## Suspect in rape arrested

A Hondo man turned himself into the Ruidoso Police Department late Thursday afternoon, ending two warrants for his arrest.

Timothy P. Garcia, 20, was wanted for questioning in the alleged false imprisonment, assault with the intent to commit a violent felony, and the rape of a Ruidoso Downs woman on Monday, June 10, said Criminal Investigator Lou Wardwell.

There were two warrants out for his arrest, said Wardwell. The suspect was also wanted by the district for probation violation.

Around 5 p.m. Thursday Wardwell arrested Garcia after he turned himself in. Crimestoppers had offered a reward up to \$1,000 for information leading to the apprehension of Garcia. The Ruidoso Downs and Ruidoso police departments cooperated in the investigation.

Garcia's first appearance was on Friday morning before Judge Gerald Dean, Jr. of Carrizozo. He is being held in the Lincoln County Jail without bond.



## Steppin over the Rainbow

Steppin For The Moon lunges for a one-length win in the \$415,637 Rainbow Futurity July 14 at Ruidoso Downs. The two-year-old quarter horse ran the 350-yard distance in 17.62 seconds for his fifth win in eight

## Rains drench Ruidoso area

Ruidoso, perhaps fortunately, was on the western edge of a cloudburst which did extensive flood damage in the Roswell area over the weekend.

It was wet enough in Ruidoso, however, according to Ruidoso weatherman Bill Hostetter.

As of Monday morning Ruidoso had received 70 percent of the moisture normally received during the entire month of July. Rainfall so far this month in Ruidoso has been 2.79 inches. Normal for the entire month is 3.97 inches.

July is normally the second wettest month of the year. Normal rainfall for August is 4.44 inches in Ruidoso.

Roswell received half of its annual normal rainfall from Friday night until Monday morning, with 5.83 inches falling during that period.

The highway west of Roswell 10 miles out on U.S. 70-380 was closed for a time Saturday afternoon because of high water.

Dan Bateman, Roswell weatherman, said that from 6 a.m. to noon Saturday, 3.23 inches of rain were recorded in Roswell. Total for 24 hours Saturday was 4.36 inches.

Rainfall was expected to taper off today, tonight and Tuesday, Hostetter said. Probabilities were 60 percent today, 40 percent tonight and 30 percent Tuesday. Temperatures will be near normal.

## Police stay just ahead of crime

Criminal activity is on the rise in the Ruidoso area, but the local police department reports its ratio of solved cases is significantly up from national averages.

The Ruidoso Police Department saw a 22 percent increase in overall crime activity with a total of 1,141 criminal offenses reported in 1990 compared to 888 cases in 1989.

The rise is continuing thus far into 1991, said Police Chief Richard Swenor.

The 1990 overall ratio of criminal offense cases solved attained 43 percent versus 1989's overall of 32 percent, said Swenor.

Offense increases in 1990 were documented as 21 more assaults, eight more cases of fraud-forgery, and 314 other offense categories such as missing persons, liquor violations and narcotics.

Although this year's to-date records of 513 cases show two fewer general criminal offenses, more incidents have occurred in specific categories.

Such increases were 27 more assaults from last year's total of 44, and 20 more cases of criminal damage for a total of 97 cases.

There has also been an increase

of 13 more adults arrested, however, for the first part of last year, 46 juveniles were arrested for criminal activity. This year only 44 have been attained.

The juvenile figure is down from the 11 percent increase from 1989 to 1990.

After seeing an average 20 percent decrease in residential burglary and larceny — the two historically high offenses — larceny is rising once again.

In 1990 there was a total of 93 offenses for the first six months of the year. This year 121 larceny cases have already been reported.

The plus of this, however, is that about \$64,000 has been retrieved compared to last year's \$31,000, according to official documents.

There have been 29 more accidents than last year's total of 95, and a great many more calls dispatched for this year — a whopping 3,562 calls to last year's 2,634.

The records show more people are in Ruidoso than in past years, said Swenor. Either that, or fewer, or the same amount of people, are making a tremendous amount of more calls.

## Downpour doesn't dampen Billy Days

Welcome rains that vacillated between drizzles and driving downpours dampened Ruidoso's weekend activities and sent shivers through thousands of tourists who filled the mountain area over the weekend.

Michael E. Pitel, travel writer and marketing analyst for the state's tourism and travel division, relayed encouraging Lincoln County tourist statistics for the year at the Billy the Kid/Pat Garrett Days on Sunday at Cedar Creek Campground.

Pitel told the 200 in attendance that Lincoln County's tourist attendance is up by 37 percent in June and 48 percent so far in July. Pitel said the county enjoys a 13 percent average increase for the year.

Pitel said the area enjoyed an outstanding and prolonged ski season and that seemed to carry over to the summer's current success.

The state's market analyst said spending is up in the area, a surprising economic development.

"Usually, in a recession, less spending is anticipated," Pitel said. "We're seeing a lot more regional travel drive-up types of trips and fewer from across the nation."

