

## Council wants sweeter deal with the Links

Legal matters sent the Ruidoso Village Council behind closed doors Tuesday, and when councilors returned they voted on three items.

The council voted to settle a dispute with Air Space, Inc. of Las Cruces, to settle a wrongful termination suit that dates back to 1987 and to renegotiate the contract on The Links at Sierra Blanca.

After Links to re-open negotiations on The Links contract, Councilor Ron Andrews volunteered to be the negotiator with R.D. Hub-

bard, principal owner of AllHub, the golf course operator.

Asked what bargaining chips the village may have to open negotiations with Hubbard, village attorney David Thomsen said it would not be wise to disclose any bargaining strategy.

The village currently receives zero dollars (\$0) for the use of the land.

The Links would have to gross more than \$1.5-million in any given year in order for the village to get a piece of the gross.

## Golden Aspen Rally promoter Andrews turns thumbs down on paying for motorcycle event police protection

Ruidoso Councilor-promoter Ron Andrews Tuesday bristled at the suggestion that he should share the cost for extra police protection during his for-profit Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally.

The need for that extra help was brought up late in the council meeting as a result of a condemning letter criticizing their handling of last year's motorcycle event.

The police cried foul to newspaper reports that gilded that they allowed last year's lawlessness, which included a stabbing and a shooting.

The strongly worded letter, drafted by 27 members of the local Fraternal Order of Police accused "certain elected officials" of making laws during the rally "unenforceable due to their policies and practices."

With hundreds of intoxicated bikers roaming the downtown area, it's small wonder we haven't had someone killed," the letter read. "The local leadership also cut overtime

and would not pay for the other agencies to come and assist."

The council, although downplaying the incident, has initiated plans to beef up this year's police protection for the event with a plan to boost police power and pay.

Comparing his motorcycle rally to Aspenfest and the Ruidoso Downs Race Track, Andrews took exception to Councilor Jerry Shaw's suggestion that he should pay a part of the additional cost of the increased police presence.

event does," Andrews said. Hubbard does share in the cost of traffic control at Ruidoso Downs, the racetrack located in a multi-million dollar facility providing the seasonal activity that is the area's largest summer draw.

Aspenfest is a community, non-profit, family event with a traditionally low propensity for violence. The for-profit motorcycle rally does not enjoy the wholesome profile as either event.

President Katherine Finley, who has led the new group through its formative years, will pass the gavel to newly-elected president Genevieve Sewell.

Others to be installed on Monday include: Norma Fallwell, first vice president; Cece Griffin, second vice president; Dot Copeland, third vice president; Magel Powell, secretary; Pat Jensen, treasurer.

Elected officials have been invited to attend as special guests, but in keeping with the non-partisan national organization's strict policies, no candidates for public office will speak.

It had been incorrectly reported that Senator Pete Campos would be the guest speaker, but Campos, a candidate for re-election, will be among elected officials who are special guests, not on the program, explained Finley.

During the past two years, the League of Women Voters of Lincoln County has put together and accomplished a program of work that included a successful candidates forum before the general election of 1990, and researching and publishing an informative "Know Your County" study that is now available.

## Ruidoso bypasses state in its efforts to stop N-waste dump

Councilor Bill Karn, on the heels of a meeting with Governor Bruce King, suggested Tuesday the village's fight against nuclear waste storage directly to the federal government.

Early in the regular council meeting, Councilor Karn suggested an amendment to the Nuclear Waste Policy Act to exclude from siting a monitored retrievable storage (MRS) site in any state that hosts a WIPP site or a permanent N-waste depository within its boundaries.

The council voted unanimously to bypass the state and send a letter to U.S. Rep. Joe Skeen (R-NM) asking him to sponsor the amendment.

Also Tuesday, Karn asked that the council be kept up to date on any gang activities surrounding and within the school system.

Councilor Barbara Duff read a letter congratulating the chamber for Ruidoso being named one of the top 100 small resort towns by "Vacation magazine."

Duff said David Sailor, owner of Village Plaza, granted permission to the village to construct public restrooms at the back of the shopping center.

Wicker said that restrooms have been designed for the Main Street project near the Winner's Circle. He said the restrooms will cost about \$60,000 and will meet ADA regulations. He said restrooms might be needed at several locations.

Alonso received an award from Governor Bruce King and Judith Espinosa, secretary of the environment, for his leadership in solid waste. He said that Lincoln County and its leadership is being used as a prototype for other counties.

The council approved a resolution motion by Councilor Shaw to encourage Senator Domenici's bill to extend the deadlines of the safe drinking water act for a four year period.

**Slow Pay**  
Planning and Zoning administrator Cleatus Richards said he received a complaint from civic

events center subcontractor Barney Rue that Bradley Construction, builder of the center, was more than 90 days late in paying him about \$39,000.

Richards said Testing Laboratories of Alamogordo also noted a \$750 delinquency of more than 90 days.

The staff is recommending at this time to withhold that amount from the contract payment to protect the subcontractors who have not been paid," Richards said.

He said Bradley should provide evidence that the contractors have been paid before the money owed would be released.

He said evidence of payment would be a certificate and release from Barney Rue and Testing Laboratories verifying that they had been paid.

Alonso expressed disappointment over Bradley Construction's poor work effort.

"We're trying to hold their feet to the fire. It's just unfortunate that we don't have the same calibre of contractor doing the civic events center as we did on the highway," Alonso said.

Duff said she was concerned that there was no work done on days that were beautiful.

Karn said he was told by the workers that they could only work specific times because they were union.

Richards said he asked if they would put on a second crew because the company would not allow overtime.

"I don't know what we need to do to get these contractors to respond," Alonso said. "But I'm concerned that our local contractors are not getting paid and I favor this withholding."

The council approved paying Bradley \$322,000 and to holding back the money owed Rue and Testing Labs until Bradley honors those obligations.

Richards said he also notified the bond holder for Bradley construction of the nonpayment to the subcontractors.

# Ruidoso Downs talks money, benefits and staffing

For the first time since taking office in March, Ruidoso Downs Mayor Joe Hayhurst was called on to cast the deciding vote on an issue after the four trustees were split in their decision.

Hayhurst voted in favor of hiring village employee Ronnie Randolph for full-time employment, siding with trustees Charlotte Craig and Jackie Branum. Trustees Ray Fredrickson and Judy Miller voted against the hiring because it would be an extra cost for the village.

Randolph had been working in the sanitation department but since that was turned over to the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority in April, he has been working with parks and recreations and anything else the village needs done, said maintenance supervisor Dennis Riddle. Riddle gave the board members a written report on Randolph and told them that he has been a super employee to have because he is willing to do a variety of jobs.

Riddle said they need Randolph because they have one employee

who resigned and one who is about to retire. He said they have only six people to work the whole village in maintenance. Randolph began working at the village through the high school work study program in 1990 and became temporary full-time after graduating in 1991.

Oscar Hoffer, also a village employee, said he has probably worked with Randolph more than anyone else at the village and he has been very easy to work with. He never complains and he always does the work he is supposed to, Hoffer said.

Fredrickson said the cost in insurance and benefits to put him on as permanent full-time would be too expensive. Village clerk Leann Weibrecht said they are already weighing the taxes and social security, and the insurance match would only be about \$25 per month.

Miller said she has seen two employees picking up limbs, but why couldn't just one do it? They weren't wearing safety belts either when they were working, which could be a liability to the village,

she said.

"All I've heard since I ran for this office is this village is broke," Miller said.

Riddle said there are a lot of two-men jobs in the village including picking up limbs which are sometimes very heavy. Weibrecht also said safety belts are in the budget for the next fiscal year, and they have implemented a safety program for all departments.

When it came down to the vote, Hayhurst said after looking over the report from Riddle and since they do have Randolph's pay in the budget anyway, he voted in favor of hiring Randolph.

