## Gunman terrorizes campers

A man clothed only in an unfastened red bathrobe roamed through Eagle Creek Campground Sunday morning shouting insults and shooting at more than a dozen campers.

After twice warning the man to put down his pistol, Lincoln County Deputy Sheriff Hal R. Dew fired two shots with his rifle, wounding the man once in his left hip.

The man then laid down his 22 caliber handgun and was taken by ambulance to the Lincoln County Medical Center, where he was treated and turned over to the New Mexico State Police, according to Sheriff James McSwane.

No one else was injured.

Wesley D. Bruce, 66, from El Paso, Texas, has been charged with several counts of aggravated assault with a firearm and with aggravated assault with intent to commit a violent felony on a police officer.

His bond was set at \$1-million, McSwane said. He is being treated with anti-depressants in jail.

Dew said Bruce was a disabled veteran who was on medication and apparently was drinking before the incident. He had been camping alone for several days at Eagle Creek, which is located on the Mescalero Apache Reservation.

McSwane said Dew was the first officer at the scene and what he saw the situation, took

appropriate action.

"It was the only recourse he could have taken," the sheriff said. "It was a completely justified shooting and he is to be commended."

According to campers who allegedly were threatened, chased and shot at by the gunman, the hour-long incident began about 11 a.m.

Bruce walked into a campsite near his own trailer, waved a gun and ordered David Ashkazari to build a fire for him. He began shooting his handgun indiscriminately, then wandered into other campsites, repeating the threats and firing.

Mary Ann Tovar said she heard Bruce tell some campers, "You all want to die. I'll kill you son-of-bitches."

Nasser Yazdi said that at one point, one of the park managers fired his gun into the air near Bruce, giving David Ashkazari a chance to run when the man turned around.

Bruce allegedly pointed his gun directly into the face of Al Hernandez from El Paso and fired six times, but the chamber was empty.

"He was talking to my brother-in-law and came right up to me," Hernandez said.

As campers fled up the mountain, Bruce piled into his truck and chased them, then he returned to the Hernandez campsite and rammed the family's pickup truck. The axle of Bruce's truck lodged on a boulder. He jumped out and fired five shots into the empty

Hernandez truck, according to the witnesses.

Delia Guynes from Snyder, Texas, said she and her sister-in-law, Mary Ann Tovar, heard the shots while they were in the campground restrooms.

"After I saw him cursing (at the Ashkazari family), telling them to get out of here and shooting at them, I went to report it," said Guynes. "When I told the (park manager), a person was shooting up there and it might be blanks or might be real bullets, he said to this other person 'What do you think, shall I call his wife?' Like he's done this before or something. I said you better hurry, but hee just stood there."

"He said the man had camped there 20 years."

Guynes said later when the manager couldn't get Bruce to calm down, he went to campsites telling people to be careful and to stay away from the gunman.

"But anything that crossed that man's path, he was going to shoot, people or trucks," she said.

Yazdi also went to the gate to report the shooting.

"I told the guy you better call a ranger because this guy is shooting and he said, 'Aw, this old man he drink whiskey and think he's a killer. He's crazy, don't worry.'"

"Later he came to us and said be careful, the

## It's a long way from the river to your sink

Water, water everywhere and yes it's fit to drink, thanks to Ruidoso water department head Richard Sanchez and chief plant operator Gary Kite.

Recently, the New Mexico Water and Wastewater Association, Southwest Section, recognized Ruidoso and its Alto Crest Water Facility with the President's Award, presented for the most improved facility in 1991.

Village water wasn't always a brag point. In fact, last year, about the time village manager Ron Wicker was hired, the department problems had grown to a critical stage.

Residents remember numerous problems in quality, quantity and costs. Wicker's background in utilities was a prime reason for his appointment. It appears the village

council was rewarded.

Wicker said water and sewer are two of any city's main functions. Yet, no one wants to hear from a water department unless a tap is turned on and nothing comes out.

Ruidoso's water comes from two sources, Eagle Creek wells and Alto Lake.

Eagle Creek wells do not require a lot of treatment. Most of the year, Ruidoso uses Alto Lake treated water, snow melt from the ski area.

"There are times of heavy runoff," said Wicker. "When silt and cloudy characteristics in the water will cause a markiness in the water. During these times, it takes a sophisticated process to settle and separate the solids."

Wicker said when such water is taken from Alto Lakes, a chemical is introduced, the water is agitated in troughs, cleansed in a settling

filter and then cleansed again in a final filter that converts it into drinking water.

Wicker said last year some of the mechanical equipment in the \$2-million dollar facility was either broken or wasn't working properly because it had not been serviced for some years.

It was producing water, but it wasn't producing as good of quality water as it could, Wicker said.

At times, the water department was limited to using only the higher quality water from the Eagle Creek wells. The new improvements allow a lower quality of water to be improved with the same care does not limit the same of water.

"Today we have a fixed working like it was originally designed to work, and received an award for our efforts," Wicker said.

The plant is open day and night and is operated by three people: Kite, Steve Porter and Leonard Sanchez.

A control panel spits out data regarding quality control and the plant is outfitted with a laboratory tests.

Lines leading from the water plant also are in need of repair to make it more efficient according to Wicker. And although 2 million gallons of water poured out of Ruidoso from the plant last year, it wasn't always pouring out in the right places.

Village Councilor Ron Wicker would regularly report that much good water was being lost was a crucial first step in the

Wicker said many of the problems have been identified and fixed and to date, 48 leaks have been repaired. Wicker said.



gallons per minute, have been located. Nearly 10 million gallons of water a month can be saved, according to Wicker.


Wicker said the 10,000 square foot Alto Crest is the only treatment plant in Ruidoso at this time, although another plant is currently

being repaired. "We want backups," said Wicker. Currently, Alto Crest pumps two major 5-million gallon holding tanks. Another 4-million gallons serve other ground tanks. Gravity then provides the pressure to service the community.


In the height of season, the community may use up to 4-million gallons per day.

guy had gone crazy and we should wait for Indian reservation and state police to show up."

Lauri Ashkazari and her husband, David, also thought Bruce might be shooting blanks until he shot at her husband after ordering him to build a fire.

The family began to run, but Lauri said her four-year-old daughter was hysterical and clinging so tightly to her leg, that it was difficult.

"We're so lucky he was so old he couldn't aim good," Mrs. Ashkazari said.

"At first we never thought we'd

be in danger. We thought he'd stay at the other campsite and that the police would get here right away. But it took one and a half to two hours for someone to do something."

Sukbong Yun from California said the gunman walked into his camp and ordered him to build a big fire.

"I said OK, OK, and bring wood for him," Yun said. "Then I come back and try to run away (by starting the motor of his recreational vehicle). He come and said, 'Where you going?' I opened the door and run away and he chase me. He shot at me four or five times, pow, pow."

"Then the (deputy) stop him. He say put the gun down. (The man) didn't. He say put the gun down

and (the man) still wouldn't. (The deputy) go pow, shoot. The man gets shot twice and puts the gun down."

"I thank the good lord, I didn't get killed."

Bruce allegedly continued to shoot at people even after the deputy called to him, campers said.

At one point, Randall Galles of Snyder, Texas, said he tried to disarm Bruce.

"I was down at the trailer talking to him for about an hour the night before," Galles said. "Then this morning he walks into our camp calling our wives bad names (ethnic slurs). I confronted him. I went right up to him."

But Bruce pulled out a pocket knife and threatened Galles. Then he shot six times at Galles' new Ford Tempo, hitting it once.

