Council adopts record budget

Two big ticket items, the civic events center and sewage, drove the 1991-92 Ruidoso Village Council budget to a record high \$15-million dollars, according to Village Manager Ron Wicker.

Councilor Ron Andrews said if you subtracted the unusual expenditures from this year's budget, (3-million for the civic-events center and a million dollars in the sewer system) the difference between '91-92 and last year's budget would be virtually the same, about 11-million dollars and even improved the village's cash position by about \$600,000.

Delays stall civic center

Construction of the new civic-events center will be delayed by a month until the Department of Finance and Administration (DFA) reviews an April report according to the village manager Ron Wicker.

Wicker said the DFA is involved in funding part of the civic-events center through three different grants totaling about \$450,000.

Wicker said he was surprised to learn that the DFA has to approve the plan specifications and the bid award process.

He said the DFA called the village last week to put them on notice of their needs and to hold off on the bid process.

"We need to extend the bid date from July 24, to August 14," said Wicker. "And extend the award date for up to 45 days from the date of the bids."

Wicker said this will give the village an opportunity to meet all the requirements of the DFA.

"We don't want to have to scrap everything we've done so far,"

Wicker said. Councilor Bill Karn asked why the DFA was coming up with last minute instructions.

Wicker said the village was to send in quarterly reports previously handled by Leon Eggleston. He said when Eggleston left his position with the village, the report responsibility was inadvertently missed.

"With the additional time, they will review the plans and specifications and tell us we're in compliance with all of their standards. If we're not, there's a chance they will say we have to scrap everything we've done, so far as bidding, and start over. What we're trying to do is salvage everything we can to keep this thing on track."

Wicker said the only report missing was for April and the village is now caught up with that report.

Wicker said Cleatus Richards on

Enchanted campers encouraged by youngster's victory

Five years ago, under the glow of a beam from his uncle's flashlight, Jason Gaes' life changed.

For the next two years, he fought and won a battle against one of the fastest-growing cancers known, Burkitt's lymphoma. It's a cancer caused by the same virus that triggers relatively harmless and common mononucleosis.

Jason, now 13, and his mother GERALYN GAES, were in Ruidoso last week as part of a two-day visit by participants in Camp Enchantment.

The week-long camp sponsored by the New Mexico arm of the American Cancer Society is based in Alamogordo. But the young campers seemed eager to flee the heat below and spend two days in the mountains.

JASON'S STORY

Relaxing in one of the group shelters with volunteers assembled to help feed the campers, Mrs. Gaes explained that the first of Jason's cancerous growths was discovered on June 28, 1984, by Jason's uncle.

She took Jason to a dentist in their hometown in Minnesota. He quickly realized it was not an abscessed tooth.

Within hours, the family was told five cancerous growths were invading Jason's body. Besides the one in his mouth, there was one behind his eye, two in his right kidney and one in his abdomen the size of a golf ball.

He was given a one-in-five chance of living.

By the time Jason hit the operating table, the abdominal growth had ballooned from the size of a grapefruit, about 10-inches in diameter. Part of Jason's colon was removed.

Operations were followed by two years of intensive chemotherapy (using six different drugs) and radiation therapy, including cranial radiation to ensure the growth did not enter Jason's brain.

The treatment ended in 1986. Today, Jason plays all the major sports in school. He has written

a book illustrated with his two brothers called "My Book for Kids with Cansur" and recorded a song about fighting and beating the disease. He and his mother have appeared on talk shows and a documentary about his experience won an Academy Award last year.

In 1988, President Ronald Reagan presented the American Cancer Society's Courage Award to Jason.

"He's been off treatment for five years," Mrs. Gaes said. "He goes back for a yearly check, but by now they are not even looking for a recurrence. They are looking for repercussions from his radical treatment."

Jason also is participating in research aimed at determining a possible genetic predisposition to that type of cancer. Researchers hope to develop an inoculation using antibodies in Jason's blood to be administered to other victims of the same disease.

One of the impacts of cancer not always recognized by outsiders is the effect on the siblings, Mrs. Gaes said.

For a long while, Jason's twin brother Tim

pulled away.

"He went through a crisis of his own," Mrs. Gaes said. "He would make excuses and sleep on the floor. He was afraid he would catch the disease from Jason. He developed a stutter."

But seven years later, "I don't see any scars in the relationship of the two boys," she said.

CAMPERS ARRIVE

Two busloads full of the courageous campers arrived Wednesday about noon at the Cedar Creek Group Campground where volunteers from the local fire department, police department and community groups had prepared surprises.

McDonald's donated the lunch, caps from KBUY radio station and T-shirts from McGruff and his Ruidoso-Lincoln County Crimestoppers were passed out.

Most of the children didn't look like victims of cancer. They didn't act like victims. They looked and acted like children at camp anywhere. But occasionally, the sight of a wheelchair or a child with hair loss brought home the life and death battle they face.

Helping blow up the balloons and decorate the shelter Wednesday were several of the local organizers of the visit including Kathleen Michelena, Lanny Maddox and Mary Maul.

After the campers digested their meals, Dave Dale took them into the forest for a nature walk, pointing out plants, animals and other things of interest.

When they returned, some of the children took advantage of the fire engine parked at the campground and initiated a water fight.

That night, gunfighters shot it out at the Flying J Ranch where the children ate dinner and listened to the music of the Flying J Wranglers. Then it was off to bed at The Inn at Pine Springs.

OFF TO THE RACES

More thrills were in store for the campers Thursday morning when they ate breakfast at the

Turf Club with about 30 jockeys from Ruidoso Downs.

Dianne Anderson from KOAT-TV in Albuquerque acted as master of ceremonies. Joan Dale Hubbard, of Ruidoso Downs Race Track and the Hubbard Museum, was on hand to welcome the children and to invite them to visit the Hubbard Art Museum after breakfast.

