

during these Christmas holidays, bringing a mini-economic boom to every segment of the community. Christmas buying was unusually heavy this year. The village's one large department store, Wal-Mart, was packed solid all day long on December 24, and the mid-town merchants had wall to wall purchasers in search of unique gifts.

Texans want to know all about the Ruidoso area

With one of the busiest weeks of the year coming up, Ruidoso is sure to see plenty of visitors ready to celebrate Christmas and the ski season.

If inquiries at the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce from the last few months are an indication of how many people are interested in coming to the area, motels, restaurants and shops should finish the year on a strong note.

Lisa Storey, coordinator of the visitors promotion and services center for the chamber, said the chamber started receiving calls about Christmas in September. In November the chamber answered 30,593 phone calls, compared to 21,065 last year. So far this year's phone calls have been 45.2 percent more than last year.

The number of mailings sent out this year is 101.5 percent more than last year. In November alone, the chamber sent out 18,823 packets of information on the area, twice as many as that month last year. Total activity at the chamber so far this year is 40.8 percent more than last year.

Storey said on the average they

send out 100 packets each day and the staff works hard to get the information out the next day from the inquiry.

She said she has had visitors comment that the reason they came to Ruidoso is because the information came quicker and had more detail than other places they received information from.

For the last two months many of the chamber member motels have been full and look to continue that way through the New Year.

Storey said when the staff gets inquiries on lodging the people are referred to chamber members first and then to non-chamber members. She said there are a few rooms left around, but they have been filling up lodgers' cancellations as quickly as they find out about them.

After Ruidoso fills up, the staff refers the people to Capitan and Lincoln and then on to Tularosa or Carrizozo. Staying in other communities also gives people a chance to see more of the attractions that are in the area, she said.

Many of the people making inquiries about the area are doing so

based on reader response in such publications as the Arizona Republic, the Houston Chronicle, Texas Monthly, New Mexico Magazine and the New Mexico vacation guide.

Storey said they have seen an increase in the number of travel agencies asking for information about the area. She also received a call from a man in England who has a ski publication and had heard about the area.

Texas still leads the way in numbers of inquiries from the United States, although it doesn't represent as big of a percent of those calling as it did last year because more people are calling from other states. The chamber has received inquiries from all 50 states and about 30 foreign countries, including Canada, Panama, Nigeria, the United Kingdom and Mexico.

"I think the increased numbers are due to the aggressive advertising we do and to (chamber executive) Joan (Bailey) and the advertising committee. They really have their act together," Storey said.

Volunteers team up to restore San Patricio Church

Its bright green steeple peeks up above Highway 70, catching at least the glance of any driver traversing between Ruidoso and Roswell.

It needs a new coat of paint and the bell is missing, but it still beckons many people off the highway for another look. About 15 miles out from Ruidoso Downs, the San Patricio church is just a short drive back in history and with a little assistance it will still be there years down the road.

A cemetery curls around the old church with only a narrow driveway up to its door, which is also trimmed in dark green, the symbolic color of St. Patrick.

Weeds have been pulled from around some of the tombstones, while others are still hidden by many summers' growth. Some stones are tall engraved memorials, while others are rocks or chunks of cement marking a spot.

Patches of plaster have fallen off the walls of the church, revealing the grayish-brown abode.

Visitors entering the church are greeted by old wooden floors that lead the eyes and feet to a beauti-

fully refurbished altar. Before reaching the altar, though, people stop to read the white marble tomb of the man who built the church, Ysidro Sisneros who died in 1885.

A small table in the corner has a photo album and a book of stories about the church. The door is always open to visitors to come in to look at the album and if they have any, to write down their memories of the church.

One of the last pictures in the book is of local residents with Teofilo Sisneros, Ysidro's grandson. Teofilo came to the church for a special mass on St. Patrick's Day this year. Almost 50 people filled the church for the event.

Since September 1991 area residents and interested individuals have been cleaning the grounds and trying to repair the old church. Joe Gutierrez started the committee for restoration and is now president of the group.

Gutierrez said the church was built in about 1865 and served not only San Patricio and the valley but also those living around present-day Ruidoso for many years. His cousin, who is 90 years old, is one of many of the older people in the community to attend the church.

He said he wasn't sure when the people stopped using the church.