Pitel told of four articles that will appear in national magazines regarding Lincoln County and its wild west heritage. Pitel said the four articles with a combined circulation of 6.6-million would be worth \$480,000 in advertising dollars. This compares to \$78,000 gained last year. The four magazines will be American Heritage, Wild West, Travel & Leisure and Smithsonian.

**PAT GARRETT DAYS**  
Despite the heavy rains, Pat Garrett Days, sponsored by the Billy the Kid Gang, was a success and outdrew last year's attendance.

Tourists and costumed characters of the past roamed the campgrounds from stew pot to stew pot for free samples during the Stinkin' Springs Stew Contest.

The cookoff is based on an event in county history that took place in December 1880. Billy the Kid and his gang were cornered in a remote rock cabin called Stinking Springs near Taiban. As the siege continued overnight into the next day, both

factions were becoming very hungry.

Not knowing how long the outlaws might hold out, Garrett made arrangements with a nearby rancher to haul some provisions and wood out to their camp. Upon their arrival in late afternoon, Garrett's men built a rousing fire and "went to cookin'."

According to legend, "The odor of roasting meat was too much for the famished lads, who were without provisions. Craving stomachs overcame brave hearts."

Thus the surrender of Billy and his friends was accomplished not by gunplay but by the mortal pangs of hunger.

Although the actual ingredients of the stew were not known, participants in the Stinking Springs Stew Cookoff are restricted to using only those meats and vegetables that most likely would have been available on a cold December day in 1880 on the desolate plains of eastern New Mexico Territory.

While the contestants boiled their stew, several authors sat under the new shelter house and sold books about the Lincoln County Wars.

Bob L'Aloue, author of "Knights of the Six Guns" and "Mystery, Mayhem and Madness" was autographing his new book on the Kid. Other hot sellers were Billy the Kid art and copies of the original transcripts of the Billy the Kid trials.

Highlights of the event included the stew contest and look-alike contests for Billy the Kid, Pat Garrett, Deluvina Maxwell and Susan McSwane.

There were several readings about the Lincoln County Wars by Susan Cortright aided by William Cox, the Caprock Outdoor Drama group, a piece by playwright Don McAlavy, a Lincoln period piece was performed by local favorite Boyd Barrett who works with the New Mexico Endowment for the Humanities.

At times patrons scrambled from the outdoor stage for the shelter house during several cloudbursts.

Others, in fashionable long split-leg slickers, braved the rain for a closer look through crystal beads that dripped from the brim of their 10-gallon hats.

Many still had their six-guns strapped to their legs. Not all were in costume. County Sheriff

James McSwane showed up looking like he usually does and won the Pat Garrett look alike contest.

Stinkin' Springs Stew judges included Councilor Jess Stinson, Councilor Barbara Duff, artist John Meigs, and radio personality Ed Hyman.

Janean Grissom, current president of the Billy the Kid Gang, won first place for her stew. The Burrito Bunch was runnerup and Paul Blevins was awarded third place.

Bill Allen's stew camp was awarded for appearance of the most authentic cooking style and gear.

Billy the Kid/Pat Garrett Days is four years old. The first year's event was held at Fort Sumner, followed by Lincoln. Last year's event was also at Cedar Creek.

William H. Cox was the repeat winner in the Billy the Kid look alike contest. Cox is from Bartow, Florida.

Cox moved to New Mexico after viewing the movie "Young Guns" about Billy the Kid. He met Ken Hobbs of the Roswell

Museum. Hobbs was struck by the resemblance of Cox to the Kid and took him to Lincoln. Now Cox spends most of his time in acting out Billy the Kid in speaking engagements to those who will give him work.

Sheriff McSwane won the Pat Garrett look alike contest. Keith Garrett Long was runnerup and Paul Blevins finished third. It was McSwane's second year as winner and historians swear he is a "dead ringer" for the former legend sheriff.

Freda McSwane captured the hearts of the crowd with her large exaggerated girth as she won the Deluvina Maxwell look-alike contest. Maryln Bowlin won the number two spot and Marvella Thorp gained third place honors.

Young Susan McSwane look-alike was Haylee McSwane.

The top adult Susan McSwane look alike was Carolyn Allen from Odessa, Texas. Susan Cortright was a close second and Maryln Bowlin, third.

Allen said she fell in love with Billy the Kid at age 14 when she saw a movie about him and has been a fan ever since, 43 years.

William Long won the young Billy look-alike contest. Long was a spitting image of the Kid's photograph, complete with rumped vest and hat.

Wayne McSwane and Riley Carbutto were in a two-way tie for second and Joshua L'Aloue, Kalongi Kazen-Bobb and Jake Albersmeyer were in a dead heat for third.

The annual membership meeting followed the look-alike contests.

Guided tours of local historical sites were given throughout the Pat Garrett Days. On Saturday, there was a dedication of an historical Market at San Patricio, MP 281.