Hyesuk Galles said she told her husband to get away from the man and they began to run with their children. The man attempted to chase them in his truck.

Elisa Galles, 13, an eighth grader from El Paso, said she was frightened.


"At first, we thought it was blanks, he was shooting every where. He pointed the gun at my father and my uncle," she said.

After wounding the suspect, Dew started down the mountain with Bruce in the patrol car. He was met by an ambulance about one mile down the road.

"It's unfortunate," Dew said. "He's a retired disabled American veteran who was on medication and whiskey."

Mrs. Ashkazari looks at it differently.

"We're so lucky," she said. "He shot at us six times over two hours. I want to see him prosecuted."

# Mittens will warm your heart

Gray mittens cover her front paws and sprays of gray accent her nose and chest.

"It wasn't hard coming up with the name of Mittens for her," said Randy Basch, manager of the Lincoln County Humane Society.

A Chesapeake bay retriever-wire hair terrier mix, Mittens was brought to the shelter as part of a litter months ago. Her personality and markings caught the attention of shelter workers.

"Mittens is about six months old and good with everybody," Basch said. "She's a high energy dog and would do well in a home with kids to throw a ball and take her out running."

Although she is not fully housebroken, her cage generally is neat and she learns quickly.

"She's intelligent and everything should fall into place once she has a house of her own," Basch said.

Full-grown, Mittens will weigh about 30-35 pounds. She will need to be spayed.

All cats and dogs adopted from the shelter must be spayed or neutered to ensure they do not reproduce more unwanted animals that might later have to be destroyed.

Contributing to the shelter's spay and neuter fund, which is reserved only for animals who are candidates for adoption, is one of the best and most direct ways of helping the abandoned animals at the shelter. The donation can be earmarked for a particular animal.

The altering procedure is the most expensive portion of the adoption fee. The chances of adoption are greatly enhanced for a sponsored animal.

In the cattery next door to the main shelter, Zoro, a big black, friendly tomcat, waits for a new home.

Zoro and a look-alike named Midnight, were brought into the shelter as strays. They are about three years old and sport the moon-face associated with adult male cats.

Basch said males, once neutered, generally are more affectionate than females. Either one of these two would be a great pal to come home to in the evening after a hard day at work.

## BEWARE OF QUILLS

With the advent of warm days and cool evenings, owners need to be especially careful to keep their

dogs under leash control or confined in a fenced yard while outdoors.

One of the biggest threats to a curious dog is the porcupine.

If a dog comes in contact with the porcupine's quills, it may become enraged by the pain and disoriented, Basch said. Often, the animal will not return home. Sometimes the condition is bad enough that the dog can't eat or drink.

Unless an owner is trained in removing quills, it may be best to take the pet to a veterinarian, especially if the quills are located around the eyes or mouth. The vet can remove the quills while the dog is under anesthesia.

"If the owner removes the quills, he might miss some," Basch said. "They can get in the back of the throat or they can keep working their way under the skin, causing an infection that could eventually kill the dog."

Dogs brought to the shelter with quills will receive treatment, but the owners remain financially responsible for the care under Ruidoso village ordinance. Failure to provide treatment for an animal in that condition could result in a fine of \$300, Basch pointed out.

"So often I hear owners blaming the dog, calling it stupid for getting hit with quills again, but the solution is simple," Basch said. "If a dog is properly confined, that won't happen."

A less threatening, but extremely annoying adversary is the skunk. "The spray can burn a dog's eyes, but not do permanent

damage," Basch said. "A tomato juice bath probably is the best antidote."

"People also should remember that raccoons and skunks are the primary transmitters of rabies."



## Weight Loss Surprises Researchers

WASHINGTON — A nutrition organization was hopeful that a nutritionally complete "hi-tech" food tablet would help erase world hunger problems, until a study revealed that one of the ingredients could cause significant weight loss.

Although other studies and scientists may not agree, researchers in Europe found that the ingredient, a natural plant colloid, actually caused people to lose weight, even though specifically instructed not to alter normal eating patterns, according to one study published in the prestigious *British Journal of Nutrition*. Researchers in an earlier study had speculated that the weight loss was due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calories.

# New EDC director feels right at home

Under the direction of a new director, the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County may be on its way off the inactive list.

The future named Karen Kopp the new director last month, but had to finalize details before announcing she will begin her responsibilities on June 1.

Kopp served as a temporary assistant under former director George Puckett, and she said she has always had an interest in economic development.

She is originally from California and had served as a purchasing supervisor for five years with a federal government contractor. She purchased components for manufacturing, worked with a team to create proposals and kept up with the pricing of items and how much more of the product was needed to complete a job. As the department supervisor, Kopp also got her workers on to computers.

Kopp also earned her certified purchasing management certificate by going to school while working in this position. She moved to Ruidoso in 1989 with her husband, Scot Muhn, and they now own Ruidoso Printing.

During the last two and a half

years, Kopp has also been a counselor for the New Mexico Procurement Assistance Program to educate New Mexico businesses on how to sell to all levels of government, federal, state and local.

"The main purpose of this is to keep money in our own state to help our own economy," she said.

Kopp was based in Roswell so had to commute to her office and also organized workshops once a month in Roswell, Carlsbad, Hobbs and Clovis and once each quarter in Ruidoso. She helped businesses understand such things as federal specifications or where to start in a bid packages. One project she has been active in recently was helping clients with 8(a) applications to be certified as a socially and economically disadvantaged business.

She also worked closely with the Air Force bases in New Mexico and the Small Business Administration personnel and programs. Kopp said she can draw on her knowledge in these areas to help businesses in Ruidoso.

"Economic development has always intrigued me. I like people and business so this position fills both of these," she said.

"Because EDC's mission is to get business to locate in the area I would also like to take an active role in helping businesses here. I would like to get workshops and help from SBA," Kopp said.

She said she is excited to begin in the position, especially since she will no longer have to commute.

"I like Ruidoso and I would like to see it grow. Being a business owner I have a vested interest in this community," she said.

Current EDCLC president Ronnie Paulger said since she is a local person they knew she was committed to the community. He said they decided to hire her for several other reasons including her working knowledge of governmental programs and her ability to continue to work with the government.

"In interviews and reviews of her application we found she was very enthusiastic, a self-starter and very deliberate in completing a pro-

ject," he said.

Paulger said it is important that she has these qualities because there is not much supervision on a daily basis. He said Kopp also has excellent communication skills and could deal with prospects on all levels, from a small shop to a corporation with a multi-million dollar project.

Since the corporation has been without a director since the resignation of Anita Sanders in November, they had to put a lot of things on the back burner, Paulger said.

Kopp will have to get up and running on new prospects and get the committees going again. Another priority will be to get the funding sources lined out, he said.

Paulger said he doesn't think the months of inactivity will hurt Kopp's ability to perform the duties.

"It's just a fact of life. If a ship loses its captain it will wander off course. We are in this for the long haul. A few months without a director is insignificant to what we want to accomplish. We wanted to make sure we had the right person, and I think it was worth the wait," Paulger said.

Kopp will get a formal introduction to all the EDCLC board members at the monthly meeting May 28.

proceeds from the sale to purchase uniforms for its members. The uniforms cost has been estimated in excess of one thousand dollars.



## Warriors earn two track titles

Two Ruidoso track stars were crowned state champions Saturday at the state competition in Albuquerque, while several others had outstanding performances.

Monica Martinez, a junior, came off a district championships to win the girls discus with a throw of 120 feet, six inches to beat out Sheila Hoover of Goddard at 117-7. This distance is a new record by five inches for her.

