



## Council OKs lodgers tax audits

Ruidoso Village Councilors approved Lodgers Tax Ordinance 92-15, which contains the changes required by legislation adopted earlier this year.

Conditions of the ordinance that was finally passed include:

—Mandatory annual random audits.

—A minimum penalty of \$100 on delinquent taxes.

—Requiring payment of all lodgers taxes due when there is a judicial sale of the property involved.

—Mandatory criminal sanctions for failure to pay tax.

The state-mandated ordinance passed on roll call vote of five to one. Councilor Ron Andrews voted no.

"I cannot, in good faith, vote for an ordinance that requires that I be audited," said Andrews casting the lone "no" vote.

"Maybe you should abstain since you own a motel," said Councilor Jerry Shaw.

Also Tuesday, the council discussed a special fund to be used for the payment of bonds for the construction of the civic events center and the balance, if any shall be used for the operation of the civic

events center. The seemingly routine item caused some confusion among councilors. (See related story in a box below.)

Councilor Ron Andrews explained to former councilor Al Junge about late filing.

"Late filing, Mr. Junge, is at the bottom of your lodgers tax form," said Andrews. "Let's say you're filing June's tax report at the end of July. If you don't file it by the 25th of July, then you have been adding a \$10 late fee, or 10 percent of the balance, whichever is greater. That \$10 just jumped to a \$100."

Thomsen said the state-imposed penalty becomes property of the village.

"It's just the state requires us to put those extra teeth into our ordinance," he said.

Junge said that the random auditing will make enemies. He said the state law does not provide for checks on vendors who rent cabins less than 30 days at a time and does not report the tax.

That vendor, according to Junge, doesn't have an occupational license and are missed in the audits.

Councilor Jerry Shaw agreed with Junge.

"There still are vendors out there that don't even live in Ruidoso that rent at least three to four cabins out as a motel room," she said.

Attorney Thomsen said by definition, those vendors would fall under the lodgers tax ordinance.

"The problem, of course, is catching them, and that may be difficult. It's often difficult to catch any kind of violator."

Andrews explained the difficulty.

"There are a number of property managers who very diligently report and collect their taxes on time," he said. "The problem is that the owners of those units will periodically send 'family'. I've talked with them and they all know that these people are charging over, to back wherever home is for these people. And these people aren't 'family', but there's nothing you can do about it."

Shaw said the money for those nights never comes to Ruidoso.

"It's paid in Lubbock, Odessa or wherever," she said.

The Ruidoso-Lincoln County Crimestoppers is offering a \$1,000 cash award for information leading to the arrest of Erwin Boyd Bartlett.

When last seen he had dark shoulder length hair and a tattoo of a cross on his right upper arm. He has a heart with a banner on his right forearm.


Bartlett is considered extremely dangerous.

that's with most people having to come out of their way to bring materials," he said. "With someone here six days a week and with the igloos, we're trying to make it more convenient and get the word out to the public."

Individual igloos are marked for newspapers, for tin and aluminum, for different types of plastic and for three colors of glass.

"Paper labels are all right, but plastic labels should be removed, as should lids," Krumsiek said. "It's imperative that the containers be rinsed out. We do not accept glass dishes, mirrors or drinking glasses, only glass containers."

"At the center, we will pay for scrap aluminum, copper and brass. Businesses can bring their cardboard and office paper."

and to limit parking off of Church Drive.

Cape will come back with requested changes.

Agent D.T. Collins requested a variance, conditional use and an amended commercial site development plan for the old KOR Campground off Highway 70.

The 9.1 acre tract was rezoned to C-2 from R-3 last October. The area was previously zoned for an operated as an RV park until 1986.

Ruidoso State Bank proposes to upgrade the facility and operate it as an RV park. Some 80 spaces previously existed with utilities devel-

oped. The bank now proposes 69 spaces with existing utilities to be used. The bank plans to develop 5.6 acres for RV park usage, with 3.5 acres retained for open space and future expansion.

RV regulations require a minimum area of two acres for development.

Primary access to the site is from Highway 70 via Pine Crest Drive. Second means of access is from Highway 70 via Glade Drive which is through a R-1 single family zone district.

The district was approved on the condition that an intersection be paved 50 feet back on the road and that the park will provide out-

side recreation.

Applicant Clark Carpenter requested a replat for lot 7 of Country Club Heights. Carpenter said he wanted to replat one large plat into four lots, all exceeding frontage requirements. The lot is at the corner of Hull Road and High Loop Drive.

The commission approved the replat conditional to a second hydrant to provide coverage and spacing.

The staff said Carpenter can provide hydrant prior to sale of lots or provide 100 percent installation bond to guarantee performance.

## Downs makes plans to move the village municipal building again

Plans to get a new village hall on the old site in Ruidoso Downs on Highway 70 passed another road block this week as village officials found out the ground is not contaminated with nitrates.

Mayor Joe Hayhurst and the current board of trustees had asked Testing Laboratories, Inc. of Alamogordo to test the site for possible sewage contamination and for an underground fuel tank leak, and all of the results are now in. In the testing for sewage contamination the results showed 3.93 milligrams of nitrates per liter, which is well below the 10 mg limit set by the New Mexico Environment Department Water Quality Control Commission.

T.C. Shapard, water resource specialist for NMED, said the detection levels from the two samples taken were lower than necessary so there wasn't any threat to the ground water on that site. He said it is likely that that smell at the time of the sewage leak was probably worse than the problem actually was, making them think there would be contamination.

In the winter of 1990 workers in the old village hall started to complain about smelling sewage and getting headaches, and the NMED was called in to investigate the complaint.

Carl Stubbs, environmentalist from the local NMED office, reported to the Village of Ruidoso Downs in a letter dated February 1

that a large volume of raw sewage had been discharged from a break in the plumbing under the restroom. He then required the village to stop discharging the waste and to clean up the site.

Since that time the Village of Ruidoso Downs received emergency funds from the state to move to its present location in the old Redmens Club. The past board of trustees, with Bonnie Addy as mayor, approved a resolution on August 26, 1991, to tear down the old village hall to clean the possible contamination up after a state building inspector, Patrick Vandergriff, inspected the site and stated it met the requirements to be condemned.

