Top 10 taxpayers are listed

by DIANNE STALLINGS Ruidoso News Staff Writer The phrase is a familiar one. "I'm a taxpayer in this county," often is the introduction to a litany of complaints. Ever wonder who pays the most in Lincoln County property taxes? County Treasurer Janice Ware recently compiled a list of the top 10 residential and non-residential taxpayers at the request of the New Mexico Association of Counties in Santa Fe.

Topping the residential list with property estimated at a full value of \$647,568 was William R. Burgess of Alto. He pays about \$5,375 in county taxes. New Mexico property owners are taxed on one-third of assessed property value minus all exemptions.

Trailing Burgess are R.D. and Joan Dale Hubbard from Fort Worth, Texas, with Lincoln County property valued at \$474,670 and taxes of \$6,403; J.A. and Evonne Cardwell of El Paso, Texas, with property valued at \$431,927. Wayne and Valda Fletcher of Alto, William and Kenda Henderson of Ruidoso, Dr. A.N. and Jacqueline Spencer of Alto, Cleber and Patricia Massey of Abilene and The Car Ranch Partnership in Glencoe.

At the end of the list with property valued in the range of \$287,000-\$293,000 and taxes of more than \$2,000 are Phillip and Kelsey Jeffers of Hilliard, Ohio, and Elaine Bates of Ruidoso.

Utilities dominate the list of non-residential taxpayers.

Texas New Mexico Power Co. of Fort Worth leads off that roll with property including three lines valued at nearly \$8.25 million and taxes of about \$117,858.


Ruidoso Sun and Inn of Ruidoso, N.M., is credited with property worth \$3.9 million and taxes assessed at \$10,508.

Other non-residential taxpayers include the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, Ruidoso Valley Bar and Museum and the Winner's Circle.

David Cox, a representative for the state insurance commission said that Naughton was a good insurance company but the coverage on the policy was narrow and primarily for the sanctioned AMA race. He said it might have covered a parade, but little else.

Officers who drafted the letter also expressed their concern that Councilor Andrews' decision would affect other businesses.

Police group says enforcement is tough

Twenty-seven angry law enforcement officers have condemned members of the Ruidoso Village Council for perceived inept handling of last year's Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally.

The blistering criticism was in response to a Ruidoso News editorial and was signed by Ruidoso's assistant police chief Michael Lovelace and 26 other members of the Fraternal Order of Police, Sierra Blanca Lodge (FOP).

The editorial condemned lawless acts that were accepted during last year's motorcycle rally.

To conclude that the police allowed such lawlessness is a gross misrepresentation, wrote the local police chief. "The police department is a very professional organization. Certain elected officials, however, have invited and encouraged these rallies. The mayor, council members and the village council have all made enforcement of the law a low priority in the editorial, all but member cable news stations, radio stations, write the law enforcement officers.

public, right in the middle of town. The serving of liquor in parking lots made enforcement of such laws as drinking in public, impossible. With hundreds of intoxicated bikers roaming the downtown area, it's small wonder we haven't had someone killed. The local leadership also cut overtime and would not pay for the other agencies to come and assist.

Councilor Andrews has owned or been part owner of the rally for the past five years. During the last rally, a stabbing and shooting occurred at the Winner's Circle bar. The bar's part-owner Jess Stinson was on the village council at the time.

Mayor Victor Alonso noted it was the first profitable weekend for him since his restaurant burned down, but expressed a word of caution about future rallies during the aftermath.

I am concerned as mayor that a situation like this needs to be controlled, and this community needs to have a way in which to control it.

On September 24, 1991, Alonso said he was forming a committee to come back with a workable plan for future rallies.

The meetings to correct the problem have been sparse. Last week May 26, the council approved a special ordinance to require that stalls needs teeth for community water protection.

The ordinance, which was extracted at the time of the meeting of Councilor Andrews during a council meeting.

Village manager Ron Wicker noted that the ordinance was passed to protect the village was missing from the draft as submitted to the council by village attorney David Thomas at the last workshop.

Andrews apparently sees a strong future for his rally. He pushed for and received a three-year extension on raising for lodgers tax money that could benefit him.

Andrews currently has a \$1,500 request before the village council to help him advertise his profit-making rally this year. He originally had asked for \$2,500.

His rally brochures say that the village has funded a \$2-million civic events center to be a home for his motorcycle rally.

It's official!

Despite a few last minute glitches, last Tuesday's election went smoothly, Lincoln County Clerk Martha Proctor said Friday.

She met with county commissioners to officially canvass the election results and to count one absentee ballot that was submitted under the provisions of a new election regulation.

If a voter has applied for, but not received, an absentee ballot up to election day, he or she can vote at the appropriate precinct on an emergency ballot after signing an affidavit.

But to ensure that the person has not voted twice, the ballot is sealed until the clerk has a chance to verify the information, Proctor explained. It is not opened or counted until the official canvass in front of the commission.

It's not as interesting this time, but it would be if there had been races as close as one vote and the final tally wasn't in until this morning's canvass," said county manager Andy Wynham.

"I don't think I could pull it out with this," quipped Commissioner Bill Elliott, who was defeated in the Republican primary by Wilton Howell.

The ballot wouldn't have helped Elliott, anyway. The voter cast his/her support to Howell.

Proctor said there were a few other minor count adjustments, but nothing greater than one or two votes due to machines being misread by precinct workers.

She noted that the State Elections Division under the Secretary of State within the next 30 days will tabulate each race again as added protection against error.

Proctor said the computer firm that handled her voting machine tabulations threw her a curve by discovering at 7 p.m. on election

MainStreet reviews marketing strategy

It's been four years since Amy Horowitz Ware has been in Ruidoso, and she has seen a few changes in the village but more work needs to be done to promote this village to tourists.

