Warrant issued in burglary

Ruidoso Police are seeking Johnny Flores in connection with the August 11 burglary of Lincoln Cablevision, 117 Wingfield.

Detective Lanny Maddox said the department has been investigating that break-in where \$1,300 in cash and a number of checks were reported missing.

Maddox said, through anonymous tips and his investigation, he was able to place Flores, 30, who formerly lived at Twin Spruce Trailer Park #3, at the scene. He also learned that Flores allegedly had a great deal of cash.

A magistrate warrant was issued Friday, and Flores' name was entered in the national computer.

Maddox said he recovered checks totaling \$2,979.08, during the course of his investigation.

Entry was gained to Lincoln Cablevision by prying the steel roof panel, entering the building through the roof and tearing through the "blown" ceiling. The intruder pried numerous file cabinets and drawers and gained entry to several locked cabinets that con-

Area celebrates 50 years of conservation

When ranchers and farmers get together they talk a lot about water — how to make the most of what they have through good stewardship.

For 50 years, farmers and ranchers in Lincoln County have been working with state and federal agencies to conserve and care for natural resources, and they got together Thursday to celebrate 50 years of conservation.

The Upper Hondo Soil and Conservation District is celebrating 50 years of conservation, and its members recalled their history during a party at the Flying J Ranch Thursday.

Amid the speeches, barbecue dinner and musical en-

tertainment, the district honored its own, naming Paul Jones outstanding farmer, Tom Sidwell of the G-F Ranch, outstanding rancher, John Cooper, outstanding supervisor, and Tom Roybal, outstanding conservationist.

Fred Pfingsten was re-elected and Bob Boebinger was elected to the two slots open on the board of supervisors for the district.

Clem Weindorf and Greg Haussler each detailed the history that led to the formation of the conservation groups.

Weindorf remembered the "Dust Bowl" when the dust was blowing so badly that chickens went to roost at noon.

The government took an unusual approach when dealing with farmers and ranchers through soil conservation agencies — they worked to keep control with the people, and that philosophy has worked.

New Mexico was one of 22 states that enacted a law authorizing districts in 1937. Those districts were charged with taking care of major resources — soil and water — for future generations.


It was in 1941 that the Upper Hondo Conservation District was formed — one of 63 districts in New Mexico. Today there are 47 soil and water districts.

Programs listed during the speeches included CCC camps, Pilot Watershed Program, Great Plains Program and others.

"A lot of work has been done over the last 50 years — there's still a lot to be done," said Weindorf. He said Peter Hurd, well-known Hondo Valley artist, was one of the original supervisors. He went on to name many people who have served through the years, including Bert Pfingsten, who served as chairman for 47 years; and Ernest McDaniel who has served on the board since its beginning.

"Farmers and ranchers are some of the first environmentalists," said Greg Haussler, state conservationist. He said his agency works with landowners at their request.

The Soil and Water Conservation District Act was es-

established in 1937 to form soil and water conservation districts as political subdivisions of the state responsible under state law for directing soil and water conservation programs within their district boundaries.

The Upper Hondo District was formed to further total resource conservation and development and to give local people the opportunity to plan, direct and carry out programs that lead to the conservation and development of natural resources.

The District covers more than 1,073,425 acres of land in Lincoln and Chaves counties.

Its board of supervisors is locally elected and charged

County gears up to stand up to state, federal agencies

The Lincoln County Commission is loading its arsenal with legal ammunition to keep federal and state agencies in check, promote private land ownership and protect the county's agricultural, mineral and timber industries.

During its meeting Tuesday, the commission is expected to adopt two ordinances: one spelling out its policies in dealing with state and federal agencies and another creating an Agriculture and Rural Affairs Advisory Committee to act as its watchdog.

The meeting will begin at 9 a.m. in the commission room of the County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

Two recent activities spurred the action. In early March, the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) conducted its first meeting on the proposed acquisition of up to 5,000 acres along the Rio Bonito near the historic settlement of Lincoln. The land would be used to enhance recreation activities, improve wildlife habitat and restore damaged streambanks, BLM officials

said. That same week, several ranchers warned the commissioners that if they failed to take a more active role, federal and state agencies might cut them out of deliberations and could make land use decisions that would adversely affect the area.

Although initial reaction was positive to the plan to swap isolated tracts of BLM land outside the county for the acreage around the river, the mood in the county appears to be shifting in recent months.

The County Planning and Zoning Board has gone on record opposing the exchange and County Commission Chairman Sterling Spencer has gone on the offensive. With the backing of the other two commissioners, he has demanded that the BLM demonstrate the economic impact the acquisition would have on the county. He noted that the exchange would remove more land from the county's tax rolls when nearly half already is public land.

Spencer also stated his dissatisfaction with the past record of the BLM.

In an interview with *The Ruidoso News*, Spencer said he wanted guarantees

in writing on several issues including that no land will be condemned because of the project, private landowners rights will not be impacted negatively and that associated water rights will remain in the county. Some parameters for development of the land also should be drafted, he said.

Officials from the BLM are on the commission agenda Tuesday to discuss putting some of those items of concern in writing to clear the way for the swap.

The appearance also will give the BLM a chance to comment on the proposed Interim Land Use Policy Plan, the first of two ordinance set for action.

The interim plan is to stay in effect until the county adopts a comprehensive land plan.

The plan "addresses federal and state land use management issues directly and is intended to be used as a positive guide for federal and state land management agencies in their development and implementation of land use plans and management actions."

The policy puts the commission on record as supporting the continued multi-

ple use of federal and state lands in the county. Those multiple uses include agriculture, timber cutting and mining.

The policy also stresses that federal and state agencies must inform and coordinate with the county all pending actions that would affect communities and cities.

Prior to any land adjustments, the policy requires state and federal agencies to obtain commission concurrence and to perform impact studies. It specifically states that "no additional wilderness areas shall be designated in the county."

