

The volunteers dedicate most of their spring and summer weekends to traveling around the state, helping with various projects that need to be done.

It took two full days of hard work and sweat, but the clean up crews were able to get the chore done, just in time for sloppy joes around the campfire.

Maiden prepares for rite of passage

Dressed in a white deer skin dress decorated with pyramids of thousands of colored beads, Angela Simms will prepare herself for womanhood during the July 4th Coming of Age Ceremony in Mescalero.

For eight days, the 12-year-old Apache Indian will run around medicine baskets, dance, and pray for blessings. She will leave her moccasins of childhood and enter a life leading to marriage, bearing children and raising families.

The ancient puberty ritual, performed in the village ceremonial grounds, is held annually for maidens who are ready to multiply the tribe.

This year Angela, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Simon Simms Sr., is the only one. However, the seemingly shy little girl said she isn't nervous about it.

The culture of the Pueblo and Apache tribes are very important to her.

"I'm proud to be an Indian," she said.

Not every maiden girl chooses to have this ceremony. The decision for Angela to participate came from within her heart, said her aunt, Karen Geronimo.

Angela has dreamed about her own Coming of Age Ceremony since she was little. Every year she attended the event. She watched carefully the participants taking care of each girl, and choosing who she wanted as her godparents.

During the ceremony, the young girl's parents are set aside while the chosen godparents attend to her needs.

However, the ceremony is not a

dream that can be done overnight. Angela's aunt explained that years of preparation and months of hard work have been put into it.

The most exciting task is making the maiden girl's ritual dress. Angela chose the colors of her beads, and picked the design for her dress — it came from her first pair of Apache moccasins.

However, the most important chore is preparing a feast of traditional tribal and modern food.

The work however is not bothersome to the family members, rather they look forward to it because they know that Angela is going to be blessed and in return will bless her guests.

Food is very important to the tribe at this time, said her aunt Geronimo. It nourishes the body and is a symbol of celebration.

The family gathers Mescalero beans, Indian bananas and piñon

as they become available during the years.

The mescal and other foods have been brought up from Carlsbad, El Paso, Alamogordo and found on the fields of the reservation.

Although the cleansing of some of the food has already begun, the cooks will start preparing the feast four days in advance.

In addition to preparing food, the family also must gather buckskins and cloth, make the teepees, and teach Angela the significance of the ceremony's procedures.

Angela helps in all these preparations as she also walks and bike rides daily to strengthen her legs for the ritual dancing and running.

Then, after all the preparation is finished, the ritual begins with the raising of the big ceremonial teepee.

As Angela runs around the medicine baskets the bark covered poles, laying on the ground in a shape of a teepee, will rise clockwise until entwined at the top. The cloth is then stretched out and the teepee is formed.

For the first four days, Angela will go into the teepee, which serves as a sacred place at the time, to dance. Family and other tribal members dance outside of the teepee.

At night she will retire to her own personal teepee. This one is all white, and the bark on the poles have been taken off for smoothness, said her aunt.

The longest night of the traditional ceremony is the fourth night, when the bottom half of the young maiden's face is painted white, along with the parts of her arms and legs that show. Then she must

dance from midnight until sunrise.

The running and dancing is a ceremonial rite to wish the young woman a long and happy life, enriching her faith in the tribal culture, said Geronimo.

During the ceremony many different songs are played. These are one of Angela's favorite parts of the ritual. She has special feelings for some of the songs because they fill her with peace.

Angela has only two brothers, Simon Simms Jr., a 1990 Ruidoso High School graduate who recently received his New Mexico chef's license, and Rodney Simms, a junior at Ruidoso High School.

In fact, the young lady is one of only two female children on both sides of her parents' families, so the event has added importance to them.

Her maternal grandmother is Reyes M. Chama of Santa Domingo, a reservation northeast of Albuquerque. Her fraternal grandmother is Josephine Duffy of Mescalero.

Her great-great grandparents are Massau, known as Apache Kid, and Zanagoliche.

