## 4 deputy manager finalists selected

The Village Deputy Manager position has been narrowed to four applicants out of 89 entries, according to village manager Ron Wicker. None of 10 applicants from Ruidoso were among the four finalists selected for personal interviews.

The four finalists are Samuel Acosta of Silver City, Alan Briley of Tucumcari, Michael Ciesielski of Albuquerque and David Miller of Albuquerque.

—Acosta is currently employed as finance director of Silver City.

"As finance director, I have been primarily responsible for the preparation and the year round monitoring of the budget," Acosta wrote. "I oversee the divisions of utility billing, meter reading, purchasing and accounts payable. I also carry the title of City Clerk and as such have the responsibility of overseeing elections. On numerous occasions, I have served as acting city manager in the absence of the city manager."

He said his 28 years experience in the management field, both public and private, fully qualifies him for the position of deputy manager.

—Briley summed up his qualifications as a New Mexico registered professional engineer with more than eight years experience in municipal government.

Briley, of Tucumcari, noted he was experienced in a wide variety of areas including engineering design, project administration, personnel management, budgetary procedures, scheduling, federal and state grant management and public interaction.

Briley's educational background includes a B.S. in Civil Engineering from New Mexico State University and 22 continuing education courses.

—Ciesielski of Albuquerque was the general manager and chief executive officer for the El Paso County Lower Valley Authority from 1990 to 1992. He supervised the departments of water, wastewater, parks, recreation, refuse and storm drainage.

Ciesielski was deputy chief administrative officer for the City of Albuquerque from 1985 to 1989 when he supervised departments in aviation, public works, solid waste, planning, environmental health.

## Pete says MRS is dead

The Mescalero MRS is all but a dead issue, according to U.S. Senator Pete Domenici (R-NM), who held a public meeting in Ruidoso last Friday.

Domenici said the only reason the Mescalero Tribal Council is forming a community support group now is that they are out of money for any more MRS (Monitored Retrievable Storage) study.

The storage facility would be for spent nuclear fuel rods.

"They're not going to get any more money, because they don't have any community support," he said. "You don't have to worry about the next week, or the next month, because it (money) isn't coming."

He said their only new recruits

were from the Tribe and "They were getting turned off as fast as they were getting turned on."

"They have a shot at proving community support, if they don't, it's over with," Domenici said.

"I don't believe New Mexico, whether it's on Indian land, non-Indian land or federal land ought to have any more partnership with the federal government then we already have," he said.

Domenici said Los Alamos has been great for New Mexico with a "marvelous" lab for the rest of the country.

"WIPP is going to go through that in a normal legislative way," he said. "I predict it's going to be open. I think we're going to vote that in. There will be research on site, but it's very careful, not nearly as dramatic as your (project)."

"I've been with that one (WIPP)

for 14 years," he said.

Mayor Victor Alonso told Domenici that he appointed members to join the MRS Citizens advisory group, not to learn anything, but "we want our committee to tell them face to face, across the table, we're not in support. Cut it out."

County Commission Chairman Sterling Spencer expressed a different opinion on MRS storage.

He agreed with Domenici that the WIPP site at Carlsbad is good for the economy of New Mexico.

Spencer said he felt near the WIPP site would be a logical location.

"I think if Eddy County would like to put a temporary MRS above ground at their (Carlsbad) location, there's a positive net effect for the state of New Mexico."

Spencer said he did not think

## Chamber board battles budget shortfall

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce realizes that one good event won't dig it out of the financial hole, but it may tide the group over until it can get back on its feet this year.

Chamber board of directors got the final numbers on the fiscal year budget Wednesday night, but it wasn't good news. Contract accountant Jack Muhn said the chamber ended the year \$16,193 in debt. He said it is basically because the chamber didn't get the membership dues it had budgeted, and it made almost no profit in special events, although more than \$5,000 had been budgeted for revenues.

Next fiscal year looks like it is going to be

a different ball game because the staff is more enthusiastic and more planning has been done on events, Muhn said.

One special event that the chamber has counted on for several years to keep it above water is the Art Festival. Board director Ron Wicker, who has questioned the chamber's deficit budget before, asked Muhn if the profit made from the event this year would put them back in the black. Although the festival made a profit of more than \$31,000 in this fiscal year, much of that money had to go to pay for bills and expenses from the past fiscal year, Muhn said. He said, since they borrowed, there is only about \$15,000 in the bank from that event.

Attendance was down at the July festival by 13 percent, but it was the highest profit

the group had made in its history. Next year the festival will be at the Civic Events Center, and directors are confident the move will increase attendance.

Wicker then asked how the chamber ended the fiscal year in 1991. Muhn said they had a year-to-date loss of \$1,728. Theoretically the cash in the chamber is \$16,000 less than it began the year with, he said.

"My concern is that at some point we need to make money. We can't keep losing year after year," Wicker said.

Chamber president Paul Crown said the group goes through a cycle about every three or four years in which it loses money and then regains it. Last fiscal year was one of those years that they lost money, he said. He said it is his goal to improve the situation to

get it back to a positive point, and he hopes the board also wants to help reach that goal. It has been an uphill battle for several years since the group over-spent \$20,000 in advertising one fiscal year.

To add to the confusion, Muhn also told the board about state matching funds the visitors promotion bureau received for the fiscal year, which will give that division a positive carry-over of about \$19,000 for next year. He said the money will be used for brochures next year, because they weren't needed this year. The division will only have about \$13,000 revenue from state matching funds next year, so the carry-over is something they will need, he said.

Director Frank Sayner asked if they could

## BLM director favors increasing grazing fees

While sailing through Lincoln County last week, Bureau of Land Management (BLM) director Cy Jamison called for support from area ranchers on a proposed grazing fee formula revision.

The fee as now designed has come under attack in the U.S. Congress for being too low compared to privately leased land. Environmental groups have pointed to that perceived inequity as one of the reasons ranchers should not be allowed to graze their livestock on public lands.

Jamison said the proposal being considered on the House side would raise the fee to more than three times its current level over a three year period.

The one on the Senate side is better and would be incentive based," Jamison said.

