Real estate sales up 19%

Real estate sales in Ruidoso totaled \$52,428,943 this year for an increase of 19 percent over last year's \$44,052,197.

That big increase — 805 sales this year compared to 672 last year — didn't just happen, and the Realtors who made those sales got together Friday to celebrate this successful year.

Gary Lynch of Gary Lynch Realty took two of the three top awards for the second year in a row.

Lynch is both Salesperson of the Year and Hustler of the Year for 1992. It's his second consecutive year to make the most sales (measured in dollars), and his fourth year in a row to win the Hustler of the Year for the most

real estate transactions.

Winning the Hustler of the Year award is the result of a great deal

of hard work because that's the title given to the one Realtor who has the most transactions (number of listings and sales) for the year.

Nobody seems sure what the Pink Crane award means, but former recipients Crane, Bill Pippin and Gary Lynch were pleased to pass it on to Siddens.





Roads prompt police calls

Reporting icy road conditions has been a bigger problem than the icy roads themselves, according to Ruidoso Police Chief Dick Swenor.

Swenor said Thursday morning, that outside of pulling a few cars out of a ditch, the major problem is reporting road conditions to the 200 to 300 calls per shift.

"We have a heavy service load of phone calls that nearly reaches 24 hours a day," Swenor said.

"People need rides to work on a late shift, only to slow down in the middle morning hours, but right

now (8:30 a.m.) it's picked up tremendously."

Swenor said he has had to pull a patrolman off the road to help handle all the calls.

Swenor said traffic in Ruidoso dwindled to "nearly nothing in the early evening" Wednesday.

The weather in Ruidoso was beautiful for most of Wednesday with plenty of sunshine. According to Swenor, when a snowstorm quickly moves into the area, it catches people by surprise and that is when we get a heavy load of

calls, either local or people from out of town wanting to know if they can get to Ruidoso.

He said all Ruidoso schools and buses were delayed by two hours.

Ruidoso Downs dispatchers said there were no accidents to report for their area.

According dispatchers at the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department and Ruidoso Downs Police Department, they were unaware of any accidents as of early Thursday morning.

County files suit to stop land swap

The Lincoln County Commission filed suit Wednesday against Interior Secretary Manuel Lujan, the Bureau of Land Management and the Lincoln Valley Land Company, asking the court for an injunction to stop the Rio Bonito land swap.

County Manager Andy Wynham said no date has been set for a hearing. The county expects fairly rapid action since the bureau (BLM) already has moved on the exchange of the first 400 acres of a 1,115-acre package. Four parcels have been offered by the land company to the BLM in exchange for 36,000 acres of federal property elsewhere in the state.

Also named as defendants were Larry Woodard, state BLM director, and Leslie Cone, Roswell District BLM manager.

Ron Green, one of the principals in the land company which first proposed the exchange to the bureau (BLM), has been served with a notice of the suit, Wynham said.

"But I'm not sure if all of the federal officials have been served. That has to be done first," he said.

While the suit was filed in the Twelfth Judicial District, Judge Richard A. Parsons may not hear the case in Carrizozo.

"We tried to get it in one of the courts in Alamogordo because we had reason to believe that Parsons might be uncomfortable with the jurisdiction and would have no problem recusing (withdrawing) himself from the case," Wynham said.

Contacted at his home in Roswell, Green declined to comment on the suit and reports that he intended to countersue the county for interfering with his civil rights. He referred all questions to his attorney, Bill Lutz in Las Cruces.

Lutz said Monday he hadn't had time to review the case in depth, but that it appeared the county's dispute was with the BLM, more than the land company. He said it's likely the suit will be kicked up into federal court since federal officials are being sued.

"My client's big concern is the effect this suit may have on the rights of private land owners to dispose of their property as they choose," Lutz said.

Land company representatives first proposed

the exchange of up to 5,000 acres near the historic settlement of Lincoln two years ago.

Under the proposal, the BLM would acquire the Rio Bonito property in a swap for 36,000 acres of isolated and hard-to-manage federal land in other counties.

The commission strongly opposed the swap unless the BLM consented to a list of eight concessions and to the disposal back into private hands of 35,000 acres of federal property inside Lincoln County's boundaries. Commissioners contend the federal government damages the tax base of the county when private land is removed from the tax rolls.

The BLM had signed off on all the required items, except the commission's insistence that the 35,000 acres inside the county be sold or traded concurrently with the Rio Bonito swap.

According to Cone, three of the four Rio Bonito parcels are tied up in court as part of a dispute with the original owner. But the fourth parcel was free and clear and the agency proceeded with that swap two weeks ago. Lutz said issues regarding that parcel are moot.

BLM officials have stated repeatedly that

IRS holding extra cash for some New Mexicans

The IRS wants to hear from 373 New Mexican Taxpayers who have not received their 1991 tax refund checks. Among them, they are due total of over \$130,500. Check amounts range from under \$2 to over \$9,000.

