Bikers rev up for rally

Even before the golden aspens that decorate the higher elevations around Ruidoso light up the mountains with gold, Aspenfest '91 excitement will begin.

It all starts with the Golden Aspen Rally, the time when thousands of motorcycle hobbyists visit the area to ride the mountain roads, check out the trade show and entertain locals and visitors.

When thousands of motorcycles customized, decorated and all spilled up - line the streets of Ruidoso, it's really a sight to see.

The Golden Aspen Rally starts Wednesday, September 18, and continues through the weekend, joining in the Aspenfest celebration for the 22nd year.

Headquarters this year is at the Anne C. Stradling Museum of the Horse in Ruidoso Downs, where special games and events will be staged. The Museum of the Horse is also the site of this year's big trade show.

A special added attraction this year will be demonstration rides on the new Harley from 9

a.m. to 3 p.m. Friday and Saturday. Events that will draw locals and visitors alike are the two parades down Sudderth Drive.

The "big" parade will begin at Sudderth and Mechem at 9:30 a.m. Saturday, September 21, with cyclists roaring, at a sedate parade pace, all the way down Sudderth Drive to the "Y."

Golden Aspen royalty, crowned at 6 p.m. Thursday at the Museum of the Horse, will lead the parade that draws thousands to ride and watch.

The night light parade will go the other direction, starting at the "Y" at 9 p.m. Thursday, September 19, and roll down Sudderth around the traffic circle and back to Y-Knot Park.

The Trade Show is open free to area residents at 6 p.m. Thursday, and offers a chance to see all kinds of biking apparel, equipment and accessories.

That show is open for a small charge from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. throughout the rally.

Those who stop by the rally headquarters

will see motorcycle riders taking part in all kinds of games and competitions, and if you're anywhere in the county, you're likely to see the riders taking in the scenery or riding in one of a series of special "runs."

From 1-3 p.m. Thursday, Ski Apache opens its gondola for Golden Aspen Rally riders to ride.

Rallies will be the guests of honor at a street dance at 7:30 p.m. Friday. The Winner's Circle invites everyone to join in the fun in the club parking lot on Sudderth Drive.

Many members of the Christian Motorcyclists Association will be among the more than 2,000 riders in town for the rally, and they'll be conducting non-denominational church services at 8 a.m. each day at rally headquarters.

Aspenfest is on a roll with Circus on Parade

"Circus on Parade" is the theme for this year's Aspenfest parade, set to roll down Sudderth Drive at 10 a.m. Saturday, October 5.

Bands, clowns, animals, cars, Shriners, kids and just about anything else may show up for the big parade, said Aspenfest chairperson Judy Wicker, who's promising a parade that will be a lot of fun for the entire family.

This year's grand marshal, Howard Morgan, the popular weather man from KOAT-TV, will lead the parade riding in a 1944 convertible.

You, too, can be in the parade. The deadline to enter is Monday, September 30, and entry forms are available at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

Cost to enter is \$50 for political entries and \$35 for all others, with entry free for kids on bikes and their "cute critters." Float entries will be competing for a top prize of \$250, second place of \$200 and a third place \$100, with a special large ribbon (no cash) for the most original.

Line up along Sudderth before 10 a.m. to watch Ruidoso's own "Circus on Parade."

10 RMS students arrested

Ten Ruidoso Middle School students were charged Friday with criminal trespass and damage to property at the school.

Ruidoso (CD) Commander Lanny Maddox said damage to the school property was estimated at \$600.

According to Maddox, the students last Thursday allegedly ripped out a hot water line in the football equipment room and damaged uniforms as well as other general vandalism.

After all these years Billy the Kid still dazzles his fans

It's like being surrounded by a bunch of groupies.

But instead of a squealing, giggling gaggle of young girls, these single-minded aficionados tend to be middle-aged, well-dressed and scholarly.

A hefty number have written or are writing a book or magazine article.

The object of their attention is William H. Bonney, alias Henry McCarty, alias Kid Antrim, known to the world at large as Billy the Kid.

About 80 of these amateur and professional historians descended on Lincoln County last week to join the Billy the Kid and Western Violence Symposium.

They were there to listen to some 20 scientists and researchers dispel myths and backup facts about The Kid.

They also grabbed every opportunity to participate firsthand. Over five days, field trips stopped at several of Billy's old stomping grounds: Lincoln, White Oaks, Mesilla, the South Springs Ranch.

Led by author Leon Metz, a historian who wrote a biography of Sheriff Pat Garrett, they traveled to the site of the Blazer Mill shoot-out. They listened as Fred Nolen of London, a member of a research team on the Kid, retraced the events and deaths of that day.

Following the lead of Art Blazer, grandson of mill owner, Dr. Joseph Blazer, they climbed a hill behind the old family homestead. Hidden from the cars driving past on U.S. 70, markers indicate the general location of the graves of Buckshot Roberts and his victim Dick Brewer, both killed in the melee.

Brewer was the leader of the "Regulators," who were looking for the posse that murdered John H. Tunstall on February 18, 1878. Billy also was a regulator and they were eating at Blazer's Mill when Buckshot Roberts, suspected of helping in the Tunstall murder, rode up to Dr. Blazer's house.

During the gunfight that followed, Buckshot killed Brewer and Billy killed Buckshot.

Other stops included the 1908 murder site and the grave of Garrett, and the grave at Fort

Sumner where Billy is said to rest, killed by a bullet from Sheriff Garrett's gun on July 14, 1881.

Back in Ruidoso, old films on the young outlaw were reviewed. Esoteric discussions dissected the social and cultural implications of the nation's fascination with Billy and "manly" violence in general.

But one of the major reasons for the gathering was to announce the findings of a research project put together by the Lincoln County Heritage Trust aimed at establishing or disproving the authenticity of photographs and letters purported to be Billy's.

After examining all of the examples and using computer analysis, the expert concluded that:

Apparently, the only authentic image of Billy is a tintype acquired by the Heritage Trust in 1986 from the heirs of Dan Dedrick, one of Billy's friends. It shows Billy in front of what is thought to be Beaver Smith's Saloon in Fort Sumner. The Kid has his hand on his rifle and his other arm behind his revolver in a jaunty pose that has become synonymous with The Old West.

Lewis R. Sadler, a biomedical visualization

expert at the University of Illinois said the other tintypes and photographs examined did not score high enough to prove they were the same person shown in the original tintype.

Sadler's impressive credentials include being asked recently to analyze photographs supposedly of American MIAs and creating computer-aged images of abducted children.