One of the reasons he likes the Senate proposal is that it

originated with U.S. Secretary of the Interior Manuel Lujan back in March.

The incentive approach appears to have backing from some more reasonable environmental groups, Jamison said.

It would give deductions over the 10 year life of a permit for good management," he said. Other reductions might be awarded based on improvements made to the property by ranchers, especially improvements not directly benefiting the rancher's operation, he said.

A task force to develop the concept and test its application has been formed under the direction of Jamison.

In a fact sheet on grazing fees, BLM officials wrote. While the Administration is committed to the current grazing fee formula, the continuing public debate suggests that it may be productive now to examine new fee concepts."

The U.S. Forest Service has two region representatives on the committee since any proposed change in the grazing fee

also would impact federal lands managed by that agency. In addition to BLM officials from 11 states, committee members also include representatives from three universities.

Possible incentives to be examined are credits for vegetative community in an upward trend and desired rangeland condition; installation of range improvements including fences and water development; allowing public access across private lands; improved management practices such as herding and changing seasons of use; improving and protecting riparian (streamside) areas; improving wildlife and fisheries habitat and protecting threatened and endangered species.

The BLM administers livestock grazing on about 170 million acres of rangeland, mostly in 11 Western states.

Congress authorized grazing on such lands in three separate laws passed in 1934, 1976 and 1978.

In 1990, nearly 18,000 BLM permittees grazed livestock on



# Consistency is key to economic development

Getting a consistent message out about itself through advertising will be a goal the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County will work toward now that it has a director to do a campaign.

Corporation executive director Karen Kopp told board members she received a packet of advertising information from a trends magazine, but the one project would take most of what had been budgeted for advertising.

"It is really a nice presentation but it is out of our budget. I think to be successful you have to be consistent in getting your message out, not just do it once," she said.

Considering her recent trip to California with the Southwest Public Service Business Quarter, Kopp said they may want to zero in on the southern part of that state because there are so many businesses that want to leave. She said she has also been informed that the businesses are unhappy with the climate in Minnesota too.

Kopp suggested advertising in the L.A. Times, while board director Joan Bailey said they may want to try the Wall Street Journal, but other directors said both would probably be too expensive.

Board president Ronnie Paulger said it is fairly inexpensive to do advertisements on the local cable system, so it may be possible to get ads on a local system in California for a reasonable price.

Director Dick Mound said Kopp may also want to find out about local talk shows on those systems. He

said he has used programs at Roswell to promote events, and it has worked well.

Kopp said she didn't know if that would work because she would be targeting a different type of people. Most business people are at work when the local programs air in the morning or at noon, she said. She will check into both possibilities.

Director Scott Shafer asked Kopp if she had asked the businesses she contacted in California what they look at to find out about new locations. She said she didn't ask them when she visited with the Business Quarter, but she is planning to follow-up on those she sent Ruidoso packets to, so she will ask them.

Bailey said Kopp should also contact the state economic development division to find out what campaigns it is doing and get its suggestions on where to advertise. She said the Rick Johnson firm of Albuquerque is also hired by the state to assist in promotions, and Kopp could call him to get information.

Also in her executive director's report Kopp said she did an inventory of the promotional material the group has left. They are fairly well stocked on almost everything, but there are some mistakes on the Sierra Blanca airport insert. She said the word Ruidoso is misspelled and a whole sentence is repeated, among other problems.

She has discussed the problem with Phil Price Advertising Agency, who did the publications, and they will be sharing the costs of having

it reprinted with the corrections. Another problem is that the airport runways are shown in dashes, so it doesn't look permanent. It will cost the EDCLC \$100 to have the insert reprinted after the basic corrections are made, but the agency is also charging \$45 to fix the airport map. Kopp said it shouldn't take them but a few extra minutes to make those changes when it is called up on a computer so she will be talking to them on the price.

EDCLC doesn't want to send out something that is incorrect, so if they have to absorb the cost of the corrections that is what will have to happen, said director Glen Crane. Barbara Duff, representative of Ruidoso, asked why the errors weren't caught before it was printed.

Kopp explained that former director Anita Sanders had worked on it with someone at the agency, but it wasn't completed before she left in November 1991, and the person at the agency also left. She said from the information in the file it looked like the ad copy had been OK'd once, but the corrections didn't get changed. With the board's consent she will begin working on getting it corrected and ready to be sent out.

She has also been working with village manager Ron Wicker and Civic Events Center director Kathleen Michelena to help locate a hotel near the Civic Events Center. Kopp said On-Track has been video taping the area and should have a final tape ready some time this week. After the landscaping is done in front of the building, photog-

rapher Herb Brunell will take pictures of the whole area. The pictures and video will then be sent to hotel corporations to encourage them to build a hotel here.

Kopp said she has also talked to the local board of realtors concerning a problem she had in getting information out to prospective businesses. At last month's meeting she told the directors that she couldn't be the one to send real estate information out, but said at this meeting that it had been a misunderstanding. She said as long as she sends the information out on the Realtors' stationary, not on EDCLC letterhead, it is OK to give the businesses the information.

She said she will be meeting with the local Multiple Listing Services in September to discuss a plan to have them help meet the needs of the businesses who would like to come here. Kopp will create a specification sheet to send out to realtors when a business requests a certain type of property, and then the realtors can let them know what is available. She will also be in contact with Carrizozo and Capitan real estate agents.

In the president's report, Paulger said he is going to start putting committees together, so the directors should consider which ones they would like to serve on and who they think would be good on a particular committee. Directors may either chair the committee or serve on it, and each committee will need four or five members. Paulger said the committee members don't necessarily have to be members of the EDCLC, as long as they are in-

terested in doing a good job for the group.

Members are needed for the prospect, A team special task force, membership—public relations—advertising, community development, retention and expansion in small business assistance, hospitality, transportation, recycling, free trade, corporate finance, fund raising, research and marketing data and agriculture committees.

In other business, director Pat Huey questioned what connection the EDCLC has with Louis Adney, a sales representative. Kopp explained that Adney is with Southern Star Publications which is doing a community guide for the chamber of commerce and the EDCLC. The guide will not cost either group anything and may make a little money because the two groups will get 10 percent of the sales for the advertisements.