The small town was ransacked by the sheriff and his posse as the result of information that Billy and the Regulators were hiding in town.

John Meigs, whose Fort Meigs Gallery and home are in San Patricio, was master of ceremonies for the dedication.

Residents of Ruidoso were also treated to information about the Lincoln County Women at the Chautauqua Festival in Midtown Ruidoso. Those performances were sponsored by the new Ruidoso Arts and Film Commission.

The new Village of Ruidoso Transportation Advisory Board has scheduled an organizational meeting for 7:30 a.m. Wednesday, July 17, in the meeting room of the Lincoln County Cafe at the corner of Sudderth and Mechem.

According to village clerk Tammy Maddox, the purpose of the meeting is to elect a chairman, vice-chairman and secretary and to adopt, by resolution, the Open Meetings Act and Robert's Rules of Parliamentary Law.

## State offers free water tests

The state will test well water free from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. July 20 at the Hondo Valley school cafeteria. Results will be available later that day, said Craig Shapard, a water resource specialist with the State Environment Department's technical support services of the Ground Water Bureau.

To obtain a valid sample, residents should use a clean, one quart container. They should allow the water from the cold tap to run for five minutes before filling the container. The testing will be confined to levels of nitrates, sulfates and iron. No biological tests will be run, Shapard said. He also will need a legal description of the well site, including section, township and range.

# Lovelace assists police chief

It took three years, but Police Chief Richard Swenor finally found the money to hire a number two.

Officer Mike Lovelace, an 18-year resident of Ruidoso who has been with the department since 1975, has been promoted to assistant chief — filling a position that has been vacant since June 1988.

The police department has had employees who acted as assistant to the chief, but, this is the first time it has been an official budgeted position since 1988, said Chief Swenor.

The position was cut from the budget in 1988, and reinstated in recent budget workshops.

There were three applicants — Lovelace and two of his colleagues — said Chief Swenor.

Lovelace was chosen by a review committee that considered seniority and rank, time as a police officer, job evaluations and community involvement.

It was a complicated procedure but the only way for the promotion to be fair, Swenor said. "It keeps personalities out of it."

"I was a little surprised when I found out and felt good that my qualifications and experience were enough to obtain the position," Lovelace said.

The chief is also looking forward to having Lovelace on board and getting projects back on line that have been placed on hold in the past few years.

Lovelace has been with the police department for 16 years starting out as a front line patrolman.

He made his way to the top through community involvement

and the extension of advanced schooling.

"I have attended over 1,000 hours in advanced schools and seminars related to Law Enforcement," commented Lovelace in his application.

Swenor said Lovelace has been nominated to the FBI academy.

He is also involved in Crimestoppers, the Fraternal Order of Police, the Sertoma Club, and assists with the local Family Crisis Center, Human Services, Special Olympics and Santa Cops.

"I'm glad for the opportunity of advancement and looking forward to the challenge of the new job," said Lovelace, who is confident that he will be able to perform well.

The new lieutenant enjoys working for the Village of Ruidoso and said he has no plans to go any place else.

Greg Masters, vice president of the Economic Development Division, announced his committee chairpersons.

Joan Bailey will head Visitor Promotion and Service; Doug Conley, Data Development Committee; Dave McIntosh tentative, Relocation Services. An Area Relations chairperson still is being sought.

Valerie Miller is vice president of Community Development.

Her committee chair persons are: Public Affairs, Tom Battin; Arts and Cultural Committee, Dr.

James A. Fenimore; Transportation Committee, Dick Weber; Education Committee, Donald Swalander, and Beautification Committee, Jim Varnadore.

Chamber board members indicated they are leaning toward "farming out" Oktoberfest to a private organization.

# Alto residents speak out on zoning proposal

Land around Alto that has been farmed, ranched and banded about through more than a dozen court hearings, got the attention of the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zoning Commission (ETZ) last week.

ETZ, a village-county group that oversees Ruidoso's one-mile perimeter, approved a zone change on 75 to 80 acres of that 110-acre tract, changing it from residential (R-1) to rural-suburban (R-S).

But not before hearing a couple of dozen Alto residents and the property owner in heated discussion over the best use for the undeveloped land.

In 1962, Robert Scribner purchased the land in Deer Park Meadows — land that had been farmed and ranched since it was patented in 1912. He farmed and ranched on the land that is next to the Alto Lakes private development.

Scribner and his wife, Ann, sold their land to a company that is no longer in business and after a series of legal transactions, they have their 110 acres back — whether they want it or not.

"My intention is to revert to its former use," said Scribner, who was faced with a new problem when he completed his court procedures.

Somewhere along the line his farming and ranching land had been zoned residential (R-1). Although Scribner was on record as the mortgage holder when the ETZ took effect and the R-1 zoning was established, he was never notified.

