County manager ousted

In a surprise move Thursday, the Lincoln County Commission announced that county manager Nick Pappas would be leaving the position he has occupied for the past three years.

After a closed executive session, Chairman Stirling Spencer made the motion to place Pappas on sixty days of administrative leave and then terminate his employment.

The motion was seconded by Commissioner Bill Elliott. It passed 2-1 with Commissioner Monroy Montes voting against the dismissal.

Pappas chalked it up to a "difference in philosophy."

"I've spent three years away from my family (in Roswell)," he said. "In some ways, I feel lighter."

About his future plans, Pappas said he will head back to Roswell "and see what's out there."

Pappas and road manager Bill Cupit are appointed employees of the commission and work without contracts. They serve at the pleasure of the commission and can be dismissed at any time.

Pappas said he planned to leave the Carrizozo office Thursday and head home.

Last year, Pappas was off the job for about two months after being hospitalized for a heart-related illness. Martha Guevara took over as acting manager and was appointed to that position again Thursday until a new manager is on board.

During his time as county manager, Pappas chalked up many accomplishments, including playing a major role in the formation of a regional coalition called the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

"I don't want Nick's termination to overshadow his accomplishments," Montes said. "He didn't leave a bad taste in anyone's mouth. It was a privilege to work with him. I think he just had a different style of doing things than the direction of the commission now."

Elliott said he voted to oust Pappas "because we have differences in how the duties of the manager's office should be carried out."

"I do not in any way question Nick's honor and integrity. And I enjoy him on a person-to-person level. We wish him the best of luck and have no ill-feeling."

Elliott said his personal dissatisfaction with Pappas had been on-going since he was elected a year ago.

Pappas was given two months administrative leave because in his appointed position, he did not ac-

Drug net draws in two men, 49 pounds of pot

Drugs with a street value in the six-digits were confiscated Friday when the White Mountain Task Force made two more arrests in its ongoing war on drugs.

Sheriff James McSwane, heading up the regional task force, said two Mexican citizens were arrested late Friday afternoon in the parking lot of the Winner's Circle on Sudderth Drive.

Members of the task force and Ruidoso Police officers arrested the brothers, Jose de Jesus Farias-Romero, 40, and Francisco Javier Farias-Romero, 39, who listed their home as Guadalajara, Mexico. The younger brother was charged with possession of a controlled substance, distribution of a controlled substance and intent to distribute a controlled substance.

The older of the two was charged with possession of a controlled substance and possession with intent to distribute.

Two vehicles were confiscated, a 1991 Dodge pickup; and a 1989 Ram Charger. McSwane said those

Two vehicles, added to those taken by the task force in a regional bust a couple of weeks ago, bring the total value of confiscated cars and pickups to more than \$60,000.

A search of the two vehicles turned up 49 bricks, about 1 half kilo or a little over a pound each, of marijuana.

The first 23 pressed and plastic-

wrapped bricks were discovered in a spare tire that had been cut open before the arrests were made.

The other 26 were found when McSwane took the other spare tire to Gateway Texaco and had it broken open. The inner tubes, with just a small amount of air, were attached and folded inside the tires, and the bricks of marijuana filled the rest.

"We're going to do a complete search of both vehicles," said McSwane.

"It feels good to bust this stuff, but it feels even better knowing it was going to be sold right here in this county," said McSwane.

"It's really a good bust; this bust affects the community," he added. "I've got four kids in school and I want this shut down," said McSwane.

He said the major operation the White Mountain Task Force led recently has led to more and more information — so much that the officers are swamped.

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BLM makes another pitch for land swap; county commissioners aren't impressed

Four items continue to separate the Bureau of Land Management and the Lincoln County Commission in reconciling their positions on the proposed federal acquisition of land along the Rio Bonito.

State bureau director Larry Woodard flew to Carrizozo Friday to meet with the commission in an effort to clear up any confusion and to spell out the bureau's procedures.

After two hours, the mood was better, but differences still remained.

Chairman Stirling Spencer said the issues separating the federal bureau and the commission are:

—Not enough specifics have been presented on plans for the land and how they would impact the county economically, culturally and in other ways.

—That the swap, because it would be for land outside the county, would further tip the balance away from private land ownership in Lincoln County.

—That no guarantees exist on the continued multiple use of the land.

—That no assurances have been given the agency would not introduce an endangered species or create a suitable habitat to attract such a species, with resulting adverse effects on adjacent property owners.

"Those four problems are the crux of why I can't turn the corner on this thing," Spencer said. Last December, the commission issued a letter of protest against the swap.

"And those four things are difficult to nail down for you," Woodard said. "I suspect if we get the land, it will be a mixed blessing for adjacent land owners. For some, it will protect the greenbelt behind their residences. Others may not want people walking up and down the old trails."

Woodard said he was shocked when first approached by the Lincoln Valley Land Company to find out it had obtained options on a fairly complete segment of the Rio Bonito and around the town of Lincoln.

"That's one of my favorite towns," he said. "And my assumption had been that the land all was held in small private ownership."

"My initial interest in this was,

of course, the riparian (water-related) areas the Rio Bonito would flow through and the possibility of keeping public ownership of a scenic backdrop on the drive to Lincoln. As I got further, there also appeared to be an advantage in maintaining the historic setting for Lincoln."

The original figure of 5,000 acres offered was dropped to 1,400 and now has been refined with surveys to 1,100 acres, Woodard said.

In contrast to the Rio Bonito land, the federally-owned acreage he hopes to swap is in the growth corridor around Las Cruces and a good area for the government to back away from, Woodard said.

He acknowledged a special interest in land with water.

Interestingly, the BLM is the largest land owner in New Mexico, but it has only 250 miles of live water," Woodard said.

"There may be only 253 miles in the whole state," Spencer replied amid laughter from the audience.

Woodard said parts of the 30,000 acres to be exchanged for the 1,100 acres in Lincoln County lie south of Alamogordo, around Carlsbad, Farmington and Las Lunas.

"There are people in those places willing to buy public land," he said.

LOCAL LAND MARKED

Spencer said the commission is not against the concept of swapping, especially when more land ends up in private hands than is acquired by the government. But why not pick land in Lincoln County, he asked, noting the county will be losing high quality private land.

About 35,000 acres of BLM land in Lincoln County has been marked for disposal, Woodard said.