Ware works with the National MainStreet Center and has provided seminars on marketing, advertising, tourism and graphic design in 27 states. She visited Ruidoso four years ago and was back Thursday for another marketing seminar.

She had taken some photographs of the area on both trips and was able to give some before and after shots, but they weren't all good.

MainStreet Ruidoso co-sponsored the seminar, which was

open to the public at the village hall. The first part of Ware's session concentrated on marketing by design and creating a marketing plan. In making a plan there are several questions the business person must be able to answer. The first is what is your business market?

Ware said a business in this area may have two to three markets, but if they have any more it will only dilute their money.

Businesses should also consider what media options are available in their area and what that will cost. Business owners must also ask themselves if the money they spend on these media in the past was worth it.

Another step is to ask what non-media options or promotions are available. Please see MainStreet, page 2A

County road boss responds to criticism of his department

Answering questions contained in a political advertisement that appeared the day before the primary election, Lincoln County road manager Bill Cupit, came to a County Commission meeting Friday armed with time sheets and other documentation. He acknowledged doing some of the road work detailed in the ad published by Ed Lundquist, department mechanic, and other concerned residents. He expressed his regrets if that had caused problems for any of the commissioners.

But he didn't apologize for helping out with ball fields, bus routes and a road into a church cemetery.

"When you first hired me, you told me to take the road department, shape it and make it function," Cupit said. "You said Bill, use your judgment and give the public what they're paying for."

"We're trying to do things for you, trying to do things that are right."

"We can prove what we've done. I've got the documents. I'm only asking them (critics) to give us a chance."

"I've helped ball fields in Ruidoso Downs, Hondo and Carrizozo, the senior citizens centers and the fire departments," Cupit said. "Anything that's good for the people of the county, if I feel (the crew) has the time and proximity to do it."

Commissioner Monroy Montes thanked Cupit for his work.

"From my point of view, you used your discretion and you've done well," Montes said. "When the roads in Arabela, floodeds, and some were private, it was a disaster and you took care of them. I would expect that again."

Cupit said the criticism "is an obvious attempt to try to destroy the road department for one reason or another."

But Lundquist told *The Ruidoso News*

Sunday that he doesn't want to see the road department destroyed.

"They've got a job to do and it's probably the most visible job the county does for its citizens," Lundquist said.

"Mainly, I think the people in Lincoln County deserve the truth."

In bringing forth cost estimates (based on rates charged by the county in state cooperative projects) for work Cupit performed on the road leading to the home and cattle pens of Road Chairman Stirling Spencer, "I wasn't willing to make a judgment whether it was incorrect to do the road." But he had questions about the accuracy of the cost estimate presented by Cupit and the appropriateness of the apparent attitude "that they can do whatever they want."

"I want to see honesty in local government wherever it leads," he said.

"They're doing some good things," Lundquist said. "It's their method and how they make their judgments (that concerns him)."

Cupit told commissioners Friday, "I think we have done an excellent job for what money we have. I'm sure I've done things wrong, but I can show you sheets and sheets of things (previous road department administration) did wrong."

He contended there were costs not figured into road jobs and work improperly performed that he had to go back, correct and finish.

"I keep hearing about there being bad morale (in the department), but it's two or three people."

"It doesn't work in private business for men to sit around with their feet up and it won't work here."

Lundquist's job is being eliminated in the department's 1992-93 budget. Cupit has said there is not enough to keep Lundquist busy. He has said Lundquist, a

mechanic, will have first chance at a driver's job (for less money).

Lundquist told *The News*, "When I was hired, I was working. I had a job. I had a completely unfitted mechanic truck and more or less donated it to the county. They subsequently bought one that I set up for them."

Lundquist said he, former road manager Tommie Hall and another man "went in and got things in order. I set up records for each vehicle. Safety was a big deal for us. It was run very efficiently."

"I feel like I gave the county a lot. I worked hard and applied myself. I have 20 years of experience and went above call of duty and now, it's a bunch of B.S. about not enough work."

He pointed out that most municipal and county governments have their own shop and mechanic because it is an efficient approach.

As for morale, Lundquist said Cupit's methods and his approach to the men falls far short of the proper mark.

"I feel he's a bully and uses threats," Lundquist said. "Others in the department had been told not to talk to me. If they are doing everything right, why should they try to silence people. Personnel management is just not his strong point."

Despite their differences, Lundquist said he always has been able to perform his job and work with Cupit.

"I felt I worked for the constituents," he said. "In fact, I'm helping him order (items for after the mechanic's job is scrapped)."

On Friday, Montes told Cupit that under previous department management, he used to get calls from residents irritated because they saw equipment sitting idle.

"Now I get calls because they see you hauling (materials and equipment) all over and they want to know what you're working on," Montes said.

"I always give 110 percent," Cupit said. "I'm not a politician. I'm just a road manager. As long as I'm doing a good job, it's hard to understand why we don't just get good publicity."

"Anybody can look at our records. We have nothing to hide."

Commissioners reassured Cupit that they are pleased with his work.

Spencer said it's the commission's responsibility to take the heat because they're the elected officials.

County Attorney J. Robert Beauvais said the county is in no danger of violating any laws when helping with a road or facilities such as a ballpark or cemetery owned by another government entity.

"The problem is the anti-donation provision which prohibits coming to the aid of private business," he said. "But I think we, as a rural county, have traditionally tried to come to the aid of our residents and community groups. As long as we are not violating the spirit of the law, we're going to continue in the tradition of what we have done."

Spencer told Cupit in the future, if there are any gray areas whether he should use public money, call the appropriate state department for advice.

Cupit listed some of the projects that have been criticized as:

— A Catholic church cemetery with a poorly maintained road that become nearly impassable for funerals.

