Council takes the red out of budget

Ruidoso's village preliminary fiscal budget approval almost took a backseat to a host of fiery subjects that surfaced in Tuesday's Ruidoso Village Council meeting.

Deputy manager Gary Jackson and Lee Ann Boswell of village finance walked through \$900,000 in cuts that reduced the budget from a deficit to about a \$60,000 surplus.

Two budget items discussed in length by the council centered around transportation and water.

Mayor Victor Alonso pushed for an early mass transit system which he admitted would be a long-term cost to the community.

"Since we don't have a hotel built next to our Civic Events Center, the next best thing we can do is buy some busses with federal money, 80 percent and 50 percent shared operating expenses," Alonso said. "And we're going to be in the mass transit system."

Alonso called it a good deal because it is economic development. He said for \$75,000 the village was really getting \$200,000 in matching funds.

Councilor J.D. James said he was concerned of the operational costs in subsequent years.

"We're taking on something here that hasn't worked in the past," he said.

Alonso estimated Ruidoso's exposure to be

\$50,000 per year.

Councilor Andrews said if 40 businesses gave \$1,000 per year to advertise on the side of the busses it would nearly cover the operational costs.

Councilor Jerry Shaw questioned why the \$75,000 had to be budgeted before a feasibility study was made.

James said he felt a lot of money had been wasted in the past few years in feasibility studies.

The council approved a \$75,000 budget that included a \$13,000 feasibility study to see if a mass transit system is warranted.

Another much discussed item in the budget involved the water fund.

The budget had called for a \$1 decrease in water fees and a \$2 increase in sewer fees.

Councilor Jerry Shaw said she was not in favor of decreasing water fees because it would leave a surplus of only \$4,000. She said that was too low.

"We're not using the increment one eighth gross receipts tax to create \$75,000, yet we're going to take away \$75,000 by lowering the water rates. I would like to see the water rate stay the same," she said.

Andrews said he was the one who pushed hardest for a decrease in water rates.

"The water rates have been significantly higher than any other community in the state,"

Andrews said.

Andrews said when the rate was set years ago, they were told after major construction the rates would be lowered.

"The water fund has always had a very good profit margin," Andrews said. "Unfortunately, in the past it has been robbed repeatedly. Transfers have not been just to sewer. If you go back over the past 10 years, you will see significant things transferred out of the water fund that had nothing to do with the water or sewer system."

"The citizens have been lied to for a number of years, thinking they were paying a reasonable water rate, when in truth they were paying a hidden tax," Andrews said.

"This city has no reason to be in a profit making situation in anything it does."


"If we need money to landscape a park or to pay somebody's salary in administration, we need to step forward and say we need the tax to do it. Historically this village has not done that."

"Historically this village has transferred out of the water fund money it needed to do a whole lot of other things."

"We have been hiding a tax in the water fund. This reduction still would put it back into a better than break even situation, which is all we should be doing," Andrews said.

The vote was split three and three. Jerry

Ruidoso Downs postpones moving

The tight economic conditions of the area have everyone up against the ropes including the municipalities that some groups depend on for support.

The Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees had to table a request for money at a meeting Monday night from Jim Kerlin, executive director of the Counseling Center, until the mayor can talk to representatives from the Ruidoso Downs Race Track, which in part draws the people that use the center from Ruidoso Downs.

The Counseling Center, a private nonprofit organization, has been providing a broad array of substance abuse, assistance and counseling since 1971. Kerlin said the center has had tremendous growth in the last four years. He said

it provides counseling, crisis counseling and therapy to individuals, families or groups. Someone is on call 24 hours a day, every day for emergencies or crisis situations, Kerlin said.

The state provides about 80 percent of our funding. The rest is up to us and that determines the quality and quantity of what we can do, Kerlin said.

He said they have been able to support the counseling in Lincoln County by services they are providing in Otero County. The center is funded by the county as well, but the county commissioners voted to reduce the amount of support instead of increase it, Kerlin said.

"We are extended far beyond our budget to meet the current need. If we don't increase it, we will have to cut back the services we provide," he said.

One problem in Lincoln County is people tend to be independent and when they have a problem they don't seek to prevent it is out of control. It brings up more emergency situations, Kerlin said.

He said Sandy Clark, mental health therapist, is stretched out because of all these emergencies that her on going therapy work is being seriously effected. At this point they will either have to bring

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County workers get pay increases

Lincoln County's 90 employees will see their wages increase by six percent July 1.

In a special budget meeting Tuesday, the county commission voted unanimously to approve the raise.

"We don't need to complain and groan about what had happened in the past," said county manager Wynham. "We can't go back to the Ruidoso officials, who have a plan we have money and that's that."

"We have to live with the reality of the tax and I will not be able to raise the tax any more," Wynham said.

The commission also approved a 10 percent pay raise for the county employees who have a different pay scale than the county's other employees.

County Treasurer Bill Wicker said County Clerk Martha Swenor, County Assessor Patricia Swenor and

It's not to spend every cent of the tax, but to save money.

Wynham said the county will start the new budget year with a healthy cash forward total of nearly \$2 million, an almost \$300,000 from last year.

Overall, the general fund will be down, as will the road department, Wynham said. Because of the budget changes, the exact figures will not be available until February.

After mid-year adjustments, the general fund for 1992 was at \$1,900,000. Wynham said that is a decrease from \$2,200,000 in 1991.

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someone in her out part of the case load or pull her out of emergency services.

"Our services are inexpensive compared to calling in a private practitioner," said Kerlin.

"It would be difficult for us to say, no, we can't be there, but if we can't, we can't," he said.

Emergency services are provided to the police, the jail, the hospital and the courts in the county, for such problems as driving while under the influence of alcohol (DWI) or suicide attempts. Ruidoso Downs Suidicide Judge Harold Mansell said he has referred many people from his system to the center because it has a good program. In a case two years ago, which concerned a DWI, a person was referred to the center, and he was able to stay sober, Mansell said.

Trustee Judy Miller asked why part of the fine couldn't be used to help for the cost of services. Kerlin answered that as a state contractor, they have to provide services to anyone they are capable of reaching. If the person is incapable of paying, the center can't charge or if it is a low income person a sliding scale fee is used, which may mean only a dollar or two for payment. He said 90 to 95 percent are in these categories.

About four years ago they made a commitment to provide additional services to Lincoln County, but they have had little increase in funds. They had a half-time therapist at that time and now have a full-time, but Kerlin said they could easily keep three people busy.

The primary problem in Ruidoso Downs is the large influx of substance abusers in the summer months, Kerlin said. He said the cost of services for Ruidoso Downs would be \$5,000, but the center is possible. It would be as if the village is contracting for these services, and they would have to if they didn't get them from the Counseling Center, he said.

Ruidoso Downs is the second highest user of the services with 25 percent, while Ruidoso residents make up about 50 percent of the users.

Kerlin reported later this week that he compared five summer months to five winter months for the last year and the current year through April. He said he is not putting the responsibility of the increase on the track, but during the track months of mid-April through mid-September the center sees an increase of 36.5 percent per month in the use of mental health services. The substance abuse assistance is also up 20 percent each month in that period for an overall increase of 28 percent in all services.