Camp Enchantment organizers gave the audience a quick overview of the operation. They thanked Sports Services for providing all of the breakfasts for the children and for donating the profits from the \$12-a-plate meals for the adults.

Ten campers won the right to stand in the winner's circle with the successful horse and jockey after the race dedicated to the camp later that day.

An autograph session with the jockeys followed and then it was off to the stables to see the horses.

The children next headed toward the Ski Apache area. Kentucky Fried Chicken donated the lunches, Furr's supplied the soft drinks and Pat Morrison passed out scarves from the ski resort. Then it was back to the races and photographs with the jockeys, who handed out racing goggles to the campers.

Goodies bags were prepared for each camper by the Cabbage Rose shop, Cowboys, Indians and Outlaws and Frank's Fruit Market.

Everyone cooled off with an hour-long dip in the community pool, then enjoyed more than 30 pizzas from Pizza Hut and dessert from It's Yogurt Time.

"The outpouring from this community was phenomenal," Maul said. "The children stayed an extra hour or more at the pool. They didn't want to leave, but they had a dance to go to later in Alamogordo. They all said they were looking forward to coming back next year."

Reality says not all may be here next year, but like Jason, they're fighters. Enchantment organizers and local volunteers just hope this past week may give them some extra emotional ammunition to continue their battle.

Summer's no vacation for working teens

Because of a special grant from the Department of Labor, a group of Ruidoso High School students are working while earning high school credit this summer.

The Department of Labor gave the high school a golden opportunity, offering a grant of just under \$2,500 for a special summer program.

Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA) is part of the student youth and training program designed to help people with financial need. JTPA pays students to take a summer class and gives them a job with a non-profit, public or private, agency.

In Ruidoso, the students have jobs with the public library, the police department, fire department, airport, parks and recreation, humane society and the administrative offices.

The kids are actually getting paid to go to school and to go to work, said high school principal

Mike Kakuska.

The JTPA program coincides with the high school's first year at providing summer school. Without the grant, the school may not have been able to offer such a thing.

"It pays for itself," said Kakuska.

The only major cost of summer school is paying the teacher's salaries and the grant pays for that.

Costs are also being subsidized by the \$80 tuition fee for each class taken by those students who are not part of the JTPA program, he said.

Kakuska said 30 students are taking classes, with only 10 in the JTPA program. The additional 20 students do not have to report to a job daily.

Also, just because some students participating in the JTPA program are also taking a class, they don't necessarily have to qualify for the program, said Karen Boehler from the Alamogordo Department of Labor.

Although schooling is important

to the agency, its major concern is providing a source of income to needy students, who are paid minimum wage for a 25-hour work week. For those who are attending a class, the two-and-a-half hours or more are included in this total, she said.

In order to receive the benefits of the JTPA program the students must attend school and report to their jobs daily, Boehler said. A few Ruidoso students have not complied with this rule and therefore have been dropped from the program.

Although financial need was the only criteria to be eligible for the program, almost every student taking a class is one who must make that course up in order to graduate.

It's just a coincidence, but it demonstrates one of the reasons of starting up the summer school program in the first place, said Kakuska.

Ruidoso teenagers have never had a chance to make up classes before.

During a school board meeting

last week, Kakuska said the old procedure resulted in putting the student behind. With a failed class, and the high number of credits required to graduate, the students gave up, he said.

The high school is providing two classes. A morning English class from 7:30 to 10 a.m. and a math class from 10:05 a.m. to 1 p.m.

The principal is very happy about the opportunity that was given to the school.

"It seems to be working out well," he said.

Kakuska had worked with the JTPA program when he was a principal in Albuquerque. When he came to Ruidoso, he felt that a program here would benefit the school greatly so he began the procedures and paperwork.

"I think it's going to grow," he said.

The program has been going on for the past six weeks. The students will graduate from their classes and their jobs on Friday, July 26.

Hondo water flunks state test

During a routine analysis of the water at the Hondo Valley Public School, Benzene was discovered in amounts exceeding by 10 times the maximum contaminant level allowed by the State Water Supply Regulations.

Ruidoso environmentalist Carl Stubbs said the maximum level of contaminants is five parts per billion.

The Hondo school water was tested twice. One well tested at 5.3 parts per billion, and at another time 28 parts per billion.

A second well at the Hondo school tested within the required limits.

The New Mexico Environment Department (ED) has requested that the Hondo public school cease further use of the water from the contaminated well and that the well be physically disconnected from the system.

Stubbs said Keith Fox, an ED specialist from Albuquerque, would be in Hondo this week to conduct an extensive investigation to determine the source and extent of the contamination.

Downs trustees meet tonight

Ruidoso Downs trustees tonight will seek input into what future CDBG grants should be sought in the village.

Also on the agenda for the 7 p.m. meeting is a Memorandum of Agreement on 911 emergency telephone service.

Also the village clerk will seek permission to publish changes in an ordinance dealing with fines in municipal court.

State plans ahead for road projects, schedules hearings

The New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Department in conjunction with the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District will have two public hearings to receive input on the 1992-93 Five Year Transportation Plan. The Five-Year Plan addresses capital improvements to be undertaken on the State's highway system over the next five years. The plan is updated annually based on needs and priorities received from local citizens and elected officials around the state.

The public hearings for Chaves, Eddy, Lea, Lincoln and Otero Counties will be at 1:30 p.m. August 2, in the Campus Union Building, ENMU-Roswell, and at 1:30 p.m. August 5, in the Otero County Commission Chambers, New York & 10th Streets, Alamogordo.

Officials from the State Highway and Transportation Department will be present to explain the planning process and receive input on highway needs within the district. Possible needs could include road repair and upgrade, road closures, or possible new road development.

Councilor J.D. James said it has been his sixth and best budget since he came to the council in 1987. He said congratulations were in order for the department heads, Wicker and Lee Ann Boswell for an outstanding job.

"The citizens of this village will be glad to hear that they have a working governing body. I'm just real proud," James said.