—Handwriting found in 10 letters signed by a William Bonney from 1878-81 appear to have been written by two different people, according to Maureen Casey Owens, an expert forensic document examiner from Chicago.

—The claim by the late Oliver P. "Bushy" Roberts that he was Billy the Kid is false. Jerry Weddle, author and independent Lincoln County Wars researcher, told those at the seminar that extensive computer analysis of the only authenticated tintype of Billy and photographs of Roberts leave no doubt that they were two different men.

But the dispute certainly won't end with that announcement, despite Weddle's statement that Roberts' birth records also show that he and Billy were two different people. The controversy already has been featured on an ABC-TV special hosted by Lincoln County part-time resident Sam Donaldson and on NBC-TV's "Unsolved Mysteries."

William Tunstall, who lives in Roswell and has been the chief proponent of Bushy Roberts' claim, has asked for a face-to-face with members of the Heritage Trust.

According to a report in the Roswell Daily Record, he's disappointed that he was not invited to the symposium to offer the evidence he has collected to back up Roberts.

Tunstall has written a sequel to his first book about Roberts, "Billy the Kid and Me Were the Same." He said he is convinced that the Kid lived to a ripe old age in Hico, Texas, as Bushy Roberts.

Back on the field trip trail, after the group of Billy buffs left Blazer's Mill Saturday, Art Blazer said he can't quite figure out why everybody is so interested in Billy.

"When I was growing up, shoot, it didn't amount to much," Blazer said. Now 69, Blazer

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Leaders line out the state

State lawmakers are still at it in Santa Fe — drawing lines that will affect the political climate of this state for at least 10 years to come.

State Representative John Underwood (D-District 56) is a member of the House Voters and Elections Committee. Late Sunday his committee passed a plan to divide New Mexico into 70 state legislative districts.

Both Democrats and Republicans, in weeks leading up to this special session, said repeatedly that their aim is to draw the best districts for the state as a whole, regardless of the political party makeup of different areas.

Lines are being drawn for New Mexico's three congressional districts and for the state house and senate. Requirements for the distribution of population are established by federal law, and the redistricting uses Census figures. Minority populations, too, have to be considered in dividing the state.

According to published reports, at least half the 70 districts in the plan passed Sunday contain a majority of Hispanics and/or native Americans — almost exactly the same percentage as in the state as a whole.

The plan, while called fair by most, got an unenthusiastic reception from the six representatives who end up in the three districts with two current legislators living within the new borders.

"It's pretty much the plan that came out of all of our redistricting hearings," said State Representative John Underwood early today.

Council hears pleas for Parks & Rec plans

Amid puzzling rhetoric and emotional pleas, the Ruidoso Village Council took it on the chin from several residents at the special Parks and Recreation meeting last Thursday.

New Parks and Recreation Advisory Board chairman Smokey Stover brought his master plan for recreation before the council. The plan was filled with action steps.

That appeared to make several entities uneasy, especially leaders of the gymnastics program.

For years, the Ruidoso gymnastic's program has enjoyed an enormous share of the parks and recreation budget.

Stover and village manager Ron Wicker appear to be moving village budget money into an arena where gymnastics' wedge of pie in smaller and village maintenance in parks and recreation will actually get a wedge.

Wicker said approval of the master plan from the Planning and Zoning board was necessary before the council and parks could prioritize the plan.

The council then opened the session to the audience.

Robert Donaldson, chairman of P&Z, cautioned the council of embarking on ideas beyond the dreaming stage before surveying all the problems.

"We have to be sure there aren't other problems we're not now aware of before we spend taxpayers dollars," Donaldson said.

Jeff Maul of the P&Z board, apparently frustrated over the inactivity of anything in parks and recreation, admonished the council for not being able to service the community on the simplest of amenities.

"I feel like the Parks and Recrea-

tion commissions, directors, this council and previous councils have failed in Parks and Recreation with various simple things," Maul said.

"Things that are discussed here are big things. There are 100 little things that can make a big difference in this community."

"New playground equipment. I don't think I've seen new equipment in 10 years."

"How about a basketball hoop and a piece of concrete in the park next to the swimming pool. That's a little thing that would make a difference."

"How about a backboard for the tennis courts on a slab of concrete. I know people would use it while they waited to get on the tennis courts. It hasn't seen bucks."

"We haven't seen anything new like that go into the community in ten years."

"How about a moderate skate board ramp? I've seen them in other communities. It would keep the kids off Sudderth and Mechem. That's not a large cost. Not a big deal. A little shot in the arm goes a long, long way."

"How about a horse shoe pit? These are simple things. We have a piece of land, why not use it?"

"My daughter has been in gymnastics, it's a good program, but let's look at the little things. I just plead with this council and the parks commission to give our small children some things that they want."

Gerald Ames, president of the Ruidoso Gymnastics Association, made a hard pitch for gymnastics, saying he didn't want to be left behind.

Mayor pro-tem Barbara Duff said there was a rumor that the village was going to disperse with the gymnastic program. She said nothing has been proposed along that line.

Ames pitched the council, justifying the value of the gymnastics program.

"We have a lot of expertise in the youth area," Ames said. "We've been doing it for 10 years and we just don't want our input not there."

Ames said he just wanted to know the process of implementing these park master plans so that gymnastics could have input.

Ames said the gymnastics program started as a private-type of gym. He said liability insurance turned out to be too much and Pam Graves, then parks director, accepted the program for the village.

Ames seemed confused in relating the direction gymnastics should take in the community.

He said the program has grown and now the gymnasts would like to have their own gym. He said fund money had been collected.

But Ames then said if they could afford a gym, they couldn't afford the program. He also said if they had enough money for a program, they couldn't afford a gym. Therefore, he concluded, he wanted the village to get out from underneath the \$800 per month rental and give the money to a strong gymnastics coach. He said his daughter needed a strong coach.

"We have to send her to Albuquerque in the summer. I'm losing her. She's a ninth grader. I don't want to lose her. I want her in my town with me," Ames said.

Ames also offered information as to why the schools no longer have a gymnastic's program.

"It's expensive, you've got to have coaches," he said. "I'm a high school teacher. We cannot hire enough people at the high school just to coach football, basketball and track."

"If you apply for a job at the high

school today, the first question is, 'What can you coach? How many will you coach?'"

"We have to offer these things to the kids and we can't do it. We're short-handed right now."

"About 70 percent of the school is coaching," Ames said. "Seventy percent of your teachers are staying after (school) for 25 cents an hour, that's what they get paid. They're coaching for 25 cents an hour."

"This (gymnastics) is another school program before high school. There are very few high school kids in it."

