So much was said by so many people at a meeting at the Inn of the Mountain Gods Friday that all the stories couldn't be carried in one edition of *The News*.

"The other view" will be included in Thursday's edition, along with remarks by Fred Peso and more information on the meeting conducted here by the legislative committee on radioactive and hazardous waste.

Neighborhood action leads to arrests

A good neighbor paying attention led to the speedy apprehension of three juveniles who broke into an Alto home last week.

According to sheriff's deputy Frank Hooper, at 3:10 p.m. on Tuesday, September 21, the home of Dr. Juergen Rebstock, a new physician living in Alto, was entered illegally while the doctor was at work. Three juveniles stole a knife, a 357 magnum gun, assorted gold necklaces belonging to Rebstock's wife and a compact disc player with speakers, all valued at \$1700.

A neighbor saw the vehicle leaving the doctor's residence, and was able to secure a partial license plate number.

That same day, officers from the Ruidoso Police Department spotted the car at a local McDonald's. Hooper and the PD talked to the boys and found the stolen property in the car.

The three boys, ages 15-17, were each charged with three felonies of aggravated burglary and larceny.

Hooper praised the neighbor's alertness in spotting the license plate.

If that hadn't happened, it would have been a long shot," Hooper said.

A blaring alarm system, also connected to the police station, thwarted a burglary attempt shortly after midnight Monday at the Pick and Pack country store across the highway from Alto.

Hooper said someone attempted to throw a rock through the glass door of the store to gain entry. The safety glass only shattered and didn't break, setting off the alarm, according to Hooper. He said Mountain Alarm owner Jack Halbrook responded and no further damage was reported.

Councilors get an MRS update from Mescalero

Frederick Peso of the Mescalero Apache Tribe will report on the nuclear waste facility under consideration for reservation land during the Ruidoso Village Council meeting Tuesday.

The meeting will begin at 6:30 p.m.

Peso will show a 15-minute video regarding the facility, called Monitored Retrievable Storage (MRS). Following the video, Peso will speak for about 15 minutes on the progress to date.

A public hearing on Ordinance 93-19 will cover personnel rules and regulations.

Personnel director Debbie Rogge and a group of employees gathered last winter to work on revising the personnel rules and regulations.

After several draft revisions, Rogge said the final product was reviewed in a council workshop.

Copies of the ordinance are on file in the office of the village clerk and are available for public review between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Under regular items, the council will consider a bid award for the MainStreet Ruidoso redevelopment project.

Deputy manager Alan Briley wrote the council that the highway department has verbally approved additional funding to start the project.

Briley recommends the council award the improvement project to the low bidder, D&S Contracting, from Santa Teresa, in the amount of \$1,335,072.59.

Briley said this award would be contingent upon the village getting approved for the additional funding, and contingent upon state and federal final approval to award bid.

A conception plan for land use around Grindstone Dam will be presented by Debbie Jo Almager, parks and recreation director.

The proposed master plan of Grindstone will divide the property into phases beginning from east to west.

The lake will continue to function as approved by the village council. The fully developed subdivision, which cannot be used for recreation purposes, will be sold.

Phase one will be to develop Wingfield Park and the parks and recreation office.

Phase two will be to develop a park for youth and families that will include playground equipment, covered picnic shelters with barbecue grills, beach volleyball courts, basketball courts, softball, baseball backstop, access to sledding, skiing, trails, and the lake.

Phase three will be the development of a reunion-retreat-special events area, to be used by reservation only.

The amenities of this phase will include a large covered pavilion with bathrooms, showers, barbecue pit, electrical hookups and lighting.

This area includes more playground equipment, beach volleyball court, basketball court, softball, baseball backstop, horseshoe pits and accesses to lake trails and RV Parks.

Phase four will be to develop RV parks and camping areas.

The purpose of this area is to provide services to the visitors who are visiting for a few days. Officials

MRS experts speak to state lawmakers

State leaders surprised by vocal citizens

State legislators may have gotten more than they bargained for Friday.

When the Radioactive and Hazardous Materials Committee met at the Inn of the Mountain Gods Friday, the legislators scheduled an update on a study over high-level nuclear waste storage to be followed by comments from "concerned citizens."

State Senator Tom Rutherford, chairman of the committee, had his hands full before he adjourned the committee meeting.

Concerned citizens attended the meeting expecting — even demanding — a chance to speak out, ask questions and get some answers, and state lawmakers were all set for a normal quiet committee meeting where they could gather information and make a few speeches.

Plans by the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe to study placing a Monitored Retrievable Storage (MRS) nuclear waste storage site on the reservation have prompted passionate feelings among the reservation's neighbors, and many of those neighbors were at the Inn Friday to learn more about the study, and to ask the state to intervene.

Senator Rutherford emphasized that the committee meeting was to gather information, and made an effort to hear from as many people as possible without turning the Wendell Chino Ballroom into a battleground.

Officials from the Office of Nuclear Waste Negotiator, the Department of Energy and the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission were on hand to provide technical information on the MRS.

Opponents listened carefully, but they wanted to know more; and some of them wanted to speak out against taking even one more step toward storing the nuclear industry's high level waste in New Mexico, and specifically in "their neighborhood."

Several audience members told the experts from Washington D.C. that they don't trust the federal government, and they weren't buying what they heard about the MRS.

The folks from D.C. included Robert Mussler, counsel for the Office of Nuclear Waste Negotiator; Victor Trebules Jr., director of the storage division for the Office of Civilian Radioactive Waste Management with the Department of

Energy (DOE); and Charles Haughney, chief of the Storage and Transportation Systems Branch of the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission.

Also speaking to the state legislative committee was Julie M. Jordan, program manager for Utility Nuclear Waste and Transportation Program with the Edison Electric Institute in Washington D.C.

Rutherford, who ended the meeting pretty close to on schedule with some guests feeling frustrated and disappointed, had this to say to the Washington contingency:

"I hope the folks from Washington have listened. The most valuable lesson has been learned by them."

Before that calm ending to a sometimes fiery meeting, the state, some Indians and a great many non-Indians declared in many different ways that they don't want the federal government to force any project, much less a highly-dangerous project, on them.

On the other hand, Fred Peso, a member of the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council and the MRS project manager, explained why his tribe is studying what the tribal leadership sees as an economic development project.

Opponents included Bob Walters of Ruidoso and members of the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe: Joe Geronimo, Donnalyn Torres and Rufina Laws. An audience member taped the proceedings and spoke out loudly while others spoke, but declined to state her name.

But, the day belonged to the legislators and they attempted to stick to their agenda, hearing from the experts in the nuclear industry and from Peso.