"I cannot afford to keep a 110-

acre green belt area for Alto Village residents," said Scribner, who was facing about 20 of his Alto neighbors, on hand to be sure that any change in zoning would be in the best interests of their property.

Concerned over the possible development of a trailer or modular home area, Alto residents at the meeting learned that much of Scribner's land is in the county, outside the ETZ, and not zoned at all.

Scribner was asking the ETZ to zone the 75-80 acres that are in that group's jurisdiction R-S, not because that's the zoning he wanted, but mainly because it was the closest to his former use.

He said he sold to the Lakeside Corporation with release clauses, and while the land was in limbo the board of Alto Lakes Golf and Country Club raised the price on golfing memberships from \$1,500 to \$4,000 to \$20,000 all within 90 days. He said that was the "death knell" for his property since those same golfing memberships selling for \$11,000 when sold by individuals.

"I'd have to give someone \$10,000 to take one of my lots," he said.

With the R-1 designation, Scribner said he would be forced to subdivide the land in 3/4 acre lots to develop some low-cost modular housing — in the \$35,000 range.

His preference was the R-S designation — the zoning that he got — and under that zoning he can farm and ranch or sub-divide into lots no smaller than five acres each.

Scribner said he wants to sell his land, but warned the ETZ that he's spent so much money just getting

his land back, that he is quite willing to spend whatever it takes to get the zoning designation he needs.

ETZ Chairman Tim Hoyt and member Robert Donaldson stressed to the protesters that the ETZ is in place to protect the orderly development of the Village of Ruidoso. Such area zoning is established in state law, and it gives villages and towns some protection from annexing areas that have grown up willy nilly with no development criteria.

"It's a buffer zone," said Hoyt.

Some members of the audience asked ETZ to rewrite or amend the zoning ordinance — especially as it might relate to modular homes, trailers or basically any low-cost housing.

"You really need a ranching, a farming zoning," said Scribner.

"I'm sure all of us appreciate both sides ... we go and change the zoning ... you just automatically start affecting a lot of people," said Hoyt, noting that "you can't please everybody."

"I think everybody here would prefer R-S," said Dwight Andrews.

Faced again and again with the fact that just two choices were on the table — R-1 or R-S — not everybody was pleased.

"It's like asking if you like alligators or rattlesnakes," said Alto resident Clarice McWilliams.

At one point, a member of the seven-member commission called the county attorney to ask if an exception could be granted to the zoning law, and learned that the ordinance has no provisions for an exception.

The county attorney says it's

got to be alligators or rattlesnakes," said Donaldson.

After Commissioner Jack Page made the motion, seconded by Commissioner Stormy Edwards, to change the zoning to R-S, Commissioner Mack Bell asked for a show of hands if anyone still strongly objected. About half the people in the room — most all the women — raised their hands.

The zoning change passed on a 6-1 vote, with Bell, a rancher, casting the lone "no" vote.

Hoyt said the ETZ usually is faced with people in the unzoned county who want fewer restrictions instead of more. He noted that Scribner's situation was unusual in that his land backs up on one of the most restrictive subdivisions in New Mexico.

"The subdivision built around me," said Scribner.

Also during last week's meeting, ETZ approved a setback variance for Clarence and Opal Armstrong who want to construct an addition on their home at Lot 10, Block 3, Fawn Ridge 2nd addition.

The Commission also unanimously approved a front yard setback variance for Steve Morgan on lot 32, 33, 34 and 35, Block 16, Paradise Canyon Subdivision.

Commissioner Bell explained that ETZ is made up of three representatives of the Village of Ruidoso, three from the county and one at large. Bell is the at large representative, with Hoyt, Donaldson and Doug Siddens representing Ruidoso and Page, Edwards and Gordon Barham representing the county.

# Apache Trails is spreading the word

If the word isn't getting out about attractions in the Otero-Lincoln County area, it won't be the fault of the Apache Trails Promotion Council.

Some 20 members of that regional group met Wednesday at the Wortley Hotel in Lincoln.

Watts said Apache Trails has enough money in the treasury to cover the estimated \$2,000 cost for a third of a page advertisement.

New member Chris Kiamer, representing the Southwest Ar-

chaeological Museum in Alamogordo, was welcomed. The privately owned museum features a collection of Mimbres Indian artifacts covering 1,200 years.

The town of Lincoln has a new foldout brochure which contains a highlighted map of the Apache Trails area.

The word is getting out on area attractions.

Members reported on upcoming special events in their towns and locations, including the Ruidoso Art Festival, July 26-28; singer Don Edwards to appear at the Flying J Ranch during Aspenfest; Aspenfest in Ruidoso; Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium; Lincoln County Fair; Space Week at the Space Hall of Fame; the All American Festival in Lincoln County; Old Lincoln Days, August 2-4; and Cottonwood Festival in Alameda Park, Alamogordo.

Watts said the Apache Trails sign project is moving slowly. The plan is to get New Mexico Highway Department's cooperation to put Apache Trails logos on highway sign posts in the area.

