## Senator concerned over Indian jobs

Senator Pete Domenici wants a better grasp of the problem of Indian employment on reservations.

That and streamlining the system are among the New Mexico Republicans' goals.

Domenici, in the area Saturday for a speaking engagement, told *The News* that we need better information on needs and on the types of job needed among the Indian populations.

The senator is co-sponsoring legislation which would combine employment training programs of four Federal agencies.

"We could seek one big grant rather than a myriad of them," the senator said.

Domenici addressed an AMCOT Conference at the Inn of the Mountain Gods in Mesalero.

AMCOT is the international sales office of American cotton growers. It is a cooperative of the nation's four major cotton marketing cooperatives: Calcot, Ltd., Plains Cotton Cooperative Association, Staplecotn, and the Southwestern Irrigated Cotton Growers Association.

AMCOT has sales representatives in several countries including Taiwan, Japan and England. Some of those representatives were at the conference.

The senator was scheduled to speak on free trade, tariffs and other topics in which the cotton industry is involved.

"I found out there wasn't much interest in that," he said.

Instead, Domenici expressed his views on a rapidly changing world and touched on domestic problems and his concerns about them.

The senator cited a study in Michigan which showed what qualities business and industry want most in employees.

No. 1 on the list was for prospective employees to be drug-free, the senator said.

There was no requirement in the study "on academic qualifications."

Other desirable traits, he said, were integrity, honesty, loyalty and ability to work with other people.

"We are seeing the loss of basic values by too many Americans. What's in it for me? seems to be the basic attitude," he said.

Domenici says he has intro-

duced, along with Governor Bruce King, a Joint Economic Development Initiative which includes a section on Indian employment.

Domenici says he has asked Interior Secretary Manuel Lujan, also of New Mexico, for an Indian financial officer and a "development person" to be part of that initiative.

Domenici said one of the most critical problems in America is health care.

He said that although he is an attorney and three members of his family are lawyers, "medicine and hospitals should never get into the courts."

Physicians have to "practice bushels of defensive medicine," he said, citing mostly unnecessary tests and increasing health care costs.

The senator expects congressional action on the problem after the national elections in 1992, not before.

Regarding Russia's move toward capitalism and more freedom of the individual, Domenici said he is worried about the Soviets maybe not knowing how to act from where they are to where they want to be. He cited possible revolutions.


"We must put our brains to bear on this ... we don't want it to fall apart after we've won the battle," he declared.

"If you have an opportunity to go man-to-man to show them, then do it," the senator said.

One answer, he said, is an exchange of people skills.

"I think they are ready to abandon 70 years of communism," he said.

The senator flew back to Albuquerque immediately after his speech at the Inn.

## All systems are go for center

All systems are go for Ruidoso's civic center — an on-again-off-again project for the past three or more years.

The project was placed on hold by the Department of Finance and Administration (DFA) in Santa Fe last week, but village manager Ron Wicker learned this morning that problems have been ironed out and the village has approval to go forward with Wednesday's scheduled bid opening.

"We can go ahead and open bids and evaluate the bids and be ready," said Wicker on Friday. This morning, a letter from DFA erased any clouds that might have stalled the project further.

Bid opening is set for Wednesday, August 14, and the village has 45 days after the bid

opening to award a bid.

Wicker said the project drew a lot of interest with as many as 80 contractors paying the \$100 to pick up bidding specifications and plans.

The schedule calls for breaking ground the week after the bids are opened, said Wicker.

"We're still shooting for opening the spring of 1992," he added.

Questions raised by DFA attorneys could have nullified lease agreements between the Village of Ruidoso and the Links at Sierra Blanca and the proposed Radisson Hotel, according to village manager Ron Wicker.

But, Wicker said Friday he was working closely with state officials to keep the project on schedule, and had plans to make a complete report to the Ruidoso Village Council on Tuesday.

Wicker still will report to the council, but that report is expected to be a lot more upbeat since it will include good news from Santa Fe.