Whether or not that land is used for an exchange depends on if there are buyers, he said.

But it would be difficult to change the conditions of the Rio Bonito exchange at this late date, he said.

"We have private people with money exposed and it would be hard to shuffle the deck for Lincoln County partners," Woodard said. "Archaeological studies have started and they have paid for appraisals."

Spencer and Commissioner Monroy Montes pushed Woodard for a timeframe involving a possible

swap of federal land in Lincoln County.

"The identified area would be good for 10 to 20 years," Woodard said. "A lot depends on someone coming forward and saying I want to acquire that land or swap."

County attorney J. Robert Beauvais suggested the bureau consider using the acreage to acquire 1,000 acres of riparian land in San Miguel County that has been identified for a possible exchange.

In the meantime, the county is vulnerable to other proposed exchanges, Spencer said. Next time, someone may want a quarter of the county.

"What kind of standing would we have in future considerations?" he asked. "I'd like the county to have a guarantee."

COMPENSATION

The federal government's annual payments to the county in lieu of taxes (PLIT) does not adequately compensate for the loss of taxes on improvements and livestock, Spencer said.

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CofC volunteers to coordinate scholarships

The relationship between the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce and the Ruidoso schools could become much stronger after the chamber agreed to help collect scholarship information.

At its meeting Wednesday night, the chamber heard an education committee report from Valerie Miller on a recent meeting with Superintendent Mike Gladden, high school and intermediate school principals and counselors. The main concern the whole group had was the students may not be motivated to fill out the forms to get scholarships.

The parents may be motivated, but they need to know the deadlines and what the student needs to do, Miller said. She said most scholarships focus on students with a high grade point average who receive a lot of awards, but the crying need is for the middle range of students.

The chamber decided it would

serve as a repository for all scholarships available in the county to assist the counselor in getting current information this year. After the chamber collects the information it will be given to the school to be made into a brochure. Miller said the school could then send it out to the parents of juniors so they know what scholarships are available in advance of the deadlines.

Miller said students should still go to the counselor to get application forms and other information, but those sponsoring scholarships should contact the chamber to be put on the list. Chamber director Jerry Watts said the staff could handle the work involved in requesting the information and compiling it to give to the school.

She said the school has a desk top publishing system that would work well to make the brochure.

The chamber will be looking at its own scholarship, which has not been awarded for the last two years. In the past they had awarded two \$1,000 scholarships to

students who met the criteria which included a four-month log on a community service project the student did. The last two years no students have even applied for the scholarship. It is also too late for anyone to apply for it this year.

Board members said they were willing to reconsider the requirements, but the student should still show some community service. Chamber president Paul Crown said the chamber first began the requirement because the first recipient of the award helped at the chamber.

A change will also be made in the account for the money. Now it is designated as scholarship money, but is just in the general funds. Member Joan Bailey suggested the committee meet with Jack Muhr, chamber staff member, to develop an accounting mechanism to keep it separate.

The scholarship will also be given at \$500 per semester instead of one check for \$1,000 so it doesn't deplete the fund as quickly. The

check will also be made out in joint to the student and the school.

In the meeting the group also discussed a program to award students who have 100 percent attendance and good grades at the high school. She said some area schools do this and give gift certificates to those students. At the high school level this would be about 25 students, but they hope it would grow, Miller said.

Until they can get more information on a possible program, the chamber will wait to make a decision on getting involved. The chamber will also not get involved in another issue the group discussed.

Miller said school officials were concerned about the number of students who work late into the night and then have a hard time in school the next day. She told them the chamber couldn't really get into this. Chamber member Don Dutton said the issue should be between the employer, the student and the

Fire protection tops commission agenda

Fire protection for pockets of uncovered areas around the villages of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs will be discussed by the Lincoln County Commission at its meeting Tuesday.

The meeting will begin at 9 a.m. in the county courthouse in Carizozo.

Officials with the Palo Verde-Glencoe district appear to have worked out an agreement to establish a substation at Agua Fria subdivision.

More than a dozen volunteers showed up at the first training session. The substation will provide a

quicker response time to fires in Agua Fria since the Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees has declined to cover the area, although it is only five miles away.

The commission will be asked to consider a joint powers agreement with the Ruidoso Fire Department to cover structures within a one mile radius of the village that are not now within a fire protection district.

Fire and rescue calls received from those areas would be prioritized like all others, with life-safety being the top priority.

In return for the coverage, the village would receive from the county a fire engine similar to one recently purchased for the Glencoe-Palo Verde department.

In other business, road manager Bill Cupit will discuss road projects for various county construction and repair programs.

The board will review recommendations from the county planning and zoning commission, including a request for a stop sign at the intersection of High Mesa Road and Fort Stanton Road in Alto.

Also on the agenda will be an

update on the timber bridge at White Oaks, a request for a road variance for Vera Cruz Ranches, appointments to the Lincoln County Fair Board and Lincoln Historic Preservation Board and a public hearing to discuss the acquisition of county solid waste equipment by the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

If the purchase of the equipment is extended over a 15-year period as proposed, the county will receive a total of \$138,913 for a 1971 bulldozer and 14 dumpsters with covers.

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parent. He said there is a child labor law that must be followed, but it can be waived by the parent.

In other business Crown gave a membership report on the accounts past due and new members. He said on the second billing of the more than 40 accounts that are 30 days past due, seven members paid, while two canceled. For the 38 accounts that are 60 days overdue, five have paid, four have canceled and nine have said they will pay. The chamber has not been able to contact some of the people on this list.

The seven that paid gave the chamber \$1,131. Crown said they

have lost some members, but they have also recruited new ones. In December, 14 new members joined.

Watts said several of these new members resulted from referrals the chamber was able to give to non-members during the busy holiday season.

And a great season it was, according to Joan Bailey, chairperson of the visitor promotion and services committee. She said everyone of these visitors was handled by some one on the chamber staff, so they all received a personal touch.

"These are big numbers for such a small staff," she said.

The total 1991 activity, including walk-ins, phone calls and mailings, was 52,786, which is just short of last year's total of 53,011.

In other business the chamber also heard a report from Dick Weber of the transportation committee on the progress of Resort Air which he hopes will be in the air by July 4. The not for profit organization is in the licensing phase and has had extensive meetings with the Federal Aviation Agency and city officials in Raton and Taos.