Of course, they heard from each other, too; with Rutherford admitting how tempting it was to make a speech when standing behind the podium and microphone. He made several.

Feds spell out nuclear waste storage process

A trio of experts with the federal government lined up to report Friday to the state's committee on radioactive and hazardous materials.

The three, joined by lobbyist Julie M. Jordan of the Edison Electric Institute, were at the Inn of the Mountain Gods to talk about the process that will lead to building a Monitored Retrievable Storage (MRS) nuclear waste storage facility somewhere.

That somewhere could be on the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation, and state lawmakers want to learn more.

Members of the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe, tribal leadership, elected officials from around Mescalero and concerned citizens want to know more about the MRS, too, and they half-filled the large Wendell Chino ballroom Friday morning.

Office of the Nuclear Waste Negotiator

Robert Mussler, counsel for the Office of the Nuclear Waste Negotiator in Washington D.C., was first on the program.

He said the federal government came up with a plan to store the growing stockpile of high-level nuclear waste that is a byproduct of nuclear energy, and that plan was based on seeking a voluntary host to take possession of the waste until it is placed in its permanent resting place.

"I can assure you that the tribes and the states were given the same opportunity to participate," said Mussler, who said 500 invitations were sent offering a chance to apply for the phase I \$100,000 study grant. He said three state and 20 tribes responded, and in the end no states and four tribes continued into phase 2.

Counties in Wyoming, North Dakota and Utah each received those initial grants as did several tribes.

Mescalero is one of four tribes that went into the second stage and requested and received a \$200,000 grant for more in-depth study.

"We have not targeted Indian tribes... we did not target anybody," said Mussler.

The Mescalero tribe has indicated an interest in going forward with the process leading to an agreement, and in that phase a grant could be for as much as \$2.8 million.

While the political process has

County endorses sale barn purchase

Within the next 60 days, Lincoln County residents should find out whether future "rural events" will be staged in Capitán or Glencoe or both.

County commissioners Thursday voted to move ahead with a plan to purchase 11.76 acres on U.S. Highway 70, commonly referred to as the Super Select Sales Barn.

Commissioner Wilton Howell and Chairman Monroy Montes said they envision staging horse shows, concerts, dances and other major rural functions, and possibly the annual county fair at the Glencoe site.

Situated on a major highway that connects Chaves County to Ruidoso, they contend that although it is a big investment at \$250,000, in the long term, it will pay off in dividends for county residents.

But members of the county Fair Board assembled after the meeting questioned whether it would benefit the community enough to justify the price. They wondered aloud if a combination of the Ruidoso Civic Events Center and the Lincoln County fairground in Capitán would serve the same purposes.

On his way out of the meeting, Commissioner Stirling Spencer told the group the 60-day escape clause imposed by the board on the purchase agreement gives them time to try to change at least one of the "yes" voting commissioners.

Howell and Montes have made it clear they favor the move. The swing vote, Commissioner L. Ray Nunley, came down on their side during the special meeting Thursday.

Spencer, in a move to bring the issue to a head, offered a motion to proceed with the purchase. It was seconded by Commissioner B. Schwettmann, who serves on the county fair board.

"I thought I had Nunley and Schwettmann to vote it down," Spencer told *The Ruidoso News* later. "They were sitting around and talking and I was sure he (Nunley) wouldn't let it go through in a hurry."

But Nunley threw Spencer a curve.

He proposed an amendment with a list of conditions, including the 60-day escape clause if commissioners change their minds as

been making changes in Washington D.C., the two tribes that are still in the program have identified possible MRS construction sites and those sites are being reviewed.

The Mescalero sites under consideration are near Three Rivers and in the Elk area (between the community of Mescalero and Mayhill). According to Mussler, an evaluation of those site will be finished in time for his staff to make a recommendation to the negotiator.

"Our office is prepared to move forward," said Mussler.

But, he hopes to make his recommendation to a sitting negotiator, and right now that position is vacant. President Bill Clinton asked the George Bush appointee, David Leroy to step down in July 1993, and his replacement hasn't been confirmed by the U.S. Senate.

President Clinton has announced his intent to nominate Richard Stallings, but he hasn't submitted his name to the Senate. Meanwhile, Department of Energy Secretary Hazel O'Leary is acting negotiator.

Once a recommendation is made to the negotiator as to the site for an MRS, the negotiator's office has been directed to work with the potential host to identify terms and conditions of an agreement.

Issues to be included will be payments, control, oversight, technologies, construction and benefits, said Mussler.

Once an agreement is hammered out, it will have to be voted on by the Congress.

"Congress gets one shot," said Mussler.

State lawmakers and audience members wanted to know where they fit in with the federal government negotiating with a sovereign Indian tribe whose land is within the boundaries of the state.

"We are required to consult with the state and affected communities," said Mussler. "It's a process of inclusion, not exclusion," he

added, but went on to admit that his office is doing this for the first time, and there are a number of details that aren't specifically lined out in the legislation establishing the nuclear waste negotiator's office and duties.

"The ultimate agreement, if an agreement is worked out, will necessarily have to address concerns of neighbors," he said.

But some of those neighbors, included Senator Tom Rutherford, are concerned that the law doesn't speak to who has standing as a neighbor and who doesn't.

Department of Energy

Victor W. Trebules, from the Department of Energy, spoke next, he is director of the storage division for the Office of Civilian Radioactive Waste Management.

Trebules, like Mussler, said this visit to Mescalero was his first.

"This is the first time anybody from the DOE has been on the reservation," said Trebules.

He said this process of seeking a home of the utility industry's high-level nuclear waste began with a law passed in 1987. He said the DOE has the mission of constructing an MRS and to find a site or support the voluntary host process.

"Our role in that voluntary process is basically to make grant money available," said Trebules. He said the DOE has made a small amount available, speaking of the \$100,000 and \$200,000 grants already awarded and spent.

With the Mescalero tribe going into the third phase, the DOE is doing site studies.

Trebules said an MRS will be sort of an industrial complex sitting on about 500 acres divided into three sections.

He said the first part will be the receiving section for the transfer of the canistered spent fuel rods from the train or truck into storage units where they will stay until they are moved to an eventual geologic

repository — probably at Yucca Mountain, Nevada.

The second section will be the storage area which will be an above-ground concrete or steel structure.

The balance of the plant will be for training, security and administration.

Trebules said the DOE estimates it will cost a half billion dollars to build an MRS, and the construction project will generate some 1,500 jobs.

Trebules estimates there will be 500 jobs at the MRS site during the 40-year operating life of the facility.

"Congress has determined it's the federal government's responsibility to manage (utility industry) spent fuel," said Trebules.

