## DUI School turns out to be sobering experience

I spent Saturday morning attending school with nine other people. We were all there by choice.

I was there because I wanted to write a story. The other nine were attending in order to mitigate their sentence in first offense DUI. It was a way to avoid a possible jail sentence of 90 days, \$500 fine and revocation of their driver's license for a year.

Were they any more guilty than me? No, in each of their stories I could see myself. "There but for the Grace of God..."

The nine students covered the age and social spectrum, from a college freshman driving an old van to a prosperous looking retired military man who drove a Cadillac.

Many had different views of why they were stopped and their degree of admitted guilt. Later we will explore these.

This first of three four-hour sessions, was conducted by Ed Riordan and his wife, Peggy. They operate Court Referral Educational Services, Inc. (CRES).

CRES is a contract school that conducts DUI classes in communities where it is not financially feasible or logistically possible to organize their own schools.

Riordan, and all DUI school instructors, are certified by the state.

Riordan paid a compliment to Ruidoso. He stated that in 20 years of teaching the school and dealing with more than 30 different communities, he has not dealt with a more professional police depart-

ment than Ruidoso's, nor has he had any more support and cooperation from a police chief than he has from Police Chief Richard Swenor.

Only first offenders are assigned to the school. The object of the school and the intention of the judges that assign them to the school, is to provide first time offenders with the education and facts that will help keep them from becoming second offenders.

That is a noble goal, one which may never be reached, but if the reaction of the students was anything like mine, they will not be guilty of DUI again.

Riordan begins the class by reviewing the hours of the class, 8 a.m. to noon, and giving the dates of subsequent classes, the next two Saturdays. He points out that attendance is taken and reported to the judge who assigned the offender to the class.

There were 17 people assigned

to the class, eight, for whatever reason, failed to show up for the class.

Riordan does a good job of relaxing the participants in an otherwise uncomfortable situation. He gave each participant an opportunity to tell the circumstance of their arrest, the reason they were stopped, and why they were drinking that particular day, and how much.

Jane (all names are changed), the college freshman said that she had received some good news that day and was celebrating. She had failed to dim her lights causing the officer to stop her.

"I was smashed," she said, "I deserved the arrest."

"Daryl" was drinking for opposite reasons than Jane. He was feeling sorry for himself because he was unable to find work and got "smashed." He admitted to compounding his problem since work will be harder to obtain without a driver's license.

"Edith" was drinking with friends after work, and was so happily drunk, when stopped for swerving over the center line, that she thought the arrest was funny. Her Blood Alcohol Test (BAT) showed .18 percent Blood Alcohol Content (BAC), nearly twice the legally drunk limit.

She said that the reality of the arrest did not hit her until she was locked in a jail cell.

"Chuck," the retired serviceman said that he had had perhaps two and a half doubles (6-8 oz) of bourbon, before being stopped for speeding 12 mph over the limit. He didn't think that he was speeding and ex-

plained his .17 BAC as the alcohol reacting with prescription drugs he was taking.

He indicated that he would challenge the officer's "probable cause" for stopping him.

"Bill," a middle age Native American had refused to take the BAT.

"I was already under arrest," he said "I didn't see any sense in giving them any more evidence on me."

By refusing to comply with the implied consent provisions of the state laws, he will administratively lose his driver's license for a year, unless he chooses to appeal and proves to a commission that the officer had no cause to stop him.

Not much chance of that. He was driving with no taillights.

The second hour of the class was presented by Ruidoso Police Officer Laura Standridge.

She relaxed the class by telling them that if any of them had been arrested by an officer Standridge and thought it was a man, they were not hallucinating, her husband is Steve Standridge, a State Policeman.

"We want you to make up your mind to do something about your drinking and driving," she said.

She went over the things that officers look for when patrolling for DUI, things such as failure to dim lights, driving too slowly, taking curves too wide, edging toward the center line and then jerking the wheel suddenly. Any of these things give an officer probable cause to stop you and administer a

field sobriety test.

Officer Standridge's presentation was professional and to the point, colored by anecdotes of experiences in DUI arrests, some humorous, some sad, but all pointing out the tragedy of DUI.

She related the time when an officer had to go to great lengths to prove to a man in a hospital bed that the previous evening he had killed three people with his automobile. He simply could not remember the accident.

The remainder of the morning was spent exploring the physical and psychological affects of alcohol consumption.

It was pointed out that it is impossible to tie intoxication to the number of drinks consumed, since each person has a different tolerance for alcohol, different body weight and different metabolism. The amount of food in the stomach is also a factor.

We were administered the Michigan Alcohol Screen Test (MAST) that is designed to indicate potential drinking problems.

I did not score well.

I had expected to see volumes of gory accident pictures and listen to monotonous hours of canned lectures on the dangers of DUI. I assumed that the participants in the class would be indifferent to a class that they were being forced to attend to reduce a sentence.

I was pleasantly surprised. The presentation was interesting, the facts relevant to the problems of DUI and the problems that each of us who drink, face when trying to reconcile our social and driving requirements.