But the policy also would place heavy financial burdens on the county.

It would commit the commission to prepare plans for the protection of all aquatic threatened and endangered species within its boundaries, to promote and pursue development of water markets for future water rights, to provide opportunities for the development of water-based recreation, and to initiate a process for establishing a geologic, hydrologic and biologic data base. The county also would be obligated to develop Wild and Scenic River designations of its own design and would be responsible

for monitoring the condition of lands used for grazing, timber, wildlife conservation and wetland areas.

Those goals seem out of reach without creating a county planning department, some commission observers say.

Some of the monitoring responsibilities could be handled by the proposed new five-member agriculture and rural affairs advisory committee. However, three of the members are to be involved in primary agriculture production and two with secondary agriculture services, which could pose a possible conflict of interest.

In other items on the agenda, county manager Nick Pappas has put together a proposed definition of required residency for members of commission-appointed boards.

Sheriff James McSwane will present a proposed pay scale for his deputies. The commission rejected a scale submitted during summer budget sessions. Adoption of the pay scale would give the county two wage charts, one for deputies and one for the balance of county employees.

The Village of Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees has cancelled its regular meeting scheduled for today (Monday), September 9. The board will meet next at 7 p.m. Monday, September 23.

Mayor expected to name Espinosa to village council

Patricia Espinosa of Discovery Travel is expected to be named to the Ruidoso Village Council at Tuesday's meeting in Village Hall.

Mayor Victor Alonso's appointee will replace Al Junge who resigned from the board to pursue other interests. The post has been vacated since July 30.

Village manager Ron Wicker submitted a pair of resolutions concerning the Lodger's Tax Board.

One resolution seeks the support of the New Mexico Municipal League to petition the State of New Mexico Legislature for regionalization of existing Lodger's Tax Advisory Boards.

The move, if successful, would help eliminate the confusion created with the current Regional Advertising Board (RAB) and the Lodger's Tax Committee (LTC). Those two boards meet at the same time, open, close and reopen meetings depending if they are wearing their RAB hat or their LTC hat.

The state attorney general's office did not know why LTC boards were not allowed to regionalize in

the first place, other than a joint powers agreement would be required which is a lengthy process.

The second resolution, the pet project of Councilor Ron Andrews, would center around a one percent local option hospitality tax on establishments which provide services to tourists or visitors.

The resolution reads that the village is in "the process of completing a civic events center," and needs money to promote it. Groundbreaking for the facility is set for Saturday, September 28.

The resolution hints of an increase in lodgers taxes to the maximum of five percent. The council just passed a one percent lodgers tax increase from three to four percent.

Andrews presented this idea to the Revenue Stabilization and Tax Policy Review Committee in Ruidoso recently. The idea had mixed reviews before that board that leaned toward the cool side.

Another resolution concerns it. Please see Mayor, page 2A

State passes out fire money

Fire departments in Lincoln County walked away with \$50,358 from the state this year in a distribution of \$1.8-million to providers of emergency medical services statewide. It's the fourth distribution under the "Dollars for Life" amendment passed by the 1987 State Legislature.

The money comes from the Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Fund Act. Thirty-three counties and 78 municipalities will receive allocations on behalf of 261 providers, according to Barak Wolff, chief of the Public Health Division's Primary Care and Emergency Medical Services Bureau.

Each service is guaranteed between \$3,000 to \$20,000. Wolff said the establishment of a permanent fund by the legislature has tripled the amount of money the bureau could distribute. The money is generated by a \$1 annual assessment on every motor vehicle registration.

Ten departments received money in Lincoln County. The Ruidoso EMS took home \$17,353 and Carrizozo ambulance service was given \$5,117. Eight other units were sent checks of between \$3,060-\$3,766. They are ambulance units in Alto, Capitan, Corona, Fort Stanton and Hondo; fire department in Capitan, Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs.

Altrusa announces 1991 mammogram screenings

The Altrusa Club of Ruidoso, in cooperation with the Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) has scheduled its fourth annual mammogram screening for 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday, October 7 through November 1.

In accordance with the American Cancer Society's criteria for mammogram screening the program will be available to women who are at least 30 years old, and have never had one before.

The fee for the screening is \$50, to be paid by cash, check or credit card at the time of registration and appointment, at the hospital. Screenings are by appointment only.

This is the fourth year Altrusa has joined the Lincoln County Medical Center and local physicians in sponsoring the low-cost mammogram screenings during Breast Cancer Awareness month in October.

The first year the screenings were conducted, three people were identified as having breast cancer in its early stages, during a one-week period. That screening has now been extended to a full month.

Local economist judges a national education program

Dr. Marianne Talafuse of Ruidoso will join a committee of economists at Illinois State University in Normal, Illinois September 10-13 to judge entries in the twenty-ninth Annual National Awards Program for the Teaching of Economics.

This program is sponsored annually by the International Paper Company Foundation and administered by the Joint Council on Economic Education.

In schools throughout the nation, innovative teachers are providing high quality economic education. Too often, the strategies and outcomes of these successful teaching practices were not shared as fully as was desired.

To meet this deficiency and to encourage replication of effective teaching, the National Awards Program for the Teaching of Economics was established. Cash awards of \$11,000 are made each year.

Dr. Talafuse was the recipient of the Distinguished Service Award in Economic Education in 1988. The award was presented by the Joint Council on Economic Education and the National Association of Economic Educators at their annual meeting in St. Louis, Missouri.

tained money, according to police reports.

Also over the weekend, police investigated a fight between two Ruidoso 15-year-olds. One Ruidoso High School student was treated for a knife cut at Lincoln County Medical Center where his arm required six stitches, said Maddox.

No charges pressed, but the investigation is continuing.

Ruidoso Middle School was also burglarized over the weekend, and that investigation is under way today, said Maddox.