"Believe it or not the federal government is concerned about saving money," he added.

That's why the preferred plan is to have one large site to store all the spent nuclear fuel waste instead of many small sites. He said the one-site storage will save the federal government millions of dollars.

The way the process will continue once a host is chosen to enter into the negotiating phase, will be for the DOE to do a preliminary review of the environmental elements of the site and prepare an environmental assessment (EA) to be presented to Congress.

If the site passes the scrutiny of the EA, then the government will go forward with a more formal environmental study, called an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS).

At that point the Nuclear Regulatory Commission will enter the picture and begin the reviews leading to licensing the MRS; and if the volunteer host gets over that hurdle, then construction will begin.

Trebules said the DOE already has completed the first stage of a design for an MRS. That design will be analyzed from the aspect of

safety before the final construction stage begins.

Meanwhile, the DOE is working with private industry to develop a multi-purpose canister for high-level nuclear waste. Such a sealed canister would be designed to house the waste from the time it leaves the nuclear power plant until it is placed in a permanent geologic repository.

U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission

Charles Haughney, chief of the storage and transport systems branch for the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) explained how and when his agency enters the picture.

"I'd be the person who would sign the license," said Haughney. He said the NRC is a separate agency from the DOE and is not involved in the application process.

"We review it after it is finished," said Haughney, adding that the final document is massive.

"(It) would fill a bookshelf or two," he added, noting that getting to the point of signing a license is a laborious and complex process. He said it's possible to have what the NRC calls a hearing before a three-panel judge with involved parties arguing their relative points on merits.

Some of the things the NRC is concerned about include radiation shielding, structural integrity of construction, fires and explosions, and physical security.

He said the NRC would oversee practice runs, dummy handling operations before the licensing was completed. He said the NRC would require that the MRS comply with the EPA's dose limit.

Haughney made three final points:

1. We will establish a local public meeting in the vicinity of the selected site about the time the applications is finished.

2. The NRC has for 15 years maintained an open meetings

policy, with all meetings announced and open to the public. Observers can make comments at the end of the meeting.

3. On a major project like the MRS, the NRC will station a resident inspector at the facility throughout its life. "We would tend to have a construction expert on site," added Haughney.

Industry advocate

Julie M. Jordan, with Edison Electric Institute in Washington D.C., added the viewpoint of the institute's members. She said Edison represents 43 of this nation's 44 nuclear utility companies.

"We have the spent fuel sitting on our sites," said Jordan, adding that the companies are being forced to keep the waste even though ratepayers pay one mill per kilowatt hour to the nuclear waste fund.

That fund, established by congressional action, is supposed to pay for moving and storing that waste.

"We believe a temporary MRS is an integral part of the process," said Jordan.

She said 22 percent of this nation's energy comes from nuclear power.

"The Nuclear Waste Policy Act passed in 1982 said a storage facility would be open in 1998 ... the schedule has been pushed back to 2010."

Jordan said nuclear power plants have spent fuel pools, and they're running out of space. She said some already have had to build dry storage facilities.

By 2010, 75 plants will have exhausted their capability, she said.

Even if a nuclear power plant is closed (decommissioned), that spent fuel will have to be transferred to a storage site.

"We also believe in central control — all waste on one site instead of 72," said Jordan.

"I understand the concerns of host states ... that the DOE will abandon you and not proceed with a permanent site."

"Most other countries with nuclear power have planned or built intermediate storage while they go forward with (developing) a geologic disposal site."

"We don't believe doing nothing is responsible."

hope the park will keep visitors within the village limits for the benefit of the local merchants. The sites are to be located close to the lake and other recreational facilities

Phase Five is the development of Lake Loop, parking and trails, which will be handicap accessible.

The purpose of Lake Loop is to provide vehicular access around the lake for a scenic tour of the wilderness, as well as, parking and access to all areas of the lake for fishing,

boating and windsurfing.

Trails will be developed for jogging, biking, hiking, leisure walking and cross country skiing.

The council also will hear a proposal for a contract instructor program from Almajer.

The program is being presented

by the parks director and is set up to hire instructors to teach classes on a contract basis.

In other council business, authorization will be sought to apply for certification to regulate rates for cable TV basic tier service and equipment.

Judith Olean, general council of the New Mexico Municipal League, wrote the village that the 1992 Cable Television Consumer Protection and Competition Act gives franchising authorities, municipalities, the authority and responsibility to regulate rates for

basic tier service and equipment. In order to do so, however, a municipality must take certain steps.

First, Olean said councilors must determine whether they want to regulate the rates.

more information is gathered.

The request to add the amendment passed four to one with Schwettmann voting nay.

Spencer said he figured if the motion to purchase passed, it would be better with the conditions than without them and voted for the amendment.

The amended motion was approved three to two with Schwettmann and Spencer voting against their own motion.

In tandem with that action, commissioners also approved filing a quiet title action on the fairground in Capitan to establish a clear ownership claim for the county.

The fairground is scheduled to receive a \$125,000 face lift using state (\$100,000) and county money (\$25,000). But to accept the allocation from the State Legislature, the county must have clear title and the quiet title suit could take 45 days, Schwettmann said.

County manager Andy Wynham recommended the suit as a way to settle the ownership issue after a search of official county property records failed to uncover any chain of title. Many people seemed to know when the land was used for a school and then for a fairground, but apparently, deeds never were filed. The suit should cost about \$1,500, Wynham said.

Both actions were taken following a 15-minute closed executive session.

Schwettmann initially tried to convince commissioners to conduct all discussions about the land acquisition and title in public, but the other board members refused to open the executive session.

"I want our attorney's input on procedures to acquire property since this is a first for us if we so

decide," Montes said.

When they opened the doors after the session, the first topic was the title.

Nunley explained that although members of the Fair Board at a meeting Wednesday indicated they would prefer to own the property instead of leasing it from the county, the group then would be ineligible to receive money from the state or the county.

With us owning it, you still would be eligible, he told fair board president Gordon Barham.

Wynham agreed that, "As a private non-profit group you could not receive government money because it would be against the anti-donation law."

"Only if the land is owned by a government entity would it be eligible (for government financed improvements)."

"I think the consensus of the board is that we want to go independent," Barham said. "Deed the land back to us and we are willing to forego the state money."

"It will give us peace of mind. We want to ensure the fairground remain where it is in Capitan for years to come."

Mostly Capitan residents have spent thousands of hours of volunteer time working on the fairground and putting together the annual fair and Smokey Bear Stampede. They have an investment there that goes beyond money, he said.

County Clerk Martha Proctor later told The News that the \$100,000 from the state may only be spent on improvements at the fairground in Capitan, according to state officials. If the Glencoe property is purchased, the money could not be used there.