In other business, the board accepted bids on two of the items they had put up for sale last month. Tommy White had the high bid of \$512 for a 1975 Dodge pick-up and received it. They also approved the bid of \$1,001 by McCarty Paving for a dump truck. Weibrecht said they didn't receive bids for the flatbed, salt box and plow. The village isn't paying any insurance on these items so it isn't costing anything to

have them around, she said.

The board did request her to re-open the bidding on the flatbed with no minimum bid requirement. They will hold on to the rest of the equipment for now.

Trustees have also approved going out for bids on a new fire truck, a Class A pumper with a 750 gallon capacity. Weibrecht said one of the fire department's trucks is about 20 years old, and there is no way to bring it up to working standards. She said if they have a fire call out of district, it would basically leave the village unprotected.

She said it may be possible to trade in the old engine for the new one, but they will just have to wait for the bids to come in. Weibrecht said they have a state fire allotment of \$32,658 a year that has to be spent each year. Trustees can get the bids in for the truck and After discussion of the issue, the board approved his request.

Ruidoso Downs Auxiliary president Shirlene Fitzner reported to the board what the group has been

doing at the new senior center. She said they had a successful potluck dinner in April that helped the center fill its shelves. They have recently purchased a hood for the stove and had it cleaned. Gas has also been hooked up for the building, she said, and shrubs and trees have been planted around it.

The village planted the trees for them, but Fitzner said they will need some assistance in watering them as well. The mayor said they would be happy to help care for the trees.

Fitzner also reported that they received approval from the state to do the adopt-a-highway program, but the signs haven't come in yet. The village has already made poles that people can use to pick-up garbage along the road. The group is also checking into the costs of putting up two welcome signs in Ruidoso Downs, but will come back before the board if they decide they would like to put the signs up.

As the board was discussing the senior center, former trustee Tony Parker asked why the village hall

could not be moved into the center, even on a temporary basis, until they have a new building. Weibrecht said the state will not allow the village to be in the center because it was paid for in part by a Community Development Block Grant. If the village breaks any of the regulations it is required to pay back all of the grant.

The village won't be using state matching cooperative funds to pave Wood Lane because the village couldn't come up with the matching money in time, Weibrecht told an audience member who asked about that project. She said they have money in the next year's budget to improve the road, but it won't be paved. They will put in culverts before putting on six inches of gravel and sealing it.

The parks committee and the senior citizens committee will both be meeting within the next few weeks, Weibrecht said. She hadn't been able to get everyone on the committees together because the village office has been busy with the budget.

stantial investment in the golf course and the common areas of the civic events center and hotel site, he stands to lose \$100,000 if a planned hotel isn't built this year.

In an unrelated matter regarding The Links, village manager Ron Wicker read a letter from attorney Don Dutton on behalf of Hubbard.

The letter expressed disappointment that the jogging trails had not been completed by the village and that Hubbard was being blamed unfairly for the village's delay.

Wicker reported the jogging trail on the south end of the golf course has been completed since the letter was written. He said the golf course fence extends into the right of way at the north of the golf course and the road will have to be relocated to accommodate the path. He said Hubbard had agreed to pay \$10,000 toward that relocation.

"I'm sure its going to cost considerably more than \$10,000 because it involves widening the road on the north side," Wicker said.

The entry road and civic events center paving should be completed by the end of June, according to Wicker.

Genevieve Sewell, a regular at the council meetings who often furnishes refreshments for the council and audience, said Hubbard was responsible for planting bushes around the chain link fence that surrounds the course.

Sewell said the original intent was to make the fence more attractive.

Mayor Victor Alonso said he shared Hubbard's disappointment that some of the projects had not been completed. Alonso said the village departments have completed a lot of work around the civic events center while trying to keep pace with streets and other routine obligations.

Also after the executive session, councilors voted to purchase air-plane hangars from Air Space Inc. for \$215,000.

Thomsen called it a net settlement. It was not determined how the village would pay for the new business venture.

Andrews said he didn't think government should compete or enter the arena reserved for private business.

"I have serious reservations about a governmental entity that we all know is very inefficient in the operation of any enterprise that it ever enters into, purchasing a business that private proprietor says is not making any money," Andrews said.

"I am concerned that we will lose more money than he is losing and I do not approve of the purchase," he said, casting the only "no" vote.

Thomsen discussed various

methods of purchase with the council.

"The alternatives set out in the letter are either cash payment which we may or may not be able to obtain by bonds, or time payments which would have to be acceptable to both the village and Mutual Building and Loan for that amount," Thomsen said. "That could be done by a lease purchase agreement."

Alonso also noted Air Space requested a two-year first option. Presumably on another piece of property.

The hangars now generate \$2,700 per month, according to Air Space.

The council also settled a wrongful termination suit filed in 1989 by Danny Stewart, a former detective with the Ruidoso police.

Thomsen said under the agreement with Risk Management, the village's share was about \$26,500.

Two other wrongful termination cases are pending, one filed by former airport manager and Transportation Division director Tim Morris and the other by former police officer Kent Berkedahl.

Also Tuesday, Wicker gave an update on water leaks for the community.

"So far we have identified leaks that would amount to over 10-million gallons of water a month," Wicker said.

He said the department has been able to repair several million gallon per month leaks.

"Are we going to have to tear up the street?" a concerned Mayor Alonso asked.

Wicker assured Alonso that no one has to dig into Sudderth at this point.

Councilor Bill Karn asked when the two tennis courts, under construction for over a year, would be completed.

Wicker said money had been placed in the new budget to complete the courts. That money will be available July 1.

A local resident in the audience reported that the two "good" courts were sporting several huge cracks and were in need of repair before the damage escalated.

Wicker said he would inspect the courts.

In other regular business, the council approved Ordinance 92-14, an ordinance to prevent double taxation in sanitation billings under the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

Councilors also approved handling solid waste billing for 39 cents per customer.

Alonso said the village could save the authority money by inserting garbage bills inside the village's monthly water bill envelopes.

He said it would also save the authority from the necessity of purchasing computers at this time.

## Councilors spend 57 minutes on how to shorten their marathon meetings

In a workshop session preceding Tuesday's meeting, the Ruidoso Village Council spent 37 minutes discussing how to cut the long hours spent during the regulars meeting.

During the council session, another 20 minutes was discussed on the subject.

The council voted to lump items together in a consent agenda, items that require a single vote. They felt that would cut 15 minutes from the seven- to eight-hour televised talkfests.

Andrews was concerned that the public forum be kept open as long as necessary.

"I've never believed in cutting the discussion short at the podium, or the number of people to discuss things at the podium," he said.

Andrews indicated that standing at the podium could be intimidating.

"They have decided it was very important or they wouldn't be standing there," he said.

"I think we owe it to them (the public) to discuss whatever they think is important. They are the ones that pay our salaries," Andrews said.

He said he would not be against adding a third meeting.

Shaw said she was concerned about retirees having to stay so late to be on the agenda.

Outside of the consent agenda, no other changes were made in the meeting format.

Concessionaire Sought

Kathleen Michelena, civic events director, reported to the council that a single vendor to provide food and beverages as well as alcoholic beverages was the village's proposal.

Michelena said the center's kitchen has a severe space problem because the design was predicated on the hotel being built next to the center.

She said to allow separate caterers to simultaneously use the center, as well as an independent beverage dispenser, mass confusion would be inevitable.

She said one entity could handle liquor, coffee and food service for the groups to create less congestion.

Michelena said that different clubs and organizations may be interested in serving their own types of food and beverage. She gave Oktoberfest's German beer and knockwurst as an example.

"It's very easy to specify, when the request for proposal (RFP) is published, that there are certain clubs and organizations that do not fall under the guidance of the concessionaire," she said.

Michelena said a goal of the center is uniformity.

"All servers are to dress with black trousers, black skirts and white shirts and blouses," she

said. "You need to have that consistency if you're going to serve sit down dinners to groups of thousands."

"The concessionaire also will supply the linens. Necessities have to be furnished in a first class way with quality," she said.

Deputy manager Gary Jackson said that the RFP should be sent out immediately.

The council passed a motion that a draft of the RFP be brought back before the council at a special meeting at 10 a.m. on June 15.

