## Town talks transit system

Ruidoso residents may or may not be in favor of mass transit for the community. Whatever their opinions, grant money for such a project won't be available until October 1994.

Ruidoso's town hall meeting on the subject is scheduled for 7 p.m. Monday, January 11, at the Civic Events Center.

On November 24, the village council decided to postpone any action on a mass transit system for the village until a town meeting on the subject could be conducted on January 11.

At that November meeting, the council also reversed a previous decision to allow a modified \$5,000 feasibility study of a transit system.

Village manager Ron Wicker told the council that mistakes had been made in drafting the request for proposals (RFP) for the study and he submitted a confidential letter to the council outlining errors.

He asked the council to reconsider the RFP.

Because we have not violated any laws as yet, I would recommend the council reconsider the item, he said.


The council had received some local criticism because action toward lining up a transit system had been taken before a need was discussed.

The council had approved \$75,000 in the village budget; an application for a state grant by the transportation board was nearly complete; a local bus operator had been contacted; council support seemed secure; and a study, limited in scope, was only advertised in the local newspaper.

Although a similar proposal was made in 1990 for a transit system, that proposal asked for capital improvement money from the village of less than \$10,000 and no operational subsidy.

Councilor J.D. James pointed out that this new plan in question called for capital improvement money as well as operational subsidy with a five-year plan costing more than \$1 million.

Councilor Bill Karn suggested

## First five-member commission seated

Monroy Montes barely had a chance to sit down at the Lincoln County Commission table Monday before being unanimously elected chairman of the county's first five-member commission.

As the organizational meeting began at the courthouse in Carrizozo, outgoing chairman Stirling Spencer said he wasn't interested in another term with the gavel. He served as chairman for his entire first two-year term of office.

He nominated Montes to take

his place. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Wilton Howell. At the suggestion of Commissioner William Schwettmann, Montes was named by acclamation.

It was a harmonious start to a day that saw a few divided votes and several motions die for lack of seconds.

Earlier in the morning, Twelfth Judicial District Judge Richard A. Parsons swore into office all officials elected last November. He then sent them back to their department expressing the hope that

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## Rep. Underwood meets with his constituents

Drunk driving and health care led a variety of topics discussed at State Representative H. John Underwood's Town Hall meeting Monday at Village Hall.

Underwood and his guest, Senator Pete Campos (D-Santa Rosa), asked for community feedback as they prepare to enter the 1993 Legislative session.

Underwood said a better enforcement of the laws is only one of many possibilities in curbing DWI (driving while intoxicated) offenders.

Deterrents and knowing that when they caught me, my little rear end was going to jail and I was going to have to pay some fines regardless of who I knew, that might make a difference," Underwood said.

He felt emotional response is running high because of the tragic Christmas Eve accident that claimed a mother and three small children from Albuquerque.

Underwood said the last thing the state needs to do is spend millions on a plan that is inoperable.

Underwood said he is supportive of Attorney General Tom Udall's 62-point plan to fight DWI offenders.

He asked for a show of hands supporting a proposal to close all drive-up windows for liquor sales. Only one hand was raised.

Underwood said there should be required proof of insurance from bar owners at the time a license is issued. Another approach would be to tighten the hours of bars with later openings and earlier closing.

Underwood said he also is in agreement with the task force and liquor retailers who proposed closing the loophole in the state law that permits minors to purchase and consume alcoholic beverages in

bars, or to have alcoholic beverages served or delivered to them, if accompanied by a parent, adult spouse or legal guardian.

Underwood said he would like to leave community service open as a means of punishment.

"Just because you can't afford to pay the money, is no reason that the rest of us should be at peril," Underwood said.

He is looking into a "breathalyzer" that attaches to a car and prevents the motor from starting if the driver registers a high reading on the machine.

He suggested after a first offense that a driver would be required to

purchase and install such a device and leave it on for a designated period of time.

Several persons from the audience stressed education. Underwood agreed, but contended other action steps are necessary.

Another member of the audience suggested confiscating the offender's automobile, much like the current law against deer poachers. Underwood said that is under consideration.

Campos said police officers in his area know the regular drinkers, but don't stop those drinkers every day. He said it's a problem that has to be dealt with in every community.

