Feds hold local man

Merle Arthur Miller of Eagle Drive in Ruidoso was indicted last week by a Federal Grand Jury in Las Cruces on three counts involving drug trafficking.

Miller surrendered to the Ruidoso Police Department at noon last Friday, August 30, and was then arrested by Ruidoso Police and the Federal Department for Alcohol and Firearms.

Subsequent to Miller surrendering to authorities, Ruidoso Police and a Treasury Agent visited Miller's residence. They were unable to locate Miller at that time, but left word that he needed to turn himself in to the authorities that day.

The three-count indictment, according to Lanny Maddox, CID Commander for the Ruidoso Police Department, alleges Miller used a firearm in relation to a drug trafficking crime.

Maddox said count two alleged that Miller was in possession of less than 500 grams of cocaine with the intent to distribute.

Count three alleges that Miller manufactured more than five grams of cocaine base, also known as crack, said Maddox.

Miller, 44, was first arrested at his home on Friday, May 31. Miller had been under investigation for six months according to Maddox.

Miller was released on June 6 to the custody of his brother, Blane Miller.

Magistrate J.R. "Jim" Wheeler reduced Miller's bond from \$100,000 to an appearance after an agreement was made between ADA Scot Key and Miller's attorneys Gary Hill and Richard Dukes of El Paso.

Miller was then ordered to go directly into a 28-day drug treatment program.

After that program, Miller returned to Ruidoso where he has stayed until the indictment last Friday.

Miller was taken before U.S. Magistrate Wayne Jordan in Alamogordo who ordered Miller remanded to the U.S. Marshal's office in Las Cruces.

Maddox said no trial date has been set.

If convicted of using a firearm in a drug trafficking crime, Miller could receive a mandatory five-year term without probation or parole eligibility Maddox said.

He said the cocaine charge has penalties ranging up to 20 years.

For the crack charge, the penalty is five to 40 years upon conviction.

If convicted of all three counts, Miller could receive a maximum penalty of 65 years in the federal penitentiary. If convicted of all counts, Miller also could be fined up to \$3-million in cash, including the 65-year prison term, Maddox said.

Miller has been remanded to the Dona Anna jail facility pending a court date. There is no bond set at this time, according to Maddox.

EDC develops new marketing strategy

A new deluxe brochure spelling out Ruidoso's and Lincoln County's attributes was praised highly and will be put to work immediately by the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County.

EDCLC directors Tuesday night approved a newspaper advertising campaign aimed primarily at out-of-town subscribers to local newspapers as well as being directed to Lincoln County citizens.

Details of the advertising will be worked out Friday morning by a committee including Ruidoso Mayor Victor Alonso who volunteered to "put a package together."

Tentatively, subscribers will be invited to order and, in effect, pay for the brochure. They would be eligible for a drawing for a free weekend in Ruidoso.

Local residents will be urged to contact friends and acquaintances living elsewhere who might be prospects for moving to and bringing businesses/industries to this area.

EDCLC directors agreed that a solid plan of action must be put in place to lure business and industry to Lincoln County if the EDCLC is to survive.

"The reservoir has a big leak in it. If we don't show real activity, we're in trouble," board member Steve Stroud declared at the meeting.

"I'd like some action, not just talk," Alonso said.

"Let's get some commitment," Ronnie Paulger, president of EDCLC, said.

"We're going to have to sit down and work out a commitment of time," Paulger said.

A retreat to plan strategy will be planned in detail at the next meeting, September 26, with Anita Sanders, executive director, instructed to "bring back what you perceive to be marketing strategy," Paulger said.

"This is a great piece of work," Stroud said of the new brochure, a simplified revision of an original brochure. The new one is less expensive but will be sent only to "serious" prospects because of the \$5 per copy cost.

Specific goals will be set at the late September meeting. In other business, the EDCLC approved Richard Mourd to do a required audit.

Directors approved the last Thursday of the month for regular meetings, at 7 p.m.

EDCLC lost its financial support from the county this fiscal year. Sanders said a plan for funding must be developed if the organization is to survive beyond next June 30.