Andrews made a motion for a letter to be drafted from the council to all the department heads and other workers directly involved in the budget process expressing the council's appreciation for being particularly attentive to budget expenses.

Wicker said his only real disappointment of the past budget year was leaving 12 percent of the budget unused in the water and sewer department.

"As many problems as we have in that area, I would have liked to have seen that budget item at 101 percent instead of 87.7 percent," Wicker said. "There's a lot of improvements to be done and we will work on that next year. At least we've got it going in the right direction."

One of the major budget discussions evolved around the Economic Development Commission of Lincoln County (EDCLC).

"This \$20,000 we allotted to the EDCLC will not save it," said Councilor J.D. James. "The way I understand it, they are not going to get anymore money from the county.

We, Ruidoso, can't support it."

Councilor Ron Andrews agreed with James.

When Paulger (president of the EDCLC) made the presentation, I'm sure (he) was under the impression that the county would match the \$20,000, that they wouldn't find a loophole."

"He thought it was a done deal," interjected Councilor Al Junge.

"I agree with J.D.," said Andrews. "that we have only allocated \$37,500 for this year. And the \$37,500 plus \$20,000 is not going to do what the EDCLC wants done. I would consider not paying them any of the \$37,500 until such time as they show some way of matching the additional \$20,000 that we gave them."

Andrews said he favors telling the EDCLC that the council gave them the \$20,000 with the assumption that it would be matched through the county. That \$37,500 budgeted will be unavailable for EDCLC until that \$20,000 is matched.

"And if they can't do it, that \$20,000 comes out of the \$37,500 we promised," Andrews said.

Andrews said to give the EDCLC all the money it needed to operate would be too much for the village.

James and Andrews made the motion that although the \$37,500 was approved for the 91-92 budget, only \$17,500 will be contracted to the EDCLC until such time they can prove they have matched the \$20,000 that the council gave them at the end of the 90-91 budget.

The motion carried unanimously.

Thursday gave the DFA two sets of plans and specifications and certified minutes of council meetings and actions of the project.

Councilor J.D. James was concerned that the official construction completion date of March 31, 1992, would be delayed for 30 days.

Wicker said there may not be a delay if the council acts as quickly as possible. But he reiterated that the extra time was important to avoid scraping essential action al-

ready in progress.

"We may not be thrown off course at all," Wicker said. "I would suspect we are looking at 30 days."

Wicker said the project started with 75 sets of plans printed that were issued within the first week at \$100 a set. He said another 10 plans were printed with 15 primary contractors to pull plans.

"There's a lot of activity, and we feel we're going to get some very good prices," Wicker said. "But we do need to go through this process with the DFA."

The motion to delay the project passed unanimously.

There's no place like home — unless you're a victim of domestic violence

Home isn't a haven for victims of domestic violence.

Instead, it can be the place where they suffer at the hands of their mate or lover — the place where they are battered.

For some victims that means being thrown against the wall, slapped, kicked, or beaten into unconsciousness.

It can be punishment for laughing, crying, talking on the phone or burning a meal.

And, sadly, for many women, it's a way of life.

A New Mexico woman is far more likely to be killed by a spouse or boyfriend than by a stranger — 90 percent of these cases were usually preceded by several warning incidents, according to statistics provided by the Ruidoso Family Crisis Center.

These facts are startling, but they hit home.

Many local women live a secret life where not a month goes by without their being severely battered. They are too scared of the consequences to report the abuse, said Barbara McDaniel, the site coordinator of the center.

A Legal Perspective

Giving up the abuse may mean giving up shelter, food, money and security, explained District Judge Richard A. Parsons of Carrizozo.

In the past six months, 20 percent of the domestic relation cases filed have been over violence, according to the district court reports.

"That's too many," he said. When it comes to bickering and squabbling, women are equal to men. But a domestic spat is not abusive battering.

Because men are usually physically stronger than their wives, they are less likely to be battered, reported the statistics. However, both sexes sometimes hesitate to report such abuse.

The problem, said the judge, is that to do anything about it, a criminal complaint must be filed.

"That rarely happens, although it really should," he said.

The legal system's first obligation is to provide protection for those involved in domestic violence, Parsons said.

His court can issue an order of protection, providing for the victim to remain in the family home while the batterer is ordered to stay away from the victim.

Just three days after a complaint is filed, it's common for the couple to be all "lovey dovey" in the court office, he said. "The pain disappears with the anger."

According to statistics on domestic violence, that "honeymoon" period is common after a

battering incident, with the batterer filled with remorse over hurting the person he loves; and the victim is showered with attention, flowers, apologies and promises of a bright new future without the pain.

The cycle, if uninterrupted, continues and the battering incidents recur. That cycle is sometimes broken when a couple separates, but often the batterer, still unable to deal with

anger, goes into another battering relationship with a new victim.

Counseling is available for the victim, the batterer and the family. But not everybody is convinced that therapy really makes a difference in this vicious cycle.

Over the years, the judge has also been convinced that counseling's percentage of success is very low. It's hard to overcome the years, the environment and social "rules of thumb."

In order for Judge Parsons to order counseling, both parties must agree to it. Just keeping the abused person interested in receiving help is hard enough, he explained.

Judge Parsons said he is forced to order a 90-day separation (order of protection) between the two parties and pray that the couple will see a different light during that period.

If they see one another, the judge can sentence the defendant to six months of imprisonment for violation of court order.

"It's frustrating because they do get back together," he said.

Family Crisis Center

The unreported cases of domestic violence are decreasing thanks to Ruidoso's 24-hour crisis hot-line and the Ruidoso Family Crisis Center, which serves the entire county.

The center acts as a protection/advising/advocacy agency for abused people involved in domestic violence acts. Most all their clients are women.

The volunteers are not trained to counsel the victims but try to be the best friend possible, said McDaniel, the site coordinator — an advocate — one who listens.

Volunteers never tell the client what to do, but advise the victims on the various options available to them, provide medical statistics, give handouts on warning signs, and offer transportation and a safe place to stay.

