N-waste studies stalled

Without approval from Governor Bruce King, the Mescalero Apache Indian tribe won't be eligible for a final \$3 million grant to study storing nuclear waste.

David LeRoy, the U.S. nuclear waste negotiator, reportedly told congressman Joe Skeen that the Mescaleros cannot receive that grant without consensus from King's office and the New Mexico congressional delegation.

Skeen, who represents South Central New Mexico in the U.S. House of Representatives, said Friday that he opposes the Mescalero Tribal Council's plans to continue studying the possibility of building a monitored retrievable storage site in South Central New Mexico.

The Tribe has completed a first phase study using a \$100,000 grant from the Department of Energy, but apparently that's the end of it.

LeRoy has been quoted time after time saying that his office won't continue in the face of regional opposition. He backed that up by assuring Skeen the next grant won't be forthcoming without support from New Mexico's elected officials.

That support just isn't there. Governor King and New Mexico's two senators, Pete Domenici and Jeff Bingaman, already have announced their opposition to any study that leads to storing nuclear waste in New Mexico.

Also on record opposing any nuclear waste facility in the area are the Chaves and Lincoln county commissions and the Ruidoso Village Council.

"The Mescaleros have a long way to go before they can establish an MRS site on their lands," Skeen said.

Governor King, asked by the Village of Ruidoso to support its request for a \$100,000 grant to watch the Mescaleros' study, assured the village that he'll oppose this and any other move to store nuclear waste in his state. He said the Waste Isolation Pilot Project in Carlsbad is enough.

Domenici and Bingaman, too, have made strong statements opposing further study of placing nuclear waste in this area.

"My opposition applies to sites on tribal lands now held in trust as well as to lands purchased by the Tribe to be held in trust for this purpose," said Domenici last week. He, too, said New Mexico is doing its share.

LeRoy's latest assurances, added to the growing list of elected officials who are opposed.

"Not guilty!"

Drug bust suspects enter pleas in court

One by one Friday, the accused were led into the district courtroom in Carrizozo.

Their hands bound, dressed in orange jail garb, one by one they pleaded not guilty to an array of drug charges.

It was the most crowded court docket in a long time for Twelfth District Judge Richard A. Parsons. But he patiently explained to each defendant the charges against them and the possible jail sentence or fine.

Most of the 16 people arrested last week in a massive drug raid in Lincoln County showed up to enter

their pleas. A few submitted written pleas, all not guilty.

And word was relayed by attorney Noel Orquiz that a seven-teenth suspect was in Arizona, but willing to return to New Mexico and surrender to law enforcement officials.

"Debbie Rogers is in Arizona and has been in touch with our office," Orquiz said, referring the Gary C. Mitchell firm. "We can get her in. Our office will be representing her. She's a single parent with several children and she testified as a state's witness last year (in another drug case).


"We're asking for some time."

Parsons said Rogers should FAX to district court a waiver of arraignment, a document that contains her not guilty plea and tells the court she knows the charges against her and the possible sentence.

Parsons said he would have to leave the warrant for her arrest in effect until she turned herself into the sheriff's department.

Jay Goodman was the first defendant to stand before the judge. Represented by attorney Don Dutton, Goodman, if convicted, faces a possible base sentence of up to 12 years, Parsons explained.

Goodman, 40, is charged with conspiracy to traffic cocaine by distribution, a third degree felony with

a basic sentence of three years, and trafficking cocaine by distribution (attempt), a second degree felony, with a basic sentence of nine years.

Each sentence can be increased or decreased by one-third, depending on whether there are aggravating (negative) or mitigating (positive) circumstances. Parsons said the sentences can run concurrently or consecutively, at his discretion.

If a prior felony record exists, the sentence can be increased by up to eight years with three or more convictions.

Deputy District Attorney Scot Key said Goodman previously was arrested in Memphis, Tennessee, for possession of a controlled substance and conspiracy involving a substantial amount of marijuana. But he said he was unaware

whether a conviction was involved. Key said in the matter of bail, he would concede that Goodman had ties to the community.

Goodman, 40, has lived in Ruidoso 12 years and owns Goodman Construction Company, Dutton said. He also owns a home on Grindstone Canyon Road.

Chino sends for protest petitions

Representatives of Mescalero Apache Tribal President Wendell Chino were in town last Friday to pick up a stack of petitions against the possible storage of nuclear waste on tribal-owned land.

Dave Dale, organizer of the Save the Sacramentos environmental group, said Tribal Council Secretary Fred Peso and member Keith Miller showed up at his business about 4 p.m. Friday.

"Ruidoso deputy village manager Gary Jackson brought them down," Dale said. "They told me they would accept the petitions, but at that point, I only had the originals and I didn't want to let them go. I said I would contact them after I made copies. They gave me a telephone number to call."

"When I called, Chino answered. He said he had sent the men down for the petitions and he would again once I found a suitable time and place."