All of the students were attentive and most participated in a lively manner.

DUI is pervasive in our society. Anyone who drinks and drives is subject to the humiliation of arrest and conviction.

In researching this and previous DUIs I have found zero tolerance in the law enforcement ranks for the offense.

Saturday's Albuquerque Journal carried a story of a Taos County Commissioner being arrested for DUI and spending the night in jail.

From scions of society down to near-do-wells, like newspaper reporters, we're all susceptible if we drink, because we all have to drive.

If we continue to drink and drive, chances are good that we will be arrested for DUI or kill or be killed.

## Hot rods & megabucks: the MRS saga

Grave economic issues have begun popping up lately in casual conversation since the October announcement about a storage facility for high-level nuclear waste in the Ruidoso resort area.

The waste from the nation's nuclear power plants carries with it what some informed experts have called "the most devastating of all forms of pollution." That waste would be hauled by rail to a "monitored retrievable storage" (MRS) installation hosted by the Mescalero-Apache Tribal Nation next door to the Lincoln National Forest vacation spots of Ruidoso and Cloudcroft.

The entire region is teeming with hard times presently. Nevertheless, local talk revolves around what added impact the MRS may have on the economy already hindered by a national recession.

Will the MRS improve the economy by bringing in lots of new jobs? Or will the negative aspects outweigh the positive ones? Who will really benefit?

Given what has happened in other places in similar situations, it is clear that:

—Tourism and real estate values may be

seriously jolted.

—The impact on other regional industries may be ruinous.

—The blow received by the taxpayer nationwide may seem unacceptable.

An eye-catching brochure put out by the State of Tennessee in 1985 concluded: "MRS is not needed, and it will cost the American public more than \$2 billion!" This brochure was part of a massive effort on the part of Tennessee to prevent the Department of Energy (DOE) from putting the MRS facility at the old Clinch River reactor site or anywhere else in the state.

Independent and state experts investigated in detail the impact an MRS would have on the state's economy, public health, and ecosystems.

Among the many surveys carried out on behalf of Tennessee's campaign to deport the DOE was one in which tourists' development was considered. The National Travel Data Center found that "the MRS is seen as a negative factor by a significant number of people in their decisions about where to vacation." Almost half of those people who were likely to travel in Tennessee said "they would alter their previously set vacation plans if they later learned that their vacation site was located near an MRS." More than half of these would change their plans "even if the MRS were 100 miles from their destination."

The MRS fallout in New Mexico may change more than a few vacationers' minds here as well.

A world traveler enchanted with the rustic nature of the Sacramento Mountains expressed her opinion about what the MRS might do to tourism in the region: "The mystique of Native Americans has a distinct tourism draw. Their deep connection to the Earth is going to be severed by placing a nuclear storage facility nearby."

The MRS will be interpreted as "The ultimate insult for a Native American whose spirituality is most closely centered with the Earth," that earth-based spirituality will become "null and void" in the tourist's mind just as soon as a nuclear facility is installed. "It's against Native American spirituality as well as Christian and Western theology," she remarked.

As for other international visitors — especially those from countries which belong to the Non-nuclear Club (New Zealand, Australia, Denmark, Australia, Austria, the Philippines, Greece) and who have been previously charmed by Native American culture as a tourism enticement — "they are not going to like the MRS."

# On the road again!

## County Commission reviews policies on maintenance

Led by Lincoln County Road Manager Bill Cupit, the County Commission is putting together a comprehensive road maintenance program.

The project has required research and legwork. Still more is needed before commissioners will know the exact condition of every public road in the county and before they will have an inventory of roads for which the county is responsible.

Commissioners met Wednesday with representatives of the U.S. Forest Service from the Cibola and the Lincoln national forests.

"We discussed what (forest) roads are heavily used by our citizenry," said Commission Chairman Stirling Spencer. "We need easements on those roads in the national forests so that we can apply for state money for their maintenance."

Four roads were mentioned in the Cibola southwest of Corona. They branch off from U.S. 54 and are listed as DO26, 29, 39, 40.

Twelve roads were pinpointed in the Lincoln forest: BO23, 27, 28, 30, 31; CO13, 46; DO05, 6; and EO02, 05, 07.

Commissioners hope to have a document ready by their meeting on December 17 that would establish the ground rules for a cooperative agreement on some forest roads, Spencer said.

"We'll probably use a June 1985 agreement as the framework with some minor changes," he said. "It will call for an annual review as to what roads will go into the cooperative agreement, with the county maintaining them."

"If a major capital expenditure was necessary, the forest service would put up the money and they might possible reimburse us for

maintenance."

Under the cooperative agreement, the Red Cloud Road near Corona is being considered as are six roads in the Lincoln forest: AO56, BO07, BO09, CO14, CO20 and CO33.

One of the items Cupit is trying to incorporate on a new county road map is a uniform numbering system.

"Some roads now have county number designations, but they may not be county roads," Spencer said. In other cases, a road has a forestry number and a county number.