The center works closely with law enforcement to provide help.

Anyone needing help can call the hot-line, 257-7365, and get assistance immediately from trained volunteers who are notified through the police department.

The center has seven volunteers, and is currently offering a training course. Since all of the volunteers also have regular jobs, they take 24-hour shifts on their days off. Although the center is short on helping hands, McDaniel assured that the victim is taken care of.

"We make sure every hour of the day is covered."

The volunteer meets the victim at the police department or the hospital, she explained. She then assists the victim in any way possible.

Services Available

In addition to the volunteer program, the Family Crisis Center has started a lending library of self-help books for the many victims not able to afford the suggested reading material.

It's very small at the time, said McDaniel, who hopes for a much bigger and diverse set of books. However, anyone desiring that type of help only has to walk into the office to receive it.

The center has also recently started another free support group of battered wives and their children.

Every Monday, support sessions are conducted during the lunch hour and in the evening.

The first one, directed by Dr. Birgit LaMothe, is a one-hour open door counseling from noon to 1 p.m. at the doctor's office at 445 Mechem. The second one is at 7 to 8 p.m.

This is just another way the Family Crisis Center is trying to reach out to as many victims as possible, said McDaniel. A lot of working women can't make the one at noon.

Counseling can help the battered woman gain self confidence to make informed choices on her future, she explained. Just like with any self-help group, it helps to hear the stories of other people who have had similar experiences and problems.

You Can Help

"We need more volunteers," McDaniel said. "The depressing situation is a given but it's comforting to help. It's a rewarding experience because there is a need that you can fulfill."

Last Tuesday the center started a six-week program to train volunteers on how to handle situations involved with domestic violence victims.

During the first meeting the center saw a low response of only two concerned volunteers.

However, the first meeting gave only the explanation of what wife abuse is — exploding the myths and learned responses used by abused partners.

"It's not to late for anyone to become a volunteer. It's easy to catch up," said the veteran helper.

To be a volunteer, a person doesn't need any professional training. A volunteer only has to communicate understanding and interest in that person and her problems, she said.

The most important thing which the helper can do is to really listen to the person and try to understand what she is feeling.

During the course, the volunteers are taught about the mourning a battered woman goes through with the death of a relationship, the signs to look for in an abusive personality,

resources and the legal aspects of domestic violence, medical case statistics, how to handle traumatic phone calls, and most of all stresses how to perform silent listening.

The three-hour classes are at 6:30 p.m. Tuesdays at 445 Mechem.

Hospital finances continue up and down

Hospital board members met their latest scholarship recipient and heard a financial report during Thursday's meeting.

Candace Wilcox of Carrizozo High School has been awarded the \$2,000 scholarship provided by the Lincoln County Medical Center each year.

Wilcox was introduced to the trustees at a regular meeting, Thursday evening, at the hospital. She plans to attend Duke University this fall.

Other students in the county currently being helped by LCMC scholarships are Chris Shanks, Randy Barone, Kim Eckland and Connie Najera.

Trustees in their meeting heard financial reports on the hospital, the Carrizozo Health Center and

ambulance service.

Valerie Miller, hospital administrator, reported that June activity levels were high compared to previous months. Net revenue, however, was down \$7,132 from June 1991, but up \$107,024 from June 1990, resulting in a gain of \$68,470.

The Carrizozo Health Center shows a loss of \$1,544 for June and a year-to-date loss of \$4,119 despite \$44,247 in mill levy funding.

The ambulance company showed a gain of \$920 for June.

In other business, members discussed pros and cons of lobbying by the New Mexico Hospital Association.

Miller said that although she is personally opposed to PACs (Political Action Committees) lobbying was effective during the last ses-

sion of the New Mexico Legislature.

Individual trustees and medical staff members can participate in a "reverse lottery" sponsored by the NMHA if they so desire as individuals.

Gary Mitchell, member, said in his opinion PAC activity is "nothing but bribery."

Miller said the hospital will be staffing first aid booths at the Lincoln Days celebration and during Aspenfest. She reported that the float built by employees at the hospital appeared in the July 4 parade in Capitan and will be in the Lincoln Days parade and possibly in the Aspenfest parade in October.

"Then it will be dismantled," she said.

Miller also said that the parent organization of LCMC, Pres-

byterian Health Services, owns a house in Ruidoso and would be interested in having it sold.

The four-bedroom place is on Nogal Place. It has been rented in the past to medical personnel at the hospital.

Miller said an orthopedic surgeon was scheduled to visit Ruidoso for a couple of days last week, that "I hope we can get him to come to Ruidoso."

LCMC Auxiliary members contributed 1,282 volunteer hours to the hospital in June, Sally Avery, member, reported.

Next meeting of the trustees will be at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, September 19, in the hospital conference room.

Proposed fort links state's historic forts

"Boots and Saddles," a plan to link seven New Mexico forts through a riding trail, took a giant step last week.

The proposed trail will include a station at Fort Stanton in Lincoln County, along with six other forts occupied during the Civil War and Indian campaigns.

The Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee approved the bill, co-sponsored by Senator Jeff Bingaman (D-NM) and Senator Pete Domenici (R-NM).

The legislation authorizes the Secretary of the Interior to develop a way to preserve and interpret Fort Selden, Fort Bayard, Fort Craig, Fort Cummings, Fort Stanton, Fort Sumner and Fort Union, by establishing guided tours involving common themes.

The bill will now be considered by the full Senate.

"This legislation will help recognize and preserve these important relics off New Mexico's past which played a key role in the economic development of the American frontier," Bingaman said.

"Through the years, natural weathering, unsupervised visits, and lack of maintenance have deteriorated the forts, and my bill will help to protect them. It could also provide the many visitors to New Mexico a very informative and historic attraction. I am pleased the bill has cleared one more step and I hope my colleagues in the Senate will support it."

"I am very pleased that this legislation will now be considered by the full Senate," Domenici said.