At that time the NMED requested that the village do the test on nitrates to see if it could have af-

fecting the water. Although the tests show a low, safe level of nitrates, Shapard said there was no way people could have continued to work in that building at the time because of the smell. He said to fix the plumbing problem and still use the building the village would have had to tear up the concrete slab floor.

Levi Abeyta, general manager of Testing Laboratories, sent a letter to Downs maintenance supervisor Dennis Riddle with the results, which Riddle then submitted to NMED. Abeyta said samples were selected as the worst or hottest samples based on odor, with tests showing very low levels of contamination present in both areas.

Shapard said the village can use that property again since the detec-

tion levels were low. Plans may be delayed, though, because of the tests taken on samples near an underground fuel storage tank. He said the tests did detect gas but that was from only one test. NMED wants the underground tank removed as soon as possible, and the village has already applied for a tank closure permit, Shapard said.

After the village pulls out the tanks, they will need to take samples around the site, he said. If the detection level is above the standard level, Shapard will require an on-site investigation. He said there is evidence of a leak, but there isn't any more product in the underground tank.

The NMED will be on-hand when the village takes the tanks out, Mayor Hayhurst said, and it

shouldn't be any problem. He said he is glad that the village can proceed fairly soon with leveling the lot and the plan to put a building on it in the future. Getting village hall back on Highway 70 was one of Hayhurst's campaign promises when he ran for mayor in March.

The village has already leased a modern office building that will be set up later this month near the senior citizens center to house the administration and police offices. The board of trustees decided to make the move because of high utility costs at the current location. It was also a step in getting the village hall back on to Highway 70.

With the site almost ready, the board will now have to decide how to get the funding to put a village hall in that space.




July will also be a good month for softball as Ruidoso hosts two more tournaments.

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
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## An open letter to members of the Otero County Electric Cooperative

Recently the general manager of the Otero County Electric Cooperative issued a letter to its members that contained misinformation regarding Texas-New Mexico Power Company. The letter contained the following statement:

"Our neighboring investor-owned utility, Texas-New Mexico Power Company, is currently financially stressed and is itself proposing to raise rates. TNP Enterprises, which owns Texas-New Mexico Power Company, showed a \$1 million loss the first quarter of 1992."

The statement was incorrect and misleading about two major points.

**TNP not requesting rate increase in New Mexico**

•TNP is not currently proposing to raise rates in New Mexico. TNP has not requested a general rate increase in New Mexico since 1982, and its rates have been relatively stable in New Mexico for the last ten years. In fact, TNP's residential and commercial cost per KWH to its customers was approximately 4.5 percent lower in 1991 than it was in 1982.

**TNP Enterprise's 12-month earnings showed increase**

•In the first quarter of 1992 (January-March), TNP Enterprises did experience a net loss of approximately \$1 million. However, the net earnings for the 12 months ending March 1992 (which is a more important consideration) were \$16 million, a \$2 million increase from the 12 months ending March 1991. A primary contributor to the first quarter 1992 reduction in earnings was a reduction in kilowatt hour sales caused, in part, by milder than normal weather throughout TNP's service territories.

## Motorcyclists will train here

The Motorcycle Training Unit of the State Highway and Transportation Department will conduct a motorcyclist training course in Ruidoso, beginning at 5 p.m., Friday, July 17 through Sunday, July 19, at Ruidoso High School, 125 Warrior Drive.

In order for the class to be conducted as scheduled, a minimum of seven students must be pre-enrolled by 4 p.m. Wednesday, July 15.

According to a news release, the course uses a 20-hour course curriculum developed by the Motorcycle Safety Foundation.

Motorcycles and helmets are provided. However, if a student has his/her own helmet with eye protection, they are encouraged to bring their own helmet. The student must provide their own protective clothing; i.e., full-length trousers or jeans, jacket or long-sleeved shirt, boots or shoes that cover the anklebone, and full-fingered gloves.

The age of participants is basically from 13 years and up. Individuals within 60 days of their thirteenth birthday will be accepted, although they

cannot obtain a license until age 13 with parental consent. Participants under age 18 must also have a parental consent (waiver form) to take the course.

The course is designed for new riders or experienced riders who would like a refresher on the skills and defensive riding techniques necessary to reduce the probability of accidents. Persons who satisfactorily complete the course are not required to take a written or a road test when applying for a motorcycle license or endorsement and receive insurance premium discounts from certain insurance companies.

Interested persons can call to get pre-registration information by contacting Ron Andrews, of the Golden Aspen Association, at 257-4031, or the Traffic Safety Bureau at 1-800-541-7952, during regular office hours.

The cost of the 20-hour course is \$50 which includes liability insurance and a student workbook. Students must pre-register with Ron Andrews with a cashier's check or money order in the amount of \$50 made out to the Motorcycle Training Fund.

## Take to the trails: #36

# Big Bonito leads scenic hike

Big Bonito trail #36 is one of the major hiking routes to the crest of the White Mountain Wilderness.

It ties into other trails where it tops out and is used to make loops for day hikes or for longer camping trips on Crest Trail #26.

Treading a path that follows Bonito Creek, a hiker will pass many good camping sites along the way. The canyon is full of thick stands of quaking aspen trees and the view at the crest includes Elk Point, White Horse Hill and the Tulare Basin.

Elk Point and White Horse Hill are two of the major landmarks on the crest for map orientation. Waterproof maps are available for \$4 at the Lincoln National Forest Smokey Bear Ranger District office on Mechem Drive.

Bonito Jeep is located north of the trail just prior to reaching the crest. This offers a prime example of the origin of the White Mountain



Wilderness streams that make up the Bonito watershed. It's one of the most dependable water sources in the wilderness, perfect for watering your horses. But U.S. Forest Service officials recommend that hikers carry personal drinking water.

This trail is shared by both hikers and equestrians. During the hunting season, it is used heavily by hunters on horseback for access to the higher hunting grounds.