"The volleyball team that won the state championship for Ruidoso last year, on that team were a number of gymnastics kids that made that team better," Ames said.

Several coaches reached over the weekend, including Ruidoso Athletic Director Ronnie Maskew, disagreed with statements made by Ames.

They said the volleyball team that won the state championship for Ruidoso had one player, Cicele Makowski, who was a former gymnast. She was a JV'er and not a regular.

Maskew said teaching assignment was the primary consideration for hiring a new teacher. If the teacher's subject fit within the program, coaching then became a plus.

Maskew said that coaches' pay of 25 cents an hour was something people said years ago that wasn't applicable and had no scientific basis.

Maskew said that of 32 school teachers, 15 also coach. He said that includes the band director and two cheerleader sponsors. He said coaching is seasonal and that several coaches work after school on a volunteer basis, not mandatory.



Palomarez trial set in Nov.

The embezzlement trial of former Carrizozo deputy town clerk Kathy Palomarez has been rescheduled for Nov. 12. The trial was set to begin Tuesday. Palomarez was indicted by a Lincoln County grand jury in April. She is accused of diverting more than \$2,500 from the city for her own use between January 1, 1990 and August 31 of the same year.

Garbage meetings scheduled

Members of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority will be talking garbage with residents of communities across the county the week of September 23-27. "We'll be reviewing the history and organization of the Authority," said Recycling Director Kerry Krumsiek. "We'll cover collection, disposal and billing; how to obtain variances from mandatory service; the recycling program and the compost demonstration project."

The meetings all are scheduled for 7 p.m. They will start Sept. 23 in the Capitan school cafeteria. The others are set for Sept. 24 in the Hondo school cafeteria, Sept. 25 in the county commission room of the courthouse in Carrizozo, Sept. 26 in Ruidoso Village Hall and Sept. 27 in the recreation room of Corona High School.

Personnel Board meets to get organized, elect officers

The Village of Ruidoso Personnel Board will have its organizational meeting at 7 p.m. Friday, September 20, at the Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center.

The purpose of the meeting is to elect officers, draw lots for term of office and any other business that may come before the board. The meeting is open to the public.

has watched the Kid's following heated over the years. Things really grew up when Bushy Roberts came forward and the debate started over whether Garrett really killed Billy, he said.

People don't bother him much anymore with requests to see the scant remains of the old mill or the house where his grandfather died and the family store next to it.

He only showed up Saturday to make sure the group understood that the markers on the hill for Roberts and Brewer are only there in memory and acknowledgement that the two men are buried somewhere in the vicinity.

"Nobody's buried (under the crosses)," he said. "We did the same thing for some others up there" including his grandfather and three soldiers.

Blazer said he doesn't talk much anymore to researchers who are writing books, because his words don't always come out the same in print.

He spent most of his life working for cattle growers, but now is a school bus contractor with his son, Kenneth Blazer.

Born on the second floor of the family store, Blazer said he's stayed close to his roots.

"I never got very far," he said. "I moved another half-mile down the road." His son now lives in that house and Blazer maintains homes in Capitan and Tularosa.

His family managed to hang onto the mill property and a portion of the old homestead even after the Mescalero Apache Reservation was formed around it in 1873.

"That's because my grandfather came in 1868," Blazer said. "They took a lot, but most of it, we got to keep."

His father tore down the mill (now situated on the south side of the highway) in 1947 because the east wall was leaning severely, yet people keep climbing an attached staircase. He feared someone would be hurt, Blazer said.

"We just couldn't keep them out," he said. "Only a portion of two adobe walls remain."

But across the street, his grandfather's house still stands.

"This building used to be an old saddle shed and adobe corral when he came in 1868," Blazer said. "The (other) buildings burned at the turn of the century and grandfather put on a floor and a roof and lived there until he died in 1945."

Today, while the indestructible adobe — like the Blazer family — endures, the inside of the building is in shambles, a victim of time and vandals.

Underwood said lawmakers took testimony early last week, getting public input from various groups including Native Americans and Hispanics, who came up with a plan of their own.

Underwood, speaking before heading to Santa Fe for the special session, said he's in favor of a state legislative district that will include all of Lincoln County with Mescalero, Tularosa and a tiny chunk of Chaves County, Precinct 104, the leg that sticks down and is the home of 96 voters. That part of District 56 in the past.

"It makes all of Lincoln County have one representative instead of

three," said Underwood.

Currently, Lincoln County is divided into three districts, with Ruidoso's Representative Underwood also representing parts of Chaves and Eddy counties — including Artesia.

The strange shape of the three districts leaves Alto and Capitan represented by State Representative Richard Knowles who also represents Roswell, Carrizozo and some other parts of the county are lumped in with the Elephant Butte district represented by Representative Paul Harrington.

Underwood said Ruidoso and Lincoln County residents have more in common geographically and economically with Mescalero and Tularosa than with Artesia.

"That's what the people in Artesia believe, too," said Underwood.

The committee reviewed a proposal on federal congressional districts Sunday, but took no action.

Points of contention, during the past few days of negotiations, tended to be over political party makeup, with some Republicans claiming that Democrats are out tooust Congressman Joe Skeen, a Republican who represents Southeastern New Mexico.

Governor Bruce King was quoted in the Albuquerque Journal saying his concern with the District 1 proposal that made it through the Senate is that the big district is overloaded with Republicans.

"That district combines Rio Rancho with Albuquerque."

The Senate passed its proposal on to the House, but Roundhouse watchers don't expect the House version to be exactly the same as

the Senate's.

"We are trying to pass districts that are contiguous and are as compact as possible and that will meet the federal court requirements regarding minorities," said Underwood.

Congressional districts much each contain a population of 505,000, plus or minus 5 percent.

"We've come up with a plan that is different than the Senate plan — we've got about three of those. We're trying not to split up Albuquerque. We're trying to keep rural with rural and urban with urban and still have a fair mix for the people of New Mexico."

"It's not an easy thing," he added. "I think we'll adopt a plan, and I expect the Senate will sign off on it, and we'll sign off on the Governor's plan and send both to the Governor

for him to sign one of them," said Underwood.

With progress made toward a congressional redistricting plan, lawmakers will turn their attention to drawing lines for all 112 of the State Legislature's seats.

Lines will also be drawn for the State Board of Education's 10 elected members. The 15-member board also includes five members appointed by the governor.

The House of Representatives passed a measure, 60-6, Saturday that divides the state into 10 equal-population districts.

San Juan County representatives weren't pleased with moving Aztec into District 10, from District 5 where it has been for at least 20 years.

House leaders were quoted Sunday saying they hope to complete the redistricting task by Thursday.