The petitions were collected primarily by students with Save the Earth, who protested along the

main street of town last week. Many contained personal messages to President Chino, calling on him to put a stop to studies on a monitored retrievable storage facility for high-level nuclear waste.

Rumors that Dale intended to delivered the petitions as part of a protest march at the Mescalero-run Inn of the Mountain Gods sparked threats of retribution from Chino. The tribal presidents told several business leaders, he would shut down Ski Apache for the rest of the season if such a demonstration occurred on reservation land.

Ruidoso's winter economy is heavily dependent on Ski Apache. But there was some question whether Chino would be violating the terms of his land lease with the U.S. Forest Service if he closed the ski area. The permit for the forestry land is based on allowing public access and running it for public benefit.

By press time, Dale hadn't arranged a new appointment with Mescalero officials to hand over the petitions.

"I've known his father for 40 years and probably represented him when he bought (a business)," Parsons told courtroom spectators as he deliberated about lowering bail and setting conditions of release.

"For years in Ruidoso, there were only two attorneys and so often I know the parents of defendants in my court. It does not sway me one way or the other."

Parsons allowed Goodman to get out of jail on unsecured bail of \$50,000, but restricted him to Lincoln and Otero counties and specified no contact with other defendants, particularly Tom Brunett.

Key explained that unsecured bail essentially acknowledges that if a defendant runs, he will owe the state that amount of money and his property can be confiscated.

Orquiz submitted written pleas of not guilty for his client Fred Gurule, 37, who is charged with distribution of marijuana and traf-

ficking cocaine by distribution.

He said not guilty pleas also had been mailed to the court for Todd Dentler, 21, for two counts of distribution of marijuana and one count of conspiracy to distribute marijuana.

Kurt Richardson, 25, who posted his \$5,000 bail on the drug charges was in jail Friday in connection with separate misdemeanor charges stemming from a dispute with his girlfriend, Orquiz said. Richardson pled not guilty to distribution of methamphetamines, trafficking cocaine by distribution and conspiracy to distribute marijuana.

David Moran, 20, who faces two counts of distribution of marijuana, was celebrating his birthday Friday.

After Moran entered a plea of not guilty, Parson's granted unsecured bail of \$5,000 and Moran went home with his parents.

After registering their pleas of not guilty, Marsha Chavez, 42, and her husband, Jeremy Chavez, 26, received permission to leave the county so that Chavez could be a

pall bearer at his stepfather's funeral.

Both are charged with two counts of distribution of marijuana and one of conspiracy to distribute marijuana. They asked to be represented by the public defender's office.


Tom Brunett, identified as the owner of a floor and tile firm with several outstanding contracts to fulfill, was allowed by Parsons to pay ten percent of his \$25,000 bail, if an investigation of his past history turned up no previous criminal convictions. He has lived in Ruidoso for the past one-and-a-half years.

Brunett, 35, is charged with two counts of trafficking cocaine by distribution and one count of conspiracy to traffic cocaine by distribution.

And so it went the rest of the morning, with Orquiz sitting in for public defender Cindy Turcotte, who had been delayed in Alamogordo. At least seven of the defendants claimed to be indigent and requested the aid of a public defender.

Applicants line up for RHS head football coaching job

Ruidoso High School has had 26 requests for applications for the position of head football coach and secondary teacher vacated by Mike Speck earlier this month.

LSD is back on the scene with sales spotted at RHS

The drug of the sixties and seventies, LSD, also known as acid, also known as window pane, is making a comeback in the nation, and worse, at Ruidoso High School.

The hallucinogenic drug has been disdained by even hardcore drug users in recent years because of its unpredictable effects long after it is taken.

Authorities think that it is coming back because it is easily manufactured, concealed and distributed. Also it is much cheaper than cocaine or marijuana.

This last factor unfortunately appeals to school age children.

Last week two persons, one a high school student, were arrested for selling LSD to high school students. Ruidoso Police videotaped some of these sales at the school.

Ruidoso High School principal Mike Kakuska said that he was unaware of LSD being sold although he did give Ruidoso Police the name of one of the alleged LSD dealers.

According to a teacher at the high school, drug sniffing dogs have been used in the school.

According to Paul Wersich,

member of the White Mountain Task Force (WMTF) that led the drug raid in Ruidoso last week, LSD is being manufactured in laboratories in Albuquerque.

In the lab a sheet of paper is perforated, in this case with multiples of small peace signs, and then dipped into the drug solution. The chemical fills the perforation voids and soaks into the paper.

When the sheet is dry it is cut into small "tabs" and sold. The dealers here travel to Albuquerque, pay \$2 a hit, or tab, and sell it for \$5.

"This is a business to these people, and to combat it we have to think like they do, from a business perspective," Wersich said, as he reflected about the economics of selling LSD at \$3 a "tab" profit, and factored in the cost of gasoline to Albuquerque and return.