Sophie Erickson is the treasurer of the group, keeping track of donations and encouraging more to come in. She said they need a lot of ce-

ment, paint and other materials or donations to purchase these items. They also need pews for inside the church and a bell for the steeple.

"We thank all the people who gave us donations, but we need

more to do this," Erickson said.

John Hamilton, Manuel Corona, Cruzcita Corona, Rufino Herrera and his son, Albert, and Rafael Rodela are also members of the restoration committee. Rufino, who

is the most experienced with building, has estimated it will cost \$10,000-\$20,000 to fix the church.

Besides donations, the group would also like to collect stories about the church. If anyone has a story to add to the history or would like to make a donation they should contact Erickson at 653-4434 or write her at H.C.R. Box 200, Hondo 88336.

The group tries to get out to the church as often as possible to clean up the weeds but the winter weather will likely slow them down. Gutierrez said they have plenty of labor lined up once they get the needed supplies.

Hamilton said many times people stop and ask if they know where someone is buried but most of the time they don't because of the number of stones or markers that don't have names on them. Gutierrez and Corona, among others in the community, can point out the graves of relatives.

People also stop by and donate to the restoration because they served as altarboys or attended church there and want to see this piece of history preserved. One per-

Roads to the rural life may be rocky

Living in undeveloped portions of Lincoln County may offer spectacular views of nature, ample privacy and lower taxes, but it often also means poor roads, long drives to buy necessities and no frills.

"That's a decision a person makes when they pick rural living," Commissioner Stirling Spencer said Tuesday during a discussion of road work requested by residents along I-065, which connects the sparsely-settled Arabela to the nearly abandoned Pine Lodge area.

Commissioners told the half dozen residents at the meeting that while the county will do routine maintenance on about three miles of the route, if they want substantial improvement, they need to get help from the Smokey Bear District of the U.S. Forest Service and secure the necessary building material.

Road manager Bill Cupit said the road was washed out during floods last spring. He rebuilt it in

places to give residents a way out of the area, spending at least \$16,000. He should have moved it then to prevent future problems, he said.

"It's four to five feet deeper than the rest of the ground. It's a channel," he said.

Road review chairman Bill Rawlins, during his report to commissioners, said that to do major work on it now could run from \$20,000 to \$50,000, "and the committee doesn't feel that much money should be spent on a low-use road."

Doug Eley, who owns a lodge on the road that he rents for reunions and to other groups, said money invested in the road would be returned to the county in revenues generated by hunters, hikers and others wanting access to the Capitan Mountains.

Sue Croskell and William Welch told commissioners they're building homes on the road and now have trailers there.

"We're not asking for a four-lane road, just to get in and out," Croskell said.

The road would open up thousands of acres to development, Welch and Eley said.

Spencer said that prospect might force him to become "a tree-hugging environmentalist." Giving more access to the public would only be inviting more problems, he said.

Commissioner Monroy Montes said he'd like to see the county help the residents.

"The isolated areas don't get what some of the more urban areas get," he said. "I recommend we go in to keep it passable. I don't believe we can stand by as a local government and let these people have that burden on them."

Even though it connects to a forest road, the forest service won't help at all, Cupit said.

"They turned us down politely, even though the equipment is there," he said. "We'll blade the road, but you can't blade rocks if it floods again."

He's even offered to use county employees to run the forest service equipment to do the job, but the offer was refused, Cupit said.

In another road improvement and maintenance request, commissioners left it up to Cupit to work out when and how much work he can do on Piñon Road in Mesa Verde.

Bill Jones, who is building a home in the subdivision, said five school children will be living there in the 1993-94 school year.

Spencer suggested Jones get with the school district bus contractor to have the road placed on the list of priorities for maintenance.

Cupit said he doesn't see an immediate need for improvement, but would respond if the road appears on the school bus priority list.

"I'm not saying it doesn't need gravel," Cupit said. "It does, but I have another 1,000 that do, too."

The county is under no legal obligation to bring the road up to standards, Rawlins said.

Jones said the road has been a county road for 20 years. Up until now, not enough people lived there

County residents are surprised by new garbage charge

The calls have been tying up the telephone at the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

Irate, distressed and confused county residents are complaining. Somehow they've missed all of the discussions over the past two years ago about the authority taking over collection responsibilities and charging for the service.

Previously, the county commission set aside a specified amount of money each year to pay for a commercial service. Residents have been paying through their taxes. Now they will see a bill every three months.