Local cable TV program contract goes to Cable Advertising Network

Ruidoso News Business Editor Rifkin and Associates of Denver, parent company of Lincoln Cablevision, has severed a relationship with Parsons Productions of Ruidoso and will rely on a national company to sell and place advertising on Lincoln Cablevision channels.

Paul Crown, manager of Lincoln Cablevision, said that as of September 15, Parsons Productions will be out of business as far as a relationship with Lincoln Cablevision is concerned.

Rifkin has contracted with a national ad seller and ad placement company, Cable Advertising Network (CAN) to sell and place local and some regional and national advertising on five Lincoln Cablevision channels.

The channels are ESPN, CNN, TNN, USA and TNT. Lincoln Cablevision and CAN have a third-party agreement with On-Track, operated by Sy Leland, which handles taping and telecasting race results from Ruidoso Downs Race Track and some other tracks.

Leland says he has done produc-

tion work for CAN in the Alamogordo market for the last year and a half.

He said his company will continue through an agreement with Rifkin to telecast local football games, village council meetings and such.

CAN has an office in Alamogordo and may service the Ruidoso area out of that city.

"I'm sorry that we're losing the personal touch," Crown told The News concerning Parsons Productions.

Bobby Parsons has headed Parsons Productions, headquartered at 445 Mechem Drive. He was not available for comment before deadline time today at The Ruidoso News.

On Track, Leland says, does production work and tape editing for several industrial and commercial accounts in the area. The company will be operating Channel 11 after September 15, Leland said.

Octoberfest will be staged by new group

A new non-profit organization, Ruidoso Octoberfest Committee, will stage the Octoberfest this year, featuring German dancers and other groups which have performed here in the past.

The October 18-19 event will be at The Barn on U.S. Highway 70 West.

Craig Rawlings, one of the organizers of the new group, said a board of directors and officers will be elected since it was learned the

committee has a green light to stage the event.

At the last Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce board meeting, Paul Crown, vice president, was authorized to negotiate with two entities wanting to stage Octoberfest.

The Chamber board decided to "farm out" Octoberfest for one year, reserving the right to take it back next year if desired. It has been a

Chamber project in the past.

Carrizo Lodge withdrew an application to orchestrate the event, however, leaving The Barn as the only applicant.

Rawlings said that shares at \$100 each will be sold to provide "seed money" for this year's event.

He said the Ruidoso Octoberfest Committee "didn't want to see Octoberfest go" and decided to take on the event. The committee is made

up largely of people who in the past have worked with Octoberfest through the Chamber, Crown indicated.

"I'm for anything that promotes Ruidoso. I wish them success," he said.

He said The Barn is being furnished under a standard lease agreement. He said the upstairs portion of the Barn will be available for booths.

Horse Tale exhibit in Albuquerque features items from Stradling Museum of the Horse

"Horse Tales: An Evolutionary Odyssey," the newest exhibition at the New Mexico Museum of Natural History and Science in Albuquerque, is sponsored by the Anne C. Stradling Museum of the Horse in Ruidoso Downs.

Horse Tales, which began September 1 and continues through February 9, explains the evolution of the horse, its abrupt disappearance from North America about 10,000 years ago, and its reintroduction just 500 years ago by Spanish explorers.

It also explores the modern-day world of the horse and its interaction with humans.

Many of the artifacts in the contemporary exhibit are from the Museum of the Horse, which is in the midst of planning and developing a permanent exhibition for Ruidoso Downs.

The Anne C. Stradling collection, housed in Ruidoso Downs, contains more than 10,000 items which are being refurbished, cataloged and



prepared for the permanent exhibition.

Meanwhile, some of those items are part of the Horse Tales exhibition. That part of the exhibition details the origins of horse breeding, the training and behavior of the horse and the contemporary uses of tack.

Horse Tales also received a

monetary grant from the Hubbard Museum.

The Albuquerque exhibition also details the evolution and natural history of the horse, and that portion of the collection will remain on permanent display at the Natural History Museum as part of its Tertiary Period exhibit.

Seven paintings from famed Western artist Charles M. Russell are in the exhibition. Each of the Russell paintings has an Appaloosa horse in it; the Appaloosa has been an artistic tracing agent for thousands of years.

Enlarged photos showing a section of two Russell friezes — known as the Doheny murals because they were painted for the Doheny home in Los Angeles — are included in the temporary portion of the exhibition.

The originals, titled "This History of the West" are a part of R.D. and Joan Dale Hubbard's private collection.

An art competition, show and

sale also are part of the exhibition, and feature the work of 15 invited regional artists whose artistic efforts reflect the horse in Spanish Colonial or Western Frontier periods.

The competition, curated by Linda Grasty of Albuquerque and judged by artists Betty Sabo and Gordon Snidow, included a \$400 award for best of show which went to Betty Moyers of Santa Fe for her oil painting, Appaloosa Autumn.

The \$300 first place prize went to a Tesuque artist, Veryl Goodnight; second place to Claire Goldrick of Pagost Springs; and third place \$100 to Pop Chalee of Santa Fe.

On Sunday, September 15, a dressage exhibition and champagne brunch is scheduled in conjunction with Horse Tales. The event will be from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Old Town Farm.

The Juan de Oñate Trail Ride is scheduled October 10-13, from Isleta Pueblo to the Coronado State Monument.

This cat could be for you

With the long, slender body of an elegant Siamese, but the good-nature of a crossbreed, Vann the cat would bring happiness to any home.

"He's very calm and laid back," said Randy Basch, manager of the shelter of the Lincoln County Humane Society. "He's litter box trained and very affectionate."

Vann was brought into the shelter about ten weeks ago as a stray. His neutering, the most expensive cost connected to adoption, will be paid for out of the proceeds from a benefit garage sale conducted by The Ruidoso News.

All animals adopted from the shelter must be spayed or neutered to prevent the production of future unwanted litters of kittens and pups that might be abandoned or have to be destroyed.