"I believe we must take action now to protect and preserve the remnants of the forts that dotted the New Mexico landscape during the 19th century. They represent a telling introduction of the Anglo culture to the New Mexico territory."

Bingaman visited Fort Selden, northwest of Las Cruces, in March. The fort was established in 1865 and protected settlers from desperadoes and Apache raids. Fort Bayard, located near Silver City, was constructed in 1866 and played a key role in the campaigns against Geronimo.

Fort Craig, the largest Civil War fort in the West is located in Socorro County. The largest Civil War battle in New Mexico took place a few miles south of the fort in 1862.

Fort Sumner is the site where many Apache and Navajo Indians remained for five years after Kit Carson invaded their homelands. Bingaman said Fort Sumner represents the U.S. government's policy of repressing Indian resistance to American expansion through forced settlement on military reservations.

Fort Cummings, located in Luna County, was a base of operations for the Apache wars.

Fort Stanton, north of Ruidoso, was founded in 1855 as a military outpost during the Indian wars. It was abandoned by Union troops in 1861 and occupied by Confederate forces until they retreated to Texas after the Battle of Glorieta.

With a friendly face and bushy body, Moe the chow greets visitors to the Lincoln County Humane Society shelter.

The one-year-old black Chow mix is one of the most intelligent animals in the shelter, in the opinion of manager Randy Basch.

"He knows the schedule and where to be standing at the right time," Basch said. "He's very neat, very intelligent, housebroken and he gets along well with other dogs."

Moe is playful, but has a calm disposition. He works well with volunteers of all ages and is a favorite of the younger helpers at the shelter.

Basch said Moe is a small chow and weighs about 35 pounds.

Moe was brought to the shelter on April Fool's Day as a stray. He is being sponsored for neutering by the Franklin Veterinary Clinic of Ruidoso Downs/Glencoe. The owners of Hondo Valley Kennels will donate a free grooming after Moe is adopted.

The neutering cost is the major

expense connected to adoption. The only other charge will be for city license tags and shots.

The society requires that all cats and dogs adopted from the shelter be neutered or spayed to prevent production of more unwanted litters. The aim of the organization is to reduce the unnecessary suffering of animals brought into the world only to be abandoned or destroyed.

According to humane society statistics, for every human being born, 15 dogs and 45 cats come into the world. At the other end of the cycle, literally millions of animals are destroyed in shelters and pounds each year.

During the summer, the population of the shelter in Ruidoso swells and many new homes are needed. Basch also is looking for foster homes for litters of puppies and kittens while they wait for their protective immunizations to take effect.

Feds propose land management plan

Federal officials will be in Capitan Wednesday to discuss and answer questions about their plans for land within the Roswell Resource Management District of the Bureau of Land Management (BLM).

But residents won't just be listening, they also will be invited to offer input during the hours of 1-4 p.m. and 6-8 p.m. July 24, in Fletcher Hall of the Lincoln County Fairground.

Specifically, the officials are interested in comments about a proposed resource management plan for the Roswell district, which includes about 14 million acres in Quay, Guadalupe, Curry, DeBaca, Roosevelt and Lincoln counties. A separate amendment also is being proposed for the Carlsbad Resource Area, encompassing 5.9 million acres.

LAND SWAPS

One of the dilemmas facing the district in the preparation of the resource management plan is what to do with small isolated tracts within its boundaries. They end up not being managed or with inefficient management, according to the resource plan summary.

One of the options is to exchange isolated tracts for more appropriate land in clusters. Such exchanges could enhance the management of a specific resource such as an endangered species.

An exchange currently is under consideration in which about 1,500 acres along the Rio Bonito near the historic settlement of Lincoln would be acquired by the BLM and more isolated tracts would be swapped from other areas management by the agency.

The BLM also is reviewing areas that have been withdrawn from public access as game refuges and for oil and gas extraction.

FORT STANTON

The future management of the Fort Stanton Reservation may be one of the most significant topics for local residents.

The goals stated in the proposed plan include using it as a demonstration and outdoor experi-

mental facility for livestock, wildlife, riparian (water-related), watershed, recreation and surface protection; to enhance the riparian values; to protect the habitat of all endangered species; to continue to develop recreation facilities and to continue to develop the historic and pre-historic values of Fort Stanton and surrounding areas.

Fort Stanton, 25,000 acres of BLM administered lands, contains a block of state land in its center. It also contains prime recreation lands and a riparian resource uncommon in southeastern New Mexico because of the presence of Salado Creek and Rio Bonito.

The BLM manages the cave bearing formations on the reservation as critical resources. It recently opened seventeen miles of hiking and equestrian trails, which may be connected to Fort Sumner and other cavalry forts, depending on a vote by the U.S. Congress.

Because of the increasing demand for recreation, the BLM has proposed developing a recreation site near Salado Creek. A group of citizens have proposed setting aside a portion of the reservation as the Center for the Western Horse.

Since 1988, Eastern New Mexico University has operated an archaeological field school on the reservation with the idea of developing interpretative facilities.

Several endangered or sensitive species inhabit or seasonally use portions of the reservation. Careful planning must be used to ensure the species and their habitats are not adversely affected.

ACCESS

One question facing the BLM is how it should balance the need for legal and physical access to public lands with the need to protect fragile resources and to minimize conflicts among different land users.

Federal, state, county and privately owned roads provide access to public lands. Ownership patterns control access, according to the summary.

As use of public lands has increased, conflicts between different users also has increased, especially between hunters and ranchers.

To resolve conflicts, the ranchers

have requested that the county commission remove unneeded county road designations, but doing so without coordination with the BLM has led to administrative difficulties, according to the summary. On the other hand, too much access may be harmful to wildlife and some roads should be closed, it was stated.

BLM's planning process requires designation of public lands as open, closed or having limited access for off road vehicle (ORV) use. A closed to ORV use limits vehicular travel to existing roads or trails.