Although a foot short of his record, Shane Eidson also won a title at the state meet in the shot put. He threw 53-6 1/2 at the meet, but had reached 54-8 at the district meet just a week ago. The distance was all it took to beat Brian Smith of Raton who barely broke 52 feet. The meet was a return trip for Eidson who placed fourth in the shot put last year.

Also improving their records over last year's performance were Luisa Tam, Sarah Dix and Eric Evans. Tam finished second in both the 1600 meter run and the 3200

meter, improving her 1600 meter finish by two places and the 3200 finish by three. Her time in the 1600 of five minutes, 22.58 seconds was a new school record, but her competitor, Stephanie Milam of Bloomfield, set a state record at 5:13.29.

Dix, a sophomore, earned a third place in the long jump with a distance of 16-8 3/4, after finishing fourth last year. Evans won second place in the 110 meter high hurdles in a time of 14.66, an improvement from his sixth place finish as a sophomore.

The girls 800 meter relay team of Catrina Gabaldon, Natasha Mulqueen, Rachelle Holstein and Kristie Ryan crossed the finish line sixth as did Keith Henson in the high hurdles. Nick Nanz also earned a sixth place medal in the 1600 meter run. The boys 1600 meter relay team of Anthony Torres, Jackie Lynn, Louis Jimenez and Evans won fifth place in a time

of 3:29.25. Lynn also placed sixth in the 800 meter run.

In team stands the girls finished seventh with 22 points, behind district powerhouses Oñate in first with 75 points; Silver, third with 48 points and Deming fifth with 30 points. The boys placed ninth with 18 points, while Belen captured the title with 41 points.

Coach Ronny Maskew said he thought the Warriors did well considering they were up against athletes from 31 teams. He said they were extremely pleased to have two state champions this year.

"They all did a great job. We were real pleased with everyone, and they really had to do a good job to get to state," Maskew said.

Some of the schools that scored well such as Oñate, Goddard and Deming also have double and triple the enrollment. Maskew said the Warriors had a lot of good individual performances, but didn't have the depth these schools did.

## Downs set for holiday weekend

Ruidoso Downs will offer a special week of racing and promotions in celebration of Memorial Day.

The week will begin Wednesday, May 17, with the Sports Theater hosting simulcast horse racing from The Downs at Santa Fe at Albuquerque.

Racing returns to Ruidoso Downs on Thursday with 11 live races and two races simulcast from California's Hollywood Park. Thursday's featured ninth race is a six-furlong starter allowance for 4-year-old and older Thoroughbreds.

The weekend is highlighted by the Norgor Derby trials on Friday; the Fine Loom Handicap, Governor's Handicap and the \$38,600 Kansas Futurity Consolation on Saturday; the \$254,000 Grade I

Kansas Futurity on Sunday; and the \$60,000 Rio Grande Futurity on Monday.

Several other activities are planned in conjunction with the holiday-week program.

Saturday, May 23, someone could leave Ruidoso Downs racetrack driving a new customized 1500 Chevrolet Pickup and/or pack home \$100,000. The prizes are part of a scratch card promotion limited to mailing list patrons.

Saturday evening is the Museum of the Horse Opening Gala held at the new museum located just east of the racetrack. The gala includes dinner, dancing, and a "Parade of Horse Breeds". Tickets for the gala are \$20 for Museum members and \$35 for non-members.

The Museum is home for the multi-million dollar Ann Stradling Collection — an accumulation of horse related paraphernalia ranging from buggies and exotic saddles, to fine paintings and elegant Victorian furniture.

Although Ruidoso Downs ordinarily doesn't race on Monday, the mountain track will offer a special Monday, Memorial Day program. Monday's card will be highlighted by the rich finals of the Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity for 2-year-old Thoroughbreds racing five furlongs. Also on tap for Memorial Day is the simulcast of the Grade I \$500,000 Metropolitan Mile from Belmont Park in New York.

### Christian Don stays honest

Consistent campaigner Christian Don remained honest to his owner/trainer Sunday by winning the featured New Mexico-Bred Invitational Handicap.

Christian Don and jockey Chris Zamora won the six-furlong race with a burst of speed down the stretch, winning by an easy four lengths.

"I knew if he could get a good break from the gate he would be right there," said owner/trainer Bob Hirst of Roswell. "He's an honest horse and always tries."

Hirst said he can always count on the gelding to be close. The 6-year-old gelding has won 20 percent of his races and runs in the money 50 percent of the time.

Christian Don stopped the clock at 1:10.1 and paid \$5.80 to win, \$3.20 to place and \$3.20 to show.

Like Christian Don, Kay's Joker and jockey Eric Perner made a late charge to snag second place, two lengths over Draconic's Moon.

Kay's Joker paid \$6 to place and \$6.20 to show. Draconic's Moon paid \$6.80 to place.

Racing will resume at Ruidoso Downs Wednesday with the Sports Theater hosting simulcast races from The Downs at Santa Fe from Albuquerque.

Sunday's ontrack attendance was 2,612, for a total attendance of 3,338.

Ontrack wagering was \$220,339, for a total handle of \$367,320.

## No excuses needed for Ima Ladys Alibi in Saturday's race

Several fractious horses caused a delay in the start of Saturday's \$20,000-added Go Together Handicap Saturday. This caused concern for jockey Steve Fuller aboard Ima Ladys Alibi in the first post position.

Fuller's concern was for naught, however, when Ima Ladys Alibi left the starting gate like a bullet to win the Grade III Go Together Handicap by an easy length.

"I was concerned about how long we had to stand in the gate being in the one hole (post)," Fuller said following the 350-yard race. "We waited so long she acted like she was falling asleep on me."

Because Quarter Horse races are so short, a sharp start is critical to winning. The number nine horse, Shineys Rebel, delayed the race when he refused to enter the starting gate. Several other horses acted

up further delaying the start by several minutes.

"Much to my surprise she broke like a shot out of a cannon," Fuller added. "She raced on her own, I never had to push her."

The winner's wire-to-wire victory came at the expense of 6-5 favorite Shiny Six and jockey Luke Myles. Although Shiny Six carried three more pounds than Ima Ladys Alibi, trainer Dwayne "Sleepy" Gil-

breath, didn't believe the added weight was the reason his mare was beaten by a 6-1 shot.

"She had no excuse," Gilbreath said following the race. "She broke good and was just plain outrun."

Owned by Georgie Shipley, Carol Addison and Helen Wood of Seagraves, Texas, Ima Ladys Alibi covered the 350 yards in 17.53 seconds. The chestnut filly paid her supporters \$14.40 to win, \$4.60 to

place and \$4.20 to show. Shiny Six finished 1 1/2 lengths in front of Ten Dollar Socks and paid \$3.40 to place and \$3.20 to show. Ten Dollar Socks paid \$5.60 to show.

Trained by Jack Brooks and ridden by Jacky Martin, Vital Class hustled the 400 yards in 19.86 seconds to win the second race. Four

other horses from the second race also qualified for the finals: Disco Sheza, who finished second behind Vital Class by almost two lengths; Six A Pass; Fresh N Easy; and Montego Dash.

Vital Class was bred, and is owned, by Clarence Scharbauer, Jr. of Midland, Texas, and paid \$4 to win, \$3 to place and \$2.40 to show.

Martin's, Brooks' and Scharbauer's luck ran out in the seventh trial. The trio's horse Easily Twelve won the seventh race, but did so

bucking a head win and failed to post a top-10 time.

Also caught off guard by a head wind in the third race was Brooks' Steppin For The Moon, who at 1-5 was the second shortest priced horse of the seven trials.