Massau moved into the Mescalero reservation after escaping from a moving train en route to Florida. If he hadn't jumped he would've become a prisoner of the Geronimo War.

Angela, a top student at her school, believes she received her knowledge and wisdom from him.

Her hobbies include bike riding, walking and baking. She is fluent in her Apache language and is one of the 100 native students able to attend a Native American Preparatory six-week school at NMSU.

Village budget cuts could hamper CofC efforts

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce can't promote and advertise Ruidoso without sufficient funding from the village of Ruidoso, Tony Wilcoxson says.

Wilcoxson is the incoming president of the Chamber of Commerce. The Ruidoso Village Council this morning in a special called meeting was to discuss "advertising and promotion of the Village of Ruidoso" and any other business that might come before the council, according to the village clerk, Tammie Maddox.

A meeting of a chamber committee with the chairman of the Lodgers Tax Board, Ed Hyman, was conducted at the chamber last week to discuss the level of support LTB will recommend for the chamber's visitors bureau.

The village recently took over from the chamber the "convention" functions of the Convention and Visitors Bureau.

Wilcoxson indicated a high degree of dissatisfaction with the outcome of the meeting with Hyman.

He declared that the amount of money the LTB will recommend to fund chamber visitors information services isn't enough, even, to match the \$42,000 available from

the Wilcoxson matching funds.

Wilcoxson says the chamber qualifies for \$13,000 more in matching funds than last year.

"We used to have \$150,000 for advertising. Last year it was \$100,000."

"If we can't get a reasonable amount of money to promote the community, then we don't want to promote the community," Wilcoxson told *The Ruidoso News*.

He said an "inordinant amount" of money is going toward marketing the convention and civic events center to be constructed in 1991-92.

Joan Bailey, chairperson of the chamber advertising committee, said a lack of communication between the village, the LTB and the chamber is part of the problem.

"My frustration with events program Ruidoso's advertising program and the Chamber of Commerce as a vehicle to facilitate that program comes from the fact that in this community there is a feeling the chamber has inappropriately performed its duties in advertising this community.

"This is not so. A group of volunteers has been as prudent as possible and has spent dollars to bring as many people to Ruidoso as possible.

"There isn't and has never been a hidden agenda. Our efforts and interests are pure.

"My frustration is that it seems to be a total breakdown of communication between the council, the LTB and the Chamber of Commerce," Bailey told *The Ruidoso News*.

She said the chamber will never shut down.

"We'll do what we have to do," she said. But she added that might not include advertising.

"It takes \$62,000 (from the village) just to cover expenses," Wilcoxson says.

He said chamber dues from members covers mostly salaries. Money to advertise the community as a resort area traditionally has come from lodgers tax funds which by law are earmarked mostly for advertising.

The chamber advertising committee arranges through the Price Advertising Agency of Lubbock the placement of Ruidoso advertisements and news articles in newspapers, magazines and the electronic media.

Village support has helped pick up those expenses.

"Inquiries are up ... I think we are doing a tremendous amount of good," Wilcoxson said.

Jerry Watts, executive director of the chamber, says that if the visitors' side of the chamber isn't funded properly, the chamber still will take telephone inquiries.

But, he has said, the names and telephone numbers will have to be taken daily to village hall for replies to be dealt with there.

The LTB is an advisory board. The board recommends expenditures for advertising Ruidoso out of the lodgers tax revenue to the village council.

Wilcoxson says a chamber contract with the village in the past has provided a minimum of one and a half salaries" as part of the village's support of chamber advertising.

Watts said that the village contract with the village of Ruidoso "runs out next Friday."

"We need to know who is going to be paying someone to answer the 800 number after July 1," Watts said.

"We don't know who will be handling inquiries."

Watts said it would not be in Ruidoso's best interest if the village loses its competitive edge as a resort area because it can't match state money that is available.

LCMC staff builds big buggy

A strange structure being constructed in back of the Lincoln County Medical Center is not a new building to house a CT scanner the hospital will be using in about four months.

The strange structure is the framework for a huge baby carriage which will be the hospital's entry in the Smokey Bear Parade July 4 in Capitan and later at the Lincoln County Days in Lincoln and during the Aspen-cade in Ruidoso.