James Hobbs of the Flying J Ranch said he had driven the Turquoise Trail out of Albuquerque recently.

He said the Apache Trails has much more to offer in the way of area attractions.

The group will meet next at 5:30 p.m. August 14, at the Flying J Ranch, preceding the evening performance by the Flying J Wranglers that day.

# Humane Society business is booming

Her name gives a hint from the start that Rosebud is a little bit unusual.

Since she arrived as a stray at the Lincoln County Humane Society shelter in January, Rosebud has become a favorite of shelter manager Randy Basch.

The red heeler-huskie cross "is very sweet and very people oriented," he said. "She's starved for affection and gets along well with all dogs."

Rosebud is housebroken and when she does go outside, her performance is as unusual as her name. Before and during the process of taking care of "business," Rosebud stands on her back legs and jumps up and down against the fence.

"I've never seen her do it any other way," Basch said. "I have no idea where she acquired that habit."

Tanner Racing Stables from Phoenix, Arizona, will sponsor Rosebud's mandatory spaying to ensure her eligibility for adoption and to take care of the major cost.

Rosebud is about one year old.

Basch said the shelter urgently needs foster homes for kittens. Several litters recently had to be destroyed because they came to the shelter in poor condition, without protective shots, and no foster homes were available.

Foster homes keep kittens a few weeks until their immunizations take effect. The kittens come back to the shelter better socialized because of the attention they have received and that makes them better candidates for adoption, Basch said.

The day of the interview at the shelter, Basch was depressed. He related an incident in which a woman brought in a litter of Labrador puppies that she had not bothered to give protective shots for Parvo or distemper.

Basch said he told the owner all of the Labrador pups would

have to be destroyed because they arrived looking ill and without shots.

"She didn't care what I did with them," he said, shaking his head.

However another woman in the office at the time was insistent that Basch give the lab puppies a chance. Against his better judgment, partly because he wants people to know the shelter does its best for each animal, Basch relented and allowed the pups into the shelter.

"I was afraid to send the litter to one of my foster homes because they could infect that environment and make it unsafe for future litters," he said.

Two pups adopted by the woman and her friend died, as did the remaining Labrador pups at the shelter.

Instead of being put down quickly and humanely, they lingered and suffered for days," he said. "And now 14 other animals have to be put down because of their exposure (to diagnosed Parvo and distemper)."

"I shouldn't have let the woman sway me from what I knew was best. People get concerned about one litter and don't think about the larger picture and how they could affect many more animals."

Like any other person who cares for animals and is faced with tough life and death decisions, Basch said there are some days he gets very discouraged about the lack of concern by many pet owners.

He stressed the importance of spaying and neutering all pets to prevent unnecessary suffering and death for unwanted litters. If someone wants new pets, there is an abundance of stray and abandoned animals available at the shelter for adoption any time during the year.

The society requires all adopted animals to be neutered or spayed.

"Sometimes people just don't understand that," Basch said. "I had a rancher call me about

adopting a pet and he just couldn't understand why we wouldn't let one go without neutering. He kept saying he was a rancher.

"I told him that many of my puppy litters are brought in by

ranchers who don't want them.

I've seen too many of those young animals have to be put down to let one of the animals from the shelter be used to produce more puppies."

Basch said he appreciates the

many supporters of the society, who donate money and their time to help the shelter financially and as foster homes. Those people brighten his days. But the best news always is an adoption, when he is able to match a new owner with an animal from the shelter.

## Federal Duck Stamp released

It soon will be open season on the 1991-1992 Federal Duck Stamp, also known as the Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation stamp.


The 1991-1992 Federal Duck Stamp will sell for \$15, a \$2.50 increase over last year. Congress authorized the price increase as part of the Emergency Wetlands Resources Act of 1986 to provide more funds to acquire and protect disappearing habitats.

Hunters 16 years of age or older must carry a current, signed Federal Duck Stamp in order to hunt waterfowl.

July 1 signals the official opening of the 1991 Federal Duck Stamp contest.

This year's contest regulations have been revised slightly to clarify regarding the administration of the contest, judging procedures, and the obligations of the winning artist.


# Luck is the key to big game hunts

The first two weeks in July are very important to a lot of big game hunters around the state. Right now, drawings are under way to decide who will receive permits to hunt for several species of big game this fall.

Many hunters are anxiously awaiting the results and lots of telephone calls are being received at Game Department offices from those hoping to get early information. However, the department is not able to supply early information on those successful in the drawings. All applicants, both successful and unsuccessful, will be promptly notified by mail. Cards with this information should be received within 10 days of the drawing.

So far, drawings that have been completed include: deer entry permits, oryx and ibex on Monday; bow elk Tuesday; muzzle-loader and handicapped elk on Wednesday. The drawing for rifle elk permits begins on Thursday and should be complete by next Monday. Drawings for antelope permits will then take place and should be completed by Tuesday, July 16.