Huey said the advertisements in it seem to be a little high in price with a range from \$350 to \$2,000. Bailey said it may be high, but they need to consider what it is going to be used for. The chamber will send it out to people who are interested in relocating here, while the EDCLC will send it to businesses that are interested in moving here. The guide will include interviews of community leaders and businesses that have located in this area to give people reading it a better feel for the community.

"We need to look at this piece not as an instant gratification, but a chance to pull together as an area," Bailey said.

## Drinking and driving can be dangerous

federal rangelands.

Some of the recent criticism by U.S. Rep. Mike Synar (D-Oklahoma), chair of the House Government Operations subcommittee, is misleading, according to a sheet put together by the BLM called "Myths and Facts about Public Lands Grazing."

While a General Accounting Office study authorized by Synar and released in June found that 500 largest BLM grazing permits encompass nearly 47 percent of the agency's grazing land, it failed to note the other side of the picture.

That other side is the small family operation which depends on BLM and forest service land to survive.

BLM Public Affairs officer Tom Gorey pointed out in the staff summary that 90 percent of the BLM grazing permittees are family-size operations of no more than 500 head of cattle.

In Lincoln County, only seven out of 60 grazing permits issued by the forest service are for more than 200 animals and the largest is for 1,000. From there the number drops to 300 and lower.

"Also, Rep. Synar's list of the top 500 public lands livestock operators is misleading," Gorey wrote. "For example, the Synar list ranks Rock Springs Grazing" as the second largest public lands livestock operator. Actually, this is a Wyoming grazing association of more than 30 operators."

These ranchers depend on a mix of adjacent private, state and public rangelands because of the West's patchwork pattern of federal, state and private land ownership, BLM Gorey noted.

In many instances, ranchers may water their livestock on private land while grazing them on public land.

The ranchers' need for this land mix is shown by the fact that about one-third of the beef cattle in 11 Western state graze at least part of the year on public rangelands, Gorey wrote in the agency summary.

BLM rangelands are not being overgrazed and, in fact, are in better condition today than at any time in this century, he stated.

In a study titled, "State of the Public Rangelands 1990," the BLM found that the amount of public rangeland in good to excellent condition has more than doubled since

1936, from 15.8 percent to 33 percent in 1989.

During that same period, the amount of BLM rangeland in poor condition declined by more than half, from 36.3 percent to 16 percent, the lowest percentage ever recorded.

Overall, the study found 69 percent of the BLM rangeland in fair to excellent condition, another 16 percent in poor condition and remaining 14 percent unclassified.

"It should be noted that the 36 percent of the public rangeland found to be in fair condition is not unsatisfactory as grazing critics suggest," Gorey wrote. Fair condition often is a very satisfactory stage for producing high-quality forage, wildlife cover, watershed protection and an aesthetic landscape, he said.

The rangelands improving condition further is evidenced by the dramatic increase in big game populations over the past three decades, BLM officials insist.

From 1960 to 1988, the number of elk rose by nearly 700 percent, moose by more than 375 percent, bighorn sheep by 335 percent, antelope by more than 110 percent and deer by 30 percent.

Those who oppose public range

grazing such as Synar are quick to point out that private land grazing fees run from \$8-\$12 per animal unit month (AUM). An AUM is the amount of forage necessary to feed a cow and her calf, or one horse, or five sheep for a month.

The grazing fee on public land is \$1.92 per AUM.

"But this forage cost disparity does not show what each fee 'buys' for the rancher," Gorey noted in the summary. "When a rancher leases private land, the fee he pays usually gives him exclusive use of an area. Also, the private fee often covers livestock care that is provided by the landowner."

"By contrast, the public lands rancher has to share the land with hunters and campers. Also, for a variety of reasons relating to range improvement and maintenance expenses, it costs a rancher more to graze cattle on public than on private rangeland. Finally, the federal government provides no livestock care for the public lands rancher."

"It also should be noted that despite the supposedly low \$1.92 per AUM federal grazing fee, public lands ranchers annually do not use nearly 20 percent of the public land forage."

The current fee is based on a formula that takes into account the cost of production, the price of beef and forage values.

The fee has risen and fallen with fluctuations in the livestock industry from a low in 1987 of \$1.35 per AUM to a high of \$1.97 in 1991, a 46 percent increase. It fell 2.5 percent this year to \$1.92.

The BLM summary author also accused critics of misleading the public when they declare that the federal grazing program give public lands ranchers and farmers a \$52-million a year subsidy.

Critics based that figure on the \$73.8-million cost of overall federal rangeland program administered by the BLM and forest service in 1990 while federal grazing fees generated \$21.5-million.

"Thus, according to grazing critics, taxpayers subsidized public land ranchers at a cost of \$52.3-million," Gorey wrote.

"But that alleged subsidy figure is misleading."

About \$42.8-million of the subsidy figure of \$52.3-million cannot be considered an operating cost of the grazing program, he stated. The grazing program loss is closer to \$9.5-million, with the BLM's share

about \$1.9-million.

The \$42.8-million figure comes from \$21.8-million spent by the BLM and forest service on rangeland ecology that benefits wildlife and riparian areas. That money would be spent with no livestock on the range, he said. The two agencies also spent \$15.5-million on range improvements, which are in the nature of land enhancement investments, not an annual cost of administering the grazing program. Another \$5.5-million represents grazing fee receipts shared with state and county governments, not a loss.

"Whether grazing fee receipts should cover the entire cost of the federal grazing program is a debatable question," Gorey summarized. "But there's a big difference between reducing a \$52.3-million alleged subsidy to zero and getting a \$9.5-million actual loss to zero."

A tentative schedule for the task force is to finish the concept document by September 30, begin field tests of incentives by October 19, complete data collection and start evaluation by January 30, and complete a final report with recommendations by April 30, 1993.

and transit where he and his staff prepared the annual budget.

He noted as volunteer experience that he was the Junior Olympic Regional Weightlifting Chairman responsible for administration and fund raising within a 6-state region.

Miller has been director of public works in Rio Rancho and Alamogordo.