Questions raised by the state involved the process used to select civic center architects and the petition process that stalled the center about two years ago.

The present council parted ways with the first architects hired by the former mayor and council before municipal elections last year in March. The present administration, after paying off the first architects, requested proposals and entered into a contract with new architects after an evaluation and selection process.

Apparently that process was in question. DFA said general counsel Carolyn Wolf was

## Council will meet Tuesday

The Ruidoso Village Council will meet at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, August 13, in the council chambers of Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center.

Village manager Ron Wicker will report on requests from the Department of Finance and Administration regarding the civic events center project. Issues raised by the DFA include a legal determination on the original petition calling for a referendum and validation of proper procedure in the selection of an architect.

Items on the agenda include recommendations from the Planning and Zoning Commission on zoning, vacation of right of way and replats; and applications for a street dance and lumberjack jamboree.

The council is scheduled to discuss the Parks and Recreation Commission and will consider resolutions regarding dangerous buildings at 204 Spring Road and 109 San Miguel.

## School board will hear eight resignations Tuesday night

Personnel resignations and recommendations will be heard during Ruidoso's Board of Education regular scheduled meeting 7 p.m. Tuesday, August 13.

The board will approve eight resignations while hearing recommendations for 20 other applicants seeking employment with the Ruidoso school district, according to the meeting's proposed agenda.

The approval of two programs new to the 1991-92 school year, the new smoke-free policy and the breakfast and lunch applications, will be voted on, while the board will also hear reports on the White Mountain Project, the status of the ENMU center, and the administration retreat held this past weekend.

In fiscal business, the board will approve RCC IX and ancillary contracts along with the final budget for ENMU and Ruidoso, and the athletic admission fee for 1991-92.

The public is invited to attend the open meeting.

asked to review the architect selection process because it did not appear to meet the selection process set forth in the State Procurement Code. She gave the go-ahead to continue after asking the architects to comply with handicapped access concerns.

"There was a question if we had submitted all the forms on the scoring on the architects," said Wicker. "We felt like we had complied in every instance," he added.

"We started doing everything that we needed to do and we've probably sent DFA 200 sheets over the fax machine over the past month," said Wicker, who wasn't working for the Village of Ruidoso when this whole process began.

He said DFA has basically told village architects what changes need to be made, and they've made them.

"I think we're in good shape now," he said of the architect question.

The other question involves the petition distributed in 1989 calling for a vote on the entire resort project.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. and the council OK'd plans for the Sierra Blanca Resort — golf course, hotel, civic center and performing arts center — and a petition drive was launched to overturn that decision and take it to the people in a referendum.

After the petitioners obtained the required number of signatures to place the question before the

voters, supporters of the resort project countered by persuading signers to remove their names. Enough names were removed to cause the number of petition signers to fall below the number required, and the project went forward without a vote.

That process, too, was in question.

"The DFA apparently is trying to question the removal of the names," said Wicker on Friday. "The way we understand it, it could nullify all of the contracts that the village has entered into."

Those concerns were cleared with today's memo, which said statutory requirements were apparently met regarding the lease for the golf course.

Wicker said it all started about a month and a half ago, when he was contacted by Don Gonzales, of DFA, about quarterly reports on the project that is funded in part by state funds.

Because of changes in personnel at Village Hall, the Village of Ruidoso didn't make a quarterly report that was supposed to be made, said Wicker.

"In the process they started wanting information from us, primarily in the selection of the architects and the petition, and the way people took their names off," he said.

A DFA attorney raised the issue on the petition, said Wicker, adding that municipal clerk Tammie Maddox and Cleatus Richards were being more involved in the specifics on that issue.

# Ruidoso schools add agriculture education

Ruidoso Schools will add agricultural education (ag-ed) to the curriculum for the first time this year.

Using a \$50,000 grant, ag-ed programs will be offered to 30 mid-schoolers and 30 high school students during the 1991-92 school year.