The proposed route for the airline includes stops at El Paso, Ruidoso, Albuquerque, Santa Fe, Taos, Raton and Denver.

"The licensing is going to be a tough cookie," Weber said.

He said they need to do a lot of paperwork including writing thank you and informational letters to supports of the project. They will

also have to generate manuals, he said.

Although he hopes they can do it for less, Weber said it could cost \$250,000 for the licensing. The group also has a proposed budget of \$9.5 million for all costs, such as equipment, operating expenses and insurance as well as the licensing.

Weber said the group is going to meet with the state transportation authority to request they issue revenue bonds. He said the board was formed in 1984 and has not issued any bonds yet, so it may be a good time to make the request.

The group also hopes to have a representative aircraft at the airport later this spring for people to inspect for themselves.

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and building and building," said the Sheriff.

McSwane said with the momentum gathering it's important to continue rounding up suspects and getting drugs off the streets —

and that takes money.

The force has been funded with a grant obtained by the Sheriff's Office, but McSwane is asking the Village of Ruidoso to obligate one officer full-time to the task force.

He said the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe has agreed to provide one full-time officer, as well.

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The commission can raise or lower taxes in response to the county's need, but it has no say about the PILT payments.

Without a definite management plan, "I don't feel comfortable yet that there will be multiple uses," Spencer said, referring to possible decreases in allowed grazing of livestock.

Woodard said his agency has money to start the detailed planning for the acreage if it is acquired, but it would take 18 months to two years before it could obtain the money to put the plan into operation.

"But we will eventually get it," he said. "I'm pretty confident of that."

At first Woodard said his agency is prohibited from condemning land, but later acknowledged that it can legally "take" land for easements to public property. However, the bureau's policy is to pay for any easements it needs, he said.

Once an endangered species is sited, adjoining property owners lose all their rights, Spencer said.

Woodard agreed that if one did appear, his agency would be obligated to protect it.

"But I know of none now but a

small cactus on the Fort Stanton Reservation, he said, referring to the hedgehog cactus.

Occasionally animals are moved by the agency from one area to another.

"But it wouldn't seem to me the best place to introduce it would be right next to a little town," Woodard said. "I think we would go to more isolated areas."

An explosion of the deer population and resulting damage to orchards would require action by the State Game Commission, Woodard said.

Sheriff James McSwane quizzed Woodard about a possible supplement from that agency for increased patrolling that would occur.

"We receive money from the federal forest service, but not the BLM," McSwane said. "If there is increased traffic, I'm responsible. At present I have no agreement with the BLM to patrol or if there will be a BLM agent in the county for enforcement."

"Now it can be from one hour until the next day before BLM representatives get here."

"The majority of people feel like we're totally responsible for the land," McSwane said. "The BLM's officers are not really recognized in the county."

Woodard said the agency has a

small enforcement staff in Roswell, but that McSwane's points will have to be addressed.

Commissioner Bill Elliott said people also are worried the property will be fenced off.

"We do fence and may well fence part of this," Woodard said. "But it is public land and in areas, the land will be used for fishing and possibly hunting. I can assure you we're not going to fence it and keep everybody out."

"We suspect we will need parking at a couple of places, but we're not that far yet."

Spencer said he keeps hearing the BLM say the swap is in the best interest of the public, yet most Lincoln County residents signing petitions were against the exchange.

Best interest does not relate to a vote by the people, Woodard explained.

"In my version, it means the values of scenery, maintaining the cultural framework for Lincoln, preserving the creek and wildlife, values that in our opinion are significant enough to say the land ought to be in public ownership."

Spencer said he also is worried because the BLM is not required to comply with a county historic preservation ordinance that covers land for five miles on either side of Lincoln.

"Once more, it's a loss of control for the county," Spencer said. "I'd like to be able to walk out the back door and throw a rock, not have to go to Washington first and ask if I can look at it."

Woodard pledged his agency's cooperation with the ordinance.

One area where Woodard did appear able to reassure the commission was about the intended use for 300 acre-feet of water rights that would be acquired with the land.

He said the agency wants to see the water kept in stream to flow to Lincoln, with some possible limited farming use.

"We have to be sure the water is put to beneficial use in this state or risk losing it," Woodard said. "We need to discuss with the state water engineer if the water rights could be used to pay off the Pecos River debt to Texas."

"I hear he is going to have to buy and retire water rights. This could save some Roswell ranchers."

He stated emphatically, the bureau would not transfer the water rights.

"The worst thing we could end up with would be a piece of land with a dry creek."

COMMITMENTS

Woodard credited the commis-

sion with pushing the bureau to make commitments.

"When we acquire land, we have some general idea, but then we go into developing a fairly detailed plan," Woodard said. "Because you guys have pushed us, we've made some preliminary commitments to you already of some general matters (about how) we are going to try to take care of this piece of land."

Those commitments will be rolled into the district's land use plan after some "tweaking," Woodard said.

It's the "tweaking" that concerns the commission, Spencer said. He was speaking for all three commissioners even though Elliott voted against the motion to oppose the exchange.

Elliott said Friday he had mixed emotions about the proposal now.

"I think the philosophy of the entire BLM is more difficult to deal with," he said.

TIMING

After agreeing to send the commission copies of other protest letters received by the bureau, Woodard attempted to clarify the timing of the rest of the process.

The Washington D.C. office of the BLM is reviewing protests to a proposed amendment to the exist-

ing West Roswell Management Framework Plan, he said. The protests either will be upheld and the swap dropped, or they will be dismissed and the amendment allowed.

The target date for that resolution is February 15.

The BLM then would prepare a draft of an environmental assessment and notice of realty action by March 15. Public comment would be accepted.

By June 15, comments received would be incorporated into the final environmental assessment and would be sent to the district manager for evaluation and to the state director for a final decision. (The decision may be appealed to the Interior Board of Land Appeals.)

If the protests are upheld at that point, the exchange would be dropped.

If they are dismissed, the final environmental assessment would be available to the public by June 18, with a target date of between August 15 and September 1 for the land exchange.

"Any way you cut it, you're looking at a process that will run through the summer and probably early fall," Woodard said. "And that's if everything goes according to schedule."

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cumulate sick leave or vacation time, Elliott said.

Spencer said the evaluation of Pappas has been a continuous process as it would be with any person in a managerial role.

