Councilors try again to double salaries

Ruidoso village councilors will vote February 25, on an ordinance to double their pay from \$250 to \$500.

A survey of towns and villages in New Mexico with a population of from 3030 (Lordsburg) to 8520 (Grants) shows that the average compensation for council members is \$255.

The information comes from figures compiled by the New Mexico Municipal League in 1990.

The villages that compensates its governing body the most is Belen, population 8,530, at \$750.

The least generous with their overseers are Bosque Farms, population 3,790, and Los Ranchos, population 3,210 whose councilors serve without pay. They were not counted in compiling the above average.

Of those who pay their councilors, Socorro, population 8,120, pays the least compensation per month at \$40.

This is not the first time this Ruidoso Village Council has considered doubling its pay. A similar measure died a few months ago.

Councilors who ran for office in spite of what they consider as low pay, say that higher pay will tempt better candidates.

In contradiction to this, Mayor Victor Alonso, in a recent interview with The Ruidoso News, said that the lack of candidates to file for the upcoming election was an indication of the satisfaction that the village has with the council, its policies and conduct.

Five candidates are running for three slots on the council.

Three incumbents are among those running for re-election on March 3.

According to village clerk Tamie Maddox, those incumbents, if re-elected will benefit from the increased pay.


A telephone survey of larger communities in the state indicates that the proposed pay raise, to \$6,000 per year for Ruidoso village councilors, will raise them to nearly what New Mexico's biggest city, Albuquerque, pays council members, \$6,248 per year.

Santa Fe councilors receive \$1,168 per month; Taos, \$525 per month; Roswell, \$250 per month; and Las Cruces, \$1,167, per month.

Ruidoso's near and bigger neighbor Alamogordo pays its councilors \$50 a meeting for two regular meetings a month. Alamogordo councilors don't get any extra compensation for special meetings.

Capitan pays its trustees \$10 a meeting for one meeting a month plus any special meetings; the Capitan mayor is paid \$200 a

\$5,000 question

How to spend leftover funds

The money is on the table, but now someone has to find the right way to spend it on a plan to get retired persons to relocate in the Ruidoso area.

Members of the Board of Realtors met with Jack Muhn, chamber of commerce staff member, and Roy Crocker, former chairperson of the chamber's retirement services committee, to discuss how to use a state economic development matching funds grant that the chamber has.

The grant is for a little less than \$5,800, but someone needs to send in information by the end of April on how the money will be used. The money will not be available after June 30.

The money must be used and then proof of advertising, such as canceled checks and tear sheets, must be sent to the state before the group could be reimbursed for the costs, Muhn said.

Crocker said he has a list on a computer disk of about 10,000 people who responded to an advertising campaign that had been done through the retirement services committee. Contacting these people by a mailing or some other means would be the quickest way to use the money, he said.

"The quickest way is to recontact those people. There is a lot of fruit to be picked from it," Crocker said.

From the advertising campaign, Crocker said they had at least 20 families come here, and there may

have been more, but the committee didn't have a good way of tracking people who may have visited the area. With 10,000 responses the ad only cost about \$6 or \$7 per person, he said.

Cindy Lynch, board member, said she has been talking to the chamber for three or four months about what could be done with the grant money and names, but she hasn't heard anything back from them. She said that may mean they don't care if this group goes forward with a plan.

He said she knows several people who would be willing to help with this project, including doing work that needs to be done on a computer.

Jackie Donahue, a member of the chamber and a Realtor, said she has been working on what is now the chamber relocation committee to see what can be done to get people to move here. She said there are so many people in the village who volunteer, but the work they do is on overlapping efforts.

"We need to streamline everyone's volunteer efforts," she said.

She said the committee is called relocation, instead of retirement, so it can encompass people of all ages and make the fullest use of the money available. Prospective new residents should be contacted each month and told why this is a good month to move to Ruidoso, Donahue said.

The biggest market for reloca-

tion is for retirees because they usually have mobility and have the money to move to a new location, Crocker said. This is not a new or unique approach to go after retirees, Ruidoso just needs to capitalize on it, he said. Real estate is the first industry to benefit from these people moving to the village but that is just the beginning, Crocker said.

It is critical that someone do something right away so the money isn't just wasted, and the grant is earmarked for retirement services, he said. Lynch said some sort of campaign needs to be done because this is basically free money.

Donahue suggested a seven-member committee be formed from a variety of groups around town, but she would also contact chamber director, Jerry Watts, to see how this would work with the relocation committee plans.

Several members of the group said there wouldn't be enough time to recruit these people so the committee should be the people at this meeting and those who have already volunteered to help so they can get started immediately.