The 4.6-mile Big Bonito Trail offers some of the most spectacular views in the state and is a prime example of forest land and open meadows full of wildflowers.

Forest service officials suggest hiking only in spring through fall. They list the difficulty as moderate and the use as heavy.

Hikers and campers can reach the trailhead in a regular car by traveling north nine miles out of Ruidoso on State Highway 48. At its junction with SR37, turn west and head 1 1/2 miles to its junction with Forest Road 107. Turn left again and travel 10 miles on FR 107 to its end.

The trail head offers plenty of parking, excellent camp sites, pit toilets and corrals for horses. The stream bed at this site usually contains plenty of water for animals. Several other trailheads also begin there.

## African killer bees on their way

Plans for a statewide educational campaign to prepare residents for the arrival of Africanized honeybees are being accelerated by New Mexico State University's Cooperative Extension Service and other agencies.

Sometimes called killer bees because of their aggressive behavior, the bees currently are about 300 miles southeast of Las Cruces near Texas' Big Bend National Park.

The bees are predicted to arrive in New Mexico within the next two years by officials with the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Mike English, extension entomologist, said heavier rainfall has placed a high priority on the campaign.

"We've had a very wet spring with a lot of flowers blooming," English said. "We thought the

desert might slow the bees' movement north, but this weather has made it very conducive for those bees to move."

The aggressive bees may appear in southern New Mexico as early as next fall because of the unusual conditions, he said.

English and representatives of the New Mexico Department of Agriculture and the state health department recently formed a task force to plan an educational strategy of public service announcements, visual programs and printed material.

The education program will be directed at all age groups, starting with school children. Primary education campaign targets, however, will be highway department workers, pest control operations and others more likely to come in

contact with beehives, said English.

Task force members are garnering financial and manpower support from other agencies to have the program operational before the bees arrive. The most help could come from commercial beekeepers.

"They can do a good job managing the bees," English said. "If they requeen the hives of Africanized honeybees with more docile strains of honeybees as the aggressive bees move in, we probably can make these bees a little more docile."

Africanized honeybees were first introduced to Brazil in 1957. Attempts by several nations in South and Central American to exterminate the pests proved futile. English said New Mexicans will have to follow the lead of other nations and learn to live with the bees.

## Disease strikes forest's pine trees

The forest around Cloudcroft and other wooded areas around Ruidoso are spotted with piñon trees tinged with brown needles.

Forest pest specialists have

identified the condition as piñon needle cast disease caused by a fungus called *Bifusella saccata*.

Although the fungus always is present at very low levels in the

forest, it has intensified dramatically due to the extremely wet spring this year in New Mexico, according to Larry Mastic with the Cloudcroft Ranger District of the U.S. Forest Service.

# Nothing dishonest about Deceptively

Looking at Deceptively while she stands in her stall elicits a description of her as petite, unpretentious and ill-mannered.

On the racetrack, however, the 2-year-old Quarter Horse incites a totally different character — awesome, unmatched, unflinching, a freak. Her flagging enthusiasm and grit as she charges down the stretch invokes visions of running champions Charger Bar, Dashes Dream, Corona Chick and Dash For Speed.


Undeclared in three races, Deceptively is favored to win Saturday's Grade I \$230,000 Rainbow Futurity at Ruidoso Downs Race Track. The 400-yard race is the second leg of the Triple Crown for 2-year-old Quarter Horses and is one of the most prestigious races in the Quarter Horse industry.

More than 150 horses participated in the Rainbow Futurity time trials June 25 in the hopes of securing a start for Saturday's race. The 10 fastest of the day secured a starting berth, with Deceptively being the fastest of all. Ridden by youthful jockey Jerry Yoakum, Deceptively posted a qualifying time of 19.48 seconds for the 400 yards.

Next was Mr Webster which finished second behind Deceptively by more than four lengths with a time of 19.79 seconds.

Deceptively is trained by Bruce Bell and is owned by Roger Knight, Jr. of Madisonville, Texas.

"Unless something happens to Deceptively, we're all just running for second money," said trainer Jack Brooks who qualified four of the 10 finalists. "But then, it has been proven time and time again that they can all get beat, even though it may be their own doing."

Witnesses to Deceptively's three races will attest it's not likely she'll beat herself through bad behavior. The bay filly may be crotchety around the barn, but when it comes to running she is the ultimate race horse. She stands quietly in the paddock, oblivious to the clamor and building excitement. She stands alert in the starting gate, all four feet soundly planted in anticipation.

On the track she explodes with such grit and determination that it dishonors her competition.

"She runs so fast it's scary," said Yoakum. "Looking back, I would have to say she would have broke the (350 yard) world record had I

let her run all out in the Kansas."

Yoakum has never whipped Deceptively, mindful that it doesn't matter how far you win, only that you win. Deceptively astounded race fans when she won the \$214,000 Kansas Futurity last May by two lengths while under a strangle hold from Yoakum.

More importantly, the pair broke Ruidoso Downs' 19-year-old track record for 350 yards, despite a sloppy racetrack.

Although she just missed breaking the world record, her time of 17.22 seconds did equal the world record for 2-year-old horses racing 350 yards set by Corona Chick last

year. "Genetically she's a freak," said Bell. "She's a hybrid, top of her breed. She really enjoys running."

While Bell likes to think he has a wonder horse, he knows she's just a horse and horses are fallible. In fact, Deceptively might be the cause of her own downfall. She tries hard and taxes her body to its limit. After each of her races Deceptively has suffered muscle spasms.

She also "bled" her first two races. Bleeding is a natural phenomenon in any athlete under stress, human or horses. Horse's lungs when blood vessels in the lungs rupture under the stress of

an explosive burst of energy. The ensuing blood may cause a horse to choke.

Some horses will quit running when they bleed while others, such as Deceptively, run through it. Once a horse bleeds, some refuse to extend themselves because they're afraid of the consequences.

"She hasn't made the connection between her running hard and her bleeding and spasms," said Bell.