"There are a lot of relatives in Carrizozo and the county and people couldn't get hearses in to have funerals. I didn't it help the community," Cupit said. In response to a request from Paul Ortiz, Cupit said he contacted Spencer, who donated \$4,020 (804 yards at about \$5 a yard) of cover material for the road. The cost to the county was \$1,275.

Lundquist suggested to *The News* that

the cost of the materials donated by Spencer should be much lower, closer to 50-cents a yard.

Checking with an Alamogordo sand and gravel dealer, the lowest grade of material sold locally goes for \$3.50 a yard.

Lundquist pointed out that no matter what the county's good intentions, the anti-donation law may have been breached in the cemetery situation.

— A road opposite Country Club Drive in Carrizozo going back to the Lovelace concrete plant. The county was blading on city road when a school bus driver asked Cupit to fill a crater created by the heavy rain on the other road.

"In my eyes, I was serving a school bus," Cupit said. "In fact, one bus had to wait while we were working on (the hole)."

The cost of that project was \$73 to the county, he said. Spencer donated about \$248 in cover material "that he didn't know until now."

— A road that leads to the home of Spencer's mother. He said the work, primarily blading, took about two hours and cost the county around \$45.

Cupit emphasized that he agrees to such projects only when county equipment is in the area and as time allows without being detrimental to other scheduled projects.

The crews at the site were working on a road classified as a school bus route that leads to chairman Spencer's home and cattle pens. The department maintains roads that access commercial operations beneficial to the county.

Lundquist noted that Spencer just before his road received maintenance said the county will no longer work on private roads unless they benefit many people.

To remove personal judgment on that issue, he suggested the county use a vehicle counter.

available to market. After deciding which options are good, the business person decides what to spend on each of these.

Also important to a marketing plan is what message does the business convey to the media and the people in the market area. This message is dependent on the time of year, such as Christmas or Valentine's Day, among other factors. Ware said to remember that the quality of the store and its surrounding area needs to match the quality of merchandise being sold.

Stick to the budget and marketing plan at all times but have at least a 10 percent contingency for flexibility. Ware said with money set aside businesses may be able to take advantage of an advertising concept that will serve them well.

The most important thing to remember is it is easier to do a marketing plan the second time, she said.

In the second part of her seminar Ware discussed what other communities have been doing to be successful at promoting themselves as tourist communities.

"Our job is to remember Ruidoso isn't just competing with the surrounding communities or even other mountain resorts. You're competing against Disneyland and cruises or any other visitor destination," Ware said.

She said Ruidoso has done a fine job of getting special events and activities planned for visitors, especially in the fall. It is one thing to get visitors here, but it is another thing to get them to keep coming back, Ware said. Ware had served as Durango director of the city of Durango from 1982 to 1986, when

the city began developing a bicycle race and a Western Literature Conference. Both of these have grown into huge events that people keep coming back to Durango for.

As she went through Ruidoso before the seminar, Ware said she heard time and again that the businesses' hours were not conducive to tourist use. Skiing people don't get back until at least 5:30 p.m., but few stores are open except the restaurants.

The problem is similar for people who go to the races all day and want something to do in the evening. She said one individual store would have a hard time being successful with extended hours, unless it was located by a hotel or restaurant, but a group in an area could try it.

"People are in the mood to shop after dinner, but it will take the support of the whole community. You just have to hang in there when it gets tough," Ware said.

When businesses extend hours they need to let everyone know about it. Tell the hotel clerks, restaurant owners and in the winter the ski shuttle drivers so they can tell visitors about that business, she suggested.

Ware said the opening of the Museum of the Horse goes a long way to provide activities for people who visit Ruidoso. If the museum could also expand its hours, it would provide a great opportunity for evening entertainment, she said. Other villages have created activities such as farmers' markets, carriage rides or Jeep rides in their down towns to improve their tourist economy, she said. People will pay for these activities, but businesses have to keep in mind what price their particular market will bear, Ware said.

One concept that is being used in a variety of ways is the circle tour where an area or parts of a city work as a group in a marketing effort. Ware said the tour may be historical, driving, walking, scenic or any other connection people may make. Examples of these include the Turquoise Trail and the San Juan Skyway.

Also a good concept for a village is to cross-promote for events that are coming up. When people are in town they see what activities will be going on in the future. Ware said malls have been great promoters of events and that has hurt the downtown. She said Ruidoso has a huge return business for people who come back for specific events, but they need to keep reminding the new people of these events.

Promotional items with a village's name on it can also help with return visitors. This could include T-shirts, shopping bags or posters among other specialty items. If it has an interesting slogan or design on it, it can serve as a conversation starter when the person gets back home.

Directional signs are also free advertising, but villages have to be sure to make the message clear. Ware said she could probably be here three to four days and not know of the ski slope or race track because there are no signs in the downtown to promote them. Villages may also want to consider visitor information centers which can tell a variety of things if it is easy to read.

"Sometimes it takes someone from the outside to ask where things are to make a town realize it needs these things," Ware said.

Signs she didn't understand were the Up-Town and Mid-town that aren't really helpful to visitors

unless they already know the town. One sign that was impressed with the ware entry was at the "Y" where Sudderth Drive and Highway 70 meet. She said there was quite an improvement in the quality of the sign and the landscaping from when she visited the first entry.

It isn't just the first entry that businesses need to be concerned with because visitors also see the sides of buildings and the rear entries.

"Weeds and trash degrade your ability to charge what you want for your products," Ware said.

She said in addition to the village last week she had to carry a coke bottle around for quite awhile before finding a place to put it down. The Ruidoso MainStreet plan for an improved streetscape should help this problem, but businesses may not want to wait that long to help their customers, she said. Another concern is the lack of public restrooms in downtown. She said visitors want them to be convenient. Other public conveniences they look for are telephones, automatic teller machines and possibly police activity.

