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lage was earning \$20,000 a month on the service.

"We haven't gained any ground since January," he said. "I'm not saying you wasted it. But if (the authority) bank balance isn't going by \$10,000 a month, you've got a problem."

"We made some asset purchases," authority director Gene Green said.

Board treasurer Ron Andrews, a Ruidoso village councilor, said that he met with Green and designed a new report "we felt would be simple to understand" and shows a beginning and ending balance.

The report for July shows the authority retained earnings of \$38,173. Junge apologized for not noting the new report format and said he was handed the report at the beginning of the meeting and had not had a chance to study it.

"That's still not where we want to be (in terms of a report)," Andrews said. "We will break it up into operations of different departments too, but the authority's financial situation is improving, for the newspaper's information."

"We will have reports. Some departments won't make money and some will gain."

"It's extremely important the public knows what we're doing in an understandable way," board member Dave Dale said.

"You've got to know where you're bleeding," authority chairman and Captain Mayor Frank Warth said.

"That's right. A lot of people think we're bleeding and that's not the case," Dale added.

"I read with great concern the editorial in The Ruidoso News (critical of a perceived reduction in service and lack of progress since the authority took over Ruidoso garbage collection in April).

"This is a brand new organization and it needs help, not diatribes. However, some of the points in the editorial had merit."

He agreed that the authority's management has been "loose and needs to be tightened from the manager on down."

"This organization has a great amount of potential and must grow it," he said. Its aims are much greater than just garbage collection. They include establishing a regional landfill with Otero County and a successful recycling system, he said.

He attributed some of the negative rumors to employees. He stressed the need for positive public relations and volunteered to head a committee to that end. He recommended that other members of the board serve on committees formed by Warth to deal with specific problem areas.

Thirty days between regular board meetings is too long to keep a tight grasp on the situation, he said. The executive board, comprised of authority officers, also should meet more often. Dale recommended.

"We need some kind of positive statement on what we're doing...to counteract what I consider overblown negative publicity," Dale said. He will chair the public rela-

tions committee, which also will include recycling coordinator Kerry Krumsiek and Frank Cummins, a Ruidoso village councilor and authority member.

TRANSFER STATION

Junge next turned his attention to the condition of the transfer station on Gavilan Canyon Road across from the county Humane Society animal shelter.

He passed around photographs of a transfer station operation in Dallas and El Paso to show how clean and relatively inoffensive one can be if properly supervised.

"I checked (the Gavilan transfer station) this morning at 8:15 a.m.," Junge said. "I suggest members of the board go over and take a look, but take a cup so you can throw up. It's been getting worse the last couple of weeks."

Part of the problem is the lack of control over employees, Junge said.

The authority agreed to take Ruidoso's sanitation force without a probationary period or review of personnel records.

"Now, quite frankly, you're paying for it," Junge said. "Gene was placed in a bad position by insisting he take these people sight unseen."

Junge said he fears that the intricate hydraulic system of the transfer station is not being properly maintained and when it fails, it will be a big ticket item to repair.

"Do we have a maintenance system set up?" he asked, without response from Green.

"The other day I was out and there was a truck with the hood up. The engine was filthy. You couldn't even see it. That's our maintenance."

"You've got to improve the performance of the employees or replace them. Have the employees been rated? Has Mr. Green been rated? He's been here one year."

"He's expected to handle people, the office, finances and the operation."

Junge criticized Green for failing to retrieve personnel records from the village of Ruidoso to set up his own filing system at the authority headquarters.

Junge said the village lost several court cases because its personnel records were not kept current with performance evaluations.

"I talked to Gene four months ago and still there are no personnel records here," Junge said. "Unless there is stricter supervision, you're not going to get employees to perform. They need to comply or else."

Ruidoso village manager Ron Wicker, vice president of the authority, said, "I know this hasn't been the easiest transition with the employees."

"I talked with Gene on two occasions about some problems and what he might do. In the last week, I've seen improvement out on the street. It seems to me some of the concerns are being addressed."

He said the village can't release former employee records without getting each individual's signature approving the transfer of the records to their new employer, the authority.

"Fine, let's do what you said

then," Junge said. "It makes a person think there are problems we aren't seeing, that something is being hidden."

DUMPSTER DISASTER

Dumpsters were next on Junge's list.

He recalled that a year ago he reported the village had failed to live up to the term of its dumpster repair contract with a local welder by not cleaning out the units when they were delivered for repair.

That cut the number repaired each month from an expected 22 to less than seven, he said. When he pointed out that failure, instead of moving to correct the situation, the village changed to spot welding repairs. And when the authority took over, it continued on that course.

Junge warned that spot repairs will not allow the complete reconditioning needed to keep bottoms from rusting out and other major and very costly problems.

When lids are welded without chains, the welds break after several pickups by the compacting machine, which sends the lids swinging back abruptly, he said.

"That's stupid," Junge said. "We can't continue those spot repairs. We have a paint shed and a steam cleaning unit at the station. We can bring some in to repair completely and put others out."

He advised the board to ask the manufacturer to supply lids with slip bolts that will not break when lids swing open. He advised against plastic lids, which he said have a five-year lifetime and blow open in the wind.

Warth asked board members Cummins and Bill Elliott, a Lincoln County commissioner, to meet with Green to review the condition and repair of the dumpsters and to come back with some recommendations.

By the time Junge was finished, authority members had either adopted his recommendations or in-

formed him that they already were moving in the direction he indicated on his three of his four recommendations: initiating monthly operating reports, securing personnel records while beginning employee evaluations, discontinuing on the spot dumpster repairs and reestablishing the executive committee to oversee the performance of the authority.

COUNTY SERVICE

Green set October 1 as the start up date for mandatory county garbage collection. By December, he should have two months of collection history and should know whether collections are on track, he said.

"Whether the \$5.25 charge per household is adequate for the county," Junge restated.

"We'll go with quarterly reviews to see where we're at," Andrews said.

The county rate was set at the \$5.25 figure, because Commission chairman Stirling Spencer (an authority member) was emphatic it should be lower than others since the service will be less than in the municipalities, authority attorney J. Robert Beauvais said.

Wicker noted that the mandatory garbage collection ordinance gives the county commission power to set garbage collection rates in the unincorporated areas of the county.

"Setting rates is obviously going to be one of the most important things we do," Wicker said. "That's why there are representatives from each elected board on the authority board. A couple of municipalities have surcharges to protect."

Everyone agreed initially to leave their fees in place until the authority was up and running and for political reasons, but it was an open question down the line whether to make the fees uniform, Beauvais said.

Andrews said he doesn't see the provision as a problem.

Let's get creative about trash

Business owners on Sudderth who want to improve the appearance of Ruidoso's main street by removing unsightly dumpsters need to talk to Gene Green, director of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

"A request to relocate a dumpster really needs to come from the person and then the authority can take a look at other options," said authority member Ron Andrews, who also serves on the Ruidoso village council.

"We need to determine how we can get into a dumpster if it is moved," he said Monday during an authority meeting. "What works today may not work on January 16 when there's snow and the dumpster is frozen to the ground."

Andrews was responding to a photographic editorial in The Ruidoso News showing rusty and damaged dumpsters

glaringly situated along the main street of the resort community.

Green has said other options could be offered to businesses such as polycarts. That approach would require more manpower and more frequent collection, but could be arranged for a higher per month charge.

Andrews said the dumpster by his West Winds Lodge has been moved three times at his request.