The county road review committee currently is looking at dozens of roads at the request of the commission to determine their condition, amount of use and right-of-way ownership.

"We've made up a list of roads to be reviewed and we'd like the committee to tell us how long it will

take, three months, six months, a year," Spencer said. "Some of these roads haven't been used for years, they go to a windmill or run out to the middle of a pasture because of changes in ownership and changes in transportation patterns."

Specifically, commissioners want the review committee to take a look at roads with high maintenance costs that may not really be serving the public.

Those roads may be moved to the back of the maintenance list, or if the road truly has no public relevance, it could be closed with the county holding onto the right-of-way.

"We'd like to put more emphasis on upgrading our high usage roads," Spencer said.

The volunteer members of the road review committee have become invaluable to the county, Spencer said.

"We talked a bit about having some other people go out and look at the roads and pass their opinions to the committee, because there are so many roads to review," Spencer said. "But we have three individuals on the committee that are trained now and experts in the field, so we want them to do the work."

"We won't put out the final road map until the reviews are completed and we feel comfortable."

When the map is finished, the roads will be aligned into five districts, Spencer said.

But they won't match up with the five new commission districts that will be in effect after the November 1992 election.

"Geographically, that would not make sense and it would be inefficient for road maintenance," Spencer said. "And if we lined them up with commission districts, you'd

have commissioners fighting over road equipment and projects. We're too small a county to be fighting. We've got to work together."

Cupit has drawn the districts based on geographic areas and by need, he said. The map "is pretty well laid out now," Spencer said.

People shouldn't panic if their road is left off or shifted to low priority maintenance, Spencer said.

"We don't plan on vacating or closing roads right away," he said. "We don't want to lose the easement. We'll see how it goes for a year to be sure."

Cupit also is reviewing the status of cattle guards in the county, Spencer said.

"Guards cost so much whether you go through the state or others," he said. "They are costly to repair and we're looking at all options including possibly the county making its own cattle guards."

## Ruidoso meets the mountain

Sunny skies and snowy slopes greeted business owners, tour operators and members of the community on Wednesday when they met the mountain, Ski Apache.

About 20 people made the trip up the mountain on the S&S Charter bus so they will know more about the ski area. The event was sponsored by Ski Apache and the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

After arriving at the resort the group took a gondola ride to the Gazebo Snack Bar for a view of the entire area. The group could see the White Sands, the Valley of the Fires lava flow and below them skiers and snowboarders swishing down the slopes.

Pat Morrison, director of marketing and public relations for Ski Apache, gave the visitors a tour of the first aid station and told them about the services provided. She said the biggest reason people come to the station is because of altitude sickness.

The skiers usually rush from lower elevations to get to the slopes and don't adjust to the altitude. She said the best way to avoid this is to eat properly and to take time to get up the mountain.

All of the ski patrol members are emergency medical technicians.

Ski school is available for handicapped skiers on a donation basis. Morrison said the lessons are free, and lift tickets for handicapped people 21 years and older are half price. More than 1,500 people have gone through the school.

Ski Apache is excited about the new Elk Quad Chair which had its last chair installed on the day of the visit. Morrison said the quad, a four person chair, should be operational by the middle of the month after it has been tested. The capacity of the quad will be 2,500 skiers per hour.

Morrison said Ski Apache has the highest capacity for skiers of any of the slopes of New Mexico at

15,300 plus skiers per hour.

At a lunch provided by Ski Apache, the group met Roy Parker, manager of the resort, Riker Davis and Barb "Bob" Carter, traveling representatives. Davis said they are concentrating on promoting the ski area in their own backyard and

to people who can travel to the slopes in their cars.

The saddest thing is that people in New Mexico don't even know where Ruidoso and Ski Apache are, the representatives said. Carter said one thing that will draw people to Ski Apache is that snowboards will be allowed this year. She said they have not had any problem with the snowboarders. Lessons are also available for snowboard beginners.

Now as visitors come for the best early snow skiing for years, business people throughout town will be able to tell guests about the hottest winter spot in New Mexico, Ski Apache.



Meeting the mountain didn't include skiing down it, but those who participated in the Ski Apache event on Wednesday did get to ride the gondola to the top of the mountain and watch skiers and snowboarders enjoy the good conditions.

switch their plans and attitudes about the wholesome atmosphere of Camp Mary White, Sacramento Methodist Assembly, Wehnapay Boy Scout Camp and Camp of the Tall Pines among others ... when they discover that an MRS facility is just over the mountain. Affluent Texans and wealthy Mexican nationals may alter their ski destinations. Fans of Ruidoso Downs may stay at home.

Economic sanctions may plague neighbors of the MRS.

A plunge in real estate values is another economic factor to consider when a nuclear waste facility is being considered in a region, according to Hugh Kaufman, an assistant director of hazardous site development with the Environmental Protection Agency. The resort areas of Ruidoso and Cloudcroft have already suffered financial setbacks caused by the last recession and the deterioration of the domestic petroleum industry.