Basch said this summer at the shelter was much better in terms of animal health and adoption than previous summers.

"I want to thank those families that acted as foster homes for our litters of pups and kittens and gave them a shot at life," Basch said. "It really made a difference this summer. It was good not to come in the shelter in the morning and find puppies dying that looked healthy two days earlier."

Foster homes act as safe houses for litters while their protective shots take effect. Not only do the young animals benefit from not being exposed to possible diseases, they also become more adoptable because of the individual attention they receive at the foster homes.

Basch said the addition of new concrete dog runs at the shelter

also helped sanitation by being easier to disinfect and clean than the old pock marked asphalt.

The shelter currently has several adorable puppies available for adoption, as well as larger young and adult dogs suitable for indoor and outdoor living.

People who would like to directly increase the adoption chances for

dogs and cats at the shelter may become sponsors by contacting Basch or by sending an earmarked donation of from \$18 for a male cat to \$45 for a female dog.

"Whoop" it up here this fall

State and federal wildlife officials are asking New Mexico residents to watch the skies this fall for whooping cranes.

If the big white birds with black wingtips and a red forehead are sighted, the time, place and other details should be reported to local wildlife officials.

In flight, the bird's long neck is held straight forward and its long black legs extend beyond the tail. The adult's wingspan may be more than seven feet. When standing, they are as tall as five feet. Juvenile birds have white and rusty brown body feathers and black wingtips.

Only a few representatives of the species are left in the world. They are protected under the Endangered Species Act, Dr. James Lewis, National Whooping Crane Coordinator for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, said.

"Hunters, photographers, farmers and others are cautioned not to shoot or unduly disturb these birds," he said. "A whooper could easily be frightened into wires and other obstacles, or be disturbed from an important food and roosting site, especially critical during

migration."

An experimental flock that migrates each fall from Gray Lake National Wildlife Refuge in Idaho to Bosque del Apache refuge near Socorro contains 13 birds. But they have not bred despite efforts to promote pairing. The 17-year project is being phased out because of the lack of reproduction and the high mortality experienced by the flock.

The Rocky Mountain flock migrates in late September or early October from Idaho and Wyoming through Utah and Colorado. It stops for several weeks at Monte Vista National Wildlife Refuge in the San Luis Valley in Colorado before continuing to southern New Mexico in late October.

Canadian whoopers begin their 2,500 mile journey to the Texas coast in mid-September and October. The several-week journey takes them through central Canadian provinces and midwestern states of North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas.

The wildlife service expects about 142 endangered whooping cranes this September to migrate south from their Canadian nesting

grounds at Wood Buffalo National Park in Northwest Territories to Aransas National Wildlife Refuge on the Gulf Coast of Texas.

Biologists report production of only nine to twelve chicks this year due to drought in the nesting area.

Last fall, 146 birds flew safely to Aransas, but unusually high losses since then and the poor nesting success caused the first year of population decline since 1980.

Nine, possibly eleven cranes disappeared from the flock in the Gulf Coast area last winter and are presumed dead. The most plausible causes for the losses seem to be disease and predation. Two Texas men have been charged with killing a female in April. The penalties can be severe. In the fall of 1989, an individual was apprehended for shooting a whooping crane on the Gulf Coast of Texas and was fined \$21,480.

In May, Canadian wildlife biologist Ernie Kuyt found 32 whooping crane nests. June surveys located 21 chicks and one clutch of two eggs still being incubated. By August 21, the number of chicks had declined to about a dozen.

Legislation may force cable TV rate increase

A major cable re-regulation bill pending in Congress, if passed, could result in a hike in cable television rates in Lincoln County, but not 20 percent as some companies estimate, Paul Crown says. Crown operates Lincoln Cablevision out of Ruidoso.

A proposal in Congress to pay for the broadcast channels they presently receive free of charge.

Crown says that if the "Cable Television Consumer Protection Act" is passed and becomes law, cable company operators would have to "pass through" extra costs to consumers. He estimates that the increase in cable bills would be about 10 percent.

U.S. Congressman Joe Skeen in a news release says the bill awaiting action on the Senate floor "would allow local television stations to negotiate with the local cable operator for a place on the cable system. This

provision is known as 'retransmission consent.'

There is nothing in this bill which requires or establishes a surcharge for retransmitting local broadcast signals.

Skeen asks why the cable industry would have to raise rates if the measure becomes law.

"Is their profit margin so thin that they must pass along so they increase in their expenses to their customers? Like most businesses, cable operators have a great deal of flexibility in pricing decisions," the congressman says.

Crown says any increase in operating expenses has to be a "pass through" situation. "The one person who pays is the consumer," he says.

In years past, Crown says, the broadcasters "romanced us" to carry their signals. He said the federal government requires cable companies to keep their channels.

Mexican food restaurant finds permanent home

Chester and Ysleta Stone have hung up their ladles and are going to travel in their fifth wheeler and take it easy after many years of operating the Upper Canyon Restaurant and before that Whispering Pines Restaurant.

Don Victor Mexican Food was scheduled to be in a permanent home and open for business at the former Upper Canyon Restaurant location on Main Road at the Traffic Circle just up from the Post Office by today (Monday), September 9.

An innovation is that the restaurant will be serving a breakfast buffet much like the Stones had for many years. In addition, lunch and dinner will be served with Mexican food featured.

A Ruidoso business woman advises other merchants to be sure which "Yellow Pages" company they are paying when they are billed.

Shamie Mills thought she was advertising in the Contel (now GTE) Yellow Pages when she received what looked like a bill. It turned out it was Yellow Pages of America, Inc., Business Directory which contacted her.

Yellow Pages of America has no connection with any telephone company.

Mill was solicited for advertising which, when published, will go only to corporations, selected consumers and small businesses she was told when she questioned what looked like a "What would anyone in New Jersey care what I carry in my store?" the owner of The Kids Store in the Timbers Mall said.