While several pre-race favorites failed to make the cut, two longshots slipped into the finals — Kelleys Special Girl, winner of the first race, and first Down Doll, winner of the fifth race.

The betting public overlooked

Kelleys Special Girl who had never raced before. The filly, however, ousted the heavily favored Sixty Lady to win at odds of 30-1.

Those who know her say she is neat and helpful but she likes things to go just her way and doesn't like to be told what to do. As a result, Elizabeth needs extra help with her behavior. She has spent some time in the children's psychiatric hospital and the intensive therapy resulted in enough improvement so that she could join her brother in his foster home in August. Elizabeth was in a regular second grade class last year and got good grades but special education classes may be needed if her emotional and behavior problems get in the way of her continuing to do well. In the past, Aaron and Elizabeth have not had the nurturing and parental control they required. A small Native American two-parent family would be best for them. Their social worker feels that some knowledge of behavior modification techniques would be helpful and the family would be expected to continue in therapy with the children. Tuning in to TV hasn't always been considered a good way for kids to learn about the world around them, but with the creation of Channel One several years ago more schools have started each day with a television program.

Ruidoso High School and middle school have had Channel One for three years, since the 1989-90 school year, and those watching it have seen both sides of the sometimes controversial program. Channel One is a 12-minute daily news production of Whittle Communication Inc. of Knoxville, Tennessee, with two minutes of that reserved for commercials.

Generally, the program starts with two young newscasters giving a summary of major events from the past day, such as elections or economic news. It then shows a fast fact on a topic before showing the first commercial, which has become the controversial part of the production.

After the commercial, they do a segment following a weekly theme. The program may end with a commercial and a preview on the next day's program.

Superintendent Mike Gladden said when the school board made the decision to implement the program, they thought it was important to expose students to current events at their own level. It is also a quality presentation, he said.

"We felt it was appropriate for our students," Gladden said.

When Channel One first came on the market it had some controversial aspects, he said. These programs are paid for by sponsors of hot items for kids, like Nike shoes, Gladden said, and some people thought this was a bombardment of status symbols. The board

discussed it, but if students open up a magazine or turn on a TV they see it too, he said.

"We didn't think it was a big enough concern to stop kids from getting the program," he said.

TVs were allocated to the schools at one per 25 students, which allows them to have a television set in almost every room. In the first hour of the day 12 minutes are set aside for the program in a homeroom situation in the middle school and in the regular classroom at the high school.

Teachers feel it is effective and important, and it isn't one of those programs they want to see done away with, Gladden said.

"I have heard no negative comments on it (Channel One) since we initiated its use here," he said.

High school principal Mike Kakuska, who has testified against Channel One at federal hearings in Washington D.C., said they have not done a formal survey of how students feel, but it does have some merits. How effective it is, is hard to tell, he said. The programs are usually good, and the students can get good information, Kakuska said, but the commercials may be setting a precedent in public education that isn't beneficial.

Channel One was installed at the high school with the enticement of free television monitors, Kakuska said. Some teachers at that time decided they were not interested in having it so a small number of rooms don't have monitors to watch the program, he said.

Part of the contract with Channel One requires that the school have the monitors on each day at that time or they will take the hardware out, Kakuska said.

The teachers all receive a Channel One guide stating what the

theme will be each week and how different subject teachers can use the information. High school librarian Judy Radtke said they also get a schedule of special programs on what is called the classroom channel, that teachers can have taped to use at a later time. Some of these have been really good, she said.

One program featured high school students in the United States and high school students in the former Soviet Union talking to each other and asking questions in a live broadcast. They also did one with a school in Japan and a school in Irving, Texas. One program featured West Mesa High School in Albuquerque.

"Some teachers like it, some don't. They can use the schedule to see what it has to offer," Radtke said.

"Most teachers use Channel One and don't have any complaints about it. It's a new project, and there isn't that much hard data on it," Kakuska said.

One study recently commissioned by Whittle has produced some hard data that may not be good news for Channel One. The study, done by independent researchers, was reported on in the April 24 edition of the Wall Street Journal.

The study found that students usually talk or do school work while watching the broadcast, but do catch the public service announcements and segments about teen living, music and films. Researchers found there really wasn't much learning going on during these broadcasts.

On the average, Channel One students learned more about current events than non-viewing students, but the advantage was very small. The study also found the program worked best for students of high academic ability.

Ruidoso is just one of about 10,000 high schools and middle schools nationwide who carry Channel One. New York is the only state that has banned the program, while California financially penalizes schools that broadcast it.

Turner Broadcasting also offers a program from the CNN Newsroom that is commercial free, but they don't provide free monitors. About 23,000 U.S. schools use this service.

Gladden said the school already had Channel One when he first heard about the Turner program, so they didn't want to change in the middle of trying the first one out.

At the middle school about 25 rooms have monitors for students to watch the broadcast, but principal Paula Papponi said they could use about five more. She said she sat in on a class that watched the program, and the students had a very good discussion after it.

"A lot of teachers use it as a spring board to more in-depth discussion," Papponi said.

She said she has not heard any negative comments from teachers or students about Channel One. The one disadvantage is the commercials, but they are done tastefully and are geared to students.

"If it could be done without commercials it would be great, but that is what pays for it," Papponi said.

Two teachers at the middle school don't mind Channel One coming in to their classrooms. Lindy Lott said some students watch it, appreciate it and enjoy it; others watch it because they know they should, while others have no interest in it at all. Although Lott teaches math, he said he tries to make sure the students understand the news items if they are really "earth-shaking." Occasionally they can take a current event topic and

do a math problem from it, he said.

Lott taught a current event class in the past, and it seems that with young students these ideas in the news grow with time, and then the interest grows when they know the background of an issue.

"As the drama plays out the students' interest grows. It really gets them hooked," he said.

Lott said he thinks Channel One is positive and worthwhile. He doesn't see the commercials as a problem or even an issue, because some times the students watch them and some times they don't. So far Lott said he has not seen anything objectionable.

"Whittle is very careful about the commercials. They understand they are being examined closely," he said.

Delton Estes teaches social studies and geography and can also use some of the issues discussed on Channel One. He said the students enjoy it and have been glued to the TV set because of several issues lately, including the Los Angeles riots. In geography, the students were able to use the information on the break up of the Soviet Union and Yugoslavia to look at what new countries were being formed.

The students are all interested in the pop quiz each day. Estes said they all like to guess at it, even if it doesn't pertain to their class. He isn't concerned by the commercials either.

"The students are already exposed to it at home," Estes said. Channel One gets mixed reviews from high school teachers. Gerald Ames, who teaches history courses, said at best it is boring and is usually late with current inter-views. He said it also lacks depth and has too many commercials.

"It's like regular TV with less substance," Ames said.

Clifton Neal, who teaches biology, said he thinks it is great because it does keep everyone up-to-date.

"It gives them a view of the world, instead of just Ruidoso," he said.

Students might not think they get anything out of it, but it is probably more informational than they think, he said. Since they see it every day, they don't really think about it, Neal said. He said he has been able to use issues from Channel One in the classroom, like when they did segments on AIDS when the class was discussing it.

"They are covering things the best they can in the time they have. We wouldn't be able to have Channel One without the commercials," he said.

The commercials give the students a little time to discuss the issues on the news cast, Neal said.

One student, Stephanie Arthur, said the program is interesting and they do get to discuss it in classes. She said Channel One is the only chance to see news because she doesn't have time to watch it at night. One aspect she would like to see improved is that they should do features on students in a wider variety of schools.