"Another kick at property values may just push the towns into a depression," said one Realtor. If such a decline was due to the siting of an MRS, the region might never recover economically, say some experts.

Kaufman admits that his counsel is not consistent with official policy but it reflects his experience of two decades in the field. He says the billions of dollars of liability and assorted costs aligned with a "pariah-type" installation such as the MRS far outweigh any financial benefits promoted by the nuclear industrial complex, like short-term hazard-filled jobs.

One couple's experience illustrates the influence the MRS has already had on real estate values in the area, even before Phase I was complete. They were looking for a retirement home in the Mayhill area and found the "perfect" location, or so they thought. While checking on certain aspects of the property such as water availability and road maintenance they bumped into someone who had just learned about the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council's intention to "study" the feasibility of the MRS on Indian land.

"We took the first plane home and we may never return — we'd never want to be supportive of something like that ... in spirit or in cash" was their response to the news that a nuclear storage facility might be in the cards.

Another couple who already owns their future retirement home in the Ruidoso area exemplify what may become a trend: they have already put their property on the market and will sell at almost any price. They are looking for another retirement paradise.

The owner of a large resort nearby expressed genuine concern when he promised

to have "a serious talk with the Governor and anyone else who can do anything about this dreadful situation." Like many others in the area, his initial reaction was consternation and outrage.

Although the impact is not so immediate on other regional industries, the MRS facility could affect ranching and farming as well as the oil and gas industry. Should an accident involving a radioactive spill occur en route the air, water, and soil could become so contaminated — given the lessons learned from Chernobyl — that prices for agricultural and livestock products could plummet or even vanish.

If a worst-case scenario event — such as a huge lightning strike at the MRS facility itself — were to occur, particularly during a storm with New Mexico's omnipresent wind, a bona fide holocaust could result.

If even a tiny percentage of the MRS stored waste were to get into New Mexico's most precious commodity — water — the concentrations, long half-lives, and lethal nature of the radionuclides could easily bump off the already weakened economy, not to mention more than a few living things.

It is sobering to recall that officials the world over have touted nuclear energy as the safe and economical way to go. Yet base complacency and false confidence caused the Chernobyl disaster.

Christopher Flavin of the Worldwatch Institute tells how Pennsylvania's Governor Thornburgh toured nuclear facilities in the USSR in 1979. He was told that "nuclear safety was a solved problem" and that it would soon be possible to safely operate a reactor in Red Square."

Only seven years later the most expensive, and perhaps the most serious, nuclear accident occurred at a plant with a record of excellent performance.

"The cost of Chernobyl could eventually climb to over \$10 million. Radiological monitoring and compensation of farms in Sweden rung up a bill of more than \$145 million. West German farmers were compensated for lost sales of \$240 million. Poland lost hard currency sales to the West which ran between \$35 and \$50 million. And other countries are still calculating their losses.

Given these mind boggling costs and given the fact that experts anticipate more accidents of this nature before the year 2000, a reasonable question is "Can the U.S. afford the MRS and its risky parent, the nuclear industry?"

In an early 1985 issue of *Forbes* business magazine, James Cook wrote an article titled "Nuclear Follies" in which he discussed the financial ruin of the U.S. nuclear power industry. It ranks, he said, "As the largest managerial disaster in business history, a disaster on a monumental scale ... It is a defeat for the U.S. consumer and for the competitiveness of U.S. indus-

try, for the utilities that undertook the program, and for the private enterprise system that made it possible. Without even recognizing the risks, the U.S. electric power industry undertook a commitment bigger than the space program or the Vietnam War."

Even while staggering under unprecedented cost overruns in constructing, operating, cleaning up spills and leaks, the nuclear industrial complex now faces the monetary and technological challenge of burying routine waste and quite soon, whole worn-out reactors. Exceedingly large amounts of tax dollars and waste fund money will have to be readily available for transporting and storing or disposing of huge mountains of radioactive waste.

Such amounts of money would not cover the liabilities of a nuclear accident. In fact, according to "A Study of Nuclear Insurance in America" by the Environmental Policy Institute in 1986, the insurance industry in this country refuses to cover such accidents because the risks are beyond any limits they consider reasonable.

Thus, major costs of accidents would have to be absorbed by the public that should answer the question of how safe and economical are nuclear power and the sequel matter of MRS overkill.

The high-level radioactive waste earmarked for the MRS remains, according to Cynthia Pollock of the Worldwatch Institute (1776 Massachusetts Avenue, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20036), "More radioactive than the original uranium ore for about 3 million years." It has to be kept out of the human environment and biosphere until it has decayed to harmless levels. That stretch of time is longer than recorded history, tens of thousands of years. In spite of the efforts of many of the 26 nations which now have a combined total of over 500 nuclear power plants, no permanent disposal site on Earth has been proved acceptable for holding these wastes. Although many nations now have "stipulation" laws on their books making nuclear power plants contingent on adequate disposal plans, Bob Johnstone in a 1985 *New Scientist* article compared Japan's lack of disposal facilities to "living in a house without a toilet." Pollock warns that the "lack of permanent repositories could severely limit opportunities for timely decommissioning — the task of dismantling and disposing of irradiated and neutron-bombarded nuclear plants to protect people and the biosphere from deadly radiation.