In its proposed plan, the BLM goals are to start an aggressive easement acquisition program; to coordinate with private landowners and the state; and to apply and enforce road construction standards.

MANAGEMENT

BLM wants to identify areas that require special management to protect their resources. After the overall resource management plan is adopted, separate management plans will be developed for each area in addition to programs to identify, evaluate and protect cultural values in caves and rock shelters.

Within the Roswell Resource Management Area, nine sites have been identified as requiring special management because they have resource values that are unique or scarce. They include Fort Stanton Cave, the Mesalero Sand Dunes and Torgac Cave. Two wilderness areas cover the Carrizozo Lava Flow and there are scattered sites of sensitive nature.

OIL, GAS AND OTHERS

Another question confronting BLM is how to manage the on-going oil and gas leases and development programs on public lands, and federal minerals underlying private and state lands.

Closely connected is the question of how the BLM can manage the use of hazardous materials on public lands.

The BLM is developing new environmental standards for land uses that involve hazardous materials including waste disposal,

oil, gas and mineral development, and industrial and agricultural operations.

Current policy does not allow for disposal of hazardous materials on public lands, however, the BLM receives requests to exchange, withdraw or sell public lands for such disposal. Illegal dumping also continues to occur and can pose serious risks to both humans and animals coming in contact with it.

WILDLIFE

Wildlife management is another area of concern. With pronghorn antelope and mule deer important among big game species, the habitat could be threatened by livestock grazing and water consumption and contamination.

BLM proposes to develop or maintain habitat management plans for all public lands within the resource area, to inventory and provide protection for special status species.

RECREATION

The BLM wants to know what types of recreation opportunities it should provide.

The major activity on BLM land is hunting, both big and small game animals, the summary states.

Caves must be protected because of their possible cultural contents and as a habitat of bats. Interpretive sites are being proposed as well as development of water-based recreation, perhaps using lands suggested for acquisition along the Rio Bonito.

The summary states that the most intensive recreational use now occurs at Valley of Fires.

Under management goals, the BLM has listed designation of recreation areas such as campgrounds and ORV areas, providing for interpretation of cultural sites, obtaining state and private land to accommodate expanding recreation and public demand, providing water based recreation consistent with availability.



Although many of those attend-


ing were gray headed, a large number of young people were in the services led by evangelists from Oklahoma and California.







Pony Express riders saddle up for race

The Pony Express returns to the historic mining town of White Oaks on August 3.

White Oaks, in Lincoln County, boomed as a result of gold discovered in Baxter Mountain in 1879, and the sleepy ghost town comes back to life each year for a replay of another piece of history, the Pony Express.

The original Pony Express was an ambitious endeavor to transport mail on horseback all the way from Missouri to California. In less than two years, the company bankrupted its owners and became extinct. That two-year phenomenon became a legend in the annals of the Old West.

From April 1860, until Novem-

ber 1861, Pony Express relay riders dodged outlaws and Indians to complete the run in 10 days.

Lincoln County is also prominent in Old West history as the site of range wars and outlaw activity that made Billy the Kid and Pat Garrett folk heroes.

When Lincoln County reached its Centennial Year, promoters of that celebration initiated the Lincoln County Pony Express Race from White Oaks to the town of Lincoln, and that race continues each year.

The race between two-rider/four-horse teams continues to be run each year along a shortened route of 37 miles on back country roads from Capitan Gap to White Oaks,

where attendant activities fill the day with celebration.

Following the approximately two-hour race of mail-carrying "cowboys," the quiet little town of White Oaks welcomes visitors to a barbecue, dance, an auction, a "wild west" rodeo and a rollicking melodrama played twice during the day.

Pony rides, concession stands, street music and crafts round out the day's activities that begin at 8 a.m. and last until midnight on Saturday, August 3.

Dry camping is free for hardy souls. Accommodations in the nearby towns of Carrizozo, Capitan and Corona include motels and RV parks.

White Oaks is located nine miles off Route 54 on State Road 349, just 12 miles northeast of Carrizozo. It is about 155 miles southeast of Albuquerque and 110 miles northeast of El Paso, Texas. The elevation is about 6,000 feet above sea level, giving it pleasantly warm days and comfortably cool nights.

During its heydays, White Oaks was an opera-loving, theater-going town but as the mines were abused and the railroad bypassed it, residents moved out. It is listed in the National Register of Ghost Towns.

Currently, with the influx of new settlers and mining explorations, White Oaks experiences a burst of revitalization, according to a news release.

Small wet-weather springs are running from the hillsides with moss and ferns beside their tiny streams. Food and medicinal herbs are everywhere amidst the—mint, lambs

quarter, verdulaga, and many others, long famous in pioneer Spanish and Indian culture.

The Rainbow

July is the season of the rainbows, Mother Nature's masterpiece. All through the valleys in the sunshine and rain days of July you can see double rainbows arching over the valley from hill side to hill side with their Heavenly colors blessing the sky and the land—causing your heart to rejoice along with good Mother Earth.

The Rain Moves In

Now just after noon, the clouds are forming over storm mountain and over by Sunrise mountain, and the lightning flashes gold and crimson and blue, and the thunder booms—that joyful sound. And in a twinkling the drops patter on the roof, and all the valley to the west is silvery gray with approaching rain. You inhale the breath of the rain, and feel new life gladdening your heart and lightening your step. And you say a prayer of

thanks to our good Lord.

The Hard Rain

As I told you last time, when I came home in early afternoon on the 12, I was met by one of the hardest rains I have ever seen here in the Vale. Yet the new vegetation which had sprung up from the earlier rains, held the sky water in check, so that most of it went into the ground.

The rains in the higher country have been absorbed the same way so that the river is not flooding—just carrying a good supply for the farmers and ranchers down stream.

The family has requested memorials to the First Baptist Church in Ruidoso or to the Boys or Girls Ranch.







A Carrizozo man is on the job in Kuwait City.





