An ACT preparation class should be of special benefit to high school seniors seeking college scholarships.





Mescalero tribe takes mext step to host MRS

The Mescalero Apache Tribal Council announced today (Thursday) that it has submitted a letter to Secretary of Energy Hazel O'Leary, acting nuclear waste negotiator, requesting "credible formal discussions" on the siting of a storage facility for used nuclear fuel on the tribe's reservation in South Central New Mexico.

The letter seeks additional funds from the Department of Energy to continue the tribe's studies on the desirability of hosting a Monitored Retrievable Storage facility (MRS) for used fuel from the nation's commercial nuclear power plants. The tribe indicated it is ready to begin discussions with the federal Office of the Nuclear Waste Negotiator on the terms under which it would agree to host the facility.

The Mescalero Apache Tribe was the first community in the nation to respond to an invitation from the U.S. Congress to consider voluntarily hosting an MRS. They have conducted extensive feasibility studies since October 1911, under what is known as Phase 1 and Phase 2-A of the process, which were funded by grants totaling \$300,000.

This week's letter initiates the next step, or Phase 2-B of the study process. Grant funds, up to \$2.,8 million, would pay for extensive en-

Wilderness area bogs down in red tape

How long does it take to create a wilderness area?

When the government is involved, more than 15 years and holding

Paul Happel, outdoor recreation planner from the Roswell district of the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), briefed Lincoln County commissioners Tuesday about the status of the proposed Little Black Peak Wilderness Area.

A combination of 14,904 acres in the Little Black Peak study area and 10,408 acres of the Carrizozo lava flow study area, the proposed wilderness already was approved by the Secretary of the Interior in 1991. It was forwarded to the President, who will submit it to the U.S. Congress, he said.

"And the Congress can hold it as long as they want," Happel said.

The BLM was directed in the mid-1970s to inventory the land it manages to pinpoint possible candidates for wilderness areas.

Scott Shafer of Carrizozo asked if the public is allowed to comment ness. on the need for the lava flow to be designated as a wilderness.

Happel said public comments were accepted in 1980 and 1984, "but I don't foresee any more. You

For the second time in a little more than two years, the juvenile probation officer may have to find new quarters.

The Lincoln County Commission, which is legally required to provide space for the probation service, voted Tuesday to offer to pay about half of the rent being charged by Ruidoso Downs for the service's use of an office at the town hall complex.

Wednesday, county manager Andy Wynham received a response from Mayor Joe Hayhurst.

"He rejected the offer and said the rental arrangement expires on August 27," Wynham told The Ruidoso News.

"This isn't something between the county and Ruidoso Downs," Wynham said. "The juvenile probation office is the issue. Where do they want to be, here in Carrizozo or at the county suboffice in Ruidoso?

"We have to house them, unless owned by the county) and then they have some responsibility."

Juvenile probation officer Jane Parnell said she hasn't been party to the negotiations. Two years ago, she was moved from the county suboffice when county officials contended the building was tight on space.

At that time, state officials said they didn't have money for rent, but they did have money for one- and the state would pay a like time renovations. In a letter to the commission, Hayhurst had requested \$375 a month. The commission, in a 3-2 vote, offered to pay \$187.50.

Commissioners Wilton Howell and Bill Schwettmann voted against the motion, contending the county should pay the full amount, because of its obligation to provide space.

"I haven't heard any of this," Parnell told The News Wednesday. "I knew they had asked the county to pay some rent."

She would move into any office designated by the county, Parnell said.

"But my caseload is here," she added. "Most of my probationers are in Ruidoso and the people who come to see me. They would have to travel to Carrizozo."

'This is a convenient location and a nice place, but it's not crucial," Parnell said. "We kind of go where they put us."

Commissioner Stirling Spencer said he'd prefer to see the sheriff's department move out of the suboffice and consolidate in Carrizozo.

If that idea doesn't work, the commission should take a look at any other entity in the courthouse complex that has the option of using offices somewhere else, he said. Parnell could then be moved into the vacated premises.

"We have one tenant in the complex that rents from us, the magistrate court system. The rest are required," Wynham said. The magistrate operation pays the county \$150 a month and "gets a lot of space for that."

Although commissioners have talked a great deal about renovations or possible expansion at the suboffice, nothing has been done, you.' he said.

'My position on the lease is that we're negotiating with the State of New Mexico, not Ruidoso Downs," Wynham said.

'We provide a wonderful space month, yet the state is making us ump up and pay \$375 a month," Spencer said.

"The law requires we provide space for the probation officer, but not the magistrate judge," Howell said.