He has an MBA from Golden Gate University in San Francisco.

use that money to help off-set the deficit, but Muhn said it couldn't because it is for two separate operations. He said they got money from the village to be eligible for the match and when the state money came in it was more than was necessary for the projects. Because of the requirements of the process he did have to borrow from the chamber to pay bills in the visitor promotion area to earn the money from the state, but that has all been paid back, he said.

Directors were still confused by the specifics of the financial statements, although they all understood the concept of being in debt. Crown said to be debt-free by this time next year they need to make an extra \$16,000. The directors voted to approve the fiscal year statement, and Muhn said for the July statement he will make three separate statements for the chamber, the visitors promotion division and the village advertising contract.

"I don't mind having five balls in the air at one time, but we are going in such a positive direction I don't want us to get a black eye from this," Wicker said.

Executive director Joan Bailey said she is able to maintain confidence in the program because the problem in the past was that they didn't pay enough attention to special events and increasing memberships, but that has already begun to change.

She gave the board an up-date on two special events the chamber is planning this year.

Both the AspenFest and the Oktoberfest are ahead of schedule on being planned and promoted. She said people think of the AspenFest as more of a community event, which makes it one of the biggest draws.

The parade is being organized by Sharon Wicker and Vicky Daulton, but the whole committee is dedicated and excited about the event.

AspenFest will be the first weekend of October and will begin with a family style dance on Friday night at Schoolhouse Park and will continue with the parade on Saturday morning. Going on throughout the weekend will be the chili cook-off, the rod run and the downtown festival.

Bailey said they are asking different organizations or businesses to challenge others in the same industry to get a high turn-out for the parade.

The Oktoberfest is in equally good shape, Bailey said. Although the event has been turned over to the chamber, last year's committee is again putting the plans together. It will be at The Barn again this year on the third weekend of October.

Another event coming up for the chamber is the annual banquet on September 25 at the Civic Events Center. Crown said he thinks the event will be fun for everyone not just chamber members, and it will also serve as a fundraiser for the group. Directors will be selling tickets for \$10 per person or \$18 per couple.

In other business, Bailey and Crown gave the board an up-date on a plan to hire another part-time person to handle the visitor in-

quiries about the area. Crown said after an article about the area came out in the U.S.A. Weekend magazine a few weeks ago, he came down to the chamber to talk to Bailey, but the entire staff was busy responding to calls about the article.

The chamber has a contract with the Village of Ruidoso which pays for one full-time person and one part-time person to provide visitor information services. Crown said there are 18 chamber members in the Village of Ruidoso Downs, and the chamber hadn't requested any funds from that village.

Bailey went before the Downs lodgers tax advisory board, which recommended approval for \$5,800 for the person. When she went before the board of trustees, they asked for a job description for the person before they make a decision on September 14.

They did not go to the county for funds because the county has two other chamber organizations in Capitan and Carrizozo, and the Ruidoso Chamber has also done cooperative projects with the county. Bailey said she pointed out to the Ruidoso Downs board that the chamber is making an effort to change from just promoting Ruidoso to promoting the whole area, and she thought they were receptive to the idea.

"We need to do more as an area and realize that we can't do it by ourselves. I hope they see our sincerity," Bailey said.

The chamber will need to consider a new lease with the village for the property the building is on. Crown said that the lease is outdated, and they haven't paid it for quite a few years. The original lease was \$1 for 25

years so they owe the village about 45 cents.

He said the village attorney is preparing a new lease, and it won't be ready until the end of September. They won't know what the cost will be until that time, he said. The original lease was signed by Dan Swearingin when he was mayor.

In her membership report, Bailey said nine new members have joined the group, with only one that had participated in the chamber before, for a total of 313 paying members. They received almost a 100 percent response to the large billing they did in May and another one will come out in November. She said due to the generosity and commitment of the members, the chamber should be in good shape.

Bailey said the group's presidents club is alive and working hard to get more members. Crown asked her to note on the directors' reports who sponsored the new members, so next month's list will have that information.

Ruidoso has been the host for a photographer and senior editor from Southern Living Magazine. Bailey said both have been really excited about the area, not just because of the scenery but the people and the nice community. The senior editor said he had to sell his magazine editors on the article because there is no perception of this area.

This magazine is one of several that have done articles about the area which has increased the number of inquiries about the area. Bailey said the staff has almost reached its capacity for being able to answer all of these inquiries.

"Growth is good, but we need to plan for it," she said.



# Dusty is looking for new home

"She's part shaggy, part cute," Basch said.

All of the little guys and girls were brought in as strays, abandoned by the people they trusted to care for them.

To be adopted, most will need to be spayed or neutered in line with the society's commitment to reduce the unwanted pet population through birth control instead of the inhumane option of premature death for the many mother dogs, puppies and males brought to the shelter.

The answer is responsible pet owners, willing to invest in their favorite friend's future.

Donations to sponsor a pet for spaying and neutering are welcome. The cost of the procedure is the major cost associated with adoption.

Another way to help an animal be adopted is to visit them. Human attention, playing, walking or just talking, keeps an animal more sociable and more likely to attract someone's attention.





# Shirlene Fitzner

## Neither rain nor snow (or anything else) can stop this postmaster

Making a commitment to do a job right has been the key to success for Shirlene Fitzner, both in her work and her community service in Ruidoso Downs.

Residents of the little village can always count on a "hello," from her or her staff at the post office or when they see her at a community event she has helped organize. Fitzner has worked for the United States Postal Service for 32 years, all here, and whether people are year-round or summer residents, she knows almost everyone by name.

In every task Fitzner takes on she makes sure it is a promise she can keep.

"I feel like everybody that lives in a community and cares about it should get involved. So many people don't get involved and then sit back and criticize what is done. Anything I join I try to do my part," she said.

She was born and raised in southern Utah near Brice Canyon National Park in a community that was even smaller than Ruidoso Downs, but it was also very pretty, she said. Fitzner came to New Mexico with her late husband in 1955 for a three-month job, but so far that hasn't ended.

"I hope it never does because I love it here," Fitzner said.

