Two die in plane crash

Two people died late Friday when their airplane crashed while they were attempting to land at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport near Ruidoso.

The bodies of John Lovelace of Coppell, Texas, and his daughter, LuAlice Lovelace, 26, of Lubbock, were found in the scattered wreckage Saturday morning about a half mile from airport runway.

Airport manager Lloyd Wayne said according to the filed flight plan, the Lovelaces were traveling in a 1966 Cessna 337-A from Lubbock to Ruidoso.

Wayne said the last recorded transmission from the plane about 9 p.m. was that the pilot intended to circle the airport before landing.

"When he came in that night, the pilot was following standard visual flight rules, staying as high as the highest mountain peak until visual contact with the airport,"

Wayne said. "Then he started descending."

The pilot called the airport for an advisory and the person on duty gave him information about the wind velocity, the altimeter reading and advised that there was no other traffic, Wayne said.

"Everything was tape recorded. (The pilot) said he was at 9,000 feet, was circling and would be coming in to land on runway number 24," Wayne said. "Somewhere during the circle to the south of the field, about 1,000 yards south of the runway, he started a rapid descent and disappeared."

"There was nothing wrong with the operation of the airport. What happened to the airplane, I can't say."

Lovelace had flown into Sierra Blanca several times before, Wayne said. He was unsure whether any of those landings were at night. The family apparently recently bought a

Compromise efforts stall over BLM land swap

The proposed federal acquisition of 25,000 acres of land in Lincoln County is on hold until late 1994, due to the failure of federal and local government officials to reach a compromise.

The news is depressing to many residents of the historic village of Lincoln, who supported the proposal as additional protection to ensure the preservation of the village.

"I need more information to comment on the details of the situation," said Cleis Green, chairman of the Lincoln Historic Preservation Board. "But I feel the majority of the people in this valley are in favor of the swap. It disturbs me that the Lincoln County Commission is not listening to the wishes of the swap are not a compromise. It is what is going to happen. We believe the BLM and the County Management would be a good partner in a developer."

Green said that at risk the proposed swap is being agreed by the Lincoln Valley Land Company along the Rio Bonito area. The 25,000 BLM acres also includes the historic parkman Ron Green.

"We have financial considerations to take into account," he told *The News*. "Many may have to 'start chipping in' to meet those obligations."

Company officials don't intend to sit around for the next two years, however.

"We do have a plan in mind to install the project," Green said. "But he would not discuss any details."

The land company gains its profit by taking the property acquired in the swap and selling it to ranchers already lined up for the deal.

COMPROMISE EFFORT

BLM officials and county commissioners met over the last few weeks trying to work out a compromise.

That effort failed, the major obstacle being BLM's inability to commit to the sale of a portion of 35,000 acres in the county tentatively identified for disposal.

The commission has insisted on a swap that drops objections to the exchange and that the BLM agrees to sell some of the property to local managers in Lincoln County.

That stance is in line with a land-use policy adopted by the commission, which requires that "land parity" between government and private ownership of land be

maintained.

Bureau of Land Management Director Cy Jamison put the proposed Rio Bonito land exchange on hold yesterday," according to a bureau news release July 30.

Citing concern about the impact of the exchange on the tax base in Lincoln County, Jamison instructed New Mexico State Director Larry Woodard to notify all interested parties that no action will take place until the Roswell Resource Area's resource management plan (RMP) is completed in the fall of 1984.

That plan will identify specific lands to be marked for disposal in Lincoln County to the BLM.

Over the past months, BLM's Roswell District had been negotiating with the county to resolve their concerns, according to the release.

"The major remaining issue to be resolved was the question of loss of private land in Lincoln County. The board's interim land use plan requires parity between federal and private land ownership exchanges in the county. No BLM land is ready for exchange or sale in Lincoln County. However, the Roswell District stated the lands would be identified in the resource management plan, which would be complete in late 1994."

The Lincoln Valley Land Company first proposed the exchange to the BLM in September 1990 after acquiring the property during a bankruptcy action.

Under the proposal, the BLM would acquire about 1,115 acres of land and 330 acres of water rights near the village of Lincoln in exchange for about 36,719 acres of public land in Doña Ana, Otero, Sierra, Eddy, Chaves, San Juan and Valencia counties.

All the public land previously had been identified in management plans as lands to be transferred from federal ownership.

Just a month ago, it appeared the BLM and commission were about to work out a

compromise. Bureau officials essentially had agreed to all conditions laid out by the commission except the land parity issue.

When Commissioner Monroy Montes, county manager Andy Wynham and county attorney J. Robert Beauvais left Woodard's office after a meeting in June, agreement had been reached on everything except the amount of federal land to be put up for sale immediately, according to Commission Chairman Stirling Spencer.

Woodard was talking 5,000 acres. Montes wanted 35,000 and the commission later settled on 15,000 acres as the number to be included in an official protest letter to the BLM.

Montes and Wynham subsequently met in Roswell with BLM area district resource manager Sandra Allen and new district director Leslie Cone.