Funding is from the Carl Perkins Vocational Technical Education Grant, a federal program which funnels monies down to the states for agriculture and other vocational education classes.

The program will serve as a catalyst for the development of Ruidoso's first FFA Chapter and as a pilot program for other New Mexico schools to observe.

The district is using it as an alternative education program.

The ag-ed program will integrate the applied basics and give technological prep competencies to those students who have high potential but have not yet realized complete academic success, said middle school principal Paula Papponi.

The administrators also hope the program's graduates will go on to attend the new Eastern New Mexico University Instructional Center in Ruidoso.

The course work will ease the transition for students exiting Ruidoso High School as they enter the work world or continue on to a post-secondary institution, said superintendent Mike Gladden.

The superintendent believes the program will be an asset to the educational system and to the community since area industry relates directly to agriculture — for instance, forestry, golf course management, horse racing, cattle growing, wildlife management and horticulture.

It makes the district an excellent setting for such a program, said Gladden.

The \$50,000 grant covers the cost of a new instructor, field trips, classroom materials, guest speakers, and a special six-week summer program.

The class emphasizes core math, science, social studies and communication skills like all classes at that level.

"The difference," said instructor Mike Gaines, who was the ag teacher in Carrizozo for 11 years, "is how it will be learned."

Gaines explained how the students will learn through day-to-day projects like building a cement slab, doing electrical wiring, welding signs, dissecting embryos and

drafting projects.

The program is very unique because it is designed to provide a motivational education that will keep students' education intact while reinforcing the basic education core in a hands-on environment, he said.

It is a more of an active instruction rather than the traditional

passive instruction, said Papponi.

The program also interfaces with the special education program by flip-flopping the two three-hour blocks.

According to the schedule of classes, 15 students will attend the ag block for the first half of the day and the special education classes during the second half of the day. Meanwhile the students in the morning special education classes will go into the agriculture program for the rest of the day.

The students will also be required to have a one-hour life skills class designed to help them better their esteem, communication skills and concept of life.

This class is used as a vehicle to motivate and instill responsible decision making skills for the non-traditional learner, Papponi said.

Their success will be measured by achievement on state and local testing, successful student participation in organization competitions, and close staff observation, said Gaines.

The students will continue the program in basics for six weeks of the summer as they gain more hands-on experience at the racetrack, a cow camp, the Elgin Breeding Service, ranch tours and packing houses.

At the high school level, the instruction will focus on career opportunities and basic instructional curriculum in an agricultural setting.

The classes will be in the old art room at the middle school, and in the Industrial Arts Complex at the high school.

"We are very happy for this opportunity that Ruidoso schools has received," said Gladden, recalling that in the past, students with an interest in agriculture transferred to Capitan or Hondo.

The New Mexico Legislature, in its most recent session, directed schools to approach more effective education through the areas of accountability, restructuring and vocational education.

Gladden said Ruidoso's new ag-ed program is designed to accomplish all three directives, and attain the goals which the Board of Education has set for the school's success.

## Former 'Zozo teacher hired for ag-ed classes in Ruidoso Schools

A Carrizozo teacher recently made the 37-mile move to Ruidoso to become agricultural education teacher for Ruidoso schools.

Mike Gaines has been a Lincoln County resident for 11 years, teaching agriculture at Carrizozo High.

However, his life's path took a slight turn when the Ruidoso Board of Education recognized his abilities and snatched him up.

Because the success of the new program is highly dependent on having an instructor with top notch skills, the board wasn't taking any chances, said superintendent Mike Gladden.

The agriculture education program is brand new to Ruidoso, made possible through a federal grant.

The board hired Gaines during the July school board meeting — after receiving the funds for the new program.

Gaines, along with Gladden and Middle School principal Paula Papponi, helped write the proposal for the grant.

Gaines said he is excited about the transition and of being a part of giving this opportunity to the community.