Her husband had a job with an engineering firm for Otero County Electric Cooperative, and they wanted him to transfer here. He later worked in security at the Holloman Air Force Base test track. In 1979 when he died of cancer, Fitzner said her mother wanted her to come back to Utah, but she had her home, job and friends here, so her mother came to live with her instead.

It was July 16, 1960, that she began her 32-year career with the postal service, and although some long-serving workers are enticed to retire early with financial incentives, Fitzner hasn't considered that option.

"What I get out of my job is more than dollars and cents. I am happy where I am," she said.

"I have no desire to go into a larger office because you lose the personal touch. I have a good relationship with my people," she commented.

Fitzner did assist at the

Moriarty post office for three months but was glad to get back to her regular customers in Ruidoso Downs.

In January 1976 she was promoted to postmaster, but her biggest reward and challenge started in January 1992.

She became the editor of the Postmasters Gazette, a monthly magazine put out by the postal service to about 40,000-50,000 readers. Although it takes quite a bit of her time, Fitzner has been excited to take on the new duties.

The position requires her to fly to Washington D.C. for several days every other month to discuss upcoming stories with national postal officials and to be in contact with the various regional representatives whom she asks to write stories. Fitzner has to have stories and columns lined out for at least two to three months in advance for this publication.

She said when a representative agrees to do a story she always writes a thank-you to the person, and the writers appreciate that. Fitzner also gets to write stories about interesting people in the postal community. She will be the editor of the magazine through 1993.

Fitzner said the current post office, located by the Circle K convenience store, is the third building she has worked in, and this one has been remodeled twice, which shows they have had a steady growth. She said the people they serve just can't be beat because they are always friendly.

The post office is also known as one of the friendliest ones in the area. One special effort that they make that may have earned them the reputation is to fix Christmas trays for those in the community who are alone during the holidays.

Her hard work at the post office has also earned Fitzner honors among her peers. Last year she was chosen postmaster of the year for the Western Region and in May she earned postmaster of the year for the state.

In her career at the post office a lot of changes have been made, but not all of them have been good. Fitzner said the most disappointing change has been in the service standards and how quickly the mail gets out to the people. She said she has talked to the new postmaster general about the situation and he

is concerned about it, too.

Fitzner said she has always stressed the importance of good service to her employees. The post office is set up to be a service for people, and without the people that come in, the postal workers wouldn't have jobs, she said. She currently has two full-time employees and had one part-time person assisting from Mesalero.

She has been called on both in her professional work and in the community to help organize a variety of activities. She said she was asked to organize a going-away party for former Ruidoso postmaster Bob Chamberlin and then to do the welcoming party for the new postmaster Gordon Rowell.

Her hard work and positive attitude have also been a valuable contribution to the Ruidoso Downs Auxiliary, of which she is serving a term as president. The auxiliary assisted in getting a senior citizens center built and has since put it to good use.

One of the most successful events the auxiliary has sponsored in the building was the community Christmas party, with a Santa Claus, refreshments and the trimmings. During Easter, the group also sponsored an Easter egg hunt in the park by the building and gave away prizes. The auxiliary also sponsored a potluck dinner at the center to help furnish the kitchen with utensils and supplies.

Fitzner is also a member of the village senior citizens board and that group is working on getting the building open at least two days a week starting in September. She said when they first set this goal they didn't realize what would be involved in getting a program set-up, especially concerning the regulations and the costs.

The auxiliary has also established a new program to help improve the looks of the community. They have adopted the two to three miles through the down town of Ruidoso Downs in an adopt-a-highway program and will begin keeping that area free of litter.

Another important event the group does that Fitzner has been involved in is the annual auxiliary Arts and Crafts Fair, which is a fund-raiser for the group. Fitzner has been involved in the event for about five years and is the co-chairperson this year. The fair requires a lot of hard work of the auxiliary

members, but it has become a tradition for the village and for outstanding artists in the area.

Fitzner is serving as president of the organization this year, but has also been the secretary-treasurer. She said when the group asked her to be president she decided to do it because she wanted to do her part to keep the organization going strong.

"It doesn't matter what size a village you live in because there is so much to be done. You take pride in it (the village) and want it to be to best it can be. When you get involved in a community you have a closer relationship with all the people," Fitzner said.

One of the people she has become a little closer to because of her work in the auxiliary is Ida Hale. She said Fitzner and the auxiliary are really interested in Ruidoso Downs and what can be done for

the town. Hale said the auxiliary works hard to give scholarships to high school students and to give donations to meals-on-wheels.

"Shirlene tries hard to be thoughtful of other people. She always makes me feel good when I go in the post office," Hale said.

Because of her new duties as editor of the magazine and her work with the auxiliary she has not been able to be as involved in Beta Sigma Phi, an organization she has been an officer in for several years. Fitzner said she wasn't able to take any office in the group this year because she knew she wouldn't have the time to do a good job with it.

Another important part of her life that she does take time out for is her family.

Her husband, Julius, to whom she has been married for eight years, is a retired postmaster from Tucumcari. She has two daughters,

two grandsons and two granddaughters that she is happy to have visit from California or Utah during the summer.

"It is fun to get re-acquainted on a one-on-one basis with my grandkids," Fitzner said.

She also teaches a youth class at her church. When she gets a little free time she likes to quilt, which has a few benefits besides relaxation. She said she made a star-quilt and raffled it off at a postal convention here to help pay for expenses.

"Quilting is so neat. I get started and the day just goes by," she said.

Ruidoso Downs Mayor Joe Hayhurst said Fitzner is a great asset to the community.

"She gives 100 percent to the senior citizens center and to the auxiliary. She is hard to beat when you have a job that needs done. She is a great lady to work with," he said.

# Football team earns A for attitude

Although the score board didn't show any points for Ruidoso at the end of Friday night's football game, the Warriors scored well with coaches, fans and teammates for not giving up in the 0-34 defeat by Artesia.

"We couldn't have asked them for more effort. They never gave up. It showed a lot of heart from those guys, and they played with a lot of class. It's easy to revert to cheap shots when you are down, but they never did," Coach Mike Gaston said.