"If dumpsters are placed in unsightly locations, it's no fault of this board," he said. "I think it could be worked out with the customers."

"If customers want customized service, they should contact us," said authority chairman Frank Warth.

Customers with complaints or those interested in alternate approaches to garbage collection along Sudderth should contain Green at 378-4697.

"The authority should have to justify to the individual elected boards any request for a rate increase," he said.

"All this says is that this board unilaterally can't adopt higher rates. This board will come up with recommendations and board members will take them to other elected officials. This doesn't make me nervous."

The joint powers agreement between the entities in the authority doesn't address rate setting, only billing and surcharges, Beauvais said.

Green said the authority needs to order 100-150 side-loading dumpsters.

"That's a big spread," Elliott said. "Could you be more specific?"

Green said he needs to get some dumpsters out in the county and watch their use for a few months. He will service them with his existing crew and equipment by switching around schedules, running on Saturdays and afternoons.

He estimated he can provide service for \$15,750 a month in projected revenue.

He will put together a map showing proposed new and existing locations of each dumpster and will add additional dumpsters at many currently used sites.

Referring to previous comments by Len Stokes, consultant to Southwest Disposal, that a private collector could do the job in the county for less than the authority, members said they want to see numbers.

"He's not offering the same service as the authority," Green said.

"The money the authority receives also goes to recycling," Andrews said. "That's something a private contractor is not going to do, and it will go toward opening a landfill. There are services going to be provided, long term services. If we can do small portion (through a private contractor) for less, fine. Contract with him and we can make more money."

"I think we can do it better and we need a year to see," Wicker said. "I agree," said Dale. "It's up to a private contractor to prove they can do it, not for us to invite them."

Beauvais pointed out that there are provisions for Green to contract with vendors. But Southwest isn't interested in handling billing, or to pick up things like mattresses, sofas and dead animals.

"As we used to say in college, he wants the cream of the crap and to leave the rest for us," Beauvais said.

"If he says he can do it, bring in a proposal. Put up or shut up," Warth said.

Beauvais said the villages of Corona and Carrizozo are about half way into a five-year contract with Southwest and will join the countywide service under the authority later. The county has a month-to-month agreement and will notify Southwest of the ending date.

In other action, authority members:

—heard that Warth met with officials of the newly formed Otero County Solid Waste Authority.

"The city of Alamogordo is gung ho on this thing," Warth said.

"We've got some work to do on how we are going to form together on this thing (with Otero). I'm confident we will have an Otero-Lincoln regional landfill as a result. Where it will be and when I'm not sure."

Beauvais said Lincoln and Otero are moving much faster on their side than the Southeastern Economic Development District on a study it is performing to locate potential landfill sites east and west of the mountain range.

Some agreement needs to be reached with Otero on any costs incurred. "I think it's incumbent on this body to nail it down real quick," Beauvais said. "I think they are moving a little fast without preliminary work."

"They're going solo on the initial costs to try to remove some of the pressure associated with the 1994 closing deadline on the Dog Canyon landfill," Warth said of Otero.

"But if they make a decision that is not that well thought out, it may waste time and money," Beauvais said. "I just got concerned about that."

He reminded members that when the authority signed on with the Southeastern grant, there was a specific agreement to locate a landfill site on the Lincoln County side of the mountain.

"That study has bogged down, yet they're talking about starting to punch test holes. If we wait for the study, it will be this time next year before it comes out. There was money in the grant (for a west side site). We need to recover as much of that as possible," Beauvais said.

News that some land administered by the Bureau of Land Management could be purchased for \$2.50 an acre has officials excited about moving ahead. They already know generally where a landfill could be located, he said.

—heard Krumsiek's report on activity in the recycling department.

Unlike heavily populated areas on the East coast and West coast, markets in the Southwest are stable, he said.

"With the large populations on the coasts, each program has a huge impact on the market, but here with a lower population, it's more stable," he said.

The addition of the recycling igloos around town may cause the volume of materials generated to double eventually, he said.

Krumsiek is developing a different technique for handling the igloos to allow them to be unloaded on site by using industrial bulk bags. The bags are reusable.

The county's school systems also are scheduled to become involved in the recycling effort this year, he said. When children become involved, so do their parents.

Wicker asked Krumsiek to break down the "avoided" costs of the county by recycling some of its garbage.

"I know we're not in this to make money," Wicker said. "The real issue is to reduce the amount of garbage to the landfill. But I'd like to figure the cost in time and effort for hauling cardboard to El Paso compared to taking it to Roswell (landfill)."

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siting? Even with the Tribal constitution that we have, much of our federal civil rights are being violated. The document, as it is now, give to the power to the president (Wendell Chino) and the Tribal Council and it negates a lot of the rights of individual tribal members themselves," Laws said.

"If they did vote and act in concert together, it would still be taken out of their hands by the majority and given to a small group of people. This is what frightens us," she said.

Apparently, Udall did not understand what Laws just said. He informed the audience that some of Laws concerns and answers "are going to be resolved at the tribal level."

Udall said if Chino and Tribal Council heard a presentation by the state, including his office that has experience in this area, that they would see they are headed down a "treacherous" course.

He said a temporary facility may become a permanent facility.

"There is a real danger that any temporary site immediately be-

comes a permanent site," he said. "As a permanent matter, enforceability is one of the greatest problems."

"We're going to try to answer all your questions." But he said he couldn't give away any strategy.

He said the state would sue if citizens are required to face unreasonable risk or suffer unfair financial hardship.

Udall was asked if water rights could be condemned.

He said the section of law quoted in the meeting was for a repository and not an MRS.

He said the water rights acquired for an MRS are quite undefined. Complex situations could cause greater water rights to be required.

On accountability of the Tribal Council for the \$300,000 received from the Department of Energy, Udall said there would be audits.

"There's no doubt that you can demand it (accountability), and I think you should keep demanding it. We're going to keep demanding it," he said.

"I'm sure there will be some kind of independent audit. I don't know how public that it will be."

"It has to be made public, it has

to be made public," someone called from the audience. But his demand was ignored.

Ruidoso Village Councilor Ron Andrews asked about alternate plans.

Udall said the least risk is to leave the spent nuclear fuel rods at the power plant where they are used.

Andrews charged the government blackmails the states.

"They did it with the speed laws. Yes, you don't have to pass a 55 miles per hour speed limit, however you will get no more highway money," he said.

Andrews asked what could prevent Congress from blackmailing a state to ensure nuclear waste could cross through the state to the reservation.

Udall said states have rights outside the federal government. He said a dormant 10th Amendment says you can't force certain things on a state. He said a recent United States Supreme Court ruling declared that the federal government just can't turn over its responsibilities in certain areas, for example nuclear waste.

Councilor J.D. James read a reply to the council from Mescalero

President Wendell Chino written months ago.

"We recognize anything nuclear in New Mexico is bound to be controversial. To us that means being open with our neighbors right from the start. We intend to approach this step by step and to inform people about it each step along the way. That includes first and foremost, our tribal members, our neighbors, interested communities and public officials."

James said as a public official he has never been informed, other than hearsay.

"I'm getting tired of being hoodwinked," James said. "The only information we ever get is from our own advisory board. If we didn't get that report from our own committee, we wouldn't know anything. This is what I resent."

Udall said his responsibility was to have his staff work with the village's committee.

"Your concern is ours, and we're going to try to help you any way we can," Udall said.

He said that Idaho stopped nuclear waste through negotiations and lawsuits.