Sanders reported to the board that she attended an economic development institute in Norman, Oklahoma, August 11-16. She also was present for a New Mexico Industrial Development Executives Association meeting in

Pendaries, New Mexico.

Sanders also reported she attended a Business Quarter meeting in Amarillo, Texas, August 5 and 6. She said Business Quarter has contracted with New Mexico State University to perform several studies concerning economic development.

Directors approved a letter written by Paulger to the Village Council of Ruidoso.

The letter says that EDCLC requested and received \$20,000 from the village for fiscal year 1990-91.

"The purpose of the funding was to enable the EDCLC to secure undischursed matching funds from Lincoln County in accordance with the contract between the EDCLC and

Lincoln County. As you are aware, the county denied honoring the contractual agreement by refusing to match the \$16,000 available.

"Since our objective was not accomplished, the EDCLC wishes you to consider the \$20,000 funded in June of 1991 to be part of the \$37,500 approved for fiscal year 1991-92. Consequently, we will only be requesting the balance of \$17,500 for 1991-92," Paulger wrote.

Lee Griffin was welcomed as a new board member, replacing Hal Sims of Carrizozo who apparently has moved to Alamogordo.

Bettors set records on Labor Day

Highlighted by the largest Labor Day handle in the history of this racetrack, total handle and attendance were down only slightly from a year ago.

Despite losing a big day of racing because of a severe rainstorm here Saturday, June 29, there was still a total of \$39,183,032 pushed through the mutual machines during this 78-day summer stand for a daily average handle of more than a half-million dollars.

Of course, the biggest betting occurred on closing day when 11,847 fans pushed a Labor Day-record \$1,324,132 through the mutual machines. The closing day handle was the second largest in the history of this track.

Also, total attendance was down only slightly for the season. A total of 348,088 fans made their way through the turnstiles this season for a daily average of nearly 4,500.

No way to keep Hondo teacher

After more than a week of exploring every alternative presented, Hondo School Superintendent Sergio Castañon said Tuesday that apparently there is no legal way to keep Thurman Sanchez on the district's teaching staff.

"There are no more options," Castañon said. "I have opened the job (formerly held by Sanchez) and am looking for a replacement."

Sanchez' teaching contract was rescinded by the Hondo School Board August 23 after members learned they had violated state law by hiring him.

Sanchez began serving on the board when he was elected in March. But when a teaching position opened up in Hondo, he resigned from the board, left a 21-year teaching career at Ruidoso High School and took a pay cut to come to the valley.

Three days after he started teaching four classes in late August, Sanchez was told he had been hired illegally.

A new board member was reviewing his state packet on school board regulations when he noticed a law apparently overlooked by the Hondo board, Castañon and state officials contacted before Sanchez was hired.

The law prohibits board members from receiving compensation from the school board during the length of their elected or appointed terms — even if they resign before

Recycling Center lists hours

Recycling is getting easier than ever with the new hours at Lincoln County's new center located in Ruidoso Downs off U.S. Highway 70 at Second and Harris. The Recycling Center, beginning September 13, will be open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Friday and Saturday. The telephone number is 378-4697. Recycling coordinator Kerry Krumsiek said the center is equipped now to accept aluminum cans (rinsed); glass that is rinsed and separated with no lids, as well as dry, boxed, bagged or bundled newspaper, cardboard and computer and office paper.

Inquiring minds want to know

More and more interest is being shown in Ruidoso and Lincoln County if traffic at the Chamber of Commerce is any indication. Walk-ins at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce are showing a huge increase over 1990, 1989 and 1988. From January 1 through August 31, walk-ins total 14,143. That compares to 17,830 for all of 1990, 15,447 for all of 1989 and 15,891 for 12 months of 1988. Phone call numbers for the first eight months of 1991 already exceeded the whole of 1988 and 1989. Through August, 17,175 telephone calls were handled by the Chamber, matching the whole of 1988. The year 1990 will be hard to match; some 27,715 calls were handled that year. One difference is that the Chamber office is now staffed on weekends. Weekend traffic (telephone calls and walk-ins) in August added to 257. The total for eight months is 803. In other Chamber news, Jerry Watts, executive director, reports that Ed Jungbluth, former executive director, is now executive director of the Chamber in Grants. Watts recently was elected to the board of directors of the New Mexico Chamber Executives Association.

Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority is sponsoring a poster contest for children in kindergarten through twelfth grades. BLM closes Aguirre Spring Campground temporarily

Bureau of Land Management (BLM) officials announced today that Aguirre Spring Campground will remain closed to all public access until further notice. The Highway 70 entrance has been posted; however, the road will be barricaded at the cattle guard approximately 1 mile from the gate and the gate will remain locked. Baylor Pass Trail will be closed at the pass with notices posted at the trail head. Tim Salt, Mimbres Resource Area Manager, said plans call for reopening on a limited basis as soon as the roadway is clear, it is hoped in 30 to 60 days. The public is encouraged to comply with the restrictions to public access for their own safety. Violators will be cited.

Main streets are revitalized all across New Mexico

MainStreet efforts across New Mexico are paying off in creation of new businesses and in jobs development. Ursula Boatright, who heads MainStreet New Mexico, reports that in the seven communities in the state which have MainStreet organizations, 242 new businesses are evident in the five and a half years of MainStreet activity. Some 667 jobs have been created, too, she says. New business facades, building renovation and new construction adds up to \$18.5 million during that period, she says. In Ruidoso, a MainStreet redevelopment project has been defined. A Houston firm will do the engineering, including a River Trail project.

that ending date. Despite a strong show of support for Sanchez from students, parents and teachers, Hondo School Board members at their meeting on August 23, said they had no choice but to follow the law and dismiss Sanchez.

Contacted by The Ruidoso News late Tuesday, Sanchez said he had no comment as to his future employment or the possibility of taking civil action against the board. "In Hondo's position, they need to hire somebody to do the job for them," Sanchez said. "I don't know if all the options have been explored. I have different things I am

following now. What Hondo does is up to them." Castañon said a proposal that Sanchez be handled as a contractual service and paid through Region IX (special education agency) was rejected by the state because the money would essentially be coming from the same source. "There was talk about raising funds from the people in Hondo, but Mr. Sanchez thought that would place too much stress on the community," Castañon said. "It's a very sad thing, unfortunate for Mr. Sanchez, the students and the teachers of Hondo," Castañon said. "We were not aware of this law. Nobody is to blame. It's just unfortunate. We need to regroup and get the year going. We need to get the best qualified teacher to fill that position."

Study recommends a nursing home at Fort Stanton Hospital

A study aimed at keeping Fort Stanton Hospital and Training Center open has recommended that the institution be converted to a nursing home supplemented with some mental health programs. The report was submitted earlier this week by Fort Stanton Administrator Ervin Aldaz, chairman of a task force assigned to examine alternate uses. Secretary of Health Mike Burkhardt will review the report and then forward it to Gov. Bruce King and the Legislative Finance Committee later this month. Aldaz estimated the conversion could cost \$291,000 for the initial revamping of two cottages to provide private individual sanitary facilities for 31 clients. The institution would need an increase of \$583,000 from the state for operat-

ing expenses the first year and \$2.7-million in 1992-93, he told The Ruidoso News. "We will need that increase to carry over the staff and preserve our certification during the conversion period while the number of clients and amount of revenue flowing to Fort Stanton is down," Aldaz said. "The whole objective as we go through process is that later on down the line, we will generate more revenue as clients are added, then our request from the state's general fund will go down." But some financial help always will be needed because the amount of payment the center would receive for nursing home patients would be lower than it receives now for clients who have developmental disabilities, he said. The number of clients also would be reduced from the existing 155 beds to 125, he

pointed out. The cost of converting the remaining cottages, as yet undetermined, would have to be requested as a subsequent capital project, he said. For more than a decade, Fort Stanton has served developmentally disabled clients. But as a result of a federal court order late last year, the state plans to move those one hundred plus clients into community programs. Aldaz and the 11-member task force have been trying to come up with a new use for the hospital to help preserve some of the 225 jobs. The loss of those jobs would adversely impact the economic base of Lincoln County. The task force decided about 125 beds could be set aside for nursing care and the study recommended that beds could be earmarked for clients who could not afford private