The new job is a challenge to Gaines, who has to add to his extensive general agriculture knowledge, information on forestry and equestrian divisions of agriculture.

The superintendent and principal are thrilled with the chance that Ruidoso school's has received.

"Ruidoso schools are very lucky to have been able to attain a teacher with such high qualifications," said Gladden.

According to documents prepared for the grant application, Gaines has a reputation throughout the state of New Mexico as being innovative, involved and hardworking in the agriculture area.

Gaines graduated from Socorro in 1975 and went on to New Mexico State University to earn his bachelor of science de-

gree in 1980. After teaching for seven years he returned to NMSU to receive his master of arts.

He has received numerous teaching awards and recognitions and is involved in several professional and civic activities.

Gaines' wife, Melody, hopes to be doing her student teaching this fall within the Ruidoso school district.

# Smoke break in village parking lot lands two local men in jail

Two local men were arrested for possession of marijuana, paraphernalia and cocaine this past weekend as the Ruidoso Police Department spent a busy weekend and made a number of arrests for various unrelated crimes.

Charles Arnold Jr., 42, and Philip Blanchard, 45, were arrested Friday night when officers Pete Esquibel and Mike Lovelace detected a strong odor coming from Arnold's 1972 White Buick.

The officers were crossing the municipal parking lot as they began foot patrol in the Midtown

area when they saw the two men sitting in the front seat of the car smoking.

As the officers passed the car, they noticed the odor, according to police reports. Officers asked Arnold a question, and, according to the officers' report, the driver implied they were smoking a substance alleged to be illegal.

During a routine inventory check the officers found a red paper bundle folded in what officers say is commonly known as a "dope fold." The paper contained a white substance. They also found a metal pipe in the trunk of the car.


Esquibel and Lovelace then

read the subjects their Miranda rights and, after Arnold asked for an attorney, they took them down to the station where the cigarette and white substance were tested.

Officers say the tests came back positive for marijuana and cocaine.

The two men are in Lincoln County Jail. Arnold's bond is set at \$3,700 and Blanchard's at \$3,825.

Also during the weekend, in unrelated cases, police arrested seven people for battery, three for driving while intoxicated and several others for assault, possession of a firearm, and theft.

# Exchange programs help students, families, schools and the community

Each year thousands of foreign and American students, wishing to live and learn abroad, have to go in search of families to help make their dreams come true.

Many students find their dreams of experiencing and learning a new lifestyle stalled because there aren't enough host families willing to open the doors of their homes.

Elisa Arrowsmith was one of the lucky ones. She was able to find a host family to take her in as their own daughter for the year.

Now the Alto teen will have a chance to broaden her horizons living and learning in New Zealand.

New Mexico, the Land of Enchantment, has the third lowest percentage among all states of families taking part in foreign exchange programs.

Ruidoso had five foreign exchange students at the high school level last year, but that number has dropped to three for this year.

People complain of not having enough money to take in an extra mouth to feed, said Florence "Flippie" Arrowsmith, who has been involved with the exchange program for 21 years.

"They don't realize the world of difference it makes. This is an experience that can't be found in an eight-to-five job, or in school."

She knows by firsthand experience. Arrowsmith has raised six children, and all of them have traveled abroad.

"A program like this can develop world leaders," she claimed.

But the benefits don't stop there. The experience is unlimited for the

student, the host family and for Ruidoso, she said.

Living with a foreign exchange student lets the host family a chance to learn about a new country. It also gives the family possible connections for a place to stay if they ever decide to travel themselves, Arrowsmith said.

It is true, the cost of a trip to Europe, Spain or Switzerland can be a lot cheaper when room and board is free.

Arrowsmith explained how Ruidoso benefits from the exposure it receives in other countries. She said the program benefits all the other students attending Ruidoso High School through their personal contact with students from other countries.

The more foreign students who come into the United States for study, means more American students will be able to live and study in another country.