Each year, the post office

returns checks to the IRS because the names or addresses on the checks are incorrect or the taxpayers have moved and did not give the IRS a new address.

There is no charge to claim these refunds. The claim form is available by calling the IRS' tollfree number 1-800-829-1040.

The U.S. Postal Inspector has warned people to beware of people offering to assist in securing these tax refunds, but charging for the assistance. They simply supply one with the claim form that the IRS would provide free.

Smaller Lincoln county historic board may endanger certified local government status

A proposal to reduce the number of members on the Lincoln Historic Preservation Board could endanger Lincoln County's designation as a certified local government.

Holding onto that title keeps the county in a more favorable position from the state's view for financial support for history-related and cultural projects.

County commissioners are scheduled Tuesday to consider reducing the board's size. The regular monthly meeting will begin at 9 a.m. in the commission room of the county courthouse in Carrizozo. The ordinance amendment is scheduled for 11 a.m.

Action on the reduction has been held up several months while the commission waited for a list of other proposed changes in the ordinance from the preservation board. Commissioners decided to go ahead with the one item and not

wait for the suggestions from the preservation board.

However, Robert L. Hart, certified local government (CLG) coordinator, said that when he heard the discussion about downsizing the board at its December meeting, he contacted Ed Boles of the Historic Preservation Division of the Office of Cultural Affairs in Santa Fe. Boles is the designated coordinator for the state.

Hart said Boles requested a copy of the proposed amendment. His initial interpretation was that unless the proposed smaller board included two experts, passage of the amendment would terminate CLG status. If ex-officio experts are appointed to the board, but lack a vote, the situation would fail to satisfy state rules, he said.

Hart said he's planning to attend the meeting Tuesday to pro-

vide any other information the commission may need.

Other items on the commission include:

—a proposal from jail administrator Wayland Hill to lower the charge for housing inmates from other jurisdictions.

Hill said because of the current high rates, entities such as Camp Sierra Blanca, Ruidoso Downs Police Department, Capitan, Carrizozo, Cloudcroft, Tularosa and Otero County have stopped housing their inmates in the county jail in Carrizozo.

"We feel if we reduce our cost down to \$45 a day, the organizations will continue to house their inmates with us again," Hill wrote in a letter to the commission.

"Also, after conversation with administrator Norman Mick from Otero County Detention Center, he

advised that he would charge us the same rate that we charge them for holding inmates."

—consideration of a resolution for approval of the Department of Finance and Administration to purchase used electronic voting machines from Otero County and to participate in the state's revolving fund for acquisition of election voting machines.

—a call for a special commission meeting on Monday, January 4, after the planned new inauguration ceremony for the three new commissioners.

—requests for removal from the county maintenance list of county road (CR) 029 (Spencer Road) and CR-030 (Barham Road), and to open Pinon Road and the north half of Pine Ridge Road, and to vacate the south half of Pine Ridge Road on a request from Bill Jones.

Auditor chides Ruidoso schools for minor accounting problems

Capital improvement money was used improperly for bus repairs and band instrument refurbishing during the Ruidoso school district's 1991-92 fiscal year.

District auditor Terry L. Jones, a certified public accountant, noted that deficiency and four others in his annual audit comments reviewed by the school board last Tuesday.

But board member Ron Hemphill, an accountant himself, said the auditor posted no significant citations on the current report. He said they were very routine types of comments.

Jones wrote that criticisms from the previous year's audit had been corrected by the district, said finance officer Caron Snow.

"We felt very good about that," she said.

Those previous criticisms corrected included inequitable distribution of district money among local financial institutions.

"They are now doing much better in keeping their funds distributed to the various institutions in the proper ratios," Jones wrote.

The district also has initiated procedures to monitor their bus contractors' payments of salaries to their drivers, he said. Jones com-

mented that he found no instances of overpayments for travel in excess of the guidelines established by the Travel and Per Diem Act that were noted in the last audit.

He also found no instances in his tests where merchandise had been returned by staff without the administrative personnel being notified.

Two other citations from the last audit were only partly resolved: the inability of the district to prepare its own annual financial statements and footnotes for inclusion in the annual audit report, and that the amount of activity funds invested was not accounted for on the high school activity fund ledgers as a cash balance.

Jones said the practice of not preparing the financial statements appears to stem from the small size of the district, the small accounting staff and tradition.

"At this point in time, and without an expanded staff, we do not feel the district financial personnel have either the time or the expertise to prepare such a report without considerable assistance from the auditor," Jones wrote. The district staff agreed.

Although the central office in 1991-92 did include investments for non-budgeted activities in their final cash report, Jones suggested

that a separate activity card be maintained for each activity that has its own investments and that those investments be included on the monthly reports filed with the central administration office.

Management concurred.

CURRENT COMMENTS

Use of capital improvement money is restricted to construction projects, refurbishing school buildings, purchasing or improving school grounds and maintenance of public school buildings and grounds, Jones wrote. He found a few instances in 1991-92 where restricted money was directed to other purposes.