She thought the \$294 charge was a little stiff for advertising which wouldn't benefit her.

The company, which plans to publish the Yellow Pages Business Directory, is in its infancy. No directory has been published as yet, Pam Townsend, an executive with the company, told The Ruidoso News when contacted.

It's just a solicitation, Townsend said.

The face of the solicitation document looks very much like a bill. One received by The Ruidoso News in big letters says "Pay This Amount" and shows a figure of \$167.25.

Under that in faint letters is this notice, "This is not a bill this is a solicitation. You are under no obligation to pay the amount stated above unless you accept this offer."

On the back of the form, appear these words:

"The Business Directory Publishing is not associated with nor a part of any telephone company. The time of publication and distribution for this directory is entirely up to the discretion of Business Directory Publishing.

Ranchers, foresters cooperate

The land of the Lincoln National Forest is beginning to benefit from a very long and old disagreement between ranchers and the forest service.

The Carrizo Integrated Resource Area, located north of Capitan in the Lincoln National Forest, has recently been designated as a pilot project to develop and implement better land management skills for 55,000 acres on the National Forest that is infested with piñon and juniper trees.

Thanks to an area rancher, Sid Goodloe, the Forest Service has faced the problem and developed ways to deal with it.

Goodloe was tired of the damaged forest ruining parts of his ranch.

"I attempted for years to get something done about the silt from the forest's erosion that was running down and ruining my ranch, polluting the streams," said Goodloe, who has been ranching for about 35 years.

He finally got something done when he started range improvements on his own land and showing the forest service what good land management could lead to in the future.

Change in Management

The progress he showed resulted in a change of the "custodial" type management the forest service had been doing for the past two years.

That type of management was leading to a decrease in livestock grazing capacity due to lack of forage, wildlife habitat conditions bleakened, and an extensive gully system that continued to transport silt-laden water into streams and rivers.

Now, the Forest Service has enhanced activities to restore watersheds, enhance range and wildlife habitat, improve forest health through vegetation manipulation, soil stabilization, water resource development and implementation of sound range management practices.

The desired future condition is for the forest to be restored back to its original condition before the settlers came in the 1800s, said Edwards.

That means using brush management, controlled fire management, fuelwood cutting, building dams and an improved watershed condition.

It will also be used as a research area for experiments to be tried. "I don't know what will be done, but I know it will be all," said Edwards, who hopes the technology learned during the project won't be forgotten or looked at as ridiculous in the next five to ten years.

Existing Problems

The problem with the land is that the trees have overpopulated the forest, taking the water from the grass and drying up the earth, resulting in gullies occurring.

Each tree takes up 14 gallons of water in the spring and 32 gallons in the summer. Their roots grow underneath the ground, twice as wide as the diameter of the tree branches, said Edwards. The grass surrounding the area died off.

The project will result in the riparian vegetation, increase in herbage because of the replacement of areas with solid woodland canopy to a mosaic of native vegetative seral stages that increases biodiversity, and an enduring partnership between ranchers and forest person-

nel will be made, according to a document explaining the project.

History

Back in the 1800s, the Lincoln National Forest consisted of old Indian settlements with intense Savannah land of breezy grass and spured trees.

Some of the areas still have historical artifacts and are considered archaeological sites, said Edwards. Those areas will remain the way they are.

However, the beautiful land was destroyed when the settlers came and overgrazed the land with domestic livestock, said forest personnel, Dick Edwards.

For years the blame has been two-sided.

"The rancher always gets the blame," said Goodloe. "But it's not all his fault."

He claimed one of the main reasons the forest got to be in such bad shape, was because of the newly developed forest service and their new fire prevention message.

Whatever the cause, the two sides have come to both agree on one thing. It's the land that is suffering, and that is most important, said Goodloe.

Progress has been made, but "it's only a scratch on the surface," he said.

The Forest Service has constructed 22 earthen dams, cleared two acres of trees as a demonstration project, reformed a 20-foot gully that is now, at the least half that depth, and are about to begin more vegetation management.

The problem is money, said Edwards. It will be a slow process, but the Forest Service hopes to have the first half of the Carrizo project finished in seven years.



Warriors walk the yellow flagged road, lose 34-0

The Ruidoso Warriors again failed to crack their opponents 20-yard line and were shut out by top ranked Lovington Wildcats 34-0.

For the Warriors, Friday's game started with much more intensity than the flat Artesia game a week ago. But like Artesia, the ill winds of miscues started those yellow flags to flapping.

The major turning point of this game came early after some brilliant Warrior defense.

Louis Jimenez on special teams knocked a Wildcat silly after he caught Brook Henderson's kick on the 40. Craig Turner followed up with superb tackle that dropped the quarterback for a 20-yard loss. The Warriors looked spirited, ready to neuter some 'Cat. The Wildcats were deep in their own territory.

Even the first Warrior yellow flag didn't seem to mean that much at the time. Then came two plays that killed Ruidoso for the night.

On third and Carrizozo, Lovington's QB Pilar Carrasco split the secondary easily when a Warrior slipped on the wet turf.

A few plays later, on a key fourth and long, a Warrior was drawn offside and the Wildcats had a critical, gimme first down.

It wasn't very pretty after that.

Still, the Ruidoso offensive line, showed improvement and courage to withstand the brutal attacks of the Wildcats swift and beefy front four.

The Wheaties Award for Champions for this game belongs to that Warrior front line of Jeff Cox, Richard Rippey, Keith Henson, Brooks Henderson and Able Chavez. Outmanned in size, they were never beaten.

True, Ruidoso did not have a sustained drive to report that entered the opponent's 20-yard line. But there was some fine Warrior work by Shane Eidson, both defensively and offensively. The big kid, over 220, is fast with the softest pair of hands you can have without gloves.