Y Not Sizzle burns up the racetrack

Young jockey Eric Perner had fallen on relative hard times since losing his apprentice allowance a week ago.

Mounds were hard to come by, and winners were obsolete.

Perner kept plugging along, however, and Sunday he scored the biggest win of his young career and first as a journeyman jockey.

Moving to the outside down the backstretch and mounting a bold rally on the turn, Perner guided Y Not Sizzle to a convincing 3-length victory in the \$102,746 Kachina Stakes.

"I needed that one," said Perner, moments after the race. "Things hadn't been going so well since I lost my bug."

Y Not Sizzle, one of only two New Mexico-breds in the field of 12 juvenile fillies, was a \$1,200 bargain purchase at last summer's

Ruidoso Horse Sales. She is owned by Charles Trimble of Bovina, Tex., and is trained by Bob Arnett.

The daughter of Poly's Blade, who had finished second in the trials after a troubled trip, had no such fortune in the finals.

"I took her back a little bit at the start," Perner said. "We knew there was a whole bunch of speed in there, and we were hoping they would burn each other out."

At least three horses hooked up in the battle for the lead. The early fractions of 21.3 and 45.1 were quite quick for a track that was dulled by steady drizzle.

Near the half-mile pole, Perner asked Y Not Sizzle to run, and the bay filly responded. She accelerated quickly on the turn, and by the time the horses reached the stretch, Y Not Sizzle was comfortably in command.

Dance Trainer gives some racing lessons

Paul Prather's Dance Trainer found his shot stride, so did long-shot Christian Don, under jockey John Cushing. The pair raced as a team from the 3/16ths pole to the wire, with Dance Trainer earning the nod late.

Dance Trainer has now captured an amazing 24 of 54 career starts. He banked \$10,200 for his winning effort and increased his career earnings to \$241,251. He is trained splendidly by Billy Hitt.

In Saturday's \$1 million Pick 10 contest here, there were no entries that correctly selected 10 consecutive winners. Max Supnet, Jr., of El Paso, Tex., however, picked the first four winners on the card, and took home the consolation prize—a new Jeep Wrangler.

Dance Trainer, an 8-year-old gelding, battled the length of the stretch against upset-minded Christian Don. In the last 50 yards, however, the old warrior pushed his nose in front for the victory.

Dance Trainer—the defending champion of this race and the 7-to-5 favorite of the crowd of 7,544—cruised toward the leaders on the turn under a confident ride by jockey Glen Corbett.

Prince Ego makes royal run into winners circle

Prince Ego, holding stubbornly down the stretch, posted a narrow victory against the fast-closing Forever Best in Friday's feature race here.

The 6-furlong test, which carried a clamoring tag of \$16,000, offered a purse of \$4,300.

The victory was the second straight for Prince Ego, who is owned in partnership by Robert Haynsworth and Phillip Mote. The 7-year-old gelded son of Bold Ego attended the early pace throughout, and finished strongly to hold off the late charge of Forever Best.

Prince Ego, one of the toughest sprinters in the state, has now captured 17 of 54 career starts. In his previous start here, Prince Ego captured a \$6,400 allowance race.

Trained by Fred Daney, and ridden confidently by Duane Sterling, Forever Best covered the six panels in 1:11.1. Forever Best, winner of the Mescalero Apache Handicap here June 15, finished a half-length behind in second. Longshot Herculadd was another neck back

in third.

Meanwhile, in the trials for the World's Championship Classic, both of Joe Kirk Fulton's charges—Reckless Dash and Special Leader—were quite impressive, each winning a division.

Special Leader, Reckless Dash and the next eight fastest qualifiers from the trials all advanced to the July 18 Grade I World's Championship Classic, a 440-yard dash with a purse of \$32,134.

Special Leader, who finished second by a nose to his stablemate here June 30 despite a terrible trip, had no such trouble in Thursday's eighth race.

The 4-year-old son of Special Effort broke alertly en route to a head decision over the tough Aloulou. Special Leader covered the 440 yards in a best-of-the-day 21.65.

In the first of three trial heats, Reckless Dash, a 4-year-old son of Dash For Cash, swept up along the outside for a close decision against upset-minded Dealin Easy's Moon.

Ruidoso High School has received a \$12,000 grant to participate in the Great 24-Hour Solar Car Race at Kirtland Air Force Base in April of 1992.

On the second weekend of April, a team of Ruidoso High School students will try their luck at New Mexico high schools' first ever solar car race competition, said Ruidoso High School principal Mike Kakuska.

The grant will either be given by the Department of Energy or, if the federal agency cannot come up with the money, the New Mexico Department of Energy, to sponsor the three schools who attended a meeting in Albuquerque last weekend, said Joe Moore, a senior at RHS

who is in charge of the project.

Other services sponsoring the event are the Public Service Company of New Mexico, and the New Mexico Solar Energy Council.

Teams of New Mexico schools will compete against one another in designing and building the most efficient car which runs on energy from the sun, said Moore.

He said the car will be something that a person can practically build in their own backyard rather than the more complicated electrical ones in similar races held in Hawaii.

No other traffic will be around the race is closed-circuit, he said. There are two categories in the race.

The first will be a competition of whose team's car will go the

farthest distance in a 24-hour period. However, the race will continue until all the cars run out of stored energy.

The car that goes the farthest distance with the use of one day's energy will also win, Moore said.

The prizes for the event are not solid yet, however, there has been talk about scholarships being offered to the winning team members.

The principal is very excited about the event. "The project should be fun and very educational," he announced to the Board of Education last week.

To prepare however, the school is in the process of organizing a corporation of students and teachers to design and build the car.

The project will run just like it

would in any corporation, Moore said.

The faculty will make up the board members while Moore and his junior classmate, Casey Ward, act as so called "presidents."

The two students will have four groups of workers under their supervision, resulting in a total of eight work groups.

The amount of students involved will remain unknown until a meeting of interested students is scheduled, Moore said.