"Carelessness may be part of the cause of incorrect payments being made out of restricted funds," Jones wrote. "Sometimes, the administration takes a very broad interpretation of the Senate Bill-9 provisions and includes repairs of equipment as a warranted expenditure."

He recommended SB-9 money no longer be used for repairs to equipment and vehicles.

Jones noted that personnel turnover and lack of training may account for some of the problems he cited that led to possible weaknesses in internal controls and record-keeping during the 1991-92

fiscal year.

In February 1992, the district's payroll clerk left and during the next four months, two other people filled that position.

"Neither of these two employees every fully learned how to handle the duties of their position," Jones wrote. "As a result, the records of the (district) were in a state of disarray for several months."

He noted that bookkeeping personnel need to be more closely supervised until they have mastered their responsibilities. Because district staff members were busy with their own jobs, that didn't occur.

Jones recommended that existing employees be cross-trained to ensure they can fill a void if it occurs. More time should be devoted to training new employees, he said.

Other criticisms included: —dates on invoices frequently preceded the purchase order dates. Jones noted that purchase orders should be issued before the merchandise and invoices are received.

Causes offered by Jones were insufficient training of a new food services director hired that year; purchases that originated outside of the central purchasing office and a remote location that sometimes necessitates deviations from normal routine.

"Good internal control as well as

a reliable encumbrance system require that the central purchasing office be aware of all purchases made and obligations incurred," Jones stated. He recommended that all orders originate through the central purchasing office and that procedures already in place be followed.

—instances where expenditures were classified to wrong accounts. He listed as the apparent cause that the prescribed sequence of procedures for classification review were not followed.

—the district entered into a lease-purchase agreement for band instruments.

Although the lease is cancelable at the end of the year and does not obligate the district money for future years, the end result is after three years, the district will own the instruments. A New Mexico Attorney General's opinion has ruled that lease-purchase agreements are illegal, Jones stated. While noting that Ruidoso had relied on another school district's interpretation of legal ways to enter into such agreements, he recommended refraining from doing so until it is clearly established what types, if any, of lease-purchase agreements are legal.

Snow said the administration still is confident the arrangement is

legal since it does not obligate district money beyond a single fiscal year.

Figures highlighted in the annual audit showed total expenditures for the district's general fund at nearly \$7.9-million and special revenues at \$975,198.

About \$1.66-million was spent on capital projects with a balance of \$2.1-million remaining in that category.

In other business handled Tuesday, the board:

—approved the sale of \$3-million in bonds to cover construction of the new elementary school at White Mountain. The sale will be conducted at 11 a.m. January 12. A board meeting is scheduled for that evening at 7 p.m. in the school library.

—heard a report by Snow about the state task force charged with developing a new document to be known as Standards for Excellence for New Mexico Schools, focusing on how schools should be accountable for defining, addressing and evaluating outcomes for all students. The group is to rethink the state requirements that schools must meet to be accredited and to develop a more concise set of standards based only on those elements known to support student learning.

EDCLC still looking for a quorum to meet

Several directors for the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County met for another discussion session Thursday night, after not quite hitting the quorum mark.

Of the 15 directors of the organization only seven were present for the meeting, but this isn't the first time the EDCLC has had to delay action on items because directors were absent.

The last regular meeting of the group had was October 1. The EDCLC tried twice to meet in November but did not have a quorum for a meeting on November 19 and canceled one planned for November 19.

Directors absent from the meeting were John Van Tussenbroek, Daniel Luera, Joan Bailey, Lee Griffin, Margie Morales, Eileen Lovelace and Ronnie Paulger. Karen Kopp, executive director of the EDCLC, said Paulger, EDCLC president, had a prior commitment for this date when the meeting was rescheduled. She also said director Dick Mound did not attend the meeting because of a miscommunication between herself and Mound.

Although no action could be taken without the full board, Kopp did update the present directors on projects the group is involved in.

She said she sent out packets to 15 hotel corporations to see if any would be interested in building a hotel for the Civic Events Center Complex. She said she will wait three to four weeks before calling to

see if they would like any more information.

Kopp said the Southwestern Public Service Business Quarter dues are up the first of January, but there had been concern at a past meeting that the EDCLC may not be serving the EDCLC's needs. The dues are \$2,000.

With all the communities in its service area participating, the Business Quarter has a budget of about \$74,000 which enables small communities to be represented at four large trade shows and in two direct-mail campaigns.

One example of the county may not have been served by the group is that a business prospect was looking for a place with a small airport. Kopp said Carrizozo would have been perfect, but the Business Quarter representatives didn't know about it.

The next Business Quarter meeting will be in Ruidoso in January, so Kopp said she will take the representatives on a tour of the county to make them familiar with what it has.

Kopp also had a copy of the Business Quarter brochure map, which it is going to reprint, and wanted to know if there were any suggested changes. Director Scott Shafer said he would like to see Carrizozo and Capitan added to the map as well as U.S. Highway 380 from Socorro to Roswell.