Student Jason Hightower said students watch whatever catches their attention, but a lot of students don't watch. Channel One did cover the recent riots in Los Angeles well, they said.

Whether students watch the program or not, it has become a part of the daily routine at both the middle school and the high school with its merits and faults.

With the results of the study, schools may want to take another look at the first 12-minutes of the day.

# Democrats campaign for primary

Lincoln County Democrats got together last week to hear from candidates and make plans for a June fundraiser.

Karen Morris reported on plans for a fundraiser June 27 and 28, that will feature Senator Jeff Bingaman (D-NM) as the keynote speaker.

Plans include a golf tournament at The Links of Sierra Blanca, lunch at the Turf Club, an afternoon at the races and a champagne brunch Sunday at Tinnie's Silver Dollar.

Voters will be making choices in five Lincoln County districts for the first time June 2, and Democrats have unopposed candidates in four of the five districts.

Commission candidates Fred Hansen, Alvin "Bob" Harcrow, L. Ray Nunley and James Sanchez were on hand for the county convention. Charlie Griffin of Ruidoso, candidate in District 3, and Harold Garcia of Carrizozo, candidate in District 1, were not present for the meeting at the Smokey Bear Restaurant in Capitan.

Jerry Wright, one of two candidates for the Democratic nomination for probate judge, asked Democrats to support him in his bid for that office.

"I'll make myself available to the citizens," said Wright, who is general manager of K-BUY Radio.

Ted Turnbow of Nogal is the other candidate for the probate judge. He is the golf professional at the Carrizozo golf course.

Cece Griffin, chairperson of Lincoln County Democrats, said her

husband, Charlie Griffin, a candidate for the Democrat nomination from District 3, was out of town and couldn't attend the meeting.

Charlie Griffin, who is retired, was appointed by Governor Bruce King chairman of the state Parks Department. In that job he has visited all the state parks to evaluate the facilities.

District 3, which includes much of Ruidoso, includes 1,388 voters: 554 Democrats, 777 Republicans and 57 others.

District 2, also includes Ruidoso with 1,039 voters: 444 Democrats, 576 Republicans and 19 other.

Alvin "Bob" Harcrow and L. Ray Nunley are vying for the Democrat nomination in that district.

Harcrow, a graduate of Capitan High School, has lived in this county since 1936. He is making his second bid for the County Commission.

Harcrow served in the Air Force and then worked for the State Highway Department, retiring after 30 years. He wants to see a greater emphasis on the needs of young people in Lincoln County.

Nunley, who is manager of the pharmacy at Wal-Mart, has lived in this county for 16 years. He almost didn't make it on the ballot because of a mixup over his voter registration.

"As a result of Mike Runnels and Wilton Howell, I am on the ballot," said Nunley, adding that he didn't want to sue the county, but was happy that the efforts of Runnels and Howell opened it up for him to continue his run for office.

Nunley said he has a particular interest in economic development. He said Lincoln County needs to be in the forefront of border development.

In District 4, with 1,212 registered voters, Fred Hansen is unopposed for the Democratic nomination. District 4 has 543 Democrats, 632 Republicans and 37 voters registered in other parties or undeclared. Three Republicans are running for the GOP nomination.

Hansen's district includes Alto and extends to Capitan.

Hansen, an engineer, was a helicopter pilot in the military before getting into the oil business 30 years ago. He retired as president of Southern Union Co. in Dallas, Texas, after 30 years with that company.


Hansen, who lives in Alto, is involved in investments and has the time to serve Lincoln County.

"I want to serve," said Hansen. "I want to find ways to maintain the natural beauty and clean up this county," he added.

Harold Garcia, running in District 1, owns and operates the Outpost Bar in Carrizozo. District 1 includes 1,145 registered voters: 509 Democrats, 616 Republicans and 20 others.

He was out of town and couldn't attend the meeting.

James Sanchez of Lincoln is a candidate for the Democrat nomination in District 5, which includes the Hondo Valley up to Ruidoso Downs and over to Lincoln. There are 741 voters in District 5: 367 Democrats and 374 Repub-

licans.

Sanchez, an educator for the past 26 years, is retiring from New Mexico Military Institute, and says he'll now have plenty of time to serve on the County Commission. He is a lifelong resident of Lincoln County.

His background includes 20 years in the U.S. Army Reserve and work as a journeyman electrician before going into teaching and school counseling.

He was appointed by Governor King to the State Board of Education.

"I'm not new to county government," said Sanchez, who has served on the Lincoln County Medi-

cal Center board for eight years and the county Planning and Zoning board for the last three years.

Chairperson Griffin announced that State Representative H. John Underwood, a Democrat, has been appointed chairman of the Ethics commission.

Griffin also announced that Governor Bill Clinton, the top contender for the Democratic nomination as president, will be in Albuquerque Tuesday, May 19.

He'll speak at a public address and rally from 11:45 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Albuquerque Civic Plaza and will be honored with a reception from 1-2:30 p.m. in Ballroom C at

the Albuquerque convention Center. She said reception tickets are available from the New Mexico Clinton for President Headquarters at 842-5120.

Griffin, wearing a "Bill Clinton for President" button, distributed copies of a letter from Clinton to the people of New Mexico.

"I want this to be not just a campaign for President, but a campaign for American's future," wrote Clinton. "I need your help, and I look forward to being in New Mexico this month."

Flo Maul is Lincoln County chairperson of the Clinton campaign.

#### In The Mountain Land

This is being sent to you in late afternoon of May 13, and will reach you on May 18. This way we will be right in the middle of the season of spring.

In most years May is a dry month with the children of Mother Earth depending upon the ground moisture left over from winter snow, to bring forth blossoms, leaves and flowers.

Good snow moisture was followed by April rains and now good rains in May, have brought us golden year — a springtime of green mountain meadows and hillsides, with flowery like magic showing their many colors like bright little banners celebrating a landmark season of spring.

All day today the clouds have passed to and fro in the sky in a day of sunshine and shower — of rainbows, and fields sparkling in rain jewelry and rainbow colors all across the emerald fields.

The sunshine and rain and light west wind have brought out summer flowers that usually wait for the rains of July — Indian Paint Brush, Black Eyed Susan, Indian Blanket and Primrose.

All day long bands of robins, those emblems and spirit of spring, have been sending their cheery notes through the sunshine and the showers. The orange and black Grosbeak adds his flute-like notes to the bird chorus — the songs of springtime in full tide.

#### The Wild Rose

Today the first blooms appeared on the bushes of the wild rose bushes under the large cedar tree in the yard. The pure pink five-petal flowers with the golden center are wel-

All throughout Mescalero Apache Reservation they bloom along with the sky blue flax, the Scotch bluebell, the English buttercup, the scarlet columbine, and the purple violet. This will be the year of flowers all through New Mexico and especially Lincoln County.

The fragrance of the Wild Rose is the breath of Springtime in the mountain land.

#### A Golden Bush

Now it is mid-morning on May 14, and the clouds of yesterday have mostly drifted away leaving the Vale in mellow sunshine above the green hills and vales. A new color is shining on the hillside, and on the gentle breeze fragrance reaches you that is more welcome with each arrival of spring. It is like inhaling the airy essence of pure honey.

The algerita bush, distant cousin to the English holly, is out all in a day in full bloom of small flowers which cover the bush with a solid glow of sunlight yellow.

These bushes, blooming on the mesas, foothills, and hillsides in every direction away and away from the mountain, are like a little spot of sunshine itself amid green of the land.