Themes for the Capitan parade is Smokey Bear and the All-American Cowboy.

The hospital float is somewhat of a mystery, but it's believed the "babies" in the giant baby buggy may have some medical expertise.

The staff at the Medical Center is building the float.

"Chicken wire stuffing is something new to me," Valerie Miller, hospital administrator, told trustees at a regular meeting, Thursday evening.

Trustees during their meeting authorized purchase of a CT scanner, heard about how many

hours auxiliary member have contributed to the hospital and considered a scholarship problem.

Hospital auxiliary members contributed 1,581 volunteer hours last month, trustees were told. Dorothy Talley reported "real good" income from the thrift shop and pink shop.

The auxiliary each year helps the hospital buy needed equipment. This year some \$63,425 has been spent on such projects, Talley said.

A dearth of scholarship applicants from area high schools prompted the drafting of a letter to principals and others asking for help in meeting deadlines when scholarship applications are due in the spring.

One thing that is needed are letters of recommendation from principals, instructors or counselors, Julie Duffalo, scholarship chairman and director of nursing, told trustees.

She indicated that sometimes that is the bottleneck in getting scholarships awarded.

Miller reported that a mam-

moth "progress" has been sent to the Joint Commission in Accreditation. She also said that a system-wide employee survey found 94 per cent of employees responding.

Results are not yet available, she said.

Next meeting of the trustees will be at 5:30 p.m. July 18, in the board room of the hospital.

Miller reported that May activity levels were slow from the previous month. Net revenue, however, was up \$115,532 from April 1991 and up \$167,936 from April 1990, resulting in a gain of \$61,257.

"If the mill levy amount is subtracted the actual gain from the month is \$14,000 which includes \$14,749 in mill levy funds for the Carrizozo Clinic," a report says.

The Carrizozo Health Center shows a loss of \$2,849 for May and a year-to-date loss of \$4,918 despite \$29,498 in mill level funds.

The ambulance company is ahead of budget for the year.

Now's the time to bring back stolen street signs

Over the past several months street signs in the villages of Capitan and Ruidoso have been damaged or stolen for a loss of more than \$5,000, said Criminal Investigation Commander Lanny Maddox.

The approximate cost of village signs is \$54, with the \$5,000 an estimate that includes the labor, nuts and bolts to replace the signs.

Capitan's city clerk Jan Starnes, said that village has seen 20 street signs stolen and 26 more signs damaged beyond repair. Although no exact figure could be obtained from Ruidoso, police say the problem is a serious one and the price is mounting.

"We're up to several thousand dollars in stolen or damaged signs," said Detective Corporation Lou Wardwell.

Taxpayers' dollars must be used to replace the stolen signs. These incidents are not only costly to the public, but are also serious crimes

that could result in jail time for the offenders.

Possession of a sign is a high court misdemeanor with a possible sentence up to 364 days in jail and/or the cost of the damage.

Larceny of street signs may be a misdemeanor, said Maddox, "but I wouldn't want something as little as a street sign on my personal record."

The police are mostly concerned with the disappearance of street and stop signs.

"The theft and destruction of street signs is not only costly, but poses a great danger to motorists as well as pedestrians," Maddox said.

Without street signs in place, it is also hard for emergency vehicles to locate residences.

Capitan put up street signs so that they could be part of the E-911 system, said Starnes. Having no signs is hazardous because it slows the response time on a call.

In an effort to recover these street signs, the Ruidoso Police De-

partment is offering its third annual amnesty period.

Anyone may drop off a sign at the police station, no questions asked for 45 days, Maddox said.

This gives anyone with a public sign, whether it is stolen or has been found, until July 26 to return that property and avoid arrest and prosecution. It's the last chance for anyone with a stolen sign in their possession to keep their record clean.

The first year the police offered this program, response was terrific, Maddox said. "We had a truck load of signs returned."

From past experience, the department believes that the signs are being stolen from students going off to college to put in their rooms.