care or who have behavior problems that disqualify them for other nursing homes. The state has pinpointed a growing need for nursing care as its elderly population increases. Currently, the state provides 514 nursing care beds among three facilities in northern New Mexico. Their occupancy rates run at 98 percent. In the report, Aldaz also proposed designating ten beds for short term rehabilitation for persons with mental illness. Respite care could be provided with another ten available beds, giving rest time to families that usually care for patients at home. A cost estimate of that portion of the proposal was not included in the study. Southeastern New Mexico lacks sufficient mental health programs, Aldaz pointed out. The conversion would help fill that void.

Hardy hikers take to the hills this summer

Each weekend this summer, a hardy band of curious visitors to the Lincoln National Forest has headed into the woods, trailing a tall, lanky leader with non-stop enthusiasm for his subject matter. Dave Dale's interpretive nature walks are laced liberally with philosophical excursions into conservation and protection of the environment.

"This forest contains 11-million acres for which there are 150 full-time employees to take care of the most precious kind of land," Dale tells his tennis shoe-clad audience. He urged their support of more federal dollars toward the management of the forest. A graduate of the University of Chicago, Dale readily admits his credentials are self-earned, not

from classes. "I've been leading nature tours since I was 13," Dale told a group last Saturday. "But the only relevant course I took in college was biology." The rest of his knowledge has been acquired through personal research, reading and hands-on experience. One of the reasons he became involved as a volunteer in interpretive programs is the lack of such resources locally and in Northern New Mexico in the Cibola National Forest around the Sandia Mountains. He figures if he can interest one child in protecting the environment, he has accomplished something toward a global situation he considers desperate. But amid his warnings about environmental abuse, Dale can wax rhapsodic about the delicate structure of a wildflower or the nutritional value of a gooseberry. He explained to his hikers Sat-

urday that wild food like gooseberries are more concentrated. A bird can derive approximately the same amount of nutrition from one gooseberry as a human from an entire orange. Recent steady rain reaped a harvest of wildflowers on the forest floor and Dale can throw out the name of nearly every bloom. He reviewed the relative value of parasitic plants like dwarf mistletoe that eventually kill their host trees, helping to thin the forest and eliminate weaker individuals. Dale repeatedly pointed out the cycle of nature linking sun, plants, animals, water and weather. "Everything in nature is a recycling process," he emphasized. He even speculated whether nature might be adapting humans through pollution to prepare for a cataclysmic meteor strike similar to that theorized as the possible death knell for the dinosaurs. One of man's biggest hangups, besides being inherently destructive, is that he likes to fit things into neat little squares in cultivation, dam and reservoir construction, river channels and other endeavors, Dale said. "Nature doesn't work in neat squares. Nature works in twists, but it gets there," he said. Indicating an expanse of meadow to the side of the trail, Dale said 95 percent of everything growing in the forest and meadow produces a drug of some kind. Folk healers from different cultures have utilized them for centuries. And science has isolated and synthesized them. "Generally, the farther down you go on the plant, the more powerful the substance," Dale said. He often uses the leaves of the yarrow plant, a member of the carrot family, as ingredients for a tea to relieve headaches, he said. But he cautioned against picking mushrooms because a deadly species with gills resembles many other harmless varieties. Dale moved to the Ruidoso area less than a year ago and to date has identified about 450 plants along the forest trails he hikes. He said there are about 1,500 more he needs to pinpoint. To be sure his hikers returned with some practical information,






Dale stopped to point out stinging nettle and poison ivy. As the group climbed higher on the trail at the end of Cedar Creek Road, pine trees were left behind and firs dominated the landscape. "Those two trees account for about 60 percent of all the lumber cut today," he said. Douglas firs show short leaves, flat and soft. The tree shape is pointed at top. Juniper, also called cedar, is rarer at higher elevations and in forests with tall, close-growing trees because there isn't enough light, Dale said. He told his hikers that when they read about the cutting of vast forests in the Amazon, they should also realize that the tragedy and waste is occurring much closer to home. "The same thing is happening in the Northwest forests of American," he said, hoping to spark an environmentalist lurking beneath the surface of just one of his listeners. Although Dale's summer program is over, he has plans to put his observations in writing as part of an environmental advocacy organization to be called Sacramento.




aging 165 pounds hold off the charges of a line that averages 240 pounds?