"We would like to incorporate as much of the school as possible."

Skills and concepts from mechanical drawing, math, science, physics, chemistry, art, business, electronics and auto mechanics, will be learned by the students and applied in building the car.

Participants will gain an understanding for environmental issues and careers involved in these fields, said Kakuska.

The project is an extra-curricular activity and no credit will be earned.

However, some students taking classes such as auto mechanics or accounting during the day, may be allowed to work on the project during class time, Kakuska said.

The principal isn't sure what incentive will be offered the students who work on the car.

A plan for the school to provide the team's expenses of going up to Albuquerque for the racing event is being considered, but nothing is concrete.

The whole program of designing and building the car is not costing


the Ruidoso Schools administration anything because of the grant and donations of expertise given, Kakuska said.

Besides the \$12,000 given, the team can raise up to \$4,000 more to build the car.

A team would want to spend as little as possible on the car and more money on a system to gather energy from the sun, Moore said.

Any businesses interested in helping out can have their name put on the car with a donation of \$1,000, Moore said. These donations can range from parts and labor to expert advice.

Any labor and safety equipment supplies don't count toward the limitation of \$16,000.

Send senators home

Our senators thumbed their noses at the voters — the working class people, the retirees, the sick, the homeless, the children living below the poverty level, educators struggling to make ends meet — when they voted themselves a hefty pay increase this week.

Senators, meeting in the dead of night with few visitors and few members of the press present made what some people are calling a "pre-midnight raid on the Treasury" by voting themselves a \$23,200 pay raise — that will be added to their current six-digit pay of \$101,900.

The pay increase passed by a vote of 53-45 with New Mexico's two senators — Jeff Bingaman and Pete Domenici — voting in favor of the pay raise.

Few workers in Ruidoso and Lincoln County are in that six-digit range. Most of us do spend about a fourth of the year working to pay our taxes. Ask the guy who's working for just over minimum wage if he thinks the Senate deserves a big raise ... ask the single mom who is struggling to pay childcare expenses and barely surviving on \$10,000 ... ask the 80-year-old living on Social Security and spending most of that small income on prescriptions and medical expenses not covered by Medicare.

But, these arrogant senators didn't ask anybody — they just did it. Let's send these guys home.

State of Mind

Is a bridge too far to go for progress

Prince Edward Island in Canada, which this writer recently visited, is green, from one tip of its 140-mile length to the other.

Its widest point is 40 miles; its narrowest just four. Its highest peak is a mere 494 feet above sea level. There is water, water everywhere, and lighthouses and fishing vessels are never far away. Surrounded by the vast Gulf of St. Lawrence on Canada's eastern shore, the island can be reached only by airplane or boat.


No two places on earth seem more different than Prince Edward Island and our own mountain and desert stronghold of New Mexico, some 3,000 miles to the south and west. Yet where it counts the most, at the very essence of their identities, these outposts are remarkably alike — and remarkably fragile.

Both are absolutely gorgeous, each in its own way. Both draw sightseers from all over the world, and tourism is vital in both places. The visitors come not just to gape at the scenery, but even more to step into a different way of life, away from the maddening crowd.

Not many spots in the modern world still provide a quick detour from the fast lane, a retreat where money is not the only value, where people do not swarm, where nature is left relatively alone. New Mexico and PEI, as the islanders call their home, are two of the last.

Just as New Mexico is "The Land of Enchantment," PEI has its own alluring slogan: "One of the World's Great Islands." But whether it will remain so is in doubt.

Among Canada's provinces (the equivalent of American states), PEI is one of the poorest — at least in financial terms. Its 130,000 inhabitants do not live lives of hardship. They get enough to eat, have warm shelter against the Canadian winter, and are covered by the national health service, one of the best in the



world. But their per capita income is lower than the country's norm.

Compared to bustling metropolises like Toronto, Montreal and Vancouver, the lifestyle of PEI is rural and old-fashioned. The majority of its residents still till the soil and fish the ocean for a living. They have less money for cars, electronic devices and other statements of success. Their largest city, Charlottetown, with a population of just 16,000, is not even big enough to support a first-class shopping center.

But there is a plan to fix all that. The answer to all of Prince Edward's Island's problems, some people are saying, is a "fixed-link" bridge to Canada's mainland. Once the 12-mile structure is built, at an estimated cost ranging from \$700 million to

\$1.6 billion, everyone who has been bothered by the 45 minute ferry ride to the mainland can zip across in just 15 minutes.

Then wonders will flow, the bridge-builders promise. The annual number of free-spending tourists will dwarf the 700,000 who currently somehow make it over. Property values will soar. Every waterfront village will become a resort. Condos will spring up on all of PEI's

few hills, and in fields that now are only being used to grow food.

Many islanders will get high-paying construction jobs on the big bridge, until the project is completed in a few years. Best of all, the residents of PEI can dash over to the mainland whenever they need to buy something, and can do their business in giant, low-cost shopping complexes that will make the little stores that have served the island up until now obsolete.

The plan does have some opponents. Critics point out that the bridge would lose down the bustling ferry lines that have been PEI's link to the mainland for two centuries, and would throw thousands of permanent employees out of work. Nor is anyone sure what the environmental impact of a fixed link would be.

If the huge underwater foundations and the steel shafts supporting the bridge somehow blocked the shoreline ice from flowing out to sea each spring in this far northern clime, it could lower the water temperature by several degrees. That could destroy fishing in the area. The bridge people say they don't think will happen, but they don't know for sure.

In fact, because a project of this magnitude has never been undertaken in such a frigid climate, the experts cannot guarantee that the ice from an extraordinarily cold winter will not topple the bridge. But again, they don't expect it to.

Those opposing the bridge argue that nothing less than PEI's way of life will be lost if it is built. But backing the fixed link are the government, the construction industry, real estate interests and others with a stake in it. The fight is not over, but the forces of "progress" are winning.

Prince Edward Island, Canada: So far and yet so near.