Chamber president Paul Crown said if any group came up with a good idea on how the retirement money should be spent, the chamber would probably be willing to look at it. Watts said he doesn't want to leave the money on the table, either, because there are plenty of qualifying ideas to use it on.

Lawmakers will debate high level N-waste storage

Concern by state nuclear development industries that the wrong message will be sent to the federal government may block passage of a House memorial opposing a high-level nuclear waste storage facility near Lincoln County.

State Rep. John Underwood (D-Ruidoso) said Monday he has received mixed reactions to his memorial, which acknowledges the right of the Mescalero Apache to study the possibility of establishing such a facility, but calls for legislative opposition.

"I think the biggest thing is that people are reading about the federal government considering consolidating its nuclear research and development activity at Los Alamos," Underwood said during a break in a committee meeting in Santa Fe. "Legislators fear we would be running off business for the state. They don't want to send the message that New Mexico doesn't want anything to do with nuclear energy. That would be the wrong message."

His memorial clearly states that opposition would be directed only at high-level nuclear waste storage in the form of a 40-year temporary monitored retrievable storage (MRS) facility.

The MRS is being proposed for tribal-owned land. The Mescalero reservation lies next to Ruidoso, but is not located in Lincoln County, which officially has opposed the concept based on its chilling effect on the community and tourism. The reservation falls within Otero County and that county commission has refused to pass a resolution opposing the MRS, noting the tens of millions of dollars and business it could bring to the area.

Underwood said the memorial may be amended in committee review. It has been sent to the Consumer and Public Affairs Committee, but no date has been set for a hearing.

"I wish everybody could come up and watch the legislature for at least one day during session," he

County stands firm on board attendance

Lincoln County Commissioners tried going through the front door, but they don't mind using the back door if it accomplishes their purpose.

When they learned last week that Ruidoso Village Council won't go along with proposed changes in membership criteria for the Extraterritorial Zoning Commission (ETZ), county commissioners said the new rules can simply be applied administratively.

The ETZ Commission is an appointed board that hears zoning cases within a one-mile radius around Ruidoso. Three members are appointed by the county, three by the Ruidoso village planning and zoning board and one (who lives outside the one mile radius and also outside the village limits) by the members of the ETZ Commission.

The ETZ commission's land use recommendations go to the Extraterritorial Zoning Authority, which hands down the final decisions. The authority is comprised of two county commissioners and one village councilor.

That board can pass the new membership requirements administratively, said County Attorney J. Robert Beauvais.

"The ETZ Authority serves in a superintending capacity over the ETZ Commission just as the county commission does over its planning and zoning commission," he said. "The authority is a policy-setting board on which the county has a majority. It can adopt rules for the board in the same way the city council can for its standing committees."

The boards are a joint effort of the council and the county commission to coordinate development within the radius designated. The members try to ensure that roads are tied in correctly and that land uses that would be incompatible for areas in the county adjoining the village are not allowed to develop.

The village is interested because the land in the one-mile radius may someday be annexed. At one point, village officials pushed to extend the radius to three miles, incorporating the high tax base of the Alto development, but the county rejected the overture.

The need to insert additional membership requirements came up last year.

The Ruidoso News raised questions about the fact that one member of another county-appointed

board was not a registered voter and did not live full time in the county.

"County commissioners immediately went in and amended their ordinances to require county residency and local voter registration," Beauvais said. "They said, yes, that's a good idea."

They also inserted an attendance requirement. If a board member misses more than three meetings in one year, they automatically are removed, although they can seek reinstatement.

"If they miss that many meetings, we assume they are either too busy to do the job or they aren't interested," Beauvais said.

But when it came time to put those membership requirements in effect for the joint ETZ commission, the Ruidoso council, on advice from its attorney, balked.

"All we were asking was for Ruidoso to concur," Beauvais said. "But the council said it wouldn't adopt the amended ordinance because they feared it would give us control over their appointees."

In Beauvais' opinion, it changes nothing. The village would continue to choose its own appointees.

"I told (village attorney) Dave Thomsen that we can't have one set of rules for your members and another for our members," Beauvais said.

When he mentioned the impasse during a county commission meeting last Tuesday, Beauvais offered the solution of the ETZ Authority adopting membership requirements for the ETZ commission administratively.

"Since two county commissioners serve on the authority and only one city councilor, the county can vote 2-1," Beauvais said.

"We can't lose our grip on what happens in the county," said County Commissioner Bill Elliott, who is chairman of the ETZ Authority. "Yes, we've got the upper hand, but we're supposed to. This land is within the county."

Thomsen said Friday that he recommended against the amendment "because it would have required our members to go to the county to be reappointed. Obviously, we hope nobody misses any meetings."