"Many great horses, such as fastest time, 19.87, and Speed I Levi, which posted the sixth-fastest time, 19.94, Gilbreath will saddle Lady Bugs Gypsy which posted the champions Refrigerator and Ronas Ryon have bled, but never made the connection. Perhaps they disconnect because it's after the fact or maybe because they love to run. Kinda like a runner's high."

Following each race, Deceptively returns to the winners circle like an Olympic marathon runner — shaking and heaving.

"When we tried to slow her down in the Kansas Futurity all she did was fight the bit and it made her mad and matters worse," said Bell.

To combat the bleeding, Bell's veterinarian treats Deceptively with the legal diuretic medication Lasix. The filly did not bleed in her last race.

Bell and Yoakum also determined that instead of trying to slow Deceptively down, they should let her run free.

"Somehow she knows when a race is over and she won't give in until then," Bell said. "We did a lot better in the Rainbow by just sitting on her and letting her run free and letting her pull herself up. Her muscle spasms were, not nearly as bad."

Despite her physical problems, Bell expects an even better race from Deceptively than she produced

in the Kansas Futurity.

"After the Kansas we found that she had a lower than normal red blood cell count," Bell explained. "I attribute the low count to the stress of racing. We're now giving her more and different vitamins which obviously helped her in the Rainbow trials and should help even more in Saturday's race."

Like Brooks, trainers Sleepy Gilbreath and Jerry Lazenby agree that Deceptively will be the one to beat in the Rainbow Futurity.

Lazenby will saddle Time Bender which posted the fourth slowest of the 10th time, 19.97.


"Deceptively will be the one to beat," Lazenby said Wednesday. "But if she messes up there are three or four other horses that could take the win, Mr Webster, Mr Eye Opener, or Time Bender."

Deceptively raced against Mr Eye Opener and Time Bender in the Kansas Futurity and humiliated them both. Mr Eye Opener finished third while Time Bender finished seventh. In fact, Deceptively has defeated every Rainbow Futurity finalist.


Miss Bully Bullion, Speed I Levi, and Lady Bugs Gypsy all finished behind Deceptively in her Rainbow trial.

"We're all running for second," said Gilbreath, "and will be for the rest of the year as long as Deceptively is around. Horse vying for the Rainbow Futurity winner's share of \$94,900 are: Speed I Levi, Steve Fuller; Lady Bugs Gypsy, Luke Myles; Dash Thru Traffic, Jacky Martin; Mr Eye Opener, Kenneth Hart; Time Bender, no rider named at time of entry; It Aint No Bull, no rider; Deceptively, Jerry Yoakum; Mr Webster, Chris Zamora; Choculo, Jerry Nicodemus; and Miss Bunny Bullion, James Lackey.

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


### ECOLOGICAL ISSUES AFFECT CAR CARE COSTS

Beyond keeping up with changing technology, automotive service technicians now face a new challenge: keeping up with the automotive "green" list. Air conditioning service, for example, now demands sophisticated equipment and procedures; drain oil, tires and batteries must be properly disposed of.

Depending upon local ordinances and state or federal laws, antifreeze and oil filters are on the list. It's unpopular, if not illegal, to throw tires or batteries in the trash. # Downs heats up with big money races

Starting Friday, Ruidoso Downs and The Downs at Santa Fe will be crossing simulating each others race cards over the next two weeks. What that means is that if you like action, you'll get it with 24 races crammed between 1 p.m. and about 5:30 p.m.

Each track will have its own program and certain television monitors throughout the grandstand are designated for Santa Fe races. The Daily Racing Form will cover both tracks in its New Mexico Edition. You may place bets for both tracks at any mutual window.

Besides designating the amount of money you want to bet, the type of bet you wish to make (win, place show, exact, etc.), and the number of the horse you want to bet it on. You must, however, also designate which track you're playing.

For example: I'd like to place a bet on a race at Santa Fe, \$2 to win on the #5.

If you just say, "I want to place \$2 to win on the #5," it will be assumed you want to place your bet on a Ruidoso Downs race.

If you find you've placed your bet for the wrong track, you have until the horses break from the gate to change your ticket, which you can do at any mutual window.

### FLAVIO FIRST

With Minnesota Canterbury Downs' in financial trouble, jockey Flavio Martinez wasn't willing to drag his family a 1,000 miles only to have the racetrack close. Instead he moved his tack from Arizona's Turf Paradise to Ruidoso Downs for the summer.

Canterbury's loss was Ruidoso Downs' gain. Flavio, 34, is currently Ruidoso Downs' overall leading jockey with 40 wins from 211 mounts for a win percentage of 19. Flavio rides thoroughbreds exclusively.

"I have spent the last six years at Canterbury Downs and really didn't have any place else to go for the summer so I tried Ruidoso and I love it," said Flavio who brought his wife Roberta and their four children with him.

"I really like it here because we only race four days a week instead of six like they do at Phoenix. It's sort of like a working vacation."

Flavio worked on the track during the summers while studying to be an electrical engineer. Flavio "caught the bug" and by 1978 he had dropped out of the University of New Mexico and was riding race throughout the southwest and Midwest. The Albuquerque, native, held his own in Illinois and Minnesota where he rode with the likes of Pat Day, Sandy Hawley, Eddie Delhoussey and Earlie Fires.

"I thought I'd do okay here because I know

of a lot of trainers here, but I didn't think I'd be so hot," Flavio said with modesty. "It's too soon to tell now if I'll be back next year."

### JOCKEY SHORTS

Second in the overall Jockey standings with 28 wins is Todd Fincher who stands heads and shoulders the rest of Ruidoso Downs' jockeys...literally. You see, Fincher is considered tall by jockey standards, real tall. The skinny Fincher stands an even six feet. Amazingly, you never notice his height when he rides. He gets as low and rides as hard as Flavio who is only 5'2".

Fincher rides mostly thoroughbreds, but he is limited by the number of horses he can ride because he tacks 120 pounds. Many trainers, however, including his father, think enough of his ability to let him use the overweight allowance of seven pounds.

Jacky Martin continues his dominance of the quarter horse jockey standings with 23 wins from 64 rides.