In other regular business Tuesday, the council:

—scheduled a public hearing on Ordinance 92-15 relating to required audits of lodging vendors for the June 30 council meeting.

—heard several residents from Ponderosa Heights request road work to be done in their area. Ken Bearden complained of a tree growing in the middle of the street that poses a problem to passersby. Bearden said a giant mud puddle steered cars to the wrong lane.

The council asked the staff to come up with an estimate of road improvement as well as look at the tree.

—asked the staff to look into programmable signs to be placed in strategic areas to advertise events held within the community.

posed a high potential for violence.

Councilor Bill Karn said money has been set aside for the police department this year.

Shaw said she didn't recall overtime pay being created for the event.

Village manager Ron Wicker said overtime was essentially the same as it was last year. But according to several police observers, under the current council, overtime means compensating time off

instead of pay. This has often led to two officers protecting the entire village instead of three or four officers on duty.

Those observers note that with only two officers on duty, simultaneous calls to police dispatch could prevent an officer from having a backup and put that officer at risk.

Wicker said he is looking for extra help this year.

"We will look at the state department of public safety per diem charges for those people, plus the mounted patrol. We also went

ahead with the process, prior to the letter coming out, of saying that we want to go on a 12-hour shift, cancelling all vacations and unnecessary leave," Wicker said.

He said the June 30 council meeting will unveil a plan developed by the police department.

Wicker said there would be an estimate of the extra cost involved explained at the meeting.

"If we have to bring in a lot of extra people," Shaw said. "I think the event itself might have to help." That prompted event-owner

Andrews to set his terms for sharing costs that included Hubbard and Aspenfest.

"I heard local citizens could be deputized for that three-day period," said Councilor Barbara Duff. "Is there anything to that?"

Wicker said he was unaware of a previous suggestion of that sort.

"To be deputized, I'd think you have to be a certified police officer," he said. "I think it would be more of a liability than an asset."

With no more discussion, the council moved to go into closed session.

# Gang threat prompts school board to adopt dress code policy

New policies and a dress code may be instituted by the Ruidoso School Board next August to deter teen gangs from gaining a local foothold.

District School Superintendent Mike Gladden told board members Tuesday about an incident near the end of the school year allegedly involving gang threats and the display by a Tularosa student of what appeared to be a weapon.

He thanked Ruidoso Police Chief Dick Swenor for responding to a call for help at Ruidoso Middle School.

The offending students from Otero County were apprehended by police later that day, Gladden said. "This caused concern throughout the community that something like this could be occurring," Gladden said. "It caused concern with school officials."

"I just want to tell you some of the things that are being done and are planned for the beginning of school next year."

Board president Lynn Willard and Gladden are scheduled to attend a legal seminar this weekend and one of the topics running rampant throughout the state is how to deal with gang activity, gang threats and gang attitudes surfacing throughout New Mexico," Gladden said. "It's one of those things that we'd like to see never happen

in Ruidoso, but we have some students, whether they're involved in a gang or are gang want-to-be's, we don't want to let that catch hold in our district."

Policies will be proposed and discussed at the seminar, he said.

"They will have to do with procedures and how to handle the students who come into our schools from California, Texas, Albuquerque and Las Cruces, who want to bring that attitude into our district."

Based on that input, the staff will form a policy and give it to the board for review and a first reading July 14, and a final vote in August to put it in place for the school year.

"Something like this makes you re-evaluate your procedures for emergencies," Gladden said. "We're already doing that. We'll refine those so that everything should be handled quickly."

"One of the things where we'll be asking the community to cooperate. There is a direct link with some of the dress that kids wear to school and wear outside the school that have to do with the (gang) organizations," he said.

"We've always prided ourselves in Ruidoso that we didn't need an elaborate dress code. It is time now to rethink that. All we ask is to wear clothing that is not suggestive and not to dress with spike hair or something that can poke your eyes out, things of that nature."

Some districts are adopting dress codes to eliminate gang colors and the wearing of hats in school halls, Gladden said.

"This is something that the board will be looking at very closely," he said. "We realize there will be some parents who say this isn't fair. If they realize the major motive of wearing certain colors and the hats in the positions that they do, then I think they will be appreciative that the school is stepping forward and making the environment of the school safer."

A letter was sent to parents before end of school year telling them what to watch for in the clothing their children buy, Gladden said.

Swenor said the final week of school "was something else," and that he spent many nights with parents.

"Fear is a great motivator, but also leads to irrationality," Swenor said. "A lot of subsequent things that happened were based on misinformation."

"We will do everything we can to try to keep the community informed. But it's extremely difficult."

Big city problems eventually will overflow into smaller systems such as Ruidoso, he said.

"We live in the sixth most violent state in the country, little old New Mexico," Swenor said. "There's a lot of reasons. The whole society is permeated with violence. Here in Ruidoso, violent crimes are

up 30 percent and domestic violence is up 70 percent. We can't say it's not happening in our community."

"It's scary when it gets down to the kids. I have nightmares about something happening in a school."

Despite all the scares, there was just one incident on campus last year involving a real gun and that was at the high school, he said. Offenders now can be prosecuted under federal law as well as state and local laws.

Something that bothers him almost more than the prospect of real guns is the look-alike gun craze involving pellet guns, water guns and BB guns that resemble real firearms.

"Ten feet away you can't tell the difference and an officer can't tell up killing someone who's brandishing one of these things," Swenor said, holding up an example.

Gangs appeal to young people because membership is a way of belonging, he said. Society needs to find a way to direct that drive toward positive pursuits.

"The only answer I know of is education, starting with the children," Swenor said.

The community also must be involved in an effort. That's difficult with the proliferation of single-parent families where supervision is at a minimum, he said.

Curbing the use of alcohol and breaking up groups where younger

children mix constantly with older students also would help, he said. Activities targeted for more limited age groups would improve the picture.

"We will look at minor security measures (at school campuses), no cyclone fences, spotlights or gun towers," Swenor said.

"But what we need the most is for the teachers, staff and community to be aware and watchful, and to contact us, to tell us if something starts."

"I think we've got a handle on it and I don't think there is any organized gang activity here. My people are watching for that."

Meanwhile, parents should support a statewide effort to revamp the juvenile justice system, he said. "Right now there is no way to correct behavior," he said.

Ruidoso also has a better chance because "we've got the type of community when something happens, I can pick up the telephone and call the superintendent of schools, call in a teacher or a principal, and they can call us. It's not big a bureaucratic apparatus to work through."

In other business, the school board:

—Presented engraved silver platters to long time district teacher Jackie Branum of Ruidoso Middle School, speech therapist Karen Crane Tingley and Special Education services director Karen

Tillman. The three women have resigned.

—Accepted the resignations of second grade teacher Kim Gibson, high school math teacher Gerald Tully, special education teacher Richard Erhard and high school secretary Teresa Anderson.

—Hired Dan McNulty as a high school science teacher, Eddie Hedin as a high school special education teacher, Juan Baca as a high school history teacher, Danette McNulty, Waynta Wirth and Gretchen Becker as middle school education teachers, Joe Chavez as school bus driver, Bill Rogge as high school custodian, Virginia Mays as instructional aide at Nob Hill and Yvette Torres Troy as a first grade teacher.

—Voted to expand the Chapter I remediation program from language arts to mathematics for a total of \$85,895.

—Heard a report by Frank Cannella, principal of White Mountain Elementary on efforts to beautify the school campus and to create a community recreation area.

Gladden credited Smoky Stover with pulling the project together. Donations from Altrusa, the Board of Realtors and the Volunteer Alliance were noted as well as labor and equipment from local businesses. More than 100 trees and shrubs have been planted, three tables built and two picnic shelters will be installed.

# Truck crash up north alarms area N-waste dump opponents

A truck accident that caused a five mile slice of Interstate 40 Tuesday delivered a warning that federal, state and local officials should heed, say opponents to using New Mexico as a dumping ground for nuclear waste.

The truck was carrying a highly poisonous gas and some radioactive highway equipment.