"We don't want to break the ties

completely with the county," Barham told commissioners. "We appreciate your past help, but when we look at what we've accomplished over the years, our objective is to keep the fairground for the fair and Stampede and we're willing to go private to do that."

During the fair board meeting the previous evening, members had voted to reinstitute the organization's incorporation status as an association. That status was allowed to lapse in 1988 when the group became a county board to take advantage of the county's insurance coverage and some financial help from the commission. All assets were given to the county at that time.

Wynham reminded commissioners that if the property is claimed by the county, it could not be "given" to the fair association. That would also be a violation of the anti-donation state law.

"It could be sold for fair market value, but I don't think they have that kind of money," Howell said.

"With the size of this county and the level of participation, I think it's best for the fair to remain tied to the county to support what's needed," Spencer said. "I believe the fair needs to stay with county government to keep it going, no matter where the location."

Barham and other fair board members said commissioners apparently don't realize the significant economic impact of the annual fair and Smokey Bear Stampede rodeo on the Capitan community.

Several business owners contend profits from the Fourth of July weekend and the August fair carry their businesses through the rest of the year and allow them to serve town residents. Changing the fair

site could deal a fatal blow.

More important than that is the positive effect the agricultural activities staged at the fairground have on young people in the area, said fair board member Ralph Dunlap. Raising livestock for show keeps them busy and gives them something in common with their parents, he said.

Howell told The News Saturday that it never has been his intent for the county to close the fair building and fairground in Capitan.

"As one commissioner, I would like it to continue as a community facility and for rodeos," he said. By looking at the Glencoe property, "I'm after a facility to meet the needs of the entire county and maybe of the region."

"I see a fair there that would allow us to extend a hand of friendship to students and families from the Mescalero (Apache Reservation) and to get those youths to participate."

"As I understand it, they have pretty much been frozen out of the Otero County Fair competition. Yet, and I have to check this, I've been told that one boy raised a steer that was named grand champion in Albuquerque."

"The only way is to break down barriers between all of the communities in the area and encourage participation."

Specifically, Howell said he sees designating a spot for the Mescalero tribe to erect a cultural village during the fair. A midway with rides and other attractions also would draw more people than just the agricultural and home economics displays that characterize the existing fair, he said.

"I can see a place where the Lions and Rotary could have food booths as a major money maker, es-

pecially since no restaurants are nearby," Howell said.

At other times of the year, besides leasing it out for events like the annual Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium and horse sales, Howell said horse shows and a Future Farmers of America barn for students who do not live on ranches to work with livestock would be two other uses.

With the artistic resources of the county, he also would like to try a workshop where well-known artists could work with children.

"As one commissioner, I don't intend to take away Capitan's fairground and would favor continued financial support by the county," Howell said.

Asked what might happen if fair board members consider the Glencoe operation too big an undertaking for a group of volunteers and they prefer to focus on whatever events remain in Capitan, he said, "I'm open for suggestions."

"If the fair board isn't interested, it could be another volunteer group or some sort of paid coordinator. I don't know at this point."

During the commission's special meeting last week, real estate agent Bill Hirschfeld said the property had been appraised at \$460,000, but was being offered to the county for \$250,000. The principals want \$100,000 down and two annual payments with interest, or cash, he said.

R.D. Hubbard, part owner of Ruidoso Downs, is connected to the operation through the racetrack. Hirschfeld said he has been working with Grady Stowe of Texas and Gerald Blue of California.

"We felt that because of the property's value compared to the sale cost, it might work for that end of the county if commissioners plan

to expand out there," he said. "It was not meant to replace the fairground."

Schwettmann asked why the county would want to buy the land and building.

"Who's responsible for ramrodding in such a hasty way?" he asked. "Are we willing to spend tax money for a white elephant that is used only a few times a year? Maintenance for property like that would be a real number. You're talking about a tuppence to the fairground."

"I feel the issue should be put to the voters to decide. We could ask them if they are willing to commit at least one mill (equal to \$1 for each \$1,000 of taxable value)."

He proposed tabling the issue for more study.

"Talk about ramrod," Howell said. "I'd like to discuss this."

"On a motion to table, there is no discussion," Wynham noted. The motion was rejected three to two with Schwettmann and Spencer voting in the affirmative.

"I would like more time to discuss it and would like a 60-day option to tie it up," Howell said. "I don't think we need a referendum. When we were elected, the voters designated us to make some decisions for them. I don't think every time you spend a quarter, you have to put it on the ballot."

After the vote to purchase passed, fair board members urged commissioners to take a close look at how long the property has been on the market and its past record of earnings and maintenance.

Spencer noted that the acoustics are poor for an orchestra and a previous concert staged there was underwritten by Jackie Spencer, who now has plans for a performing arts center in Alto.

Your best friend may be waiting at the shelter

One of the most attractive residents of the Lincoln County Humane Society animal shelter, Marley's blue merle coat sets him apart.

The Australian shepherd mix, possibly with blue heeler or cataboula, is about one year old and very friendly.

He was picked up by the Ruidoso animal control officer in one of the traps near Crown Point Condominiums," said shelter secretary Kathy Tetreault. "He had been hanging around a few days. He

doesn't have a collar or tags.

"He's a beautiful dog and he doesn't look like he's been out on his own long. He has a good disposition and is not hyper. He also knows the 'sit' command."

Marley will have to be neutered in compliance with state law that requires all animals adopted from shelters to be altered in an effort to curb the population of abandoned pets.

A newcomer in the small dog section of the shelter, Kumquat appears to be a Norfolk terrier mix.

"He's short to the ground and has wiry hair," Tetreault said. "His

coloring is apricot blonde."

About 10 months old, Kumquat won't get any larger. He originally was adopted from the shelter as a young pup, but a change in the family's circumstances landed him back with society employees.

"He has lots of energy, a typical terrier," Tetreault said. "But he knows several commands, so someone gave him some individual attention."

Free workshop

A real bonus for owners of animals adopted from the shelter will be offered each month by former shelter manager Randy Basch and Linda Turk, who trains champion golden retrievers.

They will conduct a free dog training workshop from 2 to 3 p.m. the first Saturday of each month at School House Park between the library and the municipal swimming pool.

Turk already offers free telephone advice to owners of shelter animals that are exhibiting behavior problems. Basch now operates his own training business, The Educated Owner.

"We got together and decided this would be of real benefit to any animal owners, but especially those who adopted from the shelter," Basch said. "So many have been brought to the shelter for minor behavior problems that could be easily corrected if the owner was willing to take the time."