Make the most out of the vacant windows and buildings in the downtown, Ware said. Set up displays or information centers in them to encourage people to go a certain place, such as a museum or a business. Doing a nice window display in a business will also encourage people into an open store.

After presenting her ideas and slides of examples from other villages, Ware answered questions for those at the seminar. In the afternoon she was available to individual MainStreet members for consultation on marketing their individual business.

day that one of its programs was not properly entered. That caused about a one-hour delay, she said.

In reviewing the percentage of turnout by each party, while the Republicans registered five precincts with a higher than 60 percent show, the Democrats lagged behind with 58.7 percent as their best effort even though there were many more state offices involved.

The big money for the election was collected by Sheriff James McSwane, who won re-election in the Republican primary. Whereas most candidates received small contributions of \$25 and \$50, McSwane's list posted several at \$100 or more and one \$1,000 contribution from Dr. Phillip D. Jeffers,

who owns the O Bar O Ranch in Carrizozo.

Some of his other top contributors were Gerald and Tricia Tully of Glencoe for \$500, contractor Bill McCarty for \$200 and under sheriff Bob Miller of Ruidoso Downs for \$200.

His total contributions were listed as \$2,700 and expenses at \$2,099.

Proctor said since the report was filed 10 days before the election, the rest of McSwane's money and any additional contributions probably were spent and will be reflected in a subsequent financial report due 30 days after the primary.

But she noted the election law only deals with reporting, it does not address what to do with left over contributions once all campaign debts are paid.

"If money remains in the hands of the candidate or a (campaign support organization), the last report that has to be filed is due at six months," Proctor said. "But the law does specify what has to be done with the money after that."

Several candidates essentially donated to their own campaigns and reported those amounts. Others received substantial outside support.

County Treasurer Janice Ware, who won re-election in the Republican primary, reported \$730 in contributions and \$724.46 in expenses.

In amounts of \$100 or less, she noted contributions from Nora Silva of Capitán, local Republican party leaders Jack and Noema Page of Alto, former Ruidoso village councilor Jess Stinson of Ruidoso, and attorney J. Robert Beauvais

of Lincoln, Betsy Tillman of Ruidoso, McGary Studios of Alto and Mr. and Mrs. Frank Silva of Capitán.

Her defeated opponent Leon Eggleston showed \$663.86 in contributions from Sam Cherry and \$710.05 in expenses.

Don Dutton, defeated in the Republican primary for commission district 4, listed contributions from \$100 to \$300 from Faye Garcia of Carrizozo, contractor Bill McCarty, lawyer Michael Line of Ruidoso, Steve and Joan Stroud of Ruidoso and R.D. and Joan Hubbard of Ruidoso, for a total of \$1,150. His expenses were \$1,442.09.

Capitan Mayor Frank Warth was a contributor to the campaign of William Schwetmann, who is running as a Republican for county commission district 4. He also

plunked down \$100 for defeated Republican sheriff candidate, Jimmie Luna of Capitán.

Others adding their dimes to Luna's \$1,395 list included Bill Karn of Ruidoso. Luna noted his expenses as \$1,247.

Most candidates elected to keep their expenses under \$500 for the primaries. State election law specifies that they then do not have to submit an itemized account of all donations and expenditures.

Claiming they received or spent less than \$500 were Stirling Spencer, the incumbent Republican commissioner in District 1; Alvin Harrow, a Democrat defeated in the primary for the District 2 commission seat and Karon Petty, a Republican running for that post; Charles Griffin, a Democrat running for commission District 3 and

his opponent Wilton Howell, a Republican, as well as Elliott and Tommie Hall, Republicans defeated in the Republican primary; Fred Hansen, Democrat running for the District 4 commission post and Jack King, a Republican defeated in the Republican primary for that position; Monroy Montes, incumbent Republican from District 5 and James Sanchez, his Democratic opponent.

Also claiming no more than \$500 were Albert Baca, a Republican defeated in the primary for county tax assessor; Jerry Wright, a Democrat running for probate judge; Larry Ted Turnbow, a Democrat defeated for probate judge; Gilbert Sambrano, defeated in the Republican primary for sheriff; and Proctor, who faced no opposition for re-election as clerk.

Gentle Carmella could capture your heart

A stand out even behind the shelter cage door, Carmella's one blue eye and one green eye grab the attention of visitors to the Lincoln County Humane Society.

Her unusual features don't stop there. Shelter manager Randy Basch said Carmella's markings, round forehead and ears indicate she's a cross between a papillon and Australian shepherd.

The one-year-old female is brown merle in coloring. She was brought to the shelter as a stray two weeks ago.


"She's very gentle," Basch said. "Around other dogs that are aggressive, she's submissive. I think she'd get along with anything."

"She's obviously had some leash training and prances on a walk."

Basch said Carmella is housebroken, although she may need a little refreshing after her stay in the shelter.

The 30-pound dog should be considered a primarily indoor pet. "She's a low maintenance animal and will need only an occasional brushing," Basch said.

Carmella is sponsored for spaying. All animals adopted from the shelter must be spayed or neutered. That's part of the society's commitment to ensure they do not produce more unwanted cats or dogs, who

then face abandonment and eventual destruction by pounds and shelters.

Puppies and kittens routinely are dumped at the shelter by uncaring and negligent owners who fail to have their pets neutered and spayed, then refused to accept responsibility for their neglect.

Usually, those owners even refuse to keep the puppies 10 days longer to allow protective shots administered by Basch to take effect.

Without that protection, the litters often are doomed to death through exposure to distemper and parvo.

As an alternative and to give the puppies a fighting chance to find new owners, Basch uses foster homes.

"I need to hear from those homes who helped out last year or new people who are willing to be involved this summer," Basch said. "Please contact me."

A foster home cares for the pup-

pies for about two weeks while the immunizations kick in, and then the animals are returned to the shelter to be put up for adoption.