The word algerita comes from the Spanish word Aigrites, or little sour ones — from the tart flavor of the small scarlet berries which follow the golden blooms, turning the bush into solid light red. These berries are good for jelly, especially when mixed with apple.

The algerita grows to a height of 10 feet and is a true favorite among plants of the Southwest.

#### The Fruit Picture

A few days ago I met Mr. L.E. McCutcheon up town and he told me that Tull Stansell's cherry orchard, there on his place at the bend below Ruidoso Downs, is ready to bring a fine crop of cherries this year. The cherries are the long time favorites, Bing and Lambert; and this is the largest cherry orchard in Lincoln County.

Word comes from down the Ruidoso Valley that the apple crop will be very abundant this year, making up for last year's slim pickings.

Also there will be cherries, peaches, pears, plums and even apricots — in other words a golden year for the orchards.

In the orchards around Ruidoso Downs the picture is the same — a heavy crop of fruit especially apples.

The apples of Lincoln County are among the best in the world for flavor and health qualities. So be ready to visit your orchard neighbors throughout the county, as the fruit begins to ripen in this golden year.

Let us thank the Lord for the promise of a happy and bountiful summer and fall.

# Memorial Day is a time to remember

## Tales of an ancient mariner...

I hope my friends and old shipmates will forgive me for usurping the title "Ancient Mariner" for my writing. Somehow I feel that is exactly what I am now that I'm in my middle seventies, retired and out to pasture these past 10 years. I probably even look the part, what with wearing my hair white as would seem fashionable for my age group!

I'm going to relate some of the "mind's eye views" I have that grow more vivid with the passing years. In addition, I will tell of some observations I have made, which are the gospel truth as I know them.

Following are a few details about me, that I'm sure will get by the censor all right! I'm a third generation ocean going captain. On my maternal side my grandfather was a sailing ship master. His son, and one of my favorite persons in this world, my Uncle Jim, was one of those unique "old salts from the days of wooden ships and iron men!" He was master of both sail and steam ships. He had retired just before World War II and returned to shift ships around the British Isles. I was fortunate to get to see him several times during that war. My mother was born aboard my grandfather's sailing ship off the coast of Ceylon and later served as nurse aboard a British troop transport during the First World War. Some of my first "mind's eye views" are of sitting in my Uncle Jim's cabin as a young boy.

My parents were both naturalized Americans and proud of it — my mother from England and my father was Swiss. My dad was one of six brothers, all teachers, accountants, one banker and no watchmakers! By having the good fortune to be born within the borders of the United States of America, I look upon myself as a Native American. I should imagine the majority of us folks in these parts fall into this category. I got my sea legs early on when I was just six months old when my father was transferred to Buenos Aires, Argentina, for a period of six years. I don't recall much about that sea voyage, but it was the only way to make that sort of trip in those days. At the ripe old age of going on seven I do vaguely remember some details of the train trip across the Andes Mountains to Chile and gradually making our way with stops at various ports along the west coast of South America and passing through the Panama Canal en route to our final destination, New York City. I was to become very familiar with the Panama Canal and also to revisit those South American ports again later on.

Skipping ahead to the middle 1930s, we find myself a lad of 17 living in central New Jersey and smitten with the notion of a career in the world of ships and the sea! Somehow I learned there was a school of navigation and seamanship on the top floor of the old Seaman's Church Institute on South Street in Lower Manhattan, New York City. During the next summer holiday I set forth armed with a special train ticket that also covered the ferry ride from Hoboken to Manhattan Island. From there it was just about a two-mile walk to the Institute.

Aside from learning knots and rope splicing, I was exposed to the biggest book I had ever been involved with. It was the American Practical Navigator by Nathaniel Bowditch. One could hardly help not being impressed with this volume! It was about three inches thick, weighed five pounds plus and consisted of more than 1,500 pages of all one would ever need to know about astronomy, meteorology, navigation, oceanography and related mathematics. At the back of this book was a complete set of formulas and tables needed to work out the mathematics and navigation. It is a wonder this great collection of knowledge gathered together between two covers was not enough to scare any young man off going to sea forever!

"Nat" as Captain Bowditch was known informally, was born March 26, 1773, in Salem, Massachusetts, of a family of very modest means.

At the age of 12 he was indentured to a Marine Supply Company for a period of nine years where he had his own room with food and clothing provided. In return he was expected to learn the business and help out as needed. Before long it was determined "Nat" was a genius, who learned very quickly and more than lived up to expectations. Soon he was learning other subjects such as mathematics and navigation in his spare time. On completion of his apprenticeship at the age of 21, he shipped out as captain's writer/second mate. This was a special position given him in view of his budding reputation as a scholar.

Needless to say, it was a most unusual experience for the ship's captain to find his new young officer unearthing mistakes in what was the standard navigation text at the time! Within a short time he had uncovered 8,000 errors! When this information was brought to the attention of the nautical authorities and confirmed, "Nat" was asked to prepare a new reference book. When this work was completed again in his spare time at sea, it was accepted as a new standard for the entire maritime industry and by several foreign governments as well. It became known and remains to this day as the "Epitome of Navigation!" In recognition of his great contributions to the knowledge of mankind in the fields of mathematics and navigation, and without ever attending a class, he was awarded an honorary degree of Bachelor of Arts by Harvard University. Later he also received honorary master's and doctorate degrees from the same university. He went on to serve as master in our Merchant Marine. Many years later I had a brief, but most interesting, association with descendants of Captain Bowditch, also by coincidence on the good captain's last voyage he visited Indonesian waters, which was also the scene of my last tour of duty as master! I just came along almost two centuries later!

When I completed the Seaman's Church Institute course, my folks decided I was serious about a career at sea and arranged for me to enter the New York Merchant Marine Academy. At the time this was a two-year technical course especially geared to producing future ship's captains and chief engineers. In fact, it turned out many officers urgently needed for the World War II effort. Later this school developed into a full four-year accredited degree school and is now known as the State University of New York Maritime College. Sad to say when I attended it was "single males only need apply!" These days women are not only accepted, there are now several "lady captains" sailing the ocean blue! I graduated in the summer of 1940 and, aside from a few trips aboard a passenger ship, I served most of my career in the oil tanker business. Another "mind's

eye view" involves a coastwise voyage to Texas just before Pearl Harbor. I was chatting with our ship's agent about the possibility of our getting into the war, which had already begun in Europe and he said, "I reckon if the United States gets into the action, Texas will too!"

Promotion was fast during the war and by my middle twenties I was appointed master. I can so clearly recall my first day as captain striding confidently toward the dock where my ship was moored. As I rounded the corner of the pier and my first command came into view, any feeling I had of being Captain Bowditch, James Cook or John Paul Jones vanished instantly! She was riding high having just completed cargo discharge and taken on no ballast. I put my suitcase and five-quart brief case down on the wharf and stared at this monster for a long moment with a great feeling of humble pride. I enjoyed a good career as captain with no damage to my ships or injury to personnel. I can attribute this to several excellent skippers I had the good fortune to sail with from whom I was able to absorb a few good operating habits, that stood me in good stead. In addition, I was blessed to have some very competent men around me I could depend upon. My main contribution to the effort seemed to be constant vigilance, lost sleep and a generous portion of good luck!

Just at the end of the war in Europe my ship may well have been the first to retrace the third voyage of Christopher Columbus from Gibraltar to Guira a small port on the East Coast of Venezuela, South America. The only difference being he passed to the South of Trinidad Island and I passed to the North. I have a "mind's eye view" of that little town. It reminded me a lot of many little Texas villages with a square and County Court House in the center except as I sat in the town square of Guira there was a lovely little church in the middle. This was apparently the only place where Columbus set foot ashore on the mainland of what is now known as the Americas. I understand he thought he had just found another island. I suppose if one considers the big picture with North America bordered on the north by the Arctic Ocean he was correct. The whole spread is some big island!