House stands as lonely reminder of lost dream

Family cherishes good memories of hard times

On a wind whipped island surrounded by an ancient river of fire, stands an abandoned monument to pioneer spirit and ingenuity.

The walls of a deserted house, hewed from the rough lava rock around it, testifies to trampled dreams of carving out a life on the malpais of New Mexico.

The naturally-insulated lava walls are two feet thick. The rocks are plastered together with mud. Members of the family that quarried the rock and built the walls were intent on using whatever resources were available.

Pete Griffin, owner of Griffin's Western Wear in Ruidoso Downs, spent his early teens on the malpais building that house with his father and three brothers.

"Some of those times weren't the best," Griffin said.

The family had suffered through a string of bad luck and had moved back to Lincoln County about 1959-60, because Griffin's father previously owned a ranch in Corona and had formed lasting friendships there.

"It was state land and we hoped to lease it to run some goats," Griffin said of the malpais. "We had horses, milk cows, but we never got fully stocked with goats."

"We built the house but never worked in. We worked on it kind of between other jobs. We never got the roof on, only the outside walls and fireplace. We intended to put in partition walls and we had started a basement."

They planned on adding stucco to the inside and counted on the lava providing a good natural insulation, Griffin said.

A large sandstone fireplace dominates what would have been the living room. Sandstone also was used to decorate the window lintels.

The family used cement around the windows and doors, but natural soil mixtures for plaster between

the rocks.

Griffin, now 43, said he's visited the unfinished house that he worked on when he was about 12 years old and in seventh grade at the Carrizozo school. The land now is privately owned. He's surprised by how well the house has fared despite being opened to the elements.

"We used native dirt (for mortar) and it still looks about the same as it was, even without a roof," he said.

Griffin's father figured goats would be well suited to the rough

surface of the hardened lava.

"Dad had raised 5,000 head of goats at Corona and was familiar with the stock," Griffin said. "He felt it would be surprising the amount of stock that the malpais could support."

For one and a half years the family lived surrounded by the malpais (Spanish for badlands).

"Some of my brothers were in college at the time," Griffin said. Besides the family, a friend of his father also lived with them in a small house they were using until the lava house was completed.

We did our cooking in a travel trailer and we had several smaller sheds," Griffin said.

The boys, Cleve, Clarence or "Yunk", Garvin and Garrett (Pete), were used to helping their father with chores.

"We were raised on ranches," Griffin said. "Dad had 260 sections in Texas, north of El Paso. But there was a drought in the early 1950s and the bottom fell out of the cattle market."

"Dad believed in working from daylight to dark and sometimes later."

Water was pumped from a windmill-powered well "and then we'd carry it to the house and heat it on the wood stove for our baths."

"We used coal lamps for our lights. We were too far out to run power. We got used to not having a telephone," he said.

The story around Carrizozo describes sheep and other livestock becoming lost on the malpais beneath ledges and inside lava tubes. Their owners could hear their braying but couldn't find the animals.

Albert Najar with the Bureau of Land Management at nearby Valley of Fires Recreation Area, said descendants of those animals still roam the malpais today.

"You still see sheep out there today," he said, along with the black lizards, black mice and black diamondback rattlesnakes that have developed the necessary camouflage to survive in the dark environment.

Griffin said he wasn't aware of the family losing any livestock, but that there were other ranchers who ran goats in the area.

Everett Greer was born on the malpais in 1951. His father was taking care of a small ranch owned by his uncle since before World War II.

"They ran Angora goats and had 1,000 head at one time," Greer said. "They ran them across the malpais. The goats would fall into crevices and they'd lose them. I've found dead deer that have fallen in and a six-point buck rack wedged in so tightly, I could never get it loose."


Sometimes the goats would race each other to the nearest yucca plants to eat the flowers.

"They were like kids that way, but not many of them were lost," Greer said. "Usually a herder and a couple of dogs stayed with them."

Other activities occurred on the malpais besides ranching, Greer said.

Another small rock house south of the Griffin lava structure and not in sight of the highway was a thriving moonshining operation.

"It had a water tank on the side to catch rainwater and a tube ran inside to cool the alcohol," Greer said. "Dad was a kid going to school in Carrizozo and he went to the guys

making the moonshine. I don't think they were ever caught."

Before moving to Carrizozo and the malpais, the Griffin family experienced many good times. The four brothers won the world championship in trick riding, Griffin said.

"That was around 1956-57," he said. "We worked together as a contract act for about 10 years."

During the early and mid-1950s, the family lived in Colorado and traveled throughout Arizona in the winter.

When they moved back to New Mexico and another ranch, bad luck struck again. Lincoln County was the next stop.

"We started over and it's been hard work ever since," Griffin said. The lava rock was quarried from nearby private land.

"We used bars to break it loose and sometimes a tractor and a big dump truck," Griffin said. "What we quarried was a lot different than that around the park. It wasn't a big solid mass. This would break loose. We shipped it all over the United States."

"I remember loading many a rail

car with stone. It was a means for all us boys to make some money."

The boys went to college, but they also learned the craft of stonework from their father, a trade that has served them well throughout their lives, Griffin said.

"We knew it was a good trade and if we learned it right, it could be a lifetime thing," Griffin said. "There's not a lot of competition. Not many are willing to put in that much hard work."

Under the name of Griffin Brothers Construction, three of the brothers still work together today building homes and laying stone while balancing other business interests.

"We're doing the stonework on the home of Joyce and Douglas McBride (an oilman and developer of the White Mountain area)," Griffin said. "We get along well. We've worked together so long, we know each other's moods and when to stay away."

Griffin takes great pride in the quality of their work and that of his father, noting that the elder Griffin in the early 1930s built a station near Corona and chiseled a star design into the rock.

"It would be sawed out now," he said. "Dad was considered a master mason, although he was a cow man at heart."

The family left the malpais to operate a travel trailer park in La Luz.

Griffin's father, Clarence Griffin, went on to serve two terms in the 1970s as an Otero county commissioner. He died in office.

"Dad always liked public speaking," Griffin said. "He had gone to college on a football scholarship, but had to quit during the Depression."

Griffin looks back on the malpais period as happy despite the tough existence.

"Life was slower paced then," he said. "You had more time to be a family."

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

He will be demonstrating the cutting and polishing of the stones at two locations in the near future.



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Aug. building permits top \$1 million

August building permits totaled well over a million dollars compared to a value of only \$360,050 in August of 1990.

Building permits this year added to \$1,187,850.

Total permits for the first eight months of 1991 still run more than \$1 million short of the figure the same time last year.