They came back confused about where we stand," Spencer said. "They said she wouldn't commit to anything."

Spencer ran into Allen and Cone at a meeting on another issue and the discussion switched to the Rio Bonito swap.

Cone was sitting there saying how she couldn't guarantee anything," Spencer said. "I told them I understand they may not be able to give (a signed contract), but asked them what can they do. I told them I was tired of the negativism."

second home in Ruidoso.

"The pilot was following the proper visual flight rules, coming in high until the lights were under him to define the ground altitude and then letting down to enter the landing pattern," Wayne said. The plane never made it to that landing pattern.

Wayne said it is possible that Lovelace became disoriented when he started a turn to the left and the runway lights disappeared.

"All he would have had in front and to the side was black. There was no moon," Wayne said. "There were no lights for visual orienta-

tion. You've got to go with your instruments and believe them."

Frustrated rescue workers from White Mountain Search and Rescue and other agencies conducted an unsuccessful ground search Friday night and early Saturday, but were hampered by darkness, the heavy vegetation, rough topography and lack of roads. Attempts to spot the plane by air with a heat sensing jet, U.S. Customs and Civilian Air Patrol aircraft also failed.

Searchers also were unable to pick up any signal from the Cessna's transponder, battery-operated electronic device that on impact is supposed to send out a signal, according to rescue officials.

At sunrise Saturday, a helicop-

ter from Holloman Air Force Base in Alamogordo headed out and airmen visually spotted the wreckage within 15 minutes.

Published reports that the plane was being tracked by radar and disappeared from the screen or that the airport tower controller told the pilot he was too high for a landing are erroneous, Wayne said.

"We have no radar (locally)," Wayne said. "The Albuquerque radar can pick a plane up at 13,000 feet over the field. There are future plans to enlarge the radar (scope) out of Roswell, but there is nothing to follow a plane all the way down."

The airport tower was taken out about a year ago when the Ruidoso village council decided to discontin-

ue its subsidy of the operation.

The airport's only navigational aide, a non-directional beacon, was out of commission because of damage from a lightning strike.

When he saw that weather conditions permitted a landing at Ruidoso, Lovelace notified Roswell by radio that he was switching from an instrument flight plan to a visual flight plan, recognition that Sierra Blanca had no navigational aide, Wayne said.

Officials with the National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB), an arm of the Federal Aviation Administration, were at the accident scene Saturday evening. Cessna experts arrived Sunday morning to perform their examination.

"The NTSB took the altimeter with them to analyze with other items," Wayne said. "Everything is suspect until it is proven not to be involved. They're very thorough and they don't jump to any conclusions."

The New Mexico State Police directed the search and rescue operation.

Other agencies that responded to the emergency call included the Ruidoso Emergency Medical Services and the Fire Department, the Bonito Volunteer Fire Department, the Capitan Volunteer Fire Department, the Fort Stanton Volunteer Fire Department, the Lincoln County Emergency Medical Services from Alto, Fort Stanton and Capitan.

Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane, Officer Laura Standridge of Ruidoso Police Department and several agents with the Federal Bureau of Investigation also were on hand.

Chamber of Commerce board reviews Art Festival figures

All the booths and tents have been taken down, but there is still money to be counted and bills to be paid before the 21st annual Ruidoso Art Festival is finally over.

Chamber of Commerce board directors heard a report Wednesday night on preliminary figures from the festival and it looks like it may beat last year's revenues by a little more than \$1,000 although this year's attendance was down by about 13 percent. Jack Muhn, contract accountant for the chamber, said the bad news was that the gate was down by that much, but the figures look good for what had been budgeted. The budget total of revenue over expenses was \$28,400, but the preliminary estimate of revenue is \$29,979.

He said the tent negotiations went very well, and the cost was only 10 percent more than last year even with adding one tent. The one tent, though, allowed the group to increase revenues by \$5,000 from booth fees. Another thing that cut down expenses was that the chamber did not sell beer this year, so the group didn't have to have costly insurance.

Muhn said he didn't look for any of the other expenses to go up from what was budgeted. As far as revenues he wasn't sure how they would compare to the budget because he hadn't counted all the receipts, but it looked like soft drink sales were down by 10 percent and hamburger sales by 20 percent. These numbers were also a reflection of the gate numbers, he said.

On Friday, the first day of the event, attendance was up before a tremendous rain and then the day ended up very low. Saturday's at-

tendance was down by about 10 percent, while Sunday, Muhn said, was within 40 to 50 people of last year's attendance. The total count was 7,693. Muhn said the Friday rain probably cost them about \$5,000 but the bottom line looks better than budgeted.

He said he should have the actual figures within the next couple days, and he will have the June financials then, too. Last month was the last in the fiscal year, but Muhn said he is still closing that out because he wanted to check each account. He had told the board at the last meeting that he hoped to bring in about \$50,000 and had come within about \$400 of that amount. The board is still looking at a deficit, but he will have the exact figures at the next meeting.