It was 1497 when Columbus made his third voyage. Shortly after in the same year another Italian captain by the name of Giovanni Caboto sailing under the British flag for King Henry II of England explored the East Coast of North America. He was later better known as John Cabot when he became a British citizen! A third Italian explorer Amerigo Vespucci came along in 1499 and apparently touched the East Coast of South America, but never set foot on either Central or North America. However, he must have been a

legend in his own mind and a pretty good press agent too! He wrote a glowing report of his exploits to a friend in Italy, who in turn passed it on to a professor of geography at an obscure college in northeastern France. This gentleman had access to a printing press and the Amerigo Vespucci report was reproduced in book form with numerous copies being circulated giving "Amerigo" credit for discovering the new world! Actually, the new land was called "America" and the whole land mass was so named on charts of the world published in 1508. Neither Christopher Columbus or John Cabot were mentioned in this book according to reports I recall. This omission, confusion or misinformation may well have been the result of Columbus himself reporting that he had reached islands off the Coast of India and, in fact, named the people he found there "Indians."

As we are all probably aware by now, this is the "Quincennial Year" or 500th anniversary of the arrival of Columbus in the West Indies. He certainly pioneered the route to the New World and the return, which became the standard for sailing ships trading to the Caribbean Sea, the Gulf of Mexico and east coast of North America. In addition he established the Caribbean Sea as a great cruising ground! However, I shall never understand why, when cruising along the coast to the north of Cuba, he didn't venture out for a few hours to the Northwest where he would have found Florida! Instead he got involved in the colonizing effort for which it appeared he had no special skills. As a result he lost credibility with the Royal House of Spain and died a very disappointed man. Sad to say after five hundred years the observance of Columbus Day continues to be a divisive event. It is felt our society has enough concerns on its' plate these days and it would appear sensible to avoid divisive issues where possible.

Now that we have substituted "President's Day" for George Washington's and Abraham Lincoln's birthdays on which day we can honor all past Presidents, once the Quincennial Columbus Day is passed, the name of that day might be changed to "Explorer's Day." On this day we could honor all those explorers, who have risked their lives, and in some cases given their lives, to further the knowledge of mankind. A partial list might include the "First Americans," Leif Ericsson, Christopher Columbus, Ferdinand Magellan, Captain James Cook, Admirals Robert Peary and Richard Byrd, of Arctic and Antarctic fame, Admiral Alan Shepard our first man in space, the Apollo and Challenger Crews who gave their lives to the exploration of space.

There has never in history been any greater feat of adventure and discovery than that of the First Americans. Wherever Christopher

Columbus, Ferdinand Magellan or Captain James Cook went, they confirmed they found people making their way in life by their skills in farming, fishing or hunting! Captain Cook marveled at the genius of these people, who had mastered the art of survival over great distances at sea, also their skilled boat designs. These early adventurers must have learned how to stock their craft for long voyages and how to replenish water supplies and food by fishing while at sea. They also developed through experience the art of navigation through a keen sense of ocean currents and winds, by observing the migration of birds and above all observations of the sun and stars. Several reasons have been reported for these great adventures. It seems some whole groups and their religious leaders were exiled and had to move on. Other groups may have just wished to extend their horizons for trade or adventure and others may have wished to establish their own churches, political clubs or both! Archaeologists have developed evidence that the "First Americans" arrived in North America from Siberia via Alaska. However, it is also believed, in view of their great ocean voyaging skills, some may have arrived by boat. With the aid of a little hindsight, that is indeed the route I would have taken rather than via the frozen North! Aside from sailing down the West Coast of the Americas, efforts are now being made to confirm some of the "First Americans" may have returned to the Pacific Islands, also that some made their way to New Zealand from the Pacific Islands.

Captain James Cook also was born of a family of very modest means and joined the Merchant Marines at a very young age. He transferred to the British Royal Navy and rose to the rank of Warrant Officer. He also became well known for his skills in navigation, surveying and chart making. When it came time to organize the expedition to the South Sea, as the Pacific Ocean was known in those days, the British Admiralty promoted James Cook over the heads of many other officers to command this most important expedition. There must have been a lot of noses out of joint about that! Although the war between the Colonies and England was going on at the time, the work Captain Cook was engaged in was considered so important for the information to be obtained about the Pacific Ocean it was mutually agreed no action would be taken by the Colonies to hinder his efforts. It is tragic to think he lost his life at the hands of Hawaiian Islanders when he went ashore to try to retrieve a stolen ship's boat during his third circumnavigation of the world. Likewise, Ferdinand Magellan lost his life at the hands of people of the Phillipine Islands while trying to take on provisions and water for the remainder of the first voyage around the world.

Included here are sketches of the earliest boat designs and sail rigs as observed by Captain Cook and Captain Bowditch. From my own experience of five years in the Persian Gulf and more recently in the Java Sea, I can confirm these types of boats are very much still in use for commercial trading and fishing.

### Merchant Marine and Military Memorial Service

On May 22, at 10:30 in the morning a Memorial Service will be held to honor all veterans, who have served our country. Many have given their lives in such service in various war zones. Members of the public are invited with their families to join with Merchant Marine and Military Veterans and their families for this service, which usually lasts about an hour.

The Memorial Cemetery is reached by taking the road to Fort Stanton and the Cemetery is located about a quarter of a mile South East of the Fort on Route 214. A 25-foot white monument is quite visible at the center of the cemetery. There will be chairs provided, but if you would rather bring your own, that will be fine.

There will be several speakers at the memorial service. Pat Brinkley, president of the American Merchant Marine Veterans—Road Runner Chapter based at Albuquerque will tell us about our Merchant Marines.

Cleston Pritchett, a U.S. Air Force veteran, will speak about our military services and the Reverend William Kennedy will deliver a message and prayer. The service will conclude with the raising of the United States flag to the masthead while "Taps" is sounded by Dick Mound a U.S. Army veteran.

Nick Skogland and a crew from Camp Sierra Blanca is getting the cemetery shipshape for the memorial service and dressing the anchors up with coats of paint.


Recently there have been two additions to the cemetery. During the last snow storm a lovely old 1,000-pound fisherman's anchor was delivered by U.S. Air Force General Dusty Davis.

A second anchor also arrived recently. This was a 10,000-pound spare from a World War II Victory Ship presently moored in the Reserve Fleet at Beaumont, Texas. This anchor was made available through the kindness of Captain Warren Leback, Maritime Administrator, in Washington D.C.

Captain Fred Splinter, in charge of the Maritime Reserve Fleet, arranged the anchor landed ashore. It was picked up by a U.S. Navy 18-wheel flatbed trailer and moved to the cemetery. Warrant Officer Bob Bryant was in charge.

Bill Cupit and his crew of the Lincoln County Road Department were standing by a half hour early with a monster front-end loader to lift the anchor off and land it. The U.S. Navy trailer arrived a half hour early and the operation was completed safely by the originally scheduled starting time!

This entire operation was initiated by the Road Runner Chapter of American Merchant Marine Veterans headquartered in Albuquerque. The valiant efforts involved in the safe delivery of both of these anchors is sincerely appreciated as they are most appropriate memorial monuments for the cemetery.

# Project combines old-fashioned "3 Rs" with newfangled computers

Just imagine starting from the ground up on a brand new town with people who do just what you tell them to.