Another member of the audience said lack of enforcement on the state level of bar owner infractions is a serious problem.

The first offenders program was cited for its effectiveness, but with the proposal that judges adhere strongly to its requirements.

Campos said better enforcement is possible with additional officers and that would mean a boost in dollars.

He showed a pie chart of the \$2.2-billion state budget and asked if the current division best serves the public.

Ruidoso Councilor J.D. James and Lincoln County Commissioner

Wilton Howell stressed education and enforcement of laws already on the books. County Commissioner Bill Schwettmann noted the emotional issue is nearly impossible to solve without a return to prohibition, which he didn't advocate.

Local resident Dan Barrow agreed with Howell that education is the best answer, although he said the history of pouring money into law enforcement to curb drug trafficking hasn't been that successful. He said he believes local police are understaffed.

The question was asked why New Mexico doesn't have a hospital cost containment board like many other states.

Campos said that in some of the smaller communities, hospital boards are beginning to compare costs themselves to see what it takes to operate.

"So the industry itself is taking care of itself," Campos said. "It's time for us to take care of the consumer."

He urged more participation by residents during the legislative session.

In Santa Fe you have roughly about 900 interests that are being lobbied for a 60-day session," Campos said. "With that you have about 650 lobbyists who are taking care of those interests. Those people are up there and are being paid. They're being paid by citizens being paid by attorneys, being paid by communities. They're out there fighting for the so-called interests."

Then we turn around and it's very seldom unless it's through our phones that we hear from the lobbyist. The keys we need to get to know all of you better and we need to know what it is that you're feeling, not only in meetings like this, but also during the sessions. ## Commission splits, stalls on BLM lawsuit

One of the most controversial issues to hit Lincoln County in years managed to split the new five-man county commission during its first meeting Monday.

After a lengthy and sometimes confusing discussion of the Bureau of Land Management's proposal to acquire 1,115-acres along the Rio Bonito, new Commissioner Wilton Howell entered a motion to withdraw the county's lawsuits against the federal agency.

Voting with Howell was L. Ray Nunley, another of the three new commissioners. Chairman Monroy Montes cast his support behind Commissioner Stirling Spencer, who wants the county to continue its pursuit of a court injunction and rulings in district and federal courts. Both men have been involved in the issue for the past two years.

The wildcard, newly-seated

Commissioner Bill Schwettmann, said he still did not have enough information, and abstained from voting.

In the absence of Roberts Rules of Order to govern the proceedings, no restriction exists in state statutes on commissioners abstaining.

That leaves county manager Andy Wynham and county attorney J. Robert Beauvais sitting in difficult positions.

While continuing to pursue the two lawsuits filed last month by the commission, they now realize that two commissioners oppose the move and the third could topple either way in subsequent meetings.

A few minutes after the split vote, Schwettmann suggested the board go into a closed-to-the-public executive session to hash out their points of view.

"It seems gutless to sit here and not make a stand on this issue," he said.

Wynham leaped to his feet and quickly squashed that idea. He pointed out to the new commissioner that going into executive session to decide positions would be illegal.

Howell added, "I don't like executive sessions in the first place."

"Neither do I," said Montes, who had been elected chairman earlier in the meeting. He asked Wynham whether the commission could go back into the issue after a vote was taken. Wynham said without a formal meeting procedure in effect, "you can do anything."

With that, Montes gavelled an end to discussion and accepted a motion to adjourn the meeting.

Howell had asked that the Rio Bonito issue be put on the agenda of the organizational meeting because he was concerned about the expense to the county of two lawsuits.

"I believe it is not financially feasible for the county to face \$50,000-

\$100,000 in legal fees and a multi-million lawsuit (counter suit) if we lose," Howell told fellow commissioners. "I would like to plead with this commission not to expose Lincoln County to this test case."

Spencer and Beauvais have acknowledged that the cases were filed to test whether the county's interim land use plan can be imposed on the federal government and whether the bureau and its supervising U.S. Department of Interior, have followed legal requirements in cooperating with the county in reference to the proposed exchange.