At \$54 to replace the sign, plus 364 days in jail, those signs could turn out to be expensive wall hangings.

Hospital votes to buy CAT scanner

It's likely that four months from now, the Lincoln County Medical Center will have a CT scanner in place and in use to give area citizens another sophisticated medical service.

A scanner is particular valuable in assessing the extent of head injuries after accidents, Dr. Roger Beechie, chief of staff, told trustees Thursday. The trustees had just approved an expenditure of \$398,640 for purchase of a General Electric scanning machine to be housed in a building yet to be constructed.

The hospital had to know the configuration of the "winning machine" before the actual plans can be made for a small building to house the machine, Valerie Miller, hospital administrator, told trustees.

A modular building will be purchased.

The building to be constructed will be just outside the emergency room door to the south.

Area residents have had to go to Roswell, Albuquerque and such for brain scans; LCMC soon will be offering that service.

LCMC has a technician who is knowledgeable in the operation of the equipment and who made the time estimate on when the machine will be ready. He is Dave Blackman.

The machine also can be used for routine diagnostic work as well as in trauma cases, Dr. Beechie said.

Miller said that some personnel training in use of the machine is included in the purchase price.

Money is on hand for the cash purchase of the machine and for the building, Miller said. The project has been budgeted.

Fireworks go on sale — but not in Ruidoso

Fireworks, a Fourth of July tradition blamed for thousands of fires yearly, will go on sale today in New Mexico, but not in Ruidoso.

Councilor J. D. James angrily condemned a new state law that seemed to tie the hands of local offi-

cials to govern the sale of fireworks in their own area.

James and Councilor Ron Andrews noted the windy, dry mountain area of Ruidoso was particularly vulnerable to fireworks and would put the area into a high

health hazard risk.

Police Chief Richard Swenor said that anyone caught selling fireworks in Ruidoso would be asked to produce a business license that allowed them to sell those fireworks.

If they have no license, Swenor said he will cite them, tell them to cease sales and go to village hall to obtain a permit.

At village hall, Planning Director Cleatus Richards said no licenses or permits would be issued.

Council considers village advertising, promotion

Advertising and promotions of the Village of Ruidoso is scheduled for discussion during a special meeting today (Monday), June 24, at 10 a.m. in the village council chambers.

The purpose of the meeting is for the village council to discuss money proposals and direction with the chamber of commerce and the lodger's tax committee.

The results of that meeting will be discussed again during the regular council meeting Tuesday, at 6:30 p.m. in village hall.

Fourth of July fireworks and a complaint by Innsbrook Village on street and water lines are two of many agenda items. The meeting includes 12 regular items, two pub-

lic hearings, a special report by Bill Karn and a closed meeting regarding pending or threatened litigation.

Public hearings include a transfer of ownership dispensers liquor license and retailers liquor license requested by Furr's Supermarket. The new area of transfer was not identified.

The councilors will hear discussion on the Don Miner request to change zoning from R-4 high density residential to R-1 single family residential.

Councilor Karn will report on the Federal Deposit Insurance Company's negotiations on the Grindstone Lake Development. Karn will also report on fireworks

and kick off a discussion of state tax law.

The regular agenda items include:

—Approval of MainStreet Ruidoso Redevelopment Plan.

—Approval of a contract with MainStreet Ruidoso, Inc.

—Hear a complaint on street deterioration and leaky water lines from representatives of Innsbrook Village.

—Review and seek approval for an agreement between Carrizozo, Capitan, Corona, Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Lincoln County regarding the Enhanced 911 emergency number.

—Discuss a proposal by the chamber of commerce for village ad-

vertising and promotion.


—Vote on the preliminary and final plat of Donald Miner.

—Discussion of proposed replat request of a tract of land by James Townsend.

—Amend the existing contract to provide for additional services of the Lincoln County Economic Development Corporation in return for the \$20,000 authorized at the June 11 meeting.

—Consider alternate road sections and grade for the entry drive to the golf course, hotel and civic events center. The village has received an objection from an adjoining property owner of the plans approved by the village council and ALLHUB Investment Inc.