Others warn that taking the "MRS Detour" will push the permanent disposal search even further into the future, thus postponing decommissioning of embrittled irradiated plants even longer. Such a bypass may turn out to be a tragic policy as well as a foolish economic decision.

DOE's drawings of what the MRS would

look like, according to Don't Waste US, a nationwide organization dedicated to "fighting the new plague of nuclear waste pollution," include not only the large fuel-handling buildings, but also "hot cells." This is where fuel reprocessing — that dirty, messy old technology that the U.S. government banned back in the seventies — would likely take place.

By "extracting chemicals like plutonium — the deadliest substance on the face of this earth," the MRS would become not just a "graveyard for nuclear waste" but rather a "production center for new generations of waste." Reprocessing of fuel assemblies adds an entirely new dimension to the cost analysis. The added risks, pollution, and functions propel the expenditures upward.

To commercialize the breeder reactor — an option demanding a full-scale national debate — reprocessing is prerequisite. A sure way to bankrupt our nation, according to some researchers, is to build a whole new generation of breeder reactors — yet another cost dimension.

For almost four decades the nuclear industrial complex has avoided the issue of how to economically and safely dispose of "rad-trash."

Since the beginning of the nuclear age, almost every other aspect of the industry has taken its place in the budgets of both the government and the utilities. Managing the "back-end" of nuclear power production, however, is finally forcing its way into budgetary discussions in the Congress and at utility board meetings.

One of the reasons it has taken so long to become a priority, says Worldwatch Institute's Christopher Flavin, is that there has not ever been a consensus among scientists about how to dispose of the waste soundly. Such perverse circles soon become mired in administrative indecision and delays. They also reinforce in the public mind the suspicion that our technical capability may be inadequate for the task.

Austria's Foreign Minister, Peter Jankowitsch, put the issue eloquently in 1986: "For us the lessons from Chernobyl are clear. The Faustian bargain of nuclear energy has been lost. It is high time to leave the path pursued in the use of nuclear energy in the past, to develop new alternative and clean sources of energy supply and, during the transition period, devote all efforts to ensure maximum safety. This is the price to pay to enable life to continue on this planet."

The public has become more and more aware of the financial burdens of the risky business of nuclear power. Continuing government subsidies, enormous cost escalations, and higher utility bills contribute to the public's disillusionment. Consumers now pay about double for nuclear-generated electricity compared with that of gas-generated electricity.

The M.R.S. "saga" and its controversial

multiple bottom lines may help Congress decide whether nuclear plants are in the public interest now and in the future.

While the financial bottom line of the MRS was estimated in 1985 by the State of Tennessee to cost taxpayers between \$2 and \$3 billion, Rand Corporation analysts have predicted that newly developed, large-scale, technological engineering projects cost four times more than original estimates. If Rand projections hold, the lifecycle cost of the MRS may reach \$12 billion. This amount excludes social costs such as public health, ecosystems, local economic downturns, and demographic displacement costs.

After accounting for inflation, recent nuclear power plants in the U.S. have exceeded their original construction projections by 5 to 10 times, according to Worldwatch Institute. If these projections can be applied to MRS costs, then we may be looking at a potential \$30 billion boondoggle.

Scientists and the public alike are concerned that no amount of money can prevent natural catastrophes, terrorist attacks, rodent or insect intrusion, and years of weathering. Even the most expensive state of the art precautions money can buy might fail to keep lethal wastes isolated.

There is no doubt that costs associated with the MRS will rise. The Tennessee studies and other analyses show that costs will not go down and they will not remain stable. They will only rise.

At the Nuclear Regulatory Commission's request in 1978, the Battelle Pacific Northwest Laboratory estimated the costs of decommissioning a generic nuclear reactor. The industry soon discovered that Battelle's initial estimates were too low. So in 1984 Battelle updated its estimates concluding, among other things, that waste disposal costs rose faster than any other cost component.

Attempting to assess the true lifetime costs of the MRS decades into the future — like assessing the costs of other aspects of nuclear power as the Worldwatch Institute has done — involves guessing at many uncertainties: new technologies, increased costs, inflation, interest rates, evolving regulations, new labor cohorts, construction idiosyncrasies, document quirks, and unexpected events. Thus projecting the cost of the MRS program from start to finish is fraught with questions we can only speculate about.

In an environment of recession and economic deterioration, shortcuts which might endanger future generations will be tempting. Under such constraints, said one MRS opponent, "the pursuit of a mushrooming unpredictable money-eating MRS program that seems to divert us from the central goal of finding a safe permanent deep geological repository seems surreal at best, reckless at worst."

The seven-month-old blue heeler mix was brought to the Lincoln County Humane Society shelter about three months ago with her sister. They were the last of an unwanted litter. The owner had failed to spay his female heeler.