"The workshops should increase the owner's appreciation and understanding of their dogs, will en-

courage owner/pet interaction and should reduce owner frustration and the chances of animal abandonment."

The workshops will be open to everyone, even if they don't bring a dog.

"This is an introductory workshop with or without dogs," Basch said. "A lot of valuable information will be covered. We want them to come as often as possible, because they probably are the people who want to train their animals on their own."

"It will be possible to complete an obedience course through the workshops. We'll conduct them as long as people are interested and show up."

"Bring a pen and a notebook. If you're bringing your dog, be sure it has current shots and is wearing its rabies tag. The dog should have a collar and a six-foot leash."

Don't bring dogs that may be ill or females in heat, Basch said. The dogs should be more than four months in age.

The workshop will cover the basic commands and leash control, the owner's role as pack leader (since all dogs, no matter how domesticated, descended from wolves), and communication between dogs and owners.

"We also will talk about any specific problems an owner may be

having with an animal," Basch said. "No reservations are needed. There is no charge. Donations will

be accepted at the animal shelter only."

She would like to work with any new volunteers interested in running the thrift shop.

"The work can be very fulfilling for someone with the time," Oswald said. "But it's certainly not just a few days a week responsibility."

Contact acting society president Earline Phillips at 257-4547 if interested in the thrift shop volunteer work.

For more information about Marley, Kumquat or any of the other dogs and cats, call 257-9841 or stop at the shelter on Gavilan Canyon Road.

Help

The society soon will lose one of its most dedicated volunteers,

whose hard work has contributed financially not only to the daily operation of the shelter, but also to the expansion project.

Jerry Oswald, manager of the society thrift shop on Sudderth next to Arby's, plans to move back to Texas to be near her grown children and their families.

He earned a bachelor's degree in agricultural economics from NMSU in 1991, with a specialization in ranch business management.

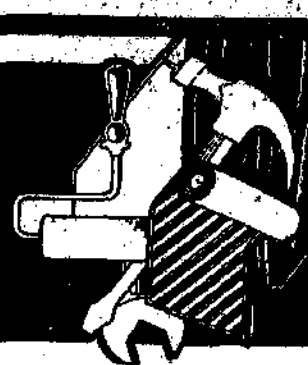

Nominating committee bypasses EDC board

Mild controversy, sparked an otherwise routine and dry Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDC) board meeting Thursday night.

New board members, Sharon Wicker; David McIntosh were introduced and welcomed to the board, and it was announced that the absent Bob Boebinger had been added to the board.

But, before the meeting ended their welcome was clouded by questions over how new directors could have been added between meetings without a vote by the membership and how a part-time resident can serve a year-long commitment.

Executive Director Karen Kopp explained that Boebinger had told the board he would be absent for the first meeting. She said Boebinger has a summer home in Ruidoso and winters in Arizona.

Questions were raised about how he can be in New Mexico for winter EDC meetings when he is living out of state.

Kopp explained that Boebinger said he will return for the meetings.

Minutes were then read and approved of the July meeting. Part of the minutes contained a section to form a nominating committee, which was to have a slate of names of interested parties to fill existing

board vacancies by the next meeting.

Frank Potter and Richard Mound volunteered to develop a list and contact people to determine if they would be interested in serving on the EDC board.

After minutes for the EDC July meeting were read, County Commissioner Wilton Howell asked if he had missed something, like an August meeting.

Kopp told Howell that there had not been a meeting in August.

Three new directors appointed to the Economic Development Corporation board Devised Commissioner Wilton Howell to question the validity of the process by which new members are selected.

"I heard the minutes. They said we had a nominating committee, but, it has never been presented to the board for a vote," Howell said. "I'm baffled how the new members wound up on the board. The by-laws state the members are to be voted on by the entire board."

"I'm a little put back with this, how can we have two members appointed three board members."

"I must be missing something," Howell said. "The by-laws state new members must be appointed by the whole board."

"I'm not disappointed in the members selected. I'm disappointed in the process," Howell said.

"If we are going to do this, folks, let's do it right," Howell said.

Howell stressed that his concerns were not with the new members selected but the way the selection process was handled.

New member Sharon Wicker spoke up then.

"I was told that we were elected to be on the board. So, where did we come from?" she asked.

Attorney Robert Beauvais told Wicker the executive committee had met and voted on the new members. It was his understanding of the by-laws that the vacancy was to be filled until the next meeting.

"I understand from the minutes that it was a nominating committee not a replacement committee," said Howell. "The by-laws are pretty clear."

Howell had a copy of a letter sent to Bill Rickard on August 31, notifying him who had been named to the board.

"The board has selected Bob Boebinger, Sharon Wicker and Dave McIntosh to serve in the vacated positions," reads the letter.

Howell continued to question how "the board" could do this without a vote.

"It set me back when the nominating committee sent out a letter to someone that I had made a recommendation for telling him that the board positions had been

filled," Howell said.

It was decided the by-laws needed to be checked. No member present had a copy of the by-laws at hand.

Wicker told the assembly that she had a copy in her car. After the document was retrieved and several minutes were spent going over the part concerning board vacancies, it was decided to put the matter to a vote before the members present.

EDC by-laws state in Section (2) "Vacancies in the Board of Directors shall be filled through appointment by the remaining members of the Board."

"We haven't had a meeting since July to vote, what I don't like is how they have weeded out the people who were interested, like Bob Rickard. We don't have a choice," Howell said.

A motion was then made and seconded to call for a vote from the board to elect the three new members — two of whom were present.

Howell voted no.

"The no vote is not a reflection on the new members," Howell said. "It is just a reflection of the process."

After the vote, the EDC board continued with the agenda. The rest of the meeting was conducted with "business as usual," and proceeded without further incident.

Warriors thumped by high-octane Rams

The News Sports Correspondent Defense caught napping The Ruidoso Warrior Football team's two-game winning streak is over.

The explosive Portales Rams handed the Warriors their third loss of the year 42-13, Friday night at W.D. Horton Stadium.

The Warriors slipped to 2-3 on the season while the Rams moved to 3-2.

The game opened with Portales taking the opening kickoff and marching down the field, before the Warrior defense forced a fumble and recovered it, at the Warrior 30 yardline.

Like the Rams, Ruidoso moved the football crisply and reached the Portales 37 before not converting a fourth-down play.

Both teams had two possessions in the first quarter, but the quarter ended without a score.

The second quarter brought on a scoring bonanza — with Portales doing most of it.

The Rams' first score occurred with 7:32 left in the second quarter with a 35-yard scamper by halfback Leroy Valdez. The extra point attempt was no good.

The Warriors netted minus 12 yards on their next possession and after three plays Ricky Devara punted the ball back to the option-oriented Rams.