"Last week we mailed out two flyers to all county residents (outlining the new \$5.25 a month charge and showing the locations of dumpsters)," authority manager Gene Green told board members Monday. The flyers went to 4,200 homeowners.

"They're doing exactly what we predicted," Green said. "We're getting all kinds of phone calls. Some say they can't pay or won't pay. Others say they should be allowed to bury their garbage. A lot of people didn't know it was coming."

Green called for the formation of a variance committee to review requests of residents to opt out of the service. One of the major requirements is that the resident must own 300 contiguous acres of land.

County manager Andy Wynham said he also has received many calls.

It's interesting how people are trying to string together land to come up with 300 acres, he said.

The committee should consist of at least two county representatives since the affected residents live in the unincorporated portions of the county, Wynham said.

"I think they are best suited to prove the legitimacy of a request," he said, noting that some residents had called to say they are not living in the county, even though they have a home here. Others contend that mobile homes on their land are being used for storage.

Wynham also emphasized that as the ordinance now reads, the only grounds for exemption re-

quires the 300 acres. He agreed that there may be other circumstances warranting an exemption, but said the ordinance then needs to be changed to reflect those situations. One example is when a family lives in a remote area and it would help the authority as well as the residents to allow them to bury their own garbage.

"But if we deviate, everyone will hear about it and try to go for the same thing," said vice chairman Ron Wicker, Ruidoso village manager.

Chairman Frank Warth, mayor of Capitan, also noted that if too many variances are granted, the income projected from county collection could drop dramatically. But Green said his initial projections were based on a lower figure than the real number of families in the unincorporated areas of the county.

"We mailed out 4,200 and 3,700 is the number we expect to serve," Green said. "I had estimated 3,000, so if we opt out 500, we'll still be okay. In fact, our financial situation will be better."

The board voted that the first billing should cover four months, December through March.

When member Dave Dale suggested not billing for service in December as a concession to those who were unaware of the change, Wynham pointed out that would short the authority by \$15,000 to \$20,000 in projected revenue for the year.

"If they're upset, they will be next month too," said authority attorney J. Robert Beauvais.

Residents can elect to pay \$63 for a year at a time. Other may decide to pay monthly, although the authority will only bill for a quarter of a year at a time.

Beauvais said the authority needs to set up late charges and to set a time limit passed which a lien may be filed against the property of a customer whose bill is past due.

Warth said the executive committee will discuss the situation and present a recommendation to the board.

The authority initially will use an envelope that contains a bill and a return mail envelope, but eventually may shift to a postcard,

which costs less to mail. It would require some new software programs for the computer.

AUDIT CRITICISM

Audit criticisms of the authority are tied to growing pains more than serious flaws, according to auditor Ron Hemphill.

He reported his findings to the group, noting that a physical inventory list of assets needs to be assembled to ensure control of authority property.

"As you acquire more, this will become even more important," Hemphill said.

In examining documents, he found incomplete records of official board meetings and in some cases, the approved meeting minutes lacked signatures of board officers, he said.

"I think this arose because everyone is new," Hemphill said. The same is true about a lapse in documenting correct procedures for going into executive sessions, which are closed to the public.

State law sets up seven exceptions to the requirement to conduct meetings in public. However, before a public board can move into a closed meeting, the person making the motion must state what is to be discussed, a roll call vote must be taken and when ending the session, a motion must be passed to come out of the session back into the sunshine.

Procurement regulations also were violated early in the life of the authority, Hemphill said.

"Items were purchased without going through procedures," he said. "It took time to get policies established. I feel they are in place now."

The last audit criticism is a common one leveled at small government entities, Hemphill said. Public bodies are required to prepare annual financial statements, but most small entities in the state don't have the staff to handle that chore.

"That has to be a finding, but the bulk of public bodies in New Mexico don't have adequate staff and I don't expect that to change."

Many of the problems stem from the fact that the authority office

manager also is expected to handle bookkeeping and secretarial duties. "She's too busy to keep up with some records," Hemphill said. "That's no reflection on her abilities."

DUMPSTER CLEANING

Turning from the audit report, Green briefed the board on alternatives for steam cleaning and repairing dumpsters.

He plans on taking over maintenance in-house by the beginning of the next fiscal year July 1, Green said. The job of performing repairs currently is handled contractually. He presented several alternatives at varying prices, including buying a building or putting up a metal building where steam cleaning could be performed and a holding tank installed.