Because of the sheer number of animals dropped at the shelter or abandoned elsewhere, it becomes necessary to destroy more cats and dogs during the summer and early fall to prevent disease outbreaks and unhealthy conditions at the center.

Hoping he'll find a home soon is Frosty the cat.

A three-year-old male, who is slightly cross-eyed, Frosty has a reddish-tan coat and blue eyes, indicating a Siamese blood line.

"He's a friendly with other cats, but slightly intimidated by dogs. He doesn't bolt and run, though, so I feel he would adjust," Basch said.

Frosty was brought to the shelter three months ago as a stray. He is sponsored for his neutering. Sponsors pay the cost of the alteration, which is the major expense of

adoption from the shelter. Being sponsored greatly enhances an animal's chances to find a new owner. Sponsors may donate for a specific animal or to the spay and neuter fund.

Others who want to help by donating their time, may walk and

play with the animals at the shelter, which helps socialize them and keeps them alert.



BLM could send area water downstream

Officials with the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) may be considering removing from Lincoln County nearly 300 acres of water rights in the Rio Bonito.

County Commissioners Friday were upset to learn about the possibility, especially in view of recent assurances by State BLM Director Larry Woodard that the water would be used for locally beneficial activities.

Bureau officials have been trying for the past year to satisfy concerns of the commission about the proposed federal acquisition of 1,100 acres along the Rio Bonito. The privately-owned land would be acquired through an exchange for more than 20,000 federally-owned acres elsewhere in the state.

But commissioners said Friday that BLM officials apparently weren't candid with them when discussing water rights during a meeting last month.

"They sat there and said to us the water was never going to go to the Pecos (River system, which flows into Texas), that the system went underground," said Commission Chairman Stirling Spencer. "Yet it says right here that it could be going to the Pecos."

Spencer was referring to a letter from Martha C. Franks, special assistant attorney general, who attended the meeting last month with BLM officials on behalf of the State Engineer's Office.

In her letter, Franks said, "You were particularly interested in the possibility that the BLM might wish to establish an in-stream flow in the Rio Bonito, possibly in detriment to other water rights."

"I responded that at present New Mexico does not recognize an in-stream flow right, although there has been much proposed legislation and it was likely that such a right would be established in the future."

"Since that meeting, I have learned that the BLM has contacted the Interstate Stream Commission to explore the possibility of ensuring in-stream flow in the Rio Bonito by assigning water rights to

the (interstate commission) under the commission's water resources conservation project relating to the Pecos River."

Under a court order, New Mexico must set aside a certain amount of water in the Pecos River each year and allow it to flow to Texas in repayment of a water debt owed to that state.

"Water rights acquired by the commission under this project are not subject to forfeiture and reappropriation, therefore, the right cannot be exercised and must remain in the stream for the purpose of the project," Franks wrote.

"I was not aware at the time of the May 27 meeting either that the commission's powers...could be construed to produce this de facto in-stream flow rights, or that the BLM had informally inquired about this construction as it might apply to the Rio Bonito."

Even County Attorney J. Robert Beauvais, who recently purchased a home and property in the Lincoln area along the Rio Bonito, was outspoken about the BLM's actions.

"Two hundred and forty acres of water rights could go out of Lincoln County headed for the border," he said. "You're going to see people's fields drying up while they're sitting and watching the water go by."

"It would take away a person's private rights to the water," Spencer agreed. "They (Woodard and Roswell Resource District Manager Sandy Allen) said to us that it was never going to go to the Pecos. Yet it says right here, it (could go) to the Pecos."

"They sat right here and said they were going to use it for farming and crops," said County Manager Andy Wynham.

Spencer recalled that early in the Rio Bonito issue, the commission had been told that Woodard said the federal government was going to take over all the water rights in the western states.

"There's no value to land without water," Spencer said. "This is being pushed by the Eastern States that have a different situation."

Recalling a private meeting he

had with Woodard months previous, Spencer said, "I sat in his office. The guy sat there with a blank face and short (answers). I know he knew more."

Commissioners said they intend to take their concerns to U.S. Secretary of the Interior Manuel Lujan even if they have to track him down in another state. Commissioner Monroy Montes, as representative to the Western Interstate Region of the National Association of Counties, was assigned the job.

"It's my feeling the BLM in New Mexico has not complied with the spirit and intent (of the federal regulation) requiring cooperation with the county (on action involving local land)," Spencer said.

The BLM has exhibited no regard for an interim land use plan approved by the commission, he said.

The county, before a June 30 deadline, will submit objections to parts of the proposal for the exchange of land that commissioners said they do not think were sufficiently covered by the BLM.

"They may be in a hurry, but it's my contention that time is not our problem, according to the regulations," Spencer said.

In other action, the commission:

—Subject to negotiation of an administration fee, accepted a proposal for Tierra del Sol of Las Cruces to monitor the \$250,000 housing rehabilitation Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) project for low-income home owners. The firm, which already is handling a \$2,000 per house weatherization project and Federal Housing Authority \$115,000 rehab grant in the county, was the only firm that submitted a proposal.

Curtis Schrader, with the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, is overseeing the CDBG program. In consultation with Montes and Wynham, he was told by the commission to negotiate the fee under the \$25,000 proposed by the firm.

The commission hopes to work on at least 22 houses.

—Set a special meeting for 9 a.m. June 15 for the opening of bids

for insurance.
—Approved a loan of \$50,000 to the County Solid Waste Authority to be repaid at 7 percent interest in three annual payments of \$19,050. Commissioner Bill Elliott asked that it be paid back earlier if the authority finds itself in sufficiently solid financial condition.

The money is to be used to keep the fledgling Authority out of the red through the summer months until its garbage collection revenues begin to come in to offset major equipment expenditures.

The Authority in April began to take over responsibility for garbage collection in the county. Different areas of the county will be phased into the program as feasible.