Louis Jimenez is constantly improving. His jarring first quarter tackle left pieces of Wildcat spread over 15 yards. The grass will be greener there forever.

Sam Gumbert didn't get close enough to try a field goal, but he did manage a fine 40-yard shot

downfield after the Warriors were caught for a safety.

Brook Henderson's foot was the Warrior's prize weapon in this game. Henderson averaged 36 yards a kick, and that helped keep the score down.

All the Warriors hard work does not magically appear at game time. What you see, good or bad, is the result of hours and hours of hard work after school by coaches, players, cheerleader sponsors and bandmasters.

That some teams are bigger and better doesn't mean you pick up your toys and go home. A team that

has character is always a winner. Win or lose, expectations are always met with lots of passes, long runs, hard tackles, feisty cheerleaders and the fight song.

The fight song, you can't say enough about it. That fight song has got to move you. Those drums have got to send chills up your spine until the adrenaline flows. It can't send a message that we're about to politely pound the opponent. It has to say we're going to reach right through your pads to rip your hearts out.

If it takes a thousand big drums to rock the stadium and send the


hometown spirits into a frenzy, so be it.

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Ruidoso's fastest pedaling in Olympic Training

They look like ordinary high school students strolling down the halls of Ruidoso High School, but put them on the backs of racing bikes and they turn into lean, mean, muscle machines.

As a reward for their dedication and talent on top of two wheels, Eric Marr and Jeremy Pinto will be matching speeds this coming week with other hopefuls at the Olympic Training Camp in Colorado Springs.

Both boys have racked up wins in their short careers.

Pinto took top honors in the 15/16 year-old division at the New Mexico Criterium, a closed circuit race, at Kirtland Air Force Base in Albuquerque and he won his division in the New Mexico Road Race, a 70 mile course. Marr earned the title of state champion in the same race in the 17/18-year-old category, although he's only 16.

The high school senior has been on a cycle seriously for the last three years.

"My brother, Roger, raced on cycles," Marr said. "I went to a lot of his races and it looked like fun. I decided to give it a shot and Mr. (Galen) Farrington coached me. He's an incredible coach."

Farrington teaches at the high school and organizes cycle racing events locally that draw competitors from across the Southwest.

Pinto, 15 and a tenth grader, has been riding for just one year, starting first with a mountain bike and then moving into racing.

Pinto rides a Schwinn Paramount and Marr pedals a Zinn Morgul Bismarck.

To be considered for the Olympic camp, the boys compiled resumes and cover letters. The Olympic coaches are especially interested in the results of the races applicants have run. Marr and Pinto both could point to wins.

The boys planned to leave for the weeklong session Saturday and will be back after it winds down on September 13.

Besides reviewing general cycling techniques, the coaches at the

camp will suggest a diet for cycling, show the best approach for pack riding (racing with a group of other cyclists) and go over bike maintenance, they said.

The cost for the boys is \$50 each plus their traveling expenses. The camp picks up the rest of the tab as an investment in the sport and in potential Olympic athletes.

Although none of the boys'

parents are cyclists, "they're very supportive," Marr said.

He would like to continue riding through college and then race as much as possible in New Mexico.

"I really like the sport," Marr said.

Pinto also would like to continue riding in college.

"Depending on how it goes there," he said. "I'll see how far I can take it."

Game and Fish commissioners go hunting for higher fees

Out-of-state hunters will pay more

SANTA FE (AP)—The state Department of Game and Fish hopes to raise an extra \$1 million from proposed license fee increases for out-of-state hunters and fishermen.

The fee increases were adopted by the state Game Commission on Friday but still must be approved by the Legislature.

Commission Chairman James Koch said he hopes to see the new fees in place for the 1992 season.

Hunting and fishing fees would not be increased for New Mexico residents.

The biggest non-resident increases would be for exotic and big game animals.

Ibex and oryx licenses would go from \$500 each to \$1,500; bighorn sheep from \$370 to \$1,500; elk from \$210 to \$500; mountain lion from \$50 to \$300; and bear from \$75 to

\$300. Other non-resident license increases would include:

Deer from \$145 to \$175; fall turkey from \$50 to \$100; antelope from \$120 to \$250; javelina from \$100 to \$140; none-game, such as rabbits, from \$25 to \$50; small game, such as pheasants and other birds, from \$50 to \$75; and spring turkey from \$75 to \$100.

The commission didn't change the fees for Barbary sheep, at \$300, and furbearers, such as beavers and raccoons, at \$300.

The commission also voted to raise year-round non-resident fishing licenses from \$24.50 to \$40.

The increase would apply only to yearlong licenses. There would be no hike in the daily or short-term license fees.

The commission also attached a

clause providing for automatic, annual cost-of-living increases that Koch said would free commissioners from dealing with the fees every year.

Some members of the audience expressed concern that the new fees would discourage out-of-state hunters. But all the fee proposals passed unanimously.

The commission approved a \$17.8 million budget for the Game and Fish Department for the 1992-93 fiscal year. The amount is up about \$1 million from the current fiscal year budget on the premise the fee increases will be approved.

Koch said the money generated from the fee hike will be used largely to hire four department biologists and four more field officers.




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

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History buffs get together to relive Valley's colorful past

Tales of gold, murder, dynamite and ambush filled the air in San Patricio last week as history buffs settled into their chairs at Bob and Jade Boebinger's Pavilion.

By that time, they had been entertained by the Hondo Fiesta Dancers and had feasted on a pot luck dinner of fried catfish during the August meeting of the Lincoln County Historical Society.

Archaeologist Karl Laumbach, one of three principal investigators for Human Systems Research Inc., was there to speak on Apache archaeology and Victorio Peak. Laumbach has served as president and coordinator for the non-profit research organization since 1986. He previously directed archaeological projects at New Mexico State University.