"She's shy, but there's not a mean bone in her body," said shelter manager Randy Basch. "She needs a loving home and encouragement. She just soaks in any attention and is very calm and eager to please."

"She gets along well with other dogs, but she would be better off in a home where she would get the lion's share of attention."

Although she may need some training to become housebroken, Lady is a neat dog. She has short hair, gray with black markings and weighs about 30 pounds.

She's sponsored by a caring benefactor for spaying, which is the major cost connected to adoption. All dogs and cats adopted from the shelter must be spayed or neutered to ensure they do not produce more unwanted litters that may end up being abandoned or destroyed.

As an added incentive for prospective owners during the month of December, Dr. Lynn Willard of the Ruidoso Animal Clinic will donate 25 percent of the total adoption fee

for any animal selected from the shelter.

He hopes the offer may prompt someone who wants to adopt, but has been waiting to make the move.

Adoptions slow down during the winter months, but the number of new animals being brought to the shelter continues at a steady pace.

The cattery offers felines of varied breeds and appearance including tiger striped, black and white, pure white, several gray mixtures, tortoise shell and calicos.

In the main shelter building waiting for new homes are shepherd mixes including a special male named Bert, along with a female greyhound named Misty, a hunting hound with attractive brown markings named Doc, a white terrier named Happy, a white spaniel named Fugi, several golden retrievers, a few black labradors, small black spaniel mixes and a variety of blue heeler mixes both short and long-haired, adults and puppies.

# New Mexico keeps an eye on new Texas lottery

Texas may not find their way to Easy Street via the new lottery set to begin next year, but that dream is expected to tempt the average Texas adult to the tune of \$125 a year.

The Texas State Comptroller's Office, which will supervise the lottery games approved by Texas voters, released those figures in an El Paso Times report. Comptroller John Sharp reportedly said advertising and promotional themes haven't been designed, but they will be tasteful.

"He's ruled out, for example advertising that encourages someone to get out of the food stamp lines by winning the lottery," comptroller

spokesman Steve Levine was quoted as saying.

Such advertising was seen in Illinois just a few years back with ghetto billboards that read: "How to get from Washington Boulevard to Easy Street."

El Paso, Texas, voters approved the lottery question on the ballot by an 81 percent vote, and state officials are expecting that kind of support to continue when lottery tickets go up for sale, probably by midsummer.

Advertising in El Paso, while it won't promise a yellow brick road to Easy Street, will be presented in both Spanish and English to be sure it reaches the multi-lingual residents of the city that is bor-

dered on two sides by states and countries where gambling is already established.

Texas state officials have predicted their \$30 billion annual budget will receive about \$600 a year from the new lottery. Bettors will receive about 45 percent of the money spent on lottery tickets, with most of the rest shared by the state and the retail lottery vendors. Texas expects to have from 15,000 to 20,000 vendors.

New Mexicans, already stunned by the early success of Texas race tracks, will be watching their neighbor with an eye to tapping into a lottery to boost revenues.

Opponents of the lottery for New Mexico have said the population is

too sparse to support itself and provide state revenues.

First up in the Texas lottery will be \$1 scratch-off tickets. Computerized lotto games, with big money prizes, are set to go on sale late next year.

Lottery is big business in Florida, California and Massachusetts, but lagging interest in California prompted that state to hire a new director.

Massachusetts is reaching out for customers, offering lottery bets that can be placed through any touchtone telephone.

Florida has the largest record payout, with one person winning \$55.1 million in 1988. Last year, a \$106.5 million Florida jackpot was

divided among six winners.

Meanwhile, in New Mexico, a state legislative committee meeting in Santa Fe last week was looking to state racing tracks as a source of new income.

The committee, responding to concerns expressed by lobbyists for the state's five racing tracks, didn't act on a proposal that would have imposed a one percent tax on the total handle each day.

The committee further talked of rescinding a tax break that has allowed New Mexico tracks to keep some of that money to use for capital improvements.

In the case of the Ruidoso Downs Race Track, that break has been invested in millions of dollars in remodeling and upgrading projects.

New Mexico lawmakers are also expected to take another look at video gaming during the January session.

That casino gambling issue just keeps coming back to haunt legislators who have ignored it, postponed it and even voted against it in years past.

But, as Indian nations, sovereign nations located inside New Mexico, have gone forward with video gaming and big money Bingo operations, the state is interested.

Roundhouse watchers say it's just around the corner — but they're not saying passing any new gambling measure will put the strapped state on Easy Street.

Owner Paula Gordon said the shop opened Nov. 23 and will be open 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. every day except Tuesdays through the Christmas season. To get Christmas gifts on time, Gordon said she will need approximately two weeks.

She said she may stay open late some nights for Christmas shoppers, so they can call her to see if she will be open.


"It was hard on them to play

"We also have invited persons from the community who have taught in a one-room school house," she said. Several still live in Lincoln County. Their stories should bring a personal touch to an already unique and unforgettable lesson in education.

# Help for students is just phone call away

Someone who will listen is just a telephone call away for students in the Ruidoso school system.