—Approved for public hearing June 30 an ordinance mandating a monthly garbage collection fee for residents of the unincorporated sections of the county. Once that ordinance has been passed and has taken effect, the Authority will assume responsibility for those areas, according to manager Gene Green.

—Approved for public hearing June 30 an ordinance that would establish an administrative fee for utilities to install their lines on county rights of way. Special charges would be imposed for cutting through or boring under roads.

Beauvais said one particular utility has objected to the charge for boring. Yet that same utility cut asphalt roads in Alto without the county's permission even though the county had no ability to repair the roads and serious problems resulted.

Road manager Bill Cupit said someone from his department needs to be present when utilities are working in the rights of way.

—Approved a special September 15 referendum for the continuation of a 4.25 mill levy that is used to help support the Lincoln County Medical Center and Carrizozo Health Clinic.

Beauvais said he has been assured that the money generated by the millage could not be used by the commission to satisfy increasing state Medicaid contribution requirements from the county.

Sculptors stump for art

A lot of people have been taking a good, long look as they pass the Chamber of Commerce office on Sudderth Drive. Some just keep on driving while others stop to take a closer look and ask a few questions.

The object of all this curiosity is a tree stump that is beginning to take the form of a man, a friend of nature. When he is finished he will have small animals and birds gathered around him.

Although they are working on it by the Chamber of Commerce building, Roche said they have been discussing placing it somewhere else in the village, possibly the new civic events center, when it is completed.

The board is also expected to approve getting bids for a new fire truck.

Capitan lodgers tax proposed

Capitan village trustees will take a look tonight at a proposed ordinance that would impose a lodger's tax within the municipal limits. The board of trustees will meet at 7 p.m. in village hall.

Also on the agenda is an ordinance that would impose a fee for liquor licenses. A presentation by a representative of Apache Trails is scheduled, as is a discussion by Carrizozo Trustee Harold Garcia and former Capitan trustee David Rouleau of the proposed sale of Carrizozo-Capitan Natural Gas.

Gang incident to be discussed

The Ruidoso School Board will review the district's 1992-93 budget during its meeting at 7 p.m. Tuesday in the administration school next to Ruidoso Middle School.

School Supt. Mike Gladden and Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor will talk with board members about a gang-type incident at Middle School. Karen Tillman will go over results of state required tests with the board. White Mountain Elementary principal Frank Cannella and Intermediate principal Don Weems will discuss that campus' beautification project. Dean Hood and Gladden will give a soccer program presentation.

Among resignations scheduled to be accepted are Gerald Tully, a long-time mathematics teacher at the high school and Jackie Branum, a middle school science teacher who now serves on the Ruidoso Downs board of trustees.

Council considers concessionaire proposals

Authorization to publish a request for proposals on the concessions for the civic events center leads a thin agenda for the Ruidoso Council Tuesday.

Village manager Ron Wicker and his staff considered alternatives for providing food and beverages for the various events at the new center and determined a single vendor should provide food and beverages as well as alcoholic beverages.

Under this proposal the village would supply only minimal kitchen equipment, as the successful vendor would be obligated to provide the necessary equipment, materials, supplies, food, beverages and personnel for all events held at the center.

A two-year contract would be proposed in order for the vendor to pay for the costs to perform the services.

The proposals would be evaluated on experience and price, a percentage of gross receipts.

The agenda will begin with a public hearing on Ordinance 92-14, designed to repeal sanitation rates that would allow double taxing.

The ordinance is in preparation for an agreement with the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority for the village to smoothly administer sanitation bills with water bills for a cost of 39 cents per customer.

Other agenda items include:

1. Bid award on seal coat ag-

gregate. Village purchasing agent Fonda Hazel will recommend to the council that the bid be awarded to Wylie Corporation in the amount of \$3.50 per year for approximately 6,000 yards of seal coat aggregate.

2. Hear a request for assistance in improving Mountain Trail by Frank Fisk.

The commission told Fisk to work with adjoining property owners to resolve encroachment problems and secure right-of-way of

the very narrow trail to allow construction to village standards. Also, Fisk was to seek work by special assessment with property owners paying full cost.

3. Payment request for \$343,245.91 by the village staff for Bradley Construction, builders of the civic events center.

4. Discussion of meeting format, closed sessions. This item has not been discussed previously in an open meeting.

5. The request for proposals on center concessions discussed above.

6. Schedule a special meeting for a decision on village advertising.

7. Agreement with Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority for administrative services discussed above.

8. Schedule public hearing on Ordinance 92-15 to require audits of lodging vendors.

9. Lodging boards and commission appointments.



Don't go up a creek without a paddle

Warm spring weather has lots of folks thinking about getting out to the lake for another season of water sports. Boating, water skiing, sailing and fishing are great forms of entertainment. However, don't let an enjoyable outing turn into a tragedy, study and follow the rules of boating safety.

First of all, make sure the boat and motor are in good working condition before you get to the lake. A leaky boat or a motor that won't run can spoil an enjoyable outing or result in being stranded out on the lake. Also, make sure the boat and motor are compatible. All boats have a maximum horsepower rating for the size of motor that may be used with that particular boat, don't exceed the rating. First time boaters should learn how to operate all the equipment before seeing how fast it will go.

All boaters should make sure they have the necessary safety equipment on board. The list of equipment varies with the size of the craft, but certain equipment is required for all boats. There should be a Coast Guard approved personal flotation device (PFD) on board for everyone in the boat. Children and those that don't know how to swim should wear a PFD at all times when on the water. The boat should

be equipped with a fire extinguisher, bilge pump or bailing bucket, whistle or horn for signaling, extra rope for towing, paddles or oars, a first aid kit, flashlight or running lights, a basic tool kit and simple spare parts.