"What economic justification can we offer to do it ourselves," Warth asked Green. "Where are we going to save money to pay for the building? This thing is getting high priced. It bothers me."

"We need some justification, otherwise, we're not acting in a prudent manner."

Member Bill Allen said it would be helpful if drivers make sure the dumpsters are empty to prevent build up of items and liquid that could freeze in cold weather.

Green said he needs to spend more time putting together an inventory of dumpsters based on their condition.

Allen then asked whether it would be feasible to wash the dumpster outside in the recycling center yard in Ruidoso Downs.

Green said he hadn't considered that possibility.

"I think that could be an option," he said. "We could pour a concrete slab and install a holding tank, and do the maintenance in the summer time."

Green said he will compile estimated costs on the difference options.

OTHER BUSINESS

In other business, the authority: —heard a report on the joint meeting with Otero last week in

which a contract was approved for the first phase of the landfill with Camp, Dresser & McKee.

Members who attended noted that personality conflicts and a wariness of how negotiators in Alamogordo are proceeding clouded the meeting.

Wicker said he felt the selection of the firm was fair, but the company wasn't his top choice and it wasn't the best suited for the job.

He and Beauvais said they were concerned about the phrasing of the contract.

"It's still a concern to me," Wicker said. "But I saw the votes were there to approve and I believe in the Democratic process. With one phase costing \$140,000, the whole contract could end up costing \$500,000."

"That's almost more than the whole landfill," Warth said.

Beauvais said the argument that the group is in uncharted waters and that's why a flat contract price wasn't possible isn't valid.

"We're in uncharted water only in that 10 local governments are involved," he said. "But landfills basically are all the same, with some site specific aspects. So this idea that this group is doing something on the cutting edge of technology is not true."

Camp Dresser just finished a landfill for McKinley County and is working on others in Albuquerque and Colorado, Beauvais said.

"What I wanted was to negotiate a contract through the submission of a permit (for the landfill to the state), but it was defeated," he said.

The joint authorities in Otero and Lincoln may regret that move, he said. If the time of the first phase of the contract expires before the permit is submitted, the firm will have the group "where it wants us."

By insisting on a 30-day no fault ability to cancel the arrangement with the engineering firm, Beauvais provided a way out for the group if Camp Dresser is not responsive.

Although Otero County Commissioner Richard Zierlein tried to lock in approval of the contract and subsequent phases to the Alamogordo negotiating unit, "we made it clear that anything has to

come back to the boards," Beauvais said.

It is time now to start looking at how to finance the landfill and putting together an preliminary budget, he said.

Although a site about 25 miles south of Alamogordo near Oro Grande is the top choice for a landfill, there is no assurance the group can acquire the land from the state.

Warth noted that efforts to keep consultant Dave Warren "out of the loop" by the Alamogordo negotiating team could be dangerous since Warren is tight with officials in the State Environment Department.

—heard a report from Warth that the authority will receive \$43,680 from a grant being used by the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District to search for regional landfill sites.

The money represents the county's portion and will be used toward the regional landfill it is developing with Otero County instead of the Southeast region.

Since the same engineering company has been employed for both studies, Warth said they must keep a close watch to ensure the company "isn't double dipping on this thing."

—heard that Beauvais will meet to firm up agreement with Roswell to allow the authority to continue to haul garbage to its landfill until the new regional operation in Otero is opened, projected for January 1994.

The contract with Roswell is up for renewal in February. It's possible that the fee for dumping garbage will be increased since Lincoln will not be joining Roswell in a Southeast regional landfill. If the increase is too high, the county could consider using the Dog Canyon landfill in Otero County temporarily.

—approved 11 holidays for employees, plus a floating holiday.

Absent from the meeting were Ruidoso Downs Mayor Joe Hayhurst, Corona representative Ernest Luyas and Ruidoso Councilor Ron Andrews. Although Bill Schwettmann has not yet been sworn in as county commissioner, he sat in on the meeting.

son driving through from California had served as an altar boy in the 1930s and remembered going through the valley with the priest and stopping at homes to see people.

The group has written letters to the state's restoration of landmarks department and the state historical society for any help possible, but Hamilton said they haven't gotten a response from either group yet.

A number of people have gotten involved by donations and words of encouragement. Some of the people have mentioned it would be nice for the church to serve as a shrine or a pilgrimage destination, Hamilton said. For now, though, they will continue to have an occasional special mass during the year.