The Warriors improved throughout the game as young players got used to new positions in the first game of the season. Gaston said several players including Scott Stricklin, Anthony Torres and Lance Roe were on the field for every play of the game, and to see those guys still giving a great effort at the end of the game was impressive.

The coach was particularly pleased with the improvement in Roe's play in the game after the scrimmage last Friday in Tucum-

cari. They had been working on outside coverage in practice last week, and Roe definitely gained ground in his position as a strong safety. He made one interception and had six rushes for 26 yards. Mario Sanchez also had an interception, while Ruidoso only turned over the ball one time.

Artesia scored 14 points in the first quarter, seven in the second and 13 in the third when a point after attempt was stopped. The Warriors held the Bulldogs out of the end zone in the fourth quarter, but couldn't quite make it in for a touchdown for themselves.

Ruidoso made four first downs for 92 total yards on offense, while Artesia made 13 first downs and 364 total yards. The Warriors were penalized four times for 25 yards and the Bulldogs had five penalties for 65 yards. The leading rusher for the Warriors was Torres with 10 rushes for 37 yards. Other rushers for the team were Sanchez, Jaime Ordorica, Victor Cocchiola and Ricky DeVara.

Gaston said the Warriors have a lot of work to do in several areas, but each Monday practice will be

devoted to work on fundamentals, such as tackling and blocking better. They also need to improve their pass offense, after completing two of seven passing attempts.

"Friday night was a good test for us because you don't learn against bad teams. The players weren't intimidated by Artesia, and they never backed off," he said.

The Warriors alternated quarterbacks John Echols and Victor Cocchiola on downs, and Gaston was happy with how both of them performed. Both of them are inexperienced at varsity play but didn't let the large crowd on both sides of the field hurt their concentration. The coach said he doesn't know yet who will be starting in the next game, but the coaches will be making a decision within the next week or two. One of them needs to have the experience of playing a whole varsity game before district competition begins, Gaston said.

As long as the players keep a good attitude and give a good effort, good things will happen because the coaches will teach them the techniques. Gaston said all of the

coaches were excited about the game because the areas the players improved on were things they had worked hard on in practice. He expects even more improvement during this week, before the game Friday at Lovington.

Lovington has a strong defense, although its offense isn't quite what it has been in the past, Gaston said. Lovington defeated Eunice Friday night in a close game, 13-10. Eunice had a chance to score in the final minutes of the game but couldn't convert on fourth down and goal to go. One of Lovington's touchdowns also came on a long pass.

Lovington still has a lot of good athletes, and it has the numbers of players and depth that Artesia did.

"We are expecting to improve tremendously. The kids are in a good frame of mind and are excited about bouncing back against Lovington," Gaston said.

Friday night's game will start at 7:30 p.m. at Lovington, but the Warriors will be back at W.D. Horton Stadium on September 11 to play New Mexico Military Institute for homecoming.

PILT (Payment In Lieu of Taxes on public lands) they've actually cut the payments to counties by 30 percent due to inflation.

What the Senate is trying to do is pass a bill with a yearly inflationary factor, but was unable to get it by the house.

Domenici said another way around the problem would be to

simply appropriate more money. "We don't want to rock the boat too much for now," he said. "We're going to find the opportune time to get it back up."

Lincoln County would be a good area for the storage site, but he thought Carlsbad might consider it.

"There's already an area there for it. The rest of the state would benefit through transportation systems and money brought down from the federal government that

might go somewhere else eventually. I'm not against that. That's just a thought."

Frank Warth informed Domenici that the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority and the Otero County Solid Waste Authority would be holding joint meetings to formulate plans for a regional landfill.

Warth said a study is near completion that will outline financing alternatives.

He said holes were being drilled in Otero County for hydrology tests and where a site can be located.

Domenici said that the ranchers are aware of a move in the U.S. Congress for the past several years to try to increase the fees for grazing on public land.

The house has passed a formula that would significantly increase the fee and the Senate has been trying to come up with a better compromise.

He said two senators got together and offered a bill that proposed a similar increase but exempted the smaller rancher with 500 cattle or less. Domenici said there are still a lot of questions as to how that would work.

Caltron has the largest percentage of public land, but Lincoln County is 45 percent public if you include BLM and Forest Service.

Domenici said that Congress acknowledges that by freezing

Drop off donations at the Food Bank between noon and 4 p.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday.



## People for the West hear the rest of the story on BLM land

"The Rest of the Story" on purchase of public land from the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) for \$2.50 an acre for mining purposes was presented by Marlowe Sharpe, Nogal at the August meeting of Carrizo People for the West (PFW).

According to a news release provided by PFW, Sharpe pointed out that this procedure is quite expensive and time-consuming, involving verified proof of mineral deposits that can be mined and sold at a profit before any patent will be granted.

Patenting a mining claim is nearly impossible, and in 1989 only three patents were granted, most of which went to Native American

tribes through land settlements in Alaska, said Sharpe.

It takes between five and 20 years to patent a claim and an expenditure of between \$50,000 and one million dollars per claim to prove an economic or body and other criteria required by BLM, he continued.

PILT (Payment In Lieu of Taxes on public lands) they've actually cut the payments to counties by 30 percent due to inflation.

What the Senate is trying to do is pass a bill with a yearly inflationary factor, but was unable to get it by the house.

Domenici said another way around the problem would be to

simply appropriate more money. "We don't want to rock the boat too much for now," he said. "We're going to find the opportune time to get it back up." Lincoln County would be a good area for the storage site, but he thought Carlsbad might consider it. "There's already an area there for it. The rest of the state would benefit through transportation systems and money brought down from the federal government that

might go somewhere else eventually. I'm not against that. That's just a thought." Frank Warth informed Domenici that the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority and the Otero County Solid Waste Authority would be holding joint meetings to formulate plans for a regional landfill. Warth said a study is near completion that will outline financing alternatives.

He said holes were being drilled in Otero County for hydrology tests and where a site can be located. Domenici said that the ranchers are aware of a move in the U.S. Congress for the past several years to try to increase the fees for grazing on public land. The house has passed a formula that would significantly increase the fee and the Senate has been trying to come up with a better compromise.