A 60-day notice of realty action is required, but patents for the first 400 acres were filed three days after the Interior Secretary dismissed the commission's objection to the land swap. By that time, the bureau had agreed to eight of nine conditions set forth by the county.

The remaining item was for the bureau to dispose of up to 35,000

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acres of its property in Lincoln County at the same time it acquired the Rio Bonito acreage.

The bureau's contention that it has met the commission's demand for land parity by giving 1,400 acres to the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport isn't valid, Beauvais said. That agency is an arm of the Ruidoso village government. The land did not pass into private hands, which is at the core of the commission's demand for private/public ownership balance in the county.

The bureau plans to swap about 36,000 acres elsewhere in the state for the 1,115 acres near the historic town of Lincoln. An initial acquisition of more than 400 acres already has occurred. Proponents contend the land will be more protected in the hands of the government than in those of private developers.

"I see letters from other parts of the country in support (of the lawsuits), but I don't see any checks enclosed," Howell said. He doubts whether the interim land use plan is constitutional because it was enacted after the mechanisms for the exchange had started grinding. He cited some case law supporting his opinion.

"I feel there will be a countersuit (by the private owner of the land proposed for bureau acquisition) and we will lose control over the legal expenses," Howell said. "I want to get out while we can. (Ron Green of the Lincoln Valley Land Company) has hired a lawyer who has taken it on contingency. They don't do that unless they think they will be paid."

Beauvais agreed with Howell that, if the commission wanted to drop the suits, now is the time before the defendants have responded. Until that time, the county may withdraw without the concurrence of the other side.

Spencer said the county is asking the federal government to comply with its own regulations. The county also needs to know whether its land use plan will stand up. That's something only the courts ultimately can decide, he said.

No one is telling the federal government or the private land owner that they can't exchange, he said. "We want to protect the county's revenue base (property tax roll) or tomorrow they could trade a third of the county

Sometimes a man's got to take a stand.

Nunley said he has compassion for both sides and that misrepresentations have come from advocates on both sides.

But I think if we get into federal court and can't get out, it might be three or four years and more than \$1 million, he said. I can't see spending the taxpayers' money for something that we may not win anyway. It's probably better to take our lumps in this and be prepared for the next. Have the land use documents approved and be ready to go after them.

Beauvais said any liability for the suits brought by the county would not be covered by insurance.

He filed in two different courts because two different items are being tested. One deals with the county's ordinances and state law, the other with federal regulations.

He disagreed that the county would be open to a valid countersuit. The two likely areas are for inverse condemnation or malicious prosecution, but the county hasn't done either of those things, Beauvais said.

"We're not telling them they can't sell, only if they do to the bureau, they must do it by the federal government rules," Beauvais said.

However, that would not necessarily stop someone from filing a lawsuit that could drag on in court, he admitted.

He also disagreed with the legal cost estimates. A declaratory judgment does not require the expensive process of discovery. It amounts to asking the courts to interpret statute and law, he said.

"The chances of succeeding on these suits is relatively low," Beauvais said. "I'm doing what you said. It's up to the commission to decide how important it is to have a say over county land."

To date, the county has spent \$2,300 on the fight, Wynham said.

Beauvais said he expects a tough reaction by the bureau. He has been told "this is the one where the bureau draws a line in the sand."

"This is staging to be a very important case. It's a question of whether we fight or wait for others to do it."

Several families that have been impacted by the exchange have hired attorneys and plan to sue the bureau, rancher Norbert McIntyre told the commission.

Rancher Bill Hays urged the new commissioners to stand behind Spencer and Montes.

"I'd like to see the commissioners continue this fight," he said. "We didn't make the rules and regulations. They did. We've got to take a stand somewhere."

Lincoln resident David Lee said he would hate to see the little 10-mile long valley "held hostage" by people trying to hang onto grazing rights or with other special interests.

He compared the county suits to a lengthy and expensive, on-going suit between the Mescalero Apache and other users over water rights.

"(You're saying) the easy way would have been to let the Indians have it (the water)," Montes asked.

Cleis Jordan, chairman of the Lincoln Historic Preservation Board, said the county would only be losing \$500 in taxes if the Rio Bonito land passes to the bureau.