Patches wants to be a working cat Adopt a pet at the Humane Society

Coming home at the end of a work day to an empty house, isn't much fun.

The Lincoln County Humane Society shelter has plenty of cats and dogs who would love to be there to greet their new owners.

Patches, a year-old tortoise shell cat with the frazzled look of "Bill the Cat," is waiting to be adopted.

"She is always chasing after crickets, spiders and dustballs," said shelter manager Randy Basch. "She'd be a great guard against field mice or any other unwanted rodent guests getting into a house."

Patches is being sponsored for spaying by Dr. R.A. Beechie, who is chief of staff at the Lincoln County Medical Center and has offices at 207 Sudderth Drive.

Basch reminded potential pet owners that New Mexico was the first state in the union to pass a leash law for cats.

"The law was passed because the cases of feline rabies far outnumber the cases in dogs," he said. "Cats roam a wide territory and owners

tend not to be as serious about giving them protective shots."

Keeping a cat indoors will extend its life expectancy, Basch said. The average life of a totally outdoor cat is three years; one that spends time both inside and out, about seven years. But a cat that stays inside all of the time can expect to see its fifteenth birthday.

Some unusual animals have ended up at the shelter recently.

A raven with a broken wing was brought in, a ferret and a young raccoon that had been caught in a trap.

Basch said that after checking the raccoon to be sure it was in good health and not injured, it was turned loose in a different area where he would not be a nuisance.

The ferret was spayed, following the society's commitment not to release for adoption animals that can reproduce. She has since been adopted.

Glorious, but hot, summer arrives

The Last Day of Spring


Just after I said this was a cool June, here on the 18th, came the hottest day of the year. The thermometer said 100. I wondered whether or not the thermometer was wrong; still you could feel the heat waves bounding up to you from the dry ground, and bird, chipmunks and cottontail rabbits, all sought the shade. The cows were gathered in the shadiest spots.

Juneteenth

On the morning of Juneteenth, the anniversary of the slaves of Texas having been given their freedom, the dove on the hillside was calling for rain, and sure enough about 5 in the evening, here came the clouds over the west mountain flashing lightning and booming thunder, and the large drops came shining down upon the thirsty earth causing Mother Earth to rejoice. Robins began singing songs of thankfulness. Then at nightfall, the dove on the hillside began singing its lullaby of peace on earth and goodwill toward men. Directly overhead in the sky was the golden half moon of pure gold shining upon the peaceful mountain world like a Heavenly benediction.

On the Eve of Glorious Summer

And now today, June 20, just after midday, the temperature is a cool 76, and the breeze is straight out of the northeast carrying a moist breath of rain, just over the hill. All the sky is covered with a patchwork of clouds of white and every shade of gray. The weather spirits have brought us mild and refreshing day here



on the last day of spring and the eve of glorious summer.

The Cow House

On midday of the 18th, the cows all gathered at what we call the shade grove, a number of tall cedars surrounding an oak. The cedar stops provide the thick shade, while the oak leaves add coolness to the air. Here the cows and calves gather on hot days while the breeze blows through the tree trunks singing a song of summer contentment.

Nearby this grove is what we call the cow house. There is a spreading walnut tree surrounded by cedar trees and bushes. In the center of this growth, is an oval shaped spot of bare ground.

With the help of Mother Nature, the cows, through the years have made themselves a house, cool in the summer and a shelter from the heavy snow in the winter.

By resting here "in sunshine and in shadow" year after year, the cows have kept bushes or trees from growing in their oval

shaped bed ground.

The tops of the cedars have interwoven with the top branches of the walnut tree, so that there is an over reaching roof of leaves, intertwined with cedar branches — a shelter for summer's heat and winter's cold.

Here on this hot day on the 18th a group of cows and calves were all lying down together in their house, the larger calves close to the smaller ones, while the arched roof kept out the midday rays of the sun, and the breeze, cooled by the nearby river and the large oak, sang a midday lullaby through the trunks and branches of the trees.