That's what a group of Ruidoso Middle School sixth graders did during a recent 14-week study unit.

Teacher Steve Havil led his class in a multi-faceted project that combined reading, writing and plenty of arithmetic. The end product was an 8'x8' scale model town, a bound book of the students' stories and a wealth of learning experiences that the youngsters won't soon forget.

"If you don't like noise in the classroom, then this is not the unit for you," said Havil, speaking last week to the Ruidoso School Board.

He showed a videotape of a group of sixth graders as busy as

bees, working together on a project that began from a basic concept and led them through research, measuring, figuring, building, character development and writing skills.

Havil said the town and his class were divided into families with each family working together to create not only a house, but also a family structure with characters who would be used to write stories.

"The year was 1900," said Havil, adding that the actual assignment was to do four stories, one for each season, using the characters who lived in the imaginary town.

Of course that entailed time in the library finding out about the time and place, and time with a ruler and calculator making sure doors and windows were in just the right proportions to the buildings

that lined their town's streets.

And, finally, the students spent a good chunk of time at the computers: writing, editing, correcting and rewriting their stories. Those stories are in a book titled "Century Stories: Visits to an imaginary time and place."

The book is illustrated with the students' drawings that depict for the reader the time and place that the youngsters had begun to know as well as they know their own hometown.

"They could actually see their town and set the scene," said Havil. Their friends and families can see and get to know that special town by reading the "Century Stories."

Havil presented each School Board member with a copy of the book, and they thanked him and congratulated him on a successful

study unit that engaged sixth graders in a worthwhile learning experience.

Also Tuesday, the board heard from Mid-School science teacher Jackie Branum who took her marine biology class on the 11th annual spring break study trip.

"We add something new every year," said Branum, who takes her eighth grade students to the west coast one year and to the Texas coast the next.

This year was a Lone Star State year, so Branum and her crew, in a bus driven by Jim Stover headed east and started with a day at Fiesta Texas. They visited the "Turtle Lady" who cares for Ridley turtles and did some beach combing on Galveston Island. The class went out on the University of Texas research vessel where they got

some hands-on experience in marine biology.

As the UT crew pulled in its nets, the Ruidoso bunch got to dig in and pull out all kinds of interesting specimens from the ocean.

"We had lots of neat things that died on the way back," said Branum.

"We got back with a lot of things that are alive," she added, noting that those specimens are in aquariums at the school.

Members of the school board were impressed to learn that six of Branum's marine biology students had been invited to speak on that subject in the Tularosa schools.

"My students are considered the experts on the ocean," said Branum.

Some of her former students, too, could be called experts in

marine biology, for 10 college students who went through Branum's class and trip are majoring in marine biology.

One of Branum's students, Sarah Hubbard, won an award at the State Science Fair that entitled her and her family to travel to NASA for a special tour. Branum said Sarah was among three New Mexico students winning what turned out to be a fun and educational trip.

The students were given the royal treatment and NASA, and even allowed to visit parts of the facility not normally open to the public, said Branum.

Board members also heard a long list of events planned in the schools for the last weeks, including awards ceremonies and field trips.

### Channel One posts poor grades

The first report card is in on Channel One, the television news program shown with commercials in some 10,000 U.S. high schools (including Ruidoso), and the grades are not good.

Channel One is a project of Whittle communications, which provides the schools with free video equipment in exchange for airing the daily 10-minute news and current events program and its two minutes of commercials.

A study conducted after the controversial network's first year in operation shows the program has had little impact toward improving students' knowledge of current events. The greatest improvement was shown among the brightest students and in those classes where the teacher incorporated program topics into their lessons. Hasn't that always been the case when movies are shown in class?

But overall the study found Channel One students scored only 3.3 percent higher on a 30-question current events test than students who don't get Channel One, a figure the report called "statistically significant, but so small as to be educationally unimportant." That sounds like a D to us.

One finding of the study was that students showed the most interest in stories that would typically appeal to — surprise — teenagers, topics such as music, films and fashion. On the other hand, most students exhibited a typical teen-age reaction to news of current events — disinterest. Call that one a C.

Not surprisingly, while the study found the bulk of students don't remember or didn't pay attention to the news topics, they all remembered the commercials. If you're Whittle Communications, that scores an A. But if you're an educator, you'd probably rate this finding an F.

One of the intriguing conclusions of the study was that students generally like Channel One. But at the same time the researchers report that most students tune in and out during the broadcast and chat or do homework during the program. Sounds like the students like Channel One not for the content, but because it gives them a 12-minute break from the teacher. Another D.

The study also found teachers generally like Channel One. Could the reason be the same?


The independent report, which Whittle paid for by the way, concludes that except in situations in which the teacher incorporates the program into a broader lesson, Channel One is generally too fast-paced, superficial and fragmented to have much affect on deepening students' understanding of current events. By any curriculum standard, that translates into an F.

Among the local students we've talked to, the general response to Channel One is either disinterest or dislike, coupled with a feeling that it's pretty much a waste of time.

Whittle says the first year report may be skewed because the Gulf War dominated the news so much and other important events took a secondary status. The company believes current events scores will improve now that no single issue dominates.

This was just the first report on Channel One in what is to be a three-year study. What future studies may show we can only guess, but there is one thing for sure: If Channel One doesn't get its grades up, it's going to flunk out of our schools — if it hasn't already.

### Peso advised to read Nuclear Waste Policy Act

#### TO THE EDITOR:

This letter is a response to the recent, seriously misleading letter of Fred Peso, the Tribe's MRS Program Manager, to the Ruidoso News (4-30-92).

Mr. Peso starts by advising that communities around an Indian reservation are eligible for economic incentives associated with the MRS. In regard, it is clear that he has not read, or if so, not understood, the Nuclear Waste Policy Act. This Act, which is the governing federal legislation for all MRS, clearly does provide benefits, but only for the site host — in this case, the Tribe.

Mr. Peso would do well to cross-check the misinformation he is get-

ting from the DOE, the Nuclear Waste Negotiator and the Pacific Nuclear against the NWP. As to the benefits that are provided by the NWP for the Tribe itself, does Mr. Peso also understand (see again the NWP) that these may well have to be appropriated anew by Congress each year, just like the WIPP arrangement? This may prove difficult in a recession year, or for that matter in any year after enough time has elapsed and the government just plain gets tired of paying. But the MRS will still be there — maybe forever.

Mr. Peso further states that "Talk about a 70-mile kill zone is just so much buffalo chips," and then follows with a homely comparison of MRS dangers to that of

chemicals in supermarket. Concerning the kill zones, these are in fact technically termed "interdiction zones," and are quoted in at least one of the government's own reports as part of the theoretical consequences of a single "spent" rod fuel-storage-pool accident. Otherwise, why would the government have to build an MRS facility "like Fort Knox" as Mr. Peso states? And why else would the government be willing to spend so much money to bribe the Tribe to take it? As to "no explosive force," if Mr. Peso would also check the government's own reports, he would discover there just might be enough, under certain accidental circumstances, to blow the lid off an "unbreachable" container or blow its sides out, even

without the help of terrorists. We hope the Tribe does not find itself downwind of such an event, because there are suddenly going to be a lot of glowing buffalo chips on the reservation with thousand-year lives.

If Mr. Peso is really concerned about the safety of his tribe and that of his neighbors, as he states in his last paragraph, then it is about time he did a little homework using information not provided by people who stand only to gain by an MRS siting locally. Such information is free from many sources — a good one nearby is SWNA, just a local telephone call away 378-5457 or 257-9318.