"I think this is a relevant story because the government is telling us that transporting that stuff (nuclear waste) is safe," said Dr. Bob Walters a member of Southwest Nuclear Alert and chairman of the Village of Ruidoso MRS oversight committee.

SWNA is fighting a proposal being studied by the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe to construct a monitored retrievable storage (MRS) facility for high level nuclear waste (spent nuclear fuel rods) on tribal-owned land.

The Mescalero reservation is situated in Otero County, but is

near Ruidoso.

"The truck was carrying hazardous waste and the emergency unit didn't get to it for two hours and then, the response team didn't have the proper equipment," Walters said.

The emergency team eventually determined that no spill or release of radioactive material had occurred, according to the Albuquerque Journal.

Don Hancock with Southwest Research and Information Center in Albuquerque said, "In my view, the seriousness of the situation was how unprepared the best trained and equipped radioactive detection response unit in the state, maybe even the country, was in this case."

"It was just 10 miles away and it took more than four hours to determine what radioactivity there was and if it released occurred."

"In your area, the unit would be 100 miles away. How many people would be exposed to radioactivity or perhaps die before they arrived? It shouldn't take more than an hour."

The minute amounts of low-level radioactive isotopes were confined in two monitors that highway equipment workers pounced into the ground to take depth measurements.

"This just confirms what we've been saying," Hancock said. "This state is not ready to deal with transporting nuclear waste to the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant (WIPP). The teams haven't been given enough money or training."

The rear trailer of the semi rolled on its side in Tijeras Canyon after the driver was forced onto the medium by cars merging with traffic in a construction zone.

Hancock said that according to information he has gathered on the response to the accident some of the emergency equipment did not work.

It also appears that a state police officer on the scene didn't follow proper procedures, Hancock said. "It could have been serious if there had been large amounts of nuclear waste being transported."

# Local kids compete in ARCO meet

The district ARCO Jesse Owens Games in Roswell got off to a slow start because of bad weather on May 23, but that didn't stop four eager participants from breaking or tying existing records.

Approximately 800 boys and girls, representing 17 surrounding communities, including Ruidoso, and 18 local schools ran, jumped and threw at the ARCO games Southern New Mexico District track and field meet at the Wool Bowl. The ages of the competitors ranged from seven to 14 years old.

Previous long jump records were shattered in three different divisions. In boys group one, those born between the years 1984-85, Brandon Waltrip, representing Del Norte Elementary School, broke the existing record by two inches by long jumping 10 feet, four inches. Boys group two, those born between

the years of 1982-83, also had a new record set by Brian Hall of Carlsbad. He beat the former record with a jump of 13'2", which was three inches more than the previous record.

In girls group three, those born between 1980-81, Annette Najar, representing Washington Avenue Elementary School, had a record breaking jump of 14'4." In running events, Robin Delameter tied an existing record in the 100 meters in girls group two. She posted a time of 14.6 seconds.

Several participants from this area also did well in the large meet. Mariah Runnels won third place in the 200 meters with a time of 31.2 seconds in the girls group three. Joni Autrey was fourth in the 400 meter run in a time of 1:13.6 in the girls group four. Aaron Morgan of Mesalero placed sixth in the soft-

ball throw with a distance of 152'1" in the boys group four. These competitors qualified for the district contest at a meet in Ruidoso on May 9. This was the first year the village had sponsored the event for area competitors.

The 34 winners in age groups two, three and four will now travel to Phoenix, Arizona, to compete in the Desert Regional on Saturday against the seven other districts of the desert region that is made up of New Mexico, Arizona, southern Nevada and parts of western California. Regional winners in groups three and four will then advance to the national finals in Los Angeles in August.

"Since the Southern New Mexico District was created in 1986, 21 district winners have made it to Los Angeles," said Mr. Kim Elliott, Roswell's recreation superintendent

and the Southern New Mexico District Coordinator for the ARCO Jesse Owens Games.

The district team will fly to Phoenix from El Paso for the meet. ARCO is making all team travel arrangements and is paying for the team travel and housing expenses.

The ARCO Jesse Owens games is a beginning level track and field program. The great Jesse Owens and the Atlantic Richfield Company (ARCO) teamed up 28 years ago to found the games based on Jesse Owens' belief that an organized, recreational competition was an effective tool for developing and building character in children and for promoting the ideals of friendship and sportsmanship.

All agencies and schools in New Mexico have the opportunity to participate in the ARCO Jesse Owens Games.





# Ruidoso cyclist breezes to first big victory

Ruidoso cyclist Bart Bowen made all the right moves Sunday in the 156-mile, eighth annual U.S. Pro Cycling Championship in Philadelphia to win by an unprecedented 80 seconds.

The 25-year-old Bowen, the son of Ruidoso resident Vivian Isaacs, finished the longest and richest bike race in the country in 6 hours, 10 minutes, 51 seconds. This was his first win in two years on the circuit.

"I took a chance and it paid off.

This is the greatest day in my life. I've been waiting a long time for a chance like this. It means I finally get to ride with the big boys and be legit," he said.

He made a move for the lead 12 miles from the finish, and no one challenged him. He even widened his lead from 55 seconds in the last 10 miles. Bowen will receive \$25,000 for the win.

Bowen began his cycling career with the Alpine Shifters at Ruidoso

High School under cycling coach Galen Farrington. Two years ago he won the White Mountain Classic here but hasn't competed locally recently.

Bowen graduated from the University of New Mexico in May with a major in architecture. Area people may also remember him from the ski team here and at the university.

He is on the Subaru-Montgomery cycling team, which left Wednesday to go to Europe

qualifying races for the Tour de France, a goal of the team. Before his big win Bowen had been in a close race in Campagna, Italy, two months ago but couldn't quite pull it off.

"This year in Europe I had a couple of close calls. One time I got caught 100 meters from the finish. You try and try and try, and sometimes you wonder if you're ever gonna get it. Today (Sunday) was the day I did it," Bowen said.

# Ruidoso High School adopts co-ed fall soccer program

A co-education soccer program will be offered next fall at Ruidoso High School.

Initially the soccer club team will be financially supported by a booster group, but long term plans call for the development of a soccer field and school teams for both girls and boys.

Representatives of the Lincoln County Youth Soccer League successfully pitched the idea to the Ruidoso School Board Tuesday. On a motion by member Rod Adamson, the board approved the program for one year, although the league offered a three-year financial commitment.

District School Superintendent Mike Gladden said it's time for soccer to be introduced into the school program.

A recent public meeting was crowded with parents and children pushing for more soccer and baseball opportunities, he said.

But it was the soccer group that since the meeting has charged ahead to present a plan.

Middle school teacher Dean Hood told board members that al-

though he originally thought it would be best to begin with a junior varsity team, he found out most schools don't have that level and there would be few opponents to play.

"So we came up with the proposal for a Ruidoso High School Soccer Club," Hood said. "For the first year we would try to get the soccer program off the ground and hope by the second or third year it would become a program sanctioned by the New Mexico Activities Association (NMAA)."

Reading from a prepared statement, league member Roy Seay pointed out that soccer is one of the fastest growing sports in America and that the New Mexico Youth Soccer Association (NMYSA) has more than 17,000 registered players.

Forty-one high schools in the state have girls and boys varsity soccer and junior varsity.

The Lincoln County league has lined up about 40 high school students interested in the program, which would be open to students in grades ninth through twelfth.

The local league was established in 1978 and more than 200 children

play in the local schedule. It has four travel teams (with 50 players) registered with the Otero County Youth Soccer League. The teams play in the fall and spring season in Roswell, Alamogordo, El Paso, Las Cruces and elsewhere, Seay said.

"The other school teams will be more willing to schedule games if we are a school program," Seay said. "In the past, we have had limited games (because) they are not allowed to play high school teams. That limits their play to club teams and men's teams."

But the NMYSZ has ruled that we can no longer play men's teams because of the danger or injury," he said.

The Ruidoso High School team would function as a soccer club until a schedule is available to compete in NMAA athletics.