Remember don't call the Game Department until 10 days after the drawing to find out results.



For those that are unlucky in the drawing and think maybe there's some way to improve the odds of getting a permit let's look at the drawing system.

Some folks search through a stack of application forms to pick out a special number that they heard was drawn more often than others, or they only apply on forms that have either odd or even numbers. Some apply as early or as late as possible thinking this gives them an edge. Unfortunately, none of these tricks work. Being drawn for a special hunt depends on one thing — luck.

All applications are received by the Special Hunts Section in the Game Department office

in Santa Fe. Applications are then checked for completeness and accuracy before being sent to the Data Processing Division. Here the long process of key punching all the information on each individual applicant into a computer is completed. Computer cards carrying this information are then rechecked to minimize errors and entered into the computer files.

The computer is programmed to store the files randomly throughout the system. It doesn't use application numbers, date of arrival, or any other specific method to store the application in its files.

When it is time to draw the lucky winners, computer operators enter the number of permits that are being issued for a particular hunt. The computer then goes through its files and randomly selects those that will receive a permit. It all depends on which file an application is placed in and which file the computer randomly chooses. In other words, luck.

It is hoped, most hunters will be lucky in drawing a permit. Those that are anxiously waiting to find out if they're going hunting this fall will find out soon.

Old Lincoln Gallery plans one-man show August 2-4

The works of Kenneth Nunn can be seen in his first one-man show at the Old Lincoln Town Gallery, August 2, 3 and 4, in Lincoln.

The adage, "It's never too late," may be particularly appropriate in the case of artist, Kenneth Nunn.

Nunn, the sixth of nine children, was born in Stanley, New Mexico, on June 26, 1934. Following a wide and varied career in many fields, he settled in Albuquerque and began painting at the age of 53.

In 1951, Ken left school for a stint in the Marine Corps which lasted until 1955. Although this was the period of the Korean Conflict, he did not see battle, but instead was placed in a position in supply where he spent the last 18 months of his stay in the Marines as a Sergeant moving troops and their families in and out of Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.

Following the Marine Corps, Nunn returned to New Mexico where he married and began raising two children, Kenny and Karen. After his marriage, he decided to go back to school. As a result, he landed a job with the Atomic Energy Commission, receiving a top secret clearance, and working on one of the first atomic reactors ever built.

However, this position soon proved to be a bit too tame, so he left the A.E.C. and went to work as a construction foreman. This job

provided a lot of opportunity to move around and live in different cities and towns throughout the Southwest.

This period also saw the development of a new hobby, stock car or jalopy racing. Interest in this hobby may be the direct result of having been raised with Bobby, Louie and Jerry Unser of car racing fame. Bobby, Louie, Jerry and Ken were a little bit wild on those three-wheel motorcycles that they rode to school in their youth.

In 1969, Ken accepted a position in Albuquerque with the General Electric Company as a foreman in the assembly of jet engine parts and remained with G.E. for the next 15 years. Realizing that a hobby more conservative than stock car racing might prove to be more healthy, Nunn and his wife, Betty, took up motorcycle riding — more conservative, not boring!

He left G.E. and went back into construction in 1984. What had begun as a hobby, motorcycle riding, inadvertently proved to be the road to a career change. An old friend, Taos artist Don Brackett and his artist wife, Phyllis Garoutte, came by to go riding with the Nunn's. During that ride, Brackett asked Ken Nunn if he would help him out of a bind.

It seemed that the Taos artist owned the Dollar Sign Shop in Albuquerque and he needed help. Nunn became a sign painter in

1986 and became friends with Albuquerque artists David Schwindt and Ralph Leyba.

David Schwindt proved to be a good friend loaning Nunn, the struggling artist, books and providing much needed advice and information during those first four or five critical years.

In 1986, Nunn began to search for workshops which would enhance his art career and found one of the best in Big Timber, Montana—Zemsky/Hines Pro Art Workshops. This proved to be the springboard to other workshops including those of Emmett Johns, L. Turner and Daniel Greene.

Nunn has met and worked with some of America's leading artists such as R. Bateman, V. Goodnight, Joe Abbrescia, Clyde Aspevig, Scott Switzer, and, of course, Jack Hines and Jessica Zemsky.

He enjoys painting in all media but oils remain his favorite.

Subject matter is no problem, as Nunn likes to paint almost anything but believes people, especially character types, are the most fun.

After this show at Sally Black's art gallery in historic old Lincoln, the artist plans to go to Montana to do a lot of outdoor painting with Scott Switzer and maybe attend the Zemsky/Hines workshops again.

"I want to give all credit for my success to God and my wife, Betty, who has been my most faithful supporter," said Nunn.



## Steppin To The Moon steps back into the winners' circle

Just when it seems like Jack Brooks has done everything a quarter horse trainer can possibly do in a career, he turns a new trick.