"I feel we probably have taken a path down which he would not be as efficient in performing as manager," Spencer said. "It's not a matter of whether he agrees with the direction we're taking. We don't mind disagreement. But I'm like a racehorse and charge through, where he's more political."

"He's done us a great job. We may have shot ourselves in the foot, but maybe not."

Spencer said he will be looking for a new and very active manager who is used to maintaining a "tickle file" (which alerts for periodic checking) on all aspects of county government. He wants someone who will come to him with thorough research on a subject and many options, someone willing to explore every conceivable approach to a

problem, he said.

"As dynamic as government is today, the commission needs to be forward thinking and responsive."

He said the commission appreciates what Pappas has done for the county.

"He's a fine gentleman and I wouldn't want to do anything to damage his future," Spencer said. "I'm sure there's a place for him. We're probably a commission that wants more squeeze for the buck."

Montes said he'll be looking for someone "who has minimal political ties to Lincoln County, who has fresh ideas and a diplomatic personality. A manager has to know all the latest regulations, but public relations is a big factor."

The commission will advertise for a new manager in newspapers across the state with an application deadline of February 29.

"We think New Mexico can offer some good management material," Elliott said.

The salary range for the new manager would be between \$35,000-\$40,000, Elliott said. Pappas earned \$39,600 a year.

John Frye, El Paso, Texas; sisters Terri Irland, Aloha, Oregon, and Marla Romero of Ruidoso.


He is survived by a son, David J. Martin Jr. of Cape Coral, Florida.

We're entering the birthday month



The Birthday Month

This is being sent to you just before sundown on January 29, and the Mountain World has all day been enjoying a perfect winter day, with a bright sun in a blue sky and a temperature as high as fifty five.

Most of the cows have been back in the middle of the pasture during the winter, drinking the snow-melt water in the natural water holes and feeding on the grass that they have saved up for just such a snowy winter as this, on the sunny side of the mountain slopes.

Then just a few minutes ago a favorite young cow called Mule Jr., came in with her first calf, Little Tiny; and Tiny's special friend, Eppie, so named because she was born on Epiphany Sunday last January.

Little Tiny suffered a bad wound in one leg while she was just three weeks old, and had to be doctored for about a month. While she was recovering, Eppie, the oldest calf in the herd, began looking out for Little Tiny, following her everywhere to see that she came to no harm. Cow creatures have a way of looking after one another in many ways.

The sun has now gone down and Corina the black cat is in her west window pallet watching these three as they feed. It is always pleasant to see the first cow visitors to the Vale after a long stay in the mountains.

As I look at the western sky turning gold, I realize that the sun is setting a little later every day, and that January is about to bring us its last days; and that by the time this message reaches you we will be over into the favorite little month of February, the bridge between the winter and the spring, known as the birthday month.

Though small in size February is full of special days. First is Ground Hog's Day February 2. Then Ronald Reagan's birthday on the sixth; Abraham Lincoln's Birthday on the 12;

Saint Valentine's Day on the 14; and George Washington's Birthday on the 22.

January has gone by so fast that Ground Hog's day showed up before I could tell you something about it ahead of time. This will reach you the day after Ground Hog's Day.

Ground Hog's Day
It has long been an American tradition that on February 2 the Ground Hog, also known as the Woodchuck, comes out of his underground home to test the weather. Looking for the approach of Spring, after his long winter sleep.

If the day is sunny and clear, he will see his shadow and become frightened and dive back into his winter home. On the other hand if the day is cloudy he will stay above ground confident that Spring with fair weather is right around the corner. When Ground Hog's Day, therefore, is sunny we will have six more weeks of winter weather.

Gentle Rikkitikki takes "Pet of the Week" title

Personality plus, plus, plus is running around the Lincoln County Humane Society shelter in a low-slung package called Rikkitikki.

A brown dachshund with brindle strips, the five-month-old stray has been living at the shelter for the past three weeks.

Tikki is a talker too. He delights in being scratched and coaxes his admirers with murmurs when he'd like some more.

"He's very personable and people-oriented," said Randy Basch, shelter manager. "He's short haired and should be an inside dog. Dachshunds are a low-maintenance breed."

"And if Tikki is appealing, I have two other very similar dogs in size who also are eager for new homes."

Tikki will be sponsored for neutering, the major cost associated with adoption.

The society requires that all animals adopted from

its shelter be neutered or spayed to ensure they do not produce more unwanted litters that may be abandoned or end up being destroyed or dying from disease.

"I always hear excuses from people, even ones who claim to understand the need for pet population control and know we have to put down dogs and cats when we get overcrowded," Basch said. "They somehow think not having litters applies to everyone else."

One common phrase Basch hears goes something like, "But this is Candy and you know how special Candy is. Her pups will be great."

Another frequent refrain is, "Oh, but mating Pooch and Snoozer would produce such adorable puppies, it won't be any problem finding homes."

Basch said people who use those excuses should come down to the shelter after a session of euthanasia and open one of the black plastic bags. They can see plenty of cute, adorable puppies, all dead.

"The practical matter is that there aren't enough homes to go around," Basch said. For every human being born, 15 dogs and 45 cats are brought into the world.

"Many of my puppy drop offs come from people who say they were able to find homes for some of the pups, but these few were left," he said. "Then again, some just bring all of the puppies in because they're a bother. They say they love animals, but they don't mind letting us destroy them."

Each year 14-million animals are killed in shelters across the nation. The figure has dropped a few million over the last three years because of heightened awareness of the need for spaying and neutering, but the figure still is staggering.

Another erroneous statement Basch frequently hears is that it's good for a female to have one litter. That's wrong, dead wrong, he said.

"That's an old wife's tale," Basch said. "It doesn't benefit the animal in any way. There's not an animal professional who will agree with that statement or

that spaying and neutering will make a dog lazy. The dog may become calmer and more affectionate."

MISS PRISS

In the cattery next to the canine building, a feminine-looking cat with flirtatious wide eyes would like to find a life companion.

She's a young gray and white female with a medium-length coat. Her eyes are emphasized by a white edging and she has an inviting meow.

Like many women, Miss Priss can be a bit standoffish on first meeting, perhaps a carryover from her life on the road. But with attention and petting, she will be a loving friend.

Miss Priss has been a shelter resident for quite a while. She is sponsored for spaying, which will reduce her cost of adoption.