The figure for eight months of this year is \$5,302,747 compared to \$6,441,317 for the first eight months of 1990.

New single family dwellings were the mainstay in building permits in August of this year, adding to \$941,500.

Residential additions/alterations were \$246,350.

Comparable figures in July of 1991 were \$623,810 and \$210,799. Also in July, commercial additions add to \$23,096 with condos coming in at \$155,000. Total permit figure in July was \$1,012,714.

August of 1990 saw new homes adding up to \$272,000 and residential additions/alterations coming in at \$80,050. Commercial additions that month were \$8,000.

Total permits for August of 1990 added to only \$360,000.

He would need the usual understanding and training to become housebroken.

Slim is up to date on his shots and is being sponsored for neutering by a long time supporter of the local humane society, C.R. Hicks.

Sponsors willing to pay the cost of neutering or spaying to increase the chances for adoption always are needed, shelter manager Randy Basch said. The shelter requires all adopted animals to be spayed to ensure that they will not produce more unwanted litters.

Statistics show that for every human brought into the world, 15 pups and 45 kittens are born. More than 18 million of these unfortunate animals are destroyed each year at government pounds and at shelters across the nation.

Pet owners must be educated that neutering and spaying will cut down on the needless deaths and suffering, Basch said.

Meanwhile, the humane society shelter is home for dozens of dogs and cats waiting for new owners. The choices include puppies that are rottweiler and beeler crosses, adults that are black Labradors, shepherds-collie mixes, a greyhound mix, a female chow and a couple nice small terriers, Basch said.

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

Retched Rockets rip Warriors in a romp, 42-6

If you don't mind losing, last Friday's domination of the Ruidoso Warriors by Goddard, 42-6, could have been entertaining.

The Rockets ran up a whopping 496 yards against the Warriors and were virtually unstoppable as long as the first string played.

Fans were treated to a poised performance by 3-A's top quarterback, Danny Vigil. Vigil ran for one touchdown and threw three touchdown passes before being yanked early in the third quarter.

Goddard's fleet-footed backs rushed for over 100 yards each. Alfie Bolanos drove 136 yards, 64 on a touchdown run and Frank Espinoza ran for 114 yards.

Goddard is a 3-A school that has for years submitted student numbers that should make them 4-A like Roswell. However, the city does not want the two schools to play in the same district and risk eliminating each other for the state title.

The Warriors moved the ball on the ground the first half, but either stumbled passing or killed themselves with a penalty.

Warrior Dan Seay also showed some fine moves on two nice runs.

Unfortunately, they were followed by Warrior mistakes.

Craig Turner, on defense, was the Warriors' key cruncher.

The Warriors only score came early in the fourth quarter when quarterback Manny Guardiola hit Shane Eidson in the end zone with a five yard pass.

Having said a cheery good night, the sun is now down behind the hill, and the Vale is in the half light of golden gleaming.

The little chipmunks have gone running up the branches of the small Apricot tree to their home, for the night. The dove up on the hillside among the piñons, with their soft green gilded with the after glow, sends down his coo-coo-coooo, song of sunset lullaby. Down among the river trees the robin sends up his evening song in answer to the dove.

Now the gleaming fades into the twilight, and the hush and the stillness of a mountain world ready for pleasant dreams casts all the vale in a mood of peace and content.

The long twilight slowly turns to dusk, and from the tall grass near at hand and out across the meadows comes the tiny strumming and the harp chords of the snowy cricket, clear and musical in the deep quiet and the stillness of early nightfall—the September serenade.

The Ripening Rays

Since mid morning the clouds gathered dark purple all to the east; the thunder rumbled and silver and lavender lightening streaks and flashed displayed a storm pageant among the thunder clouds.

And yet through heavy rains fell in the San Patricio area, the vale stayed under the sunshine and shadow of moving bands of clouds—grey, black, and billowy white.

Between the moving cloud shadows, you could feel the bright sun shining down upon you reminding you of days of mid summer.

This time of year the sun shines down slantwise upon the world on account of the lower path through the sky. You feel these rays hot against your cheek; and the apples, now reaching full size on the branches, feel these rays on their red and golden cheeks also. For these are what the old timers called "The Ripening Rays." These rays are busy during mid August doing their work of ripening, not only the apples, but also the grains of the fields and the wild grain and wild fruit of the hills and vales.

This year with the best rains in many years, the apples are nourished from the moisture in the ground; and the fruit is helped to expand and grow by the moisture in the air. For many reasons — which we can go into later — the local apples are some of the best in the world.

Apple Varieties

Right now let us go over some of the main varieties of apples. The Encyclopedia Britannica says there are thirty-five thousand kinds of apples in the world, all told. There used to be about one hundred popular varieties in the United States.

Locally they have simmered down to about six or seven not counting other varieties found here and there.

First is the Starks Double Red Delicious, and the Original Stark's Delicious. (Later I will go over with you the story of the double

red varieties, which represent most of the red local apples.)

The red delicious is the world's favorite apple for eating out of the hand, and is first choice for salads.

The golden delicious is a great all-purpose apple for eating raw, pies, cobblers, and preserves. The flavor is something like a pear.

The Jonathan has come down through the years as one of America's favorites. It has a sharp juicy taste all its own, and is great for apple candy, pies, and eating out of the hand.

Several kinds of winesaps, notably the Staymen winesap, are late ripening and are good keepers through the winter. And they are good for cider, preserves and pies. They have a tart taste which gives them their name.

The Rome Beauty is the old stand-by for baking, although it is a good all purpose apple as well.

Other varieties found only here and there are: Black Twigg, Winter Pearama in, Ben Davis, Arkansas Black, and Shenango. The health qualities of apples are legendary, and the local ones especially so.

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

Teaching enhances Hosmer's mature artistic style

Light dances across the watercolors of Ken Hosmer, infusing his scenes of common life with an uncommon vibrancy. "When I deal with other artists, I find what they want to learn from me is color," Hosmer said during a recent interview at his Ruidoso studio. "The process is) rather a surprise to me. What happens is spontaneous and intuitive. It comes from inside.

"When I'm teaching I try to analyze and see what it is that I do, determine the color scheme. But at the moment I decide to throw that other color in there, it's intuitive."

In contrast to the energy emanating from the paper in front of him, the man behind the brush is soft-spoken and low-keyed. Two traits that work well when facing a room full of aspiring or already successful artists.

Hosmer said he can remember back in first grade when he was envious of how well a girl at the desk across the aisle could draw. He was in fifth grade before he received any recognition for his own art.

"That probably woke everybody up to the fact that I was interested," he said. "I couldn't wait until seventh grade when I could take art."