"That's one of our options and

we're looking at that," Udall said.

Sue Randle asked if Wendell Chino answers to anyone.

"I think he is elected by his tribe," Udall said.

He said he was offering to Chino the expertise of New Mexico so that he may learn more about nuclear waste.

Randle asked Udall if he had any control over Chino.

"No," Udall said.

Randle asked if anyone had control over Chino.

"It depends on what context," Udall said. "For instance, there are tribal elections. The Bureau of Indian Affairs has some authority there. You're asking an enormously broad question, 'any authority.'"

He said a lot depends on the site. He didn't know, because the site hasn't been chosen.

Andrews asked if Lincoln County could depend on Udall's office and the governor's office for law suits to stop the MRS.

"We're in the process right now, and we have committed a significant amount of our resources," he said. "I've got my best guy on nuclear waste issues that we have been working on for the last 19

months. We're studying every angle. We've learned a lot here today. We're going to take that back and plug it in. And when the time is right, we're going to protect your safety interest here in Ruidoso and across the state of New Mexico."

Udall said he learned that Ruidoso has concerned vocal citizens, that he was told by a tribal member that if an election was held in Mescalero, the MRS would be defeated.

"That says a lot to me as to where we're headed," Udall said.

Wendell Chino is accountable to the people that elect him out there, and if the opposition is building on the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation, that makes a big difference to him. It may not make any difference right now, but it will down the line."

Udall encouraged the village's ad hoc committee to stay in touch and pass on information to share.

State Representative John Underwood (D-Ruidoso) said he was made a member of the Radioactive and Solid Waste Committee and will meet October 2 in Carlsbad with federal negotiator David Leroy.

Downs lodgers tax funds new C of C employee

Without a chamber of its own the Village of Ruidoso Downs has been at the mercy of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce to do its job of promoting the whole area.

Although that didn't always happen in the past, chamber executive director Joan Bailey told members of the Downs Lodgers Tax Advisory Board (LTAB) Monday night that things are changing. The board agreed with Bailey and will be recommending to the Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees that they back it up with \$5,800 for a part-time employee at the chamber.

"We care about Lincoln County which includes both Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs," Bailey said.

With an increased advertising program for the entire area, the chamber has also seen a tremendous increase in the number of people inquiring about the area, and it has become too much for the current chamber staff to handle. Bailey requested that the group fund a part-time person to deal strictly with these visitors at a cost of \$5,800 a year, which would include pay and taxes. The person would work 20 hours per week at \$5 per hour.

Bailey said the total number of inquiries through July of this year exceeded the total number of people they mailed information to all of last year. The consequence of these high numbers has been a problem in getting the information out immediately. She said the procedure has been to respond to the inquiry within 24 hours, but the chamber staff is having a hard time keeping up with the demand.

"It has become obvious that no matter how much we work it isn't enough. We can only do so much," Bailey said.

She told the group of several recent advertisements that showed the chamber is trying to promote the entire area. She said they have worked with Lara Johnson to help advertise this year's All American Festival.

"We did it for her and for us. If the All American is successful, we

are successful," Bailey said.

The chamber has also worked with the race track, Museum of the Horse and the Cowboy Symposium to get people to come to the area. They have also recently done two projects with the county. Bailey said they have gotten a visitors' booth in Santa Fe to put brochures in, and they have also placed an advertisement in Trailer Life, a special magazine for RV travelers. Both Carrizozo and Capitan have their own chamber of commerce offices, and the Ruidoso chamber works with them through the Apache Trails group.

Bailey said the chamber also tried to get a booth at the Albuquerque balloon festival, but they were too late for this year. She said they need to take advantage of the large number of people at attractions like this and at Carlsbad Caverns. The chamber doesn't have any brochures at the caverns, but they could; they just don't have the time or people to send someone down with any, she said.

Bailey said she is very pleased to have an advertising budget of \$234,000 to work with. The funds have come from the Ruidoso Lodgers Tax Advisory Board and matching funds from the state.

"We are very respectful of these dollars and try to max them out and not cover just one event," she said.

This area has also received free advertising from magazines such as Woman's Day and U.S.A. Weekend, which have had articles on the activities available here, Bailey said.

She said she has heard that a few businesses in Ruidoso Downs are interested in forming a chamber of commerce for the village, and if they decide to she will be there to support it and help in any way possible. If they decide not to form one, the Ruidoso chamber will continue to promote the whole area.

"Give us a chance to do our job, so you won't have to expend a large amount of money for what we are

already doing," Bailey said.

After the presentation, board chairman Mike Warren asked if the person would be used only for visitors and not for the chamber. Bailey confirmed that the person would be strictly for getting the visitors into town and assisting them when they get here. She said they already have one full-time and one part-time person in the visitors information division who are paid for through a contract with the village of Ruidoso.

Bailey said she did not expect the group to make a decision right away because it is a really big step. She said if the group could help fund the salary in anyway it would be appreciated.

"Help is help. This isn't an all or nothing proposition," she said.

In discussion of the request, Warren said he thought some of the requests before for advertising money had gone wayward because the board didn't know exactly which direction it was going. He agreed that a combined effort would be for the good of everyone.

"I think it is a win situation," Warren said.

Board members Camille Mansell and Shelly Barnes agreed that working together is a good idea, but they are going to have to sell the concept to the board of trustees. Barnes said since the chamber has been open on the weekends, it has helped her business. Bailey said she could also make a presentation to the village board if they wanted her to so she could be available to answer any questions trustees might have. Warren and Bailey will be on the agenda of the next board meeting, Monday night.

The tax board also approved a request of \$1,000 from Ron Andrews for the Golden Aspen Rally for advertising. Andrews, vice president of the organization and Ruidoso village councilor, said his organization has been doing the rally for six or seven years although the event itself is more than 20

years old. It has historically sought advertising funds from Ruidoso Lodgers Tax Advisory Board, but that group and the village council have recently set a limit of \$1,500 per event, he said.

Andrews said they had budgeted \$12,600 for advertising and had requested \$4,200 from Ruidoso, but only received the maximum of \$1,500. He said he also went before the Lincoln County Lodgers Tax Advisory Board and was awarded \$500.

The rally has historically benefited the entire area, Andrews said.

"Ruidoso doesn't handle all of the people," he said.

The merchants are also supportive of it because it is during a week that business is slow, he said. Andrews said his philosophy has been that to have a successful event, all a person has to do is have it during Labor Day weekend, but there are already enough people in town at that time. Some people have suggested they change it to Aspenfest weekend, but that would be of little benefit, he said.

Andrews said they have struggled to keep the event alive to give the area an activity during a slow week. The event made a profit of \$257 last year, but he said their economic projections from the event were that visitors here for the week of the rally spent \$327,000 for lodging and \$780,000 with downtown merchants. That totals about \$66,000 in tax benefit which more than pays for the \$4,200 that he requested for advertising funds, he said.

He also estimated that \$1.1 million was spent by motorcyclists in the five days, which means from \$3.3 to \$7.7 million in roll over.

He said in 1991, 1,784 people registered for the event and about 6,000 to 8,000 people went through the trade show, but it has the potential to see 15,000 to 20,000 visitors.

Andrews said he has budgeted

very tight for the event this year. If the group gets \$6,000 to \$8,000 in seed funds, it wouldn't have to beg from groups for money, he said. He said last year they got close to that point but this year he had to get a personal bank loan for seed money.