Once all this equipment is on board, don't forget the most important part of boating safety, your brain! First, don't overload a boat. All boats are rated on capacity for the persons, motor and gear they can carry, heed the warnings. Probably the most important safety rule on our large reservoirs is to keep an eye on the weather and head for shore when conditions warrant. Thunderstorms and high winds can really result in some dangerous boating conditions. In addition, pay attention to what you are doing at all times and keep a sharp lookout for other boats, swimmers, skiers,

scuba divers, anglers and obstructions. Remember also, that sun, wind, glare and just the motion of the boat can effect vision and actions and don't aggravate the situation by using drugs or alcohol when boating.

Boaters should also know and follow the "rules of the road." Generally, rowboats, sailboats and canoes have the right-of-way over power boats. Boats approaching from the right also have the right-of-way. When meeting another boat each should steer to the right. When passing a boat, let them know you are coming and give the other boat a wide berth. Boats in high speed operation should also stay at least 150 feet away from stationary boats.

In addition to the rules of the road, take your manners with you to the lake. Don't annoy other boaters by zooming around in close proximity. If you see another boater having trouble lend a helping hand, it may be you in this predicament next week. Remember also that small boats such as canoes or rowboats may be easily swamped so slow down and give them room.

Get out and enjoy water sports this summer at our New Mexico lakes, but do it safely. Don't let a boat outing turn into a tragedy.





Although Hatchetta and jockey Chris Zamora raced in last place in the first quarter mile of the 7 1/2-furlong race, the team weaved their way to the front to pull clear at the top of the stretch.

Hatchetta had finished a dismal sixth place in her last race at Ruidoso Downs when she tried to sprint six furlongs. Her previous poor racing, however, did not discourage fans who sent her to the post as the 7-5 favorite in the seven-horse field.

"All she needed was a little longer distance," said Roberts. "Her last race was just too short."

Lincoln educator retires from NMMI

Lincoln County native James Sanchez, after more than 26 years in education encompassing all levels, has announced his retirement.

Though he is now "officially" retired, Sanchez is far from it, according to his wife, Lynda, also an educator and writer. They reside in historic Lincoln where they ranch and are involved in numerous local, community and state-wide activities.

Sanchez began at Ruidoso High School teaching electricity, electronics, drafting and architectural design. After four years he returned to graduate school where he obtained his master's degree in psychology and counseling, and later an Administrator's Certificate. He is certified to teach psychology, biology and the general sciences.

While Sanchez was serving as an elementary counselor in Portales, Ruidoso's superintendent, Pat Valliant, called and asked if he would like to return to the mountains and Ruidoso schools to develop a full time counseling program.

Sanchez agreed and returned to a growing district where he became the director of guidance and counseling and vocational education. During this time he developed one of the first comprehensive vocational programs in the district as well as in the State of New Mexico. These included the Industrial During this time he also was in-

involved in coaching both boys and girls sports and was responsible for introducing the Academic All District Award for worthy athletes stressing strong academic performance as well as athletic ability.

Today, many schools have incorporated that recognition into their annual awards presented to athletes.

Along with Sandy Gladden and Dub Williams, he was instrumental in establishing the yearly Academic Awards Banquet.

Because of his innovative ideas and expertise, Sanchez was asked to serve on various state education advisory committees.

His appointment to the New Mexico State Board of Education by Governor King was the latest and perhaps most important, in his estimation, since it is the State Board that sets policy and direction for the more than 88 school districts in New Mexico. This board, of which he is now vice president, also approves funding of more than one billion dollars for these districts. It is a big responsibility that Sanchez takes very seriously.

One little known fact is that for years he was one of a handful of bilingual diagnosticians in the entire state of New Mexico.

After 18 years in Ruidoso, Sanchez was offered a position with New Mexico Military Institute. He worked as a college adviser and served as chairman of the Human

Rights Council and Director of Affirmative Action.

He has served for eight years as a trustee of Lincoln County Medical Center and is past chairman of the Lincoln County Planning Commission.

His recent decision to run for the County Commission for District 5 is but another example of his concern and interest in his native region.

"Lincoln County is one of the most diverse and beautiful counties in New Mexico, in the Southwest actually, and we must strive to maintain this special quality of life for our residents. I will now have more time to devote to important county issues," said Sanchez. "Am I retired," he asks. "Officially, yes, but not really."

Museum of the Horse presents Sadie Orchard in first special program for members, guests

The flamboyant Sadie Orchard will ride again at 2 p.m. Sunday, June 14, at the Museum of the Horse in Ruidoso Downs.

Sadie, also known as Jean Jordan, will entertain members of the museum and members of the community with her performance sponsored by the brand new Anne C. Stradling Museum of the Horse.

Sarah Jane "Sadie" Orchard, a 17-year old cockney with a shady past from London's docks, arrived in the Hillsboro/Kingston mining area at the end of the 19th century. Sadie regularly drove a six-horse Concord stagecoach through the Black Range Indian country.

Sadie left an irrevocable mark with her stagecoach, her brothel on Virtue Avenue, her hotel, and her "pet name" relationship with New Mexico's leading businessmen and politicians.

Sadie Orchard is the first of many membership programs planned for the Museum of the Horse.

"We decided Sadie would be a fun way to start the season" said development director Frank Potter. "These performances are designed to educate and entertain the people who come to the Museum of the Horse."

Organizers have tried to find

programs that relate to the wide variety of artifacts found within the museum itself. "Sadie Orchard" will be presented in front of one of the two stagecoaches found in the Anne Stradling Collection.

"Sadie Orchard" is presented by popular chautauqua performer Jean Jordan. Jean brings a wide range of experience with her. She has a master's degree in acting, writing, directing and teaching. She attended the world famous Juilliard school for the arts as well as Columbia University, Southern Methodist University, the University of Texas and the University of Guadalajara. She has been an artist-in-residence with the New Mexico Endowment for the Arts for the past two years. Her talents range from night club singer to playwright and director.