The program is balanced in its ratio of outbound and inbound students, Arrowsmith said, explaining the name, Student Exchange Program. There is an equal amount of American and foreign students coming and going, she said.

It's not too late to open up a new life for a student.

"Let them come learn about your country — are you proud of it, or aren't you?" challenged Arrowsmith.

The crunch time for a lot of these kids is now, she said, "but it's not too late — it's never too late."

The only requirement of becoming a host family is to have a bedroom for the student. They can share a room with another family member, just as long as they have a bed and a regular room, said Arrowsmith.

A host family doesn't need to provide pocket money for the student. They just have to prepare meals and have an encouraging atmosphere for the student to participate in community and school activities.

However, it is best if the family is centrally located and able to provide transportation for the student to attend these functions, Arrowsmith said.

This program is for a whole year, but there are several other agencies involved. Some, like the local Rotary Club, have the program scheduled for the student to live with three or four different families throughout the year to lessen the financial burden.



## Still fishin'

Ruidoso and the surrounding area offer several good fishing holes, with anglers still pulling out a good many fish at Grindstone, Alto and Bonito.

The State Game Commission, meeting July 25 in Rio Rancho, set 1991-92 small game and waterfowl seasons. For the first time, waterfowl hunters will be required to carry a new state duck stamp, given free to license purchasers.

Seasons for migratory species of bird are tentative, pending release of federal guidelines within the next several weeks. Some changes may be necessary to comply with federal restrictions.

Following is a summary of seasons:

### Small Game

Dove: Generally statewide September 1-30 and December 1-30. Limit is 15 per day, 30 in possession.

Band-tailed pigeon: Regular, September 1-20; southwest October 1-20. Limit is five per day, 10 in possession.

Quail: Statewide November 9-February 9. Limit is 10 per day, 20 in possession.

Pheasant: Statewide December 19-22. Limit is three roosters per day, six in possession.

Lesser prairie chicken: December 7-15 in the eastern part of the state. Limit is three per day, six in possession.

Sandhill crane: Southeast October 5-January 19, with a limit of three per day, nine in possession. Special seasons: Socorro and Valencia counties, October 18-21 and October 18-21 and October 25-28; southwest, January 17-19 and January 24-26. Limits for special seasons are three per day and in possession.

Deadline for applying for the Socorro and Valencia county hunt (up to 750 permits) is September 16. Deadline for the southwest hunt (up to 350 permits) is November 29.

Blue grouse and squirrel: September 1-30, in the north; October 1-31 in the southwest. Limits are three grouse per day, six in possession; 12 red squirrels per day, 24 in possession; seven Abert's squirrels per day, 14 in possession.

Red squirrel season is September 1-30 in the south with a limit of 12 per day, 24 in possession.

### Waterfowl

Ducks: In the Central Flyway, north of I-40 and U.S. 54, season is October 19-November 8, and December 7-January 5. South of there, season is November 16-January 5. Bag limit is 100 points per day; possession limit is twice that. Northern pintails, female mallards, red-

heads, hooded mergansers and mottled ducks are 100 points; male mallards and wood ducks are 50 points; and others are 35 points. Canvasbacks may not be shot.

In the Pacific Flyway, season is October 5-20 and November 23 to January 4. Bag limit is four ducks a day, eight in possession. Of the four, three may be mallards; one, a female mallard, one, a redhead, one, a northern pintail and one, a canvasback.

Other birds: In both flyways, daily limit is 15 American coots, two common moorhens, 10 Sora and Virginia rails, eight common snipe. Possession limit is twice that. Season dates are the same as for ducks.

Geese: In the Central Flyway, dark goose season is October 19 through January 19, closed in Sandoval, Sierra, Valencia, Socorro and Bernalillo counties. Limit is two per day, four in possession in open areas. In Socorro and Valencia counties, light goose season is November 2-February 16. Light goose season in the remainder of the Central Flyway is November 2-February 9. Limit on light is goose five per day, 10 in possession.