He said two senators got together and offered a bill that proposed a similar increase but exempted the smaller rancher with 500 cattle or less. Domenici said there are still a lot of questions as to how that would work. Caltron has the largest percentage of public land, but Lincoln County is 45 percent public if you include BLM and Forest Service. Domenici said that Congress acknowledges that by freezing



## People for the West hear the rest of the story on BLM land

"The Rest of the Story" on purchase of public land from the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) for \$2.50 an acre for mining purposes was presented by Marlowe Sharpe, Nogal at the August meeting of Carrizo People for the West (PFW).

According to a news release provided by PFW, Sharpe pointed out that this procedure is quite expensive and time-consuming, involving verified proof of mineral deposits that can be mined and sold at a profit before any patent will be granted.

Patenting a mining claim is nearly impossible, and in 1989 only three patents were granted, most of which went to Native American

tribes through land settlements in Alaska, said Sharpe.

It takes between five and 20 years to patent a claim and an expenditure of between \$50,000 and one million dollars per claim to prove an economic or body and other criteria required by BLM, he continued.

Further information may be obtained from the brochure "Patenting a Mining Claim on Federal Lands" from George Scheppoff, BLM office in Roswell, 505-622-9042.





# National Guard unit travels to the Capitans for training

Officer school candidates from the U.S. Army National Guard Military Academy cut their teeth on the rugged Capitan Mountains during a recent training exercise to retrieve aircraft wreckage.

The airplane had crashed in July 1988 in the 35,000-acre wilderness area within the Lincoln County National Forest's Smokey Bear District.

According to Zale Woodward, who assisted in the recovery effort and worked for the U.S. Forest Service this summer, forestry officials wanted to remove the wreckage to eliminate numerous reports of a current emergency from pilots and campers who see the downed plane. They also were anxious to get rid of a blemish in the wilderness.

But it was the wilderness designation that created problems.

Mechanical restrictions apply to the area. In addition, the aircraft was situated on the north side of the wilderness at an elevation of about 8,000 feet, Woodward said.

"The north side...is comprised of steep rocky slopes with numerous canyons," he said. "The extremely rocky mountainous terrain with steep inclines had made it impossible for the forest service to extract the aircraft without assistance."

To enhance the experience, the Guard created a scenario that a suspected drug lord en route from Juarez, Mexico to Santa Fe was being pursued by U.S. Custom agents, Woodward said. "After a

low altitude, high speed chase, (the drug lord's) aircraft went down in the Capitan Mountain Wilderness. After the New Mexico National Guard's drug interdiction task force concluded its aerial recon, it was determined that the aircraft was dismembered into three main parts.

The mission was for Alpha Company to retrieve the aircraft within a specified time limit.


The training was the most useful for the soon-to-be-commissioned officers from the Guard unit out of Roswell in the areas of land navigation, small unit tactics and leadership abilities, Woodward said.

The mission was accomplished on time and the wilderness was returned to its normal inhabitants.




Officer candidates for the U.S. National Guard Academy are pictured here in an exercise they conducted in the Capitan Mountains.

It's Fairtime! Get ready, we're gonna have a good time!

Like Michael Martin Murphey sings in this year's State Fair theme song, the "Biggest Show in New Mexico" is filled to the rim with entertainment, food, educational exhibits and new attractions for Fairtimers young and old.

For starters, check out 15 nights of PRCA Rodeo action and entertainment - up from 12 nights last year. The stellar line-up includes established country music stars, plus many of the up-and-comers who are shaking up the world of country music.

"We've got an exciting lineup this year," said State Fair Manager Sam Hancock. "And with our ticket prices at \$5.50 and \$9.50, you have to figure the New Mexico State Fair Rodeo is one of the best entertainment bargains in the nation."

Something new this year: Major entertainment acts at Miller Pavilion and Heritage Square, all performing FREE. Look for Jack Mack and the Heart Attack, The Dixie Chicks, The Dynatones, Moms and Other Crazy Ladies, Kay Starr and Williams and Ree. The major acts will shuttle between Miller Pavilion and Heritage Square, and stand-up comedians will fill in downtime between shows.

"Spectacular" fans should catch The Mess of Mutts and The Sprocket Jockeys, then wander over to the bungi cord jumper show and the Alpine Mountain Sports Thrill Show. The bungis and Alpine continue the trend of allowing audience members to participate in the excitement of Fair acts. 





## Fair Hosts First Lady Jockey Challenge

Picture the nation's top female jockeys vying for prize money and glory in the first ever National Championship of Female Jockeys.

Last year, State Fair Director of Racing Lidberg imagined just such an exciting, if scenario. Then, he and State Fair Marketing Director Rodger Beimer went out and arranged for the event to be held during the New Mexico State Fair.

"I guess a lot of the other racetracks will be sitting back and wondering why they didn't think of it first," Lidberg said. "There was a male championship a few years back, but this will be the first for female jockeys."

The Championship of Female Jockeys is just

one highlight of a great season of racing at the State Fair. Fans will enjoy free admission to the grandstand during the entire 17-day run of the Fair and through the extended season, September 30, October 2-4, 7-10 and 11, 12.

Twelve lady jockeys and six alternates who are members of the Jockey's Guild have been invited to attend the all ladies challenge. Based on total wins from Jan. 1 through and including July 31, 1991, the two winningest jockeys from each of the six Guild regions qualified automatically. The third highest ranked jockey in each region became the alternate.

Four championship races will be run for

Thoroughbreds. Positions will be determined by draw and the champion determined based upon total points, from 12 for first to one for last place.

"In addition to being an event which uses racing to promote racing, the National Championship of Female Jockeys is also great publicity for the State Fair and the Race-track," Lidberg said. "It is a once in a lifetime opportunity for the best female jockeys to compete against one another."

If the race generates as much local and national interest as expected, the State Fair will make it an annual event. But fairgoers shouldn't expect anything unusual from the race, other than that women are jockeys.



## More Rodeo Action in 1992

New Mexicans love their rodeo, and this year they'll get more than ever.