In general discussion about the art festival, chamber executive director Joan Bailey said they will be having the festival at the Civic Events Center next year and the space has been reserved through 1997 for the event. Director Ron Wicker said having it at the center should save the chamber about \$15,000.

Chamber president Paul Crown said he and Bailey had talked to center director Kathleen Michelena and all they could get inside would be 68 booths. At this festival they had 154 booths so they would need to put a number of booths outside too. If that is the case, he said they wouldn't need more than four tents next year, but some of the same costs would be there. The area would also be easier for the chamber to monitor because there is only one entrance and exit, Crown said.

Bailey had asked the artist about whether they would prefer inside or outside booths and about half still wanted to be outside. This

was the first time she had been on the other side of the art festival, as this was her first year as director, instead of volunteer. She said she couldn't speak highly enough of how the staff pulled together on Friday as the event was getting started. She also said the staff complimented the board of directors as well for their help and participation in the event. It shows the change that the chamber is going through, she said.

To get more suggestions on what changes could be made for next year's event, all interested directors and booth workers will meet at 6 p.m. Tuesday at the back room of the Bull Ring.

Crown said he did get a comment that Friday the event did not stay open long enough. He said he made the decision to cut it off at 7 p.m. because in his 20 years of experience with art shows the number of visitors drops off after that time. When the numbers drop artists start closing up and neither the visitor nor the artist is satisfied.

One thing came up this year that had never happened before, Crown said. At least 20 people dropped out and about five people were no-shows, but because no regulations were stated concerning it they had to give the artists their money back. He said they need to state that if a person drops out after a certain date only half the fee will be given back, and if it is a no-show, no money should be given back.

In other business, the chamber agreed to once again host the Hospitality Night for the Golden Aspen Rally on September 17. Rally president and village councilor Ron Andrews came before the board to finalize this and what else the chamber might do during the rally.

The chamber has hosted the night for about three years. The rally is not a sanctioned event of the chamber's Aspenfest, but Golden Aspen Rally is a member of the chamber.

Andrews said last year in return for hosting the night, an advertisement was published about the event with a letter from the chamber president welcoming the motorcyclists to town. He said last year board president Tony Wilcoxson also asked to give out an award and what that involved was having chamber staff members go to the rally and judge the cycles before presenting the award on Saturday. If the chamber wants to do that again this year, that would be fine because it was well received, he said.

The reason for the hospitality night is that it is the first night of the trade show, and it is open and free of charge to local people to come and meet the bikers, Andrews said. He said he and his wife, Jill, who is co-owner of Golden Aspen Rally, have been discussing combining the night with a chamber's business after hours, if it were possible.

He said they serve refreshments from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. and historically it has been the chamber staff that has done most of the work. The chamber would be there to meet with the people and make them feel welcome, he said.

"The concept of no charge is so anyone who wants can come down to find out we aren't heathens," Andrews said.

Bailey said they are obligated for business after hours, a monthly get-together, through November so wouldn't be able to do that. She agreed that in the past it has been the staff, but she and Crown strongly urged the directors to at-

tend since they had done such a great job at the art festival.

Bailey was not sure how much a trophy would cost the chamber, but Andrews said the ones they get from Mike Sargent only cost about \$45. Crown and Bailey will still need to look at the advertisement and letter to give final approval.

Also coming up in September chamber members will be having the annual banquet, which Crown said they hope to use as a fund-raiser to help fix the roof of the chamber building. They are looking at two dates, September 11 or 25, but the details will be finalized next month. A steering committee of Jim Basset, Clark Carpenter, Tom Rigsby, Frank Sayner and Ron McWilliams was approved to work with the chamber staff on these plans. Crown said anyone else who would like to help can also meet with the staff and committee.

Crown also welcomed Karen Kopp as the liaison member from the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County. He received approval as well to let Rigsby serve as a liaison member of MainStreet Ruidoso for the chamber and serve MainStreet as a liaison member of the chamber. Rigsby already serves on both boards.

Director Lara Johnson also asked board members for assistance in her upcoming All American Festival fiddle contest on August 29. She handed around a sign-up sheet for people to help with registering contestants, admissions and concession stands. She said it should be a fun time for the people who volunteer.

In the executive director's report Bailey said they have gotten nine new members and 55 businesses

have renewed their memberships. The renewals were representative of what Muhn had said earlier about the amount of money that would be coming in from billings for dues in the month. She said it also indicates that people are seeing a positive change in the chamber.

Bailey said she has also met with State Representative John Underwood and they are both running into the same positive situations with him in Santa Fe and she in Ruidoso. She said it has little to do with what the two of them are doing, but that village of Ruidoso is doing well and is being recognized.

They talked about the monitored retrievable storage being proposed for the Mescalero Apache Reservation and about gambling. She said Underwood said he would like her to come to the legislative session in Santa Fe during January. She said she would be happy to do anything that would get the word out on Ruidoso.

Bailey said she also helped civic events center director Michelena give a tour of the center to state tourism department officials. The officials were amazed with it because they knew it was being built but didn't know the specifics of it. She said the officials said they would help Ruidoso get a hotel for the area.