These months were compared to November through March, but if he would have made a full year comparison the summer percentage would have been even higher because October is one of the slower months. The statistics are based on monthly reports that are turned in to the state department in Santa Fe, Kerlin said.

Mayor Joe Hayhurst said it is a difficult financial time for the village as it is for the center.

"You came to us when we are

trying to cut back, and we are kind of strapped for money, too," Hayhurst said.

He suggested that since the increase in the summer is related to the race track opening, he could ask the track if they can work with the village to provide support for the services. Kerlin said he could provide Hayhurst with statistics on the increase of services if he wanted to take that information to the representatives at the track. Hayhurst said he will talk to them, and the board can make a decision at the next meeting which is May 22.

The Counseling Center had originally asked the county commissioners for \$20,000, but they cut the previous annual contribution from \$10,000 to \$5,000, and then Tuesday reinstated the \$10,000.

The center also requested funds from the Village of Ruidoso at a council meeting Tuesday night and received the full \$12,500 they asked for.

The board did approve the request to sell maintenance equipment, including a dump truck, a flat bed truck, a plow, a salt box and a Dodge pick-up. Trustee Ray Fredrickson voted against the list because he thought they should keep the plow and sell a back-up maintainer. He said there is no reason to keep the old maintainer, and they can't afford to just keep it around. He said the original plan was to up-grade and sell the old one.

Maintenance supervisor Dennis Riddle said with having two old machines the possibility of one breaking down is good. He said they had used the plow on the

dump truck to move snow, but it didn't work as well in steep areas. The drivers couldn't keep control of it as well as with a maintainer. Using the dump truck in the winter is also putting more wear and tear on the vehicle, which is needed during the summer.

"My main concern is not having a back-up. All of our equipment is old and worn out and this type of equipment usually breaks down at the worst possible moment," he said.

Riddle said the engine and the transmission in the old maintainer is still sound. It would be worth about \$6,000 to \$8,000 if they sold it. Fredrickson said it would cost about \$20,000 to repair it, if it broke down.

Trustee Charlotte Craig made the motion to approve the list of items to be sold and then they could consider to sell the maintainer if it came to that point. Fredrickson remained in opposition to the list because it included items they had bought only a year ago. Riddle said they bought the salt box and plow two years ago and tried it the first winter but found the maintainers worked better. Riddle said this year the village got a lot of compliments on the snow removal. The audience and board members agreed they had done a great job this year and should do what it takes to continue the good performance.

In other business the board tabled a report on proposals for modular buildings for a village hall because the village clerk Leann Weibrecht is waiting for one more bid to come in. They should have at least four to five to look at for the next board meeting, she said.

Information from a soil sample taken at the site of the old village hall has not been received yet either. Weibrecht said the company, Testing Laboratories, Inc. of Alamogordo, is backlogged and will try to get the results to them as soon as possible. The village wanted to test the area for possible contamination from an underground gas tank and possible contamination from a sewage leak in the old village hall. Hayhurst has said he would like to see the village hall go back to that site on Highway 70 if possible.

Seven people were also appointed to a Parks and Recreation Committee to take care of the village park and the equipment. They will also help get the new play ground equipment that the volunteer fire department is working to purchase through donations. Since starting the drive about two weeks ago they have raised about \$300, but they need at least \$3,600 to purchase a set they have selected.

Trustee Jackie Miller, Trustee Craig, Trustee Jackie Branum and village employees David Weibrecht, Oscar Hoffman and Billy Joe Page will be serving, as will Pappy Bell, who volunteered at the meeting to help. He asked if anyone was on the committee to represent the village auxiliary, and said he would do it.

Approval was also given for the village clerk and deputy clerk Barbara Kilough to attend an infrastructure seminar on June 25 in Las Cruces at a cost of \$137. Dale Graham was approved for a full-time employee as a mechanic since he has completed his 90-day probation.

Mayor Hayhurst thanked the Elks Lodge for sponsoring the Youth Government Day on May 6. Students who worked in the different departments in Ruidoso Downs were David Sanchez, Erica Downez, David Sanchez, Jolene McGee and Jenny Arnes.

The group also passed a resolution for a smoke free workplace which will include all village offices and the senior citizens' center.

Although it was not on the agenda the board did hear a presentation from three home owners on West Circle Drive concerning a land owner below them allowing dirt to be removed from the hillside their property is on. The removal has made the area more erodible and dangerous. Mrs. LaVerne Cole has investigated the situation and asked several federal agencies if they could intervene, but they said it needs to start at the local level. She said it is very dangerous because it is a sudden drop off of about 25 feet, so she put up flags to warn people. She is also concerned because the person has dug back into the hillside.

The excavators are not meeting safety requirements of making a certain percentage of slope or by stair-stepping the area. Village clerk Weibrecht said she has called the state building inspector and he will be able to come down to check the situation later this week or early next week. In the mean time she will check with the village attorney to see if they can stop the dirt removal until that time. The landowner had not received a permit from the village to do the removal.

—heard from attorney David Thomsen on the primary changes in an ordinance relating to business registrations and licenses.

Thomsen said contractors with a licensing provision instead of a registration provision would allow the village to require that contractor to conform with state law as part of a municipal ordinance.

He said the other major change was regarding vehicles for hire. He said this would not only include vehicles for hire already in Ruidoso, but also anyone else coming in that wants to start up a service such as a taxi cab.

Thomsen said the rest of the changes in the ordinance was technical cleanup.

The council approved a motion by Councilor Duff to amend the ordinance for non-motorized vehicles for hire to limited liability of not less than \$300,000. This would accommodate a service such as horse drawn wagons.

The ordinance passed unanimously.

—approved a request for \$12,500 from Jim Kerlin to assist the operations of the Counseling Center.

Chief Swenor said the center is an invaluable asset to the operations of the Ruidoso police.

—awarded a plumbing services contract to

—authorized staff to proceed on a proposal by Brooks Soloroz to set up a Hawaiian Ice stand near the swimming pool at School House Park.

—tabled a request by Ralph Gary for a lease agreement for his corporation United Helicopter, Inc.

—authorized payment request for \$209,000.00 to Bradley Construction Inc. for the Ruidoso Civic Events Center.

Alonso told village planner Cleatus Richards that slow pay to the sub-contractors has created rumors that the contractor is in trouble. He asked if slow pay by the general contractor was a serious problem.

Richards said he felt the situation was not serious. Richards said he and the architect were watching the progress of the payments closely. He said there was action that he could take to protect the sub-contractors.

—OK'd a variance request by J. A. Hyatt against the recommendation of the Planning and Zoning Commission and village planner Richards.

The variance was requested to place a portable garage on his property.

Richards said the request for variance did not relate to a hardship regarding topography; the building was designed with and without site development approval; the company selling

the garage structure did not contact the planning department for approval; the structure does not conform to the uniform building codes in so far as it has a wooden floor; and the variance requested placed the structure within one and one-half feet of the property line.