"Either program will be entirely funded by the (league) for a period of three years," Seay said.

In return, the league would expect the school board to allow the club to use Horton Stadium for field games, to provide letters of participation in varsity sports, to give the support of the high school athletic department and director, and to

provide the maintenance of the baseball/soccer complex at White Mountain School.

The league would be responsible for the development of the schedule coordinating use of the field, to provide transportation to out of town games when school buses are not available, to be financially responsible for all costs, to comply with all school policies and to acknowledge that the school administration has full control and management of the program.

Soccer players will have to undergo physical examinations and pay a \$25 fee to meet the costs of insurance and state registration. They will be responsible for their meals when out of town and for their equipment, except for uniforms, which will be donated by the league.

The league's three year budget was estimated at \$10,910 and would cover the coaching supplement. Several adult league members will donate their time as qualified referees.

The league already has about \$7,050 in the bank and anticipates an annual income of \$4,250 from fund-raising events.

High school athletic director Ronnie Maskew said two teams should be formed.

"We already have one more boys sport than girls," he noted.

But Hood said the league would integrate a team initially when it was sure enough girls were interested to field a separate team. The costs also would increase with two teams, he said. A team consists of 16-18 members. The league has 28 boys and about 10 girls interested in playing.

School Board member Mike Morris questioned whether the football field at Horton would be damaged by soccer use.

"I don't think games would mess up the field much," Maskew said, noting that practice would occur at the White Mountain field. Soccer action is spread across the entire playing surface and not concentrated like football.

Board member Susan Lutterman said she'll be pleased to see the Horton field used for more than just football.

Maskew explained that schools set up their playing schedules in blocks of time. The new block will begin in 1995 and that would be a

good thing to be recognized by the NMAA and set up a local schedule. Games usually would be set for Tuesday, Thursday and/or Saturday.

Parent Marilyn Ward said, "Soccer is a positive program and they are needed in our schools."

"Police Chief Dick Swenor was just talking about the need to keep kids and parents involved, now we need the school's support to do just that."

"They love the game and want to play."

"We're always asking for parents help and support," Lutterman said. "Here we have it and the kids want to play. We have to start somewhere and as soon as we can, to get it into the schools."

"I wish we could start out with 100 percent financing by the board for boys and girls teams, but I can't jeopardize the (1991-93) budget, it's so tight already," Gladden said.

Earlier in the meeting, the board had approved an \$8,186,327 operating budget for the district's 1992-93 school year.

The state, which is the major money source for the district, has reduced its per student support.

Dear Ruidoso,

I sell a lot of beef stew. It is pretty good beef stew. We make it from scratch with lean beef and fresh vegetables that we peel and chop. I would like to say that we simmer it for hours, but that wouldn't be the truth. The fact is, I have a magic pot (pressure cooker). That thing will whip out a batch of stew before a cat can lick its nose.

We use the same recipe that my grandpa used back in the 1920's. They called it Irish stew in those days. I never really knew why. Maybe the recipe came from Ireland. I don't know. He was right. We sell about as much stew in the summer as we do in the winter. I guess it's these cool mountains.

Someone asked me if I made much money on the stew. To tell the truth, I don't know. The stew is the one thing in the cafe that I have never done a complete food breakdown on. If that sounds dumb, it probably is; but, I get \$2.75 a bowl for the stuff, and that's about all anybody is going to pay for a bowl of stew, even a great one like this. I enjoy selling it, and it's kind of a tradition around the place. I am afraid if I look at its cost, too closely, I would find that I either need to go up on the price, which would result in a lot of stale stew, or that I should take it off the menu, which would result in some unhappy people, including me. So, I just buy the makings, sell it for \$2.75, and hope for the best. I guess it is all right. I am still able to pay the rent.

Anyway, if you are down this way, and want something to eat that will warm your insides, please your taste buds, and make your doctor happy, you might try a bowl of our beef stew. We will serve it with a couple of pieces of homemade cornbread. I think you will like it.

## Local horses face fast out-of-towners

Last Don B. and Christian Don both want to continue their win skeins by winning Saturday's \$10,000-added Mescalero Apache Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

The local contenders, however, will face stiff opposition in the six-furlong race from Albuquerque invaders Justa Stepahead and Dusk Patrol.

"I have wanted to get those two horses (Justa Stepahead and Dusk Patrol) down here for a race for some time," said Norm Amundson, Ruidoso Downs' racing secretary. "It should make for a very interesting race...two of our best New Mexico-bred handicap horses facing two of Albuquerque's best."

Amundson has assigned Justa Stepahead highweight of 122 pounds, followed by Christian Don at 121, and Last Don B and Dusk Patrol at 120 pounds each.

Christian Don is two for two at Ruidoso Downs, having annexed wins in a 6-furlong invitational handicap May 17, and a 5 1/2-furlong allowance race June 7. Christian Don competed at The Downs at Albuquerque all spring, but couldn't find the winner's circle until moving south to Ruidoso Downs.

"We had a lot of bad racing luck at Albuquerque," said owner and trainer R.E.Hirst of Roswell. "It might appear that he's been getting better since we got here, but I believe he's doing better because he's getting better breaks."

Christian Don faced both Justa Stepahead and Dusk Patrol in the Express Handicap at Albuquerque in April with Justa Stepahead winning by about a length ahead of Christian Don. Dusk Patrol was third. The trio have faced each other several times this year with each trouncing one another at sometime or another. Justa Stepahead, however, has done most of the trouncing.

Trained by Billie Floyd, Justa Stepahead is one the most consistent New Mexico-bred horses racing at this time. The 6-year-old gelding has raced eight times this year and has won half of those races and finished second in three others. He won three consecutive handicaps at Albuquerque earlier this year; The Express Handicap, the Coronado, and the Aspen Handicap, where Dusk Patrol finished third.

Dusk Patrol achieved revenge, however, when he won Albuquerque's Pass The Tab Handicap by a nose over Justa Stepahead May 24. Trained by Mark Harper, Dusk Patrol has been impressive racing only nine times in 1992, but winning four of those races.

Last Don B. spent his spring at Arizona's Turf Paradise, but immediately made his presence known by winning his first race at Ruidoso Downs, the Governor's Handicap on May 23.

Trainer Lynda Tanner said Last Don B. has been racing all winter and she had planned on resting the gelding after a couple of races at Ruidoso Downs. The 5-year-old gelding, however, seems to have revived himself since moving to Ruidoso Downs.

"I think the heat and the flies were really getting on his nerves in Albuquerque," said Tanner, who has trained Last Don B. all of his racing career. "Since we arrived here, he has become much more relaxed and is resting and training better. I expect he'll give me all he can in the race. This horse always tries and if he throws a bad race it's generally because of poor training or a bad ride."

Sunday's race program will be highlighted by the \$15,000-added Zia Handicap for 3-year-old and older quarter horses racing 400 yards.

## Mescalero Apache Handicap to run

Last Don B.'s race record indicated to Racing Secretary Norm Amundson that the gelding was worthy of serious consideration when assigning weights for Saturday's Apache Mescalero Handicap.

Amundson assigned Last Don B. third highweight based on his win in the Governors Handicap here May 23, and off the fact that the gelding has won 11 races from 34 starts.

Last Don B. might look good "on paper", but physically, he's not much to look at. He's heavily boned and stands a lanky 16 hands or so. His head is really too big for the rest of his body, and one knee is lumpy - not exactly the look of eagles.

"His first day on the track when he was a 2 year old, he was playing around and got up on his stall screen and broke both his upper and lower jaw," said Lynda Tanner, who has trained the 5 year old gelding throughout his three-year racing career. "He broke them real bad, but he had enough sense to take care of himself and he made a good recovery."

The gelding's oversized jaw is the result of calcium which developed over the breaks. He also received a hefty kick below one knee as a foal which also resulted in calcium deposit disfiguration.

"He really isn't very handsome," Tanner said. "His nickname is Lumpy, but that doesn't mean we don't love him."