Village planning director Cleatus Richards said the village has membership requirements similar to the county and there was no reason to conform to the county's dictates.

"I recommended against it," he said.

Voters League plans a candidates' forum

Lincoln County voters will have a chance to hear from candidates for municipal offices in a forum at 5:30 p.m. Thursday, February 27, at the Ruidoso Public Library.

Candidates for the March 3 elections in all Lincoln County villages are being invited by letter to speak and answer questions at the forum sponsored by the Lincoln County League of Women Voters.

The League, less than two years old, is well on its way to receiving its official charter.

President Katherine Finley said the active group already is nearly through with a "Know Your County Survey" which will be published soon.

That document, the result of many hours of research, is one step in the provisional league's program of work leading to official status.

Finley said the provisional league, working closely with the state organization, has already

made its presence known and felt in Lincoln County.

A spring membership drive is under way, with the member who recruits the most new members to win a weekend at La Junta Guest Ranch, "with room service."

The winner will be recognized at the April 20 meeting, where a silent auction will be conducted as a fund raiser. Mayors of all county municipalities have been invited to that meeting.

The Lincoln County League of Women Voters met last month and attended a meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council.

The League also elected officers for next year.

Genevieve Sewell has been elected president, the Norma Falwell as first vice president, CeCe Griffin as second vice president and Dot Freiley as third vice president.

Majel Powell was elected secretary with Geneva King as treasurer.

month.

said. "It's important to know where we stand. I appreciate the position of my constituency, but we're part of a statewide constituency.

"Even though I was careful to word it so that it would not interfere with the Waste Isolation Pilot Project (WIPP) in Carlsbad or the development labs, the legislature may prefer that the opposition be based on impact in tourist areas only. I see more support for that."

In other legislative considerations, Underwood said what led to the death last week of a Senate bill to allow video gambling in the state may have been the competition from a multitude of special interest groups.

"There were so many different special interest groups trying to be included in the bill and as a result, it had a deleterious effect on the vote," he said. "But it will be back on the Senate floor today for reconsideration."

Underwood has been involved in preparing several versions of a similar bill for the House. "But we didn't want to spend 30 days working on this one issue if the Senate was able to come up with a work-

able bill," he said.

A bill spelling out a hospitality tax proposed by the Ruidoso village council has been filed, Underwood said. It is being referred to the taxation and revenue committee.

But the Department of Tourism may step in to delay a vote.

Mike Cerletti, director of that department, prefers that a statewide study be undertaken first, Underwood said.

"He doesn't want a negative effect on tourism," he said. "They may create an interim committee to study different forms of taxation to come up with a different approach."

"The village essentially is saying that it doesn't want the lodgers carrying the ball for everyone. I don't think councilors will object to a study."

Part of the difficulty with the hospitality taxation concept is defining who would fall under its provisions, Underwood said. "Would it include go-carts as well as restaurants?" he said. "It'd be fine if a study is done and they bring it back to the 60-day session next January."

Requests for money for Ruidoso's MainStreet project and civic center are sitting in the Capital Outlay Committee now, Underwood said.

Ruidoso Downs' a small town police department that earns big city respect

It may be small, but the Ruidoso Downs police department has earned the respect and trust of its residents in the past few years.

"We have an open door policy here, and we have a good relationship with the public. They trust and support us," Chief G.L. "Skip" Hazel said.

Hazel said many things have changed and improved since 1984 when he became chief of the department. He had been in the area since 1971 and was a corporal with the Ruidoso department before being appointed chief at Ruidoso Downs.

The department has almost doubled in size since he came, and currently has six certified police officers, four certified full-time dispatchers and two part-time dispatchers to fill-in when others are on vacation or ill. Hazel said all the officers are on call 24 hours a day.

Hazel said he would like to see the department increased so two officers can be on duty for every hour of the day.

"We would like to have more officers for the public's safety and ours. Other departments with a racetrack have eight to 12 officers. We do have help from Ruidoso and the state police. We have never had a problem with back-up," Hazel said.

To say the least, it is rough in the summer for the officers mostly because of traffic. Hazel said the population jumps from 1,200 to 10,000-plus in the summer. He said his officers get cussed at sometimes as they direct traffic in and out of the track, but it can be fun, too. One thing the whole department can be proud of is the fact there has never been a serious accident coming in or going out of the racetrack.

"We patrol the main streets more in the summer, but in the winter we get into the neighborhoods. We have a 12-person staff all year around. The one thing I love about it is we all get along great," Hazel said.

Ruidoso Downs Mayor Bonnie Addy said in the past the conditions in the department weren't always this pleasant, so Ruidoso Downs seemed to serve as a training ground before officers went on to another community.