Wall had a unique approach, sending in two ballots vastly different. One ballot tied for the highest at 17. The other was rock bottom at seven.


Deming's loss to Los Lunas was the big stumbling block for most



State offers classes for hunters

The fall hunting seasons are right around the corner and parents should take note.


In New Mexico, anyone under the age of 18 must first successfully complete a hunter education course before they can purchase a hunting license. So, if you have a son or daughter interested in hunting this year it's time to sign them up for the New Mexico Hunter Education Program.

The deadline to sign up for classes this year is September 30.

Courses in the New Mexico Hunter Education Program are taught by a corps of dedicated, volunteer instructors. This means that times and scheduling vary from place to place. However, all courses require a minimum of 12 hours of instruction before completion.

To enroll in a course in your area contact your local conservation officer or call the Game Department office in Roswell at 624-6135.

Youngsters of all ages and adults are welcome to take the course, but the material may be difficult for younger children. Therefore, policy requires that students under the age of 11 must be accompanied to all classes by a parent or adult guardian.

Adults that are planning to hunt in other states should also consider taking the course. Laws vary from state to state and in some instances older people are required to pass a hunter training course before hunting.

The course taught in New Mexico is excellent for beginning hunters, and even the old pros may learn a thing or two. It is an extensive course that covers many topics to help students become well-rounded sportsmen.

Sessions in the course teach the history of hunting and the traditions and ethics necessary to become a true sportsman. Students are taught principals of wildlife conservation and

management as well as wildlife identification. Instruction is given on the responsibility each hunter has to the landowner, the wildlife, himself and other outdoor users.

Other sessions cover safe gun handling, firearms and ammunition and the fundamentals of shooting. It is not the purpose of the course to make expert marksmen, but to instill basic rules of firearms safety and marksmanship in the minds of the students.

There are sections that deal with the more primitive and difficult hunting methods. These cover hunting with bows, muzzle-loaders and handguns.

Course material also includes a section that may possibly save your life. It teaches survival techniques that could be the difference between life and death to the hunter that becomes lost or has to face other life threatening situations.

The New Mexico Hunter Education course, as you can see, strives to deal with all aspects of hunting. The information contained is important to not only the beginner, but the expert as well. Don't forget to sign up now before the fall rush.

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

Capitan Tigers fight back against impossible odds

Plagued by injuries that benched their quarterback and forced freshmen to take the field against the first string of the 2A Eunice Cardinals, the Capitan Tigers fought back in the fourth quarter last Friday to score a touchdown.

Head Coach Pat Ventura applauded the courage and commitment of his young players. The final score of 43-6 just doesn't do justice to their spirit, he said.

"We moved the ball well passing and pretty well running," Ventura said. The Tigers advanced 120 yards during the game, 50 yards from the five out of 16 passes completed. But they lost 45 yards in three offensive penalties.

"We've got 14 players (Capitan is a 1A team) and there is no one (for the defensive line) to practice against during the week," Ventura said. "Out of five seniors, only four have experience. We have a young team."

"It took my boys a quarter before they settled down. We turned the ball over to them three or four times. The runningbacks ran the wrong way (into blocks). Every-

thing we tried didn't work."

The Cardinals racked up most of their scores during that confusing first half with a score of 35-0, Ventura said.

The Cardinals gained 259 yards for the game, 152 yards during the first 12 plays.

"One pass was for 60 yards by itself," Ventura said. "Their total passing yardage was 120."

Even then, "they never ran the ball on us," Ventura said. And when the Tigers came back out at half time, they played hard, keeping the Cardinals down to one touchdown for the rest of the game.