You can't tell much about a book by its cover and Tanner says the same is true with Last Don B.

"This horse has never cheated me out of a race," said whose stable consists of 12 horses. "He tries every time and if he doesn't win, it's generally because of poor training on my part or a bad ride."

Saturday's race program will also offer the simulcast of three out-of-state stake races: the \$208,000 Remington Park Derby from Remington Park in Oklahoma City and the \$100,000-added Valky and \$150,000-added Mulady handicaps from California's Hollywood Park.

The Grade I Remington Park Derby is for 3-year-old quarter horses racing 440 yards. The Valky is for California-bred fillies and mares racing 5 1/2 furlongs. The Grade I Mulady is also for fillies and mares, but over the dirt for 1 & 1/16th of a mile.

16 wins from 107 races. Arreola is next with 15 wins from 71 rides. Next is Carlos Rivas with 14 wins and Todd Fincher with 13.

Jacky Martin also missed a day of racing at Ruidoso Downs last week, but still reigns in the quarter horse jockey standings with 15 wins from 40 mounts. Luke Myles is next with nine wins from 42 mounts, followed by Kenny Hart with seven wins.

Jerry Nicodemus and Jacky Martin are among the jockeys selected to compete in the Lazy E National Quarter Horse Jockey Championship at Remington Park Sunday.

The 10 jockeys, who have combined to win virtually every major quarter horse race, will compete for \$20,000 in prize money, including the \$7,000 first prize. Promoters of the event claim the jockey with the most points after the four-race series will be crowned the "world's best quarter horse jockey." Points are determined by where a jockey finishes in each race.

Other jockeys include Alvin Brosett and Tami Purcell of Louisiana, Kip Didericksen and Henry Goacia of California, and Tram Telg and Jerry Yoakum of Texas. Yoakum rode Deceptively to victory in the Kansas Futurity here last month.

Trainer Jack Brooks leads the quarter horse trainers' standings, with 18 wins from 74 starts for a win percentage of 24.3. Sleepy Gilbreath is next with half as many wins, followed by Fred Danley with eight wins.

Danley is also holding his own in the thoroughbred trainers' standings, ranked second with nine wins behind Doyal Roberts' 11 wins. Add up Danley's quarter horse and thoroughbred wins and Danley ranks second overall in the number of winners saddled.

Deceptively, winner of the 1992 Kansas Futurity, is ranked #1 on the American Quarter Horse Association's weekly racing poll for last week. The AQHA polls racing writers and racing officials to find out which horses are the best horses racing each week. Ruidoso Downs' based horses dominated the nationwide poll with Mr. Eye Opener being ranked third, Special Task (4th), Choculo (8th), Alifax (9th) and Dash Master Miss (10th).


Prior to her last race, Cajun Lass had never raced beyond six furlongs, nor had she won since breaking her maiden last Novem-

# Capitan

## Capitan considers gas line sale

Looming major repairs and a chance to pay off a long term debt prompted the Capitan Board of Trustees Monday to authorize negotiations for the sale of a Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas transmission line.

The board would have to approve the final sale proposal after figures are hashed out between the principals.

Zia Natural Gas and its parent company Natural Gas Processing of Worland, Wyoming, have proposed buying the existing 44 miles of line as an alternative to installing its own separate line.

The Capitan-Carrizozo company would retain ownership of the distribution system that serves Capitan, Carrizozo, Fort Stanton,

told the trustees.

Selling the transmission line would eliminate the need for maintenance, repair and upgrading, and it would wipe out the remaining \$377,000 debt, he said.

A consulting engineer "has determined that the system is obsolete, outdated and outgrown," Rouleau said.

To update the system, the engineer has suggested rebuilding a regulator station and replacing 24 miles of line at a cost of \$2.7-million to handle growth until 1996.

Other alternatives involving installation of six-inch or 8-inch lines parallel to the existing pipeline would cost \$2.98-million to \$3.2-million and would serve growth until 2005. The cost estimates are based on 1992 dollars without an inflation factor or interest from debt.

Rouleau pointed out that the gas board's transmission line is fed by the El Paso Natural Gas Company, "so loss of control really is not a factor. The state regulates transmission lines."

Zia could construct its own natural gas line and by-pass the gas board completely, resulting in a loss of \$62,775 in revenues to the community gas operation, Rouleau noted.

However, Zia was stopped from acquiring rights of way for that 30-mile by-pass line last January by the PSC. The commission's staff contended the company had proceeded without a license by obtaining easements and preparing surveys.

The commission is concerned that the line would be a duplication of the Capitan-Carrizozo line and that the money spent by Zia would increase customer rates.

The case still is pending, according to PSC staff.

The transmission line accounts for \$62,770 in revenue a year to the gas board (about 13 percent of the total annual revenue of \$496,807), but after subtracting the debt service on the line, the income earned is \$18,136, Rouleau said. Maintenance and repair costs of \$47,987 on the transmission lines push the true figure into the red, he said.

"We would gain \$29,000 net revenue if we got rid of it," Rouleau said.

The sale of the line would be tied to a guaranteed line of credit for nine years, an additional \$50,000 cash payment to offset transmission costs and no anticipated rate increase to consumers. It also would free the gas board from future maintenance and insurance responsibilities on the line.

A larger company like Natural Gas Processing could search out lower priced gas deals that might benefit customers, Rouleau said.

On the other hand, if the gas board elected to construct a new pipeline, the monthly bill of the average customer probably would increase by \$2.50 to cover the new debt.

The gas board depends heavily on the business of Fort Stanton

Hospital and Training Center to survive, but the hospital's future remains uncertain, Rouleau pointed out.

Another option would be for the gas board to sell the distribution system and get out of the business.

But that option would not serve the community since the gas board provides many jobs in the area and purchases most of its supplies, services and equipment locally, Rouleau said.

"If what matters is the cost of gas to consumers, we definitely have to consider a sale of the entire company because there are large companies out there that can capitalize on economy of scale," he said. "But if the human factor is important, as our board members believe, we must continue to operate."

"We employ a large number of people in each community and purchase locally. We have a heart and work with the elderly and poor, carrying their larger bills until summer. Big companies won't do that. We felt users are willing to pay slightly more for those human considerations."

"The board recommends the sale (of the transmission line only)," Rouleau said. "We're here because we think it is the wise and prudent direction to go for the consumers."

"We don't need rumors going around. We are not negotiating a sale. This is only an initial offer. We don't need to build conflict and innuendo. Our meetings are all open. We have nothing to hide. This is a non-profit board."

Although Garcia raised the possibility of hiring a different attorney to represent Capitan and Carrizozo in the sale, Beauvais said that should not be necessary. He pointed out that the gas board was formed by the two communities and their interests are not at odds.

Service should be improved if Zia takes over the line, Beauvais said.

"His customers in Upper Canyon and at the Inn of the Mountain Gods are on the end of the line and would be the first to experience a shut down (if the system failed)," Beauvais said.

Capitan Trustee Gilbert Montoya asked whether any other gas companies are interested in buying the line.

"We would seek open bids before negotiating any sale to be sure we had the best offer," Rouleau said. "But our first step was the need to decide if it was wise and prudent to sell."

Although Trustee Alfred LeRoy Montes abstained from voting, saying he didn't have enough information, an abstention is counted as an affirmative vote.

Nogal and Ruidoso.

But Carrizozo trustee Harold Garcia warned the Capitan board to proceed cautiously. He expressed concern over the legality of the proposal without approval from the New Mexico Public Service Commission (PSC) and the consequences of no longer controlling the transmission lines.

Tuesday, Garcia's board in Carrizozo also approved a motion to go ahead with negotiations, but stipulated that the trustees should be involved and that sale terms would have to be brought back for a final decision by the town board.

Dr. David Rouleau is president of the Capitan-Carrizozo gas board that was organized in 1965 through a joint resolution of the two communities.

With the help of a flip chart manned by Capitan village, Carrizozo town and gas board attorney J. Robert Beauvais, Rouleau Monday broke down the elements of the proposal for Capitan trustees.