"It is one thing to be supportive, but another to say you well help with a specific project," Bailey said.

She told directors to expect a chamber news letter Thursday or Friday. The news letter is the one thing she is most proud of but that she has had the least to do with as the office manager puts it together, she said. Any suggestions, though, from directors would also be welcome.

fort factor and if they can do that, we'll go with the exchange. I said, 'tell me what you can do.'

Cone told **The Ruidoso News** Friday that there are no 100 percent guarantees in the mechanism of federal government.

"I can't do that with any process that has so many variables," Cone said. "He wanted a signed legally binding contract. I can't guarantee anything without knowing the specifics."

Spencer said one of the commission's concerns is that current permit holders on federal land be given the first option to buy adjacent BLM property when it is designated for disposal.

If they aren't able to purchase the land, the lease should be continued and the BLM should move on to another parcel, he said. "We don't want to put a rancher out of business," he said.

But Cone said while the Federal Land

Management Policy Document states the first option process may be considered, "It depends on whether a permit holder is the only adjacent land owner."

"I told him I could not make guarantees until the specific land is identified in the plan and we determine if there is more than one land adjacent owner on each parcel."

Green of the Lincoln Valley Land Company said Cone and other officials are bound by certain regulations and guidelines for disposal of land, the same as for acquisition.

"It looks to me like they are being asked (by the commission) to circumvent certain rules while being requested to stick to the letter of others," he said.

"Another problem I see is that drawing lines around Lincoln County (on swaps) makes problems for ranchers," Green said. "In the past, they've traded across county lines where local ranchers gained 10,000 to 15,000 acres around Corona and then property elsewhere went into public ownership."

"It works both ways."

In fact, Green insists in a second phase of his company's plan for land it owns in Lincoln, the intent is to trade about 20,000 acres of the Lincoln valley property for federal acreage within Lincoln County. That federal acreage then will be sold to local ranchers and come out of public ownership.

Green's major criticism of the commission's action on the Rio Bonito swap is that in his view the board effectively is taking his property by inverse condemnation, taking it without compensation by denying his right to swap it to the BLM.

"We are a private property owner in Lincoln County and we have rights," he said. "They say there can't be subdivisions in Lincoln valley, that we can't sell our water rights and that we can't convey the land to the BLM or any environmental group. I don't know why the county doesn't buy it."

"Other land owners should be concerned. If they can control my property rights, someday it may be theirs."

Commenting on the swap, Green said, "We felt it was a win, win situation. The county gives up 1,100 acres of private land to put 36,000 back into private hands."

"An area with historic and cultural value will be protected. I think some land, such as parks, forests and historic places, should be owned by the government."

Under BLM management, additional tourism dollars also should be generated from fishing and camping activities "to more than offset any loss in taxes," Green said. In addition, the county could sell for about \$6,000, the annual use of one acre of water rights it would acquire in the deal.

PUT ON HOLD

While in Washington D.C. a few days after his conversation with Allen and Cone, Spencer took his concerns about the stance of state and district BLM to federal director Cy Jamison.

"After listening to what I had to say, Mr. Jamison decided it would be best to put the

swap on hold until the management plan is in place," Spencer said. "He felt that there were too many flies in the ointment."

Spencer said he gets irritated when BLM officials contend that annual federal payments in lieu of taxes (PILT) offset the loss to the county's private property tax roll.

"No way does the PILT take care of it," he said. "When it's private we can tax the activity that occurs on land. If we ever levy a special mill on property to fund services, we couldn't on any federally-owned land."

Rudy Pacheco, a Taos representative on the National Federal Lands Advisory Board for the BLM has requested an October meeting in Farmington to discuss the exchange policy's effect on local governments.

"He has asked me to give testimony and I intend to be there," Spencer said. "The bottom line is that they messed up by going to everyone but the county government when they started this thing."

Ruidoso Downs puts off village hall move

Ruidoso Downs employees will have to hang on a couple more weeks in the current village hall before they can move out from under leaky ceilings and high utility bills.

The Downs board of trustees approved a contract in May to lease a modular building for a village hall because of the bills, but the building is not expected to arrive until later this week. At the meeting trustees figured the average cost per month for electricity is about \$2,000 in the current village hall, which is the old Redmens Club. Gas bills totaled almost \$60 per month, too. The expected cost for electric bills in the modular is about \$400.

Recent heavy rains have brought on a new problem for the village hall. Workers have had to cover desks and equipment with plastic in some areas so these things won't

get wet, and it has also begun to break ceiling tiles.

The leased modular building will be placed, facing east and west, by the Downs senior citizens center. It will take about two weeks to move the offices to the new location. The police department will also use half of the leased building. Moving out of the current building has been a high priority since Mayor Joe Hayhurst took that position in March. The group will now begin work on a plan to build a new village hall on a site along Highway 70 where city offices were once located.

Trustees plan to have one more meeting in the current village hall on August 10 and will then have them at the Ruidoso Downs fire station because the new village hall won't be ready yet.