Wersich spoke about an interview with a suspect he arrested recently on drug charges.

That suspect told Wersich that he used LSD a number of years ago and is still having recurring psychological problems.

partment of Energy from entering into an agreement that would lead to a temporary nuclear waste dump in this part of the state.


Mescalero tribal officials announced last October that they had applied for a \$100,000 grant to study an MRS. The grant was quickly awarded and the study started.

Roly and Poly are pets of the week

Two adorable chow-golden retriever mix puppies, victims of an owner who failed to spay his pet or to accept responsibility for her offspring, are waiting eagerly for new families.

Dubbed with the temporary names of Roly and Poly by Lincoln County Humane Society shelter workers, the brothers are outgoing and responsive to any affection.

"They're about three months old and have been here three weeks," said shelter manager Randy Basch. "They will need to be housebroken and they're a little hyperactive, typical for puppies."

The boys are sponsored for neutering by contributors to the shelter, who earmark their money to be spent to spay and neuter adoptable animals.

Neutering and spaying are the major costs connected to adoption. Being sponsored enhances the chances of finding a new home.

"These two would make great playmates," Basch said. "They're big enough that a child couldn't hurt them by accident and they're at an ideal age to turn them into wonderful family pets."

Roly and Poly each weigh about 25 pounds and probably will grow to about sixty pounds or slightly more. Their coats are reddish blonde.

VISIT THE SHELTER

"Sometimes I look at these magnificent animals and think if only I could get people to come out and look, they would all find homes," Basch said.

"But the truth is that some won't make it. They have wonderful personalities, are healthy and attractive, but as crowded as we are at the shelter, some will have to be destroyed through no fault of their own."

"The next time a friend puts off spaying or neutering his or her animal, claiming they're short on money or time — yet they're able to buy a carton of cigarettes, a six-pack or go out dancing — bring them down to the shelter."

"Let him or her see the result of their negligence."

Anyone thinking about buying a dog should check the shelter first. Basch always has a variety of breeds and ages in both sexes. Some obviously are mix breeds, others are pure bred and still others carry the dominant traits of a breed even though they may be the result of a cross.

Right now the shelter has a black Labrador named Sara, golden retrievers, a catahoula named Maggie, a flatcoated retriever named Amigo, several heeler mixes including Flecks, several beagle mixes with strikingly outlined eyes, a knockout long-haired Australian sheepad mix, a black chow, Doc the bird dog, Misty the greyhound,

Shanta and Maggie, who look like they stepped out of an "Our Gang" movie, a loving white and tan spaniel mix called Fugi, a rust and white husky and many new small to medium-sized dogs brought in over the last few weeks.

Pets can provide unquestioning devotion and companionship, as well as many hours of entertainment. They ask only for food, shelter and some kind words and strokes in return.

COLD WEATHER

Basch offered pet owners a few tips to keep their animals safe and healthy this winter.

"Just like it affects us, the cold temperatures and wind chill affect our animals, especially the short-hair varieties and those that are very young or very old," Basch said.

Keep your pets indoors as much as possible, they can suffer from a hypothermia (a dangerous lowering of the body temperature) like a human after extended exposure to the cold. Even dogs with thick coats of hair may be at risk.

Although the humane society recommends that all animals be kept indoors, especially during the winter, if an owner is not interested in a pet's companionship, Basch said the owner should provide more food for the animal.

A diet slightly higher in protein is recommended because the cold puts more stress on a dog. Stressed dogs experience a decrease in red blood cells and antibodies, which make them more susceptible to illness.

Owners should check the water dish to be sure it is not frozen and should provide a doghouse for protection, Basch said.

The floor of the dog house should be at least two inches off the ground, the walls should be insulated, the structure should be dry and draft free, should face away from the wind and should have dry bedding, Basch said cedar chips are good because they also control parasites and help retain the pet's skin oil.

Heavy carpet makes a good door flap. A dog house should be large enough for the dog to stand and turn around, but small enough to conserve body heat, about twelve inches longer than the dog and three inches higher.

Salt and chemicals used to clear ice and snow from roads can burn a dog's footpads and mouth. Basch recommended owners check their dogs after a walk to rid their pads of iceballs that may be trapped.

Warm vehicle engines also are a great lure to cats. "Bang on the hood before starting the motor," Basch advised. Cats can be caught in fan blades and belts with sometimes fatal results.

One of the biggest winter hazards is anti-freeze, which tastes sweet, but is a deadly poison. Within hours, the chemical forms crystals in the kidneys and will cause kidney shut-down, proving fatal within days. Safely store your antifreeze and other chemicals.

Pets allowed to run loose or who get away from their owners also are more likely to get lost during the winter because they lose the scent in the snow, Basch said.

He recommended keeping a closer eye on pets and making sure they have up-to-date tags with a current telephone number.