The amiable Mr. Hyatt presented a history of his attempts to put the garage on his property and the council appeared sympathetic.

Alonso didn't seem to mind putting his planning director in an awkward position by inferring "he, the mayor, was given special treatment."

"I asked for a variance and I got it. Why did I get it, and we can't give it (to Hyatt)?" he asked.

The question was never answered. Richards, not wanting to embarrass the mayor, later said that the mayor's property was built before setback restrictions and the mayor did not cause his own dilemma qualifying him for a hardship.

The council seemed to agree that aesthetically, Hyatt placed the building in the most desirable location for the neighborhood. The garage is not visible from the front.

Councilor Barbara Duff amended the variance requirements to ensure the building would be brought up to code. Hyatt agreed to bring his building up to code.

—approved unanimously Alonso's appointment of Councilor Frank Cummins to the board of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

Alonso complains about The News

Mayor Victor Alonso approached the podium at Tuesday's Village Council meeting to complain about a recent editorial in The Ruidoso News.

The fiery mayor often takes exception to editorials critical of his administration. The mayor believes he is speaking as a private citizen when he leaves his chair at the council table.

The editorial questioning an \$800,000 deficit was the focus of Alonso's attack.

The mayor, calling The News ignorant and uninformed, said it was not unusual for a wish list to exceed revenues and then to pare that wish list down to balance the budget.

Alonso, in a recent presentation to the Lincoln County Commission, asked for money for parks and

recreation, the airport, the library, fire fighting outside the city limits and use of the animal shelter.

The mayor complained of the village's "\$800,000 deficit," (his words) as part of the justification for asking for money. He received nothing from the county.

The village's "wish list," normally thought of as a department's request for vehicles, typewriters, copy machines and other equipment, accounted for less than \$100,000 of a \$900,000 deficit listed on the village budget summary. To cover the rest of the \$800,000 in deficit, the council had to make fund transfers, lower a recreation subsidy and extend airport bond indebtedness by 20 years.

The newspaper's position was that with only \$5-million in revenue, a \$1-million combination wish list/deficit was excessive.

The mayor had a different point

of view.

Councilor Duff, later in the meeting, also chimed in against The Ruidoso News, specifically naming its owner, its publisher and editor.

Reading from a prepared text, Duff said, "For two years The Ruidoso News, like vultures, tried to bring down a sincere, dedicated group of people who after inheriting a \$947,000 deficit budget and the state taking \$150,000 out of the coffers are still fighting to resist reinstating the tax they reduced in 1990."

Although many Ruidoso residents say services such as garbage pickup, snow removal and animal control had diminished last year, Duff claimed in her text that services were not reduced.

Duff said The News is doing damage to the community and they should report only the good.

froudsly passed.

Alonso had high praise for the village staff and their work on the budget.

"I've been on the council for six years," he said. "I can tell you this is the best budget presentation that I have ever seen. It's taken a lot of hard work; these budgets are complicated, but I want to commend the staff for the work they have done."

built. We still have leaks. The expense to income ratio is close. For those reasons I'm going to side with keeping the rates the way they are. So I'm going to vote aye," he said.

The vote pushed the water fund surplus to \$78,000.

Richards said there are no funds in this budget for waste water improvement mandated by EPA other than construction engineering.

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budget. Commissioners noted that he is training several of his employees to handle basic maintenance and will contract for more extensive mechanical needs.

"He has a high paid mechanic foreman and no one to supervise," Wynham said.

But some county observers have contended the move is more political than a matter of economics.

Ed Lundquist serves as shop mechanic foreman and currently earns \$23,250 a year.

He has been critical of Cupit's management of the department and of the commission's management of the county. He expressed that opinion in a letter to the editor published in The Ruidoso News.

Wynham said Lundquist will be given first chance at a new driver's position that would pay \$15,140 a year for a man with Lundquist's experience in the department (\$13,763 at entry level).

Sheriff James McSwane met with resistance from the commission on most of his last minute budget proposals for the sheriff's department and operation of the jail.

Commissioners nixed a drug education officer, who would visit schools, unless McSwane can find money for the position from another source. The sheriff argued that the

position would save the county money in the long run by deterring crime.

They turned down a \$500 bonus for an employee who took over additional sheriff's department administrative duties while another person was on maternity leave. But they did approve hiring a part time jailer and part time dispatcher in an attempt to cut down on overtime in that department.

Commissioners indicated the budgeted capital expenditure replacement of three cars for the department was enough. McSwane said by January, he will need five new cars because several have accumulated more than 150,000 miles.

They said anything additional should come out of the sheriff's special cash fund financed by property forfeitures connected to drug cases. McSwane said that fund is being built up so that in the future it can support the operation of the White Mountain Drug Task Force when federal money runs out.

This past year, Lincoln County received \$50,000 for the special task force, \$20,000 more than neighboring Otero County, which has a much larger population, McSwane pointed out.

Spencer questioned McSwane about eliminating the department's office in Ruidoso and consolidating the functions in Carrizozo. But the sheriff contended the office is essential and gives his department a

broader presence in the county. The sub-office handles about 50 percent of the complaints in the county, he said.

In other issues, the board: —Agreed for more accountability to set up individual budgets for commissioners when the board expands in November from three to five members.

—Restored the \$10,000 annual allocation for the Region IX mental health counseling center, which had been cut to \$5,000.

—Approved the purchase of one additional ambulance.

—Said the county may find other uses for \$3,000 set aside for joint recreation projects with the village of Ruidoso.

"(Ruidoso Mayor Victor) Alonso said the \$3,000 didn't amount to anything and now I read that the village may start charging county residents for recreation and other services," Wynham said. "If Ruidoso thinks \$3,000 is nothing, the counseling center thinks it is something. We may find better uses."

"We could give it to our county library users to pay for their cards," Spencer quipped, referring to a Ruidoso councilor's remark that the village should charge county residents for use of the library.

"They'll take it or do without," Commissioner Monroy Montes said of the \$3,000.

"It may be that some of our commissioners need to talk to the mayor," Wynham said.

Commission gets fired up over tampering accusation

Lincoln County Commissioners bristled Tuesday at the suggestion that illegal tampering had occurred with the proposed budget of the Bonito Fire Department.

Yvonne Lanelli, assistant fire chief, and Lester Lanelli, rescue lieutenant, met with the commission on behalf of chief Howard Puckett, who was out of town.

Mrs. Lanelli said Puckett was very upset that line items had been whited out and changed without his permission on the budget he submitted to the county.

He was so upset that he contacted a lawyer and was told that such tampering could be a fourth degree felony, she said.

That's all county manager Andy Wynham and Commission Chairman Stirling Spencer needed to hear.

"I'm offended," Wynham said. "I'm not sure what you were sent here to do. We've bent over backwards to work with him (Puckett), but he continues to be antagonistic."

"We've gone through this with Mr. Puckett for years," Spencer said. "He's always thought he was getting the short end of the stick on insurance."

Since he took that attitude, the commission decided it did not care to subsidize the fire departments with their insurance costs any longer. The departments receive money from the state for their operation, Spencer pointed out.