One of the many unanswered questions the group of workers have about the church involves the missing bell. Hamilton said the church did have a bell once, and

they had heard it was at the Joyce Ranch near Picacho, which belongs to ABC News reporter Sam Donaldson. He said the foreman at the ranch was going to check into it, but they haven't heard back from him yet.

Another possibility is that the old San Patricio church bell is one of three ornamental ones at St. Jude's Church in San Patricio. Finding out if one of these belongs in the green tower may take as long as the restoration process.

Although the group is not sure when they quit having service in the church, Hamilton said it is likely it was because the area outgrew it. With the cemetery encroaching the little church had nowhere to grow but somewhere else.

Preserving the church and its rich history has become a quest for a few individuals, and with a little help from others in the community they could meet that goal, to make the old San Patricio church a part of the future.

Visitors boost the area's population to 35,000

"This was the safest Christmas holiday we've had that I can remember," said Ruidoso police chief Dick Swenor, but he cautioned that New Year's Day is just around the corner.

Swenor said, outside of a half dozen fender benders and some unscheduled borrowing of firewood,

the village and nearly 35,000 tourists and skiers have weathered the holidays very gracefully, so far.

Swenor said he did have a number of phone calls about the return of brown water coming from household faucets.

Swenor said he informed newcomers that the problem was a vil-

lage saturated with people. He said that all the activity has stirred up sediment in the water pipes and tanks, a problem that the village is aware of and will correct in the future.

The water department has been clearing main pipes for many months trying to fix the problem.

New homes are life and death to pets

Two very classy females, one canine and one feline, are hoping they'll ring in the new year with new owners.

Kia, a 1 1/2 year-old red Doberman, was brought to the Lincoln County Humane Society shelter several months ago by animal control. Cindy Propsner, who assists shelter manager Randy Basch, decided Kia was worth putting in some extra effort. She took her home and taught the dog the basic obedience commands.

"Now she will come on command, sit and stay," Propsner said.

"She's fine with other animals, unless they are aggressive with her. She definitely is the alpha (dominant) female and a good watchdog. She's high spirited, but not a nervous dog."

Kia is spayed, which means her adoption fee will be lower.

"Someone ought to get out here and adopt Kia," Propsner said. "She's a really fine dog."

In the cattery next door, Reeba, a lush-looking black cat with smoke highlights and medium-length hair, also is looking for some positive changes in 1993.

She's about three years old and responds to affection with heavy

purring and lots of rubbing. She gets along well with other cats and would be an attractive and loving addition to a family.

SOLUTIONS

Although Basch uses euthanasia only when he has no other way of reducing the animal load at the shelter or if an animal is ill, the destruction of abandoned animals is a reality at most pounds and shelters around the nation.

After a photograph appeared in The Ruidoso News showing bags containing the bodies of euthanized animals, Basch received several

phone calls. The people who called said there must be another way to handle strays instead of killing them.

"Unfortunately, the only other realistic option is one that many communities and individuals just haven't accepted, the mandatory neutering and spaying of pets to control the population," Basch said.

"One woman who called asked why I couldn't take the animals to another town," he said. "A couple said they had taken puppies to a shelter and the workers told them they were dying to get more puppies."

"I can only tell you from my years in this profession, they were lying. Shelters are overcrowded across the nation."

"I told the woman if she would find any shelter in the nation that wanted more animals, I would be glad to take them there."

"We may be putting 100 to sleep a month in this little community, but in Albuquerque it's 200 a day. They have a full-time staff that does nothing but that. In Las Cruces, it's 800-900 a month and growing."

"It doesn't take a great mathematician to figure you're going to run out of homes very quickly with 15 dogs and 45 cats born for every human being."

"Permanently sheltering an animal is not a humane solution either," Basch said. Space would have to be found for at least 1,200 animals a year locally and those animals would be robbed of one of the essential ingredients in their lives, personal contact with humans.

"They are social animals and depend on people. Interaction with humans is as necessary for their overall health as food and water," he said. "I see it here, even though the animals in our kennels get a lot more extra attention than most. If they stay too long, they become withdrawn, depressed and go off their feed."

"So permanent kenneling and euthanasia are not the solutions. The only one I know of is controlled breeding."