Winter air dries an animal's skin, making it itch. A small amount of vegetable oil added to their diet, about one teaspoon to every 30 pounds, once a day would help, he said.

People who rely on fenced yards to restrain their animals need to check for high snowdrifts that can provide unexpected escape routes.

If a litter has been born in the winter, Basch noted that young pups don't have the ability to shiver and it's imperative they stay warm.

"In no circumstances should puppies and a nursing mother be kept outdoors," he said.

Recently, two families volunteered to act as foster homes and keep the puppies inside for up to two weeks before returning them to the shelter. But more foster homes are needed.

"I had to destroy 38 animals in one afternoon and still I have two dogs in every inside pen and several that have to stay outside," Basch said.

EDCLC collects for ad donations

The Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County is settling up on its side of the deal to place an advertisement in the Oakland Tribune this fall by giving money to the village.

At its meeting Thursday night, EDCLC discussed the advertisement and its participation in the campaign. The advertisement was initiated by the village, who then approached the Board of Realtors, who continued the project with assistance from several other groups and individuals.

Ronnie Paulger, EDCLC president, said the village committed the seed money to get the ad started, but the corporation served as a collection agent for people who wanted to donate to the project. The group was also qualified to put the money up for matching grants through the state, while other organizations were not.

Including the \$200 donation from the corporation, they had collected \$1,450 to turn over to the village. Barbara Duff, director and mayor pro tem, said the village had received about \$300 from donations. Paulger said the total cost of the ad was \$3,150.

"It was a good project and the EDC benefited from the matching funds," he said.

Money left from the matching grants can now be used as seed money for any new advertising campaigns like this.

All the directors were pleased that the project received such good participation. They also discussed whether a letter on the results should be sent out to the individuals and groups that donated.

"I've known his father for 40 years and probably represented him when he bought (a business)," Parsons told courtroom spectators as he deliberated about lowering bail and setting conditions of release.

"For years in Ruidoso, there were only two attorneys and so often I know the parents of defendants in my court. It does not sway me one way or the other."

Parsons allowed Goodman to get out of jail on unsecured bail of \$50,000, but restricted him to Lincoln and Otero counties and specified no contact with other defendants, particularly Tom Brunett.

Key explained that unsecured bail essentially acknowledges that if a defendant runs, he will owe the state that amount of money and his property can be confiscated.

Orquiz submitted written pleas of not guilty for his client Fred Gurule, 37, who is charged with distribution of marijuana and traf-

ficking cocaine by distribution.

He said not guilty pleas also had been mailed to the court for Todd Dentler, 21, for two counts of distribution of marijuana and one count of conspiracy to distribute marijuana.

Kurt Richardson, 25, who posted his \$5,000 bail on the drug charges was in jail Friday in connection with separate misdemeanor charges stemming from a dispute with his girlfriend, Orquiz said. Richardson pled not guilty to distribution of methamphetamines, trafficking cocaine by distribution and conspiracy to distribute marijuana.

David Moran, 20, who faces two counts of distribution of marijuana, was celebrating his birthday Friday.

After Moran entered a plea of not guilty, Parson's granted unsecured bail of \$5,000 and Moran went home with his parents.

After registering their pleas of not guilty, Marsha Chavez, 42, and her husband, Jeremy Chavez, 26, received permission to leave the county so that Chavez could be a

pall bearer at his stepfather's funeral.

Both are charged with two counts of distribution of marijuana and one of conspiracy to distribute marijuana. They asked to be represented by the public defender's office.


Tom Brunett, identified as the owner of a floor and tile firm with several outstanding contracts to fulfill, was allowed by Parsons to pay ten percent of his \$25,000 bail, if an investigation of his past history turned up no previous criminal convictions. He has lived in Ruidoso for the past one-and-a-half years.

Brunett, 35, is charged with two counts of trafficking cocaine by distribution and one count of conspiracy to traffic cocaine by distribution.

And so it went the rest of the morning, with Orquiz sitting in for public defender Cindy Turcotte, who had been delayed in Alamogordo. At least seven of the defendants claimed to be indigent and requested the aid of a public defender.



LSD is back on the scene with sales spotted at RHS

The drug of the sixties and seventies, LSD, also known as acid, also known as window pane, is making a comeback in the nation, and worse, at Ruidoso High School.

The hallucinogenic drug has been disdained by even hardcore drug users in recent years because of its unpredictable effects long after it is taken.

Authorities think that it is coming back because it is easily manufactured, concealed and distributed. Also it is much cheaper than cocaine or marijuana.

This last factor unfortunately appeals to school age children.

Last week two persons, one a high school student, were arrested for selling LSD to high school students. Ruidoso Police videotaped some of these sales at the school.

Ruidoso High School principal Mike Kakuska said that he was unaware of LSD being sold although he did give Ruidoso Police the name of one of the alleged LSD dealers.

According to a teacher at the high school, drug sniffing dogs have been used in the school.