His focus in recent years has been to help pinpoint the 1880 battleground where Victorio's Warm Springs Apaches nearly wiped out 70 troopers of the 9th Cavalry in the vicinity of Victorio's Peak.

Laumbach said archaeologists recently have discovered the location of the battlefield and currently are trying to trace the course of the fight using artifact sites.

He gave a brief overview of

events leading up to the battle, noting that Victorio came to power in the 1870s.

The Apache leader's group headquartered in a warm springs area about 18 miles west of Truth of Consequences.

Several times, the government attempted to move the Apaches to

new reservations, but they kept breaking out and returning to the warm springs area.

"For 1 1/2 year, they stayed ahead of the cavalry," Laumbach said. "He moved men, women and children."

But about all archaeologists can find of that massive movement are isolated items, such as the projectile points on Butterfield Trail where it is believed the Apaches hit a small wagon train.

In 1880, Victorio took his people into the Hembrillo Basin of San Andreas Mountains, a big basin with high bluff walls and Victorio Peak rising from the center.

In a shelter nearby, called the bloody hand shelter because of red hand prints on the walls, figures have been pecked into the rock, Laumbach said. Experts are not sure whether Apaches or Pueblo Indians created the figures since Apaches usually scratched their art into stone.

"We haven't seen anything like this anywhere else," Laumbach said of the designs depicting a man on horseback with dots down his side, red paint over his body and puddled on the ground. One figure wears a horned headdress that a local Apache historian said represents a mountain spirit dancer.

Other figures appear to

represent a puma with puffed tail and claws, another a dragonfly. A pattern of dots lead from one figure to another as if setting the sequence for a story.

But it's the stories of gold in Victorio Peak that arouse the most public interest, Laumbach said.

The version believed by many modern-day gold hunters concerns a Doc Nos, who supposedly was scouting for deer when he found a hole in the mountain and climbed down. He brought back a story of stacks of gold bars and of skeletons tied to posts.

Laumbach explained that the mountain peak is full of holes because it is riddled with limerock fissures. "A person can climb down 180 feet or more," he said.

Nos reportedly brought out 60 gold bars and then decided he wanted to reap the rich harvest faster. He hired a "powder monkey," who set off a dynamite blast and accidentally shut down the cavern.

"People have been trying to get back in there ever since," Laumbach said. Tunnels have been cross-drilled. An aerial map shows dozens of roads criss-crossing the peak. Just as many stories abound about how the gold came to be deposited in Victorio Peak in the first place.

One tale is tied to a death bed

statement about a treasure buried under a hill by a cross.

Treasure hunters were sure that description pinpointed Victorio Peak, where a cross clearly is visible.

When researchers determine the figure was not man-made, many were discouraged, Laumbach said. But they took hope when the same researchers announced that nature had created the cross more than 400 years ago.

Victorio Peak lies within the White Sands Missile Range, but arrangements are set for a crew representing the descendants of Nos and other interests to drill this year where ground penetrating radar has indicated a large cavern, Laumbach said.

"They plan to drill holes and send cameras down," he said.

While they search for gold, archaeologists continue to look for evidence of early Apache occupations in southwest New Mexico.

Laumbach said archaeologists are excited about a rare find in a series of caves at the north end of the Black Mountain Range north-west of Truth or Consequences where Apaches were reported in abundance in the 1770s by Spanish observers.

"The caves had been sealed up with adobe, but they all have been broken into," Laumbach said. "Ex-

perts believe they were caches of clothing and other supplies left against the time (the Apaches) would return in their seasonal visits," Laumbach said. In one of the shelters, archaeologists found small fragments of broken pottery with mica in them and a "runny" design.

"And we know what pottery Apaches had, had mica in it. They were big vessels with pointed bottoms," Laumbach said.

Some of the fragments were from glazed pottery unlike Apache ware. Researchers believe those may be from Zuni pottery produced from 1680-1730, probably made at Acoma.

The Eastern Chiricahua Apache or Red Paint people, named for a red clay found at the warm springs site, were nomadic, traveling north and south in circles as hunting dictated.

"They don't leave much archaeological evidence behind," Laumbach said. "When they pick up and leave, not much is left for us to find."

But sometimes they would leave a core group in a central location, then fan out and come back from time to time. It's in those central sites that archaeologists continue to search and hope for new discoveries.

Then Elfigo said: "You will need some animals inside also, a sheep, a cow, or burro—because these animals welcomed the 'Nino Jesus' (Christ Child) into their home and warmed Him with their breath. And do not forget the rooster because when the Christ Child was born on midnight Christmas morning the Rooster sang 'Cristo Nacio' (Christ is born.)"

Elfigo taught me how to make this little shelter, which brought such great happiness to our Mother. And every Christmas now for forty years a little Cedar shelter with the same small sacred figures inside has been there in Saint Anne's Chapel. And I see our Mother's spirit fondly close and near. And I send up a prayer for Elfigo.

Elfigo has been like a brother to the Storm Brothers, and I rejoice that he is in Heaven with Our Lord where he has been re-united with friends and loved ones.

Apache chief inducted in Hall of Fame

Apache Chief Victorio (1830-1879) was inducted into the National Hall of Fame during dedication ceremonies Sunday at the Hall of Fame grounds on U.S. 62 East in Anadarko, 70 miles southwest of Oklahoma City.

The National Hall of Fame for Famous American Indians was incorporated as a non-profit organization February 1, 1952 — an idea proposed by the late Logan Billingsley of Kotonah, New York.

He conceived the idea for the memorial while working for the United States Indian Service in Anadarko before Oklahoma statehood, according to a news release.

Since its inception, 32 Indian leaders have been inducted into the Hall of Fame with Victorio being the 33rd inductee. Among those

sculpted in portraits of bronze on the Walk of Fame are Will Rogers, Massasoit, John Ross, Pushmataha, Stand Waite, Tishomingo, Sacajawea, Pontiac, Cochise, Geronimo, Hiawatha and Pocahontas.