Injuries hampered their efforts. Tackle Charlie Tracy was rushed to the Hobbs hospital with a suspected neck injury, but was OK.

Quarterback Orlando Baca, a sophomore, suffered leg cramps and was out most of the second half. Guard Jason Trujillo suffered a minor concussion during the first quarter and was out the rest of the game.

"I had nobody on the bench the rest of the night," Ventura said. The team moved the ball, but was dogged by fumbles.

"When Charlie was hurt in the

third quarter, the score was 43-0, but the other coach (Lonnie Scott) still had his starting bunch in there and I was mad. I had eighth graders and freshmen playing," Ventura said.

Officials suggested calling the game and for a while Ventura considered it for the safety of the young players.

"But the kids said, no," he said. "They said we came here to play and that's what we want to do. The first time they had the ball, they drove it all the way down and scored."

Sophomore Damian Roybal, filling in as quarterback, called a quarterback draw and ran the ball 85 yards for the touchdown.

Ventura also praised the offensive and defensive playing of tight end Weldon Smith.

"He caught several passes and broke away from tackles a few times to gain a few extra yards," Ventura said.

The Tigers will face Tatum High School in a home game Sept. 6. Ventura said he expects a tough battle but knows his team has the right stuff.



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

In the older horse division, Joe Kirk Fulton's Special Leader sewed up honors as Older Horse/Gelding of the Meet when he drew off to a 3-length victory in stakes record time in the All American Gold Cup.

Jane McGuire's Wicked Wills, winner of the World's Championship Classic and runner-up in the Rainbow Silver Cup, was Older Filly/Mare of the Meet.

In one of the closest votes of the quarter horse division, the thoroughbred Bailarin edged Pulstreak for Distance Horse of the Meet honors.

Dianne Reed's Moons Ego was named Claimer of the Meet.

The All American Derby was unanimously chosen as Race of the Meet.

Jose Poncho, a little black horse with humble beginnings, stole the affection of the fans — not to mention a couple of added-money races — en route to his honor as Thoroughbred of the Meet.

Jose Poncho, who was purchased at the 1990 Ruidoso Horse Sales by R.D. Hubbard and Ed Allred for a

mere \$2,300, captured two stakes races here and ended his freshman campaign with earnings of \$72,092.

The New Mexico-bred gelded son of Sutcliffe, who was trained by Don Farris and ridden by Joe Martinez, also was named New Mexico Bred of the Meet and 2-Year-Old Colt/Gelding of the Meet.

Gahlberg and Marconi's Mississippi Darlin, who won her first two outings here by a combined 21-lengths, was named 2-Year-Old Filly of the Meet.

In the sophomore thoroughbred division, William Clifton's Golden Wave Band, who captured both the Aspen Breeders' Cup and the Ruidoso Oaks, was named 3-Year-Old Filly of the Meet, while T.J. Hoyt's Cagney and Lace, a convincing winner of the Jockey Club Handicap, edged Bishops Tab for 3-Year-old Colt/Gelding of the Meet.

In the older division, double-stakes winner Piel Canela was a unanimous chose for Older Filly/Mare, and the 8-year-old Dance Trainer, who rebounded from off-season knee surgery before capturing the Ruidoso Sprint Championship, was named Older Horse/Gelding of the Meet.

Clifton's North Waco, who rattled off four consecutive victories from the \$5,000 level all the way up to the \$12,500 level, was a unanimous chose for Claimer of the Meet.

The First Lady Handicap was chosen as Race of the Meet.

Jockey Glen Murphy parlayed a sizzling start into a record-tying performance during this 78-day summer stand by riding 103 winners.

Some figured that Martinez's record-shattering performance of 103 winners set just the previous summer would stand the test of time.

But when Murphy started the season red-hot by riding 64 winners through the first 40 days of the meeting, there was talk of Murphy not only eclipsing Martinez's record, but of him annihilating it.

Despite the fact that Murphy cooled considerably over the final 30 days of the meeting, however, he still managed to tie the record on

the final day when he guided Goldgusher to victory in the Thoroughbred Juvenile Classic.