Although no one else in his family painted, they always encouraged his efforts. During the summer between his junior and senior years in high school, they sent him to Carrizo Lodge art school to work under artist Carl Cogar from Las Cruces.

"It had quite an impact and after that I was really set on a career in art," Hosmer said. "It was the first time I painted in oil."

When he graduated from high school in El Paso, he was torn between a major in engineering or art, opting for the former. But after his first year in college, "my heart was in art, so I changed."

After college, Hosmer taught high school art in southern Colorado, incorporating ceramics, drawing and silversmithing.

After a few years, he moved back to El Paso to teach in a community college.

In 1982, Hosmer returned to Carrizo Lodge to manage the art school. That experience evolved into his own traveling workshop squeezed into the time slots open after judging shows, writing art-related articles, creating his own art works and filming instructional videos.

"My methods have gotten tailored to workshops (12-15 a year) that usually run 9

a.m. to 4 p.m. five days a week," he said. "I lecture and give information and demonstrations in the morning. In the afternoon, the students paint while I offer advice.

"I have roughly an hour to complete a piece and that has influenced my approach. I couldn't get involved in details because they couldn't see them from a distance."

Quite a change from where he started. "I spent hours (on one piece)," he said. "You could see every hair, every tree on the hill. When I started formal training in oil, they suggested I try watercolor to loosen up and become more sure of myself because there's aren't unlimited opportunities for changes. You make that decision once."

Today, he occasionally will work in oil, but most of his time is concentrated on watercolors.

Preparation can take many forms. Sometimes, Hosmer does a pen or pencil sketch, sometimes a small watercolor, sometimes on location, sometimes in the studio.

One of his more intriguing approaches is to block out the light and shadow patterns in white and black, creating interesting pieces of art on their own merits.

"I look at the shapes and paint the shadows," he said. "It's like a map, it shows me where dark washes need to go."

Looking over the patterns, errors stick out "like a sore thumb" and he can assess the composition, he said. Occasionally, he will

use a camera, but he finds colors are never true. Subtle variations are lost.

"Working from real life is better training," he said.

"The problem with working directly from a photograph is that you are trapped and tend to put too much detail in because you're copying and that's not what painting is all about," he said. "I want to use it as a reference only."

Hosmer said he balances his time in the studio versus time in classes.

"A lot of artists want to be in the studio all the time," Hosmer said. "I get antsy. I have to do both to get fresh ideas and be around people. It's really a nice balance and works out well."

The three years he worked at the Carrizo Lodge, he learned firsthand from other artists what worked and what didn't. He also established valuable contacts that helped him later when he set up his own workshops.

Lately, Hosmer has been focusing on scenes with human figures.

"When I started, I loved nature and that really got me into art," he said. "I was doing landscapes almost exclusively. For years, there were flowers. A year ago, it was animals. Right now, I'm really interested in doing things with people. Who knows what will be next."

His animals stirred a wide audience and garnered heaps of publicity. He painted pigs, chickens and cows in pastoral and barnyard settings.

His "Spring Calves," a 15x22-inch watercolor depicting bovines in warm reds, pinks and browns accented by cooler aquas, won an award in the Southwest Watercolor Society competition and was placed in its traveling exhibition.

"I haven't seen the painting practically since the day I painted it," he said.

A portrait of barnyard pigs called "Fat and Sassy," graced the cover of Artists of New Mexico. It has been picked up by several magazines nationally and internationally with articles Hosmer has written.

Working in watercolor is like riding a stallion instead of an old gray mare, Hosmer said.

"You have to have a plan, but there's always a little edge that the water is going to flow differently," he said. "Basically, it's what you call impressionism trying to paint the light, the illusion of light, using the colors."

"I want it to look like the paint fell into place."

He generally paints two or three days a week. A project may take four hours or a half hour. "It all has to do with my emotional state," he said.

When he's painting, his schedule usually consists of a morning walk along the river. By lunch, he will have a black and white pattern block or a drawing worked out. After lunch, he starts painting. He tries to be finished by 6 p.m. The next day, he critiques the work, adds touches and makes corrections.

"That's one reason I keep the studio separate from my home," he said. "When I walk across the field, that says I'm going to work now."

The Ruidoso studio includes two bedrooms that occasionally are occupied by his students or those of his wife, Paula White Hosmer, an internationally recognized porcelain artist.

Not every Hosmer painting is a winner. "No matter how long you've been painting, you throw some away," Hosmer said. "You learn to watch for the exceptional one and when they turn up, you hang on to them and play them for all their worth."

Hosmer said for a while his best work was being snapped up by members of his classes and he'd come home to a depleted body of work. Now he sets them aside for shows.

Hosmer isn't always the teacher. He also is a student.

"I think you should always try to get as much information from wherever you can," he said. "There's no quicker way to lose inspiration than to close yourself in the closet and shut everyone out. I'm looking for ideas everywhere and it's great when lots of us (artists) get together."

"I try to take workshops. But one of the reasons I can do that is that my style is so well matured. It's there whether I want it or not. I've tried to paint differently, but it comes out a Hosmer."

We ask your help in establishing and expanding several long distance rail passenger trains as well as some shorter distance proposals.

First, there is the creation of transcontinental diagonal AMTRAK service from Seattle-Florida via New Mexico. From Denver and Trinidad to Amarillo the route in New Mexico would either run through Clayton or Raton/Tucumcari.

The second long distance train is making the Sunset Limited a daily train between Los Angeles-New Orleans via Deming and Lordsburg and extending it on to either Washington or New York using existing equipment. Other shorter distance proposals are: 1. Denver-

Albuquerque-El Paso via Las Vegas, Belen, Socorro and Rincon; 2. Denver-Albuquerque-Phoenix and 3. Albuquerque-Lubbock-Dallas service via Mountainair, Vaughn, Ft. Sumner and Clovis.

All these routes would allow connections with New Mexico as well as open up travel to many other points in the country; naturally the service would be very beneficial to residents, tourists and businesses alike.

AMTRAK has not set a specific priorities list so it seems those who push the most will get the service. AMTRAK has received additional equipment monies from Congress, which has ordered some new equipment, has equipment they could better utilize and seems to put on service

when it wants regardless to a certain extent of the cost involved if the service is feasible.

Ironically, AMTRAK's management often refuses to do studies unless the states involved in advance make a commitment that they want the train and will help fund it which is ridiculous when you are talking about a transcontinental train.

You can help in at least two ways. First, contact President Bush, senators Domenici and Bingaman and your congressman. Tell them you support the establishment of the Seattle-Florida via New Mexico route and the other services and to expand capital and operating funds for AMTRAK.