"The whole point of running the photo was that people would object. No one objects to destroying dogs more than me, but it won't stop un-

til people realize it will go on until uncontrolled breeding stops. As long as people think the animals can find homes, they will continue to breed them," Basch said.

"That fact that people can make a suggestion like take them to another town indicates they still don't understand what the problem is and the scope," he said.

"There wasn't a dog in any of those bags that wouldn't have made someone a wonderful pet given the opportunity."

Man accused in cruelty case

When he saw the horse and the pony, their skin shrunk tightly around ribcages, Lincoln County deputy sheriff Charlie LaBelle was angry.

"I went right to where he (the alleged owner) works (in Ruidoso), and asked whether they were his horses. He said yes, and I issued two citations for animal cruelty," LaBelle said. "I told him to be in court at 4 p.m. that day."

Huey Lee, 34, of Capitan showed up on schedule last Friday in the Carrizozo court of Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean.

"He pled no contest, although he told the judge that another man owns the horses, but everyone we talked to said they were his," LaBelle said. "They were on his property in his possession."

Kept in a pasture in Capitan, "the horses were pathetic," LaBelle said. "There was no food or water. If that bad storm predicted for Friday night had hit, they would have died."

Judge Dean imposed a \$530 fine and a sentence of 364 days, but put Lee on probation, providing there are no additional problems with the horses and that Lee complies with conditions outlined by LaBelle. Those conditions include bringing a veterinarian out to treat the horses and to establish a diet for their recovery.

If he fails to comply, Lee could end up serving the time in jail, LaBelle said.

Contacted Wednesday by The Ruidoso News, Lee contended the pony already has recovered.

"The vet was out there (last Monday)," Lee said. "The little pony, we already got him back into shape. He had caught distemper from the mare. It's real contagious."

Lee claimed the mare belongs to man who lives in Hobbs.

The horse was injured on the track and brought to his pasture to recover, Lee said.

"But it was sick. It had distemper and that started the whole thing," he said. "The owner didn't bring no feed or nothing. I'm going to try to get him to pick up the horse and to pay for what we're out."

The case first came to LaBelle's attention when a complaint was relayed by the Lincoln County Humane Society.

Capitan police officer Lance Zink had contacted the state livestock inspector, but offered to take LaBelle out to see the horses.

Once he saw the poor condition of the registered sorrow mare and the spotted pony, he knew he couldn't wait.




Trophies will be award to the champion team, second place and consolation winner. An all-

Then about mid-morning here came Scott, Josh, and his friend Brian Scheffe, and his father, Steve.




Archie Dolan

The Board will meet in regular session at 7:00 p.m. on January 12, 1993, at the Administrative Office of the District, Ruidoso, New Mexico, to take action awarding the Bonds. The Bonds, having been authorized at an election held within the District on November 12, 1991, will be issued in the aggregate amount of \$3,000,000, in denominations of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof, dated February 1, 1993, payable to the registered owner thereof as of the record date at the address appearing on the registration books kept by a bank or trust company located in the State of New Mexico to be named by the Board as registrar and paying agent for the Bonds (the "Registrar/Paying Agent"). The Bonds will be issued in one series and will be numbered from one upwards consecutively as requested by the purchaser and will mature in regular numerical order on August 1 of each year in the amounts as follows:

Bonds maturing on and after August 1, 2003, are subject to redemption prior to maturity at the District's option in one or more units of principal of \$5,000 commencing August 1, 2002, in whole at any time, or in part on any interest payment date, at par and in such order of maturities as the District may determine (and by lot if less than all of the Bonds of any single maturity are redeemed). The Bonds will be issued for the purpose of securing funds for erecting, remodeling, making additions to and furnishing school buildings, and purchasing and improving school grounds. Interest shall be bid in multiples of 1/20th or 1/8th percentum and only one interest rate may be bid for each maturity of the Bonds. A zero interest rate may not be specified and the rate of interest on any bond may not exceed the rate of interest on any other bond by more than two percent (2%) per annum. The maximum interest rate on the Bonds shall not exceed ten percent (10%) per annum and the maximum net effective interest rate shall not exceed ten percent (10%) per annum. Interest on the Bonds shall be evidenced until maturity by only one interest rate per maturity, the first of which shall be payable August 1, 1993, and thereafter on each February 1 and August 1 until maturity. It is permissible to bid a different rate of interest for each different maturity of