The gas board was organized as a municipal gas association because no private entity was interested in serving the rural communities, he said.

Using a grant from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, the board spent \$774,000 to construct 44 miles of four-inch pipe.

The board still owes \$375,235 on that debt, which is being repaid through annual payments of \$44,640 until the year 2001.

The problem facing the board is that the existing line soon will require major repair. A danger already exists that it could fail during peak winter usage, Rouleau

## Trustees back off on new taxes

The Village of Capitan may be in a financial bind, but imposing a lodgers tax or liquor license fee won't solve the problem, several business owners contended Monday.

Village trustees agreed with the owners and voted to take no action on the proposed ordinances.

"We're looking for revenue," said Mayor Frank Warth. "We may have to raise taxes and how are we going to answer people when they say we haven't taken advantage of other avenues open to us?"

The village will lose \$17,000 in revenue in 1992-93 because the state has taken back a portion of the sales tax previously allocated to Capitan.

Village attorney J. Robert Beauvais cautioned Warth not to pin the liquor license fee to the need for revenue.

"The assumption is that because of the nature of the business, more city services would be required. It should not be considered as a revenue-raising issue. That is not a valid reason to pass it," Beauvais said.

Norm Renfro, a former trustee and owner of the local motel, said the lodgers tax ordinance is better suited for a large city. It would require forming another board, setting up a bank account and auditing.

Capitan sells about 60 business licenses a year. Less than half are members of the local chamber of commerce, Renfro said.

"I don't think it would be fair to penalize four or five businesses with a special tax when others

don't even support the community through the chamber," he said.

"In 1987, I sent out 4,000 ski package brochures and I didn't get one response. Everybody goes to Ruidoso (to stay for skiing). They never come to Capitan unless there is a big celebration. About four times a year we fill up."

"I think Norm has the right idea," said Trustee Alfred LeRoy Montes.

Beauvais said the ordinance would impose up to a three percent tax on rental charges for rooms, except for those rented on a monthly basis and businesses with three rooms or less. A designated portion of the proceeds must then be spent on advertising and promotions.

"With only two lodging establishments that would qualify, the number of dollars is going to be small," he said.

"You can advertise as much as you want and I guarantee you will never get as much back as you put in," said trailer court owner Howard Wright, who has lived in Capitan 32 years. "I've been in nearly every business in town. You get what comes in on U.S. 380."

Montes seemed less opposed to the \$400 liquor license fee.

"If I remember, there was a fee here until (a former mayor) knocked it off," Montes said. "Ruidoso and Carrizozo, everybody has it but Capitan."

Resident R.L. VanNorman appeared upset over both of the proposals. He said a liquor license fee would be unfair because the owners already pay for a business license like everybody else in town.

"Nothing says the city must do this," he said. "I could understand it if a business required extra (attention), but I don't think (Bonnie) McEuen (owner of B & L Pizza) requires extra calls."

"It's just another tax. If we start with this one, let's raise the business tax on every business in town and see how many stay in town."

In another matter, Marienne Schweers, a member of Apache Trails and owner of Eagle Ranch pistachio operation in Alamogordo, asked the village and chamber of commerce representatives present to consider allocating some money toward the support of the trails organization.

"This is a cooperative operation with 10 communities (that form a tour loop) started two years ago," Schweers said. "The idea is to pool our money to promote our area."

Last year, the group printed 200,000 brochures for \$10,000 and placed a \$2,500 ad in the New Mexico Vacation Guide, she said. Less than 50,000 brochures are left. The group received 527 inquiries from the ad. The list of people with an interest in the area is available at the Ruidoso Chamber.

# Lincoln County ranchers contribute to education

Teachers continue to seek factual information on a variety of subjects to help supplement their lesson plans.

When it comes to nutrition and a variety of agricultural issues, the beef industry makes available 18 kits for different ages and covering topics from cookery and nutrition to the environment and animal welfare.

Two new programs, supported by Lincoln County producers through the national beef checkoff, are nearly complete and will be ready for school this fall.

"Mirror, Mirror," is a weight counseling kit that helps 9th through 12th graders make healthful food choices. The kit covers nutrition factors including attitudes about weight, factors affecting adolescent weight, symptoms of eating disorders, guidelines for a balanced and healthy diet, and guidelines for parents and school professionals. The kit is the result of extensive marketing research and was reviewed by school professionals and clinical experts.

Another new program, "Caretakers All," shows 3rd and 4th graders how they can be caretakers of their community. The kit includes a discussion of farm animal welfare practices as well as several environmental issues including soil and water conservation. The program is adaptable for social studies, history, science and reading classes.

Beef producers in Lincoln County and across in Lincoln County and across the country also help support programs such as:

"Munchsters Talk About Food"—a preschool nutrition program that uses fantasy creatures to show children where food comes from, the different ways that food are packaged and preserved, and the need to set good eating habits early in life.

"Coming To America"—a 5th through 8th grade social science program that focuses on the various aspects of pilgrim life and emphasizes the importance of food preservation methods.

"Digging for Data"—a 6th grade

science program that helps students understand scientific problem solving while learning about changes farmers and ranchers have made to create learner beef.

"Body Culture"—a high school sports nutrition program that demonstrates how a nutritious diet—including meat—can enhance athletic performance.

"Cooking Today's Beef"—a video program for high school students that shows how the beef industry has worked to develop a learner product. Cookery methods also are covered in this program.

Lessons on Meat—a college-level reference book that is a valuable resource for food, nutrition, dietetic and home economics students, and food professionals.

## USFS hosts lands meeting

District of the Lincoln National Forest.

The 33-member party started at the Sid Goodloe Ranch above Capitan and walked over the project site to see the results of a new way to manage pinyon-juniper stands to prevent erosion and to conserve water.

At the Goodloe Ranch, a busi-

ness meeting was conducted by Charles Walker, president of the Lincoln National Forest Permittee's Association.

Others attending the annual meeting were Al Schneberger, executive director of New Mexico Cattlemen's Association and Matt and Laura Schneberger, Kit and Sherry Laney of the Gila National Forest Permittee's Association.

## County ranchers receive close to \$1 million in federal funds

According to Fred W. Pfingsten, chairman of the Lincoln County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service County Committee; support payments have been disbursed for 1991 wool and mohair marketings to producers in Lincoln County. Approximately \$976,230 was made to about 50 producers.

price support rate was \$1.88 and the national average market price for wool was \$.55 per pound. A 241.8 per cent payment was used to bring the average up to the support price.

For mohair, the 1991 average market price was \$1.28 and the support price was \$4.448 making the payment rate 247.5 percent.

These payments are made from import tariffs made on wool and mohair products. And during the past few years several billion dollars has been put into the United States Treasury for other uses instead of incentive payments on wool and mohair since by law only a percent of the tariff can be used for incentive payments.

## EPA checks out Rio Grande

The Rio Grande will be getting a health check over the next two years by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

The agency is committing \$352,000 to monitor and analyze the presence of toxic chemicals along the river from El Paso to the Gulf of Mexico, according to EPA Administrator William K. Reilly.

"This study is urgent," Reilly stated in a recent press release. "We need it and we need it now to find out whether environmental pollution is causing the high incidence of birth defects in the lower Rio Grande Valley, and whether the health of residents along the border is at risk."

Reilly credited U.S. Senators Phil Gramm, Lloyd Bentsen and the EPA Regional Administrator Buck Wynne for bringing the urgency of the situation to his direct attention.

The study will involve taking water and sediment samples in the Rio Grande above and below all major urban areas and industrial sites outside of urban areas, he said. The EPA also will sample each tributary as it enters the Rio Grande, as well as sampling wastewater treatment discharges and untreated sewage at their points of discharge.

The study also will include laboratory analyses of fish samples

taken from various points along the river.

"The environmental pollution problem along our border with Mexico is one of our priorities," Reilly said. "We will move quickly. Yet, we must have sound, scientifically valid information to determine whether pollution is causing these tragic birth defects. Should that prove to be the case, I will do everything within my power to locate and stop the pollution that is threatening people living along the border."