"It is important to see a route is there. They (Business Quarter) just need to finish the job and it will enhance what they are trying to do," he said.

The group will discuss its membership in the Business Quarter the next meeting with a quorum.

Kopp also reported on surveys that have been returned from businesses that the EDCLC has helped bring into the community. The information will be used to help put together an information sheet for an upcoming pledge drive for the EDCLC.

She reminded the directors the figures and amounts were provided by the business owners and their employees. Businesses they surveyed were Juma Farms, Lincoln Laminated Logs, Apache Futures, Richards Puzzles and Warp Speed.

According to the survey answers, total property purchased by the businesses was \$2,611,600 while property rented and leased was \$78,460. The businesses spent \$317,460 on vehicles.

In services the five spent \$26,875 on accounting services and \$147,698 on insurance. Money spent for legal services was \$44,800 and for business advertising it was \$10,500. About \$41,200 was spent at travel agencies. Of their employees, 13 used medical services, eight dental and 16 banking.

The approximate annual total gross receipts was \$3,755,000 and the annual approximate payroll is \$1,145,000, according to the survey responses.

Packets will be put together to give to individuals in each industry in the county to show the impact these businesses have had on the area, Kopp said.

Shafer asked if the information

could also be broken down by communities so each community could also see the impact. That way a prospective new member could see that the new businesses brought a certain amount of real estate or brought kids into the school district, he said.


Kopp said they didn't do it by communities because the goal was to make it as easy as possible for the business owners and employees to fill out.

The group will be considering how to make the information most effective when they present it to the prospective businesses. Director Tom Rigby told the group The Ruidoso News is interested in making a presentation to the EDCLC on what it could do to present the information before the group votes on the format.

In other business, Kopp said the EDCLC may want to consider doing direct mailings to a specific industry. She said she has been working with the Small Business Development Center in Roswell to get a list of about 150 coupon processors across the United States.

Most of the work for the direct mailing could be done right out of the EDCLC office with little extra help, she said. The time-consuming work will be in getting the name of the person the mail-out should go to, she said.

Kopp said service, such as a coupon processing, and this one can be done in the mail.

Sewage repair on agenda

Ruidoso Downs trustees will meet at 7 p.m. tonight at the Downs fire station to hear how improvements at the regional waste water treatment plant will effect that village.

Representatives of Molzen and Corbin and Associates will make a presentation at the meeting and be available for questions. Downs trustees voted last month to increase sewage rates at the first of the year to help pay for these needed improvements.

During discussion on the rate increase, Mayor Joe Hayhurst said that it may cost the village more than \$600,000 for the work.

Also on the agenda are monthly department reports and selection of a representative for a regional conservation board.

Council will meet Tuesday

The purchase of Grindstone property for water improvement and two other actions are scheduled for Tuesday, December 15, at a special Ruidoso Village Council meeting.

The meeting starts at 3 p.m., and includes a public hearing on the application for a transfer of a liquor dispenser's license to be used at Bennetts Shur Sav on Mechem Drive.

Resolution 92-35, setting the open meetings for next year, also will receive council vote.

If passed, the Grindstone resolution 92-34 will amend the 1992-93 fiscal budget to reflect an increase of \$450,000 to the supplemental gross receipt tax funds expenditures.

The notice also allows for any other business that may come before the governing body Tuesday.

48 dogs and cats are destroyed due to irresponsible pet owners

Tucson, a one-year-old Shetland-Welsh corgi, and Sprite, a Brussels griffon, were lucky Friday.

They were passed over in the deadly procedure needed to keep the Lincoln County Humane Society animal shelter from becoming too crowded and creating a health hazard.

But they may not be that lucky the next time. And, unfortunately, there will be a next time, and a next time.

Shelter manager Randy Basch put it off as long as he could, but when space runs out at the shelter he has to make sad choices.

Last Friday, litters of puppies were sharing single kennels, too many adult dogs were doubled up and the outside and quarantine cages were full.

Basch was forced to destroy 48 animals, mostly puppies. Besides the personal anguish connected to performing the task, Basch said it always is difficult to reconcile in his mind that taking a young pup's life is a humane solution to the pet over-population problem.

Spaying and neutering of pets is a more humane approach, one the society has been promoting for years, he said.

With Basch and society officers leading the way, the Ruidoso Village Council was persuaded earlier this year to institute a mandatory spay and neuter ordinance, carving a prestigious place in animal rights history by becoming the second in the nation to do so.

But the society's second time at bat, they hit some trustees in Ruidoso Downs, unfortunately the majority of the board, not willing to discuss alternatives; members who apparently feel comfortable with the scene at the shelter Friday.

That scene consisted of dozens of plastic bags filled with the bodies of dead dogs and cats sitting on the pavement waiting to be transported to a landfill.

The crux of the objections from Mayor Joe Hayhurst and councilors Judy Miller and Charlotte Craig appeared to be they didn't feel it was right to tell someone what to do with their pets, their property.