Other felines available for adoption include several tiger striped from just past the kitten stage to full-fledged adults, a calico; several black cats and many other color combinations.

Still looking for a home is Hardy, half of the Laurel and Hardy sister duet previously featured as pets of the week.

Hardy was the more protective of the sisters, always watching out for Laurel. But she's a bit shyer. Someone who could give her a warm home inside would quickly win her loyalty.

Other dogs up for adoption include Fred the Bassett hound and his long-time companion Wanda, a large, medium-coat mix. They were released by their owners through no fault of their own. They're very calm dogs and not ruffled by the noise and commotion in the shelter.

Two white shepherds are new residents and a blue heeler with crystal blue eyes is another good-looking new addition.

Several former pets of the week also still are there, including the lovely white Shanta with the freckled muzzle, the white with brown spots bird dog named Doc, the very lonely but regal greyhound called Misty, a bouncy white spaniel named Fugi, a flat-coated black retriever called Amigo, a black and white catahoula dubbed Maggie and Flecks, a blue heeler mix who survived a confrontation with a car.





Warriors defeat Tulie second time this season

The Ruidoso Warriors boys basketball team will be playing hard for its first win in district competition when Cobre comes to town on Friday night.

Coach Norm Wright said the Warriors have a good chance of winning, but it will be a good challenge. Cobre lost in a close one against Socorro, while the Warriors had a major loss against the team, he said. The Warriors have an 0-3 district record.

The Warriors hope to have a lot of supporting fans on hand for the game, as no admission will be charged. The Booster Club will also be giving hot dogs to the first 400 people.

A victory against Cobre would also give the Warriors the confidence they will need to beat Silver City on Saturday. Wright said Silver is one of the top teams in the district and is also ranked in the state.

The Warriors did get their second victory this season over rival Tularosa on Tuesday. The boys had beat Tulie on the home court in January 64-52, and were hoping for a sweep of the Wildcats.

Wright said the team started off good and had a 24-15 lead at the end of the first quarter, but Tularosa cut the lead to only three points by half time, 32-29. The Warriors turned on the jets in the final quarters to win 64-57.

Crucial free throws in the final few minutes of the game helped the Warriors maintain the lead and get the win, Wright said. Robert Sayner and Jaime Ordorica both made four out of four to lead the Warriors.

Sayner scored 19 points to lead the Warriors in the game, while Eric Evans had 15 points. Ordorica made 10 points. The whole team did well in getting the ball off the boards with a total of 39, but Evans lead with 16 rebounds. Wally Murillo had 12 rebounds.

The team shot well and completed 58 percent of the two-point shots. Wright said that is excellent and they also did well in three-point shooting with 38 percent. He said that was probably the best shooting they have had all year.

Saturday night was tougher for the Warriors as they traveled to

Deming to play the team ranked sixth in the state. Wright said the game plan was to slow things down and control the tempo and the ball, so Deming wouldn't have as many opportunities to shoot.

The Warriors did an excellent job of carrying this plan out in the first half. The team played well and was patient in taking shots that went in. The score was tied 10-10 at the end of the first quarter, and it was 22-22 at half time.

The second half turned out to be an entirely different ball game, Wright said. Deming turned up the pressure and shot extremely well, while the Warriors couldn't hit anything. In the third quarter the Warriors were outscored nine to 21, and in the fourth, five to 37. The final was 35-79.

"The game went from a tie to a blow-out. We got out-rebounded and out-played in the second half. It was really a disappointment for us. We played a great first half, but we just let them get away from us in the second half," Wright said.

None of the Warriors got into double figures in scoring, and the rebounds were low, too. Ordorica


and Sayner both had eight points and Evans had seven. He also had eight rebounds for the team.

Those hunters interested in participating on these depredation hunts need to apply by February 6. This is also the deadline to apply for permits for the spring turnkey hunt in the Valle Vidal unit of the Carson National Forest.

Application forms and information sheets on these hunts may be picked up from any license vendor. A separate form must be used for each species. Completed forms must be mailed to the Game Department office in Santa Fe. Applications must be postmarked by February 6 and will be accepted for up to 5 days after the deadline.

Ruidoso is really home to Joan Dale Hubbard

Even with four houses, there's no place like home

Like the vibrant colors on the canvases assembled for the Hubbard Art Award for Excellence, Joan Dale Hubbard brings a splash of flash to the Sacramento Mountains.

Whether sitting in her sprawling mountain showcase home or greeting friends at Ruidoso Downs Race Track, Mrs. Hubbard stands out from the sheer force of her energy and enthusiasm.

Her fast-paced delivery mirrors her rapid-fire life with Randall Dee Hubbard, multi-millionaire race track owner and glass manufacturer.

The twosome has barreled through life together for 20 years, tackling project after project and hurdling obstacles that would have tripped the less hardy.

The Hubbards enjoyed vacationing in the Ruidoso area before they decided to buy the quarter horse and thoroughbred race track here with partner, multimillionaire Dr. Edward Allred of Long Beach, California. But since that August 1988, \$2.6-million purchase, the Hubbards have made their mark on the landscape, business and social scene.

Besides creating the \$250,000 art award based in Ruidoso, they are building The Museum of the Horse in Ruidoso Downs and are attempting to construct a hotel in connection with Ruidoso's soon-to-be-built civic events center and a new 18-hole municipal golf course. And they have built a sleek and chic home with a knock-out view of Sierra Blanca in the White Mountain area.

Sounds like they have made a long-term commitment to the area.

But with the release of information that construction of the hotel could be delayed by years, that the art show will skip a year while the Hubbards search for a new building to house it and that the racetrack lost more than \$1-million, rumors circulated within the community.

One of the most persistent has been that the Hubbard home — one of four — was for sale. The couple also maintains houses in Fort Worth, Palm Desert and an apartment at Hollywood Park race track.

"Well, it's not for sale," Mrs. Hubbard stated emphatically during a recent interview in their three-bedroom home. "I didn't build this thing to sell it. Who in the hell would buy it?"

Settling into an oversized off-white couch next to one of a series of picture windows looking out onto the balcony, Mrs. Hubbard pointed out that the house was designed for their special requirements, nonstop entertaining and droves of guests.

Dressed in fitted slacks, high boots, blouse and vest sweater, she is as immaculately groomed as one of the couple's thoroughbreds.