"We will be coordinating with the Center for Disease Control as well as international agencies, in conducting the study."

## Lincoln County "litter pickers" clean up area roads and highways

### Wouldn't you like to be a "litter picker," too?

We've all seen it. We drive into Ruidoso, impressed by its scenic beauty of mountain and trees — and disgusted by its roadsides trashed with bottles and cans.

But a few locals are changing that.

Through the state's Adopt-A-Highway program, these volunteers periodically — and proudly — pick up all the paper, plastic, glass, cans, cigarette packs and everything else on six miles of two highways leading to Ruidoso.

If these dedicated folks can do it, so can others, extending that six miles to many more throughout this county.

According to a recent article in "VFW" magazine, Adopt-A-Highway is a volunteer community activity that originated in Texas in 1985. The article estimates more than 500,000 miles in 43 states are being de-littered by civic and religious groups, businesses and individuals.

Locally, Wal-Mart of Ruidoso on Highway 70 and Alto Lakes Golf and Country Club on Highway 48 "adopted" the first two miles in Lincoln County. They're challenging other groups and businesses to do the same.

#### Earth Day

Wal-Mart employees adopted the mile that fronts their store as their contribution to Earth Day a couple of years ago, recalls Kathy Osborne, department manager.

"A former associate suggested the idea to other associates who like it. They suggested it to management who agreed."

Now U.S. Highway 70, from mile markers 260 to 261, or from The Barn to the garden at the "Y," reflects both Wal-Mart's and Ruidoso's pride.

#### Scenic Beauty Sells

Also proud of the pavement in front of their business is Alto Lakes Golf and Country Club.

"We're out there once a week, even though the state only requires us to clean it up twice a year," says

Chuck Dunn, the club's general manager.

Dunn gets excited when asked why the club adopted mile nine to 10 on Highway 48.

"It's ironic — we'll sell scenic beauty in Ruidoso, but have messy highways. Get around Roswell or Alamogordo. They don't have scenic beauty but have miles and miles of adopted highway. I couldn't believe there wasn't any interest here."

Jack Page took an interest. He, too, noticed mile after litter-free mile while driving through other states. So Page, who is chairman of the Republican Party of Lincoln County, persuaded that group to adopt a mile on Highway 48.

Not surprisingly, Federated Republican Women of Lincoln County also adopted a mile.

"I'm married to their president," Page says with a grin.

The Republican Party cleans from mile marker eight to nine, and the Republican Women clean from 10 to 11.

But it almost didn't happen. In the fall of 1991, less than a month after their signs were in place and after the two political groups had already cleaned their two miles, the Republicans received a note from the State Highway Department advising them their signs would be removed within 30 days. No reason was given, according to Page.

"We suspected the reasons were political because we'd already cleaned our miles," said Page. Numerous letters or telephone calls from Page, State Republican Party Chairman John Lattauzio, local Republicans and Democrats attempted to persuade Governor Bruce King, a Democrat, and the Highway Department administration.

The signs reappeared by Christmas.

"If other political parties feel we have an advantage by advertising on the highway, they can adopt a mile — or several," says Page. "It's all for the good of the community, regardless of who does it."

Let 'em know we're here

Advertising was one of several reasons the Ruidoso Valley Noon Lions adopted a mile on Highway 70. Their signs went up early in June.

"Clubs in other towns adopt highways and get exposure. If an out-of-town Lion sees our sign, he'll know to come to our meeting," says Bob Chrisman, who is both a Noon Lion and a member of the Cree Meadows Men's Golf Association.

"Many of us belong to both clubs, so we're sharing the two miles just west of Wal-Mart's mile."

Why the particular stretch of highway?

"Because it's flat," says Chrisman, who agrees with Page and Dunn.

"We have a beautiful entrance to our village. It shouldn't be covered with bottles and trash."

Page has addressed the Service Club Council and challenged clubs and business.

"Imagine if every civic club in the county, every business, scout troop, church, school group — or whatever — adopted a mile. We'd have the cleanest highways to match the most beautiful scenery."

Once you've cleaned it, people might think twice before throwing something on it again."

#### You can do it, too

Civic pride and a promise to clean your mile twice a year are all that Adopt-A-Highway requires.

If you or your group is interested, contact Tim Basler, District Traffic Engineer at the District Two office of the New Mexico Highway Department, PO Box 1457; Roswell NM 88202-1457. Basler can be reached by calling 624-3300.

In return, you'll receive an application and contract. You agree to clean your mile at least twice yearly and not to hold the state liable if you injure yourself doing it. You provide your own equipment. The state furnishes the signs at no cost to you and reserves the right to terminate the contract at any time for any reason.

#### It's fun

Volunteers cite advantages in addition to clean highways, civic pride and free advertising.

"You can redeem your aluminum cans, all that walking and bending are great exercise, and besides, it's fun!"

### Tips for litter pickers

1. There is safety in numbers. More people walking the highway attract drivers' attention. Plus, the work goes faster.
2. Keep as far off the pavement as possible.
3. Wear brightly colored clothing with long sleeves and long pants, gloves, heavy boots or shoes, a hat, sunscreen and sunglasses.
4. Don't be surprised by what you find. Expect plastic bottles, paper cups, aluminum cans and "lost of cigarette packs," said one litter-picker. "We've also found dirty diapers and dead cats."
5. Separate recyclables from solid waste. Then redeem the recyclables at the County's Recycling Center in Ruidoso Downs.
6. Enjoy the fresh air, exercise and companionship of fellow litter-pickers, as well as the sense of pride at the sight of "your" clean highway.



# Lincoln County mails delinquent tax notices to 3,700 property owners

More than 3,700 delinquent tax notices were shipped into the mail slot Wednesday at the Carrizozo Post Office by employees of the Lincoln County Treasurer's office.

Although at this point a dollar figure is not available, County Treasurer Janice Ware said the number of notices is slightly less than last year. "The letter will tell them that their tax account was delinquent

after May 10 and that the list will be sent to the state property tax division if the taxes aren't paid by July 1," Ware said. "If it's not taken care of, the real property can be sold at public auction. The personal property such as

mobile homes, cattle and equipment can be seized after obtaining a demand warrant and then sold." In addition to the payment of the delinquent taxes, the forgetful owners will have to pay interest of 1 percent a month during the delin-

quency period and a penalty of 1 percent, with a \$5 minimum. "To avoid a possible loss of property, people should pay attention," Ware said. "I like this particular form, because the language grabs the owners' attention."

Those receiving notices have 20 days to respond before Ware forwards the list to the state. "Last year, 79 pieces of property ended up going on the state list for sale," she said. "The state only works with the real property."


MONOUNSATURATED FAT

Found in both plant and animal fats. Only oil present in some margarines and vegetable shortening tend to be high in this type of fat. Oils such as olive and canola.

POLYUNSATURATED FAT

Tends to lower blood cholesterol levels. Found mainly in the fat of fish and plant oils. Oils such as safflower, sunflower, corn and soybean contain this fat.

- 3/4 lb flank steak
- 3 tsp cornstarch, divided
- 1 tsp dry sherry (optional)

tablespoon oil. Add beef. Stir-fry for 1 minute. Return cooked broccoli with broth to wok. In small bowl, blend together remaining 2 teaspoons cornstarch and water. Stir into wok and cook until sauce thickens. Serves 4.

### ITALIAN STEAK SALAD

- 1 lb boneless top round, cut 1-inch thick
- 1 pkg (9 oz.) artichoke hearts, thawed
- 10 cherry tomatoes, halved
- 1 medium carrot, thinly sliced
- 4 green onions, sliced

in bowl. Cover with Italian dressing and sprinkle with marjoram. Marinate in the refrigerator covered for 6 hours, or overnight if desired; stir occasionally.

For salad, toss together greens and mushrooms and place on 4 salad plates. Drain steak and vegetables, reserving marinade. Arrange steak and vegetables over greens on plates. Drizzle with reserved marinade, if desired. Serves 4.