Basch noted that argument, if valid, would mean the state has no right to require certain building standards, villages have no right to insist that contractors clean up debris or to take action against people who decide to dump junk cars on the roadsides. Taken to an extreme, this attitude of not wanting to tell people what to do, would

mean society could no longer tell someone not to burn down their house even if it endangered a neighbor or a national forest.

Rules need to be imposed because without them, some people would have no regard for other people's rights, Basch said.

Society members are hoping that Lincoln County commissioners and other village councils in the county will be more receptive when approached with a proposed spay and neuter ordinance. They hope those members will be more interested in saving taxpayers' dollars by forcing owners of pets to be responsible.

Even if elected officials are not great backers of animal rights, they should be aware that with fewer unwanted litters born, fewer dogs would be running loose, impounding officers' expenses would drop and much less would be spent on shelter upkeep and on euthanasia, Basch pointed out.

The ordinance, versions of which are now in place in six counties or cities nationwide with on-going campaigns for dozens more, protects breeders, multiple pet owners, veterinarians and even the occasional owner who is willing to pay more just to keep a pet fertile.

Enforcement locally of the spay and neuter ordinance falls mostly

Downs councilors didn't think should be told what to do with their pets or should be held responsible for contributing to the pet over-population problem?

Enforcement has not been intrusive. Responsible pet owners probably will never come up against the ordinance's provisions because they license their animals, they give them shots against rabies and most, aware of the staggering numbers of animals that are destroyed each year, sterilize their pets.

Those owners benefit financially in the long run because licenses for sterilized animals cost less and their pets usually suffer fewer health problems, Basch said.

LOOKING FOR LOVE

Shy and wary of strangers, Tucson laid dependently in his cage for days after being abandoned at the shelter by his former owners.

The rust-color, low-to-the-ground male dog had a difficult time figuring out why he's been tossed away.

However, in the last two weeks Tucson has warmed up to shelter workers and to most visitors.

"He's sweet and affectionate," Basch said. "He's somewhat subdued with newcomers and can be particular. His tail may wag for one, but he may back away and become defensive with others."

Tucson is housebroken, but would need to be spayed.

Sprite and her brother, Puck, were picked up by animal control running loose with their mother.

"The owner told me he didn't want to fool with the two pups, give

them shots and everything," Basch said.

"They're about seven months old and straw color."

"They haven't been handled a whole lot. The female is out-going. The male is reluctant. He acts as if he's going to be struck when you move toward him, but once he realizes that's not the case, he's happy and playful."

Griffons are lively, curious and intelligent, a great companion dog that loudly will defend a home. With long, hard and disheveled hair, they are great mouse hunters and usually do not weigh more than 6 1/2 to 10 pounds.

Because they are pups, Sprite and Puck may be adopted for a deposit of \$20, with the full payment due within 60 days.

The shelter will be the focus of a special Christmas adopt-a-pet radio program on Monday, December 21.

From 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., KBUY announcer D. Maury Brown will broadcast "Santa Claws and Paws" from the shelter on Gavilan Road. All pets will be sponsored for spaying and neutering, will receive a free grooming from Hondo Valley Kennels and a free check-up from participating area veterinarians.

Free leashes and an adoption kit also will go with each adopted pet.

"I was happy that we improved through the entire tourney, especially over the first performance," he said.

Davis said the girls have a ways to go yet and they are now aiming to be prepared for districts. He said they are not happy about losing these games but hope to play past that and win a few games down the road.

were downed again in the third and fourth quarters.

Leading scorer for the young team was Jessica Dixon with 12 points. Joree Muniz scored eight, while Meghann Valliant had four. Maya Mascarenaz picked up three. Angela Simms, Vada Stillwell and Nancy Palmer each scored two points.

The next game for the C-team will be here on January 5, followed by a game on January 7. The varsity will also play on January 7.

Davis said he has not heard yet whether the cancelled Tularosa game will be rescheduled or not. The girls would like another shot at the Wildcats to revenge the loss in the first game of the season.

Christmas traditions bring back memories

El Nacimiento (The Nativity Scene)

Among the features of the Christmas celebration handed down to us from the early Spanish pioneers of New Mexico is the "Nacimiento" or Nativity scene.

These took many forms, all reflecting the great gifts of early Spanish for creating works of great charm and originality out of whatever they found in their new home where everything was still new and strange, and yet full of interest and new wonders yet to be discovered.

One form was the replica of a stable made of large poles and a roof. Under this on Christmas Eve were live figures representing Joseph, Mary and the Christ Child.

Completing the representation of a stable were the burro, ox, sheep, goat or other animals — including the rooster. The scene would be lighted by homemade lanterns of sticks of pine pitch or a small fire.


Sometimes a cave would be carved out of a clay bank by the wayside, and inside were the human and animal figures about half natural size, carved out of wood and painted. This would be lighted also by a small fire at the mouth of the cave, or torches of pitch pine. Travelers on Christmas Eve would know that there was a Village somewhere near by.