But while Mrs. Hubbard has brought culture to her husband's lifestyle, her easy-going manner, hearty laugh and unflinching personal observations put guests at ease.

"We got into the house in May of 1990 before the art show and then finished it last summer, but we're really still working on it," she said. "We should have given it more time. We've had to go back and redo some things with all the rain."

Before settling on the house site during a 1988 Christmas conversation with contractor Bill McCarty over a napkin sketch at Cree Meadows, Hubbard had walked all over the White Mountain area with Mrs. Hubbard looking for a suitable lot.

The concrete and steel went in the ground in July 1989.

"I knew what I wanted here so it was an easier job for the architect," Mrs. Hubbard said.

"We wanted to have Baldy (Sierra Blanca) as our centerpiece and angled the house around it in a fan shape. It makes for some interesting cubby holes."

"We wanted good entertaining areas, a flow through the house to the patio. The garage is set up so the entire catering can be done there."

An apartment below the garage is set up for year-around caretakers.

The opulence of the Hubbard's lifestyle today is in sharp contrast to their relatively modest upbringing.

Neither of the Hubbards was born into wealth. Hubbard, whose worth is estimated at \$107.8-million, was the youngest of eight children and for a time, was a teacher and high school coach. His family operated an ice house in

Smith Center, Kansas.

Mrs. Hubbard was born in Oklahoma, but moved with her family to western Kansas to live near her grandfather because jobs were scarce.

When her father returned to the U.S. Navy to serve in Korea, the family lived in California.

Her father led the way into teaching.

"He'd always wanted to teach, but the war had interrupted his education," she said. "After his second time in the Navy, he became a teacher, earned a master's degree and stopped just short of earning his doctorate."

Her mother also tried teaching but didn't like it.

"She went into banking and retired in 1982," Mrs. Hubbard said. Still active and interested in people, her mother now works at a funeral home as a greeter.

From the time she was in third grade, she wanted to be a teacher, Mrs. Hubbard said. "I had a teacher in third grade who I absolutely adored and wanted to be just like her."

She taught about four years. "But I couldn't be married to a man like Mr. Hubbard and teach," she said. His interests and the demands on his time and those around him are so overwhelming, they leave space for little else.

"I was going to substitute teach, but to me it wasn't the type of teaching I enjoyed. I was at the point of trying to decide what to do and he decided for me," she said.

She met Hubbard while teaching in Wichita, Kansas. By that time, he already had transformed himself from a \$90 a week glass salesman for Safelite into its president. During the period of 1968-78, the company's sales grew from \$7-million to \$100-million.

By 1978, Hubbard resigned from Safelite, took control of two companies with histories of losing money and merged them into a new entity called AFG Industries.

The company is one of the largest industrial glass manufacturers in North America with a growth rate more than three times the industry average.

Headquartered in Fort Worth, the company was taken private in a leveraged buyout in 1988. In its last year as a public company, it reported \$650-million in revenues.

The Hubbards have been married 20 years.

"It's flown by," Mrs. Hubbard said. "It seems like yesterday. I remember my grandparents saying that same thing. Now I understand."

It was during their time working with Hubbard's first company in

West Virginia that the couple decided to head for warmer climates.

"We went through the coldest winter that they had experienced for 100 years," she said. "We looked at each other and said what in heaven's name are we doing here."

Being part of taking a company that was losing money, turning it around and developing a market was exciting, Mrs. Hubbard said.

"There's a hard core of people who have been with us from the beginning. We had a chance to create something. We look at it with great pride."

Even through the current recession, the business has been holding even, she said.

Once the company went private, all of the time-consuming and cumbersome special reports and stockholder meetings were eliminated. The couple thought they would have much more free time.

They turned their attention to horse racing.

"Dee had been in racing in the early 1960s and had sold out around 1965," Mrs. Hubbard said. "Then in 1974, I bought a horse by accident."

Caught with an unintentional winning bid on a horse, the Hubbards sold a quarter interest to neighbors and put it into training under Don Farris.

"She was good enough to keep us hanging on," Mrs. Hubbard said.

"The next year we bought five more horses, including Donna Dodad, which won the Sun Country Futurity (in El Paso). We were really smitten."

"By virtue of having those horses, we had to breed, so we needed a farm."

"Instead of by design, we just sort of fell into things."

When they moved to Fort Worth, they vacationed in Ruidoso and were distressed to see the racetrack in "dire circumstances," she said.

"Somebody needed to do something and we thought maybe it was us."

Hubbard purchased the track and sold an interest to Allred, who owns more than 30 family planning clinics in southern California and is a supporter of the quarter horse industry.

Every once in a while, the scary thought would run through her mind, "Do we know what we're doing."

Refurbishing the racetrack's decor has been one of her jobs. Areas were repainted to ensure that one color predominated and the theme flowed throughout the entire facility.

One of her other major assignments has been to entertain.

"That's why we built the house,"

she said. "The condominium we had was too small. David Smith had a gallery here and he and his wife, Linda, designed the house with us."

"We wanted it positioned so that the winds wouldn't blow the house away and the snow would melt off the patio."

The rooms are open and airy with several paintings by Frederic Remington and Charles Russell and a few striking sculptures artfully displayed.

A recreation room in bleached oak and guest bedrooms, one with wild wallpaper and an offbeat hand-stitched, red wall-hanging featuring imaginary creatures, comprise the lower floor. A later addition, a birthday surprise exercise room and sauna for Hubbard, was an after-thought and carved out of the hillside.

In 1985, the Hubbards first heard about a Remington collection being for sale, but didn't move to purchase the grouping until three years later after viewing the paintings firsthand.

One of the centerpieces is a 20-foot mural. She asked herself what do you do with something that size. The answer: you design a place at the racetrack.

"Then John Hall said we ought to do an art show, so we did," Mrs. Hubbard said.

"What I wanted was a national show of masters, the best from every state meeting in New Mexico," she said.

During its first year in 1990, the art show received international coverage. The Hubbards offered \$250,000, the biggest art award in the nation, as the major lure to promote realistic painting.

The collection was exhibited in Russia.

"The people in Russia were awed by the vibrant colors," she said. "Europeans are into Western art more so than some Easterners here."

They were astounded at the detail in a Dave McGary sculpture, she said.