Chief Victorio was an inspirational leader who was known as "the Apache whom no Mexican or American could kill." He welcomed the American troops to his territory, thinking they would drive out the Mexicans and leave the Apache in peace.

"The white man stayed on, broke more treaties than the Mexicans ever had and Victorio agreed to settle on the Ojo Caliente reservation in Texas," continues the news

release. "His band was later moved to San Carlos and his people decided they would rather die than live in that barren area, so in the summer of 1879, Victorio crossed the border into Mexico where he was hunted by both Mexican and American soldiers."

In October of that year, Victorio died in battle.

There are conflicting stories about his death, one report says he was killed by a Mexican scout named Mauricio and in another states Victorio took his own life so he would not be captured.

After his death, the war department commander for Arizona and a

U.S. Army general both said the band had been dealt with unfairly by the U.S. Department of the Interior in the relocation of San Carlos.

As a result, most of the band was killed when they fled San Carlos and it wasn't until 30 years later that the survivors were returned to their lands in the mountains of New Mexico.

Anadarko is also the home of Indian City U.S.A., an outdoor museum depicting the lifestyles of seven southwest Indian tribes; the Southern Plains Indian Museum and Crafts Center, the Anadarko Philomathic Pioneer Museum and the annual American Indian Exposition set for Monday through August 24. The Exposition is celebrating its 60th year.

EDCLC is heading down the right track


Money talks, and the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County got the message loud and clear when the Lincoln County Commission called a halt to funding for the public/private partnership. That funding cut came after the county provided about \$220,000.

But, to the EDCLC board's credit, its members got the message and now they're getting down to work.

It was refreshing to read about last week's meeting where the board concentrated on developing new marketing strategies instead of figuring out how to get more government funding. The board has some new blood, some new voices and a new leader, and it looks like that combination could add up to the changes needed to get EDCLC off dead center.

There's no question of the need for economic development to sustain and beef up the area's economy, and it's good to see EDCLC honing in on its mission.

If EDCLC will continue in this new and improved direction, it will benefit the entire area and the private funding that is so badly needed will be much easier to find.



Upon Reflection

Springer: out of sight, out of mind

It is a potential powder keg, and the news media have ignored it altogether — at least to date. Nonetheless, a chilling 8-month old report prepared by the former-Medical Director of the New Mexico Youth Authority is festering in the executive branch of state government and ought alarm those in the King administration responsible for running the state's juvenile corrections system.


The report was commissioned by the then-Secretary of the New Mexico Youth Authority, Jackie Riggs, late in former-Gov. Garrey Caruthers' term of office. Its author is the respected University of New Mexico professor of medicine, Dr. Ben Daitz.

According to Daitz' report, problems are rife throughout New Mexico's juvenile corrections system, but are "most serious and compelling" at the New Mexico Boys' School near Springer. (Interestingly, Daitz contract as part-time Medical Director to the Youth Authority has not been renewed since submitting his report.)

What the Daitz Report details, after a comprehensive examination, is a situation nothing less than explosive at Springer: a "warehouse for troubled kids" where "residents are not safe" and sexual assaults and other forms of violence are commonplace.

At the heart of the problem, the report concludes, are "three major potentially correctable problems":

—The Boys' School at Springer is shockingly over-crowded and under-staffed. Designed for 181 residents, at the time the Daitz Report was prepared Springer housed a population of 273, forcing "an already understaffed facility...to supervise, at times, over 100 residents more than capacity." This, the report notes, "in outdated and structurally-deficient cottages" with little room for counseling activities let alone privacy.



—More still, the report continues, staff training and supervision throughout the state's juvenile system is woefully inadequate, "inconsistent and largely unregulated." Once again, the most disturbing conditions are at Springer, where staffers have formed "almost independent kingdoms with different philosophies and agendas" concerning such fundamental matters as therapy for substance abuse and mental health problems which are often found in youth committed to that facility.

"There are (also) convincing reports at the (Boys' School) of staff using unnecessary force to subdue residents."

—Finally, the report concludes, "Psychological treatment services within the N.M. Youth Authority (are) practically nonexistent." In consequence, "severely troubled and mentally ill children are not being afforded the opportunity of treatment under the present system...At the N.M. Boys' School, in addition to the problem of inadequate numbers of psychologists, there are disturbing reports of incompetence."

The N.M. Youth Authority was created as a cabinet-level department directly under the governor three years ago, thanks in large measure to the tireless efforts of state Rep. Ruben Smith (D. Dona Ana). Until that time, most of the state's juvenile corrections pro-

gram or their predecessors — the N.M. Boys' and Girls' Schools, probation and parole, based youth offenders' facilities around the state — were part of the adult corrections system.

According to one of the measure's supporters, Rep. Bob Hawk (D. Bern.), "it was clear that the handling of youth simply had to be separated from the adult system because, frankly, the needs of children and youth were being treated as second thoughts within adult corrections."

What makes the Daitz Report so disturbing is the evidence it presents that youth corrections may remain a second thought in state governmental affairs. Moreover, at least in off-the-record private conversation, many close to the juvenile system — including past and present state officials — are less than confident that the present secretary of the N.M. Youth Authority is the person most apt to turn the situation around. Before Gov. Bruce King appointed him to head the department, Robert Fortillos was the longtime superintendent at Springer where some of the most serious problems are reported to exist.

In any event, not many who have seen Dr. Daitz' report appear anxious to quibble with its findings.

"The report," says Rep. Hawk, "is on target." More bothersome still, preliminary investigations by this reporter and his colleagues at Sunmount Syndicate incline us to suspect the situation may be even worse than Daitz has reported.

Citizens assume no responsibility more awesome than that which falls to them when they authorize their state officials to take custody of children and youth.

So stay tuned. We promise you more — much more — to come.