The New Mexico State Fair's ever popular PRCA Rodeos and accompanying rockin' country concerts have been given three extra nights of action in 1992. That's 15 nights of rough and tumble entertainment running Sept. 11-12, 14-26.

The New Mexico State Fair Rodeo is also a favorite with nationally ranked cowboys. There's only one other big money rodeo between New Mexico and the National Finals held in December. Since the world champion standings are determined by total prize money won, the \$160,000+ payoff at the NMSF Rodeo attracts a lot of attention.

This year's State Fair Rodeo is sponsored by Wrangler/Western Warehouse, KOB-TV 4, KRST-FM and Bailey Hats along with Bullseye Barbecue Sauce, Copenhagen/Skoal and the Albuquerque Area Ford Dealers.

For die hard rodeo fans, the participant list for the New Mexico State Fair Rodeo reads like a familiar group of World Champions. For those not as familiar with the Cowboy Sport, here are some people to keep an eye on:

World Champion All-Around Cowboy Ty Murray, who won the title for the third straight year in 1991. In 1988, Ty was the PRCA Rookie of the Year, and in 1989 he was the youngest-ever All-Around World Champion. To top that, in 1990 he became the first cowboy to win over \$200,000 in a single season.

The All-Around title goes to the rodeo athlete who wins the most prize money in a single year in two or more events. The past two years, Ty Murray has qualified for the national finals in all three roughstock events: Saddle Bronc Riding, Bareback Riding and Bull Riding. He'll ride all three on two separate nights at the Fair Rodeo.

Murray's superstar status in the rodeo world hasn't affected his personable attitude. "If someone thinks enough of me to take the time to walk over to me, out of their way, and wait in line to get my autograph, I'm going to take the time to meet them and find out where they're from and something about them."

New Mexico rodeo fans have been hearing about Clayton native Charmayne James Rodman for the past eight years. That's how many times in a row she has won the title of Women's Pro Rodeo Association World Champion Barrel Racer. Her dominance of the sport began in 1984 when she was just 14 years old. Since then she has won more than \$1,100,000.

Charmayne is quick to give much of the credit for her success to her award winning partner: her horse, Scamper. "He's one in a million. Scamper is one of those horses who stands out. I doubt there will ever be another horse like him." Scamper is a multiple winner of the WPRA Horse With Most Heart Award.

Some other cowboys you'll definitely want to watch include Robert Etbauer and his brothers Billy and Dan. The brothers finished first, second and fifth respectively in the World Saddle Bronc Riding Championship standings in 1991.

Others you'll want to watch out for are Bareback Riding World Champion Clint Corey and Tuff Hedeman, the current World Champion of Bull Riding.

For fans of the timed events, the lineup is no less impressive. World Champions Ote Berry (Steer Wrestling), Fred Whitfield (Calf Roping), and Bob Harris and Tee Woolman (Team Roping) should all have impressive times at the New Mexico State Fair Rodeo this year.

The Villa hosts a Senior Citizens Day with a polka contest and prizes for the best dancers. A festive and colorful array of costumes and dance styles highlighted by traditional folklorico, Spanish Flamenco and contemporary latin dancing will be performed daily in the Hispana gazebo.

During the final week of the Fair, Villa Hispana will celebrate New Mexico/Hispano Music Association Day by promoting and showcasing the roots and different styles of music in New Mexico. One highlight will be a giant production number tracing the evolution of New Mexican and Hispanic music, on the final day of the Fair.

### Indian Village

Put Indian Village at the top of your State Fair ticket again in 1992. This colorful tribute to the Native American cultures of New Mexico and the Southwest grows in scope and popularity each year.

More than 20 classes of competitive dancing are scheduled, including toddlers showing off newly learned dance steps, and seasoned

Major village events include the Team Dance Contest, the Pow Wow Contest, Sept. 17-19, the Navajo Song and Dance Contest, Sept. 26, and the Miss Indian New Mexico Pageant.

Daily demonstrations by silversmiths, potters and weavers vie for attention from the crowds. Jewelry, paintings, leather goods, weavings, bead work and other craft offerings are available for sale in the Village.

Nor do the hungry suffer at Indian Village. This is the home of Fry Bread, one of the all-time favorite State Fair concessions. Also available are posole, Navajo Tacos and complete dinners.

### Something to Grow About



## BIG BROTHER IS ALIVE AND WELL.

In the world envisioned in George Orwell's 1984, "war is peace," "freedom is slavery," and "ignorance is strength."

Now, in true Big Brother fashion, the seven regional Bell telephone companies are trying to foist a 1992 version of double speak on the American public—"monopoly is competition."

The \$80 billion Bell monopolies are no longer satisfied controlling the telephone wires that go into our homes. They want to own and control the news, entertainment, medical, financial and sports information services that flows over these wires.

But as George Orwell would warn us, whoever controls the telephone wires may well control access to American minds.

That's why, until recently, the Bells were barred from providing information services over their monopoly-controlled wires.

But the Bells spent the past seven years and millions of dollars getting this ban lifted. Now they want Congress to vote against HR 5096 (the Brooks Bill). This bill would delay Bell entry into the information services business in their own regions until the Bells no longer hold a monopoly over local phone service.

The Bells' response to HR 5096? More double speak.

**DOUBLE SPEAK:** The Bells claim their entry into the information services business will be good for competition.

**PLAIN SPEAK:** This is absurd. How can a monopoly be good for competition? The truth is, the Bells will use their position as a monopoly to drive competitors out of business. How? They will make it difficult-if not impossible-for competitors to use Bell wires to enter your home. They could even undercut competitors' prices by inflating local phone bills to finance the cost of their own new information services. In short, they will do everything they can to ensure that there is only one supplier of information services-them. And that will let the Bells dictate exactly what information you receive.

**DOUBLE SPEAK:** The Bells claim they are regulated and could not abuse their monopoly position.

**PLAIN SPEAK:** There are not enough regulators in the world to control the monopolistic practices of the Bells. Just look at the record-every single one of the seven Bell companies has already abused its position as a regulated monopoly. There's no reason to believe they won't in the future.

**DOUBLE SPEAK:** The Bells claim they will usher in a new era of information services.