A new service called the National Youth I CARE Hotline is a toll-free number available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The non-profit intervention program based in San Antonio, Texas, was made available Thanksgiving week to the students in Carrizozo, Cloudcroft, Corona, Hondo, Tularosa and Ruidoso school districts, according to Kathy Echols at the Region IX Cooperative Center.

Students have been given carrying cards and stickers with the number to call, but since it is a subscription service, the number is not generally published, she said.

"Students may call to seek counseling for themselves or a friend, to ask questions of the trained staff, or to talk to someone about a concern," Echols said. "Students may remain anonymous, but are encouraged to make an appointment with their school counselor."

Each month a report will be sent to the schools with the type of calls. The names of students may only be given with the students' permission.

"The program will give us immediate feedback, which will be useful," Echols said. The information is valuable in directing services needed by school staff and students.

"This is an intervention and early prevention program that should help us determine where we need to place the emphasis in our education programs, whether there is more of a need for information on abuse, dating or something else," she said.

"The program is not designed for disciplinary action, but to identify personal and interpersonal crises and problems of students."

When the calls appear to be of an especially serious nature, the district may be contacted immediately instead of waiting for the monthly report, she said.

The hotline also provides an AT&T MP 20 memory printer for hearing impaired students who may need to call. They can communicate with any student who has a printer and telephone, she said.

The cost of the service is being covered by Drug Free Schools and Communities money and Region IX arranged the service for the district.

The hotline was started by Tony Overman in San Antonio, Echols said.

"We were contacted and told that some other school districts in New Mexico had subscribed," she said. "I contacted those districts and they said it was a valuable resource."


The open hearted true American pioneer spirit prevailed through the day, with hearty laughter and many cheers for the performers. We felt all like one happy family.

One form of modern luminario is made by filling a paper sack with sand with a candle placed inside. These make a mellow glowing light in the darkness of night.

We will go into some of the early Christmas customs a little later. Meanwhile let us thank God for the beginning of the Sacred Month, and all our other many blessings.

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# Downs is determined to demolish old building

Former Ruidoso Downs mayor Jake Harris is trying to halt the demolition of the old municipal building, but current Mayor Bonnie Addy said it is going down this week.

Harris sent a letter in November to Ted Guambana, state director of local government for the Department of Finance and Administration in Santa Fe, because he thought the building was still a financial asset to the community.

He said in his letter that he thought the taxpayers of Ruidoso Downs should not have to bear the loss that could be avoided. He said although it may not be used as a village hall, it would be ideal for a police department.

Guambana said the village board has full authority to do what it thinks is necessary. He said the board has decided that to demolish the building is the best thing to do in this situation.

The city has also taken as many valuable things as possible out of the building before demolition began, he said.

Mike Unthank, director of the state Construction Industries Division (CID), said outside sources such as fire marshals, health officials and other code enforcement agencies are called in to help make a judgment on the safety of the structure. They can help decide if the building is structurally sound and whether people should be allowed in it. The entity can then make the decision on whether the building should be torn down.

The CID was called in to examine the old municipal building after the city was told by the Environmental Improvement Division there was a sewage leak under the building.

Patrick Vandergriff, a general construction bureau inspector, inspected the building and sent a letter to the village stating the structure met requirements for condemnation.

The Department of Finance and Administration gave funds to Ruidoso Downs to move out of the old building to the present location.

Harris said he also is looking into making the building a state historical site because it is made out of natural materials.

Mayor Addy said the building is being torn down as an in-house project as the board had previously decided. She said the EID is adamant that they get the contaminated area cleaned up as soon as possible.

The sewage that leaked from the pipes is under a concrete slab in the building, so it needs to be removed before clean-up can begin, Addy said.

If the building were newer, Addy said, holes could have been drilled beside the building, and the dirt removed. Since the building is older she said it could cave in if that were done.

Although the village did not do tests for it, Addy said there was methane gas in the air as well.

Structurally it is a hazard, she said. The building was constructed in 1946, and was a bar for many years.

Because there were no building codes at the time rooms were added on without regard to building standards, Addy said. She said when it rained, water would run through the light fixtures, and they had to cover up radio equipment so it wouldn't get wet.

Addy said she doesn't think it is possible to get it named as a historical site because it was never of value.

"If it had been a public meeting place such as a library, I would have some empathy," she said.

The village board had planned to have someone else demolish the building.

### Horse racing industry is important to state

The State Legislature, in its quest to beef up state revenues, had better be careful not to kill what amounts to the goose that laid the golden egg.

Racing in New Mexico is just that — a strong industry that provides employment for more than 6,000 people. That industry, which has hung in there through ups and downs in the economy, doesn't need to be tapped for any more tax dollars.

A legislative committee meeting in Santa Fe last week delayed acting on a proposal to revoke tax breaks for New Mexico's five horse racing tracks. That proposal would be disastrous to an industry already facing new competition from Texas in the form of racetracks which are logging big handles and a brand new lottery. Those two threats are new and untested, so at this point the legislature should be providing incentives to help the racing industry, not taking tax breaks away.