This time the Portales' "Veer" option offense took only six plays to score on the Warriors, as the Rams went in from five yards out on the keeper. The two-point conversion was good and the score was 14-0 with 7:32 left in the half.

The Warriors second possession of the quarter ended with the same result as their first — three downs and a punt.

But Ruidoso got a break as Portales fumbled the ball away on the second play of their next pos-

session.

Starting from the Ram 37 yard line, Ruidoso got 10 yards from Raul Davis for a first down. Davis then added nine more on the next play. Fullback Rex Comanche got the needed yard for the first down on the next play.

The Warriors got on the scoreboard with 4:39 left in the half on a beautiful 17-yard pass play from John Echols to a wide open Byron Soules, the tight end. Soules then added the PAT to make the score 14-7.

That was as close as it got.

Portales recovered the Ruidoso onside kick attempt at the Warrior 49 yardline. First down was a 12-yard keeper on the option. The next play hit paydirt from the 43 and set the scene for a long night for the Warrior defense as Portales ran through the Warrior line and secondary ... almost at will.

Trailing 20-7 with 3:42 left in the half, Ruidoso got the ball at the Ram 24 and moved the football with the same success as their previous drive, with one exception — penalties.

The Warriors were whistled with two penalties for 15 yards which eventually killed the Warrior drive at the Portales 45.

Ricky Devara, the third punter of the year for the Warriors, then shanked a punt 14 yards up the field and the Rams were in scoring position again with 2:07 on the clock at their own 41-yardline.

This time it took only one play and the Portales hit paydirt from 59 yards out as Valdez sliced through the Warrior secondary, untouched. The two-point conversion gave the Rams a 28-7 lead.

As time ran out in the half, Ruidoso's defense had been victimized for 28 second quarter points. The offense had showed some signs of life in the game, but Portales was

unstoppable.

The Warriors got the opening kickoff in the second half and again started moving the football. The Warriors' Wing-T moved the ball from the Portales seven-yardline to the 40 before the yellow hankies began to fly.

Once again, Ruidoso was its own worst enemy as the offense was whistled for a drive-stopping 15-yard penalty for clipping.

Forced to kick the ball away from the 34, this time Devara got away a beauty. Portales had to set up shop at their own 33 yardline.

But it doesn't really matter where you start from ... it only matters where you finish. And Portales was having a great night finishing.

Portales took all of four plays to reach the endzone. The Ram veer produced another long-range TD as they went in from 34 yards out in only six plays.

After the kickoff it was three-up-and-three-down for the Warrior offense, and the shell-shocked defense was back out on the field with 3:44 left in the third quarter.

This effort would end differently, however. Trying a rare pass play, the Rams gave the Warriors their third turnover of the night as Johnny Flores intercepted his second pass of the year.

Ruidoso could manage nine yards on the drive but could not make the tenth on third down and had to punt the football away.

Portales got the ball on their own 26. After just one yard in three downs and had to punt.

The Warrior offense got the ball at their own 42.

Ricky Devara got six yards on first down. Echols threw the ball away to avoid a sack on second down. On third down, a new star made his first appearance at W.D. Horton Stadium. Echols, who had avoided the Ram rush all night, did

the trick one more time as he spotted sophomore Brandon Emello over the left side and fired a strike 16 yards down the field. First down on the Portales 32.

Echols handed the ball off the Comanche on the first play — no gain.

It was then that Echols went to the sophomore well again — and guess who was at the bottom? Brandon Emello turned a 12-yard Echols pass into a 31-yard run that avoided hits, broke tackles, but more importantly created a little excitement in a game that only had Portales smiling.

Oh, Portales scored on their first play after the kickoff, but it didn't matter — there's not much difference between 35-13 and 42-13.

The Warrior defense had a terrible night — but it happens.

The offense moved the football despite themselves (penalties).

John Echols and Byron Soules continue to evolve and impress — and you can't wait to see Emello next week.

Sure, the Warriors had won two straight football games. Sure, by the scoreboard they got the tar beat out of them in this one.

But the offense was the group that caused the most concern coming into the season and they once again proved that they can score.

Portales was bigger, stronger, faster and more experienced than Ruidoso. The Rams were supposed to win the game and they did.

But Ruidoso showed that spark. They showed the improvement that we've seen all year and they didn't give up against a superior opponent.

Next week offers another chance to win. Fabens, Texas, comes to the Warriordome for homecoming.

Don't be surprised to see the gutsy, over-achieving Warriors leave the game at 3-3.

Solid waste authority manager declares war on garbage violators

No more excuses. Containers now are available for contractors to drop their trash and for residents to get rid of their pine needles, old refrigerators and discarded furniture.

Joe Lewandowski, general manager of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority, said he intends to crack down on violators, pushing for the maximum punishment. In some cases that could be a \$500 fine and up to six months in jail.

At no additional charge other than the monthly fee home owners already are paying, they can drop their yard trash and large items at the authority's garbage transfer station on Gavilan Canyon Road.

"I have what we call a 40 yard roll off available for residential use only from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday

through Friday," Lewandowski said. "The attendants will accept no commercial or construction waste. They will be turned away."

However, that type of debris will be accepted at the recycling center on Second Street in Ruidoso Downs.

"They will be charged the same commercial rate as at the 'Capitan (debris) landfill,'" Lewandowski said. "That's \$6 a yard, which amounts to about \$6-\$10 an average pickup load."

"When it comes in, our recycling people will handle it and fill out a receipt. If a person or business has a current account, they can charge it, but they need to arrange that in advance or be prepared to pay with cash or a check at the time."

The center is open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Saturday.

"So there's no excuse anymore for illegal dumping by contractors,

who fill up our residential dumpsters," he said. "In Ruidoso's solid waste ordinance it requires that construction debris be disposed of in an approved landfill, so if a contractor can't produce a receipt to show that he disposed of it correctly, we could challenge him. There was waste and where did it go?"

He combed Ruidoso's ordinance and found several pertinent sections that give him authority to prosecute violators.

One section prohibits dumping tree limbs and pine needles on the streets, another bans construction material in any containers.

"It's very clear that the containers are strictly for residential use or, if they are commercial, for a specific business and still not for wood or construction items," Lewandowski said.

He's also ordered large stickers,

about 13x15-inches reminding people that the dumpster are for residential use and listing a phone number for information about where it is legal to dump larger items.

"No person is allowed to use another person's or business container. Commercial accounts trying to put their excess in another dumpster will be fined," Lewandowski said. "If you're not paying for the dumpster, you shouldn't be using it. In residential areas, it's pretty clear which dumpsters serve what houses. Someone shouldn't be carrying their stinky garbage down the street to stick it in someone else's container."