And even of it were too late to arrive at church, the travelers would camp out for the night, celebrating Christmas Eve at this Nacimiento.

Often times the figures would be molded in clay and placed in a small rock cave in a cliff near the road or trail, and here in the early night the sacred little group could be seen lighted by a candle placed at the back of the cave, to be out of the wind.

A Special Nacimiento

Years ago, in 1950, our mother, Elfego

Palaco and I were preparing Saint Anne's Chapel for Christmas.

Mother had some small figurines of Joseph, Mary and the Christ Child which she had treasured for years, which she placed in the church at Christmas time.

When Elfego saw these he said, to mother: "I will make you a Nacimiento for these little figures so that every Christmas Joseph, Mary and El Niño Jesus (The Christ Child) will have a home of Christmas."

A few days later Elfego brought to the church a little arch-roofed shelter of small cedar branches fashioned together with a square wooden floor. The front of the little shelter was open, and the three sacred figures were lighted by a small electric bulb which serves as a star — lighting up the inside.

Then Elfego said, "Now you must find some animals to go with these figures, a cow, burro, sheep or goat. Because these creatures are sacred in the eyes of God. They welcomed Mary, Joseph and El Niño Jesus into their home after the people had turned them away. They warmed the Christ child with their breath while he lay in his bed of straw in the manger."

"And be sure to have a rooster with these other creatures, because the Rooster announced the birth of Our lord on Christmas Eve by singing Christo Navio."

Christo Nacio (Christ is born Christ is born)

Elfego taught me how to make this little cedar Nacimiento. And every Christmas now for 36 years as I place the little figures inside, I send up a prayer of thanks to God for this faithful friend, and he and our mother visit me from Heaven, along with all his loved ones and mine.

The Christmas Rabbit

This is being sent to you just a little after high noon of December 10. Out south of the house the snow is shining and sparkling under a blue sky. The sun bears down with all its might, and the show stays on the ground, a stubborn December snow that loves the land — a valuable snow that is slow to melt away, a great blessing to Mother earth.

Right now the house in the sunny splits the snow has melted a little, and a few of the summer birds have returned after hiding out from the storm, gathering at the drinking rocks — the dove, the scrub jay, the Pinon jay, the House Finch.

Joining them now is a young cottontail rabbit, who has been showing up at the feeding stations everyday the snow birds, even during the blizzard and deep snow. I have a little alfalfa hay for him near the bird feeding tables.

The birds let him eat some of their grub. Little Cristy, the Christmas Rabbit, loves the cold weather, and is a great favorite among the creatures at the Storm Ranch.

Let us "Rejoice and be exceeding glad" as the day of the birth of our Infant Saviour draws ever near.

And let us keep looking for those who need help in having a Merry Christmas.



Course offered to help families

Whether it be divorce, separation or single parents getting new boy- or girlfriends, the number of children being seriously affected by transitions in their family's dynamics is increasing.

Teachers need to learn how to effectively interact with children going through the stresses and traumas of family transition.

Families in Transition: Kids At-Risk is a two-day graduate class offered through University of New Mexico Continuing Education and Region IX-Drug-Free Schools and Communities.

The course will be from 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. on January 14 and 15, at the Ruidoso High School public meeting room. Instructor for the course is Hank Cellini, Ph.D.

The cost for the course is \$35 for one-hour credit or free for non-credit. A minimum of 20 participants is required before this class will be offered for credit.

For more information call Kathy Echols or Vicky Hesel at 257-2368.

This course will provide a current perspective on issues, theories, research and actions related to fam-

ily dynamics and family functioning, says a news release on the class.

Teachers are having more students who have personal problems related directly to the transitions that their families are going through.

The release states the class will be a skills-based workshop designed to provide educators with information to counter some persistent myths on family transitions. It will address successful techniques to aid a child in his or her interaction with other students. It will also discuss why the relationship that a teacher has with a student can help or hinder the overall transition time that a student is encountering.

The students will be involved in small and large group discussions along with various types of simulation activities. The simulations will include how to's on teaching coping skills to instructors to work more effectively with youth. Selected videos and overheads will be shown and reviewed.

According to the release, the students will be evaluated on their ability to successfully pass a test completed at the end of the class. An essay and short answer test will be given to evaluate the participants.

In addition a paper will be required that will assess the students thoughts on the best methods of working with traumatized children in the classroom.

Objectives for the course will be to become familiar with blended families, learn the effects of divorce and separation on children, learn some strategies that teachers can use to interact with children in transition and be exposed to ways to increase a child's interaction with his or her classmates.

Students also will be conversant in the coping skills that can be used to enhance class room behavior and relationships, be aware of the need for a positive relationship between a parent and child and understand how to implement programs designed to enhance family functioning, the release says.

Christian School raises funds

Ruidoso Christian School students raised \$855.70 in the recent mini march to benefit the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

"We had a tremendous turnout," said Curt Lathan, chairperson of the event.

"The money raised for the Foundation is indicative of the willingness of the people here to help others."