For the 1992-93 budget, the county broke out the cost of all types of insurance for each department, but it drove up the cost to the Bonito by more than \$3,000. Wynham decided that impact was too great and reduced the amount, with the county taking up the slack.

Administrative assistant Martha Guevara said she contacted Puckett once about the insurance.

"I thought I had settled it," she said.

"That seems to be the problem," Wynham said. "Every time we think it's settled and then he comes back complaining."

"Originally, we were talking \$7,000 for the insurance and Puckett refused to accept responsibility for it. (Because of a state fire marshal deadline), we had the option to submit it as changed (to the lower figure) or not to submit it at all."

The only significant difference was in the item for insurance. The rest of the changes amounted to

shifting of money from one line item to another to accommodate the insurance change, Guevara said.

Puckett was out of town this week and could not be reached for comment.

The Lanellis said they were not aware of the background on the insurance and did not intend to offend the commission. They said Puckett has been a tremendous positive influence on the department's operation.

"Go back and tell him and if he doesn't agree to this, we can allocate every expense," Spencer said.

Commissioner Bill Elliott said he can understand why Puckett was upset when items were whited out without making him aware of the changes.

"I think Howard doesn't understand that the figure could be \$7,400 instead of \$3,000," Elliott said.

Wynham said in the future, Puckett should contact him directly with any problem.

"The insurance will be \$3,500 instead of \$7,400," he said. "We thought we were doing this for the betterment of the fire department, but I'll be hesitant to try to benefit the department again."

Guy turns down heat on gambling

Governor Bruce King and U.S. Attorney Don Svet appear to be waffling on their strong stand to remove illegal video gambling from Indian reservations in New Mexico.

But the New Mexico Alcohol and Gaming Division has begun the crackdown on service organizations and liquor licensees with video gaming equipment.

King's spokesman, John McKean, said that the proposed May 5 letter to the Indian reservations to cease video gambling was never sent.

"They (King and Svet) never reached an agreement on mutual acceptable language," said John McKean, a spokesman for King. According to McKean, there has been no progress from that point.

FBI raids of five Indian casinos began Tuesday in Arizona. Svet said Tuesday he wants to complete an investigation before taking legal action against gambling operations in New Mexico.

However, off the reservations a different course of action took place. Jerry Manzagol of Regulations and Licensing, said his department sent all state liquor licensees notice to stop permitting commercial gambling on licensed premises.

Commercial gambling includes any game of chance which for a consideration affords the player the opportunity to obtain "anything of value."

The May 5th letter was co-signed by Mary Ann Hughes, Director Alcohol and Gaming Division and Robert Ortiz, Director Special Investigation Division Department of Public Safety.

According to the notice, any licensee who violates New Mexico gambling laws may be charged criminally with a fourth degree felony. The liquor

license also is subject to non-renewal, suspension or revocation and the licensee is subject to fine. New Mexico law permits the seizure of such gambling devices by law enforcement officers.

"We expect all licensees to operate in compliance with New Mexico law," Hughes wrote. "If you have such gambling devices in use at this time, you are advised to immediately remove them from your premises."

Video gambling continues at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, on sovereign land of the Mescalero Indian Tribe.

Manzagol confirmed that litigation by the Indians has been under way for several months.

On April 20, Interior Secretary Manuel Lujan Jr. sent a memo to Bush calling for a halt to the spread of gambling.

Lujan expressed fear that someone would make a campaign issue to blame the current administration for "fasting Indian gaming onto states which profess not to want it."

The backlash from tribal leaders was immediate. They were outraged, accusing Lujan of tampering with Indian sovereign rights to engage in legalized gambling on the federal reservations.

Pressure from a weeklong expose' on illegal video gambling by Albuquerque's KOAT-TV put additional pressure on the governor and U.S. attorney to begin enforcing the state's anti-gambling laws.

King had said the state was free to enforce the state's gaming laws. But Svet hinted early at a softer stance.

"I think we're going to reason a little bit," Svet said. "We've got to do some things before I even go talk with them."

The letter was to be a first step.

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
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

Sayner, Ford and Hightower have been involved with the Warrior golf program since the ninth grade, and improved with each season, making the qualifying rounds this year both stressful and extremely competitive.

Returning for the Warriors next year will be Jeff Chapman who continued to impress as a sophomore. Chapman and Baudo battled for the top spot on the golf team throughout the year as Jeff turned some very impressive scores for a 16-year-old.

Other varsity players returning include sophomores Cantu, Ryan Wall, Jimmy Varnadore, Lance Roe and freshman Scott Christensen.



59 horses vie for the Kansas

Multiple stakes winner Special Task is among the 59 3-year-old Quarter Horses going postward in Thursday's trial races for the \$197,600 Kansas Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

The Grade I Kansas Derby is the first leg of the Triple Crown for 3-year-old Quarter Horses and will be contested at 400 yards. The Kansas Derby finals will be May 31.

Special Task is one of 13 horses entered in the Derby by trainer Jack Brooks, who last week qualified seven of the 10 finalists for the upcoming Kansas Futurity for 2-year-olds.

Last year, Brooks started 14 horses in the Derby trials and qualified two for the finals.

"I have a lot of super horses in this year's trials," Brooks said. "But I think my strongest contenders are Special Task and Steppin For The Moon."

Special Task won the Grade I

West Texas Futurity last year at Sunland Park and the Grade I West Texas Derby this spring in stakes record time. Special Task is only the second horse to win both the West Texas Futurity and Derby. Owned by Ronald Shalz, Ed Cersovsky, and Bobby Cox, Special Task has won five races from nine starts and about \$300,000. Special Task will be ridden by Jacky Martin and will break from the outside eighth post in the fourth race.

Brooks will also saddle Steppin For The Moon who won last year's Rainbow Futurity. Owned by Jerry Wells and Joan Crews Hoyt, Steppin For The Moon has won will also be ridden by Martin and will race from the eight post in the third race.

"Steppin For The Moon qualified for all three futurities (Kansas, Rainbow, All American) and won the Rainbow," Brooks said. "On top of that, he is a son of Moon Lark,

who I won the All-American with in 1978, and Special Te, who made more than \$100,000, that makes him pretty special."

Trainer Don Farris will challenge Brooks with nine derby starters including Sixy Lady and Cowboys Rodeo.



Preakness and Go Together highlight Saturday race card

The Grade I Preakness Stakes from Maryland's Pimlico Racecourse and the Grade III Go Together Handicap share top billing on Ruidoso Downs' 14-race card Saturday.

The \$500,000 Preakness is the second leg of the Thoroughbred Triple Crown and is contested by 3-year-olds racing 1 3/16 miles. Ruidoso Downs' racing fans will be able to wager on the Preakness which will be Ruidoso Downs' seventh race. The \$20,000 Go Together Handicap is for 3-year-old and older Quarter Horse fillies and mares racing 350 yards. The handicap will be the 12th race.