The village has worked very hard at having an open door policy in the community. She said the village has also tried to furnish the department with ongoing educational programs, updated equipment and a good atmosphere.

Addy said the national average standard is one officer for every 700 to 900 people so the department here is adequate to serve the people. Since basic revenues from the community support the department, it will only grow as the village grows.

In the summer there is an influx of people, but the department has

been able to handle it well, she said.

The department covers not only Ruidoso Downs but also the area from the Agua Fria subdivision to Fox Cave. Hazel said if there is a major crime in the area, which is actually a part of the county, they assist in the situation and contact the proper agencies.

"By New Mexico state law we have to answer calls out of our district. That is our job," Hazel said.

One officer who has done his job well for Ruidoso Downs is Lieutenant Bobby Angermiller, who has been with the department for almost six years and won the Fraternal Order of Police, Officer of the Year award in January. Addy and Hazel said they were both extremely pleased that he won the award.

"He is an excellent officer and has done a good job for us," Addy said.

"He has been there for me and has done good work for us, and I am sure he will continue," Hazel said.

Last fall Hazel underwent heart by-pass surgery in Albuquerque and Angermiller was placed in charge and was responsible for keeping the department going. His fellow officers nominated him for the honor.

Angermiller said it was a great honor for him to win the award because it covers the whole county.

"When your fellow officers feel that way about you, it makes you really proud," he said.

"Ruidoso Downs is a small department and the officers are really close. We are pretty much like a family," Angermiller said.

In another area, Hazel said the equipment in the department is excellent compared to when he first started. He said their oldest vehicle is a 1985, and the newest is a 1991. Each year the department gets a new vehicle with assistance from the state law enforcement fund which gives about \$18,000 for the purchase.

Hazel said the board has always backed up the department in the attempts to improve it and has already approved the purchase of a new vehicle this year. He said he wants to be sure the vehicles his officers drive are always safe.

The budget for the department is projected at about \$280,000, with three fourths going to salaries. That leaves only about \$38,000 to \$42,000 for operating funds.

Hazel said every year the budget gets better, but he would like to be able to increase his officers pay to encourage them to stay with the department. When he began at Ruidoso Downs the salary for a certified officer was \$600. It is now \$1,650.

Certified officers are required by the state department to attend 80 hours of advanced training in two years so they don't lose their certification. Hazel said this could include conferences on first line su-

per vision, search and seizure or investigations. Several officers are currently attending a class in criminal procedure offered by Eastern New Mexico University at Ruidoso.

Hazel said this is a benefit to have a class in town because most of the training sessions are either in Alamogordo or Artesia. He said the department receives information on available sessions for the next six months to make plans. Addy said the board has never turned down a request for the officers to go to school.

One problem the Ruidoso Downs police department and board faces is deciding on a permanent solution for jail cells. Currently the city has an agreement with Ruidoso to use its jail facilities. Hazel said the people are usually processed at the Downs office, before they are transported to Ruidoso. Ruidoso Downs then gets a monthly bill for the service, depending on the number of people they have to take to the facility.

Addy and Hazel both agree that the shared facility has worked out well. Addy said the village basically can't afford to build and maintain a facility that would meet the state construction guidelines. This is where a joint powers agreement is extremely beneficial for a small village, she said.

Because of the cost, the mayor said she doesn't see a jail facility being built in the near future for Ruidoso Downs. The city did have a two-cell, 72-hour holding facility at the old city hall that was torn down

in December. The police and other village departments had to vacate the building in May 1991 because of sewage contamination.

A proposal to merge the Ruidoso Downs and Ruidoso police departments also surfaced this fall, and both city boards are studying the project. Hazel said he and his officers are in favor of it because of the added safety for the residents and for the officers. The merging could also help the officers with better advancement, he said.

Both communities are actively researching the feasibility of a merger as far as finances are concerned, Addy said. A decision can't be made until that is done. Ruidoso Downs has discovered that there is a lot more to finding out this information than they at first thought. She said the agreement to share the jail facility was relatively simple compared to this project because it could be creating another, separate entity.

She said if the two boards find it economically beneficial she doesn't know why anyone would be against it. If it isn't beneficial, the project won't be pursued, Addy said.

Hazel said he doesn't see any major disadvantages to the possible merger, except if the two boards can't reach a good agreement. He said he does understand the Ruidoso Downs residents' concern that they will have to deal with officers they aren't used to.

"My main concern in this is officer safety. We look after the people, but we also have to watch out for ourselves," Hazel said.

Specks practices hunting skills in search for new owner

A German short-hair pointer, with good hunting dog potential, Specks is looking for an owner who would enjoy spending some time with a pal.