We suggest these funds come

from the more and wider highways and airports budgets but if they had to raise taxes slightly we wouldn't mind.

Second, contact your New Mexico legislators and Governor King. Your governor is very supportive of expanded AMTRAK service through New Mexico such as the Seattle-Florida route. Ask him and the legislators to do whatever they can to help establish the routes detailed above.

Thanks in advance for your help in making expanded rail passenger service to New Mexico and the nation a reality.

Readng and writing skills are essential to our lives. We can exist without reading and writing skills, but we cannot function effectively without them. Reading guides us in our work. It helps us enjoy our leisure time. It helps us manage our home lives. Reading helps us contribute to our communities, our nation and the world.

TO KNOW

About 4.5 million Canadians and 23 million people in the United States are functionally illiterate, according to surveys by Southam Inc. and the National Assessment of Educational Progress. This means that because they can't read well, about 28 million North Americans are unable to complete everyday tasks successfully. For International Literacy Day 1991 (Sunday, Sept. 8), newspapers across North America are publishing this special supplement to remind us of the power of reading and the powerlessness of not being able to read.

Reading is more than recognizing the alphabet and sounding out words. Reading involves using what we know about the world from our own experience to understand the meaning of written words. It also means using written symbols and words to complete our everyday tasks—filling out forms, writing checks or letters, following maps and bus schedules and reading simple manuals and medicine bottles.

Many of those who need help to improve their reading skills are not receiving it. Yet there are hundreds of programs ready to help them. For a list of resources turn to the back page.

If you volunteer to help, you will find that teaching someone to read is challenging, rewarding and even fun. And nonreaders have as much to teach us about survival and life skills as we have to teach them.

If you know people who have trouble reading, this special newspaper supplement can help. Work with nonreaders on the activities marked "To Do." Activities marked "To Do" are samples of the types of skills we need to function effectively in our society. Most of these activities have answers listed at the bottom of the page. Information marked "To Know" provides some background on the importance of reading. But don't stop there—be sure to contact literacy programs in your area; volunteer to help them in any way you can.

Some are written at the most basic reading level, while others contain a range of levels; all are suitable for new adult readers.

Writers' Voices, a second LVNYC series designed and edited for new readers contains selections from contemporary writers. "Kramer vs. Kramer" by Avery Corran, Bill Cosby's "Fatherhood" and the autobiographies of Carol Burnett, Kareem Abdul-Jabbar and Loretta Lynn are part of this 24-book series.

These paperbacks "fill a gap that exists in adult reading materials. Many texts are boring or childishy irrelevant. Adult new readers want to read the same authors and the same subjects as any other adult, as well as the writing of their peers," says the LVNYC.

Safety

What should you do if your child or a child you are caring for swallows some of a bathroom cleaner? To be sure, you will need to read the warnings and precautions found on the container.

The label on the container might carry the following instructions:

Corrosive—produces chemical burns. Do not get in eyes, on skin or on clothing. May be fatal or harmful if swallowed. Do not breathe vapor or fumes. Keep out of reach of children.

If swallowed, do not induce vomiting. Call a physician immediately. Drink large quantities of water or milk, followed by several tablespoons of milk of magnesia or egg whites. Never give anything by mouth to an unconscious person. **If in eyes**, flush with large amounts of water and get prompt medical attention. **If on skin**, wash thoroughly with soap and large quantities of water, then cover with moist baking soda.

This is strong stuff!

Do you have the telephone number for your physician—or for the nearest emergency room—near the phone?

Do you have milk of magnesia or baking soda at home? Where do you keep household cleaners? Is there any way a child can get to them?


The best precaution is to read these labels as soon as you bring the cleaners into your home. Even though the print might be small, the message is important!

Check out the Ruidoso Public Library.....

The Ruidoso Public Library is your one-stop information center in Ruidoso.

The Ruidoso Public Library, located on Junction Road and Sudderth Drive across the street from the First National Bank of Ruidoso, contains 35,000 different titles, but that's just a start.

Those books are displayed in a comfortable facility that was recently enlarged to 8,200 square feet. Stop in and relax in the bright, sunny reading room where you'll find the most current issues of seven different newspapers and 57 magazines.

Research materials are arranged for easy access, and if you're a Ruidoso history buff, read copies of

The Ruidoso News on microfilm. The Library has a microfilm reader and filmed copies of **The News**.

The checkout area is sandwiched between the adult section and the children's section. Check the bulletin board in that reception area to see what's going on in the area.

Besides the books, in English and Spanish with some printed in large type, the library stocks audio and videotape books for education and entertainment.

Having a meeting? The Library charges just a nominal fee for non-profit groups to use the community room and kitchen.

Can't find what you want in this library? Ask one of the librarians about an inter-library loan and

you'll extend your borrowing choices into the millions.

"Read for the power you need" was the theme for this summer's reading program that drew hundreds of Ruidoso youngsters into the Ruidoso Public Library.

Junior programs and preschool story hour are offered three times a year in eight-week sessions.

But if your child doesn't go to the library, the library might just come to your child through school enrichment programs and the annual "Battle of the Books" program.

Dial 257-2535 any time day or night, and you'll hear a story. They're changed every Tuesday.

Or, take in a movie from 3-5 p.m. Thursdays in the community

room at the library. The movies are free and the school bus will drop your child off. Refreshments are available for a small charge.

Friends of the Library supports the facility through fundraisers and special programs and the Library Board serves as an advisory group.

Friends meets at 4 p.m. the first Monday of each month and the board, appointed by the Ruidoso Village Council, meets at 12:15 p.m. the second Thursday.

Adults wanting to apply for a library card must show proof of mailing address within Lincoln County.

But, if you're not a full-time resident of this county, you can still pay \$10 for a non-resident card, good for one year.

Altrusa Literacy projects: Each one teach one

Altrusa Club of Ruidoso offers free, individual and confidential training for adults who can't read.

Altrusa, with the help of the Roswell Literacy Council, has trained tutors since 1978, using the Laubach Method using the theme: Each one teach one.

Liz Munro coordinates the program and has 15 trained tutors working in the Ruidoso area.


"Our biggest problem is getting students," said Munro.

The program has some success stories, and those new readers are out and about in the work world putting their newfound reading skills to work.

Four tutors are currently working with students. Some meet at tutor's homes and some at the library for the one-to-one private sessions.

Tutors and students work out a schedule that fits both of their lifestyles. Sessions are from an hour to an hour and a half. There is no charge to the students.

Altrusa has raised funds to pay



for training and materials, and the club is always promoting literacy through programs and special projects.