Kentucky Derby winner Lil E Tee and jockey Pat Day are expected to continue their quest for a Triple Crown. The other top four

finishers in the Kentucky Derby will also contest the Preakness while seeking revenge for their Derby losses — Casual Lies, Dance Floor, Conte Di Savoya and Pine Bluff. Technology who was the second favorite behind Arazi in the Kentucky Derby, but finished 10th, will also try to redeem himself in the classic.

Based on her lifetime earnings of \$136,500 and a Grade I victory earlier this year, Shiny Six has been assigned the highweight of 122 pounds for the Go Together Handicap. Shiny Six is trained by Dwayne "Sleepy" Gilbreath and owned by Texans Jerry Whittle and Myrna Rheudasil. Luke Myles will ride the 4-year-old mare and break from the outside 10 post position.

Considering Shiny Six won the

Grade I Las Damas Handicap at Los Alamitos Racecourse in January, it would appear the grey mare is getting better with age. Last year the daughter of Streakin Six won the Grade II Sophomore division of the Quarter Horse Breeders' Classic and qualified for the Grade I All American Derby, but finished last.

"This mare has always been a poor 'doer' (hard to keep weight on)," said Gilbreath, who just recently took over the training of the mare from Blane Schvaneveldt. "She's doing better and getting stronger as she gets older and coming up to the race good."

Shiny Six's Rainbow Derby rival Michelle Leighann will also start in the Go Together. Michelle Leighann finished a strong third in the 1990 Rainbow Futurity.

Rio Grande set to run Friday

Riley Allison Futurity runner-up Whister Queen leads a lineup of 31 2-year-old Thoroughbreds in Friday's five-furlong trials for the \$50,000 (est.) Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity.

The four trials are carded as the 6th, 8th, 11th, and 12th races and are restricted to 2-year-old New Mexico bred. The top-two finishers in each trial and two of the third-place finishers will go on to the May 31 finals.

While most of the Rio Grande entrants are untested first-time starters, Whister Queen has shown some winning potential when she finished second in the Riley Allison Futurity at Sunland Park earlier this month.

"We thought enough of this filly

to supplement her to the Riley Allison for \$7,500," said Jon Arnett, "who trains the chestnut filly for owners John Whisenat Jr. and Calvin Brewster of Albuquerque. "But she had a lot of bad luck in the race with one horse hitting her hard leaving the gate, then another horse cutting her off going into the turn for home."

Arnett is proud of the fact that Whister Queen does not suffer any of the ailments that often plague young horses.

"I spend about an hour and a half a day working on her trying to keep her sound," Arnett said while treating the filly's shins with ultrasound Tuesday morning. "She is also an early foal...born Jan. 3, so she is physically more mature than

most 2-year-olds born later in the spring."

Arnett likes his filly's chances in the Rio Grande trials, but expects several other horses to challenge Whister Queen should she make it into the finals.

"Richard Fry (trainer) has a few horses I expect will make it into the finals that scare me," Arnett said. "He has one horse, Pursuit Of A Crown, who broke his maiden by nine lengths at Sunland Park."



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
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Driver reaction time, unfortunately, has not kept pace with improved performance of the braking system, notes the Car Care Council. 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Cable rates to increase

Capitan cable television subscribers will be seeing a 15 percent increase in their monthly rates this summer.

The Capitan Board of Trustees Monday voted 4-1 to approve a hike in the basic rate from \$13.38 to \$15.50. The total on a customer's bill will include sales tax and a franchise fee charge for a total of \$16.77.

Paul Crown, manager of Lincoln Cablevision, said customers will receive four new stations for their extra money; the Discovery channel, Country Music television, C-Span and the U.S.A. Network.

"This is the lowest rate in New Mexico for a 16 channel cable system," Crown said. The next closest rate is \$18.95, he said.

Customers in Ruidoso receive 26 channels and pay \$21.95, but there is a heavier volume of customers there. He serves 6,000 subscribers in Ruidoso compared to 280 in Capitan, Crown said.

"There is not enough revenue" out of the Capitan system to include some of the channels and buy all new equipment, he said.

He pointed out that by a law

passed in 1984, he could have bypassed the trustees and raised his rates by 5 percent each year. If he had followed that course, the rates over a 10 year period would have reached \$19.19, Crown said.

The last increase granted to the cable company was a 50-cent (slightly less than 4 percent) increase in basic rate in 1991, he said.

Trustee Gordon Ross, who voted against the increase, said some customers would like to see improved service before paying more money.

"We need good service first, a clear picture first, before more channels," Ross said. He presented an informal survey of 15 people at a local function, nine of whom gave the current operation the lowest possible rating.

"It seems the people of Capitan are not well satisfied with cable here now," he said. He added that the dissatisfaction does not extend to Bob Sanders who handles service calls in the area. Crown said the company soon also will have a toll-free telephone number in service.

"I can't transmit any better signal than I receive," Crown told

Ross. With the increase, he plans to install three new satellite dishes to capture signals. The Capitan system's equipment consists of some older pieces previously used in Ruidoso, but they have been rebuilt and are guaranteed, he said.

"There must be some solution, because other places have better pictures," Ross said.

Some spectators told the trustees that they had seen an improvement since last week when some equipment adjustments were completed.

Norman Renfro, a former trustee, said, "I imagine if you asked people, they would rather pay extra than not have cable at all."

Crown said if the increase was not approved, he would go ahead with the allowed 5 percent raise and would not increase the offering from the existing 12 channels.

"That's not a threat," he said. "I just can't invest more into Capitan without more money."

Customers won't see any difference before July 1. "You won't see one without the other," he said, referring to the addition of four channels and the rate increase.

Fired teacher files appeal

Capitan teacher Joel Edwards Monday filed an appeal to his firing last week by the district school board.

After a 12-hour hearing and several hours of deliberation in a closed session, the board voted to uphold the decision to dismiss by School Supt. David Lock.

Edwards was charged with insubordination for allegedly cutting meat in a vocational agricultural course after he was ordered to cease that activity.

Edwards has contended he was given a grace period to finish existing meat cutting obligations. He claims the motive for firing is tied to ill-feeling toward him because of an incident involving the son of a board member and another elected official.

Lock said the two sides have 10 days to agree on an arbitrator to hear the case. If they are unable to find a mutually-acceptable choice, the district judge has five more days to assign one. Within 30 working days from that selection, the hearing must be conducted. The arbitrator then has another 30 days to render a decision.

Two members of the Capitan Board of Trustees Monday balked at voting for new planning and zoning appointments without having an opportunity to meet the candidates and review their backgrounds.

Mayor Frank Warth had proposed the appointment of teacher Myrum Whitaker and Jim Service to the volunteer board.

But Trustee Alfred LeRoy Montes said, "It's hard for me to vote. I don't know them and no one has discussed it with me. I'm not going to vote."

"I feel in the future with appointments, the mayor or the people being considered should come to us."

Trustee Gilbert Montoya said he was unfamiliar with Service and declined to vote on that particular appointment.

Both candidates were approved by Trustees Gordon Ross, L.C. Cozens and Warth.