Murphy, 23, a resident of El Paso, Texas, was capturing his first-ever riding title at Ruidoso Downs. He rode 71 thoroughbred winners to win that competition by a landslide over runnerup Janeen Painter with 43.

He also finished second to perennial kingpin Jacky Martin in the quarter horse standings.

Murphy's biggest victory of the season came in the \$81,150 Budweiser Breeder's Cup aboard Charmin Abrecrombe.

Martinez was easily the leading stakes-winning rider with 10 added-money triumphs. Janeen Painter was the leading percentage thoroughbred rider with 50 or more mounts winning at a 22.2 percent pace.

Doyal Roberts saddled 32 winners for his fourth consecutive thoroughbred training title.

Also for the second consecutive year, Don Farris was the leading thoroughbred percentage trainer, winning at a 21.7 percent clip.

Not surprisingly, perennial leaders Jack Brooks and Jacky Martin ended the season as leading quarter horse trainer and jockey, respectively.

Brooks, a five-time winner of the \$2 million All American Futurity, saddled 44 winners out of 249 starters.

Martin, despite nabbing another quarter horse title, was also well down from his banner season of a year ago.

Village, county need appointments policies

Sad, but true. Political appointees are at the mercy of the elected officials who select them to serve. That sometimes leads to embarrassing situations for willing volunteers.

When the president, governor, county commission chairman or mayor taps a volunteer for a board or committee, it's not up to the appointee to check out the requirements and qualifications — it's up to that official, or their staff, to know those details and then check to see if the person selected meets the criteria. It's a lot like checking background and references on a job applicant.

You can't please everybody, and that's why President Bush or Governor Bush can legally stick by their guns when an appointee is unpopular politically. But, when it comes to specific requirements as to being a registered voter and as to residency, those qualifications are "nuts and bolts" rather than political. They're easy to check out, and it's up to public officials to do that before bringing forth a name for a public position.

The village and county should adopt a set of policies — it would be a simple process to prepare a form with qualifications listed from the ordinances or laws of the village or county, have each potential appointee fill out the form and sign it before accepting an appointment.

It doesn't take a genius to conclude that a town lacking the social consciousness to provide the financially underprivileged an admission-free recreational meeting place, is not operating in the best interest of the business community.

I have no way of knowing whom to blame for the "tunnel vision" of the local "powers that be" when all promotion is geared to such elitist pursuits as art shows, golf courses and etc.

Seems to me there is an attitude of "to hell with the poor working stiff trying to make it on minimum

wages or slightly higher."

5. Get help from local churches, volunteers and especially the chamber of commerce.

6. The operating hours should be from noon to 9 p.m. six days a week.

Actually, these operating hours should replace all the idiotic antiquated "open and closed" schedules now in operation all over our great country. For example, banks, lumber yards, courts, libraries, etc. are all synchronized to accommodate the leisure class that have all the time in the world to shop.

NMMI enrollment sets records

Enrollment at New Mexico Military Institute for the 1991-92 school year has set a new record, and students are still coming in, according to Lt. Col. Robert Shea, registrar.

As of Monday afternoon, a total of 1,020 cadets had registered, 540 in the high school division and 470 in the junior college. The record, set in 1986, was 1,003.

Of the total, 571 are new cadets, also a record, and 139 are females, another record. About five more cadets still in summer ROTC training are expected to report this week, Shea said.

Forty-one of the prospective cadets checked out before school started, and another 16 have left since classes began last Tuesday and Wednesday. The total of 57 is

almost exactly 10 percent of the new cadet enrollment, which is about average for the number of early departures, Shea said.

The record enrollment came as a complete surprise to NMMI officials, who were expecting negative reaction to the Persian Gulf crisis to have an adverse effect on enrollment, which has been around 850 for the past three years.

Lt. Col. Jim Matchin, director of admissions, said, "We had parents hang up on us early in the summer when we called to see if they were going to send their students here."

Later in the summer, however, the admissions office received a flood of applications, Matchin said. When it became apparent that the number of applications was going to exceed the 880 available beds.