Jacky's win percentage of 35.19 is the best among Ruidoso Downs' top 20 riders which ride at the mountain track weekly. Second is Kenny Hart with 13 wins from 86 mounts for a win percentage of 15.1.

Martin, 44, has opted off of Mr Eye Opener in Saturday's Rainbow Futurity in favor of Dash Through Traffic. Martin qualified both horses and although he has ridden Mr Eye Opener over Dash Through Traffic in the past.

I have to think it's because the powerful Dash Through Traffic is showing tremendous improvement with each race and may be the better of the two going 400 yards.

Kenneth qualified Speed I Levi and Time Bender for the Rainbow, but opted off the Jerry Lazenby trainees to ride Mr Eye Opener for Jack Brooks.

Speed of Jack Brooks, the Oklahoma native leads the overall and quarter horse trainers' standings with 29 wins from 123 starts for a win percentage of 23.6. Fred Danley is second overall with 25 wins, 14 thoroughbred and 11 quarter horse from a combined 155 starts.

### BITS & PIECES

For you analytical handicappers out there, the winningest position through last Sunday is the eight post for quarter horses races at 350 through 550 yards. The eight post has a win percentage of 17, followed by the one post at 16 percent. Third is the five post at 12 percent. It appears the quarter horse chute is pretty consistent rail to rail.

For quarter horses races at 870 and 1,000 yards the best post appears to be the two post at 19 percent. Now, the eight post had a win percentage of 24, but it also fell five horses short in the number of starts from that post.

Thoroughbred sprints favor winners from the five post at 15 percent followed by the six post at 16 percent.

Thoroughbred route races seem to favor horses running from the one, two, five and seven post which run from 13 to 15 percent. Again, this is taking into consideration the number of starts per position.

### RAINBOW RECORDS

Jack Brooks has started more horses in the Rainbow Futurity while winning the most: 1991 with Steppin For The Moon, 1990 with Straight To The Bank, 1988 with Merganser, and in 1984 with Heavenly. I believe he also holds the record for qualifying the most horses for the Rainbow Futurity, four, and he did that this year as well as in 1991, 1990 and 1986.

Jockey Jerry Nicodemus holds the record of four Rainbow Futurity wins; 1991 on Steppin For The Moon, 1989 on Deadly Dart, 1982 on Meganette, and 1970 on Rocket Wrangler. Although it's still tentative, Jerry should be aboard Choculo in Saturday's Rainbow, Dan and Jolene Urschel share the most wins for an owner along with Jerry Wells with two wins each. The Urschels won back to back Rainbows in 1980 with Mighty Deck Three and the great Special Effort in 1981. Jerry Wells and partners won the 1988 edition with Merganser and again with another set of partners...Deceptively enters the race the only undefeated youngster...It Aint No Bull and Miss Bunny Bullion have the same daddy, World Bullion...Mr Eye Opener shares the world record of 16.45 seconds for 350 yards with Dash For Game who set the record at Prescott Downs in Arizona in 1989...

"Unless something happens to Deceptively, we're all running for second month," said trainer Sleepy Gilbreath who will saddle Lady Bugs Gypsy in the Rainbow. "And it will be that way all year as long as she's around. She's awesome, wish I had one just like her!"

# Oldest highway in the U.S. rolls into Downs

The oldest highway in the United States dates back 400 years or so. It threaded through two nations and connected Mexico City with the wilds of Santa Fe.

The El Camino Real, or the Royal Highway, as the Spaniards called it has long been linked to the history of the Southwest. At different times in its colorful history, it has been used as a path of discovery, conquest and escape.

One more link in the history of the El-Camino Real is added this week as Ruidoso Downs Race Track announced the arrival of the highly acclaimed exhibit "El Camino Real: Un Sendero Historico."

The exhibit was prepared under the direction of the Camino Real Project in collaboration with the University of New Mexico's Latin American Institute.

An officially recognized 1992 Columbus Quincentenary Project, "El Camino Real: Un Sendero Historico" was funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities, while grants from the New Mexico Endowment for the Humanities, the New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Department and the New Mexico State Historic Preservation Division provided support for related project activities such as an archaeological survey of the Camino, and an official auto route and historic marker project.

"El Camino Real: Un Sendero Historico" opened to the public in June of 1990. In a colorful and informative 36-panel display, this exhibit invites visitors to take a fascinating journey through time as it commemorates the rich cultural heritage embodied in the long history of New Mexico's "Royal Road."

It was not long after Christopher Columbus' discovery of the New World, that the Spaniards extended

their conquests to include the empire of Mexico. From its capital, Tenochtitlan (present day Mexico City), they continued to penetrate into unknown lands in a series of northward explorations.

El Camino Real de Tierra Adentro, as the route linking colonial Mexico with its northern capital at Santa Fe was to become known, was traveled over the centuries, not only by Native Americans and Spanish Conquistadors, but also by early Mexican settlers, and later, by the first Anglo-American trappers and traders to arrive from the east.

Although parts of El Camino Real de Tierra Adentro had been used by 16th century Spanish adventurers and even earlier by Native Americans, the route in its entire length was blazed in 1598 when Don Juan de Onate led a group of Spanish settlers into the wilds of present day New Mexico and established the first formal European municipality west of the Mississippi.

The history of this great trunk road, once the longest road in continental North America, reveals a complex pattern of conquest and colonization, movement and settlement, and encounters between different ethnic groups, languages, customs and philosophies.

Turf Club patrons can view the El Camino Real every race day during the regular racing card.

The exhibit will be open to the public in the Turf Club on non-race days from 8:30 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. and from 8:30 a.m. until 10:00 a.m. on race days (Thursday through Sunday).

There is no charge for admission on non-race days.

## First Down And Ten is ready to tackle Rainbow consolation

First Down And Ten and nine other hopeful 2-year-old Quarter Horses will go postward in Friday's \$41,200 Rainbow Futurity Consolation at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

The Rainbow Futurity Consolation features those horses which posted the 11th through 20th-fastest times in the June 25 qualifying races for the 400-yard Rainbow Futurity. The 10-fastest horses will compete in Saturday's Grade I \$231,000 Grade I Rainbow Futurity.