The ordinances in Ruidoso Downs and Capitan say about the same things as Ruidoso's, he said. Capitan residents are close to the debris landfill, which is open for

residential items free on Saturday, and Ruidoso Downs residents are neighbors with the recycling center.

The one area where residents still might face a lengthy drive is Hondo. To eliminate that inequity, two flatbeds and attendants will be at the pull off dumpster area on U.S. 70 and U.S. 380 from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m., the first Saturday of each month.

"If they have anything to dispose of at that time, it will be free for residential items," Lewandowski said. "Commercial operations and contractors will be charged the regular rate."

The county's solid waste ordinance prohibits dumping items, even bags of garbage, on the ground next to dumpsters, even if the containers are full.

"Wait until it's empty or drive to

another site," Lewandowski said. "The containers being full is not a legal excuse."

The county ordinance also specifically bans commercial or construction waste at any of the dumpster sites, as well as yard waste, grass and tree limbs.

"The sheriff's department has the right to cite a person immediately and I'm going to ask Sheriff James McSwane for him to direct his deputies to watch for violators," Lewandowski said. "It's like a traffic ticket and can go up to \$500 for a fine and six months in jail."

He also wants other residents to turn in the license plate numbers of violators.

"Their only reward will be to keep the area clean," he said. "They can report them anonymously, like the old Turn in a Polluter program."







Medical Update on Breast Cancer

You may be hearing lots of facts and figures about breast cancer during the month of October, which is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Some of those facts are alarming; others are encouraging. Yet the basic message for October is simple; breast cancer, when detected early, can often be completely cured, and you can help detect this disease.

The bad news about breast cancer is sobering. The incidence of breast cancer is going up, and scientists do not know exactly why. This year, 180,000 American women will develop cancer of the breast. Most will have no known risk factor for the disease - meaning all women are at risk.

The good news is that, despite increasing incidence rates, the death rate from breast cancer has been fairly stable for many years. Improvements in early detection of breast cancer have been fairly stable for many years. Improvements in early detection of breast cancer and in treatments for the disease help account for this trend. Also, earlier diagnosis now gives women more options for treatment: approximately 36 percent of women who develop breast cancer do not have a breast removed.

Early diagnosis is the key to treating breast cancer. After treatment for early breast cancer, a woman's survival rate is as high as 90 percent. Every woman should take an active role in protecting her health by practicing monthly breast self-examination, having a yearly breast exam by a physician, and getting regular mammograms after age 40.

Many women become so afraid of what they might find that they avoid examining their breasts. It is vitally important not to be ruled by fear. Even if you or your physician find a lump, the chances of it being cancer are small - one in five. However, if there is a problem, early detection not only improves your survival chances it may also improve your chances of avoiding a mastectomy.

There is some confusion over the statistic that "one in eight women" will develop breast cancer during their lifetime. This figure refers to women who live to age 90, at which time their chances of developing the disease jump to one in eight. The risk of breast cancer increases with age: at age 30, women have a one in 2,525 chance of developing the disease; at age 40, a one in 217 chance, and at age 50 the rate jumps significantly to one in 50.

Whatever your age, remember that taking care of your breasts is not something to be put off until tomorrow, but an essential and lifelong project.