Schwarzkopf's bark saved fallen man's life

The barking of a Schnauzer named Schwarzkopf may have saved the life of his owner after he fell 40 feet from Bonito Reservoir Dam Saturday.

Besides assorted cuts and bruises, Edward Graves, 68, of Carrizozo, broke his pelvis bone, femur, hip and wrist, according to his wife, Laura Graves.

He was secured on a backboard and lifted out of the area where he fell by members of the Bonito-Rescue Unit. He was admitted to Lincoln County Medical Center and was doing

well Sunday evening.

"From what I understand, he was going over to catch some crayfish," said Jerry Graves, the injured man's uncle. Bonito Lake is a popular fishing spot for campers in the Lincoln National Forest and other nearby recreational areas.

"He had his little dog with him. They went across and down some steps on the other side. He tied the dog up, turned around on the lip where the water overflows when the dam is full, started to step back and there was nothing there.

"He went down 40 feet."

Mrs. Graves said her husband landed in

about two-inches of water in a rocky area.

"He tried to crawl out, but couldn't move," she said.

"Someone on the highway heard the dog barking and went to where he was. One person stayed and the other went for help."

That was about 1:30 p.m.

"If the dog hadn't barked and raise a commotion, he might still be down there," Graves' uncle said.

Speaking from his hospital room, Graves said he has owned the miniature Schnauzer two years. From now on, whenever his little companion decides to bark, even if it's early in the morning, it's all right with him.

Mountain World Grows Greener Still In Year of the Rain

This is being sent to you in mid-morning of July 30 and will reach you on the third of August, which year in and year out, is the rainiest month of the year, although some of our heaviest rains have arrived in October, June and December.

This has been the longest rainy season I can remember here in the Vale, and the mountain world is turning greener and more flowery day by day.

This year the rains began in May, usually the driest month of the 12. And our weather man, Bill Hostetter says that this was the wettest May in Lincoln County on record.


Then in June, usually a very dry month here at Storm's Crossing, heavy rains came in, causing Mother Earth to rejoice.

Today the sky is blue over a shining green world with the American flag floating in a breeze out of the northwest while the weather spirits are catching their breath after several days of sunshine and thunder showers.

Now to the southwest over Storm Mountain appear the snow white thunder clouds with their billowy white tops clearly outlined as they rise in the blue sky, like columns, towers, and pillars — sky-bourn monuments to the green and golden year.

The mountain meadows are Mother Nature's fields of waving grain. The small fields — hardly visible in most years — on top of the high cliffs and ridges along the mountain sides, are shining in velvet green.

Grass stems usually two feet in height are now six feet tall; and the Rocky Mountain



Gilia or Scarlet trumpet — a favorite among western flowers — are blooming on stems five feet high. The Indian Paint Brush flashes its vermilion color in solid beds along the hill sides and banks along the way. And all the mountain flowers have a special beauty added to their colors.

In keeping with the golden year of the rains, the colors of the song birds are brighter: The Mexican Jay and the Piñon Jay are wearing their best blue coats; and the orange of Grossbeak, the red of the Robin's breast and the crimson of the House Finch — all are brighter and more pure in their colors.

Going back to the first pageant in 1940, this year's Last Escape of Billy the Kid will be number 44.

The Lincoln Days was discontinued during World War II and revived in 1949. From that date it has continued to this year.

This year's Billy the Kid is Thomas Shrecengost. He is Kid number seven, the others being Peter Hurd, John Davis, John Thomas, Tom Taylor, Earl Taylor and Billy Shrecengost.

The first pageant was held with the streets of Lincoln as the stage. In that time there were stage coaches, ox carts, and covered wagons in the show.

Christobal Zamora Jr., native of Lincoln and member of the prominent pioneer family, is the only member of the original pageant to play in this year's show. He plays the part of Sheriff William Brady, and also the priest in the opening procession.

The voice of Billy the Kid is played by Casey Ward, Dave Parks is narrator of the show, and has done a great job for many years.

Other voices in the pageant are Betty Shrecengost, John Amastae, Ralph Dunlap, and Marilyn and Wayne Ward.

Joe Salazar and his daughter, Lacy, will sing, to the accompaniment of the guitar. Rosalie Dunlap is in charge of lights.

Laura Amastae will perform a special dance. Diane Shrecengost is the director.

The horsemen and their horses are a great feature of the show through the years. The children add a great charm to the show, and many grown ups in the pageant began years ago as children.

The Clouds Move In
And now on this next to the last day in July, the Patriotic month welcomes in the rainiest month of August. And all to the west a great pageant of clouds stretches all across the western mountain horizon, ready to move in with their showers to keep the mountain world green.

Otero Co-op members oust 3 board incumbents during annual meeting

Changes in rates and representation dominated activities at the 53rd annual meeting of the Otero County Electric cooperative (OCEC) Saturday in Cloudcroft.

Vocal members of the nearly 900-person crowd first debated the demand meter issue then decided four positions on the 10-person board of trustees.

A petition to recall the entire board closed the agenda.

Demand to remove demand meters

The issue of demand meters, long the bane of many, primarily Alto, residents, resurfaced as the board attempted to justify its need for rate adjustments.