Dorothy Smith of the Capitan Chamber of Commerce said Service has roots in the community and has earned a master's degree in resource management, which she thought would be particularly helpful in working up zoning maps.

The planning and zoning board is attempting to revamp a proposed zoning ordinance that received a cool reception from area residents last month.

Whitaker was at that meeting and volunteered to serve on the board.

In another matter, the council accepted the resignation of Jan Starnes as municipal clerk. Deborah Cummins will be taking her place, effective June 1.

A farewell reception for the popular Starnes is scheduled for 6-8 p.m., Wednesday, May 27 at city hall.

In her letter, Starnes thanked the board for giving her the opportunity to learn about village government and thanked the village hall staff for its support.

Starnes' husband has been transferred to Roswell.

The trustees took no action on a request from Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane for \$8,000 toward the purchase of new dispatch equipment.

He listed one piece of needed equipment as an additional taping reel for \$10,500 to eliminate down time when switching tapes.

Warth said the county already grabs \$36,505 of the property tax revenue generated by Capitan, leaving the citizens \$9,927. He suggested McSwane ask the county commission for more money.

"We have to maintain our own streets and police department," Montes said. "I think for \$8,000, we could hire a dispatcher, put a ham radio in someone's bedroom."

McSwane reminded the board that the \$36,000 covers much more than services provided by his department. However, his deputies routinely cover for Capitan when it needs backup or when an officer is in training, he pointed out.

Trustees and spectators at the meeting also had a chance to meet Don Dutton and Bill Schwetman, two of the candidates in the June 2 primary for the District 4 seat on the County Commission. The third Republican is Jack King. Democrat Fred Hansen also is running.


Howard Shanks, coordinator for South Central Mountain Resource Conservation and Development, spoke about the community's progress toward the 1984 birthday celebration for Smokey.

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

Balloons and delicious desserts decorated the Capitan high school multi-purpose room Tuesday evening for the spring sports banquet honoring athletes in basketball and track and field.

Coming off successful performances at state track and field competition, players and coaches were enthusiastic and looking forward to a winning season next year.

Principal Darrel Stierwalt acted as master of ceremonies. Two of the first presentations of the evening were Scholar Athlete Awards presented by a representative of the U.S. Army to Jennifer Eldridge and Kyle Traylor.

Coaches Pam Allen and Norman Cline next recognized the seventh and eighth grade girls basketball team, which turned in a terrific 15-2 season.

"They're very talented and I'm looking forward to the next five to six years with them," Allen said.

Cline, helped by assistant Sherry Gowen, called forth the varsity and junior varsity basketball players.

He broke up momentarily when introducing senior Jennifer Eldridge.

"There are some things you don't see on the floor," Cline said. "She's a leader and has the ability to help younger players. I will definitely miss her next year."

Tycie Traylor was the high scorer for the team, averaging 12 points a game and 20 points in the semi-final play.

"At the beginning of the year, this team set a goal to be district champs and they did it," Cline said.

Coach Ed Davis, helped with awards by his wife Nell, said their young seventh and eighth grade boys basketball team was taken

lightly by other schools at first, but soon proved they were scrappers.

Pat Ventura and assistant coach Terry Cox handed out accolades and awards to the varsity and junior varsity basketball players. Ventura thanked the fans.

"They (the players) never quit and you never quit us," he said.

Kyle Traylor was named the most valuable player of the year, having scored 350 points. He also collected awards for the best defensive player and most rebounds. Team member Ernie Gallegos took best offensive player and most free throws while Damian Roybal was recognized for the most assists and being the most improved player.

Allen came back to the microphone to handle girls varsity track and junior high track, the latter coached by Willie Rayby.

Sheryl Dockery was the most improved varsity player for the season, Allen said. She said diminutive Angie Hutchison, an eighth grader, "has the heart of a lion" and will make the school proud in years to come.

Davis took over again to announce awards in boys junior high track, noting that Jason McSwane had run against much older boys from larger school and competed well.

The eighth grade sprint relay team was undefeated all year long against larger schools.

"Their coaches kept saying they would burn out and lose, but they never did," Davis said.

Despite warnings of low interest, 51 boys turned out for track.

"They didn't just come out to take a spot, they did well," Davis said. Instead of awarding the most valuable player trophy to one player, Davis said he intended to inscribe all of the team members' names on the plaque.

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Council cuts out accounting subsidy to Resort Air

Stunned by the Ruidoso village staff's handling of Resort Air funds, a private non-profit incorporation headed by Dick Weber, Councilor Jerry Shaw cautioned against impropriety.

Shaw told councilors at Tuesday's meeting that donations solicited from various individuals and businesses were placed in a village account under the line item Airline Study.

Shaw said the village should not be using its resources to handle private accounts.

Councilor Barbara Duff, a member of the Resort Air committee and the village transportation committee, said it was placed in the village coffers for better accountability. However, Shaw maintained that the village doesn't

maintain any other private organization's books in the village.

A portion of the funds, about \$4,000 from the original \$8,000, has been spent for various reasons including trips by Duff and Weber to Santa Fe for transportation business.

Alonso said that Resort Air was proposed as a viable way to get airline service into Ruidoso. People were asked to donate.

"In an attempt to put everything above board, the people asked would the city handle our money so that nobody would have questions about misappropriations," the mayor said.

"Here's a case where Resort Air and the people organizing it went overboard and asked the village to do something that's not customarily done," he said.

Alonso said the confusion began

when people started donating money. He said some wrote checks to the village, some to Resort Air, some to Dick Weber, and all for the declared purpose of getting another airline service into Ruidoso.

Alonso said there was confusion. He said village attorney David Thomsen asked how the village could transfer the money from the account when some of the money was for an airline study and other people donated to Resort Air.

Alonso said the average donation is \$75-100.

The mayor said that the committee with Weber as chair again is going out into the community and asking for donations.

"I'd like to give the money back (to Resort Air)," said Alonso. "The intent was clear. Why go back and contact 100 people that donated. They've already told us what they

wanted to do with the money. See if we can get an airline in here," said Alonso.

Thomsen, in an inter-office memo to the mayor and council, showed concern over a possible anti-donation clause violation.

"As I understand it, the village has established a fund into which contributions for the development of Resort Air have been placed," Thomsen wrote. "Expenditures have been made, apparently at the direction of the Village Transportation Committee, the Board of Directors of Resort Air or both. In fact, many of the same people serve on both the groups."

Thomsen wrote that a potential anti-donation problem would come about if significant amounts of staff time were spent administering the fund.

"To date, staff time appears to

have been minimal," he wrote. "But if the village continues handling these funds it could get significant and cross over the line."

Thomsen informed the mayor and council that contribution checks have been made to various names and some donations have been received in cash.

"Records have not been kept of to whom the donations were made," Thomsen wrote. He said apparently if the donation sufficiently identified itself to the airline or transportation fund, it was placed into this fund.

"This fact may complicate determinations under the anti-donation clause, as well as those which are quite separate questions under the Procurement Code," he wrote.

Thomsen told the mayor and council that the village was no

longer accepting additional funds for the airline, but was referring donors to Resort Air.