First Down And Ten heads the consolation field with his top time of 19.98. First Down And Ten will be ridden by Ruidoso Downs' leading quarter horse jockey Jacky Martin and the pair will race from

the four post.

"He ran a big race in the trials, he just didn't run fast enough to make it into the finals," said Jack Brooks who trains the brown gelding for Homer Garza of Mesquite, Texas. "If he steps away from the gate in the consolation like he did in the trials he'll be tough to beat. He likes the distance."

Brook's claim of fame for First Down And Ten is not unfounded. The son of World Champion Running Horse First Champion Dash is the richest and winningest starter in the consolation. He has competed in three futurities and qualified for the finals of two. He ran fifth behind Choculo in the Grade I Sun Country Futurity at Sunland Park

last April and finished ninth in the Grade I Kansas Futurity at Ruidoso Downs in May behind Deceptively. He also ran second behind Choculo in the West Texas Futurity Consolation last March at Sunland Park. He has started six times, winning all three of his futurity trials, for earnings of about \$23,000.

Although Gilda Streak qualified for the consolation with the 19th-fastest time, 20.12, the Jerry Lazenby trainee looks like a strong contender to nab the consolation's winner's share of \$10,000. Gilda Streak won her trial race by a head. Earlier this year, she qualified for the rich Grade I Graham Farms Futurity at Manor Downs in Texas.

Owned by Durrell Russell of Arlington, Texas, Gilda Streak will be ridden by Kenneth Hart and the team will break from the fifth post.

# Local educators explain falling test scores

Local educators shouldn't react too quickly to lower scores registered by third, fifth and eighth grade students who took a new basic skills tests this past school year.

The state changed from a California test of basic skills to an Iowa test. Districts were warned to expect lower scores, special services director Karen Tillman told the Ruidoso School Board last week.

"Scores are lower all over the state," she said. "The approach to the task is different. I don't want teachers to feel the lower scores are a reflection on them. They had no part in selecting these tests and neither did I."

"It's just a very different test. We were told from the beginning the scores would be lower, but they were a shock to see."

"In any case, I refuse to believe that one test once a year is a better indicator than year-long performance."

In a letter to district test coordinators, Dr. Bud Hall, state director of assessment, evaluation and information services, wrote that the scores this year should not be compared to previous years.

"It is difficult to compare ITBS (Iowa) scores to the CTB/4 (California) scores because these are two different and distinct assessments," he said.

The objectives covered by each test are different.

"It is expected that lower student scores will occur, which is a normal outcome when a new test is administered and norms established," he wrote.

Tillman told the school board, "It would be detrimental to overall district progress to develop a 'knee jerk' reaction to perceive grade

level deficiencies. "Careful analysis will provide indicators for needed adjustments to curriculum approach. This should be accomplished on an annual basis in order to provide continuity of instruction."

"They're crying the blues all over the state," Tillman said of the basic skills tests. Comparisons showing how well the district did on balance with the rest of the state won't be available until August, she said.

Meanwhile, White Mountain Elementary principal Frank Cannella and his third grade teachers have analyzed the test and pointed out the extreme differences with the California format.

"That will result in a subsequent analysis of the need for change in curriculum," she said. "The district philosophy has been never to teach a test. However, if information contained in the new tests is worthy for instructional consideration at a particular grade level, that general content/skill information may need to be taught."

"The instructional leader (principal) and grade level teachers are the most appropriate persons to address those issues."

"I'm sure each (principal) will look at their curriculum to see if want to make changes. My advice has been if it makes education sense, use it."

Third graders placed at the thirty-fifth percentile, which means 34 percent of those third graders taking the test across the nation scored lower and 64 percent higher.

The fifth graders scored in the forty-fourth percentile and eighth graders in the fortieth percentile.

"Over the previous 10 years, the lowest score (on the California test) for the whole third grade level was the fifty-fourth percentile and the highest was the sixty-eighth. The low and high for fifth graders were 55 and 68, and for eighth graders, 58 and 73."

"So any assessment should be a multiple look," Tillman said. "It may be when we get the state results back, we might be low, but I don't think so."

Another factor that could affect Ruidoso's standing is that the district tests all of its students and doesn't eliminate those who are severely developmentally disabled as many other districts do, she said.

"If you do that, then I feel you should not include gifted students, and then who might you exclude using some other rationale," Tillman said.

Among the other scores Tillman presented to the school board Tuesday were writing achievement tests for fourth and sixth graders.

Based on a 4.5 scale, fourth graders were rated at 3.51 points and seventh graders at 2.058 points.

In his letter, Hall wrote Tillman that in the past, New Mexico students were given a direct writing assessment. This year, students are being assessed through a portfolio writing assignment. The procedures for administering the two tests are very different, he said. In addition, a new scale was used for grading.

"We were to have the material in September and work on it all year, but we didn't receive it until February," Tillman said. "I would look for those to be better next year. It's an

excellent way to approach (writing assessment) because the students are able to work on it all year and then choose their best work."

"We need to look at their tests results grade by grade and year by year," she said. "At this stage, we are just looking for development."

One test area not affected, and one in which Ruidoso stacks up well with the rest of the state, is the high school competencies examination, Tillman said.

Students in tenth and eleventh grades fared extremely well in the reading section with 98 to 100 percent passing. One hundred percent of eleventh graders also passed language arts. The percentage dropped to 91-92 percent for tenth and twelfth graders.

Passing percentage was in the 91 percent and up range for social studies, science and mathematics. Only in composition did the students seem to experience more difficulty with between 13-15 percent failing in all three grades.

In general observations to the board, Tillman observed that it has been detrimental to the district not to have an administrative person to be responsible to provide continuous monitoring of both curriculum and of evaluation for needed changes or adjustments.

"When tests results are received at the end of the school year, staff has no time to provide needed input to the next grade level teachers," she noted. "The district may need to consider adding an in-service day for grade to grade transitional curricular work, which could result in needed modifications being accomplished prior to the beginning of the ensuing school year."