"We were hit with a 46 percent increase in hydro-power costs from Plains Electric," explained T.L. Watts, president of the board.

Plains Electric G&T Cooperative supplies electricity to rural electric cooperatives in several states and to the 13 New Mexico co-ops including OCEC. OCEC in turn electrifies portions of three counties: Otero, Lincoln and Chaves.

"We serve rural Lincoln County plus the municipalities of Capitan

and Carrizozo," said Bill Stephenson, trustee from Carrizozo.

Causing further budgetary crisis was OCEC's portion of a \$60 million environmental study ordered by Western Power Association. "This works out to \$10,000 per month for us," said Watts.

He felt environmentalists further increased rates by holding up construction of utility lines.

"We've been working on replacing this one line for 12 years and we'll probably be working on it for 12 more."

He stressed that the state's rural power companies were not anti-environmental, citing the recent construction of a power plant in northern New Mexico that cost \$100 million for air controls.

"It's one of the cleanest plants in the U.S. It will not have to be upgraded like eastern coal-fired plants."

Next, Jack Moss's audit summary caused the first of many questions from the rate-conscious audience. Dr. A.N. Spencer of Alto asked where \$1.82 million was invested. Moss told him to consult the full audit available at OCEC offices.

Another member questioned the

OCEC paying for board members' hospitalization insurance. The non-salaried board receives compensation only for mileage to meetings, Moss replied. When pressed further, Moss replied, "It's common practice."

Compared to other co-ops in the state, OCEC's rates lie in the upper third.

OCEC manager William Mershon said those co-ops with lower rates have more business customers.

"Our last rate adjustment was in 1982," Mershon continued. "The biggest expense in 10 years has been the cost of wholesale power. It's 60 percent of our operating dollar in 1991, but was only 52 percent in 1982."

"This must be passed on to the consumer. Our taxes doubled also, from one percent in '82 to two percent in '91. Note that we did reduce our operating expenses by four percent. We held flat expenses we had control over. We changed carriers for both workmen's comp and group health and save 25 percent on one and 38 percent on the other."

Peak use equals peak rates

Using graphs, Mershon showed the load profile of a typical electric day.

"The biggest is from sundown to 9 p.m. Demand decreases rapidly until 6 a.m. when it rises to a secondary peak until 9 a.m. then drops until sundown. The co-op has to pay demand rates to Plains and that cost is borne by the consumer."

In the '80s, homeowners with large electric demands had their regular meters replaced with demand meters. This meter records the highest usage lasting at least 15 minutes during the month. The customer pays according to that amount.

Those members now have an option, said Mershon.

He said Otero County Co-op, Public Service Commission and a group of interveners reached a stipulated agreement that satisfies all parties.

"Large consumption users may choose either a demand surcharge or a time of use (TOU) rate," said Mershon.

"Under time of use rates, the customer pays 6.5 cents per kilowatt hour (KWH) used from midnight to 7 a.m. From 7 to 9 a.m. he pays 23 cents per KWH (18 cents in the summer); from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., 10 cents per KWH; from 5 to 9 p.m., 23 cents KWH (18 cents in the summer); and from 9 p.m. to midnight, 6.5 cents.

"Customers choosing this option will also see their monthly base rate increase from \$10 to \$15.50 to cover the meter change.

"By shifting 1.3 megawatts of

demand to 'off-peak' hours, the co-op saves \$250,000 annually. The consumer saves, too."

OCEC will mail this information to all members and give them a trial period.

Lower rates further

These options will apply only to larger residential users, those who use more than 1,000 KWH per month. This is only eight percent of the entire OCEC membership, said Mershon. Consumers of less than 1,000 KWH will still use a regular meter.

1,000 KWH users therefore have another option, to lower their use. Mershon cited several ways to do this.

"The simplest way is to manually control appliances. Turn off the water heater at night, for example. Or don't run the clothes dryer at the same time you're cooking dinner on an electric stove.

"You can also purchase regulators which will automatically shut off one appliance such as a heater when another such as a clothes dryer comes on. There are electric thermal storage heaters that are ceramic and highly insulated. These run only at night (to produce heat and store it) when rates are lowest but operate the fan during the day."

Alto resident Lee Monroe said she easily cut her electric bill from \$150 a week to \$45-\$50 a month by using an appliance regulator and by converting from all-electric to propane for water and home heating. Another Alto resident, Lillian Puckett, said she, too, cut her electric bill dramatically without sacrificing her quality of life.

Election results

In the four trustee elections, the position sought by incumbent Fred Hansen and challenger Glen Crane saw Hansen retain his seat by virtue of a tie vote.

Attorney Wendell Lane announced that both Alto men had received the same number of votes.

"According to the by-laws, a candidate must win by a majority. When there is no majority, the incumbent (Hansen) retains his seat until a successor is chosen. This may be done at either a special meeting or at the next annual meeting."

A special meeting may be called by the president of the board, by three board members or by petition numbering 10 percent of the membership. That meeting must generate a quorum which is three percent. Currently OCEC numbers 8,875 members.