Signs of Rains

The east wind, and warm weather are signs of approaching rain this time of year. The wind today is steady right out of the northeast, and the warm weather of the last few days has built up the cloud cover we have today.

Here, a little after noon, there is a good thunder cloud away to the south over Storm Mountain.

The best messenger of rain is the rain crow who makes his call during very hot weather before a heavy rain. His song is halfway between the coo of the dove and the caw of the crow. I have not heard him yet this year. Yet sometimes the turtle dove stands in for the rain crow. I hear the dove now.

And so by the time this reaches you we will be over into glorious summer in the mountain land. Let us rejoice with Mother Earth and say a prayer of thanks to God.



Plans differ on retirement

When and how you withdraw your company's pension funds can make a big difference in how much tax you will pay, says the New Mexico Society of CPAs.

Most company pension plans give retiring employees a choice between receiving their retirement funds in a lump sum or in periodic payments. If you choose to take your retirement funds in one lump sum, you are liable for income taxes on the entire amount in the year you withdraw your funds.

If you qualify, you may get some tax relief in the form of five-year forward averaging. When you use the five-year averaging method, the entire lump sum is taxed in the year you withdraw it—but you calculate the tax as if you received the money evenly over five years, one fifth at a time.

If you were born before 1936, you have the option of applying five-year or ten-year averaging to your distribution.



The Hubbard Foundation donation was added to \$180,000 provided by the New Mexico State



Adopt a desert plant for free

Desert plants displaced by construction operations on public lands are available free under the Federal Bureau of Land Management's Adopt-A-Plant program. Range Conservationist Bea Wade said while some of the plants may not be appropriate for Ruidoso's higher elevation and soil types, others could adapt or could be used as house plants. "People should call our office and we will put down the date they called and notify them on a first-come, first-serve basis when plants become available," Wade said. The plants are being displaced from their natural habitat by city expansion, sand and gravel operations and road construction, she said. The Mimbres Resource Area of the Las Cruces District of the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) has formulated a plan to relocate the plants from disturbed areas for noncommercial public use. The plants include the Desert Willow, "which would make a nice house plant and has a pretty tubular bloom," Wade said. Others are the Little-Leaf Sumac, the Apache Plume, Ocotillo, some cacti and various species of Yucca. All are at home in sandy soil. "The plants available now are sprouters, where you can take a piece, stick it in sandy soil to grow," Wade said, adding that the people adopting the plants will receive planting instructions. But they will have to come here for the information and to get directions on where to pick up the plants," she said. "Most of the activities are in the Las Cruces area. When a mining claim is involved, we have a fast turn-over time of five days." For more information or to register for plants, contact the Las Cruces BLM office at 505-525-8228 between 7:45 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

VA loan benefits extended

VA home loans benefits have been extended to Persian Gulf War veterans, according to Joseph Cordova, director of the Department of Veterans Affairs Regional Office in Albuquerque. start June 7 for owners Seven Rivers Inc. and trainer Doyal Roberts. Valeme was ridden by John Cushing, posing a time of 1:06 2/5.

Valeme impressive Sunday in Norgor

Seven Rivers Inc.'s Valeme, shaking off a tough career debut, put it all together Sunday to score a sharp 3/4-length victory in the \$85,615 Norgor Futurity.

Valeme, a handsome Florida-bred son of Valid Appeal, was making just the second start of his career in Sunday's 2-year-old stakes race at 5 1/2-furlongs.

In his career debut, Valeme found himself in tight quarters along the rail and was forced to check sharply. Despite his troubled trip, the bay colt still managed a second-place finish in the trials.

"He ran a little greenly the other day in the trials," said Doyal Roberts, who is currently the leading thoroughbred trainer here. "But that race had to help him."

Obviously, that race did. Valeme, under jockey John Cushing, stalked the quick early pace of previously undefeated speedster Capitalimprovement. He hooked that rival nearing the stretch, battled briefly for the lead, and easily held safe the late charge of Jose Pancho.

"I knew this was a runner last winter," said Roberts, who was win-

ning the Norgor Futurity for the first time. "I didn't think he'd lose in the trials."