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# Racing Vike leaves world champion in trail of dust

Racin Vike exploded away from the starting gate Sunday, and in the process left a stellar field, including 1989 World Champion See Me Do It, choking on his dust en route to a convincing 1-length victory in the Higheasterjet Handicap.

Racin Vike, owned by Charles Forbes, Jr. of Freer, Tex., had not visited the winner's circle since capturing a minor allowance race purse at Manor Downs early in the year.

But the 5-year-old gelded son of

Racin Free left little doubt as to his superiority against Sunday's field. Despite a bit of a bump at the start, Racin Vike hit overdrive about 100 yards into the 350-yard dash and was extending his advantage at the wire.

When that other horse hit us coming out of the gate, it really ticked him off," said winning jockey Alex Baldille. "He just exploded after that."

Racin Vike, dismissed at 10-to-1 by the weekend crowd, is no

stranger to the winner's circle. He has now captured 15 of 35 career starts. The company he's keeping these days, however, is a bit more than he's used to.

Despite his impeccable record of 24 in-the-money finishes in 35 career starts, his career bankroll was only \$62,450 entering the Grade III stakes race.

"I didn't think he'd open up on this field like he did," said Baldille.


"I never hit him. I was just trying to keep him straight. Last time he ran he went from the 4-hole to the 8-hole."

Racin Vike ran straight as a string Sunday, and covered the distance in a superb final time of 17.44. The stakes record was set by Dash For Speed in 1989 when she clocked a sizzling 17.25.

See Me Do It, who was making her 1991 debut, finished second with no apparent excuse. She edged third-place finisher Real Bar Forth by a nose for third.

Racin Vike earned \$11,430 for his victory, increasing his career bankroll to \$73,880. Racin Vike is trained by Duane Hartsell.

Also, there were no winners in the Twin Trifecta for the fifth consecutive racing day. The carryover for Monday's card is \$31,618.00.

# Steppin For The Moon jumps ahead of Futurity trials field

Steppin For The Moon cemented his status as one of the early favorites for the \$2 million All American Futurity in Friday's second day of elimination trials for the world's richest quarter horse race.

Breaking sharply from the gate under jockey Jacky Martin, Rainbow Futurity winner Steppin For The Moon gamely outfinished Dash Master Miss by a neck.

Steppin For The Moon, a chestnut son of Moon Lark, has now captured six of nine career outings, and appears to be trainer Jack Brooks' best hope for an unprecedented sixth All American triumph. Steppin For The Moon covered the 440-yards in a snappy :21.70.

Probably the most impressive performance of the two-day trials was turned in by the undefeated filly, Easily A Rogue, in the seventh race. The muscular daughter of young California sire Calyx, a son of Dash For Cash, ran the fastest time of the trials when she covered 440-yards in 21.66.

Easily A Rogue, who is trained by Russell Harris, has captured each of her three career starts. She was ridden by veteran jockey Ken Hart.

In Friday's third race, a lightly-raced but plenty fast filly, Perfect Liaison, stamped herself as an up-and-coming contender by hanging a nose decision on Perfectly Dashing. The daughter of Moon Lark, who has now captured two of three career starts, is trained by Blane Wood of Lubbock, Tex. She covered the distance in a fast :21.81. Perfect

Liaison is owned by Rick Fleetwood of Midland, Tex., and was ridden by Jeff Williams.

In the fourth race, Vital Class overcame a slow-start en route to a sharp 1/2-length decision. The Texas-bred son of Easily Smashed, who finished second by a nose to Magic Dozen in the Kansas Futurity, has captured three of six starts. He is trained by Brooks and is owned by Clarence Scharbauer of Midland, Tex.

The ninth race featured Delta Downs invader Its Payola Time, who captured her third consecutive race. The daughter of thoroughbred sire Raise Your Glass, who is trained by Duane Hartsell, covered the 440-yards in a quick final time of 21.71. Its Payola Time, who has now won four of five career starts, is owned by Jimmy Springs of Nixon, Tex.