the Bonds, but no bid shall specify more than one interest rate for each maturity of Bonds. Except as limited above, there is no limit on the number of different interest rates that may be bid on the Bonds. Only unconditional bids will be considered and each bid, except the bid of the State of New Mexico, if one is received, shall be accompanied by a deposit of not less than 2% of the principal amount of the Bonds, either in cash or by cashier's or treasurer's check of, or by certified check drawn on, a solvent commercial bank or trust company located in the United States payable to the order of the Ruidoso Municipal School District No. 3, which deposit shall be returned if the bid is not accepted. The Board will take action on the Bonds by awarding the Bonds, or rejecting all bids on the Bonds, not later than twenty-four (24) hours after the expiration of the time herein prescribed for the receipt of the bids. If the successful bidder or bidders shall fail or neglect to complete the purchase of the Bonds within 30 days following the acceptance of his bid, or within 10 days after the Bonds are made ready and are offered for delivery, whichever is later, the amount of the deposit relating to the Bonds shall be forfeited to the District, and in that event the Board may accept the bid of the one making the next best bid for the Bonds should such bidder elect to purchase the Bonds on that basis. Delivery of the Bonds will be made to the successful bidder or bidders in Albuquerque, New Mexico on or about February 18, 1992, at the expense of the District or elsewhere with the consent of the purchaser; PROVIDED, HOWEVER, that if, for any reason, delivery of the Bonds cannot be made within 60 days after opening of bids, the successful bidder shall have the right to purchase the Bonds during the next

succeeding 30 days upon the same terms, or at the request of the successful bidder, during the next succeeding 30 days, the good faith deposit will be returned and such bidder shall be relieved of any further obligation. All bids shall specify: (a) the lowest rate of interest and the amount of the premium, if any, at and for which the bidder will purchase the Bonds; or (b) the lowest rate of interest at which the bidder will purchase the Bonds at par. Any bid which specifies split interest rates will not be considered. The right is reserved to waive irregularities in bids except that no bid shall be considered which is received after the time herein prescribed for the opening of bids. Proposals should be enclosed in a sealed envelope marked on the outside "Proposal for Purchase of General Obligation Bonds, Ruidoso Municipal School District No. 3" and addressed to the Board of Education of Ruidoso Municipal School District No. 3, Administrative Office, 200 Horton Circle, Ruidoso, New Mexico 88345. Any bid may be submitted with the intent to qualify the Bonds for municipal bond insurance. If the Bonds are qualified for municipal bond insurance and the successful bidder desires to purchase municipal bond insurance, premium and disclosure costs and expenses associated with acquisition of municipal bond insurance will be the sole responsibility of the successful bidder. The best bid for the Bonds will be determined by deducting the amount of the premium bid, if any, from the total amount of interest which the District would be required to pay from the date of the Bonds to their maturity dates at the interest rate or rates specified in the bid and the Bonds will be awarded on the basis of the lowest net interest cost to the

District. The Bonds will be awarded to the best bidder considering the interest rate or rates specified and the premium offered, if any, and subject to the right of the Board to reject all bids: If there are two or more equal bids at not less than a par and accrued interest which are the best bids received, the Board shall determine which bid is to be accepted. The purchaser must pay accrued interest from the date of the Bonds (February 1, 1993) to the date of delivery. The Bonds will not be sold for less than par and accrued interest nor shall any discount or commission be allowed or paid on the sale of the Bonds. Upon delivery, the deposit of the successful bidder (without accrued interest) will be credited on the purchase price and the balance shall be paid in federal funds. The applicable CUSIP numbers will be printed on the Bonds; provided that an incorrect CUSIP number printed on any Bond or the absence of any CUSIP number on any Bond shall not constitute cause to refuse delivery of the Bonds. The Bonds will constitute the general obligation bonds of the District, and shall be payable from general ad valorem taxes which may be levied against all taxable property within the District without limitation as to rate or amount. The District will prepare a Preliminary Official Statement dated as of December 30, 1992, relating to the Bonds which is deemed by the District to be final as of its date for purposes of allowing bidders to comply with Rule 15c2-12 of the Securities Exchange Commission ("the Rule"), except for the omission of certain information as permitted by the Rule. The Preliminary Official Statement is subject to revision, amendment and completion in a Final Official Statement as defined below. Copies of the Preliminary Official Statement and the bid form may be obtained from the District's Financial Advisor, The Principal/Eppler, Guerin & Turner, Inc., 6201 Uptown Blvd. N.E., Suite 101, Albuquerque, New Mexico 87110-4134, telephone (505) 881-0400. The District will prepare a final Official Statement ("Final Official Statement") as soon as practicable and will provide to the successful bidder 50 copies of the Final Official Statement on or before seven business days following the date of the award to the successful bidder. The Final Official Statement will be dated as of the date for delivery of the Bonds. The District authorizes the successful bidder to distribute the Final Official Statement in connection with the offering of the Bonds. The validity and legality of the Bonds will be approved by Modrall, Sperling, Roehl, Harris & Sisk, P.A., Albuquerque, New Mexico, Bond Counsel, whose approving opinion, together with the printed Bonds and a complete transcript of the legal proceedings, including a certificate stating that no litigation affecting the validity of the Bonds is pending, will be furnished to the purchaser without charge. The delivery of the Bonds is also subject to the approval of the Attorney General of the State of New Mexico. The District will covenant to take all actions which may be required of it for the interest on the Bonds to be and remain excluded from gross income for federal income tax purposes, and not to take any actions which would adversely affect that exclusion, under the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"). The approving legal opinion of Bond Counsel will include an opinion to the effect that