The two-year-old male was picked up as a stray and brought to the Lincoln County Humane Society shelter about a month ago.

"He gets along well with other dogs and seems to like everybody," said shelter manager Randy Basch. "He's pretty calm most of the time, but like most of the dogs, he gets excited when people come to visit. He is not aggressive and will back down if confronted by an aggressive dog."

Specks is sponsored for neutering by supporters of the shelter. Neutering or spaying is the biggest cost connected to adoption. When a dog or cat is sponsored, it greatly enhances their chances of adoption.

ORDINANCE NEEDED

Irresponsible pet owners are the reason private shelters and public pounds exist. They fail to neuter or spay their pets, then, like a couple last week, they dump the mother and six pups at the shelter door.

Basch or his workers point out that the shelter is overloaded and the chance of survival for the pups and for the mother, whom the owners claim to really love, is dismal. But they turn the animals over to Basch, blaming the female for "getting herself pregnant." They drive away, having unloaded onto the taxpayer and the shelter, the "problem" they created.

Spaying and neutering are one-time expenses that can save the owner and the public much more

money in the long run.

Owners don't end up having to feed puppies, their female and male dogs are less prone to several different illnesses, and the cost of keeping strays off the street goes down.

The Village of Ruidoso later this month will be looking at an ordinance being tried in San Mateo, California. It requires owners to neuter and spay their pets or be subject to fines.

"It's a win-win situation for everyone," Basch pointed out. "The veterinarians receive business from people who for once would be required to take care of their pets."

"They won't be losing out on future business, because many of the owners who currently are causing the problem, aren't the kind of pet owner who would bring a sick dog to the vet any way. The puppies dropped here never come in with protective shots from a vet."

Qualified breeders can benefit because they can obtain special licenses for their businesses. Eventually, they would have less competition from mixed breeds.

"The village would win because the cost of picking up strays and caring for them or euthanizing them would go down as the problem was reduced," Basch said.

"But people still would have a choice of pets because realistically, some owners are going to continue to dump their pets like old furniture when they become inconvenient or the owners will evade the law and not spay and neuter."

To ensure that people who fail to comply with the mandatory neutering ordinance do not just abandon litters, the San Mateo shelters have set up contained night drop off

areas where puppies or kittens could remain safely confined until morning when the shelters open.

Until the problem is tackled, Basch will continue to be faced with the hard life and death choices when the shelter becomes overcrowded. That's the current condition. The shelter has been overwhelmed several times in the last six months not only with litters and litters of kittens and pups, but also with adult dogs abandoned by their owners.

"People will read where we had to put down some animals and come in and want to just take an animal and let it loose in another town or take it to another shelter," Basch said. "The truth is that animals have a better chance at this shelter than in Las Cruces or Alamogordo, where many more animals are put down and they are not kept as long."

"But I would rather put one animal to sleep now than let someone take it, not get it neutered and not give it shots, and then end up putting down its offspring for the next 10 years."

"Taking one animal just doesn't solve the problem. And charging for animals somehow gives them more value in the minds of the new owners, as well as helps to offset the cost of rabies shots, city licenses and caring for them at the shelter."

"The sad thing is, the problem could be solved. We could put an end to the millions of animal deaths each year by lethal injection and other means. It's up to each of us to be responsible pet owners."

APPLIANCES

A benefactor of the society recently donated some large plants,

a work table with a vise and grinder, a baby crib, two refrigerators and items such as a barbecue grill. Several of the pieces are stored at the shelter on Gavilan Canyon Road.

Persons interested in buying may come to the shelter to view them. The purchases will help support the society's work as do sales at its Kit 'N Kaboodles thrift shop on Sudderth Drive near Arby's.

—several blue heeler mixes including one male already neutered named Flecks, the survivor of a confrontation with a car.

—a well-behaved and intelligent black and gray catahoula called Maggie and her friend Sarah, a black Labrador.

—Poly, one of the brothers of Roly and Poly, golden retriever-chow mixes featured recently as pets of the week.

—two attractive and friendly

white shepherds.

Hardy still is a resident of the cattery, even though her sister, Laurel, was adopted after the two were featured for adoption.

The tiger-striped young female is shy and wary of strangers, but her loyalty and protectiveness of her sister won the hearts of shelter workers. Someone with a calm dis-

National tax preparers offer free service to help taxpayers

President Bush's order to immediately reduce income tax withholding is contrary to the desire of many U.S. taxpayers that will backfire when the working men and women of America discover there are smaller and fewer refunds in 1993, according to Thomas M. Bloch, president and chief operating officer of H&R Block, Inc.