Neither Hansen nor Crane were available for comment at press time.

Other winners Saturday included challengers Eric Heckman, Gary Wood and Ed Haselhoff over incumbents G.B. Oliver, Charles Mulcock and James Rogers and challenger Rick Vanderwart.

Recall petition

Attorney Lane briefly touched on the last item on the agenda, a petition calling for the recall and replacement of all board trustees.

Lane said there were not enough valid signatures for the petition to be considered. A valid signature must be legible and be that of the member.

Not everyone in a household is considered a member.

"Each meter is entitled to one vote, or in this case, one signature,"

explained a board member later.

Lane continued, "Because a substantial number signed the petition, the board will consider their concerns and has appointed a five-person committee for this. Lincoln County members are Bill Hughes of Alto, Neva Garrison of Carrizozo, and John Cooper of Hondo."

Originator of the petition, Nancy Ashcraft of Carrizozo, was unavailable for comment.

On a lighter note

Not all the meeting was business. Members heard of OCEC's Herculean efforts during the Christmas power outage and met 12 scholarship winners, including Mary McDaniel of Capitan.

Members also took home dozens of door prizes and ate a barbecue lunch.

Ringo is this week's star at the animal shelter

If you're looking for a buddy to curl up with on the couch at night or to take on long walks in the cool evening, the Lincoln County Humane Society has just the right answer.

Three lap-size dogs are temporary residents of the society's shelter and are ready for new homes.

Ringo is a Pomeranian mix who weighs about eight pounds and is tan with white paws.

He was picked up about three weeks ago in the Capitan area with tags dating from 1990 to 1992. But efforts to trace the owners in Victorville, California have failed.

"He's real personable and responds to his name," said shelter manager Randy Basch. "He's good

with kids, cats and other dogs."

Ringo needs to be neutered, as do two other pint-size male charmers named Moogie and Cranky by shelter workers.

Moogie is solid red in color and like his companion, Cranky, appears to be predominantly a long hair chihuahua, Basch said.

Moogie seems to get along well with everyone and everything.

"Both are about five to six years old," Basch said. "But the lifespan of a chihuahua is 17-18 years, so they're far from old."

The two dogs get along well together and probably would be good to adopt as a pair, he said.

But if they go to separate new homes, Cranky, who is black and cream with distinctive eyebrows, would be better suited for a couple without children.

The shelter also has many medium and large-size dogs, hounds,

huskies and some strikingly attractive white and brown spaniels, a young, but calm Irish setter, as well as a tan cocker spaniel.

Carmela, a papillon mix with one blue and one green eye, is the perfect choice for a woman. Medium-size and slender, she's easy to walk, housebroken and absolutely elegant on the end of a leash.

Sugar, a terrier-Australian shepherd mix, would be a great pet for a family with children. She is inquisitive and loves to explore. She would be a tenacious defender and a great friend.

Adoptions have been down the last few months, but the number of animals discarded by their owners is way up.

Late last month, the figures

caught up and overflowed the shelter space. More than 50 animals were destroyed in one day. Several were past featured pets including Misty the greyhound, Maggie the intelligent catahoula, Flecks the blue heeler, Mittens, with the fancy gray paws and Spice, who so valiantly protected his little friend Sugar.


Whether it's the sluggish economy that's prompting some people to put pets at the bottom on their list of priorities, no one can say for sure.

But the effect is devastating on shelter workers, as well as in the loss of each of those special lives.



Homeless animals could use a little help from their friends

People with room in their hearts are welcome to visit the Lincoln County Humane Society shelter on Gavilan Canyon Road and bring new hope and love into a dog or cat's life by giving them a home.

Those who can't adopt, but would like to share some of the affection the animals are so ready to give, may help by becoming foster homes for puppies or by walking and playing with the abandoned animals at the shelter.

During the period of time for protective shots take effect, foster families keep litters of puppies dumped at the shelter by uncaring and irresponsible owners. After two weeks, the pups are returned to the shelter and offered for adoption with a much better chance of survival.

Without foster homes and the shots, puppies are likely to die of distemper or Parvo in the shelter.

Another option for those who want to make a positive impact on the effort to save animals in Lincoln County is to donate to the shelter's operation.

The money can be a general gift or be earmarked for spaying or neutering an animal, or for food to feed puppies in foster care homes.

Spaying and neutering greatly enhances an animal's chances for adoption, since it is the major cost connected to leaving the shelter.

All animals adopted must be altered as part of the society's campaign to stop the needless killing of abandoned animals, some 14-

million annually nationwide. Killing animals is not a humane solution to a problem caused by negligent pet owners who allow their unaltered animals to run loose and reproduce litters that later are discarded at the shelter, Basch said.

The Village of Ruidoso has backed up that position by passing a mandatory spaying and neutering ordinance.

Visitors getting ready to leave at season's end and year-round residents cleaning house for winter should haul usable items to The Ruidoso News, which will run its annual garage sale August 28 to benefit the shelter's spay and neuter fund.