RAIN IN THE FACE

Sculpture greets guests to Museum of the Horse

Three larger than life size bronze sculptures by Ruidoso artist Dave McGary have been purchased by the Hubbard Foundation, according to a news release.

The first bronze, "Rain in the Face", was delivered for the Museum of the Horse's grand opening in late May, and is on guard by the front door at the museum.

As a prominent leader of the Sioux tribe, this warrior distinguished himself many times in battle. His posture is slightly slumped and the war shield dangles loosely from two fingers to show fatigue.

Below his distinctive wolf's head, his facial warpaint is streaked with rain.

The other two sculptures, "Iron that Walks" and "American Horse", were Gros Ventre and Oglala Sioux respectively.

These works record the cultural and aesthetic personalities of these historically important individuals.

McGary is known for his research in great detail to portray as accurate a representation as possible.

These artworks depicting the Native American experience are cast in bronze, finished in multi-colored patina and hand painted.

Recreating heroes from the past is an area which McGary excels. Two of his bronzes, "Horse Thief" and "Buffalo Warrior" are in the permanent collection of the White House in Washington, D.C.

In September of 1991, McGary won a national competition sponsored by the city of Santa Fe. The award was \$125,000 to create a representation of Don Pedro de Peralta, the found of Santa Fe.

This oversize bronze monument shows Peralta astride his horse pointing out the location of the city to his engineer.

The official unveling and dedication will take place during the annual Fiesta in September.

Her entrees include Mexican dishes, steaks and sandwiches and they also have a bar for a variety of drinks. They also have daily lunch and dinner specials.

Many people may have been to the restaurant in its younger days when it served as a lodge for summer retreats for the cadets of the New Mexico Military Institute. The walls of the building are adorned with old photographs of this period in its history. The Institute owned the property until 1943 when World War II began. The building is now on the national registry of historic landmarks.

Rosalie's is sure to make history as well for being one of the best restaurants in the county.





Stop for pedestrians in the crosswalks in Midtown. That's a good time, too, to smile and make sure tourists and other shoppers feel welcome in our little town.



Police officers group objects to editorial

TO THE EDITOR:

The Sierra Blanca Lodge of the Fraternal Order of Police takes exception to your editorial dated 5-14-92. The timing of your editorial was chosen in poor taste, as the week of May 10 through May 16 was set aside by a Presidential Proclamation as police remember the thousands of officers who had been slain in the line of duty. Every 56 hours an officer is killed in this country.

We take exception to your premise that the local police made no arrests during the last motorcycle rally because they were outnumbered. The local police, and all other law enforcement agencies are always outnumbered. There are over 250,000,000 people in the United States. There are less than 500,000 police in the United States. Just last weekend, on Saturday night, May 23, the local police had a total of three officers on duty. (Ruidoso Police Department and Ruidoso Downs Police Department.)

Referring to the editorials' example of "speeding, public intoxication, public nudity and the exchange of gunfire," only the exchange of gunfire was an arrestable offense. The parties involved in the shootings, shot each other; neither one wished to press charges nor would they cooperate in the investigation; no witnesses wished to testify. Therefore, it was decided best not to pursue a criminal prosecution, due to the difficulty of obtaining a conviction with the above

mentioned factors being considered. Nationally, arrests and incarceration of violent offenders are at historical highs, but violent crime continues to go up. It is becoming more apparent that arresting and incarcerating violent offenders is not solving the problem. The problem of violence in our society is too deeply rooted.

As for speeding, offenders are cited, not arrested.

Public intoxication is not against the law in New Mexico. Public nudity as "committed" by certain females during the last rally, is only illegal inside a licensed liquor establishment.

The motorcycle rally for the past 10 or so years has attracted large numbers of "outlaw" types. Their presence in our local bars has always posed a high potential for violence. In the late '70s and early '80s the local police were able to keep some control over the situation by having all of their officers working extended shifts, canceling days off, and by having other law enforcement agencies assist. The local officers were paid overtime and the other agencies' officers were paid per diem.

This changed in the late '80s and early '90s. The leadership of the village stated allowing licensed liquor establishments to have street dances, which included a "picnic" license. This allowed hundreds of bikers to drink in public, right in the middle of town. The serving of

liquor in parking lots made enforcement of such laws as drinking in public, impossible. With hundreds of intoxicated bikers roaming the downtown area, it's small wonder we haven't had someone killed. The local leadership also cut overtime and would not pay for other agencies to come and assist.

To allude that local police allowed such lawlessness is wrong. The local police did not invite, nor sponsor these rallies. Certain elected officials, however, have invited and sponsored these rallies. The local leadership not only condoned the rallies, but made enforcement of the very laws mentioned in the editorial, all but unenforceable due to their policies and practices as mentioned above.

The local police will always endeavor to perform their duties to the best of their abilities, even when hamstrung by the local leadership. The local police will continue to work these motorcycle rallies even when they are undermanned, overworked, and underpaid.

Our question, as law enforcement officers, is this: Will the money generated in revenues, special permit and licensing fees, be compensation enough to the Village, if one citizen, or one business, or one visitor is injured or destroyed?

Personally, as law enforcement officers; we do not believe the compensation rate is equal to the pos-

sible damages.

Police, in today's society, are not very well liked. This has not always been. But since the explosion of illegal drug use, especially in the entertainment industry, and the constant portrayal of police as the "bad" guy and the outlaw as the "hero" in movies and television, it's no wonder we see this kind of editorial. The police in this country are not a reflection of society. They are better.

Less than half of one percent of all officers turn out bad. That's a better percentage rate than even the clergy. The police are screened, tested, educated, examined, interviewed, checked through NCIC, and samples of their urine tested for drugs. When a bad one is found, they are removed from the ranks.