He said the group's advertisements are to attract family enthusiasts, but some of the less desirable people come along too. The event last year caused little problem for Ruidoso Downs, Andrews said.

Warren said the event does bring money into the community, and the lodging facilities are full at that time. Some of the cyclists are good and some are bad, he said. Mansell pointed out that it is the same way at the race track.

The village would see at least \$1,000 in lodgers tax from the event, Warren said before making a motion to recommend \$1,000 for the event to the village board to approve.

In other business, Warren said board member Karen Stevens is resigning, although she has not submitted a letter yet. Stevens had missed several meetings, including the one Monday night. The board will begin looking for someone to replace her before next month's meeting when they will have their election of officers.

The board is made up of one at-large member, two members from the lodging business and two members from the promotion or tourism business. These members were appointed by the former mayor of Ruidoso Downs last spring, and the village trustees have the authority to change any of the members.

Term lengths were also discussed because in the original ordinance that created the group does not state how long these should be.

Mansell said since they were appointed by the board the new mayor should also approve or disapprove of the members upon taking office. Village clerk Leann Weibrecht said the ordinance could be amended to read that way because the state statutes do not say how lengths should be determined.

State group meets here

Attorney General Tom Udall's office is softer on the anti-donation clause than the Hal Stratton administration admitted Marian Matthews, assistant attorney general.

Matthews was responding to a question by Representative Jerry W. Sandel (D), Co-Chairman of the Revenue Stabilization, Tax Policy, Telecommunications and Business Development Committee Tuesday for the second straight year at Ruidoso Village Hall.

Matthews also noted that the current administration has offered no formal major opinions on anti-donations.

"We have issued a number of advisory letters and have dealt with a lot of anti-donation issues," she said.

Matthews said a number of opinions were issued under the Stratton administration.

She said, although not a formal opinion, "we reversed him (Stratton) on the Workers Compensation program."

Matthews said there was a distinct difference between the two attorney generals and the approach to anti-donation issues.

Asked if she thought Udall's approach was "looser," she said, "As I indicated, we think of our major roles is to try to be problem solvers," Matthews said. "Our job is not just to tell government or the legislature that they can't do things. Our role is to help them figure out how to do things legally."

Matthews said the anti-donation clause is probably the most maligned and least understood provision of the New Mexico Constitution.

Matthews summarized the provision and noted two proposed amendments that failed.

The players have gone through some extensive four-hour practices, and they seem to be in pretty good condition, which might be why they are so aggressive. Gaston said if the kids are tired they might loaf around or not give all their effort, but these kids haven't been doing that.

Right now they have 28 players out for the team, but Gaston said he expects a few more to come out before they get too far into the season. He is pleased that all of the kids that came out for spring football exercises returned this fall, except for a few that moved out of town.

"We had a good carry-over and it

helps because they had a good idea of what was going on when they came back," Gaston said.

The Warriors will be counting on a few returning starters to anchor the team. The coach said eight kids will play both offense and defense throughout most of the game, while three others will alternate. When these starters come out though, the pressure will be on the second string.

"The younger players will have to produce when they are spelling those guys," he said.

Players that Gaston has his eyes on to pull the Warriors together are senior Bryan Streety, offensive line and noseguard; senior Jeff Cox, offensive and defensive line; senior Robert Murry, offensive line; junior Anthony Torres, running back and defensive back; senior Jaime Ordorica, free safety and wingback; senior Scott Stricklin, defensive back and linebacker; senior Mario Sanchez, linebacker; and junior Ricky DeVara, defensive back.

The Warriors will get a dry-run game at 7 p.m. Friday night in a scrimmage in Tucumcari.

"The main thing is what we will get to see them under pressure. They are all ready to be hitting someone else besides the scout team or a blocking dummy," he said.

Gaston is especially anxious to see how the starting quarterback, sophomore John Echols, will perform in a game situation. He said Echols has been doing great in practice, but the scrimmage will serve as a test to see how he reacts.

Coaches will also be playing the kids at different positions to see what their best position might be. Gaston said they also want to try to set the tempo of the scrimmage and teach the players to keep attacking.

The scrimmage will also serve as a warm-up for the coaches, since four of the seven varsity coaches have never coached together before. They will be working out the kinks of sending in the plays and communicating with the head-sets as well as the problems that come up on the field. The format of the scrimmage will be 15 plays with the first offense for both teams, 15 plays with the first defense for both teams, 10 plays for each with the second offense and defense and eight plays each at the goal line. They will then have a half time and then two quarters of regular play.

The Warriors will be at home for seven of the 11 games this season and hope to use the home field advantage. Gaston said it worked out that way because St. Pius of Albuquerque couldn't get a stadium to play in on a Friday night, so that

team will be coming here for the second year in a row on October 2. Every game on the schedule is important for the Warriors, he said.

"Just because they are non-district opponents doesn't matter. We have some tough non-district teams and some tough district teams. We wouldn't want it any other way. To be the best, you've got to play the best," Gaston said.

He is also positive about the 23 freshmen that are out this year.

"Our goal is to develop those kids and keep them out all four years. We just have to work with them right so we have big numbers when they are seniors," he said.

The team has adopted the theme song "Eye of the Tiger," because of the message not to give up. The kids are really excited about it and the band is learning to play it too, Gaston said, which draws the team and the band closer together.

"I couldn't be any prouder of these kids. A lot of them have really come through and proven themselves. We still have a lot of work to do, but we will get better on our techniques."


"These kids got after it from the first. They were not afraid from anybody. They are going to play with class. There won't be any hot dogging or grand standing. They will play hard and represent the school and city well," Gaston said.

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Happy Trails Pack for a safe and fun hike

Do you recognize the logo that accompanies this series? It's the international symbol for hikers. Two features distinguish a hiker from just another pedestrian. What are they?



One is the pack
If you've ever wondered why hikers carry a pack, you'll understand after your first trip. It seems obvious to state it, but you're in the wilderness, miles from a water fountain, closet or telephone. Whatever you need you'd better have.

Continuing their discussion from last week, veteran hikers Bob Palko, Barbara and George Goedecke agree: a little planning makes packing easy and your pack light.

Start with a small pack, called a daypack. Find these locally at ski shops, sporting goods stores or discount stores. The better ones are constructed of Cordura (TM) nylon, have compartments, padded shoulder straps and a waist adjustment. Look for secure closures, either Velcro (TM) or YKK (TM) zippers. Slide the zippers back and forth. The better ones work

smoother.

You don't need the biggest one in the store. Select the model that comfortably holds your gear — and fits comfortably on you.

And the packables

1. **WATER.** This is the single most important item you will carry. Figure two quarts for each adult. Even if you don't drink that much at home, you will on the trail. "At high altitude, you dehydrate quicker," reminds Bob.

To minimize weight, carry water in a plastic bottle instead of a glass one. Empty 16-ounce soft drink bottles are convenient and cheap.

DON'T plan on drinking water from a stream. Not all trails cross water, and if you do find it, there's no guarantee it's safe. According to

a recent article in "Ski Patrol Magazine," hikers are among those at greatest risk to contract giardiasis, an intestinal disease caused by a one-cell parasite commonly found in untreated water. Don't risk illness, carry your own water.

2. **SNACKS.** Barbara favors carrot and celery sticks ("lots of moisture") and a trail mix of nuts and dried fruits ("fast energy.") She does not recommend fatty snacks such as potato chips, or greasy luncheon-type meats.

"They sit in your stomach forever and slow you down."