According to Paul Wersich,

member of the White Mountain Task Force (WMTF) that led the drug raid in Ruidoso last week, LSD is being manufactured in laboratories in Albuquerque.

In the lab a sheet of paper is perforated, in this case with multiples of small peace signs, and then dipped into the drug solution. The chemical fills the perforation voids and soaks into the paper.

When the sheet is dry it is cut into small "tabs" and sold. The dealers here travel to Albuquerque, pay \$2 a hit, or tab, and sell it for \$5.

"This is a business to these people, and to combat it we have to think like they do, from a business perspective," Wersich said, as he reflected about the economics of selling LSD at \$3 a "tab" profit, and factored in the cost of gasoline to Albuquerque and return.

Wersich spoke about an interview with a suspect he arrested recently on drug charges.



That suspect told Wersich that he used LSD a number of years ago and is still having recurring psychological problems.

ing placing nuclear waste in New Mexico, is good news to the many private groups and individuals who have voiced strong opposition to the plans.

At least three citizen groups have formed to try to stop the De-

partment of Energy from entering into an agreement that would lead to a temporary nuclear waste dump in this part of the state.

Mescalero tribal officials announced last October that they had applied for a \$100,000 grant to study an MRS. The grant was quickly awarded and the study started.

The Department of Energy (DOE), in inviting Indian Nations all over the United States to apply, has dangled the promise of billions of dollars in immediate and long-term benefits to the eventual host.

The DOE, anxious to find a spot for the growing amount of commercially generated nuclear waste, targeted Indian nations to avoid ne-

gotiating with states and communities, hoping to bypass some bureaucratic, and perhaps even environmental study, requirements.

Three sites off the reservations have been studied during phase one, but with LeRoy's latest assurance to Skeen, phase one will be the first and last chapter in the MRS saga.

Roly and Poly are pets of the week

Two adorable chow-golden retriever mix puppies, victims of an owner who failed to spay his pet or to accept responsibility for her offspring, are waiting eagerly for new families.

Dubbed with the temporary names of Roly and Poly by Lincoln County Humane Society shelter workers, the brothers are outgoing and responsive to any affection.

"They're about three months old and have been here three weeks," said shelter manager Randy Basch. "They will need to be housebroken and they're a little hyperactive, typical for puppies."

The boys are sponsored for neutering by contributors to the shelter, who earmark their money to be spent to spay and neuter adoptable animals.



ROLY

Neutering and spaying are the major costs connected to adoption. Being sponsored enhances the chances of finding a new home.

"These two would make great playmates," Basch said. "They're big enough that a child couldn't hurt them by accident and they're at an ideal age to turn them into wonderful family pets."

Roly and Poly each weigh about 25 pounds and probably will grow to about sixty pounds or slightly more. Their coats are reddish blonde.

VISIT THE SHELTER

"Sometimes I look at these magnificent animals and think if only I could get people to come out and look, they would all find homes," Basch said.

"But the truth is that some won't make it. They have wonderful personalities, are healthy and attractive, but as crowded as we are at the shelter, some will have to be destroyed through no fault of their own."

"The next time a friend puts off spaying or neutering his or her animal, claiming they're short on money or time — yet they're able to buy a carton of cigarettes, a six-pack or go out dancing — bring them down to the shelter."

"Let him or her see the result of their negligence."

Anyone thinking about buying a dog should check the shelter first. Basch always has a variety of breeds and ages in both sexes. Some obviously are mix breeds, others are pure bred and still others carry the dominant traits of a breed even though they may be the result of a cross.

Right now the shelter has a black Labrador named Sara, golden retrievers, a catabhoola named Maggie, a flatcoated retriever named Amigo, several heeler mixes including Flecks, several beagle mixes with strikingly outlined eyes, a knockout long-haired Australian sheepdog mix, a black chow, Doc the bird dog, Misty the greyhound,

Shanta and Maggie, who look like they stepped out of an "Our Gang" movie, a loving white and tan spaniel mix called Fugi, a rust and white husky and many new small to medium-sized dogs brought in over the last few weeks.

Pets can provide unquestioning devotion and companionship, as well as many hours of entertainment. They ask only for food, shelter and some kind words and strokes in return.

COLD WEATHER

Basch offered pet owners a few tips to keep their animals safe and healthy this winter.

"Just like it affects us, the cold temperatures and wind chill affect our animals, especially the short-hair varieties and those that are very young or very old," Basch said.

Keep your pets indoors as much as possible, they can suffer from hypothermia (a dangerous lowering of the body temperature) like a human after extended exposure to the cold. Even dogs with thick coats of hair may be at risk.

Although the humane society recommends that all animals be kept indoors, especially during the winter, if an owner is not interested in a pet's companionship, Basch said the owner should provide more food for the animal.