certain foreign corporation doing business in the United States, and a tax imposed on excess net passive income of certain S corporations. Under the Code, the exclusion of interest from gross income for federal income tax purposes can have certain adverse income tax consequences in other respects for certain taxpayers, including among them financial institutions, certain insurance companies, recipients of Social Security and Railroad Retirement benefits, and those that are deemed to incur or continue indebtedness to acquire or carry tax-exempt obligations. The applicability and extent of these other tax consequences will depend upon the particular tax status and other items of income and expense of the owner of the Bonds. Bond Counsel will express no opinion regarding such consequences. The purchaser of the Bonds, by submitting its bid, agrees to provide a certificate including information as to bona fide initial offering prices to the public and sales of the Bonds and a certified determination of yield on the Bonds under the Code, as and at the time requested by the Financial Advisor and Bond Counsel. AUDITS

If you are auditing a class (enrolling for NO CREDIT), be sure to indicate (NC) on the Registration Form. (Example: 3/NC or 1/NC).

WITHDRAWALS

If you are unable to attend the class or classes for which you have registered, please officially withdraw from your class or classes by completing withdrawal slips in the office. Withdrawals are not taken over the phone. The last day to process a class withdrawal will be April 2, 1993.

DROP/ADD

If you are unable to attend the class or classes for which you have registered, but would like to re-schedule into another class on another night or at another time, please make arrangements at Ruidoso Center Office, 1400 Sudderth Drive, 257-2120. The last day to Drop/Add is January 27, 1993.

CANCELED CLASSES

OVERLOADS

COURSE REPEATING

ATTENDANCE

Attendance is required at all sessions for each course for which the student is enrolled. When circumstances make attendance impossible, such absences should be reported to the instructor. Possibilities for makeup work should be discussed with the instructor on an individual basis. No extensions of the vacation periods are given to a student. Non-attendance of classes due to late registration is considered the same as absences incurred after registration.

VETERAN CERTIFICATION

A veteran who is expecting to receive educational benefits should make his or her intentions known in the Ruidoso Center Office and complete the certification forms. If you are enrolled in classes at ENMU-RUIDOSO, you must contact the Certifying Official in the Registrar's Office at the Portales Campus. For those students who are on continuing Veteran Educational benefits, full payment will be required at the time of registration; Unprocessed VA's will be considered for deferred payment with a minimum of 33% down at the time of registration and balance due within 45 days.

Out-of-State: \$54 a credit hour; \$648 maximum total tuition per semester (12 credit hours or more). Non-New Mexico residents enrolled for 6 or fewer credit hours are charged according to in-district or out-of-district residence.

Senior Citizens: \$5 a credit hour. This rate is applied on a space-available basis to New Mexico residents over 62 who are enrolled for 6 or fewer credit hours.

If you do not make immediate payment or payments arrangements, your place in class will be canceled.

Registration will not be accepted from any student with a previous semester financial obligation without prior consent from the Student Affairs Director or Campus Director.

Non-resident students taking six hours or less at any enrollment period will not be charged out-of-state tuition. Tuition and fees are subject to change without notice by the Board of Regents of ENMU.