"This one little girl was afraid to touch it, but I told her to. Her eyes opened wide at the detail in the beading work."

Mrs. Hubbard found herself constantly petting one piece, a cat sculpture called Mountain Princess. It was her anniversary present from Hubbard last year.

The winner of the 1990 show, "Transferring the Medicine Shield" by Howard Terping epitomized pure old western appeal.

At the other end of the spectrum, the 1991 winner was "Portrait of Elaine," an oil and gold leaf painting by New York artist Ronald Sherr.

The Hubbards have announced that the art show will be on hiatus in 1992, but they insist the postponement is tied to a lack of staging area, not a lack of commitment.

"The convention center (in Ruidoso Downs) is the new home of the Museum of the Horse" set to open May 23, Mrs. Hubbard pointed out.

"The whole idea was to have the event here to attract people to Ruidoso," Mrs. Hubbard said. "So moving it wouldn't serve any purpose."

"We need time to think about it." Some other advantages of postponement also will be realized, she said.

Artists will be able to plan and work on a piece longer and a foreign tour can be arranged in advance.

"To do an excellent master work, we gave artists only six months and that's not very long," she said. "So we're toying with the idea of having the show every other year. And

we're trying to come up with a better format."

Timing was everything with the first show's tour of Russia. The Berlin Wall was coming down and the tour appealed to the Soviet government. The Hubbards knew they needed an international tour to focus attention on the show.

"We wanted to send the last collection to Japan, but we ran into reality," Mrs. Hubbard said.

"We thought we were good enough to do it any time we wanted and we found out we couldn't, we weren't that charmed."

They were told that nearly a two-year advance was needed to arrange a tour.

News that the racetrack lost \$1-million last year shouldn't surprise anyone, Mrs. Hubbard said.


"That racetrack never made money ever," she said. "We're streamlining and fixing things. There was a lot of fat, but we've got a great group of people around us there."

Hubbard's efforts to purchase another racetrack in the Dallas-Fort Worth area shouldn't upset locals, she said. It would create a solid racing circuit that would only help the area, she said.

Right now her attention is centered on creating The Museum of the Horse, which will feature the

Dress for success on the ski slopes

It's school ski day at Ski Apache. Everywhere are laughing happy young skiers, enjoying the snow and sunshine.

But one skier isn't smiling; his gloveless hands are cold. Another doesn't wear sunglasses; she squints into bright sun reflecting off snow. Yet another shivers in cold, wet blue jeans.

A few minutes' forethought and preparation could transform those unhappy kids into comfortable skiers.

With a few school ski days left, let's remind students (and their folks) how to ski in comfort.

Hot Tips for Cool Skiers

1. Layer your kid like a birthday cake

Two or three medium weight layers of clothing keep a skier

warmer than one heavy bulky layer. Why? Many layers trap insulating air.

Make the inner layers cotton or a cotton-wool blend, such as cotton long johns, a cotton blend T-neck or sweatshirt and wool or wool-blend sweater.

The outer layer must be water-resistant — either a wool blend such as ski pants or an insulated layers such as bibs, warm-ups or jacket.

But not blue jeans. Blue jeans get wet easily and sock right through to skin.

2. The eyes have it

Make sure your student wears sunglasses or goggles every ski day, whether it's sunshine, cloudy or snowing.

If a skier doesn't wear sunglasses or goggles on a sunny day, the combination of high altitude and sunlight reflecting off

snow will damage retinas and sun-burn eyes. It's snowing a skier without goggles can't see where he's going.

3. It's a glove-ly day

Yes, the sun shines in the school yard and it's a comfy 50 degrees. But several thousand feet higher on the mountain, your student skis in colder temperatures and variable conditions.

In town, one may not need gloves, but on top, your skiing child must wear gloves or mittens regardless of weather. But not woolly, fuzzy ones. These collect snow and freeze the kid's hands. Get water-resistant insulated ones.

4. Put a lid on it

At temperatures below 40 degrees Fahrenheit, a person can lose up to 90 percent of body heat

through the head. So wear a hat, especially if it's snowing. As days become warmer, sunny days may rule out a wool hat, so opt for a sporty baseball-style brimmed cap or colorful headband.

5. Toes cold?

Do your child's ski boots fit properly? Does he or she know how to adjust all the buckles? Is he or she wearing proper socks?

Try on boots the night before and correct any problem spots.

Ready to Ski?

Still not sure your student's dressed OK to ski? Ask ski shop personnel; they're experts at knowing what gear works in sub-freezing weather.

Or, imagine how you'd prepare yourself for a cold day at 11,000 feet — and dress your student accordingly.

Anne C. Stradling collection of horse-related artifacts as its focal point.

"I think the museum exhibit will really be exciting," Mrs. Hubbard said. "Some people plan a trip around stopping to see the biggest ball of twine. This relates well to our clientele and market."

She's pleased with the work of curator Gary Miller.

"He's so good at pulling out these unusual things," she said. "He's excellent. I think everyone will be pleased."

"I want to involve the community, get artists fit to speak. It won't be as extensive this summer obviously, but I want it to be a learning experience, too. I want to invite people in to use it."

Part of the Albuquerque Museum Horse Tales exhibit, toward which the Hubbards contributed backing, also will be on display.

"The museum of the horse will be an on-going thing," Mrs. Hubbard said.

She also wants to start an archive at the racetrack on the quarterhorse and its early promoters.

"We're in search of memorabilia if someone would like to contribute," she said. "It should have been down there at the racetrack all along. Gene Hensley's picture will be there."

Hensley was the key developer who broadened the appeal of the Ruidoso Downs racetrack with the All American Futurity.

The Hubbards also have been involved in other philanthropic endeavors.

"Our foundation (the R.D. and Joan Dale Hubbard Foundation) primarily was set up for education, not artwork or a museum. We kind of got off the track," Mrs. Hubbard said.

Two of the foundation's initial projects were to finance a camp for gifted children and a camp for future teachers. It also set up a science program in western Kansas to give students from small schools an opportunity to work with professors from the University of Kansas.

"We had to drop that because the money went into (the museum) building," she said. "We want to get back to our original intent."

Although the Hubbards have no children of their own, Hubbard has three sons by a previous marriage. His oldest daughter died in 1982 and her son has become very close to the couple, Mrs. Hubbard said.