A diet slightly higher in protein is recommended because the cold puts more stress on a dog. Stressed dogs experience a decrease in red blood cells and antibodies, which make them more susceptible to illness.

Owners should check the water dish to be sure it is not frozen and should provide a doghouse for pro-

tection, Basch said.

The floor of the dog house should be at least two inches off the ground, the walls should be insulated, the structure should be dry and draft free, should face away from the wind and should have dry bedding. Basch said cedar chips are good because they also control parasites and help retain the pet's skin oil.

Heavy carpet makes a good door flap.

A dog house should be large enough for the dog to stand and turn around, but small enough to conserve body heat, about twelve inches longer than the dog and three inches higher.

Salt and chemicals used to clear ice and snow from roads can burn a dog's footpads and mouth. Basch recommended owners check their dogs after a walk to rid their pads of iceballs that may be trapped.

Warm vehicle engines also are a great lure to cats. "Bang on the hood before starting the motor," Basch advised. Cats can be caught in fan blades and belts with sometimes fatal results.

One of the biggest winter hazards is anti-freeze, which tastes sweet, but is a deadly poison. Within hours, the chemical forms crystals in the kidneys and will cause kidney shut-down, proving fatal within days. Safely store your antifreeze and other chemicals.

Pets allowed to run loose or who get away from their owners also are more likely to get lost during the winter because they lose the scent in the snow, Basch said.

He recommended keeping a closer eye on pets and making sure they have up-to-date tags with a current telephone number.



POLY

Winter air dries an animal's skin, making it itch. A small amount of vegetable oil added to their diet, about one teaspoon to every 30 pounds, once a day would help, he said.

People who rely on fenced yards to restrain their animals need to check for high snowdrifts that can provide unexpected escape routes.

If a litter has been born in the winter, Basch noted that young pups don't have the ability to shiver and it's imperative they stay warm.

"In no circumstances should puppies and a nursing mother be kept outdoors," he said.

Recently, two families volunteered to act as foster homes and keep the puppies inside for up to two weeks before returning them to the shelter. But more foster homes are needed.

"I had to destroy 38 animals in one afternoon and still I have two dogs in every inside pen and several that have to stay outside," Basch said.

EDCLC collects for ad donations

At its meeting Thursday night, EDCLC discussed the advertisement and its participation in the campaign. The advertisement was initiated by the village, who then approached the Board of Realtors, who continued the project with assistance from several other groups and individuals.

Ronnie Paulger, EDCLC president, said the village committed the seed money to get the ad started, but the corporation served as a collection agent for people who wanted to donate to the project. The group was also qualified to put the money up for matching grants through the state, while other organizations were not.

Including the \$200 donation from the corporation, they had collected \$1,450 to turn over to the village. Barbara Duff, director and mayor pro tem, said the village had received about \$300 from donations. Paulger said the total cost of the ad was \$3,150.

"It was a good project and the EDC benefited from the matching funds," he said.

EDCLC narrows director search down to five applicants

The search continues for a person to fill the position of administrator at the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County so the group can go forward with other plans.

President Ronnie Paulger said at the monthly meeting Thursday the search committee has come up with five finalists for the position. He said they had first verified if the applicants were still interested in the position and then they began checking references.

The check is about 80 percent complete, but Paulger said they hope to have it done by the first part of next week. The committee will then meet to discuss the references and begin interviewing

the candidates.

"We did have a lot of good applicants so it was hard to zero it down to five," Paulger said.

Currently Johanna Gallager is answering the phone and doing the necessary work in the office. With no one there to initiate things, though, the corporation has come to a screeching halt.

"We aren't going forward in our present situation," Paulger said.

"We are in our survival mode," commented director Scott Shafer.

Plans are still going ahead for a major fund raising effort for the group which should kick off in April. Paulger said the group had discussed the plan at the annual retreat this fall. It is tailored after the style used by the United Way

that asks for long-term commitments.

He said the businesses in the community were divided up into categories, such as lodging, restaurants and professional, then they listed all businesses in the area that were in that category. The next step will be to select a person to serve as the team captain. That person will then receive training and find other people for their team.

When the team goes out to speak to the businesses, they will have the name of the contact person and will give them a packet of information on the EDCLC. The team member should also be able to answer any questions the person has about the group.

By asking for a five-year commitment, the corporation can set up a long-term budget, Paulger said. It also provides continuity for the group, he said.

"This is our opportunity to keep this operation alive and take the pressure off municipalities who have supported us. We want to show others that this is a worthwhile project," Paulger said.

"We spend 75 percent of our time trying to find money and 25 percent on doing what we are supposed to," he said.

The group estimated it would need \$100,000 a year to keep going with current projects.

Corporation directors approved the November and December financial statements and discussed an

audit of the fiscal year. Paulger said the group could take a copy of the audit home to look at in depth before giving approval of it at the next meeting. He said it is very clean with no problems.

"I am pleased there are no deficiencies in the audit," he said.