On a rainy Sunday, with the surrounding Sacramento mountains shrouded in clouds, Brooks became the first trainer in 28 years to saddle back-to-back Rainbow Futurity winners.

Steppin For The Moon, just one of five horses in the Grade I dash from Team Brooks' barn, upset some of his more highly-regarded stablemates in the prestigious second leg of the 2-year-old Triple Crown. The long-striding son of Moon Lark checked in one length clear of the field, and covered the sloppy 350 yards in a snappy 17.62.

Steppin For The Moon, who had not won a race since capturing a division of the Kansas Futurity time trials, was flawless in Sunday's race. He broke smartly under veteran jockey Jerry Nicodemus and simply strided away from the field.

Obviously, Brooks has ironed out the gate problems that plagued the

chestnut colt when he finished last in the Kansas Futurity here May 26.

"I made a decision in the Kansas to try a flipping rig on him for the first time," said Brooks, who has now won the Rainbow Futurity a record four times. "He fought the rig, and banged his head real hard. But it taught him a lesson. He's been real good in the gate ever since."

The victory was the second Grade I triumph for Steppin For The Moon, who earlier captured the West Texas Futurity at Sunland Park. After capturing the first four starts of his career, Steppin For The Moon snapped a three-race losing streak Sunday.

"He was real kind at the gate today," said Nicodemus, who also rode Steppin For The Moon in the Kansas Futurity. "He was no problem whatsoever. Jack (Brooks) did a job."

Steppin For The Moon was fairly overlooked by the betting crowd, despite his record of four wins and two seconds from seven starts. He

was sent off at odds of 9-to-1, the fifth choice in the field of 10. The entry of Bills Ryon and Special Task was the overwhelming 4-to-5 favorite.

Steppin For The Moon, who is owned in partnership by Jerry Wells and Joan Crews Hoyt of Sulphur, Okla., increased his career bankroll to \$232,093.

Bills Ryon finished second, just a neck in front of his entrymate Special Task. Bills Ryon was the fastest qualifier by 14/100ths of a second, and actually defeated Steppin For The Moon by almost two lengths in the trials.

Bills Ryon entered the finals with three wins in four starts. His only loss came in the Kansas finals when he finished sixth, and reportedly was sick with a virus.

"He was still sick with that virus," said Steve Fuller, the rider of Bills Ryon. "He couldn't get any air. He coughed the whole way warming up."

Also, for the fourth consecutive day, there were no winners in the Twin Trifecta.

# Space Week is set for blastoff

Spaceweek at the Space Center will be a week-long extravaganza celebrating space exploration at the international space museum and OMNIMAX/Planetarium complex.

The schedule of events at the Space Center is as follows:

**Tuesday, July 16—Starparty at the White Sands National Monument**, co-sponsored by the Space Center and the Alamogordo Amateur Astronomers. The public is invited to participate, and no equipment is necessary, as the astronomy club will set up telescopes for public viewing. Please arrive at the middle of the Loop Drive before dark, to prevent light pollution by vehicle headlights.

There will also be storytelling of Indian Sky Legends in the Astronaut Memorial Garden, adjacent to the International Space Hall of Fame. The program will begin at 10 a.m. and will repeat every half hour, with the last show at 3 p.m.

**Wednesday, July 17—Dr. John P. Stapp** will be autographing his collection of humorous insights and sidelights, called the "Dr. Stapp's Almanac and Rational Calendar," on the first floor of the International Space Hall of Fame between 10 and noon and between 1 and 3. He will also reminisce about his famous ride on the Sonic Wind I, when he acquired the name "the fastest man on earth." The restored film, "Space Age Railroad," filmed in the 1950s at Holloman Air Force Base, will be shown as well. Shuttle Camp cadet rockets will be fired during the afternoon, in the upper parking lot of the Space Center.

At 6:30 a special dinner will take place at the Holiday Inn, after which Astronaut Mullane will give a personal account of his venture into space. Tickets for the dinner and program are on sale for \$12.50 per person at United New Mexico Bank, First National Bank, KPFA Radio and Holiday Inn. (The ticket cost helps pay the cost of bringing Mullane to Alamogordo.) Because the content and format of the astronaut's monologue, Mullane has requested that only guests over the age of 18 attend this special event.

**Saturday, July 20—Film Night** at the Hubbard Space Science Education Building. Special archival films will be presented on the history of spacelift, providing unusual insight into the fascinating origins of space travel. Begins at 7 p.m.

**Sunday, July 21—Youth Day** at the Space Center. All adults are encouraged to explore the facility with the enthusiasm of youth, purchasing their adult combination tickets at the youth combination ticket rate. (Includes both the museum and the OMNIMAX feature, "Blue Planet").




### Signs set the tone

The Village of Ruidoso adopted a sign ordinance some years ago, and that passage was preceded by public hearings, discussions and plenty of debate. How much is enough? How much is too much? And, in the end, rules and regulations were adopted that the Planning Commission and Village Council believed would fit this mountain resort community.