In a news release, Lathan thanked all the participants and volunteers who took part in the

event and contributed to its success.

The money raised by the mini march will help buy the scientific knowledge which will cure Cystic Fibrosis (CF), the number-one genetic killer of children and young adults in this country, according to the release.

In 1989 scientists discovered the gene which causes cystic fibrosis.

In 1990, researchers were able to correct CF cells in laboratory dishes.

1993 holds the promise of more

groundbreaking research as science continues to move forward, continues the release.

Funds raised by concerned groups, such as the Ruidoso Christian School, are accelerating the pace of medical breakthroughs, and bringing researchers closer to making the dream of a cure a reality for the 30,000 people with cystic fibrosis.

This newspaper and most other publications use editorials to interpret opinions and beliefs on various subjects and issues. The opinions of this and other newspapers are not necessarily meant to reflect a consensus or majority opinion, but simply that of the publisher and editorial board. Newspapers might even find themselves promoting a minority opinion because of a belief that it's right, moral, ethical or simply better. For instance, the many newspapers that endorsed George Bush were editorializing on what they believe is right, not trying to predict the winner.

But sometimes, like last Thursday, an editorial strikes a loud chord of agreement that prompts many comments and telephone calls. We heard from lots of people who agreed that the "Christmas palettes" miss the mark as holiday decorations.

Besides voicing agreement that the wooden disks sticking off the sides of poles along Sudderth Drive do not add to the holiday beauty of the village, most callers and commenters had one word to say: "LIGHTS!"



So, here's the deal: the village just approved \$300 to pay for storage on the wooden palettes. We suggest storing them in a village facility, like at the Street Department where we saw some available storage areas on Friday, or at the Purchasing Department warehouse. This village owns plenty of buildings, and has no business throwing away \$300 for storage. Let's use that \$300 to purchase Christmas lights.

And, since the council can't resist matching tax dollars, we'll help. If the village will save this \$300, The Ruidoso News will match that amount so the village can start out next Christmas season with at least \$600 to purchase Christmas lights.

Therefore as we turn our minds to Christmas, let us one last time recall and give thanks for the wit and wisdom of Dan Quayle.


The following are a few of the vice president's more distinguished comments, as assembled by his friends in the Democratic party.

New Mexico Perspective

"What It Really Was"

One of New Mexico's close neighbors made history the other day, and in the process voiced some wisdom we ought to ponder.


Wes McKinley is a rancher in Walsh, Colorado, only about 60 miles from the New Mexico line. But for the past two and a half years, he's also been the citizen foreman of the federal grand jury conducting a complex inquiry into environmental and other abuses at the Rocky Flats nuclear weapons plant just northwest of downtown Denver.

McKinley and his fellow jurors were shocked at what they learned in their extraordinarily long and detailed investigation about the illegal acts of both the Department of Energy, which owns Rocky Flats, and the managing company, Rockwell International.

But when the jury wanted to indict both government and company officials, the local U.S. Attorney, a political appointee with no great enthusiasm for the case, refused to act.

So McKinley and 11 other jurors did something never done before in American legal history. On November 18, they wrote a letter to President-elect Bill Clinton, asking for a special prosecutor to investigate the government's own handling of the crimes.

It's a classic story, of course. A great department wallowing in incompetence and moral if not statutory corruption. A rich, well-connected, much-contracted company trying to cover up its poisonous, perhaps murderous blunders at public expense.



And Wes McKinley and his colleagues were classic, too — ordinary Americans who just happened to get an unusual, searing glimpse inside the system.

"It was educational," said McKinley, who drove 300 miles every month from his ranch to do his duty, and who in his old-fashioned patriotism and traditional values might be any one of so many solid folks right here in New Mexico.

But old assumptions — assumptions many still cling to — soon turned to disbelief, horror, disillusion.

"When I finally found out what it really was," McKinley told the press, "I was really embarrassed."

"What it really was" — Wes McKinley's words swept down from Colorado like a bitter north wind, reminding us of so much we don't know, or maybe don't really want to know, here in New Mexico.

If you finally found out what it really was, for instance, you'd be really embarrassed: —At the inner scandal of our state's

Governmental Ethics Task Force, and the rancid revolving door between lobbyists, legislators and big interests they've shamelessly kept open.

—at the way agents for corporations like Phelps-Dodge can't wait to get around to see newly elected members of the New Mexico legislature, and pressure them to "vote right" on all the old concessions.

—at how much money and talent this poor state really has beneath the nepotism, special interest favors and political cronyism that are strangling it.

—at how little U.S. Senator Pete Domenici really does for the low-income folks who vote for him in such large numbers, and how much for his corporate buddies and big contributors.

—at how painfully little is being done, or even thought about, in the all but paralyzed, "if-it-ain't-broke-don't-fix-it" administration of Governor Bruce King.

—at what nasty environmental messes we have with some of our own sacred cows (shades of Rocky Flats) right here in the Land of Enchantment.