Nor does she advocate carbonated drinks. "All that gas ..." Her voice trails off.

3. **OUTERWEAR.** Rain gear, a sweat shirt or jacket — essential in case of sudden summer showers.

4. **COMPASS AND TRAIL MAP.** "You must know where you are at all times," cautions Bob. (We'll cover map reading in a future article.)

5. **POCKET KNIFE.**

6. **WHISTLE.** If you become separated from your group, a lifeguard-type whistle carries louder than a voice. "Each child on a hike should WEAR a whistle and know when to use it," Bob emphasizes.

7. **TOILETRIES.** Band-Aids, alcohol swabs and toilet paper in a plastic bag. And don't forget sunscreen.

Handy, but not essential: lightweight binoculars, extra socks, field guide for flowers or birds.

Back to the logo

What's the second distinguishing feature carried by a hiker?

Right — a hiking staff, or alpenstock.

Use it for balance on side hills, steep trails and when crossing streams. It's handy to sweep away branches or rocks that block your path. Plus, you can lean on it when you get tired.

Any sturdy stick will do, as long as it won't break under pressure or splinter your ungloved hand. I'm especially proud of my alpenstock, a four-foot-long wooden staff with Oriental characters branded along one side. My hiking husband bought it when he climbed Mount Fuji, Japan. Each brand represents a station along the trail.

Now that you're well-equipped, you'll want your body to be prepared, too.

Indian clarifies her position

Mescalero activist Rufina Marie Laws, M.Ed., said the recent meeting held in opposition to the nuclear waste dump on the reservation was not sponsored by Tribal Concerns as noted in *The Ruidoso News* and by Wendell Chino, president of the Mescalero Apache Nation.

Laws said she sent Chino a letter informing him that she wants to clear her position on correspondence she sent to him and his response.

She thanked Chino for answering her invitation, but took issue at the return letter addressed to her and "Tribal Concerns."

"I am committed to the environment and my primary focus is on the issue relating to our environment," she wrote. "I am not a member of the Tribal Concerns group, or any political organization."

"I have taken a stand on the MRS issue as an individual who has taken the contra side of the issue, which is the same position taken by others who may or may not be members of the Tribal Concerns group."

"The environmental issue crosses political, geographical and racial boundaries. I trust you will respect and understand my decision," she wrote. Laws said she regretted that neither Chino nor the Tribal Council members attended the meeting.

Speedy Pullastreak takes on seven challengers Saturday

Pullastreak won last year's Gene Hensley Handicap by more than seven lengths. And while trainer Nene Simmons would like to see the gelding post such a convincing win again this year, it's okay if he doesn't. The fact that he's even in the race makes him a winner.

Pullastreak is one of eight horses going postward in Saturday's \$10,000-added Gene Hensley's Handicap for Quarter Horses and Thoroughbreds racing 870 yards.

Simmons said Pullastreak is "sitting on go" for the 870-yard handicap, but that was not the case last month. Pullastreak was on the verge of death less than a month ago having somehow contracted

colitis x, a digestive track dysfunction.

The 5-year-old gelding required intravenous transfusions to fend off severe dehydration, diarrhea, fever and an accelerated heart rate.

Simmons' husband, Arnold, who saddled Pullastreak to win last year's Gene Hensley Handicap, said he was surprised the horse survived much less rebound as he has.

"Colitis x is pretty toxic and most horses that have it as bad as Pullastreak die," Simmons said.

Following his colitis bout, Simmons considered entering Pullastreak in the Big Profit Allowance Stakes August 1, but opted against it. She thought it was too soon after

Pullastreak's illness to ask him to face such a tough field. Instead she entered him in a 1,000-yard allowance race the next day.

The strapping Quarter Horse announced his complete recovery when he won the race by more than a length.

"He's showing no ill effects of the colitis," Simmons said Tuesday. "He's gaining weight back and training great. We worked him an easy 660 yards Monday and he did super."

Last year Pullastreak three four-consecutive distance handicaps at Ruidoso Downs — the Southwest Speed Challenge, Gene Hensley, and Brigand handicaps. Earlier this year, he won the 870-yard Fine

Loom Handicap.

Owned by Mike Levi of Spice-wood, Texas, Pullastreak will break from the six post and have to contend with the likes of Hot Signature and Oh Bid Oh.

Just recently introduced to distance racing, Hot Signature has shown an affinity for 870 yard races. He won his first 870-yard race, the Master Salls Handicap last month, by more than a length. He came back and placed fifth in the 550-yard Big Profit Allowance after being squeezed back between horses at the start.

"He was knocked off stride so bad that he never could get it back together" Brooks said. "He was real

sluggish at the start anyway and that just made matters worse. He actually is better suited for longer races because he has time to make up for getting away slow."

Owned by Bud Hill of Dimmitt, Texas, Hot Signature is three for seven this year for earnings of \$21,700.

Oh Bid Oh is the richest horse in the field with earnings of \$312,600. Also trained by Brooks, Oh Bid Oh competed in the Big Profit Allowance, but finished sixth. He did, however, win the Remington Park Distance Handicap at Remington Park in Oklahoma City in June.

Entrants for the Gene Hensley Handicap, in order of post position

are: Oh Bid Oh, no rider named at time of entry; Easy Signature, Duane Sterling; Raise In Class, Eric Perner; Stamen, no rider named; Talkabout Rambler, Chris Zamora; Pullastreak, Glen Murphy; Straight Ticket, Flavio Martinez; and Hot Signature, no rider named.

Also featured on Saturday's 15-race card is a 5-1/2-furlong allowance race for fillies and mares and the simulcast of the \$1 million Travers Stakes from Saratoga in New York.

Expected to go postward in the co-featured 10th race are Not So Innocent, Bin Jer, First Spring, Jacindra, Sticky Creative and Wild S. First post is 1 p.m.

Nearly new trainer gains respect

Nene Simmons has been training less than a year, but she managed to hold her own against Ruidoso Downs' best trainers during the All American Futurity elimination trials last week. Nene qualified eight horses for the All American Futurity time trials Aug. 27. Nene's reign as a top trainer at Ruidoso Downs, however, is about to come to an end. When those eight horses start in the time trials her husband, Arnold, will be down as trainer. Just when she's beginning to get the recognition she deserves, Arnold steps in to get all the credit? Nene says putting the horses back in her husband's name was strictly a business decision.

"We want it to reflect in the record books that Arnold is trainer on any horses we qualify for the All American," she said Wednesday. "Arnold has always been the trainer in the family. We think it's important when we talk to owners about training their horses that we can say 'look at our records...our success.'" Nene took over as trainer this past spring while Arnold stayed at their Texas training center to break young horses. When Arnold returned to Ruidoso, they decided to keep the horses in Nene's name so she could retain her ranking in the trainers' standings. As of this week, Nene is ranked third in the standings with 17 wins from 138 starts and a win percentage of 12.3. "It makes no difference to me whose name the horses are under," Nene said. "Most everyone knows we are a husband and wife team, each equally responsible for our success, or failures. He has always been the wind beneath my wings, as I have been the wind under his." Arnold Simmons was down as trainer on Ronas Ryon when he won the All American Futurity in 1986. He was also down

as trainer when Floyd The Great won the Kansas Derby in 1939. "After Floyd De Great won the Kansas," Nene said, "Arnold dedicated the race to myself and all the other racetrack wives. He never says 'I'. He always says 'we'."