Under accounts receivable though, they may receive additional funds from the county in delinquent taxes from the past year. Paulger said he has been in contact with Leon Eggleston of the county about it, and he will let Paulger know next week.

The nominating committee has received commitments from six individuals who are willing to serve on the board of directors if elected at the annual meeting in February.

Tom Forrester, Dick Mound, Tom Rigsby, Rick Evans, David Posley and Glen Crane all have agreed to be nominees to fill the two vacancies for ending terms.

Paulger said they may replace more directors than that because some have not been attending meetings of the group. Other nominations for the position will be taken at the annual meeting.

The annual meeting will be on February 20 at a time and place to be decided later, but invitations to shareholders will be sent out as soon as possible. Paulger said they will probably not have a special speaker for the event.

This meeting will be combined with the regular monthly meeting, which is scheduled for February 27.

Selective Services wants you

Young men who will turn 26 this year will be reaching an important milestone, according to the Selective Service System. Men who were born in 1966 and were required to register with Selective Service in 1984 will no longer be eligible for induction should a draft be reinstated. Selective Service officials warned that, with few exceptions, a man who fails to register before turning 26 will permanently forfeit his eligibility for certain programs such as federal student aid, job training, and most federal employment in addition to facing possible prosecution as a felon. Men ages 18 through 25, who have not yet registered, can avoid the risk of prosecution and loss of eligibility by registering promptly at any local post office. Failure to register is a felony punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000, up to five years in prison, or both.

Students received information on scholarships and degrees offered by the University and visited with professors and graduate students on the campus.

The next stop was at Paducah, Texas, where they toured the Paducah FFA Livestock Facility which was designed to house FFA

livestock projects and included beef, swine, and sheep projects. More than 80 head of excellent show barrows were kept at the facility.

The FFA adviser at Paducah explained the purpose for the projects and challenged the Ruidoso group to get involved with projects similar to theirs.

After the tour the group traveled east to Oklahoma City, where they toured the Cowboy Hall of Fame. A great deal of western art and history is included in the museum and it was very educational, according to the release.

After a stop in Wichita, Kansas, the group toured IBP (Iowa Beef Processors) in Emporia, Kansas. The plant processes about 4,500 head of cattle per day.

The students toured the slaughter, process and storage facilities in the plant. Agriculture is big industry and this first hand look at the intensity of the work opened the eyes of the members.

The many job opportunities in the meat industry vary from labor, to supervisory, to federal inspection and meat grading.

When the students arrived at the National Convention, President George Bush was about to begin his address to the 25,000 FFA mem-

bers attending. Several notable speakers attended the convention and addressed the members including Miss America and Jerry Clower.

The National Convention featured a variety of sessions during which FFA members received awards and were honored for outstanding achievements.

Entertainment was provided by the National FFA Band and National FFA Chorus.

The National FFA Career Show featured more than 400 business, university and organizational booths that promoted agricultural career opportunities. Students received brochures and literature to further their knowledge of the industry.

During the stay at Kansas City, the members also attended the American Royal Livestock Show and Rodeo. The show featured outstanding livestock from throughout the United States and provided an example for our members to watch the animal being groomed and prepared for the shows.

The trip provided an exceptional opportunity for Ruidoso FFA members to see the FFA Organization and the scope of the Agriculture Industry.

LCMC blood drive scheduled for February 19

Mark February 19 on your calendar in red. It is your chance to donate blood for the good of this hospital and others across the state and nation.

The Ladies Auxiliary at Lincoln County Medical Center is hosting a blood drive on that date for the United Blood Services out of El Paso.

The service will be at the annex at the hospital from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. to take the blood.

Noema Page, director of the blood drive, said they get a lot of people who donate on a regular basis, but they would like to get those who have never done it before.

Page said the service is in dire

need of donors because supplies got low in December and January because of the holidays. Another problem is that people who were in the military and went to the Persian Gulf can't donate blood for a year because they have gotten a parasite.

She said this could result in the loss of 1,200 pints of blood and causes problems for places near military bases.

Hospital administrator Valerie Miller said the blood shortage is a problem nationwide because of the time of year and the elimination of the military.

"That really cuts into the supply because the military is usually very good about giving blood," Miller

said.

She said there has not been a shortage of blood at the hospital here, but it has been felt in the bigger cities. Late in December blood supplies got so low at the Albuquerque office that plasma and platelets, a blood-clotting factor, had to be brought in from the United Blood Services center in Phoenix, Arizona.

People may donate blood if they are 18 years old or have parental permission. Page said anyone can donate as long as they are in good health and can spare the blood.

The El Paso service provides blood for seven hospitals in southern New Mexico and several in West Texas.

The Ruidoso Warrior wrestling team had three members place at its tournament on Saturday, including the first gold medal winner in three years.