Besides the individual tutoring, Altrusa works closely with the schools to promote other literacy projects — including the Battle of the Books and an elementary school program that rewards good readers with the chance to go to the bookstore and pick out a book of their own.

Altrusa also provides "listeners" for school reading programs, and has made a commitment through the international and local clubs to support literacy programs at all levels.

Altrusa Club's literacy project is a member of the New Mexico Coalition for Literacy with contacts all over the state to keep in touch if a student moves.

When work is done and they have time to enjoy themselves, readers have a special way to relax. For many of us, books, magazines and newspapers can widen the world and provide insights not otherwise available.

TO KNOW

Reading helps us decide what we're going to do, to see, to enjoy. Newspapers tell about movies showing locally. Reading about sports teams and stars makes the actual games more enjoyable. By reading, parents can learn of activities for their children and entertainment and shows for themselves.

Many people like to "get away" in their free time. But traveling—across town or across the country—demands reading skills to read maps, road signs and schedules.

Reading helps many of us enjoy our time at home. A few minutes with the comics or a letter from a loved one brightens any day. A bedtime story can help a child get to sleep. By checking ads, shoppers learn which stores have the best prices. Reading helps people discover the best TV programs and lets them find out about their favorite celebrities.

New hobbies, new ideas, new challenges can be discovered and learned through reading. Books show how to build a cabinet or fix a clock. Magazines have information on new cars, refrigerators. Newspapers have recipes for Chinese food.

Reading lets people dream. Romantic novels. Fashion magazines. Newspaper travel guides. And, best of all, reading offers people choices.

Enthusiasm for reading can be contagious. Discussions of what's been read—a profile of a sports hero, the latest political scandal, the local department store's latest offerings or the ratings in a consumer magazine—are a bigger part of any reader's day than he or she may realize. Such realizations have led many readers in North America to volunteer in literacy efforts. Some become tutors, but there are many other opportunities to share the enthusiasm for and benefits of reading.

TO KNOW

In the past, reading at work was not as important as it is today. Many people never changed jobs all their lives. Often those jobs did not require reading skills.

Today, however, the ability to read is not optional for our work force. Technology and the world economy are changing quickly. This means that workers must be able to switch from performing one task to other tasks. The steel worker, for example, needs to have the reading skills necessary to train for a new job when the plant retools. The janitor needs to have the reading skills needed to fill out an application for employment, and to follow written instructions and to use cleaning materials properly.

Many North Americans do not have those skills. A survey by the Center for Public Resources found that about 11 percent of professional and managerial workers did not have the reading skills needed to perform their jobs effectively. In the same survey, about 80 percent of semiskilled and unskilled workers did not have the reading skills needed to do their jobs effectively.

And yet reading is necessary for almost all jobs. The Minnesota Governor's Task Force on Adult Literacy found that 70 percent of the reading material in a cross-section of jobs was between a 9th- and 12th-grade reading level. Fifteen percent of the reading material was even higher.

The economic and business costs of this problem are severe. Those who do not have basic reading skills may have difficulty finding and keeping jobs. Also, billions of dollars are lost when workers make costly mistakes because they cannot read. These workers also may injure themselves and others because they cannot read instructions and warnings. The biggest cost of illiteracy, however, may be the one that is hardest to measure. The loss of self-esteem members of a work force face when they are undereducated and undertrained.

Many employers have recognized the need for a fully literate work force and have established on-the-job literacy programs. While these programs vary, most are open to all employees at little or no cost to the employee and operate confidentially. Anyone who has difficulty reading on the job should be encouraged to seek out these programs.







Conclusion.....

There are many reasons why people cannot read.

Some people only attended school for a few years. Others had hearing problems or other problems that made school hard for them. Many are new to the area and haven't learned our language. Others have parents who could not read, so they did not get the reading help they needed at home.



Those of us who read should celebrate that skill and encourage those who cannot read to learn how to do so. People who need our help with reading skills deserve compassion and understanding. Adult nonreaders are mature people who have the same responsibilities that all of us have. Improving their literacy skills is a challenge for them; we should applaud those who try.




Improving literacy is not an "us" and "them" situation. We are all illiterate in one way or another. Many of us can understand and follow the directions for a cake mix, but find our VCR manual unfathomable. We may understand the elementary rules of running a business but not the rules of running a basic scientific experiment. We all, however, need to have the abilities to use reading and writing skills so that we can communicate with others.



Reading is essential in learning about and taking part in any community. Details about what a community offers and issues of importance to its members often are available only through reading.

TO KNOW

A conversation might alert us to a town's plan to widen a street in the neighborhood, but a newspaper article—or perhaps an official notice—will spell out the full plan and the project's schedule. Reading about the pluses and minuses of a wider street—fewer traffic jams vs. potential safety hazards—will help residents determine who will be affected by the project. And our questions to the town's decision makers often must be submitted in writing.

Reading also helps people join communities and become involved in their activities. Reading helps newcomers in town learn where to go and whom to call for help, for advice, for community services. Newspapers list clubs and support groups. Brochures tell about community agencies. Reading is needed to understand and complete the forms that are part of modern day life—from car registrations to dog licenses.

Reading helps parents provide for their children. Through reading, parents can learn when and where to register their youngsters for school and other activities. Reading medicine labels and warnings helps parents protect children from unnecessary harm or injury. And, best of all, reading enables parents to check their children's schoolwork and encourage them to continue learning.

Reading, including reading aloud, introduces children to values parents think are important. In fact, many adults seek help with their own reading because they want to read the Bible and other religious books. They want to learn more about their religion, and they know that reading is a good way to find out.

The lack of reading materials should be no problem in any North American community. A visit to the local library will provide access to books written on a wide variety of reading levels, magazines on a host of subjects and a variety of newspapers. Library staffs are eager to help people—especially new readers—find what they want or need, from local histories to bedtime stories.



Addressing Envelopes.....

You want to write a letter to the editor of this newspaper. Here is an envelope for your letter. Address your letter to: The Editor, followed by the name and address of your newspaper, which can be found in local directories or in the newspaper itself.

Here are some rules for addressing envelopes:

1. Type or write clearly.
2. If the letter is being sent to a person, always put that person's name on the first line.
3. Put the company's name on the second line. (In this case, the name of the newspaper goes on the second line.)
4. On the third line, put the street address or box number. If there is a room number, put it on this line.
5. Put the city, state or province and ZIP or postal code on the bottom line. The U.S. Postal Service prefers that you use ZIP + 4 codes and two-letter state abbreviations.
6. Don't forget your return address.