RACY INVESTMENTS Last week I mentioned that some of the All American Futurity contenders are worth \$100,000 or more. Who says Quarter Horse runners are not a good investment for the money? Mr Eye Opener was purchased for \$31,000 out of the Ruidoso Horse Sale Company's 1991 Yearling Sale. He's made five times more than his purchase price, \$130,000, and is probably worth five times his earnings as a stallion prospect. Flashing Streak was bred by his owner Jean Cagnina. The Cagninas paid only \$1,000 to breed their mare to Fast Lindy which produced Flashing Streak. Flashing Streak has already made more than \$116,000. Choculo is also a homebred and his sire's stud fee was only \$1,000 in 1990 and is now down to \$750. Choculo has won about \$83,000 and with a Grade I victory on his record, he also looks promising as a stallion prospect. First Down And Ten sold for \$40,000 out of the Ruidoso Yearling Sale and has paid his way with earnings of about \$34,000. On the high side, Dashing Mariah, which ran second in her elimina-

tion trial, sold as a yearling for \$80,000. She's only made about \$2,000, but then she's only raced three times. Her breeding alone, First Down Dash-Kellys Coffey/Allstar, makes her a "pricey" little broodmare prospect. On the low side,

SUPER MULE When a race horse runs bad or misbehaves, trainers, jockeys and owners are subject to refer to their horses as mules, among other things. O.C. Dillard is the only one at Ruidoso Downs, however, who can actually call his mount a true mule and say it lovingly. Each morning, Dillard escorts his race horses to and from the track while riding Amanda. Amanda is a 3-year-old bay mule with elongated head and ears to prove it. Amanda is one of five mules Dillard has used during his 35 years training race horses. "I like to use mules," Dillard said. "Mules have more sense than a horse. They're also more stout. You can tie a bad horse to the saddle horn and they're not going to jerk her (Amanda) down. She's also real gentle and smooth to ride. She's one super mule." Amanda may have a scrawny tail, obvious ears and a giddy-up gait, but she is as all business as her pony horse peers. Dillard currently has two horses in training, Dode 'N Glory and Chakoti, and both horses have bonded with Amanda. When I went by Dillard's barn Wednesday to talk to him about his mule, he and Amanda were out and about. But it wasn't long before both horses announced their return. Although Dillard and Amanda were more than half-a-block away, both horses picked their heads up, pricked their ears and watched intently as they returned. As they drew closer, Dode 'N Glory picked his head up even higher and nickered ever so quietly.

Two-year-old thoroughbreds go postward in futurity trials

Eighteen 2-year-old thoroughbreds are expected to go postward in Thursday's qualifying trials for the \$25,000-added Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity Aug. 29.

Heading the two-race lineup are Tellum Dear, Silver Cinders, and out-of-town invader Oyster Bay. The six-furlong trials are scheduled as Thursday's sixth and eighth races. The first six horses in each race advance to the futurity.

A recent arrival from California, Oyster Bay has raced only three times in his life, winning his second start, a \$40,000 maiden claiming race at Hollywood Park on May 20. Owner R.D. Hubbard of Ft. Worth thought enough of the chestnut gelding's ability to pay the \$6,000 supplement so Oyster Bay could start in the trials. Oyster Bay will compete in the eighth race.

Silver Cinders enters the race off a fifth-place finish in the July 19 Kachina Stakes. Trained by Fred Danley, Silver Cinders was impressive breaking her maiden by eight lengths in her first start at Sunland Park this past spring.

Since then, she has tallied a fifth, fourth and third place.

"If she hadn't gotten in trouble in the Kachina, she probably could have finished at least third," said Danley. She was making a move between horses at the head of the stretch and they closed the hole up on her. The jockey had to snatch her back and when he did it stopped her momentum.

Danley said he is very pleased with the way Silver Cinders is training and he "feels good about her chances."

Tellum Dear finished fourth in the Kachina, 1-1/4 lengths in front of Silver Cinders. Also trained by Don Farris, Tellum Dear also broke her maiden in her first race and finished fourth behind her stablemate Baby Let's Dance in the Norgor Futurity June 21. Silver Cinders and Tellum Dear will both compete in the sixth race.

First post Thursday is 1 p.m. Also on tap for Thursday are four simulcast races from Del Mar Thoroughbred Club in southern California.

More Than Glory sets track record

Last Don B.'s win streak came to an end in Sunday's Ruidoso Sprint Championship, but it took a new track record to do it.

Jack Wilson and Todd Fincher just barely won the six-furlong race by a nose over 6-5 favorite Last Don B and Flavio Martinez.

The duo duelled nose to nose

down the stretch in 1:08.4, breaking the old record of 1:09.2 set in 1986 by Flamed.

"He got through and we had to go around," Martinez said following the race. "Circling the field cost us the race, but it was one heck of a race."


Rebuilding Home and Office

Capitan school needs help to keep lights on at sports field

If the answer is no, Capitan school board members want to hear it from each and every village trustee, not just from the mayor.

Board member Ervin Aldaz plans to ask village officials at their next meeting to contribute toward the recreation of the community by paying the monthly lighting bills for a new baseball/soccer field.

Otero Electric already has offered to donate and install the lights for the field to be constructed on seven-acres of school-owned property on the north side of U.S. 380.

Last month, board members directed School Supt. David Lock to contact Capitan Mayor Frank Worth about the lighting bill.

"The mayor said there was no need for a meeting with village, that he supported the idea of recreation, but there was nothing the board could do with its financial and manpower limitations," Lock said.

"Can he just arbitrarily make that decision?" asked Aldaz. "Aren't there some other trustees involved? If it goes through the city (board of trustees) at least you'll know that's their opinion. The school is the backbone of this community."

"The trustees were voted in by the people and I think the majority of the people would like to see something done for the kids," board president Tom Trost said.

The field would be used by the entire community, not just school children, he said.

Aldaz suggested the village board look into grants for summer recreational programs. The grants often will pay a person's salary to coordinate events, he said.

Lock said Tom Guck of New Mexico State Forestry Division has volunteered his services and his staff to help maintain the field.

"That's got a lot of potential over

there for the community," Trost said.

In other business, the school board:

—stuck by a pledge at the last board meeting to schedule closed executive sessions after other items on the agenda have been handled.

Board member Preston Stone said he didn't think that procedure would always be possible if personnel items higher up on the agenda under new business required closed discussions.

"I understand people's feelings about long executive sessions, but if the occasion arises, we will have to call it (an executive session). You can't change the format just because someone doesn't like sitting there," Stone said. "We're sitting there, too."

Lock reiterated his previous suggestion that the sessions could be scheduled before regular items on the agenda by starting an hour earlier.

The board later scheduled a special executive session on personnel for 6:30 p.m. Thursday, August 20.

—congratulated members of the Capitan chapter of Future Homemakers of America for the gold medals they brought back from national competition in Chicago this summer. Aldaz said it's good for other students to see that coming from a small school doesn't mean they can't compete on a national level.

"These students weren't just good, they were excellent," he said. "The message is you can be in a small school and shine through in national competition."

—accepted the resignations of Mark Poyner, who has accepted a position with the Portales school system, and Nell Davis, only as assistant football coach, because she needs to cut back for health reasons.

—hired Betsy Eldridge as a third grade teacher and Becky Huey-Schultz as special education

teacher at the elementary level, replacing Mary Lee Daniel who resigned earlier in the summer.

—noted that to comply with the American Disabilities Act, job descriptions and applications, as well as long range architectural plans will have to be altered.