State law now taxes tracks at \$650 a day when the track is in operation, plus 0.1875 percent on the first \$350,000 wagered and two percent on the money wagered over the \$350,000. The deduction that the committee proposed to eliminate is a two-tiered allowance for capital improvements and marketing. Tracks may deduct two percent of the first \$250,000 bet each day for building and track improvements and they may deduct two percent of the next \$100,000 for marketing. Doc Weiler, a lobbyist representing Ruidoso Downs Race Track, said the tracks appreciate the Legislature for providing that help, adding that the incentives are still needed. In the case of Ruidoso Downs Race Track, the capital improvements fund allowance is spent into the year 2000 because of the many improvements already made at this facility.

The legislative committee proposed revoking the present taxes and tax breaks and instead imposing a one percent tax on the amount of money bet every day. Ken Newton of Santa Fe Racing Inc. said the proposal would be disastrous for the industry. We agree.

The racing industry is still reeling from the new requirement placed on breeders and trainers last year when the Legislature revoked a gross receipts tax exemption for racing industry services — a feed, veterinary services and supplies. That was a hard blow, and placed a financial hardship on trainers and breeders. Texas still provides that exemption, giving trainers and breeders one more reason to be tempted to race there.

The Legislature should leave the current tax structure for the racing industry in place, and should renew its exemption on services to trainers and breeders.

When we talk about economic development, let's not forget to maintain the industries, such as horse racing, that already provide jobs and revenue to New Mexicans.

### Texas man organizes fight against N-waste

#### TO THE EDITOR:

We have now organized a group of people in Texas to create a strong support base for the people of Ruidoso to fight off the impending Mescalero MRS site.

Our efforts are being supported with technical information and logistical support by several national organizations. We are also seeking and obtaining support from congressional representatives, state and federal. All major media in Dallas and west have been sent very comprehensive information packets on the pending Mescalero nuclear dump.

All the experts we have talked to have strongly warned to not take this matter lightly. This site would be the most dangerous area in the world. The workers on the site would be exposed to massive doses of radiation resulting in fatal consequences. The casks which contain the material breakdown and develop high internal pressures. The maximum usable life of the casks is less than 25 years. The material will have to be removed and placed in new casks is extremely dangerous and produces additional radiation contaminated material which must be disposed of. Unless the casks have pressure monitoring devices, the cask can explode when opened releasing massive amounts of highly radioactive gases and fine particles. Based upon the number of casks and massive volume of material at the site serious accidents are inevitable.

Based upon publications from DOE as well as expert information the site would be as follows:

The casks are 8 to 10 feet in

diameter and 16 feet long. They hold 20 tons of highly radioactive decomposing fuel rods. Oxygen and hydrogen must not be present so the casks are filled with helium with the oxygen and hydrogen removed. Should any minute amount of moisture enter the casks the results would be catastrophic, rapid pressure buildup and cask materials breakdown.

Each cask is made of steel and weighs 100 tons. The casks steel is degraded by the extremely high radiation emitted by the fuel rods.

The site will have 2,000 casks stored on a large cement slab. At the opposite end of the slab will be a large array of hot cells. These cells will be used to recask fuel rods whose casks have broken down. Many experts believe the large number of hot cells designed into all these MRO sites are to facilitate probably permanent storage capability.

The casks field will be monitored by probably four radiation sensors. Hopefully, they will have adequate monitors to check what will be the largest casks field in the world. Numerous other very small fields have had inadequate monitoring to save money. These detectors only indicate a radiation leak. The radiation is already in the atmosphere and they do not show which casks is releasing the radioactive material.

The casks will have to be located, loaded on a transporter and taken into a hot cell to be repaired or recasks. During this entire time the casks is releasing radioactive material into the atmosphere.

The workers are in extreme

danger because of the large amounts of radiation their bodies will be absorbing. You can probably see why their are so few takers for these \$45,000-a-year jobs. Not only do they seriously damage themselves, but they carry some home for their innocent wives and children to be exposed to.

The radioactive material will continue to build up in the area until it reaches extremely dangerous levels.

Transportation accidents are also inevitable; again, due to the massive amounts of material. Radiation would occur on many of these accidents. A major accident would release huge amounts of radiation.

We know the site will contain 40,000 tons of decaying nuclear fuel rods. To demonstrate the magnitude of the danger we can use the following example:

The casks prove to be extremely well designed and prove to be 99.9 percent effective. The amount of

highly radioactive gas and particles released by this .1% failure is 80,000 lbs. Enough to lay to waste most of the southwest U.S.A.

This Mescalero Apache High Level Nuclear Surface Storage Site is so extremely dangerous to everyone in the southwest we must immediately organize all the people in the area to stop it now before it has a chance to move any further.

We better not take any chances with this one.

I have been told the WIPP site in Carlsbad is geologically unsound. It appears the salt dome in which the plutonium is to be stored lies directly above a high pressure brine water formation. Not exactly a good place to store plutonium with its 240,000 year half life.