David R. Whatley of the local H&R Block office said many taxpayers will be shocked next year when they discover they will owe money instead of receiving their refund check. The average annual federal refund was more than \$900 last year, he said.

In order to help taxpayers maintain the annual refund they have come to expect, H & R Block will prepare new W-4 forms free.

Under the program, a taxpayer can come to the firm's more than 7,000 offices nationwide and receive this free service.

"We'll help individuals keep their withholding as it is now, rather than having it changed," said Whatley.

New withholding rules can be instituted without an act of Congress and will be automatic, whether or not employees want the new rules to apply. Employees who want to withhold at the current level in order to ensure a refund, will have to fill out a new W-4 form.

The New Mexico Apple Council will serve the state's individual growers by providing information about orchard management and potential markets.

Warriors strike out in weekend district games

The Ruidoso Warriors boys basketball team struck out on the court this weekend against two district opponents.

The Warriors made it a close, exciting game on Friday when they took on Cobre, who was also winless in the district so far this season. At the end of the first quarter the Warriors were only down 11-12 and kept it within one point to the half when it was 28-29.

Coach Norm Wright said the Warriors came out sluggish in the third quarter and were outscored 11-26. He said the boys charged back into the fourth quarter to outscore Cobre 31-21. The final score was 70-76.

"We came back and played extremely well. We made a run at them but couldn't quite catch them," Wright said.

The top scorer for the Warriors was Jaime Ordorica with 21 points. He had a sizzling night at the free throw line by sinking ten out of ten. Wright said Ordorica has been doing excellent in shooting, and at a practice last week he made 72 free throws straight.

As a team the Warriors did well

in free throws, making 29 of 35 shots, which is a phenomenal percentage, Wright said. He said the players have been working on this all season, but this is the best they have done.

Both Eric Evans and Darin Davis had nine points and five rebounds to assist the Warriors in the game against Cobre. Wally Murillo had eight points and was four of four on field goals. He also had seven steals which sparked the Warriors for their fourth quarter revival. Robert Sayner also scored eight points, all from free throws. Jeff Chapman had seven points and was five for six from the charity line.

Wright said the difference in the game was that the Warriors had 27 turnovers, while Cobre had just 20. Turnovers have plagued the Warriors all season, but at times the players have been able to overcome them for a victory.

The junior varsity team had a little better luck against the Cobre Indians and won 55-43. The leading scorers were Chapman with 10 points, while Jeff Cox, Jimmy Varnadore, Davis and Ricky

DeVera each had eight points.

The C team also faced Cobre on Friday but couldn't quite come up with a win although they played tough. The final score was 58-63. Leading scorer was Jim Paul Whipple with 19 points. Zack Turner scored 16 points, while Blaise Magooshboy had 11 points.

On Saturday the three teams traveled to Silver City to take on the fourth ranked team in the state. Wright said it was an incredible rough night for the team and its players. The Warriors scored 32 to Silver's 85.

Wright said it was a much more physical game than they had played this season, and the referees didn't call many fouls. The Warriors only made it to the free throw line eight times in the game compared to 35 in the game Friday night.

No one made it in to double figures, but Davis did have seven points to lead the Warriors. Evans had six points, while Ordorica and Sayner each had five.

"They were just too big for us. It was a mismatch," Wright said. The victory for Silver gave them

a 5-0 record to finish the first round of district play. Deming was close behind with a 4-1 record, while the Warriors went without a win in this round. On the season their record is 5-12.

Wright said the team is going to try hard this round to improve and beat some of the district teams. Three of the games will be at home, including the game Friday against Socorro which starts at 5:15 p.m.

"The main reason for our losses is how we approach the game. If we can go out and play like we know we can, we can beat these teams," he said.

The JV team is now 6-6 after losing to Silver on Saturday. The Warriors tried to keep it close, but were defeated 56-78. The leading scorer was Cox with 12 points. Varnadore scored nine.

The C team was also defeated by Silver, 32-67. Magooshboy dominated the court for the Warriors' effort and scored 24 points.

Both boys and girls C teams will be in action on Tuesday when they battle the Deming Wildcats starting at 4 p.m. at the high school gym.



The Dreamer

Honest Abe Lincoln remembered

Lincoln's Birthday

Abraham Lincoln, our sixteenth president, was born in a log cabin in Kentucky, February 12, 1809.

Although he grew up on the frontier and lived a life of "rustic toil," and had very little schooling, he became not only one of our greatest presidents, but also a giant on the scene of world history. It has been said that more words of praise have been written about Abraham Lincoln than of any mortal man. He was beloved throughout his neighborhood, his nation and the world.