"There's lots of paperwork to be in compliance," Lock said.

"This goes much further than just structural (aspects)," Aldaz said.

"We have to consider access to structure and to programs so if parents are handicapped, they still can attend," Lock said. "The July 26 deadline is unrealistic. I was at a workshop in Roswell last week and none of the people had the information necessary to be in compliance at that time."

"Our architect did a walk through (the school complex) today with the act in mine and will report back to us."

—approved a policy on concurrent enrollment that will allow junior and senior level students to take college courses while enrolled in high school.

The board emphasized that the program is being adopted to allow students to take courses not offered at the high school, but not to substitute for existing courses; to take courses for remediation and to make up credits; and that students must provide their own transportation, tuition and other related costs.

The policy will leave it up to the majority of the board whether other extenuating circumstances warrant allowing a student to enter the program.

—selected high school principal Darrel Stierwalt as the voting representative of the district to the New Mexico Athletic Association. Usually a principal or athletic director is chosen. Aldaz said he preferred Stierwalt, "because it affects academics and the high school program and he personally has an athletic background."

Capitan

Capitan school needs help to keep lights on at sports field

If the answer is no, Capitan school board members want to hear it from each and every village trustee, not just from the mayor.

Board member Ervin Aldaz plans to ask village officials at their next meeting to contribute toward the recreation of the community by paying the monthly lighting bills for a new baseball/soccer field.

Otero Electric already has offered to donate and install the lights for the field to be constructed on seven-acres of school-owned property on the north side of U.S. 380.

Last month, board members directed School Supt. David Lock to contact Capitan Mayor Frank Warth about the lighting bill.

"The mayor said there was no need for a meeting with village, that he supported the idea of recreation, but there was nothing the board could do with its financial and manpower limitations," Lock said.

"Can he just arbitrarily make that decision?" asked Aldaz. "Aren't there some other trustees involved? If it goes through the city (board of trustees) at least you'll know that's their opinion. The school is the backbone of this community."

"The trustees were voted in by the people and I think the majority of the people would like to see something done for the kids," board president Tom Trost said.

The field would be used by the entire community, not just school children, he said.

Aldaz suggested the village board look into grants for summer recreational programs. The grants often will pay a person's salary to coordinate events, he said.

Lock said Tom Guck of New Mexico State Forestry Division has volunteered his services and his staff to help maintain the field.

"That's got a lot of potential over

there for the community," Trost said.

In other business, the school board:

—stuck by a pledge at the last board meeting to schedule closed executive sessions after other items on the agenda have been handled.

Board member Preston Stone said he didn't think that procedure would always be possible if personnel items higher up on the agenda under new business required closed discussions.

"I understand people's feelings about long executive sessions, but if the occasion arises, we will have to call it (an executive session). You can't change the format just because someone doesn't like sitting there," Stone said. "We're sitting there, too."

Lock reiterated his previous suggestion that the sessions could be scheduled before regular items on the agenda by starting an hour earlier.

The board later scheduled a special executive session on personnel for 6:30 p.m. Thursday, August 20.

—congratulated members of the Capitan chapter of Future Homemakers of America for the gold medals they brought back from national competition in Chicago this summer. Aldaz said it's good for other students to see that coming from a small school doesn't mean they can't compete on a national level.

"These students weren't just good, they were excellent," he said. "The message is you can be in a small school and shine through in national competition."

—accepted the resignations of Mark Poyner, who has accepted a position with the Portales school system, and Nell Davis, only as assistant football coach, because she needs to cut back for health reasons.

—hired Betsy Eldridge as a third grade teacher and Becky Huey-Schultz as special education

teacher at the elementary level, replacing Mary Lee Daniel who resigned earlier in the summer.

—noted that to comply with the American Disabilities Act, job descriptions and applications, as well as long range architectural plans will have to be altered.

"There's lots of paperwork to be in compliance," Lock said.

"This goes much further than just structural (aspects)," Aldaz said.

"We have to consider access to structure and to programs so if parents are handicapped, they still can attend," Lock said. "The July 26 deadline is unrealistic. I was at a workshop in Roswell last week and none of the people had the information necessary to be in compliance at that time."

"Our architect did a walk through (the school complex) today with the act in mine and will report back to us."

—approved a policy on concurrent enrollment that will allow junior and senior level students to take college courses while enrolled in high school.

The board emphasized that the program is being adopted to allow students to take courses not offered at the high school, but not to substitute for existing courses; to take courses for remediation and to make up credits; and that students must provide their own transportation, tuition and other related costs.

The policy will leave it up to the majority of the board whether other extenuating circumstances warrant allowing a student to enter the program.

—selected high school principal Darrel Stierwalt as the voting representative of the district to the New Mexico Athletic Association. Usually a principal or athletic director is chosen. Aldaz said he preferred Stierwalt, "because it affects academics and the high school program and he personally has an athletic background."

In the wild horse race, courageous bronc riders must stay on running, bucking horses while guiding them from one end of the arena across a line and back to the other end.

Team roping and doctoring requires two good ropers who can head and heel a yearling that has been cut out of a herd of cattle at one end of the arena. Once caught and thrown down, another cowboy "doctors" him by making a mark on his head with chalk.

Sounds like a great day for a tenderfoot to watch the pros at work.

loans has dropped from 7.5 percent compared to 9.5 percent two years ago.

"That's considerably under the rate used as a guideline for action against an institution," she said.

The university is involved in collection of the loans to the point that it makes sure students are properly qualified to receive them in the first place and that they are well informed about the financial obligation.

"It's really important that stu-

dents realize these loans must be paid back," said regent Robert J. Aragon.

He also stressed to Lloyd Hughes, provost of the Roswell campus, the need to adhere to an aggressive affirmative action plan for the hiring of minorities.

Hughes said about three or four positions have become vacant over the last year and some applications were received from minority prospects.

"How many were hired?" Aragon asked.


"I don't think any faculty was

hired from minority (applicants)," Hughes said.

Aragon said he was concerned about persistent reports indicating a lack of attention to the affirmative action program.

The Roswell campus is the only branch of the university that has fallen under criticism for lack of minority participation.

"I'd like the university to take a more aggressive, assertive role," he said. "This is fine, but I think it falls far short. Minority applicants should be making it to more than just mid-level management positions."





It's easy, when you live on a beautiful mountain as we do here in Ruidoso, to keep your eyes on Sierra Blanca. That's great, that mountain overlooking Ruidoso is a feast for the eyes.


That's how we learned to ignore the filthy, dirty dumpsters that adorn our streets. But tourists and visitors, people who live in towns committed to taking care of municipal responsibilities, are appalled at some problems we've learned to live with — problems like garbage and roads.

Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority responded quickly to our crusade against filthy, overflowing dumpsters. Members of that board, particularly Ron Andrews, are willing to look at creative solutions to a tired old problem, and we're impressed and pleased at that response. It would be easy to say, well we've always had dumpsters, so why change. But Andrews isn't afraid to call on business leaders to join him in coming up with a new plan, and we appreciate such progressive thinking. The authority manager, too, wants to do a good job, and he seemed to appreciate our help.

Since it's our job to bring such problems to light and encourage open discussion, it may be time to toss out another ongoing problem — the streets.

For months now, Village of Ruidoso roads have been deteriorating and any work that was done was in the mode of "quick fix" with little regard to the safety of village citizens. We're told that the village road crews have been kept busy on a big project — the kind of project that might better be handled through a contract with private enterprise. Any cost savings is short-lived and artificial since the roads will have to be repaired and the longer you wait the more the cost increases.