Ruidoso Care Center seeks a new administrator for facility

A new administrator for the Ruidoso Care Center should be named within the next two weeks, according to Horizon Health Care officials.

The past administrator, Patrick Taylor, resigned July 21, but Kay Rogers, southern district director for Horizon Health Care which operates the care center, has been acting as interim director since that time. Taylor had been at the care center since April and declined to comment on his reasons for resigning.

Bill Mitchell, vice president of operations for Horizon, said they should have someone named within the next 14 days. He said besides Rogers, who is based out of Roswell, he is also on call for any emergencies that might come up at the center.

Both are also trying to identify viable candidates for the position of administrator here. Mitchell said they have a number of candidates, some of whom are within the corporation and some who are not. If


they select someone from within Horizon, it will be a matter of a transfer instead of hiring someone, he said.

In going through the process of hiring an administrator, Mitchell said they are first looking for someone licensed by the state or who is able to obtain a license here. They will also be looking for someone who has had experience in long-term care. If they promote from within they look for a candidate who has progressed well in the training program which takes about eight months to complete. Mitchell said the program makes the candidate more familiar with the policies and procedures of Horizon.

Candidates are then interviewed by both Mitchell and Rogers.

"We are working hard" to get someone in the position, but we want it to be someone good," Mitchell said.

Don't send cards. This boy's OK is the advice of Ruidoso village attorney David Thomsen.

Thomsen, on a public service mission, notified The Ruidoso News last week that the Craig Shergold story has surfaced again.

This type of story has been bouncing around long enough to collect 33-million cards and a Guinness Book of World Records listing for young Shergold.

The boy, according to legend, was dying of a malignant brain tumor and his alleged dying wish was to receive enough get-well cards to make the record book.

According to the story, they received letters from all over the world including cards from world leaders or at least from offices of world leaders.

The family was thrilled with all the cards, receiving several thousand every day, filling the house and then the garage. Finally, they

had no place to put them.

In spite of efforts to stop the flood, the get-well cards continued to pour in according to the story.

Ann Landers, a columnist that gives advice, called Marian Shergold in London to get the story.

Landers was told that John Kluge, a lion-hearted Virginia billionaire, had arranged for Craig to have brain surgery performed in Charlottesville and brought over the entire Shergold family so they could give Craig moral support.

In the mean time, letters are still pouring in.

The letters requesting help from Craig that were faxed by Thomsen to The News were on letter head paper of the New Mexico Public Defender Department and the law firm of Bailey and Welborn out of Socorro.

The public defender's office sent the request to help Shergold to all

legal agencies in New Mexico.

So many letters were received that even the sponsoring group, Children's Make A Wish Foundation, wasn't rich enough to make a mailing list out of them.

The story goes that an operation was made and the malignant brain tumor was removed. The boy named Craig, about 10 years ago the boy was named David, is now happy and healthy.

A recent Ann Landers column noted that if you receive any pesky chain letters in the mail, particularly any regarding Craig Shergold, "tear them into little pieces and feed them to the fish."

Landers said apparently hobbyists think they have found another "cause" and, therefore, the renewed interest in "help this boy."

There seems to be little doubt that little David or little Craig or whomever will surface again in a few years.

It's time to evaluate Solid Waste Authority

Garbage pickup in the Village of Ruidoso has basically gone to the dogs this summer. Dogs, cats and big birds are the only ones who could be pleased with the state of dumpsters and garbage pickup. Animals enjoy scavenging from the overflowing dumpsters.

If we had hired the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority as a company employee, it would be time for a 90-day evaluation. The Authority took over the garbage pickup for the villages of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs in April, and service has gone from bad to worse.

Sure, the Authority was sold a bill of goods by the Village of Ruidoso when it overpriced its equipment and sold government equipment basically back to itself for an inflated price. The village also passed on its employees to the Authority, with no questions asked. But, putting all that aside, why is it that the same people using the same equipment are doing a worse job under the new management than they did under the old management?

We were among the first to jump on the bandwagon, praising this new regional approach to garbage pickup. We may be among the first to admit that the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority is not working.

A typical employee evaluation form asks a number of questions. Employees are evaluated for accuracy, alertness, creativity, friendliness, personal appearance, physical fitness, attendance, housekeeping, dependability, drive, job knowledge, quantity of work, stability, friendliness, courtesy and the like.

We have to give the Authority and its employees high marks for courtesy and friendliness. But that's about it. Dumpsters are falling apart, they're surrounded by garbage, they look terrible, they smell bad and the Authority isn't responding to this emergency by looking for a creative solution.

The final line on our evaluation form gives choices from "definitely unsatisfactory" up to "outstanding." The Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority's performance is definitely unsatisfactory. When we check that "definitely unsatisfactory" we usually hand an employee his or her final paycheck as well, at the very least, issue a warning that includes a deadline for making progress.

It's time to issue a warning to the Authority. Could we see a new plan of action, maybe even some progress? Wouldn't it be nice to have the trash cleaned up around all our dumpsters? How about by Labor Day?