# Cece Griffin heads for the Big Apple

Representing New Mexico at the National Democratic Convention won't be all work and no play for Cece Griffin, Lincoln County Democratic Party chair.

Griffin is looking forward to helping choose her party's candidates for president and vice president and getting into the nitty gritty of adopting a platform that she hopes will include strong planks on reducing this nation's debt service.

"That's the main thing I'm concerned with," said Griffin, who has read and studied top presidential contender Bill Clinton's economic plan. "I'm very impressed with his plan, and am convinced that he is the one candidate who can turn our economy around."

"Nobody should be hungry in this nation, and the Democrats are the party of the people, the only party with a plan to get the economy back on track, while dealing with the human suffering," she added.

"I think Clinton's the one who could do it," said Griffin.

She was elected on the first ballot at the State Democratic Convention and is attending the National Convention as a Clinton delegate.

Griffin, when asked by the New York Times for her choice for vice president, answered, "Bill Bradley."

"We have a lot of Democrats who would make a good vice president, but if anything happens to President Clinton, I would really feel very comfortable with Brad-

ley," said Griffin. Clinton's Arkansas office has contacted Griffin to discuss platform planks of primary concern to the presidential contender.

The New Mexico and Alaska delegations have been paired at the Doral Court, 13 blocks from Madison Square Garden. It's close enough to walk, but the delegates have been warned to be careful in the big city.

"One enterprising businessman is leasing bulletproof vests for \$10 a day," said Griffin. In his advertising brochure he calls his hometown "Fear City."

Delegates, with their choices of meetings, parties and receptions, won't be spending much time in their rooms. The committees, caucuses and parties start early and extend way into the night, with some receptions scheduled to begin as late as 11 p.m.

Griffin plans to attend some meetings and receptions planned especially for the women's caucus, and she's picked her favorites from among a dozen or so fancy invitations.

The City of New York has prepared a complete lineup of free activities to welcome delegates. The largest fashion show ever staged will be presented in Central Park, and Democrats have been invited to dance under the stars at Lincoln Center Fountain Plaza. One night will be a night on Broadway.

Griffin said New York is making a big investment in this convention.

# Healthcare costs turn the American dream into a nightmare

People are selling their homes and using their savings just to provide themselves with needed medical care, not thinking what will happen when the money runs out. Others don't bother to go to the doctor or buy prescription drugs because they know they can't afford it.

With the increase in costs of visits to the doctor, hospital stays and prescription drugs among other aspects of health care, many groups and individuals are creating plans that may change how much people pay for care. The American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) has a draft proposal for a plan, but as in any solution there won't be any free care.

The proposal called Health Care America was presented to the Lincoln County AARP chapter Wednesday by Opal and Everett Lankford of Roswell. Opal is the assistant state director for AARP and works with groups in Lincoln, Chaves, Eddy, Lea and DeBaca counties. She said AARP has been working on this plan for more than two years and used input from its members and from health evaluation forms to come up with what is called a "blended program," that would expand and improve Medicare.

When the AARP National Legis-

lative Council began working on the plan in 1990 they set four goals for it to meet. One is to provide universal access to health care, and the second is to control costs. The third is to ensure and encourage quality, and the fourth is to meet the needs of patients who need long-term care.

They had 25 field hearings and many health care reform forums across the United States. The group also did polls and surveys to see what people wanted in health care.

The information from questionnaires to members was sent to Dallas, the regional center, and then to Washington D.C. to be put into a computer and compiled with

the rest of the suggestions. This proposal's aim is to reach every citizen in America from birth to the end of life, Opal said. They want to help all people, not just those that already have insurance or Medicaid.

Opal said AARP feels the time has come when people can't afford not having a health care reform.

"The cost of health care is three times the rate of inflation. Many people are being neglected. It is a disgrace what is happening in health care," Opal said.

The whole plan may not meet with the approval of all people because it is controversial, in that if it were passed by Congress it would require a national tax, she said. If it passes each person would be issued a card, like a credit card with a name and identification number, and the person could choose the doctor to see. After the visit or hospital stay the card information is put into a machine and sent to a central location. At that point the doctor or hospital is paid and the person never receives a bill from either of these.

The person does get a bill from the central organization, but with this proposal deductibles and maximum payments have been set depending on income and the type of service being obtained. The monthly premium for each adult would be \$50 and for a couple with

children it would be \$125, while the maximum out-of-pocket cost for the adult would be \$1,500 and \$3,000 for each family.

The program also encourages people to be healthy by providing 100 percent coverage for preventive services as well as for vision, hearing and dental screenings. It also covers at least two-thirds of nursing home costs and the highest it could possibly cost would be about \$960 a month.

"Costs will be controlled on the national, state and local level. We won't have to pay enormous prices. We want an affordable service that covers all people and takes care of the doctors and the hospital too. We don't want them to go broke either," Opal said.

Everett Lankford, who is the district AARP/Vote coordinator, showed the group a video tape about the proposal which reported on specific cases of people and how they would be effected. It also reviewed the funding process for the proposal.

Since less money will be coming from the person receiving care, more will have to come from other sources, including taxes. The estimated cost for health care this year is \$800 billion and is estimated to reach \$1 trillion by 1995. The estimated cost for the

AARP proposal would be \$486 billion, with the money coming from five primary sources.

The first source would be existing federal spending at \$229 billion and the second would be most of the existing state spending which would be \$80 billion. An 8 percent employers payroll tax for employers that opt into the public plan would supply \$36 billion. If employers do not go with the proposal they are required to have as good of coverage as the plan, excluding the long-term care. The fourth source would be the premiums from those enrolled in the plan.

New taxes would be the fifth source and would make up \$112 billion of the total. The new taxes being proposed are a 3 percent gross income tax or a 5 percent value added tax (VAT), which is like a retail sales tax villages and states impose. This amount would be tacked on to any existing sales tax a community has but would be refunded to low income families. Another possibility is an increase in tax rates for large estates of more than \$2.5 million and a 5 percent corporate surtax. A standard funding source of taxes on alcohol and tobacco could also be used for the plan. No tax would be put on food, housing or medical care.