Meanwhile, potholes and shrinking shoulders are creating hazardous driving conditions and they're tearing up the cars and trucks that drive on them. Taxpayers just keep paying, whether we repair our vehicles or we pay for temporary road repairs that don't last and then pay to repave streets. It's time for the village to get back to work on village roads.



A million dollar race deserves an All American Festival



Six survived to make it into the All American Futurity time trials August 27. The 10-fastest horses in the time trials move into the finals.

The Grade I All American Futurity is the world's richest Quarter Horse race and the third leg of the Triple Crown for 2-year-old Quarter Horses. The winner of the 440-yard finals is guaranteed a purse of \$1 million.

Among those looking to nab the cool million are Mr Eye Opener, favored to win the race according to the American Quarter Horse Association's (AQHA) All American Futurity Poll. Also looking promising for making it into the finals are Zip Dash, Flashing Streak and Choculo, all in the top-10 in dollars earned for 2 year olds this year.

Originally, 1,554 horses were nominated for the 34th running of the All American, but Flashing Streak was not among the nominees. Flashing

Streaks owners opted to pay the supplement fee of \$50,000 to start in the elimination trials.

Trained by Tim Williams, Flashing Streak has won four of five and about \$116,000. His biggest win was in the Grade I Remington Park Derby at Remington Park in June. Flashing Streak won his elimination trial by more than a length.

Mr Eye Opener may be the fourth richest 2-year-old at this time, but he is ranked first on the AQHA's All American Poll. Mr Eye Opener is one of eight horses Trainer Jack Brooks qualified for the time trials.

"I have a bunch of good ones," said Brooks. "They're all going to be tough, but the toughest will probably be Mr Eye Opener, Dash Through Traffic, Choculo and First Down And Ten. Both Mr Eye Opener and Choculo have won Grade I futurities and Dash Through Traffic has qualified for two."

Mr Eye Opener has won five of six races for earnings of about \$130,000. The colt won his elimination trial by a nose while under strong restraint by

jockey Jacky Martin. Prior to that, Mr. Eye Opener finished second behind the great Deceptively in the Grade I Rainbow Futurity July 11. Earlier this year, he won the Grade I West Texas Futurity at Sunland Park and finished third behind Deceptively and Loose Lips in the Grade I Kansas Futurity in May.

Dash Through Traffic is lightly raced having been to the post only five times and winning three. He won his trial also.

"Dash Through Traffic tries every time," Brooks said. "He's not real quick from the gate, but he loves to come running on the end so the extra distance of 440 yards will suit him well."

First Down And Ten also won his elimination while Choculo finished third.

Missing from the All American lineup is Deceptively, winner of the first-two legs of the Triple Crown. The filly recently suffered a hairline fracture in her right front cannon bone and is out of competition for probably the rest of the year.



Trainer Jack Brooks has trained five All American Futurity winners and he says he's got a bunch of good horses in his stable this year. Brooks' trainees all have been ridden into history by top jockey Jacky Martin.



JOE DUNLAP: His was the sort of beginning that makes his paintings a natural involvement with the life he loved and the subject matter he knows intimately. Joe Dunlap, a second generation New Mexican, was born into a family of outdoor people. His father, Robert, a farmer and a fish and game officer spent his life face to face with nature and he raised his sons with that same intimate contact. Joe was always aware all that was wonderful and beautiful in the outdoors. It was the stuff of life and it was Joe's "schooling" in what became a lifelong direction for his painting.



LINDA MILLER: Straightforward and forceful in personality, Linda Miller brings a delicate, old-master touch to her paintings. "They're timeless," she said. "They could have been painted in any era." Sequestered from the world that speeds by on nearby U.S. 70, Miller spends her days surrounded by her art and her pets in the San Patricio house that she designed and, in large part, constructed. "I don't plan a painting, it just happens," said Miller. Usually her palette consists of only a few colors. While realistic, her style is not to create exact replicas of reality.



ANN TEMPLETON: Ann Templeton prefers to call her painting "expressions" — a symbolic expression/impression of a subject with a personal commitment to excellence. An artist-painter since 1969, she currently teaches as many as 15 art seminars each year in as many as 10 states including Hawaii and in Mexico. She also lectures and demonstrates for art guilds and college classes and juries several art shows each year. Her conceptual style of paintings and enthusiasm for her craft are rapidly winning her awards and honors throughout the United States.



KEN HOSMER: Ken Hosmer moved to Ruidoso in 1983 to organize and oversee the Carrizo Lodge art school. In 1985, he began devoting full time to his own painting, and today works in watercolor, oil, pastel, and acrylic. He teaches watercolor workshops throughout the United States and in exotic locations such as Hawaii, Mexico and Italy. He is often a guest speaker and exhibit judge for art groups, and guest author for national and regional art publications. In painting, Ken Hosmer is especially known for his expressive and dynamic use of color.



PAULA WHITE-HOSMER: An internationally-known porcelain artist, Paula White-Hosmer has lived in the Ruidoso area 10 years. She began teaching techniques in porcelain painting in 1976; and now instructs workshops across the United States. She is a certified teacher in the International Porcelain Artists and Teachers, and a member of the Professional Porcelain Artists Association; which qualifies her to teach in the five schools operated by this organization. Paula's painting style is naturalistic, yet often has a dreamy, soothing quality.



TED ROBERTSON: Ted Robertson studied art at Colorado State University, Bergman Art School in Denver, Colorado and spent three years in the U.S. Army as an illustrator for the 101st Airborne Division. He has conducted many workshops since the mid '70s including ones at the Carrizo Lodge Art School in Ruidoso. He is an elected full member of the Pastel Society of America in New York City; The American Portrait Society in Los Angeles; and is a member of the Pastel Society of the Southwest in Dallas, Texas. His works hang in throughout the country and abroad.



WALTER R. HENN: Walter Richard Henn has been painting around Lincoln County, New Mexico for 27 years now — ever since he and his wife Nora moved to old Lincoln town in 1965. They bought an old adobe house, restored it, and opened a gallery in it to get started. To get started meant to get re-started, as a self-employed artist. He had spent 20 years in advertising in Dallas, Texas. But the goal of painting seriously prompted him to make the break from advertising and be set up camp in a mud house in the middle of a storybook-land. Such a place to paint!



MARTIN ROSE: Martin Rose and his wife, Susie and children, Grace and Marty, moved to Ruidoso in 1977. Their goal was to have a quieter life style and to get closer to nature. In Ruidoso they enjoy a variety of outdoor activities. He paints landscapes best because of the way he relates to it. "When I paint clouds, I feel the awesome power of God. From the mountains I get a feeling of God's intensity and strength. I feel God's serenity in His majestic trees that stand patiently through the ages. I get the feeling that they are just waiting."



GARY MORTON: Gary Morton grew up in the heart of New Mexico cow country, near the Bell Ranch. Seeing those big-outfit cowboys when they came into town had a definite impact on him as a boy. It wasn't too many years until he hired on at the Bell. Gary had painted all through his youth. Yet as a young man on one of the biggest cow outfits in New Mexico, he found his subject — the Cowboy. Some 15 years ago he made the decision to pursue his art professionally. Since then, Gary has become known for his accuracy in portraying the working cowboy.

Her works unfold in a fantasy or surrealistic manner to express feelings and emotions of all people, but as experienced through a woman's view.