Ruidoso council reviews personnel policies

The Ruidoso Village Council zipped through an inch-thick revised personnel manual in its first special workshop on Tuesday to clean up several projects for the village.

A committee of six employees and Village Councilor J.D. James reviewed the manual before submitting a draft for the session. Changes brought up by councilors. during the session will be added before an attorney reviews it for a final council approval in September.

The village is without an attorney at this time, but interviews have begun to contract an attorney.

Personnel director Debbie Rogge presented the major changes to the council, explaining the benefits of each. The manual now includes several policies pertaining to personnel that are currently in force, including the safety manual, the sexual misconduct policy, the police officer progression schedule, the promotional policy and the drug abuse policy.

A disclaimer to protect the village has also been added at the beginning of the manual.

The classification of employees snagged the group for awhile and a final version will have to wait until an attorney is hired to iron it out. Village clerk Tammie Maddox said the state statute contradicts itself because it states the governing body appoints the city clerk and chief of police but under a managerial and merit system, such as Ruidoso has, those two positions report to the village manager.

As stated now in the manual the clerk and chief could be terminated only by the village manager.

As appointed personnel, though, they could only be terminated with the consent of the council. Councilor Frank Cummins said they need to make it clear who can do what concerning these two positions.

The village manager position will be put in a separate classification because that person does serve at the convenience of the village council and can be terminated at any time without cause.

An in-house attorney would also have been considered an appointed position, but the council will now be going to a contract attorney, eliminating that concern. Mayor Jerry Shaw announced to coun-cilors that they will degin interviewing candidates for the contract and hope to have one hired in about a week.

Because of a recent incident with an employee, the probationary period for an added part-time position was hashed out by councilors. Councilor James said after the incident he spoke to village manager Ron Wicker and, although they didn't agree on how it should be handled, it does need to be clarified.

The village has several employees who complete a probationary period in one department and then are offered a part-time position in another department. Currently the person would then go on probation for both positions.

James said the person should be on probation for only the new position. If the new job didn't work out then the person would still have the position he or she had completed the probation for.

Wicker said the current policy is based on looking at similar circumstances. If a person is promoted he or she is also put on probation because it is a change of status.

Mayor Shaw said it is a gray area and does need to be spelled out to be fair to the employees. Several councilors agreed that since it is two separate jobs with separate job descriptions the person should be on probation for just the new position.

Rogge will clarify this policy in the probation section.

A new employee benefit added to the manual is bridging. Under this section a former employee of the village who is rehired can receive

previous sick leave and seniority for vacation accrual after completing the probation period.

Criteria for qualifying for thia would include that the person was a non-probationary employee, was terminated with the village under favorable terms and was rehired within one year from the date of termination.

Wicker said bridging is a good benefit to have for long-time employees who may quit or retire to do something else and then decide they would like to come back to the village. Before bridging they would have had to start over in getting their benefits.

The four regular part-time employees will also be eligible for group health insurance with the village paying half of the portion paid for full-time employees. Rogge said that would be 34 percent for part-time people but the amount needed to cover it is not budgeted.

Shaw and Councilor Cummins said they recalled voting earlier in the year to go up to 75 percent from 68 percent on full-time people because they could not give them a raise at that time. Rogge and village clerk Maddox did not remember the change, but Maddox will review the minutes for that action.

To encourage employees not to abuse sick leave days, the village will pay all unused sick leave up to 300 hours if the employee retires or quits. Full-time employees accrue two hours a pay period or six days per year.

Call back and standby pay was also defined in the manual. Currently workers are not compensated for time they are on call. Longevity pay has also been added for employees.

Also a new criteria for designating employee merit awards will be that the employee will be evaluated against his or her own merits and previous evaluations. In the past department heads did not take the initiative to line out criteria to be met by employees and now Rogge said they will be able to earn the

merit based on their individual improvements.

Wicker pointed out that supervisors went through a training session on employee evaluations last year and will do it again this year. He said they also plan to create a new evaluation form.

Changes were also made in the manual to abide by federal laws including disability leave, which goes beyond what is required by the law. Maternity leave has been changed to parental leave to allow for the father to have time off as well.

Added to the manual were the current police promotion policy, a code of ethics and a moonlighting section, which allows employees to have other jobs as long as they do not conflict with the position at the village.

Although it was not included in the packets councilors previewed on Tuesday, Rogge said she also plans to add the collective bargaining policy to the manual.


Councilors also suggested that the council should have a manual to follow that would include the code of ethics and the drug use policy, although the regulations would be hard to enforce on elected officials. Rogge will go ahead and put together several items for their manual,


Shaw said they will now let an attorney go over the changes in the policy and have it ready for council approval by September.

She said the next workshop session at 9 a.m. Tuesday at village hall will be on the procurement code. The committee working on the code has not completed a review but will bring all of the information it has to the meeting.

Councilor Frank Potter suggested they also review the state statutes on procurement during the session.

The group will continue to have the working meetings each week to examine village problems such as the street department and all aspects of Grindstone Reservoir.





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

The son of Ronas Ryon ran ninth behind winner MD Hammertime in the April 18 futurity, but should come back strongly in Friday's feature. His Graham Farms effort earned \$14,947 for owners Jesus Andrade and Adela Vizcarra. Billys Ryon will be ridden by Charles McMahon.

The Roberts-McMahon combo most recently pulled off an upset victory in the \$99,000 Rainbow Futurity Consolation with I Hear A Symphony on July 24.



Whether it be buying a wheelchair or paying the rent, Horsewomen United is there for support at anytime and will be for years to come.



Street department superintendent Charlie Armstrong said that

months ago.

"We are fairly familiar with the ones that plug up," said Armstrong. "I believe it was flushed out when I first requested it."

On Friday, after the Beattys found two of their cabins had been flooded, they called the street department for help.

"They did come up and they made some stop-gap measures, said Beatty.

According to Briley, crews worked until about midnight to control the flooding. The crews then returned on Monday to replace the old culvert pipe.

"We've changed out the pipe with a new, bigger one," said Armstrong. "Hopefully, that will fix the problem."

"The main part of this is the village had ample time to fix the problem," said Rex Beatty. "This did not happen because it rained hard."

When I asked them to fix it, their answer was that they didn't have time. Now they have the time."

The flooding at the cabins caused about \$2,000 dollars in damage to the rooms, including new carpet for both. But that estimate doesn't begin to cover what the loss will really be for the Beattys.

"It is mainly a loss of income for us," said Beatty.

One of the rooms was salvageable and was cleaned up in about three days. The other one, however, will take about two weeks to repair.

"This is my busiest time of the year," said Beatty. "I rented those cabins 29 of the 81 days in July."

Beatty is asking \$77 per night for the cabin that will be closed.

The Beattys are now considering action against the village to recover the cost of the damage and the loss of income.

"Everybody makes claims against the city," said Briley.

Initially, the subdivider, Properties of the Southwest, intended to request variances, but county manager Andy Wynham said Tuesday the changes would be too significant to be considered as variances.

"A variance is a slight easing of a regulation," he said. "In this case, five-acre lots to not have a central water (and sewer) system would be more than a variance and I couldn't recommend approval.

"I would recommend changing the ordinance to require the central systems only for developments of anything under five acres."

The ordinance now requires those improvements for subdivisions of less than 10-acres lots.

Commissioner Wilton Howell asked about assurances that electric service would be available without huge impact on new residents who might build on the lots.

"That's not up to government," said Commission Chairman Monroy Montes.

"The ordinance now states that The changes will accommodate the developer will provide his own service or that the development must be located ten miles from a dump," Wynham said. "Since we don't allow that or have a landfill, it would prohibit all subdivisions. That needs to be changed."

Commissioners agreed to set a public hearing for the September 6 meeting.

"That will give you time to give this to realtors for comment, before we make changes," Commissioner Bill Schwettmann said. "We need as much public comment as we can get. I hear comments that we're listening to one subdivider."

"Yes, we are responding to one subdivider, but because what he is requesting is reasonable," Wynham said. "What I'm hearing from real estate people is that they are very excited we are willing to do that."

In another issue, Gordon Barham asked the commission to consider hiring a full-time employee to schedule events at the arena and fair building, to deliver and retrieve keys, to handle cleanup duties, to provide security and to dog planned

improvement projects. "We have that legislative money "They will address that in their (\$150,000) coming and when we

start the projects, a representative from the fair board is going to have to keep up with those projects," Barham said. Members of the fair board are volunteers, who operate their own businesses or have other jobs. They already are spread thin with work days at the fairground, but would continue to handle many of the duties surrounding the county property.

Operating the county fair and running the fairground is not a profit-making enterprise, Wynham pointed out.

We shouldn't pretend it will make money," he said. "It's a little rural fairground in the middle of Capitan, New Mexico. It's not going to do it. The decision will be on the county's level of commitment."

"I think the fairground is going to grow to the point that it will either become a burden or a moneymaker for the county," Montes said.

"We started the Smokey Bear Stampede (staged on the Fourth of July weekend) as a money maker to put on the fair, because we don't charge an entrance fee for the fair (which is set for this weekend)," Barham told commissioners. "But it takes a lot to put on a rodeo