At six feet three, he was our second tallest president, next to George Washington and Lyndon Johnson, both six feet four. He was a giant in strength, needing only three strokes with the axe to split a foot-and-a-half wide log into four fence rails.

Like George Washington, before him, Lincoln was the champion wrestler of his home region.

To match his physical strength he was a man of high intelligence, abiding honesty and deep compassion for all life.

His legendary honesty earned him the nickname "Honest Abe." The story is told of how he walked several miles to return a few pennies that he had accidentally overcharged a woman who had bought something in the store in which he was working.

One time when he was riding through the countryside, he saw a baby bird which had fallen out of its nest. In his Sunday clothes he dismounted and put the infant bird back in its nest.

Taught Himself To Read and Figure

Early in life Lincoln showed a deep desire for reading and writing. The paintings and sketches of him writing and doing sums of arithmetic on a board with a piece of charcoal for a pencil have become favorite features of American history and pioneer lore.

The few books on the Kentucky frontier were shared by the neighbors, and young Abraham would walk miles to borrow a book. The books that had a great influence on his early life were: The Bible, Pilgrim's progress, Aesop's Fables, Robinson Crusoe, Mason L. Ween's "Life of Washington," Benjamin Franklin's Autobiography, and the poems of



Robert Burns.

The poems of Burns inspired him to see the true value of his fellow man regardless of rank, wealth or station. A line from one of Burns' poems on this theme is "The rank is but the Guinea's stamp: the man's the Gold, for A' that."

Through a God-given insight into the nature of humanity and the deeply spiritual nature, Lincoln became a great master of conveying his ideas and sentiments to his fellow man in American and world wide.

His Gettysburg address is considered widely as one of the greatest utterances of all time. The Encyclopedia Britannica in its section on Abraham Lincoln devotes a full page in large print to the address. It is engraved in stones at the Lincoln Memorial in Washington D.C. And you can find it in the back pages of the Webster's Collegiate Dictionary on the page explaining the proof-reading marks for Newspaper printing.

In remembering Honest Abe let us go over his Gettysburg address:

"Four score and seven years ago our fathers conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal. Now we are engaged in a great civil war testing whether that nation, or any nation so conceived and so dedicated, can long endure. We are met on a great battlefield of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of that field as a final resting place for those who here gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this. But, in a larger sense, we cannot dedicate, we cannot consecrate, we cannot hallow this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here have consecrated it far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note nor long remember what

we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us the living rather to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us—that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion—that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain, that this nation under God shall have a new birth of freedom, and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

Our Own Legacy From Honest Abe

The State of New Mexico came close to being named Lincoln. And then the regional Lincoln County took in one fourth of the entire state comprising seven present day counties, the largest county in the United States, the size of the state of Indiana. The capital of this original county was little Lincoln, before there was an Alamogordo or a Roswell.

Today as you look out at the American flag floating in a light southern breeze, with the Vale all glowing in a light gold and silvery half light with a blue and gray sky overhead, you are filled with happiness in knowing we live in one of the most beautiful spots of the original county — our own mountain homeland — our Lincoln County. Let us send up a prayer for Honest Abe Lincoln, and let us thank God for our many blessings.

1 teaspoon garlic powder, divided	1 cup sliced fresh mushrooms

2 teaspoons vegetable oil, divided	1/4 teaspoon chili powder
1 teaspoon butter	1 tablespoon dairy sour cream
3/4 teaspoon salt, divided	2 tablespoons drained, chopped canned green chilies
1 each red and green bell-pepper, cut lengthwise into thin strips (approx. 3 cups)	Lemon slices
	Cilantro sprigs

Pound boneless beef top sirloin steak with flat side of meat mallet to about 1/4-inch thickness. Combine 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder and pepper; sprinkle over steak. Heat 1-teaspoon oil and butter in 12-inch heavy frying pan over medium-high heat until hot. Pan-fry steak 5 to 7 minutes for medium-rare (150°F) or to desired doneness, turning once. Remove steak to heated platter; sprinkle with 1/2 teaspoon salt. Keep warm. Add remaining 1-teaspoon oil to frying pan. Add red and green peppers, onion, mushrooms and walnuts. State Corporation Commissioner Louis Gallegos brought his appointed staff to Ruidoso recently to evaluate their accomplishments and plan for the rest of his six-year term.

Gallegos, a Democrat, also took time to host a party and thank the county Democratic party leaders who helped him win the race that placed him on the powerful commission.

The three-member State Corporation Commission (SCC) is created by the New Mexico Constitution as a regulatory agency to protect the consumer, the public interest and the industries it regulates. Those industries include transportation, insurance companies and communications.