Coach Gerald Ames said his team wrestled really well overall in this eight team tournament. Carlsbad won the invitational followed by Cobre, Gadsden, Silver City, Goddard, New Mexico Military Institute, Ruidoso and Roswell.

Placing for the Warriors were Gunner Johnson at 103 pounds and Scott Stricklin at 135 pounds who both received fourth place. Winning first place was Poncho Portillo at 160 pounds.

Portillo got off to a fast start in his first match by pinning his opponent from Cobre in just 15 seconds. After another good match Portillo was up against Westbrook of Carlsbad, but Portillo had beat him once before and proved on Saturday he could do it once again.

Ames said Portillo was just strong through the entire tournament. His first place finish was the first for the Warriors in three years for their own tourney.

Several other wrestlers seem to

At 130 pounds Victor Cocchiola placed fourth, and Sergio Guerrero placed fourth at 171 pounds.

The JV team will host a five team tournament on Saturday at the high school gym. The matches are scheduled to start at 9 a.m.

The varsity team will be preparing for district competition as the Warriors travel to Deming for a tournament on Saturday.






Beavers served in the Aleutian campaign during World War II as a member of the United States Army. He had moved to Ruidoso in 1927



Planners pressure developers to take responsibility in subdivisions

Proposed changes to Lincoln County subdivision regulations would put more responsibility on developers and give more discretion to the county.

Members of the county planning and zoning board said they were not ready Thursday to discuss the proposal. That will be postponed until the board meeting next month.

The county's zoning ordinance remains unfinished for the lack of zoning maps, years after its initial passage. The commission has maintained limited control over subdividers through a separate set of subdivision regulations.

Member Patsy Sanchez, who has been researching records to help the county commission deal with decades-old subdivision road problems, submitted her suggestions for review in the interim until the February meeting.

Her recommendations include:

—Do not "dedicate" roads until the final plat (layout) is accepted or road maintenance is begun. The county has many dedicated roads in

the records that don't exist in reality, she said.

—Specify that once the county has accepted responsibility for road maintenance, the type and timing will be at the discretion of the county road manager.

—Do not accept any paved roads since the county doesn't have the necessary equipment for maintenance, repair or replacement. Paved roads should be private, built with paving assessments, maintained and repaired with more paving assessments.

—Fees should be paid by the subdivider at the onset of the approval process instead of when the final plat is recorded. The moment an application is submitted, the county incurs expenses and employee time is required.

—Streets should be named only after a review of existing names in the county and with the acceptance of the road department to avoid duplication and long names.

—Streets should be numbered in line with the rural addressing system.

—Developers should pay for street signs designed to county

specifications to be placed at every street corner.

One of the board's first official actions Thursday was to elect Ben Hall as its new chairman and Ralph Romero as vice chairman.

The board approved three recommendations to be sent to the county commission. They are:

—That more stringent security be applied on turnouts from the new airport road to ensure public safety.

—That the commission ask the New Mexico Highway Department to enforce fence cutting and open gate regulations along public roads.

—That a stop sign be installed on High Mesa Road where it meets Fort Stanton Road. An existing yield sign is not obeyed by most motorists and the situation is dangerous, said member Audean Franklin.

The planning board also passed a resolution strongly opposing the proposed siting of a temporary nuclear waste storage facility, called a monitored retrievable storage (MRS) plant anywhere in or near Lincoln County.







Tactics of MRS opponents could backfire

I was therefore heartened to learn of the formation of the "Save the Sacramento Committee" and eagerly signed a petition voicing my opposition to any such plan.

Last week I came into possession of the form letter being circulated by the S.T.S.C. to Mr. Chino and was much chagrined to discover a complete lack of insight into effective negotiating tactics.

There are entire generations of Mescalero Apache who cannot remember a time when Mr. Chino wasn't president. Given the high degree of prosperity the tribe has enjoyed (regardless of

whether it is distributed equitably) during Mr. Chino's protracted tenure, it is reasonable to assume he is both a consummate politician and a savvy businessman.

He openly declared his intention to pursue the M.R.S. project immediately prior to the recent election, yet he remains tribal president by an overwhelming majority.

Although there is undoubtedly opposition to and quite possibly fear of reprisal from Mr. Chino among certain tribal factions, to make such statements as "your own people are ashamed" and "your own people turn stranger against you" not only hints at Anglo arrogance, but chooses to ignore evidence to the contrary.

The point being that Mr. Chino is a powerful

opponent and one unlikely to change position in response to name calling, snide sarcasm and empty threats, all of which were contained within that inflammatory form letter. Attempting to back this man into a corner through such tactics is not a very sound strategy and one likely to alienate otherwise supporters of the S.T.S.C. If the tenor of the letter is representative of any direct dialogue that might be held between the S.T.S.C. and Mr. Chino it is no surprise he has refused to meet with them.

When we fail to recognize the dignity and self esteem of another person, it is likely we're failing to recognize our own as well.