Leaving Memories, who was so impressive here earlier in the season, returned in top form for Friday's 11th race. The strapping son of First Down Dash, who had not been postward since finishing seventh in the Kansas Futurity finals, drew off from his field under jockey Kip Didericksen.

Trained by Dwayne "Sleepy Gilbreath, Leaving Memories logged a final time of :21.76.

The day ended about like it began-with Brooks and Martin combining for another winner when Special Task easily disposed of his foes in the 13th race. The victory by the son of Special Effort was the fourth on the day for Brooks and

Martin. Special Task, who finished third in the Rainbow Futurity, clocked a final time of :21.69.

Ed Grimley easily passed his first test in quest of a berth in the \$2 million All American Futurity Thursday when he captured the third of 13 elimination trial heats.

The top three finishers from each of Thursday's trials, plus the top three finishers from 15 more trials on Friday all advance to the Aug. 22 time trials. The 10 fastest qualifiers from the trials advance to the Sept. 2 All American Futurity, the world's richest quarter horse race.

Ed Grimley's sixth consecutive victory, however, did not come easily. He battled the entire 440-yards against upset-minded Especially Phoebe before prevailing in the final jumps by a head. The New Mexico-bred son of No Tell Motel, who captured the Grade I Bay Meadows Futurity, covered the 440 yards in :21.87.

He is trained by Dwayne "Sleepy" Gilbreath, who saddled last year's All American Futurity winner Refrigerator. Ed Grimley is owned by Mitch Degroot of Portales, N.M.

In Thursday's first elimination heat, Cowboys Rodeo found the added real estate of the All American trials to his liking as he posted a powerful 1-length victory in the rapid final time of :21.67. It was the first lifetime victory for the chestnut son of Ronas Ryon, who had finished second or third in each of his first five outings.

## Editorial

### Slow down, buckle up

It's never too early to start driving carefully and taking care that every trip is a safe one — especially that trip to school and back.


Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor is joining with the state in emphasizing traffic safety as this new school year begins. In the 1988/89 school year, 8,723 New Mexico schoolchildren were involved in accidents with injuries or fatalities during school hours. Statistics indicate that 95 percent of schoolchildren in fatal or injury crashes during school hours are in passenger vehicles. That's way too many, and a lot of those accidents could be prevented if drivers will drive defensively.

Swenor and his officers will be on the streets to help drivers remember to slow down, watch for (and stop for) pedestrians, obey all traffic signs and generally use good sense behind the wheel. That's a start, but it's not enough.

According to state statistics, the real safety problem for schoolchildren in New Mexico is that 46 percent of those youngsters 11 and under are not buckled up. Among teenagers, 61 percent are not buckled up. Of New Mexico kids killed in cars in 1990, 76 percent died with neither seatbelts nor carseats in use; 84 percent of teens died with belts unused. Not using safety belts is killing young New Mexicans.

School starts at Ruidoso High and Middle schools August 21; at Nob Hill Elementary, August 22; and at White Mountain, August 26. Traffic volume will immediately increase with buses and parents driving their children to school, as well as teens who drive themselves to school. Add that to the tourist traffic that will be its heaviest around Labor Day, and logic will tell you to keep your wits about you on the roads, buckle up and slow down.

Let's have a safe school year.

### Did you know you were our heroes?

Ruidoso is full of unsung heroes, but sometimes they get overlooked.

You see, those folks, the ones who are out there plugging away doing their jobs without breaking any laws or trying to put anything over on anybody, don't make news. That's the nature of news.

For instance, it's news when two cars crash, but it's not news when millions of cars make it safely back and forth to work every day without crashing — it's news when a husband shoots his wife, but it's not news when he doesn't. You get the picture?

A part-time resident, Jody Johnson, stopped by the other day to brag a little on the Street Department. She said that after her husband complained to *The News* about street signs on Santa Rosa Street, the village Street Department got out there and took care of the problem of too many streets with the same name.