"Yes, there will be an increase in taxes, but it won't be that much.

Look at what we are paying now for health care," Everett said.

He said doctors and insurance companies probably won't want to go along with the plan, but it isn't going to hurt either of these groups. People can still have insurance to help pay for the amount they can be charged for a service.

A few questions remain for this proposal, such as when does a child become an adult, but AARP will answer these before presenting it to Congress in January of 1993. Everett said they have been talking to local members of Congress and showing them the proposal to gain support. Since this is only a draft AARP will be evaluating other plans to see if there are things that can be improved on this proposal. He said there are about 30 health care reform plans in Congress right now.

Both encouraged people to write letters to their Congressmen to let them know how people feel about the healthcare proposal. Chapter members also filled out a questionnaire to provide AARP with feedback on the proposal. If and when this proposal will begin depends on it being recognized by the public. Congress and the president of the United States, Opal said.

"It isn't necessary for us to go through this in the richest country, America," Everett said.

One hundred and twenty books were sold. And Jena's nieces Jessica and Rachael served fairy tea and cup cakes.


The book, written by Annie Ullrich, tells of two little girls, Kristen and Allie, who go to the garden and find a tea table especially set just for them with a not saying:

## Apply by July 13 for help in collecting child support

Through this program HSD submits delinquent accounts to the IRS and the state Taxation and Revenue Department to intercept refunds from absent parents. So far this fiscal year HSD has intercepted more than \$3.1 million.

In order for HSD to intercept, Silva said an account must be delinquent more than \$500 and be based on a court order for a child who is still a minor.

## Editorial

### Either enforce sign rules or drop them

If a law or ordinance is just too complicated to enforce, then it obviously needs to be changed.

That's the case with the Village of Ruidoso sign ordinance. For instance, if a banner has no words on it, then it's OK, but if that same banner (of whatever size and color) has words, then it's not OK.

Signs are allowed according to the size of your store frontage on a mathematical formula. The rules are specific on taking down signs once a business is gone, but that part of the ordinance has been loosely enforced in the past.

Signs must be kept in good repair, according to the village ordinance, and that ordinance precludes placing signs, flags and banners in street right of way.

Many hours of debate and discussion went into the sign ordinance currently on the books. Realtors came out in force at one point when discussions centered on their signs, and business owners were out to protect their right to place their messages on their properties.

The end product of all that discussion is the village sign ordinance, which has never been enforced. The village has blinked at some infractions, and apparently is now ready to issue tickets to offenders. It's unclear if this new enforcement mode will be village-wide or just hit or miss.

If the village sign ordinance is a good ordinance, one that is logical and fits this mountain resort town, then it should be enforced, and that enforcement should extend to all citizens on an equal basis.

If it's not a good ordinance, and we suspect that it is fatally flawed, then it should be amended or rescinded and redrafted.

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

# LCMC teams up with doctor to deliver medical services to Hondo

He doesn't quite make house calls, but Dr. Michael Carbuto is bringing care a little closer to home for some Hondo Valley residents.

Carbuto and his two-person staff of nurse Barbel French and office manager Peggy Lawing have made the trek to a clinic at the Hondo school for the last three Friday mornings to do anything from regular check-ups to tests for strep throat to emergency medical care.

They haven't seen many patients, but the service is valuable for those who do come in.

"The main idea of the clinic is to offer medical care in the valley so people won't have to travel. It's for the elderly, the home bound and those who have difficulty getting out," he said.

In traveling to Roswell, Carbuto saw a 70-mile stretch where no one provides care, so he approached Valerie Miller, Lincoln County Medical Center administrator, about it. Miller said she and the LCMC board of trustees had developed a strategic care plan for the county, and they had seen a need for service in that part of the county. It took them awhile to find a place to have the clinic, and Carbuto offered to go, so it finally came together this spring.

"The clinic is a fulfillment of a gap we perceived in the county. It was the last population center that didn't have care locally. These people had a choice of going to Ruidoso or Roswell and either way it is a long way to go," she said.

Their hope was that people

would appreciate the availability of medical care on a regular basis, she said. They chose to have the clinic on Friday because the school has a four-day week, but this time of year may not have been the best time to start it, Carbuto said. Many people are on vacations, and children are out of school so there aren't as many people around, he said.

Hondo school superintendent Sergio Castanon agrees with Carbuto and Miller in that they do have a need for care for people in the area, especially the elderly who can't travel as well. When LCMC approached them on it, he and the

school board decided the clinic would be good for the community. They also thought it would be good for the school to help the community by providing the space. He checked into the legalities of doing it and provided the space, which is a classroom for in-school suspension.

LCMC furnished the clinic with the examination table, stools, lights and cabinets, while Carbuto has brought the supplies he thinks he will need. He has also been in touch with the drug companies to get extra samples of standard drugs to give to the patients. Since some of

the people they see are on fixed incomes, helping the samples can help reduce the cost to the patient in buying a prescription drug.

Carbuto and his staff will also be bringing down magazines for people to read if they have to wait to see the doctor. The clinic is set up to give full medical care to people of all ages, and even has scales for babies, although Carbuto doesn't do obstetrics. The office also has minor suturing materials for accidents. Carbuto said the facility they use at the school is great, and it does have handicap access.

The clinic was full Friday, not with patients, but with visitors stopping in for an open house the staff invited the valley community to.

One resident, Eva Sanchez, said it is nice to have the clinic at Hondo so people don't have to drive so far for care. She said she hopes people will come to the clinic so it can continue to operate. Many people in the area are on fixed incomes so it is hard for them to get care, Sanchez said.

Lawing said they will always try to work some payment schedule out for patients who can't pay all at once or don't have insurance. She said she can also help people fill out their insurance forms and can file Medicare.

One way Carbuto intends to use the clinic in the future is to offer free physicals to students in the fall. He said they have been offering free exams at Ruidoso, but doing it at Hondo as well would make it easier for athletes in this area.

People may call Carbuto's