But, what good does it do to have an ordinance, if it's not enforced? A drive through town will show that signs remain long after a business is gone; some signs are shabby and in disrepair. On a drive down Sudderth Drive Friday morning, at least a half dozen hand-lettered signs were seen propped up here and there. On that same drive, we saw signs for several businesses which have been out of business for a long time.

Planning administrator Cleatus Richards says the ordinance has enforcement provisions, but the field and paperwork would take a lot of time. He said he wants to enforce the ordinance, but he needs help.

Signs set the tone for a town — project the image that the community has chosen for itself. They can enhance and improve the looks of a village, or they can turn a street into a mishmash. If we want our mountain resort to look inviting to tourists, let's set a high priority on enforcing our sign ordinance.


Nothing remotely intellectually challenging made its way into my television viewing this evening. I was busy watching Unsolved Mysteries.

You know which program I'm talking about. C'mon, tell the truth. You may say you just happen across it from time to time while you're looking for the MacNeil-Lehrer Report, but we all know the truth. You can't wait for 7 p.m. so you can catch up on whether that woman who kidnapped her kids was ever found, or if the "Commuter Bandit" struck again.

We try to keep our addiction to this show a secret from our friends. We know they view this as junk-food television, unworthy of an hour of any intelligent, educated person's valuable time. Better we should be reading Joyce Carol Oates' newest novel, or teaching ourselves harpsichord, or, God forbid, exercising, than wasting our time on this trash.

I agree with them. I'm embarrassed at being such a low-brow. But I've had a brilliant insight. I now know why this program appeals to us against our wills:

It and similar shows are the only programs on television that leave us with the sense that something can be done about anything. This matters, because most of the time when we watch television, we feel ourselves sinking lower and lower into the couch until we transform into depressed, defeated lumps absolute-

ly drenched in our own helplessness.

We watch the endless news stories about the plight of the Kurdish refugees and our hearts are absolutely wrenched. We want to invite them into our houses and empty our refrigerators for them. We want to give them our sweaters and our down sleeping bags.

And we want to rock every Romanian infant wailing in terminal misery in our big comfortable rocking chairs until they drift into peaceful, contented slumber. They need everything and we have every material thing they need, but no way of sharing it.

This frustrates us and breaks our hearts.

We see replay after replay of that group of bloodthirsty L.A. police officers beating that helpless man and we want to jump off that balcony and stop them. I at least want to tell someone how outraged I am and how stupid I think it is.

My husband already knows, my daughter is on the telephone and the dogs just slink away because they think I'm raising my voice at them.

If there were just one program on television that paralyzed us and reinforced our helplessness in the face of an enormous problem, we

could just switch channels. But every time we tune in, someone is telling us about the hole in the ozone layer, the extinction of another species or the fact that 20 percent of the foods we love will kill us.

In their stampede to win the ratings race, the networks seem determined to outdo each other to see who can be the most alarming, the most dramatic, the most shocking of all. And not one of them give me any hope that I, personally, can make a damned bit of difference in any of it.

Except Unsolved Mysteries, America's Most Wanted and Missing Persons. Although most of us actually would prefer not to discover that the man sitting next to us on the couch is the famed Commuter Bandit, we do find it fascinating that every week an actual problem actually gets solved.

Someone finds his children, a murder case is closed, an adopted child finally located her mother — and someone sitting in front of a television somewhere actually made the difference.

All it took was a stroll to the telephone in the hall. We wish all of our problems could be solved so easily.

But at least some two-way action was involved. A little paralysis was dislodged. Someone did something besides sitting on the couch chewing on the inside of her jaw trying to decide whether to by a cynic or a basket case.

Nobody saved the day, but someone got off their can and made a phone call. Optimist that I am, I wonder if somebody lifting a finger to dial the telephone today might translate into thousands of American citizens raising their fists or opening their hearts tomorrow. That would be a program to watch.

### Junk mail pumps up postal rates

#### TO THE EDITOR:

I would like to address the issue of our continuing need for an increase in postal rates. I have written to my senators and congressmen, the governor, the Postmaster General and the President. I have received one reply, from the Office of the President, in the form of a form letter thanking me for my comment.

The problem does not lie in what rate we charge for first class mail. It lies in what we charge for "junk mail." You know, that stuff that fills your mailbox that you can't wait to throw away before you leave the post office. My records show that one item out of every nine is first class and the other eight are sent with as little as eight cents

#### postage.

I would like to see anything in an envelope or folded and fastened with tape or staples sent for the same rate and called "first class." That leaves postal cards, newspapers and magazines (second class) which have a lesser rate, depending upon weight. Anything over one ounce would require an additional amount per ounce.

If the mail is important enough for us to read, it should be important enough to the sender to require the same rate as that letter from a friend or relative. If he doesn't feel it's that important, let him keep it out of our mailboxes so that we can put only the good stuff there.