"We just love it," she said, recalling lots of changes — like Sudderth Drive. Does anybody remember when it was a dirt road with a big tree in the middle of the street?


Mr. and Mrs. Johnson may have been the first people to stay in the Villa Inn when it was first built. Before they had their own place, it wasn't unusual for them to take off from Fort Worth on a Thursday afternoon and pull into Ruidoso late that night so they could go to the races on Friday.

One of those late nights, the Johnsons found every motel and cabin in town full. Does anybody remember when there weren't that many places to stay here?

Well, the Villa had been built, but wasn't open yet, so Jody and Ray knocked on the door to see if there might be a room ready.

The two guys running the place offered to bunk together and give up their room for the night since the Villa wasn't ready to open to the public. That was pretty nice — unsung heroes.

Rafael Salas, better known as "Rifle," is another one of those unsung heroes in the vil-

lage of Ruidoso.

He was chosen Employee of the Month for July, and I can't think of anybody who deserves it more.

Rifle was born and raised in Ruidoso, and has been a village employee since 1983.

He works hard — always has — and still he always has a big smile and a pleasant word for everybody. Rifle doesn't get involved in politics.

He's just kept working hard and smiling a lot through a series of village managers and department heads.

Going to Village Council meetings and listening to the kind of nonsense our elected officials are talking about (like painting pictures on dumpsters), it would be easy to forget that there are as many as 150 hard-working village employees out there doing their best to keep this village going — lots of unsung heroes.

As the mayor and council, those elected officials who all but begged us to vote for them, were DOUBLING their own salaries, most of those hard-working staff members were tightening their belts and trying to live within their means without a big pay increase.

A \$250 a month pay hike would probably mean a lot to a police officer or the guy who picks up your garbage or the clerk who sends your water bill.

But, a guy's just got to look after himself — that's what our senators and congressmen said, and our village councilors learned that lesson well.

The last time a Village Council tried to push through a pay increase, a group of village citizens distributed petitions protesting that plan. I've heard that a member of the current Village Council signed that petition — maybe even helped get other people to sign it.

Things must look a little different from the other side of that table. They even look dif-

ferent from one chair to the other.

I remember when Mayor Victor Alonso was Councilor Alonso and sat a couple of places down from the center. In those days he spent a lot of time worrying about "the little guy," even saw his mission as an elected official as standing up for that "little guy" — you know the one — he may be the guy who picks up your garbage, or the police officer or the utility clerk — the ones who didn't get big raises the same year the council voted to double the salaries for future mayors and councils.

"It's not for us, it's for future councils," they said. They may be right — those future councils may not include the folks who voted for the raise.

We don't hear as much about village employees as we used to, but I'm sure those working folks are still doing some great things. In that "past administration" that the mayor and council refer to now and then, the village manager was always bragging on somebody or other or some accomplishment or other.

As a matter of fact, that village manager and the one before him were always calling with some bit of good news — like awards, street improvements, money saved and the like. Reporters on the village beat were kept too busy with those "positive" features and news stories to go looking for any skeletons in anybody's closet.

That kind of communication sure made for a lot of "good" news, but maybe it's better when the mayor and council don't trust you. Then you don't much trust them either, and it really keeps you on your toes.

That, too, makes for some unsung heroes — like Chuck Stallings, Dianne Stallings, Al Stubbs and Sheri Cantwell. Those reporters go after the facts like a bunch of bulldogs. They won't be deterred, and it's not always easy — especially when they're met with evasive answers and rude responses.

But, they've got a mission and it's laid out in the Bill of Rights.

To quote Richard S. Salant: "If newsmen do not tell the truth as they see it because it might make waves, or if their bosses decide something should or should not be broadcast because of Washington or Main Street consequences, we have dishonored ourselves and we have lost the First Amendment by Default."

No dishonor among my heroes.