"Telephone will be a major issue in the next six months," said Gallegos while on retreat in Ruidoso. With the deregulation, each long-distance carrier has to be licensed to provide operator services in New Mexico.

"I vote against them every time," said Gallegos, who says he always puts the consumers' needs first.

Looking back at his term thus far, Gallegos and his appointees are proud of the way they've upgraded

job classifications and improved operations in the department.

"We're trying to break up the favoritism system," said Gallegos. "We've got to get away from political and hire people who are better qualified."

He admitted the department has grown from 140 employees to 178, but counts that as a plus, since his commission has beefed up enforcement and added technical employees, engineers and economists, to try to keep abreast of the fast-moving industry the SCC is charged with overseeing.

"This allows the Commission to do a better job for the public," said Gallegos, noting that when it comes to checking rates and service, his commission sends people out into the field and conduct on-site surveys and investigations.

In the past, complaints from the public often fell on deaf ears, said Gallegos, who is proud of his and his employees' response to public input.

Gallegos is particularly critical of the telephone service in the Ruidoso area covered by GTE. He said he met with GTE and Contel over the two companies' merger.

"There's a difference of night and

day between the service here and in Hobbs and Carlsbad," said Gallegos.

In the transportation area, too, Gallegos and his staff put a high priority on compliance for trucking firms and truckers. If a truck doesn't meet the state specifications, the SCC enforcement division wants that truck off the roads.

"Safety comes before everything in transportation," said Gallegos.

SCC oversees insurance companies and has to conduct public hearings over rate changes.

"We've got to get tougher with insurance companies," said Gallegos. "I think we could do a better job."

Travis Shugart, a Gallegos appointee, said a lack of unity has held the SCC back.

Every two years one of the three commissioners runs for a six-year term.

"Unless you've got unit, it's hard to get anything done. Gallegos and commissioners Eric Serna and Jerome Block have alternated the chairmanship of the SCC, and Block has been critical of both Gallegos and Serna. All three commissioners are Democrats.

Marie MacLauchlan, Gallegos'

other staffer on the Ruidoso retreat, said Gallegos has been behind a plan to improve training for state firefighters.

The SCC oversees the State Fire Marshal and the State Fire Academy in Socorro.

Gallegos initiated a pilot project

to provide training for rural fire departments at the ENMU-Clovis branch through videotapes.

Gallegos said his trip to Ruidoso is just one of many he'll take this year, as he travels the state to meet with people, see what's going on and thank his many supporters

who helped him get elected. "You pick up a lot of information out there; people really need our help," said Gallegos.

Search is on for Native Americans to compete in a regional science fair

The First Native American Science and Engineering Fair for the southwest region will be sponsored March 5-7 by the Indian Resource Development program based at New Mexico State University.

The competition, whose deadline is Friday, February 21, will be at the University of New Mexico branch campus in Gallup, according to Lance Lujan, IRD director and science fair co-coordinator. All Native American Indian students in grades K-12 from New Mexico, Arizona, Utah, and Colorado are eligible to compete.

The IRD is a statewide program developed to assist Native American Indian students to attend college and prepare for vital career areas that are critically needed for effective development and management of tribal and state resources, Lujan said.

The southwest regional fair is the result of the successful national fair that was developed four years ago.

"The success of the annual national fair this past April generated

a considerable amount of enthusiasm in our state," Lujan said. "The IRD is proud to announce a similar event for the southwest region."

The fair is designed to encourage students to develop a project reflecting the richness of their traditional Indian culture and the integration of western science and technology. The division winners from grades 5-12 will be eligible to compete in the 1992 national fair to be in Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

"We are extremely excited about this project and hope that together, our science efforts will instill an awareness in our Indian youth of the importance of science and engineering concepts," Lujan said.

The competition has six categories: Life sciences, physical sciences, earth and space, engineering/computers/mathematics, environmental sciences, and medicine and health.

Individual and group entries will be judged in three grade divisions—elementary, 4-5; junior high school, 6-8; and high school, 9-12.

There will be a special banner and poster competition reflecting the theme "The Importance of Science and Engineering to the American Indian People" for grades K-3.

Entries do not have to be completed before the registration deadline of February 21, Lujan said. However, due to fair costs, registration fees cannot be reimbursed.

Also, if registration documents are not received by the February 21 deadline, exhibit space cannot be guaranteed.

The registration fee is \$15 per project with a maximum of \$60 per school. All participants and chaperons are responsible for travel, lodging and meals. Registration should be mailed to Indian Resource Development, Science Fair Registration, NMSU Box 30001, Dept. 3IRD, Las Cruces, N.M., 88003-0001. Make all checks out to the IRD-Science Fair.