Duff defended the accomplishments of Resort Air.

"We've gone through phase one, which is getting the certificate of incorporation," she said. "And I mean that was no small thing with the state and the way they are. But, besides that the state transportation committee authority has gotten behind it now and we're ready for phase two which is the licensing for the best type of licensing that can be acquired and that is already in the works. All of that has been accomplished with the little amount that has been donated. I think it's wonderful that the state's behind us now."

The council approved giving the money back to Resort Air.

Councilor surprises CVB director with plan for monogrammed chairs

"Chairisma," a public solicitation for folding chairs, surfaced while the mayor was making recommendations for board members during Tuesday's council meeting.

Councilor J.D. James, apparently tipped on the movement, inquired from the mayor how his reappointment recommendation Barbara Westbrook got involved in securing chairs for the Civic Events Center.

Councilor Barbara Duff interrupted James to inform him it was a volunteer service to provide folding chairs for the center.

James said before the purchase, he would like to see what kind of chairs were being considered. He was concerned that they be of commercial quality and appropriate to the center's needs.

Duff indicated volunteers sponsored a program they named Chairisma for the purpose of acquiring padded folding chairs for the benefit of the civic events center. She said the action was taken independent of any guidance of Kathleen Michelena, civic events center director.

Contacted by The News, Michelena confirmed she had not

been contacted prior to the Chairisma movement.

She said it was her understanding that the individual would buy the chair and it would come with their own name tag affixed to the back of each chair.

"These donors would be allowed free admission to the civic center for what ever festivities that particular group had going on," Michelena said.

Asked how she would keep track of 1,000 names if Duff's plan was implemented, Michelena said she didn't know.

"I don't know if they were going to take the chairs home with them or if they thought I had storage space for 1,000 chairs, which I do not," she said.

Asked if she supported such a proposition, Michelena said she wasn't sure what the plan entailed.

"I've never received a written proposal, nor has the purchasing department, or the city manager or the deputy manager, or a suggestion of what the plan may be," she said.

Michelena said there would be a problem on the village's side with liability if the chairs became defective and broke. She said folding chairs are not commercially usable

for the purposes needed at the center.

"It's very hard to dress up a banquet with folding chairs," she said. "But perhaps this entity has different aspirations for these chairs of which I'm not aware."

Michelena said she is planning to purchase stackable chairs, color coordinated with the rugs used in the banquet-meeting rooms. She said these commercial chairs do not suffer the metal fatigue of folding chairs.

Michelena said the same storage considerations also are made for banquet tables.

Asked why the director of the civic events center would be bypassed in the planning and purchasing of such vital equipment needed for the center, Michelena was philosophical.

"They probably mean well," she said.

Michelena said that Duff approached village manager Ron Wicker last year regarding tables and chairs, but not her. She said, however, Duff had told her of a place in El Paso where they could purchase "seconds" in furniture.

"Maybe she's thinking of saving money," Michelena said. "But I think we should stick to quality equipment for the center."

Precinct workers go to school to prepare for June 2 primary

Precinct workers will be going to school this month to train for the June 2 primary in Lincoln County.

Election schools are scheduled for 1 p.m. Monday, May 18, at the county courthouse in Carrizozo and at 1 p.m. Thursday, May 21, at the public library in Ruidoso. The first school was conducted Wednesday in Ruidoso.

Four workers from each of the county's 13 precincts will attend the sessions. County Clerk Martha Proctor

said 6,572 people have registered to vote in the primary.

The Republicans still have the lead with 3,666 registered voters compared to 2,667 Democrats. The 181 independents and 58 minor party registered voters will not be eligible to cast their ballots in the primary.

Registration for the primary closed May 5, but residents can still sign up to vote in the November general election. Forty-one absentee ballots have

been mailed out, 14 have been returned and six people voted in the office, Proctor said.

Absentee ballots can be voted in the office up until 5 p.m. Saturday, May 30. They can be returned by mail until 7 p.m. June 2 when the polls close.

Lincoln County voters will be selected candidates for all county offices, and for the first time will be filling five seats on the county commission.

School board welcomes new administrators

Two new administrators were on hand Tuesday to meet the Ruidoso School Board.

Paul Wirth, the new special services director, and Helene Kobelnyk, White Mountain Intermediate School principal, got a big welcome from the board. The two were among six staff members hired during the regular meeting, and then they were guests of honor at a reception.

Wirth, who will take Karen Tillman's place at the head of special education, comes to Ruidoso from Roswell. Tillman is leaving the Ruidoso system to work as a consultant with Region IX.

"You have some big shoes to fill," Board President Lynn Willard told Wirth.

Kobelnyk will take over as principal at White Mountain Intermediate, replacing long-time principal Donnie Weems who is the new Ruidoso High School principal.

Both of the new administrators were selected through a process that involved the board, administration and site-school staffs. Superintendent Mike Gladden thanked his staff for carrying out

the extensive and exhaustive process.

"They wanted to get the best," said Gladden, noting that all the finalists were very high quality candidates.

Also hired during Tuesday's

Kim Graham, who just completed her student teaching in the Ruidoso system, was hired as a sixth grade teacher, replacing Steve Havil, who is transferring to eighth grade.

Lynn Rogers was hired as speech therapist, filling the position left vacant by the retirement of Caron Crane Tingley.

Nora Ernest, CPA, was hired as payroll technician in the central office.

The board accepted Tingley's resignation/retirement with regret; and accepted the resignations of cafeteria worker David Lucero and RHS head custodian Louis Zeller.

Gladden announced that a community meeting will be conducted at 7 p.m. Wednesday, May 20, to discuss adding soccer and baseball to the school sports program.

The meeting, which will be an open forum, but not an official School Board meeting, will be in the community meeting room at

Ruidoso High School.

"We're not planning to increase the athletic budget," said Gladden, explaining that he has many requests each year to add those two sports to the school's sports offerings.

"My philosophy is that I eventually would like to offer to students a full spectrum of extracurricular activities," said Gladden. The meeting will be the first step in assessing the community's willingness to support a program.

Gladden said if the programs are initiated, it probably will be one at a time, to both girls and boys, and just at the high school level.

Ruidoso Middle School teacher Dean Hood, who works as a volunteer with the soccer program, said the outside program has been able to keep youngsters interested through middle school.

Such programs are seen as a way to involve more students and reduce the spread of drug abuse and gang activities.

Vida Rae raised two of daughter Rexene's children who attended the celebration:



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



Lawlessness is out of order in LA, Ruidoso

If 56 blows in 81 seconds isn't excessive force, then what is? If a shootout on Sudderth Drive in Midtown isn't violent, then what is?

Violence in America just got a thumbs up from one jury of 12 people in Simi Valley, California. Whatever the color of the victim and perpetrators in the well-documented Los Angeles videotape, the truth is that a man was brutally beaten and kicked by four police officers. They ignored the opportunity to restrain their suspect with handcuffs and took turns beating him. It was recorded for all the world to see.