"My brother (in Knoxville, Tennessee) also has three girls and that's why you see me with lots of children," she said. "This is the place where the kids come."

Her parents now live in Dodge City, Kansas, "but my aunts and uncles pretty much live in this area."

The couple's schedule is different every year "depending on what we're into, whatever business project, wherever it is," Mrs. Hubbard said.

While Hubbard was nurturing AFG Industries, Mrs. Hubbard spent three days on the road

marketing and three days at the company's headquarters.

When Hubbard was fighting for Hollywood Park racetrack, their time was concentrated in California.

"He's busier now than he's ever been," she said.

One of the couple's first trips after they met was to Ruidoso, she said. "It always will be special. I love to come back here."

"I was based here last summer. I told Dee I wanted some place to have my personal stuff, someplace where I knew what was in my dresser drawers."

"This is the place where my books and pictures are. It was designed to be comfortable."

But after Memorial Day, there were two trips to Switzerland, some time in Fort Worth, a visit to Hollywood Park, then to Kansas and back to Hollywood Park. Meanwhile, Hubbard also traveled to New York and both headed to Palm Desert last week.

"I try to get here once or twice a month," Mrs. Hubbard said.

"The problem with a lot of people, they think (Hubbard) needs to be here to get things done. He doesn't function that way. He always has umpteen things in the air. He hires good people."

The family usually spends Christmas in Ruidoso. The fact that they did not last December also may have contributed to rumors that the house was for sale, she said.

"My parents were here last July for kind of a family reunion on my side of the family," she said. "They love to come here, but my father has a heart condition and the elevation got to him so we had Christmas in California this year."

"I find it amazing that anyone can be that concerned about my whereabouts in the first place. It never crosses my mind."

"But it is a little town and so much does hinge on the racetrack, I can see (their concern)."

What new things are in store for the Hubbards?

"You're asking me to plan ahead," Mrs. Hubbard said, flashing a broad smile. "These things just seem to fall into my lap."

"I think long range the museum will help the racetrack. And I intend to continue to encourage the racing people to get their own silks. There's such a pageant to racing. We're going to use more banners and flags."

Simulcasting at the Texas track also will introduce those patrons to Ruidoso, she said.

"This little oasis is kind of God's little secret," she said. "We show people and they can't believe it. Dee says if we can just get them here, they'll love this place."

"This is so magnificent, green and beautiful. The weather is temperate. I could become a chamber of commerce real fast about the glories of the area."

"We're not going anywhere," she said. "We're here. We probably have a good \$3-million in the museum. We have a considerable investment in the house and racetrack and you just don't walk off and leave. We just have a lot of balls in the air."



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

Everyday, I go to Ruidoso to the stores or to visit friends or to rent videos and I have to fight the traffic because of the people who visit our Ski Area daily and shop at your stores daily. I know I have read that some of the real estate agents are having problems with potential buyers. Don't blame us, the economy is not good now and if you lost a potential buyer, the buyer probably had second thoughts about what he could spend. What are you afraid of to see our Tribe prosper?

Check things out before making such a big fuss

TO THE EDITOR:

To all of you who are raising such a fuss over the MRS feasibility study — take a long hard look at the situation and you will see hysteria focusing on a rational study. It's simply that...a STUDY.

In reality, it's a "let's get Wendell Chino!" If that were not the case, why is Mr. Chino being personally attacked? Mr. Chino is a fair and just man. He listens to both sides of a story. Some of us know from personal experience.

Do you people in the surrounding communities realize what will happen if your demonstrating and protesting continues? If you cause two of the three largest employers in the area to lose business or close? Many people from the surrounding communities work at The Inn of the Mountain Gods or Ski Apache. Still our ancestors were devoted to unity and because we failed not to be divided, we were given the recognition and privileges we now enjoy.

So was then, so is now. I believe we must not allow outside influences nor inside influences divide us as Indian brothers and sisters. Our leadership has brought us as a people this far (financially speaking). The decisions made by our leaders have always been in the

best interest of the Indian people. Our criticisms, condemnations, and fears of his judgments, must be turned into trust for us to win in this new age as we did in the past. The rules may have changed but the priorities must remain the same. Here on the battlefield of the twentieth century, soon to be the twenty-first, our unity and trust in the judgements of our tribal leaders should remain true.

This letter is not exactly against the MRS facility. I would rather have it to be a reminder to the Indians that we must not forget one of the most important traditional values of trust in our tribal leadership.

We should not be ignorant of the entire responsibility, care and consequences of storing such high level nuclear waste. Neither should we be quick to condemn our leader of his ideals. We as Indian people have learned, experienced and have enjoyed some of the major "decision-making" breakthroughs our leadership has given us. I hope we have gained an understanding that our leaders have made deci-

sions always in the best interest of their people, the Mescaleros.

I defend my leader and support him 100 percent. The Chino "bashing" I have read in the newspapers, I do not appreciate.

I believe we as a tribe that has the option of storing high level nuclear waste on our land, should be commended rather than condemned because, obviously, MRS facilities are not going away. We are stuck with it as a country, and as a nation.

Nuclear waste is not going away. We must face that reality.

I am not running for political office, neither am I looking for recognition. I am a tribal member as well as an American citizen whose trust and support is in the decisions of my leaders. To you people who have been criticizing my leader, I have one thing to say.

I do not know a lot of things and I am not very smart. One thing I have learned from my mother and grandmother is this ... follow the leader. 1 Timothy 2:2

Section 2. Lease Term. The lease begins April 7, 1992 and continues until the purchase option is exercised or the agreement is sooner terminated.

Section 3. Lease Payments. Lessee agrees to make payments as specified in Exhibit B to the lease agreement, which exhibit is also attached to and made a part of this ordinance.

Section 4. Purchase Option. The Lessee may purchase the leased property on any anniversary date of the agreement or upon expiration of the term of the agreement according to a schedule of option prices.

Section 5. Special Obligations. The agreement is a limited obligation of the Lessee, not payable from general funds of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

Section 6 and 7. Certifications. Lessee and Lessor both certify that they are New Mexico Governmental Entities and have complied with their respective prerequisites to enter into the lease.

Sections 8 and 9. Use of Premises and Equipment. Lessee is required to use the premises and equipment of sanitation and recycling services, to keep them in good repair, comply with applicable ordinances and the like.