Capitalimprovement, who had been a handy winner in his first two starts, set an honest pace, reaching the quarter pole in 21.4, the half in 44.4 and the 5/8ths in 58.4.

Valeme covered the distance in 1:06.2, which was a full second slower than Talent Connection ran it last year.

"He went to the lead on his own," said Cushing. "The only thing I was worried about was making

the lead too soon. But he ran a nice race."

Jose Pancho, a \$2,300 yearling purchase at last year's Ruidoso Horse Sales, was 1 1/2-lengths clear of Capitalimprovement, who held on for third. Jose Pancho, a New Mexico-bred son of Sutchiffe, is owned by R.D. Hubbard and Ed Allred, and trained by Don Farris. He was ridden by Joe Martinez.

For the fourth consecutive day, there were no winners in the Twin Trifecta.

The carryover pool for Thursday's card is \$20,054.

Refrigerator makes competition shiver

Refrigerator made the competition shiver in Thursday's Rainbow Derby time trials.

On the heels of a powerful victory in the June 2 Kansas Derby, Refrigerator was absolutely dominating in Thursday's seventh of eight time trials for the July 7 Rainbow Derby.

Refrigerator, icing his status as the nation's premiere sophomore quarter horse, exploded away from the starting gate en route to a 1-length victory.

His final time for the 440 yards of 21.70 was easily the fastest of the day.

"That's the best I can remember him getting away from the gate," said trainer Dwayne "Sleepy" Gilbreath. "It was better than I've ever seen him break."

Refrigerator, despite lugging in a bit down the stretch, again completely overmatched his foes. Valid Proposal ran the race of his life, and finished second beaten a full-length.

"He wanted to run in, but he was running really strong," said regular jockey Kip Didericksen. "The only reason he tried to get in, I think, was because he was all by himself. If he was down on the inside or next to another horse, I don't think he would've done that."

Refrigerator, hero of last year's \$2 million All American Futurity, extended his winning streak to six. In 12 career starts, the gelded son of Rare Jet has won 10 and finished second twice.

In Thursday's first trial heat, The Regency Diamond capitalized on a rare alert break to post a convincing 1-length victory. The son of The Signature, who was fifth in the Kansas Derby after a slow start, was an easy winner under regular rider Jerry Nicodemus in the quick final time of 21.87.

In the fourth race, the ever-promising Hot Colours finally lived up to his potential. In his 12th lifetime start, the son of Special Effort broke his maiden when he scored a 1 1/4-length victory in the solid final time of 22.08. Hot Colours is owned by Preston Farms and trained by Roy "Cotton" Barrington. He was ridden by veteran Kenny Hart.

Editorial

Be careful out there

Fire danger is very high throughout Lincoln County, and that means we all have to use extra caution to be sure our county doesn't go up in smoke. The dry trees, grass and pine needles make perfect fuel to turn a spark into a raging forest fire.

Extra caution is required to protect this beautiful county. Ruidoso Fire Department assistant fire chief Barry Cole and USFS fire safety officer Steve Makowski provided the following fire safety information.

—Fireworks are prohibited in this village, the Village of Ruidoso Downs and in the Lincoln National Forest. The village ordinance does not allow use, sale or possession of fireworks.

—If you smoke, be sure to put your cigarettes out completely in a container or a bare area. (Smoking is suspected as the cause of a fire in the Grindstone area Tuesday, said Cole.) Be sure it's completely extinguished.

—Watch where you park your car. Fires have been started by catalytic converters of cars parked on dry grass.

—Be careful disposing of fireplace ashes and charcoal from cooking grills. Place in a metal container placed on bare ground, add water, stir around and leave for a couple of days. Ashes remain hot at the center and could still ignite for several days. Do not place ashes in village dumpsters or in a paper bag.

—All of the standard precautions should still be practiced, especially when away from home. That includes being sure you have a working smoke alarm, deciding on two ways out in case of a fire and arranging a predetermined meeting place in case of any emergency.

—Be prepared! Be sure you know who to call in case of fire:


