As the sun begins to set in the historic town of Lincoln on Friday, it may seem that the ghosts of those who made it famous have come back to reclaim it.

Billy the Kid, Pat Garrett, John Tunstall and Alexander McSweeney will shoot out the Lincoln County War one more time as area residents stage the annual Last Escape of Billy the Kid Pageant during the Old Lincoln Days festival. The pageant begins with the killing of Tunstall and continues on to Billy's exciting escape.

The performance will be presented at 8:30 p.m. on Friday and Saturday and at 3:30 p.m. on Sunday at the pageant grounds, west of the courthouse.

Admission for the event is \$3 for adults and \$1 for children 14 and under. People may want to get there early for a good seat on the wooden benches.

This year's event will be the 53rd anniversary, but only the 44th consecutive performance because it was interrupted by World War II.

The hard-working cast and crew have been preparing for the performance for the past month and are ready to bring the participants of the Lincoln County War back to life for the weekend.

Playing Billy the Kid this year will be John Shrecengost, while Lanny Maddox will take the role of Pat Garrett. Ron Andrews portrays Robert Olinger and Lee Crandall plays J.W. Bell. Travis Crandall will be John Tunstall. Wayne Ward will step into the shoes of Alexander McSweeney, while his wife, Susan, will be played by

Lightning hits Eagle off tee #8

Lightning struck in the heart of Ruidoso during a storm that covered the area on Tuesday.

The bolt of lightning hit a tree in the yard of Nancy Terry at 101 Eagle Drive just off the number 8 tee at Cree Meadows Country Club at about 2 p.m. Tuesday.

According to witnesses, Terry was sitting in her house when the bolt hit the tree about 10 to 15 feet from the top.

"I heard the explosion and saw a puff of smoke," said neighbor Ken Johnson. "I thought maybe the house was on fire."

Johnson said he ran outside to see if Terry was hurt. She was not injured, but was taken to Lincoln County Medical Center by an EMS team.

According to the EMS, Terry was taken in for evaluation of high blood pressure and stress apparently caused by witnessing the lightning strike. She was quickly released.

That will sure nerve you.

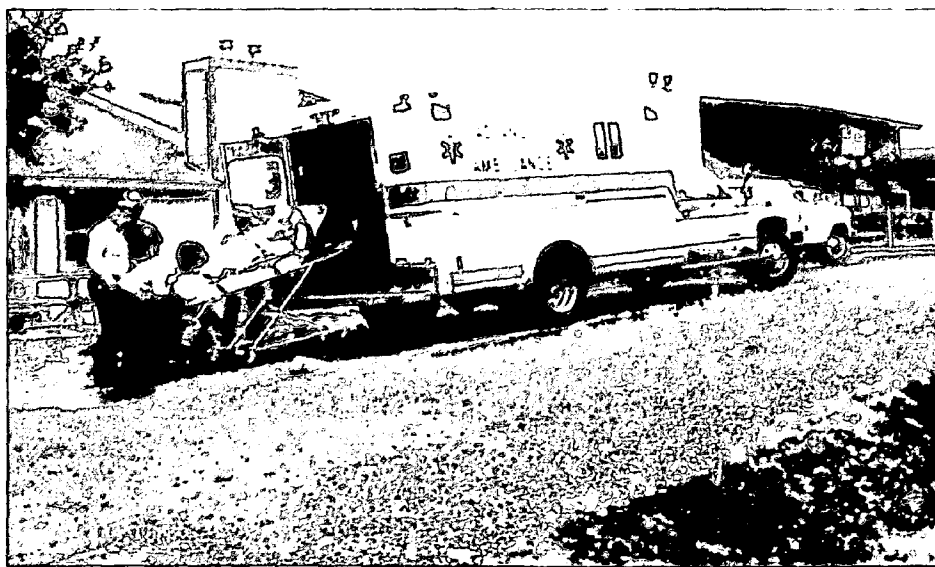
said Johnson. "It was a miracle she was not hurt."

Debris from the explosion flew for about 150 feet spreading bark and wood shards around the neighborhood.

Reynolds, the tree was going to be removed by the Ruidoso street department.

"Trees have been getting hit, said Reynolds. "This is about the third or fourth incident that we have actually been to."

Mescalero tribe takes next step to host MRS

The Mescalero Apache Tribal Council announced today (Thursday) that it has submitted a letter to Secretary of Energy Hazel O'Leary, acting nuclear waste negotiator, requesting "credible formal discussions" on the siting of a storage facility for used nuclear fuel on the tribe's reservation in South Central New Mexico.

The letter seeks additional funds from the Department of Energy to continue the tribe's studies on the desirability of hosting a Monitored Retrievable Storage facility (MRS) for used fuel from the nation's commercial nuclear power plants. The tribe indicated it is ready to begin discussions with the federal Office of the Nuclear Waste Negotiator on the terms under which it would agree to host the facility.

The Mescalero Apache Tribe was the first community in the nation to respond to an invitation from the U.S. Congress to consider voluntarily hosting an MRS. They have conducted extensive feasibility studies since October 1911, under what is known as Phase 1 and Phase 2-A of the process, which were funded by grants totaling \$300,000.

This week's letter initiates the next step, or Phase 2-B of the study process. Grant funds, up to \$2.8 million, would pay for extensive environmental studies and for a public participation process that will involve communities neighboring the reservation.

"We understand our neighbors have an interest in the outcome of this study," said Fred Peso, Mescalero Tribal Council member and MRS project manager.

"We want to involve them in the process and give them access to all of the information the tribe has gathered," continued Peso.

We also want to hear any con-

Wilderness area bogs down in red tape

How long does it take to create a wilderness area?

When the government is involved, more than 15 years and holding.

Paul Happel, outdoor recreation planner from the Roswell district of the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), briefed Lincoln County commissioners Tuesday about the status of the proposed Little Black Peak Wilderness Area.

A combination of 14,904 acres in the Little Black Peak study area and 10,408 acres of the Carrizozo lava flow study area, the proposed wilderness already was approved by the Secretary of the Interior in 1991. It was forwarded to the President, who will submit it to the U.S. Congress, he said.

"And the Congress can hold it as long as they want," Happel said.

The BLM was directed in the mid-1970s to inventory the land it manages to pinpoint possible candidates for wilderness areas.

Scott Shafer of Carrizozo asked if the public is allowed to comment on the need for the lava flow to be designated as a wilderness.

Happel said public comments were accepted in 1980 and 1984, "but I don't foresee any more. You

can always write your Congressman."

You mean there is no allowance for changes in the last 15 years," Commission Chairman Monroy Montes asked Happel.

"No, there isn't, except through your Congressman," he replied.

"As a citizen, I feel left out of the process," Shafer said. "The malpais is a wilderness as created by God, and I don't see a need for the federal government to do anything."

"It's not something the BLM initiated," Happel explained. "Congress said to go out and inventory our land. It met all the criteria."

The lava flow extends north and west of Carrizozo, dissected by U.S. 380. Southeast of the wilderness is Valley of Fires Park, which also is managed by the BLM. Although the park includes only 300 acres, the entire southern flow covers 10,000 and begins about four miles from Carrizozo.

A few blocks of state land totalling about 3,000 acres lie within the designated area and are to be traded to become part of the wilderness.

"Development potential is very low, which is a plus," Happel said. "It's a unique area, very hard to graze, although they had goats out there at one time. It wasn't picked

just for hiking, it's an ecosystem and that's what we were told to look at."

Commissioner Stirling Spencer asked Happel to define the boundary of the wilderness area.

"I've heard it's the lava's edge, but is there a legal description?" Spencer asked. "(Former New Mexico BLM director) Larry Woodard said he would supply a description and never did. I get questions constantly about where is the edge and if there will be a buffer zone."

"We used metes and bounds where we could or the edge of the lava protruding out of the ground, the edge of the main body of the lava flow, not fissure fingers," Happel said.

No buffer zone is planned, he said. The only restriction will be no mechanized devices or motorized vehicles.

"Grazing could still go on and any existing oil and gas operations are grandfathered in, but there is a low potential," Happel said.

"When are they going to fix that treacherous road?" Spencer asked about U.S. 380, which crosses the malpais.

"I know it's a bad road," Happel said. An environmental assessment

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Juvenile Probation Officer could be looking for a new home — again

For the second time in a little more than two years, the juvenile probation officer may have to find new quarters.

The Lincoln County Commission, which is legally required to provide space for the probation service, voted Tuesday to offer to pay about half of the rent being charged by Ruidoso Downs for the service's use of an office at the town hall complex.

Wednesday, county manager Andy Wynham received a response from Mayor Joe Hayhurst.

"He rejected the offer and said the rental arrangement expires on August 27," Wynham told **The Ruidoso News**.

"This isn't something between the county and Ruidoso Downs," Wynham said. "The juvenile probation office is the issue. Where do they want to be, here in Carrizozo or at the county suboffice in Ruidoso?"

"We have to house them, unless they want to pick the place (one not owned by the county) and then they have some responsibility."

Juvenile probation officer Jane Parnell said she hasn't been party to the negotiations. Two years ago, she was moved from the county suboffice when county officials contended the building was tight on space.

At that time, state officials said they didn't have money for rent, but they did have money for one-time renovations. The amount, by coincidence, came to half of the two-year rent for the office in Ruidoso Downs. The county commission paid the other \$4,000.

"That's why I was caught off guard," Wynham said. "We didn't

pay anything last year and it wasn't in the budget. When they called, I didn't know what they were talking about. What we paid was equivalent to what the commission voted to pay Tuesday."

In a letter to the commission, Hayhurst had requested \$375 a month. The commission, in a 3-2 vote, offered to pay \$187.50.

Commissioners Wilton Howell and Bill Schwettmann voted against the motion, contending the county should pay the full amount, because of its obligation to provide space.

"I haven't heard any of this," Parnell told **The News** Wednesday. "I knew they had asked the county to pay some rent."

She would move into any office designated by the county, Parnell said.

"But my caseload is here," she added. "Most of my probationers are in Ruidoso and the people who come to see me. They would have to travel to Carrizozo."

Wynham said he tried to contact Parnell Wednesday, but she was out of the office, as was Hayhurst.

"This is a convenient location and a nice place, but it's not crucial," Parnell said. "We kind of go where they put us."

Parnell said she carries a caseload of 66 official probationers and sees between 30 and 60 new files a month.

"We agreed two years ago that we would pay for one year's rent and the state would pay a like amount for improvements to the building in Ruidoso Downs," said Commissioner L. Ray Nunley. "I'd like to continue that effort."

Commissioner Howell pointed out that if the county doesn't pay the rent, it will have to come up

with some alternate space for Parnell.

"We sure couldn't find something for \$375 with utilities and maintenance included," he said. "I'd like to continue it."

But Howell's motion failed for lack of a second.

Commissioner Stirling Spencer said he'd prefer to see the sheriff's department move out of the sub-office and consolidate in Carrizozo.

If that idea doesn't work, the commission should take a look at any other entity in the courthouse complex that has the option of using offices somewhere else, he said. Parnell could then be moved into the vacated premises.

"We have one tenant in the complex that rents from us, the magistrate court system. The rest are required," Wynham said. The magistrate operation pays the county \$150 a month and "gets a lot of space for that."

Although commissioners have talked a great deal about renovations or possible expansion at the suboffice, nothing has been done, he said.

"My position on the lease is that we're negotiating with the State of New Mexico, not Ruidoso Downs," Wynham said.

"We provide a wonderful space for the magistrate judge for \$150 a month, yet the state is making us jump up and pay \$375 a month," Spencer said.

"The law requires we provide space for the probation officer, but not the magistrate judge," Howell said.

"Commissioner Spencer was pointing out that it's not balanced," Wynham clarified, adding that it's a benefit to keep the magistrate as close to the courthouse as possible.

"Put the rent up to \$450 a month (for the judge)," said Commissioner Bill Schwettmann. "You can't rent a telephone booth for \$150."

Commission Chairman Monroy Montes said the only other option to the Ruidoso Downs office is to bring Parnell to Carrizozo, "but that would be a disservice to the citizens."

Howell again suggested a one-year commitment for the amount requested. His motion was seconded by Schwettmann, but failed with Montes, Spencer and Nunley voting against it.

"Let's negotiate with the village or the state for the other year in question," said Nunley.

Spencer offered a motion to pay half of the rent for one year.

"Why not have some guts and say you're only funding \$187," Howell jabbed Spencer.

"I have plenty of guts," Spencer bristled. "Excuse me, Commissioner Howell. I'll make it real simple so everybody understands it. I learned division in second grade just like you."

Spencer's motion carried.

Wynham said Wednesday, since Hayhurst has rejected the offer, it's up to the commissioners if they want to spend more money or come up with another alternative.

"What I'm hearing from various commissioners is that there are so many aspects," Wynham said. "I'm told it's important to have the office in the Ruidoso area. And then the comment is, if it's important to Ruidoso Downs, maybe they could absorb (some of the rent)."

But I feel not between the county and Ruidoso Downs. It's up to the county to house the office and to decide what location."

In other business, the commis-

sion:

—awarded the construction contract for renovation of the sheriff's department and jail complex to D & D Construction of Capitan. The company's bid of \$193,813 was \$56,000 lower than the next bid. Out of seven bidders, the high figure was \$289,740. The security bond is sufficient to cover any problems, Wynham said.

"The commissioners wanted me to make sure the bidder was satisfied and had made no errors," Wynham said. "He said yes and he would still make enough profit, primarily by doing the mechanical and electrical work in-house and not subcontracting it."

The architect is responsible for inspecting the work. The bid falls under the budgeted amount.

—awarded a contract to Becker Fire for a \$63,649 pumper truck. The bid of the other company, Independent Fire, did not meet the specifications in the frame, the amount of gallons pumped per minute and the foam system.

Becker representative, Howard Puckett, said his company will give a one-year full warranty, five years on the body and a lifetime guarantee on the tank. The bid is within the budgeted amount.

—voted to purchase a 1994 Chevrolet mini-van from Tillery Chevrolet for \$16,928 plus extras for a total of about \$18,700.

Nunley suggested purchasing from local bidder Sierra Blanca Motors.

"I don't get real turned on about the sheriff's department having power windows," noted Nunley.

But Spencer said even with the extras, Tillery's bid still is lower.

"I'd like to award locally, but with all the options, it's still lower

than the Lincoln County bidder," he said.

"I think if you provide them the opportunity to bid, that's all you can do," Howell said.

—voted to reopen Yriart Road and Fuller Road with the granting of right of way and commitment to ensure the routes are kept accessible to the public.

—approved \$2,500 for the Village of Ruidoso for its meals program.

"It provides care," Nunley said in making the first motion to grant \$2,000 to the private non-profit group that operates the meals program.

"We're trying to set up a similar program in Ruidoso Downs, but it will take at least one year. I recommend they become part of the Zia Senior Citizens so they are not in competition."

His motion died for lack of a second. Howell pointed out that the money would have to go to the village for the county to avoid violating the state anti-donation law. He said it takes \$1,200 to feed three people for one year.

"I recommend we feed six," Howell said, offering a motion, which passed, to grant \$2,500 to the village.

"The problem we have is that the Zia program feeds people at a fraction of the cost cited in the literature (Ruidoso village manager Ron Wicker) gave out last meeting," Wynham said. "That same amount of money would impact six times as many people. We must press through with a more efficient system in the Ruidoso Downs area and not run two or three different types of programs, where they lose efficiency."

cerus they may have and seek their advice on what benefits the tribe should seek for neighboring communities in our negotiations with the federal government. We are emphasizing public participation because we believe that everyone who will be affected should be heard."

Peso said to assure an objective public participation program, the Tribal Council is finalizing an agreement with the University of New Mexico for the design and coordination of a public information and public involvement process in the communities neighboring the Mescalero reservation.

He said \$100,000 of the tribe's 2-B funds will go to the university to manage a multi-dimensional public information process that presents both the advantages and disadvantages of locating an MRS in South Central New Mexico. This public participation process will include public meetings facilitated by an independent mediator and consultation firm in order to identify public concerns and define issues which should be addressed in an environmental assessment.

It remains to be seen whether we can get an agreement with the federal government on our terms," said Peso in announcing the Tribal Council's decision.

"We've kept our end of the bargain with the U.S. Congress. We responded to their invitation in good faith. We studied the MRS, and we concluded it can be operated safely. MRS technology is in use and has proven accident-free for many years," he continued.

In a letter to tribal members announcing the council decision to move into the next phase of the study, tribal President Wendell wrote, "If we successfully negotiate an agreement with the U.S. government on our terms, the MRS would become the tribe's largest enterprise, providing substantial benefits and income for nearly 50 years.

"the Tribal Council's number one priority is guaranteeing the health, safety and environmental integrity of our lands and people," President Chino assured tribal members.

"We intend to share the benefits from an MRS facility fairly with all those living in the region," he added.

"I realize the MRS will remain controversial because it is a nuclear project, but the Tribal Council believes the MRS could provide an opportunity for long-term independence and prosperity for our tribe that we would be negligent to ignore or reject," wrote President Chino.

The Tribal Council resolution calls for ratification of the terms of any agreement which is reached in a special referendum of all Mescalero tribal members before the agreement can be submitted to Congress for approval.

"The Mescalero Tribal Council is familiar with the construction and operation of large-scale projects," Peso noted.

"We have been offered several economic opportunities in recent years, but we selected the MRS as the one that best fits our long-range business development strategy," said Peso.

Working together with our neighbors, I believe we can strengthen the economy of the region and provide good jobs for our youth right here in the part of New Mexico we all love. I believe the MRS represents a unique opportunity to provide for unborn generations of Mescaleros and our neighbors."

The legislation creating the Office of the Nuclear Waste Negotiator permits an MRS applicant to negotiate for a package of economic incentives and benefits which can include support for schools, roads, health care, emergency response, infrastructure improvements, direct cash payments, the co-location of other federal facilities, environmental clean-ups or any

other reasonable demand. These benefits must be shared by all impacted communities surrounding an MRS.

The request for Phase 2-B funds included the designation of two potential sites on the reservation that will undergo environmental assessment. The two sites selected for an environmental assessment are located in the far Southeast corner of the reservation near Elk, New Mexico, and in a strip along the western edge of the reservation, bordering the Tularosa Basin, running south from Three Rivers.

A Monitored Retrievable Storage facility is estimated to cost about \$2 billion over its 40-year lifespan and would provide 300 to 500 permanent jobs. In its grant application, the Tribal Council emphasizes additional public outreach and continued intergovernmental coordination with neighboring communities during the next phase of its feasibility studies.

"We intend to make this a project that benefits everyone who will be impacted by an MRS," stressed Peso. "We plan more nuclear power plant visits for local elected and business leaders."

"We want more public input on what we should be careful about, as well as what benefits we should ask for."

"The MRS can be a catalyst for economic development in the region. With first rate schools, first rate infrastructure and first class paychecks, South Central New Mexico will be able to compete with any community in the country for economic development projects," continued Peso.

"I hope our announcement will put everyone on notice — the politicians, the Congress, the nuclear industry and the Department of Energy — that they've found a serious and careful partner in the search for an MRS site."

"Now the ball's in their court," Peso concluded.

has been written and the right of way to widen and improve the highway is scheduled to be acquired by October 1, he said.

"As long as the right of way is granted this year, we will be able to improve the road. I never thought we'd get it," Hoppel said.

"The camping sites at Valley of Fires are constantly being updated and improved," he added. New installations are handicap accessible, electric hookups are being added and landscaping has been done, he

added. But with only 360 acres for the park and three quarters of that in lava, it probably will not be expanded to handle more recreational vehicles.

No height restrictions on adjoining land construction would be applied, he said.

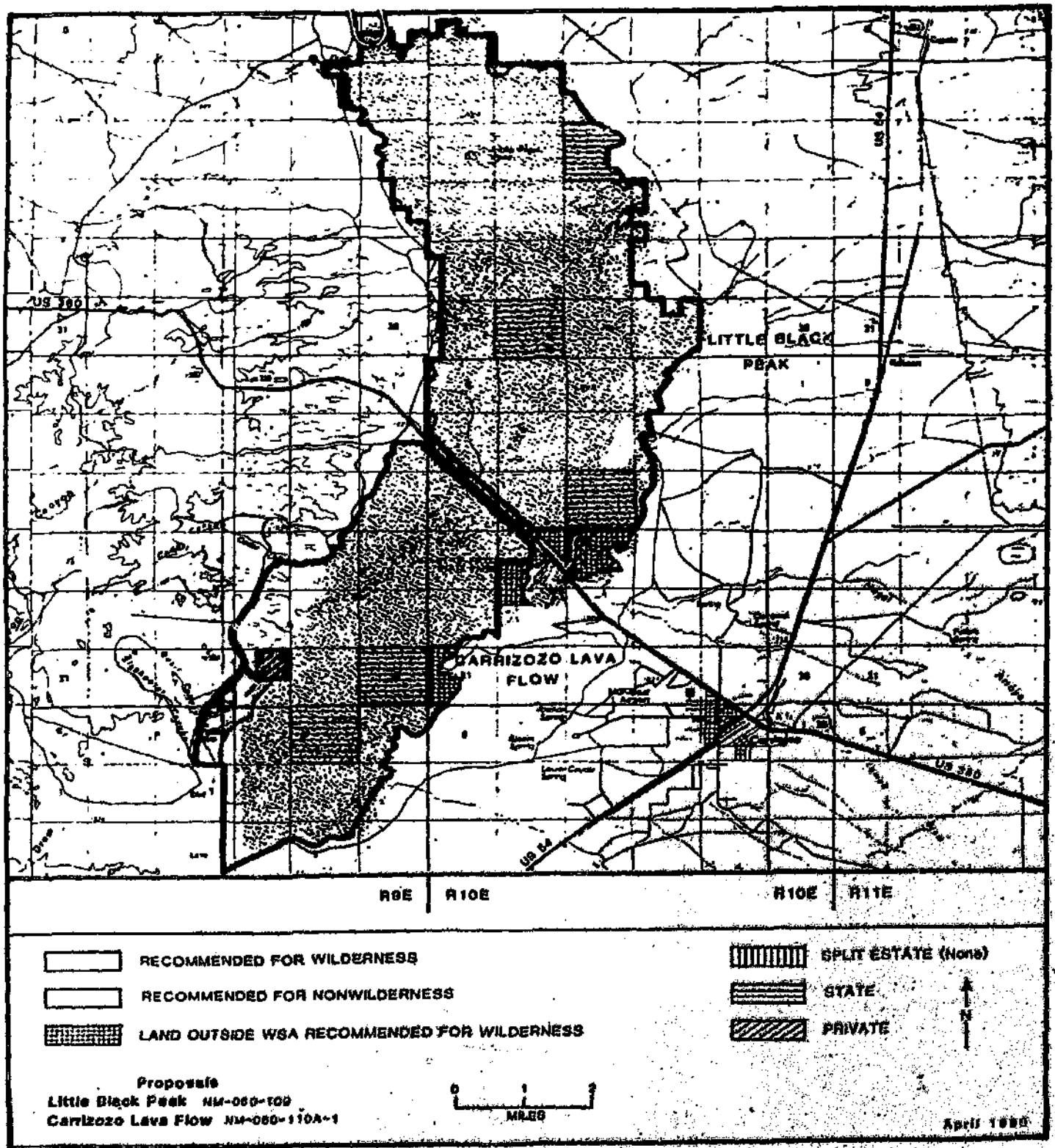
Commissioner Bill Schwettmann asked about the impact on the county.

"The only negative would be a perceived fear of locking up land," Hoppel said. "But some people will be coming through who like to col-

lect wilderness areas like coins."

Due to a tight budget, Hoppel said he doesn't see many new employees being hired. Hunting will be allowed with a state license. Most people who visit the area will buy food and gasoline in the county. The BLM estimates visitors spend an average of \$100 a day.

No more wilderness areas are proposed for the Roswell District, which includes Lincoln County, Hoppel said. Five other sites, about 8,000 acres, were not recommended.

Ruidoso council reviews personnel policies

The Ruidoso Village Council zipped through an inch-thick revised personnel manual in its first special workshop on Tuesday to clean up several projects for the village.

A committee of six employees and Village Councilor J.D. James reviewed the manual before submitting a draft for the session. Changes brought up by councilors during the session will be added before an attorney reviews it for a final council approval in September.

The village is without an attorney at this time, but interviews have begun to contract an attorney.

Personnel director Debbie Rogge presented the major changes to the council, explaining the benefits of each. The manual now includes several policies pertaining to personnel that are currently in force, including the safety manual, the sexual misconduct policy, the police officer progression schedule, the promotional policy and the drug abuse policy.

A disclaimer to protect the village has also been added at the beginning of the manual.

The classification of employees snagged the group for awhile and a final version will have to wait until an attorney is hired to iron it out. Village clerk Tammie Maddox said the state statute contradicts itself because it states the governing body appoints the city clerk and chief of police but under a managerial and merit system, such as Ruidoso has, those two positions report to the village manager.

As stated now in the manual the clerk and chief could be terminated only by the village manager.

As appointed personnel, though, they could only be terminated with the consent of the council. Councilor Frank Cummins said they need to make it clear who can do what concerning these two positions.

The village manager position will be put in a separate classification because that person does serve at the convenience of the village council and can be terminated at any time without cause.

An in-house attorney would also have been considered an appointed position, but the council will now be going to a contract attorney, eliminating that concern. Mayor Jerry Shaw announced to councilors that they will begin interviewing candidates for the contract and hope to have one hired in about a week.

Because of a recent incident with an employee, the probationary period for an added part-time position was hashed out by councilors. Councilor James said after the incident he spoke to village manager Ron Wicker and, although they didn't agree on how it should be handled, it does need to be clarified.

The village has several employees who complete a probationary period in one department and then are offered a part-time position in another department. Currently the person would then go on probation for both positions.

James said the person should be on probation for only the new position. If the new job didn't work out then the person would still have the position he or she had completed the probation for.

Wicker said the current policy is based on looking at similar circumstances. If a person is promoted he or she is also put on probation because it is a change of status.

Mayor Shaw said it is a gray area and does need to be spelled out to be fair to the employees. Several councilors agreed that since it is two separate jobs with separate job descriptions the person should be on probation for just the new position.

Rogge will clarify this policy in the probation section.

A new employee benefit added to the manual is bridging. Under this section a former employee of the village who is rehired can receive

previous sick leave and seniority for vacation accrual after completing the probation period.

Criteria for qualifying for this would include that the person was a non-probationary employee, was terminated with the village under favorable terms and was rehired within one year from the date of termination.

Wicker said bridging is a good benefit to have for long-time employees who may quit or retire to do something else and then decide they would like to come back to the village. Before bridging they would have had to start over in getting their benefits.

The four regular part-time employees will also be eligible for group health insurance with the village paying half of the portion paid for full-time employees. Rogge said that would be 94 percent for part-time people but the amount needed to cover it is not budgeted.

Shaw and Councilor Cummins said they recalled voting earlier in the year to go up to 75 percent from 68 percent on full-time people because they could not give them a raise at that time. Rogge and village clerk Maddox did not remember the change, but Maddox will review the minutes for that action.

To encourage employees not to abuse sick leave days, the village will pay all unused sick leave up to 300 hours if the employee retires or quits. Full-time employees accrue two hours a pay period or six days per year.

Call back and standby pay was also defined in the manual. Currently workers are not compensated for time they are on call. Longevity pay has also been added for employees.

Also a new criteria for designating employee merit awards will be that the employee will be evaluated against his or her own merits and previous evaluations. In the past department heads did not take the initiative to line out criteria to be met by employees and now Rogge said they will be able to earn the

merit based on their individual improvements.

Wicker pointed out that supervisors went through a training session on employee evaluations last year and will do it again this year. He said they also plan to create a new evaluation form.

Changes were also made in the manual to abide by federal laws including disability leave, which goes beyond what is required by the law. Maternity leave has been changed to parental leave to allow for the father to have time off as well.

Added to the manual were the current police manual policy, a code of ethics and a moonlighting section, which allows employees to have other jobs as long as they do not conflict with the position at the village.

Although it was not included in the packets councilors previewed on Tuesday, Rogge said she also plans to add the collective bargaining policy to the manual.

Councilors also suggested that the council should have a manual to follow that would include the code of ethics and the drug use policy, although the regulations would be hard to enforce on elected officials. Rogge will go ahead and put together several items for their manual.

Shaw said they will now let an attorney go over the changes in the policy and have it ready for council approval by September.

She said the next workshop session at 9 a.m. Tuesday at village hall will be on the procurement code. The committee working on the code has not completed a review but will bring all of the information it has to the meeting.

Councilor Frank Potter suggested they also review the state statutes on procurement during the session.

The group will continue to have the working meetings each week to examine village problems such as the street department and all aspects of Grindstone Reservoir.

Firefighters extinguish flames left in an unattended campfire

An unattended campfire brought out local firefighters late Sunday evening.

A passerby noticed a campfire burning in a vacant picnic and camping area on Mon Jean Road (forest Road 117) in the Lincoln National Forest about 7 p.m.

Bonito Volunteer Fire Department responded, finding three logs, each four to six inches in diameter, still smoldering in a designated campfire ring. Firefighters quickly extinguished the logs, noting that a recent rainfall lessened the fire's chances of spreading.

They also noted trash scattered around the abandoned fire, including paper plates, foam cups, plastic bags and bottles and pages of the El Paso Times.

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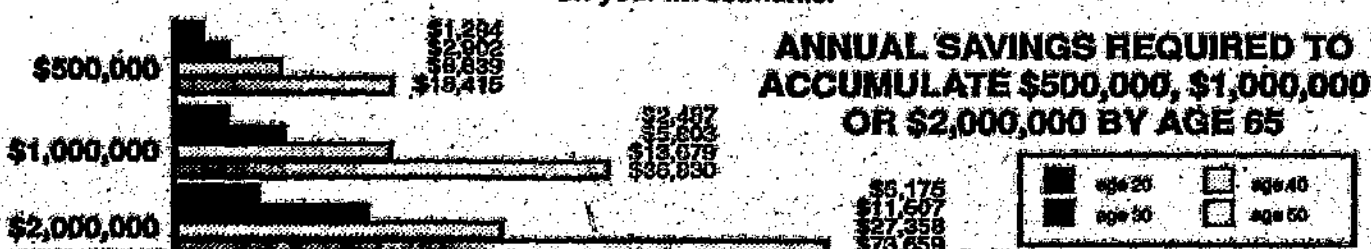

Every one of those golfers, is trying to improve their game with every stroke.

Recently golfer Gerald Pipkin hit a hole in one on the 17th hole at The Links of Sierra Blanca.

"They come few and far between," said Dan Casey of the Links. "But, sometimes they come in spurts."

Casey was referring to the fact that Pipkin was the third golfer in

a period of about three weeks to hit that elusive shot.

Those three golfers, are the only ones listed currently at The Links with a hole in one.

The shot is just as elusive at the other courses in the area.

At the Inn of the Mountain Gods, golf pro Daniel Nunez reports that three golfers this year have had a hole in one on his course.

"And one of those was mine," said Nunez. "It was my first."

Rick Riddle of the Innsbrook Village Country Club says his course probably gets more holes in one than any other course. And that is only about six or seven per year.

Todd Pertee of Alto Lakes Golf and Country Club, however, says that golfers actually hit the shot

more often than people might expect.

"It happens quite often really," said Pertee. "It happens about every two weeks. We haven't had one in over two weeks here."

But, of course, all of the courses are different and have various skill levels involved.

For instance, the Inn of the Mountain Gods is a championship course and is recognized as one of the top courses in the nation.

Also, the number of holes in one is partially determined by the number of golfers playing at the courses.

All of the courses have regular golfers and of course various tournaments throughout the season.

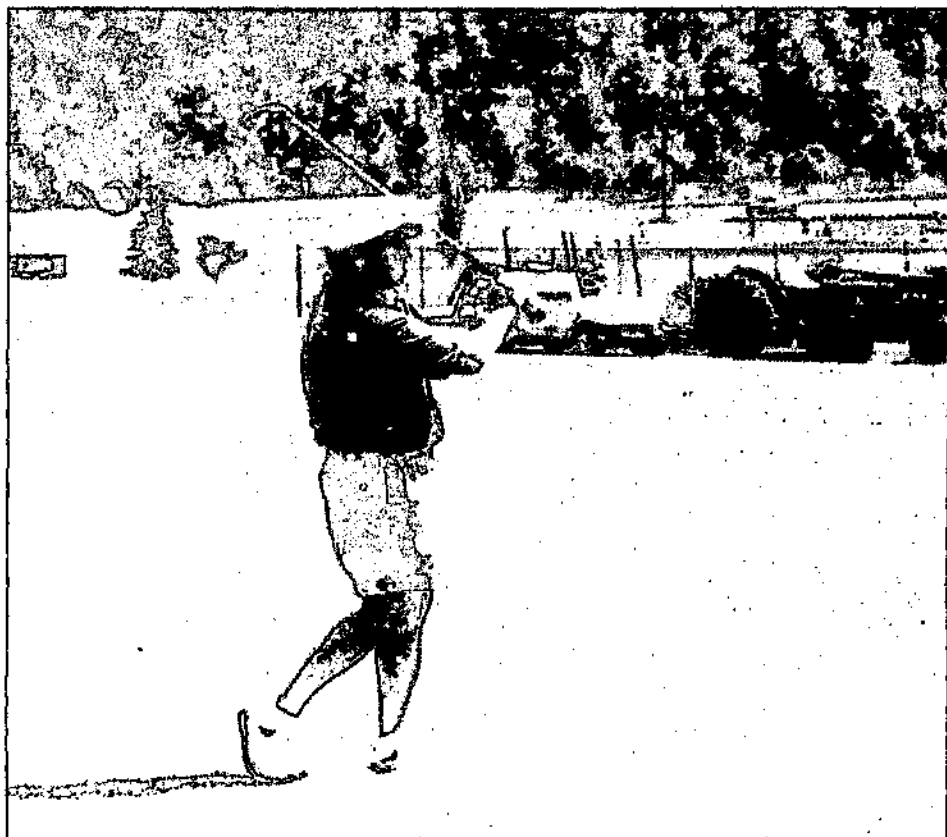
Currently Cree Meadows and Alto both have a tournament going on.

Grindstone Reservoir—Fishing is slow. Crews stocked the reservoir with 2,289 9 1/2 inch rainbow trout.

Tularosa Creek—Fishing is fair using worms and grasshoppers, and pink power bait.

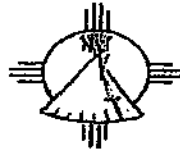
Elephant Butte Lake—Fishing is best in the early mornings and late evenings using top water lures for black bass, minnows under lights for white bass, and in deeper coves using prepared baits and on trotlines using cut bait and shrimp for catfish.

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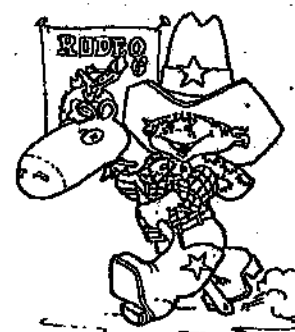
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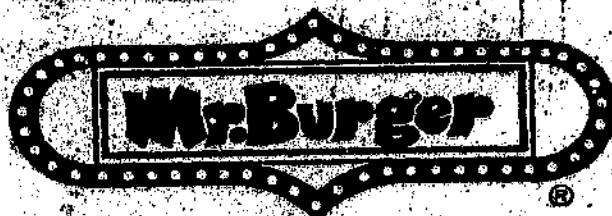

You know it's the West when the county fair queen is judged 40 percent on personality and 60 percent on horsemanship.

Tina Clements, crowned during the Fourth of July Smokey Bear Stampede, will reign over the annual Lincoln County Fair next weekend.

A celebration of rural life, the fair presents a picture of what county fairs should be, with kids and their animals, good cooking and handicrafts.

The fair building will be open for public viewing of the exhibits from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Thursday, August 12, and Friday, August 13.

The market lamb show is the first public event on the schedule at 9 a.m. Thursday.

But those who want to exhibit their items and livestock need to bring them on the preceding Tuesday and Wednesday for registration and judging.

Check-in time

Check in for all livestock, except rabbits and poultry, will run from noon to 8 p.m. August 10. Inside entries will be accepted from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m.

The fair will not furnish a night watchman on Tuesday night.

More inside entries will be registered from 9 a.m. to noon Wednesday, August 11. All livestock will be assigned pens at 2 p.m. Wednesday. Weighing, classification and entering will start promptly at 2 p.m. No late entries will be accepted.

From 1 p.m. to 4 p.m., the building will close for judging of inside entries. It will reopen to the public at 4 p.m. for four hours.

After the lamb exhibit, the Cabrito Show is set for 1 p.m. Thursday, followed by the breeding cattle show at 2 p.m. and the market steer show at 2:30 p.m.

Senior Citizen "Bake Off" entries will be accepted from 8 a.m. to noon, Friday, August 13.

Cheesecakes, custard or cream pies will not be allowed.

The market swine show will begin at 9 a.m., followed two hours later by a dairy goat show. The rabbit and poultry show is set for 1 p.m.

The big day for awards will be Saturday, August 14. The building will be open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. All fair exhibits will not be released until the conclusion of the junior livestock sale. Creators of any exhibits removed before the correct time will forfeit all premiums.

Coffee, milk and doughnuts will be served to exhibitors at 8 a.m. Saturday in the fair building.

The pet show, which draws some of the most unusual entrants in the fair, will start at 8:30 a.m.

A special lead class is scheduled for 9:30 a.m. with awards at 10 a.m.

Livestock buyers will enjoy a bountiful lunch at 11:30 a.m. The junior livestock sale at 3 p.m. will mark the end of the fair.

Some rules

Competition is restricted to Lincoln County residents, junior division members of 4-H, Future Farmers of America, Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts.

Any class may be divided, if the judges decide the class warrants it and at least three items are entered in each new class. Premiums will be awarded on the first three places and ribbons on the first five places.

No more than two premiums will be awarded to a single exhibitor in any one class. The rule will have no bearing or consideration in the placing of entries by the judges. Ribbons will be presented in the order of placing by the judges.

Mark Runyan will judge sheep, beef, swine, Cabrito and dairy goats. Robin Crouse will take poultry. Welden Wahl will handle rabbits and James Duffey will call the winners in market lamb and will be the swine classifier.

Full field of 10 chases \$20,000 pot in the Zia

The Richard Fry-trainee A Daydream Believer who won his only start at Ruidoso Downs this summer, tops an evenly matched field of 2-year-old New Mexico-breds entered in the \$20,000-added Zia Freshman Handicap, Saturday. The 400-yard dash drew a full field of 10.

A Daydream Believer beat a maiden special weight field here May 23 by a neck, then moved north to San Juan Downs for the Four Corner Futurity Trials in early June. The gray colt by Sparkling Moolah ran a strong second in the June 6 trials and qualified to the \$26,000 final. In the June 20 final, A Daydream Believer finished seventh behind winner Ten Ima Comin.

The loss snapped a string of four straight starts in which the colt finished first or second. A Daydream Believer is owned by Mike Abraham and Richard Grebe of Pena Blanca.

The colt is one of three horses in the futurity trained by Fry. The other two are Ninth Grader and Am NYws, both experienced runners on the New Mexico circuit.

Darla Crenshaw's Carrizozo Rose and Rita Danley's Good Times Girl, also have a chance to win the Zia Freshman.

Carrizozo Rose comes into Saturday's race off a solid half-length maiden victory here July 31 and will seek two straight wins for owner-trainer Crenshaw. Good Times Girl won a maiden race at Sunland Park in March and also ran second in the Sun Country Futurity Trials. The Fred Danley-trainee will make her first start since April in the Zia.

Two classy allowance races on the 15-race program also merit attention. The ninth race features the 1993 debut of last year's Rainbow Derby winner Ed Grimley. The four-year-old gelding by No Tell Motel has had much success on the local racing strip as he also placed in the 1991 All American Futurity behind Royal Quick Dash.

The Dwayne "Sleepy" Gilbreath charge heads a group of nine in the \$4,700 allowance contest which will be contested at 350 yards. The tenth race, a one-mile route for older thoroughbreds, with a \$5,800 purse, attracted a compact field of six. Polar Ridge, the third place finisher in the Budweiser Breeder's Cup and the consistent runner Lt. Roberts head the field.

The final three races will be Del Mar simulcasts. The featured event is the Grade I \$300,000 Ramona Handicap.

All American Futurity hopefuls get top billing on Friday at the Downs

Graham Farms Futurity qualifier Billys Ryon tops a competitive field of 2-year-old All American Futurity hopefuls entered in Friday's 400-yard \$3,400 allowance feature at Ruidoso Downs.

Billys Ryon, who resides in the Kenneth Roberts shedrow, won his trial division for the Grade I \$368,987 Graham Farms Futurity on April 2 and qualified to the rich final with the sixth fastest qualifying time of 1:18.22.

The son of Ronas Ryon ran ninth behind winner MD Hammetime in the April 18 futurity, but should come back strongly in Friday's feature. His Graham Farms effort earned \$14,947 for owners Jesus Andrade and Adela Vizcarra. Billys Ryon will be ridden by Charles McMahon.

The Roberts-McMahon combo most recently pulled off an upset victory in the \$99,000 Rainbow Futurity Consolation with I Hear A Symphony on July 24.

Recent maiden winners The Punisher and Flyin The Coup should also be respected in the ten-horse field. In her last start on July 10, the Jann Jones-trained filly

Flyin The Coup scored an impressive 3/4-length victory against maiden special weight foes in her second career outing.

The daughter of Coup de Kas ran the 350-yard distance in a respectable 1:18.08 seconds. Flyin The Coup is owned by his trainer and William Gahlberg.

The Punisher, trained by Roy "Cotton" Barrington, beat a maiden claiming field by a half-length on July 16 in his first start in nearly four months. The On A High colt ran respectfully in trials for the West Texas and Sun Country Futurities at Sunland Park in his prior outings, but did not qualify for either race.

The Punisher is owned by Richard Parrish and will have leading quarter horse jockey Joe Martinez in the irons.

Five Del Mar simulcasts wrap up the 15-race program. All wagers made on Del Mar races are common-pooled which allows local handicappers access to the large mutual pools and exotic wagers offered at the San Diego-area track.

Trifecta wagering is offered on every Del Mar simulcast.

United Horsewomen members have been helping friends and neighbors for 12 years

Horsewomen United's four founding members Lorann Mattox, Glenna Lambert, Joanne Minchey and Doris Roberts all know how hard life can be sometimes for people working on the racetrack.

The quartet created Horsewomen United 12 years ago to reach out to horsemen who need a helping hand.

Over the years, the group has given aid ranging from Christmas gifts to special homecomings.

Horsewomen United started in New Mexico with a small group of women and has grown into an organization with nearly 175 members, all of whom are in some way involved in the horse racing industry.

In times of trouble, such as an on-the-job injury or temporary unemployment, some horsemen may find it hard to get the resources to keep a roof over their heads and food on the table.

In such a case, Horsewomen United steps in and helps out as much as possible.

No two situations are the same and each person has different needs.

Horsewomen United provided the family with all of the Christmas trimmings.

"We gave them the whole works," said Roberts. "A tree, presents and even a bicycle."

In another instance, a woman injured her leg and she needed to

get to Florida to see her family, but didn't have the means to buy a plane ticket. Once again, Horsewomen United came through and paid the full cost of the airfare.

Roberts is pleased with the support and time donated by the members of Horsewomen United when someone needs help.

"People really rally around when a crisis happens. We may have only \$10 in the account, but if someone needs help, people start to come round."

R.D. Hubbard, owner of Ruidoso Downs, has been very supportive of the organization since he took over the reins at the track in 1988. He helped with two successful dances last summer by allowing the use of the Sports Theater and supplying security.

Horsewomen United is funded by member dues and holds numerous fund raisers throughout the year. Bake sales, raffles of televisions or saddles and holiday dances help fund the organization are a few of the ways the group supports itself.

One of the biggest fund raisers is the Welcome Back Horsemen Dance and Barbecue. The last three years Horsewomen United has sold desserts during the function which honors racetrack employees at the beginning of the meet.

Proceeds from a silent auction at the barbecue also benefit the organization.

"We had a successful year, everybody enjoys it because it's for such a good cause," said Sally Avery, a member of the Welcome Back Horsemen Committee.

The goal of the committee, which organizes the barbecue, is to simply cover the costs of the function and donate the profits to Horsewomen United. The donation that was given is a big boost to the account.

Doris Roberts and the other members of Horsewomen United are very thankful to the Welcome Back Horsemen group for their assistance.

"I would like for it to stay as active as it is right now, because someone always needs help," said Roberts about the future of the organization.

Roberts added that the future is looking bright for the charitable group because membership is increasing and new members are always welcome. Among the future projects in the works is an inaugural race at the New Mexico State Fair named in honor of the organization.

Whether it be buying a wheelchair or paying the rent, Horsewomen United is there for support at anytime and will be for years to come.

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Rain is unwelcome guest in area cabins

Blocked culvert pipes, heavy rain and a possible lack of prior action from the village street department caused flooding and damage to a local lodger's property over the weekend.

Rex and Theresa Beatty of Forest Home cabins in the Upper Canyon saw two of their cabins flood Friday afternoon during a heavy rainstorm that hit the area.

The flooding, according to Rex Beatty, was due to a blocked culvert pipe on Rose Street and Mountain View above his property.

The Beattys, owners of Forest Home cabins for five years, said that they had called the Village of Ruidoso Street Department in April asking that the culvert be cleaned out.

"The culvert up behind us has to be maintained," said Rex Beatty. "I am very observant of it, because

this has happened to us before."

Rex Beatty said that even after several phone calls, he had seen no action from the village.

"It's just the bureaucracy in the city government," said Beatty. "If you stay on them, they get annoyed, but if you don't you get flooded."

Beatty said that he did see a tractor and some crews in the area a couple of weeks ago, but apparently that action was not enough.

According to deputy village manager Alan Briley, most of the culverts in the village were cleaned out in March.

"We have a small crew and we have to borrow service from either the fire department or the water department," said Briley. "It is just hard to get it done."

"We just have miles of culverts around. You can't clean them all."

Street department superintendent Charlie Armstrong said that the work had been done several

months ago.

"We are fairly familiar with the ones that plug up," said Armstrong. "I believe it was flushed out when I first requested it."

On Friday, after the Beattys found two of their cabins had been flooded, they called the street department for help.

"They did come up and they made some stop-gap measures," said Beatty.

According to Briley, crews worked until about midnight to control the flooding. The crews then returned on Monday to replace the old culvert pipe.

"We've changed out the pipe with a new, bigger one," said Armstrong. "Hopefully, that will fix the problem."

"The main part of this is the village had ample time to fix the problem," said Rex Beatty. "This did not happen because it rained hard."

"When I asked them to fix it, their answer was that they didn't

have time. Now they have the time."

The flooding at the cabins caused about \$2,000 dollars in damage to the rooms, including new carpet for both. But that estimate doesn't begin to cover what the loss will really be for the Beattys.

"It is mainly a loss of income for us," said Beatty.

One of the rooms was salvageable and was cleaned up in about three days. The other one, however, will take about two weeks to repair.

"This is my busiest time of the year," said Beatty. "I rented those cabins 29 of the 31 days in July."

Beatty is asking \$77 per night for the cabin that will be closed.

The Beattys are now considering action against the village to recover the cost of the damage and the loss of income.

"Everybody makes claims against the city," said Briley.

attends Ruidoso High School.

The girls' parents will host visitors to a four-day feast, while the girls will go through a series of ceremonies, including running and dancing, that will signify their journey into womanhood.

According to members of the family, anyone is welcome to come and be a part of the feasting and celebrating.

The celebration will be located in Whitetail on the Mescalero Apache Reservation. Whitetail is about 20 miles off U.S. Highway 70, about a mile past Cow Camp 1.

Commissioners review subdivision rules and regs

Although a full-blown revamping of Lincoln County's subdivision regulations is underway, two sections need to be changed now, county officials say.

The changes will accommodate the preferences of a developer looking at subdividing prime land on Airport Road.

Initially, the subdivider, Properties of the Southwest, intended to request variances, but county manager Andy Wynham said Tuesday the changes would be too significant to be considered as variances.

"A variance is a slight easing of a regulation," he said. "In this case, five-acre lots to not have a central water (and sewer) system would be more than a variance and I couldn't recommend approval."

"I would recommend changing the ordinance to require the central systems only for developments of anything under five acres."

The ordinance now requires those improvements for subdivisions of less than 10-acres lots.

Commissioner Wilton Howell asked about assurances that electric service would be available without huge impact on new residents who might build on the lots.

"That's not up to government," said Commission Chairman Montroy Montes.

"They will address that in their

disclosure statement, which utilizes the subdivision will be providing," Wynham said.

The second area in the ordinance that should be changed deals with solid waste disposal, he said.

"The ordinance now states that the developer will provide his own service or that the development must be located ten miles from a dump," Wynham said. "Since we don't allow that or have a landfill, it would prohibit all subdivisions. That needs to be changed."

Commissioners agreed to set a public hearing for the September 6 meeting.

"That will give you time to give this to realtors for comment, before we make changes," Commissioner Bill Schwettmann said. "We need as much public comment as we can get. I hear comments that we're listening to one subdivider."

"Yes, we are responding to one subdivider, but because what he is requesting is reasonable," Wynham said. "What I'm hearing from real estate people is that they are very excited we are willing to do that."

In another issue, Gordon Barham asked the commission to consider hiring a full-time employee to schedule events at the arena and fair building, to deliver and retrieve keys, to handle cleanup duties, to provide security and to dog planned improvement projects.

"We have that legislative money (\$150,000) coming and when we

start the projects, a representative from the fair board is going to have to keep up with those projects," Barham said. Members of the fair board are volunteers, who operate their own businesses or have other jobs. They already are spread thin with work days at the fairground, but would continue to handle many of the duties surrounding the county property.

Operating the county fair and running the fairground is not a profit-making enterprise, Wynham pointed out.

"We shouldn't pretend it will make money," he said. "It's a little rural fairground in the middle of Capitan, New Mexico. It's not going to do it. The decision will be on the county's level of commitment."

"I think the fairground is going to grow to the point that it will either become a burden or a money-maker for the county," Montes said.

"We started the Smokey Bear Stampede (staged on the Fourth of July weekend) as a money maker to put on the fair, because we don't charge an entrance fee for the fair (which is set for this weekend)," Barham told commissioners. "But it takes a lot to put on a rodeo (stampede). It also brings in money, but we didn't have the attendance this year we had hoped for, so we didn't make money this year."

In comparing Lincoln County's approach to its fairground with other counties, the local facility is

used much more than most, Barham said.

"Kathleen Hellman got together a lot of information," he said. "We use ours as a community center. There's a lot we could charge for, a nominal fee to offset utilities, but we don't want to scare off the 4-H, FFA (Future Farmers of America) and the other groups."

The board would like to fence off the fairground to prevent unauthorized access and lessen the liability for accidents and other incidents that might occur off-hours involving vandals and impromptu teen party-goers. Having a person living on-premise would cut down that type of exposure, he said.

"The facility could be used for a broader range of things with someone there," Barham said.

Too often after a dance, the parking lot is a mess and the volunteer who handles the scheduling is left to clean it, he said.

"You're talking \$22,000 to \$25,000 annual expense with a salary and benefits," Montes said. "And we would be creating another department."

"One of the problems now for people is trying to get hold of us," Barham said. "We're not asking for action now. I just didn't want to shock you. We'll get the fair out of the way first."

Montes said the fairground loses about \$9,000 a year, but he added, it's not really a loss, because the

money benefits the community.

Hellman told commissioners that with the 1994 national celebration of Smokey Bear's fiftieth birthday as the symbol of forest fire prevention, many money-making events will be scheduled in the county and involve the use of the fairground, such as a fly-in by aviation groups.

The county should try to promote the continuation of those events annually, she added.

Montes said another approach would be to cut back on the use of the fairground to just the fair and stampede, cutting out dances, other rodeos and meetings.

"In most counties, that's the situation," Barham said.

"It's a decision we'll have to make," Montes said.

"Looking at the schedule, it appears you use the fairground 180 days out of the year," said Commissioner L. Ray Nunley. "I think the fees offset the cost enough."

In other business, the commission: —appointed David Vigil to the Lincoln Historic Preservation Board.

—voted to continue the salary of the DARE drug education officer for six more weeks until Sheriff James McSwane finds out whether a 10-month grant has been approved by the state. If it has not, McSwane said he will try to persuade the commission to keep the officer.

Clarification

In an article Monday, it was reported that the Chamber of Commerce had a loss of \$16,193 for the year.

That, however, was the loss at the end of the 1991-92 year. For the 1992-93 year, the Chamber only lost \$8,639.

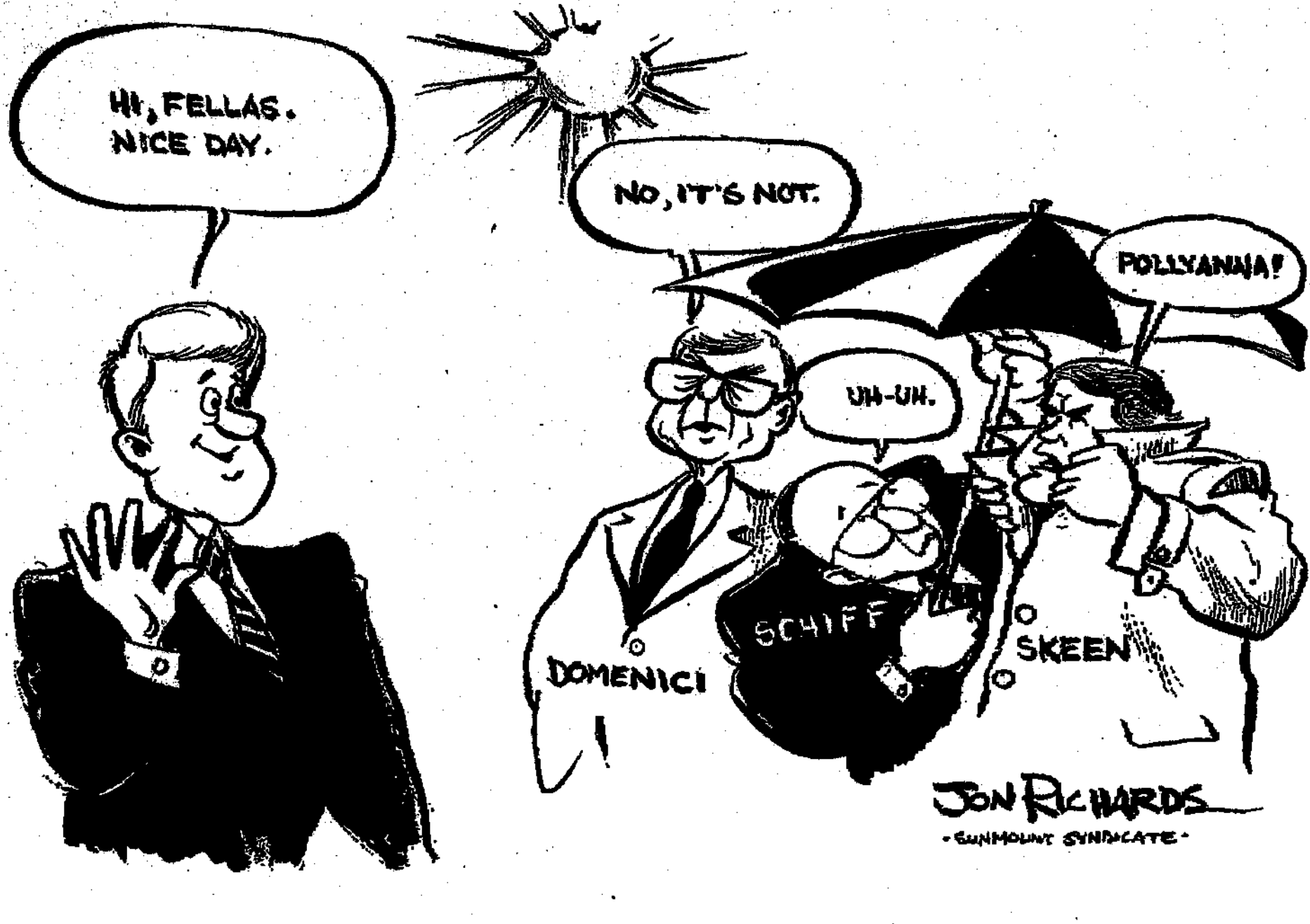

Organizer defends arts and crafts festivals

TO THE EDITOR:

I have followed the articles in your paper concerning complaints about arts and crafts shows that are not sponsored by local organizations. And, I find it difficult to believe that responsible people could be making some of the allegations.

"And are in direct competition with local lodges, restaurants and merchants." If Teri Sodd would have done her homework, she would have learned that the exhibitors at the craft shows are not allowed to park overnight at the facility. Therefore, it is necessary for them to rent spaces at RV parks. And, only a small percentage of the exhibitors bring motor homes. The majority rent motel rooms. So, before you take the word of this individual, you should check with your local motels.

We also frequent local restaurants. They also provide the items sold through the concessions stands. The exhibitors also shop at local stores, attend the races, to the casino, etc.

During our June craft show, we had more than 200 people registered in the show. That is 200 people spending an average of \$94 per day per individual during the four-day average each stayed in your community.

The majority of those attending

our craft show were our patrons from Midland, Odessa, Lubbock, Roswell, Hobbs, Carlsbad and other communities where we currently hold shows. Many planned their trip to Ruidoso around the show. And a sizable percentage of those own cabins in the city, thus contributing to your taxes, etc.

Our exhibitors make the majority of their items and don't sell wholesale to local merchants. Those at other shows may, but I feel that it would have to be a small percentage of total sales.

Participants are also required to have a New Mexico tax number. They in turn send in their quarterly tax payments to the State of New Mexico, which filters back to Ruidoso.

I can understand the frustration voiced by a few disgruntled merchants. 1993 has not been the year that everyone thought it would be. Participants in the craft shows have had to suffer through a year of declining sales, too.

If one were to apply your concept of unfair competition to the craft shows, then we shouldn't allow crafters and artists from Ruidoso to do shows in other cities where they compete with their local merchants.

Whenever you have a new building, you'll get an influx of new events. Through the months and

years to come, they will weed themselves out and only a few will remain.

During our show in June, we received a large number of positive comments on the quality and variety of our show and find it difficult to understand these few negative comments. It is our hope that the restaurants, motels, merchants, gas stations, convenience stores, residents, etc. who either benefited or enjoyed our show will come forward. Too often the silent majority allows a few self-serving individuals to dictate policy for them.

Our shows in Ruidoso aren't as successful as these local merchants lead you to believe. And, I've received the same report from participants at other shows. Many of our exhibitors don't make expenses, but they just enjoy going to Ruidoso. So, I feel a lot of the discussions are totally unnecessary since many leave more money in the community than they take out.

We work with a lot of charities and civic events. At our shows we support the South Plains Food Bank, Permian Basin Food Bank, Mu Zeta Sorority, Special Olympics, Morning Optimist Club, Midland Jaycees, Lubbock Main Street, Business Women's Club, Sports Boosters and Band Boosters, etc. It is our hope that some civic or

charitable group in Ruidoso will elect to man the concessions at our two shows a year as a money raising activity. And, we feel that one will in the near future.

When we do a show in Ruidoso, we also do advertising in Roswell, Alamogordo, Las Cruces, etc. to bring people to your beautiful community. The more people we can draw to your village, the better local merchants do and the better our exhibitors do. It is a unified effort. And most convention and visitors bureaus have realized our importance in attracting out-of-town buyers and support our shows in other cities.

Even the Las Cruces campus of New Mexico State University is doing a study on the impact of our shows on New Mexico's economy through their Center for Hospitality and Tourism Studies. So, our shows can have a positive impact on local revenue.

I realize this letter is rather lengthy, but there has been so much said against our shows and its participants that I wanted to respond to some of the unfair negative comments.

Santa Fe Watercolor Society works to save adobe churches

The Santa Fe Watercolor Society has joined hands with the New Mexico Community Foundation in a unique project to save the historic adobe churches of rural New Mexico.

The Society had a successful show at the Museum of the Horse in Ruidoso Downs this June.

With each passing year, more of these historic landmarks built by Hispanic settlers 100 or even 200 years ago begin to crumble.

Regeneration of village life in New Mexico is the goal of the "Churches: Symbols of the Community" print project.

Artist members of the Santa Fe Watercolor Society lending their talents to the art project are expected to raise not only consciousness, but also much-needed funds for the New Mexico Community Foundation.

The foundation's "Churches: Symbols of Community" project was established in 1985 to assist communities in preserving their historic churches, and in the process, to

revitalize their culture. In many of these villages, the elders are passing away or settling into life patterns of seclusion, while the young people are becoming disenchanted and moving off to find work.

The foundation has helped 55 localities by raising money, recruiting volunteers and bringing in building experts. The foundation emphasized the need for the initiative to come from local people. "The churches have become extremely powerful symbols," said Sam Baca, the foundation's community coordinator.

"It may not be a practical or even logical thing to do, but all these people feel they are preserving the work of their ancestors, their heritage and the faith values."

The Santa Fe Watercolor Society has committed itself, en masse, to helping this worthy cause by creating a portfolio of fine art prints of the historic churches of New Mexico.

Each of the nine members of the Santa Fe Watercolor Society will

select a church in New Mexico to paint. A print will be made of their painting, and the prints will be assembled in a limited edition, signed and numbered, portfolio. The society members hope to have the portfolio completed by the spring of 1994.

All profits from the sale of the prints will be donated to New Mexico Community Foundation.

The artists will retain their original paintings, which will be assembled into a show. Discussions are presently under way to tour the original art in 1994.