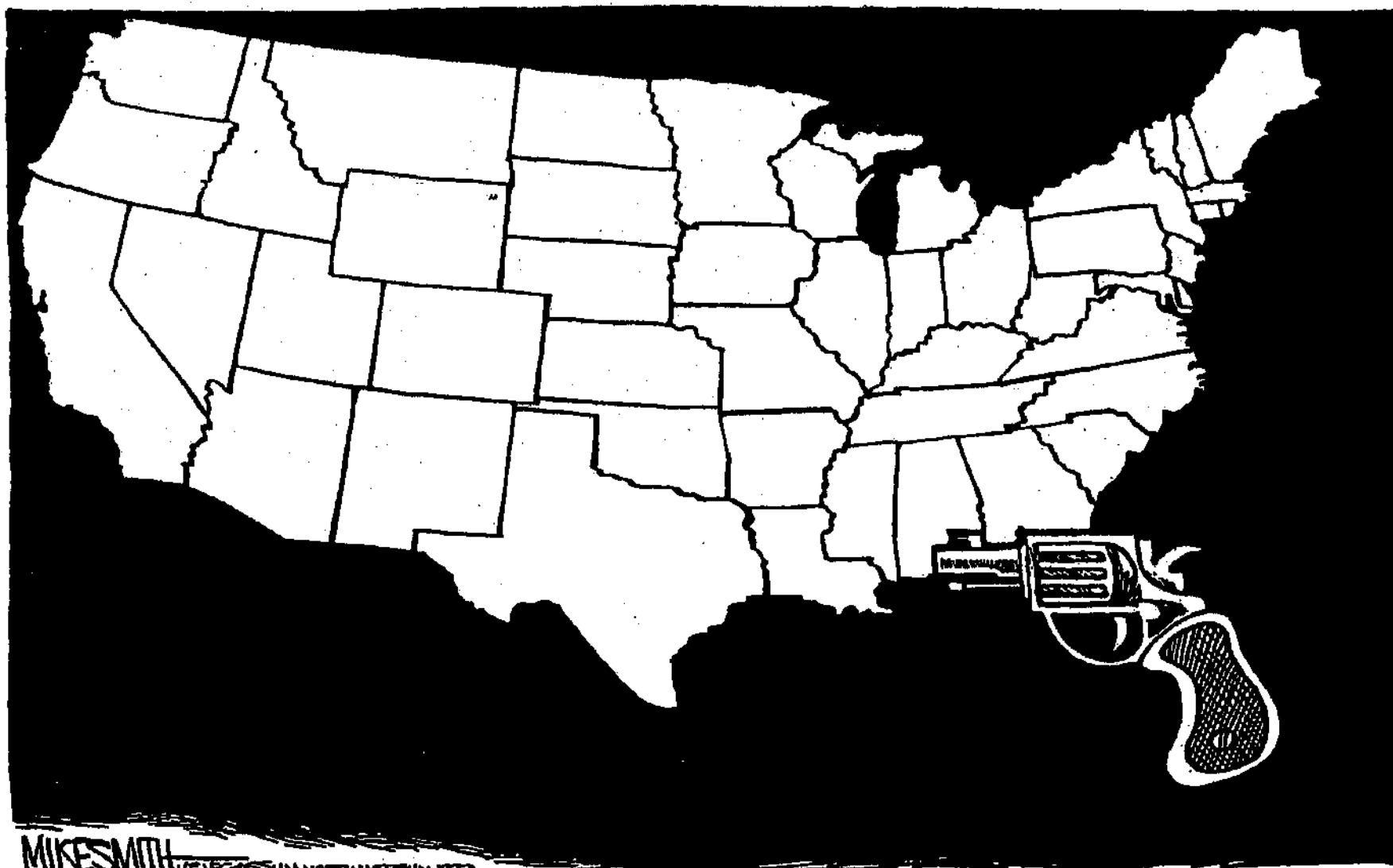

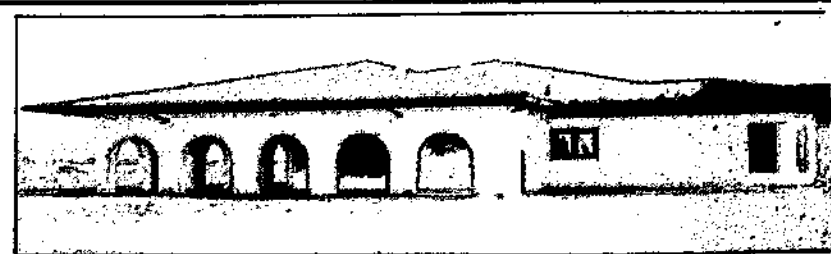

Ruidoso is seasoned just right for fall fun

When the trees in the Hondo Valley start turning orange, yellow and brown, it's just a matter of time before Mother Nature splashes her magical golden paintbrush throughout the rest of Lincoln County.

Aspenfest is named for the stately mountain trees that grace the higher reaches — those trees are the stars of Ruidoso's annual fall festival.

Visitors and locals always find plenty to do during Aspenfest — from a street dance on Friday to a parade Saturday, the annual arts and crafts exhibition under the trees and much more.

But the big weekend owes its existence to the brilliant golden aspens.

Be sure and take a leisurely drive up the mountain and watch the aspens light up the forest.

Those beautiful golden aspens are the real stars of nature's annual show.

From late September through early October the leaves of these tall trees turn a bright gold and as they fall they litter the ground with brightness, like a floor made of gold doubloons.

Aspens stand regally throughout the Lincoln National Forest — many within a few minutes drive of Ruidoso.

Depending on your sense of adventure, these viewing areas can be reached via paved routes or by taking some of the forest roads in the vicinity.

The autumn change in leaves happens suddenly and lasts for just a brief time. Contrary to popular belief, the color change is not brought on by temperature changes or freezes, but by the lessening of the amount of sunlight during the autumn days.

If you need more information on trails or where to go in the forest lands, drop by the Smokey Bear Ranger District office on Mechem Drive in Ruidoso.

Aspenfest weekend, October 1-3, is a festival that extends from one end of town to the other.

A street dance kicks things off on Friday night, with a parade at 10 a.m. Saturday.

The state chili cookoff is Saturday at Tall Pines RV Park, and the Ruidoso Gymnastics Association Arts & Crafts Fair will be Saturday and Sunday on Sudderth Drive.

Tri Cities Rod Run will be in town with the shiniest of classic cars on display at School House Park.

Next up is the Cowboy Symposium from October 7 through 10, at the Super Select Sale Barn in Glencoe.

Poets, musicians and cowboy entertainers will be on stage at the symposium. Trail rides, ropings and a chuckwagon cookoff round out the celebration.

Oktoberfest brings German food, dancing and music to the village on Friday and Saturday, October 15 and 16, at the Ruidoso Civic Events Center.

November's big event will be the Christmas Jubilee, a shopping extravaganza sponsored by the Ruidoso Valley Greeters, November 12-14, at the Civic Events Center.

According to published reports, sales of existing single-family homes in the Albuquerque area increased 3.2 percent during the first eight months of this year, compared to the same period last year.

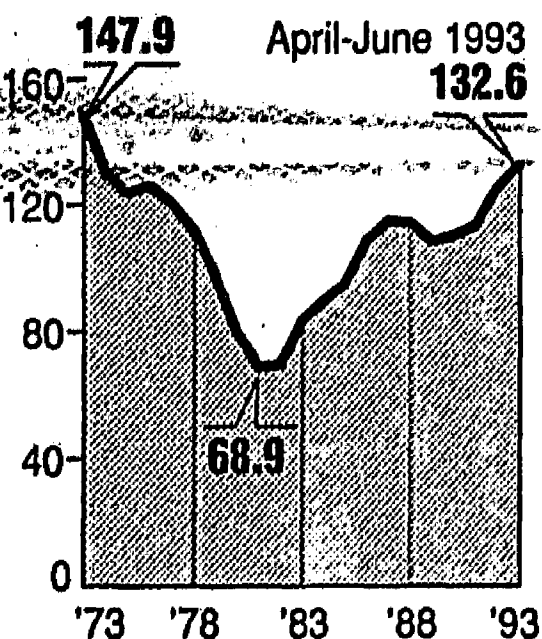
Existing single-family home sales were up 5.7 percent for August 1993 over August 1992, according to the Albuquerque Multiple Listing Service.

Household Help

Q. I own a three-bedroom ranch home in a rural area. I have my own private well due to the unavailability of municipal water. Recently, I asked several of my neighbors if they have experienced any reduction in the performance of their wells. Unfortunately for me, I am the only homeowner who has had problems with low water pressure and poor water quality. The well pump and water tank appear to be in operating condition. What could cause the above-mentioned irregularities in my system?

A. Initially speaking, a number of factors could be contributing to the disruptions in your well's performance. Some of these could be poor materials and/or construction, mineral deposits, and corrosion. However, there are also situations where the pumping equipment, instead of the well itself, is the culprit.

Taking into account what you've explained, it seems as if your system is doing its primary job, which is to pump water. Provided no other major problems, such as inadequate power or leaks, are concerned, there really isn't much else to troubleshoot. However, the possibility exists that your well's original capacity has been significantly reduced.

I would strongly suggest that you contact your local well contractor about your problem and get a professional judgment. It is also wise to have your well water tested annually to make sure it is safe to drink. In most areas, the local health department will perform this test for free. They can also advise you as to their standards of safe drinking water, etc. Generally speaking, you must beware of the presence of coliforms and E-coli bacteria.

PRE-FALL TIPS

- * You can now begin to shape up all of your lawn and garden equipment for next year's use.
- * Be sure to seal your blacktop driveways now before the cooler temperatures arrive.
- * If you enjoyed the harvest of your vegetable garden this season, till the soil for next year.
- * It is always advisable to do all major work on your automobiles now, especially before winter.
- * Give the exterior of your home a good visual inspection to see what priority maintenance needs to be performed.