Justice was not served by that jury verdict, and the city of Los Angeles is not looking out for its citizens when the mayor allows the police chief whose officers brutalized a suspect to remain in his job.

Somehow this nation and its people have to quit accepting violence in the family, in the schools and in the streets. That could mean turning off the television, staying away from movies based on violence and it could include learning new ways to deal with anger and frustration.

What we're seeing on the streets of LA was experienced here in Ruidoso last year on a smaller scale during the Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally when lawbreakers outnumbered police officers by such great numbers that no arrests were made in spite of speeding, public intoxication, public nudity and an exchange of gunfire. Lawbreaking and violence got the thumbs up in Ruidoso, too, when such behavior was allowed to continue throughout an entire weekend.

Police brutality is wrong and shouldn't be tolerated, but lawlessness, too, is wrong and shouldn't be accepted.

The Golden Aspen Rally, sponsored by Village Councilor Ron Andrews is scheduled September 16-20, in Ruidoso's soon-to-be completed Civic Events Center. We keep hearing that this year will be different, but a lot of Midtown business people want to be sure that they won't see a repeat of last year's melee. Some say we should call in the National Guard since the lawless can be expected to, again, outnumber the law enforcement officers.


Even as an ad-hoc special events committee is still at work on how to handle such public events, with the mayor at one time saying the future of the motorcycle rally should be left up to voters in a referendum, Councilor Andrews has printed and distributed his brochure announcing this year's rally with headquarters in the Civic Events Center. His brochure says, in part: "Ruidoso builds the rally a new home!! The new Ruidoso Civic Events Center is rally headquarters."

Could this be why the nicely-planned small civic center with meeting rooms and carpet on the floor was expanded into a huge big building? Now we know why we built the civic center.

Will our new civic events center have a place to check weapons at the door? Will there be grease traps in the floor in case any of the 'cyclists' big, expensive machines leak? Maybe a tattoo exhibit can be set up next door at White Mountain Elementary School, and maybe The Links will sponsor a golf tournament with a real shotgun start.

We want the "family" type motorcycle riders to continue to visit and enjoy our fine village and our brand new civic events center. But, if the "fringe" element is allowed to run amuck as they did last year, then these "mom and pop" motorcycle enthusiasts won't feel safe here, and will bypass the Golden Aspen Rally.

The mayor and council should meet immediately with their ad hoc committee and devise a plan to assure the safety and well being of locals and visitors during the rally and all special events.

Who draws lines for a nuclear community?

TO THE EDITOR:

In a recent letter Mr. Fredrick Peso the MRS Project Manager for the Mescalero tribe stated that the letter I wrote to you was filled with incorrect information. Mr. Peso states that the communities "around" an Indian reservation are eligible for "economic incentives" associated with hosting an MRS. I request at this time that Mr. Peso provide Southwest Nuclear Alert (SWNA) in writing a document from the DOE stating that the cities and counties (other than the Mescalero reservation) surrounding Mescalero are considered community and what the exact benefits are.

I will state for the record that I have confirmed through the Nuclear Waste Negotiator's office on April 30, that the reservation has not entered into negotiations with them as of this date. They are currently negotiating with the DOE. The DOE spokesman for the MRS has repeatedly confirmed to SWNA that the Village of Ruidoso and surrounding cities and counties are not considered community.

Mr. Peso continues with "The Apache Tribal Council has assured the local community they will receive an equitable role and share in these federal benefits." I wonder what "an equitable role" is. Does it mean that the Village, County or

State Governments will be allowed to participate in the management and monitoring of the facilities operation and safety procedures?

I find this hard to believe—but I encourage Mr. Peso to put in writing just exactly what the surrounding communities "equitable role" will be.

I welcome the chance to educate Mr. Peso on the "kill zone" issue and the safety record of transportation of nuclear waste in this country. SWNA has collected file drawers full of articles from Los Alamos, Sandia Labs, the DOE and GAO as well as national environmental groups indicating just what the "kill zones" for nuclear waste accidents are. A recent GAO (Gov't Accounting Office) report states that the casks purchased from PACNUC for shipments to WIPP are defective due to welding problems (just one example).

We have also collected documentation on accidents within the trucking industry where fuel rods being carried in "safe casks" have occurred. The most recent was in Springfield, Massachusetts, in December of 1991. I will be glad to provide the Ruidoso News with copies of all of these articles for proof of the facts.

Mr. Peso states that the MRS facility will not be explosive, but he

fails to point out what a silent killer it will be. Radioactive waste can't be seen, smelled or detected without the monitoring equipment. After exposure you will begin to feel ill, experience nausea, break out with red skin "burns" and depending upon the level of contamination it is possible that the final memory you will have is a taste of copper in your mouth.

I can't believe that Mr. Peso would dare to compare this type of facility to a local grocery store and the toxic chemicals you may find in products sold. At this point he should know the difference between toxic chemicals and spent fuel rods.

There has never been an operating MRS facility. The GAO has found and documented that virtually all utilities are capable of storing on-site all wastes generated over the lifetime of each plant. I am not sure where Mr. Peso gets his information about "40 years of this type of storage."

At the Western Governor's Association Conference held in Las Vegas, Nevada, in November of 1991 the members issued a policy statement stating: "The western governors oppose the location of an MRS only in a state for waste not generated in West, because such location would fail to minimize the system-wide impacts of transportation of spent fuel from nuclear power reactors to an MRS."

My first letter was filled with facts and this letter is filled with a few more. I only wish Mr. Peso and his tribal council associates could look past the billions of dollars the federal government is offering and use the common sense he claims to have and listen to the pleas of their own people, the state and local government and their neighbors.

Is it possible that the federal government may really be General Custer after the last revenge?

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Conservationists take their classroom into the outdoors

Students from Ruidoso, Capitan, Carrizozo and Hondo converged on the Cedar Creek Group Campground last week as part of 1992 Conservation Days.

The New Mexico State Forestry and the U.S. Forest Service sponsored a two-day event for fifth graders.

The students rotated among seven outdoor stations where they heard about conservation of natural resources.

Topics of the 20-minute sessions were tree measurement, covered by

Cameron Martinez and Clay Garrison of the Bureau of Land Management (BLM); tree identification, handled by Barbara Luna and Bill Duemling of the state forestry; archaeology discussed by Marty Tagg and Rita Moots of the forest service; soil conservation, handled by Greg Haussler of the Soil Conservation Service, Howard Shanks of the Southcentral Mountain Resource Conservation and Development and interagency biologist Robert Schmidt; and wildlife conservation, covered by Ben Hanson and Ron

Moore of State Game and Fish.

Fire management was tackled by Dusty Voss of the BLM; Diana Person, Steve Makowski, Ira Castor, Tom Guck and Bill Tucker, all of the forest service; and Roby Hall, Justin Shaw, Jerry Paiz and Chet Southard of the Ruidoso Fire Department.

Steve Daly of the BLM discussed watershed management.

Lynn Hutchison of the state forestry coordinated the program with Peg Crim of the forest service, with the help of forest service volunteer Joe Kumaski.

The Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District helped offset the cost of the buses.