All that and much much more. But then these are no thoughts for the holidays. It might only spoil things for the tourists or skiers.

Better let Wes McKinley stay up there in Colorado. If he and his kind come south, they might be too embarrassed even to write a letter to the President.



Inquiring tourists want to know all about New Mexico and Ruidoso area

The increased interest in Ruidoso seems to be a mirror of what is going on at the state level. Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce director Joan Bailey was one of several people from the area to attend the annual Governor's Conference on Tourism in Taos early last week.

Bailey said the conference was excellent and the community of Taos went all out to welcome guests to the meeting. Much of the information presented at the conference had a direct relevance to Ruidoso.

In a report by the state's advertising agent, the Rick Johnson agency, those attending the conference found out the state is up 67 percent on inquiries. Bailey said that is very exciting news, and in looking at the tracking information the inquiries are proportionate to the requests Ruidoso is getting.

"With a chamber committee doing the advertising for the area we can see what the state is doing and complement it," Bailey said.

One way they have done that and will continue to do is to advertise in the New Mexico magazine. Bailey said the Ruidoso area has the

largest presentation in the New Mexico vacation guide.

Another reason the state may be having an increase in inquiries is the performance of people who answer the inquiries at Los Lunas. Bailey said because of their efficiency, there is an almost immediate turn-around in inquiries and response.

One project that may boost the numbers in the future is the New Mexico exhibit at the Smithsonian Institute. Bailey said they got to see a video of the exhibit, which is extremely ambitious. She said it shows the original cultures and then follows through history on how those cultures have been impacted.

"It was a very positive presentation. They have been good to respect these cultures," she said.

Another project that came up in workshops is the two-nation vacation. Bailey said this one is a priority of the department of tourism, and the first signs of it will probably be seen in this part of the state.

Ruidoso has already started working on this with the chamber's

Mexican promotion committee. Bailey said they are already working with Telemundo to promote this area.

Overseas visitors are also on the increase for the state. Bailey said the state has reported an 88 percent increase in people visiting from countries other than Mexico and Canada.

She said Arizona and New Mexico have received a joint grant from the United States Travel and Tourism Association to enhance visitation from Germany. Bailey said one reason Germans like to come to the area is the western heritage. Another good thing about the Germans is that they like to be spontaneous and will get in a car and drive.

Getting involved in tours and tour associations is another commitment on the part of the state. Bailey said this area is also trying to get involved in this aspect of bringing people to the area.

Plan to turn gold next fall

Another chance for Ruidoso to really turn gold during its annual Aspenfest is being offered by the New Mexico State Forestry Division.

Each year, the division distributes seedlings that include aspens, the tree that now splashes golden tones only in small patches throughout Lincoln County.

Local forestry officials have indicated they would be willing to work with civic and any other groups that may want to plant aspens throughout the village and in other suitable areas to create the golden image the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce would like to promote during the yearly October celebration.

Individuals and groups can take advantage of the seedling program, which offers many other types of trees as well.

The state distributes both containerized and bareroot trees and shrubs each year during March and April. Each seedling is about one foot tall.

Under the regular program, purchasers must own at least one acre of land and the trees must be devoted to conservation practices.

Approved uses include windbreaks, erosion control, reforestation, conservation education,

Christmas tree plantations and wildlife plantings.

The state also donates trees from the seedling program to schools. To receive or make a donation, contact any State Forestry office.

Participants interested in bareroot seedlings must purchase a minimum of 50 trees; each individual species only can be sold in groups of 25. Those customers preferring containerized trees must purchase at least 49 trees; each individual species only is sold in groups of 49.

Bareroot species available this season include green ash, skunkbush sumac, native plum, Russian olive, lilac, velvet ash, cottonwood, Lombardy poplar, hackberry and Norway cottonwood.

The price for bareroot stock this year is \$21 for 50 seedlings, \$31.50 for 75 seedlings, \$42 for 100 seedlings. Bareroot orders are shipped directly to the buyer by way of United Parcel Service or can be picked up at State Forestry's Santa Fe nursery.

Containerized seedlings being offered this season include Eastern Red cedar, Afghanistan pine, Austrian pine, Colorado blue spruce, Rocky Mountain juniper, Ponderosa pine, scotch pine, South-

western white pine, white fir, Arizona cypress, piñon pine, aspen, Douglas-fir, Englemann spruce and four-wing saltbush.

The price for containerized stock is \$37 per block of 49. State Forestry delivers these seedlings by semi truck once a year to 16 drop points around the state. Nearby areas served by this seedling express include Roswell, Lovington, Carlsbad, Alamogordo, Las Cruces and Socorro. Orders also may be picked up at the Santa Fe nursery.

State Forestry is mailing out application forms for the 1993 distribution. Landowners who purchased trees last season should receive this form automatically in the next few weeks.

Past participants who don't get an application form by January, and landowners interested in joining the program can contact or drop by their nearest Soil Conservation Service office, county extension office or any U.S. Forest Service supervisor's office to pick up a form.