"You've already exceeded that amount in legal fees," she pointed out. "I'm not willing to pay that and give up the others things that might suffer such as road repair."

If the commissioners want to individually pay, that's fine. Are the interests of the county really being served here or someone else's interests?

Long-time resident Lamoyne Peters took the podium and commended Spencer and Montes.

"I'd rather my tax money be spent fighting for my rights than giving them away."

dilemma, Underwood said.

"We don't really have an issue here because we don't have an indigent fund," he said. Although the Lincoln County Medical Center does set aside money for the medical care of indigents, Underwood said according to center director Valerie Miller the hospital will not be subject to an indigent assessment.

Part of the money used to operate the hospital comes from a special annual property tax assessment.

Underwood said voluntary contributions from counties throughout the state will earn a larger increase in federal dollars for Medicaid starting in July 1993, he said.

"It should be enough to cover all Medicaid costs," Underwood said.

Underwood's next town hall meeting is set for 7 p.m. Tuesday, January 12, at the Multipurpose Room in the Capitan district complex. Two meetings in Corona were scheduled for 4 p.m. at the school and 5:30 p.m. at city hall on Wednesday.

they will work together for the benefit of the community. A non-partisan reception for the officials and visitors staged by the League of Women Voters further cemented the mood of harmony.

But working for the community doesn't mean five commissioners, who come from different backgrounds, will agree on the best course to accomplish that goal.

In other action at the first meeting, the new five-member commission:

—decided how to select a vice chairman. The county has no ordinance governing that appointment, but it's convenient to have two chances at signatures on official documents that must be submitted by deadlines.

County manager Andy Wynham, in pain from a back problem, suggested that an ordinance be drafted spelling out the term of office for the chairman, method of selection and term for the vice chairman and any other loose ends that need to be covered.

The commission approved a motion by Spencer to "keep it simple," and to elect a chairman and vice chairman annually by majority vote. The naming of a vice chairman will have to wait until the ordinance is drafted and approved by the commission.

—decided not to adopt Roberts Rules of Order and, instead, to go by the rule of the gavel.

Wynham said that many commissions adopt Roberts Rules and

then suspend them until there is a need to control an unruly meeting.

That approach saves commissioners from criticism if, from lack of knowledge about procedures, they stray from the correct steps. Someone could look through the meeting minutes, trying to find procedural mistakes to block an action, he pointed out.

"I think what you just said was we want to change the rules any time we want to and I don't think that's fair to the public," said Commissioner L. Ray Nunley. "I prefer to operate the same way all the time."

County Clerk Martha Proctor said in the past, the commission has adopted a resolution amending certain points of the rules.

"We could find ourselves amending all the time," Wynham responded.

"You absolutely have to have a parliamentarian if you adopt Roberts Rules of Order," said county attorney J. Robert Beauvais.

Spencer said he would like the chairman to take an active part in voting, not just to break tie votes.

The first motion offered by Spencer to adopt Roberts Rules with the same amendments used in the past died in a 3-2 vote. A motion by Schwettmann not to adopt Roberts Rules and to go by the rule of gavel then passed unanimously.

Wynham said that action may cause some problems in situations such as an abstention that occurred later in the day. He is drafting some guidelines for commissioners.

"I guess we will go with Montes'

rules of order," chairman Montes said. "That's a new one for me. Can I tell my wife that?"

Schwettmann replied, "It doesn't work at home."

The commission set the regular meeting dates for 9 a.m. the first Tuesday of each month at the county courthouse in Carrizozo.

Schwettmann wanted different wording to ensure that meetings occasionally could be conducted in other areas of the county.

Beauvais said the law requires the commission to meet quarterly at the courthouse, but "other than that, they can meet elsewhere."

Wynham said, "The effect of this is to give notice of the meetings. If we modify, we do so in an open meeting and give notice to the media. A resolution (setting the dates and place) can be modified at any time."

In regular business, the commission:

—adopted a 13-day holiday schedule for the county. After several false starts that failed to pass, including Nunley's proposal to cut Good Friday and keep a floating birthday holiday, commissioners agreed to add Martin Luther King Day to the list and to delete the personal holiday. Spencer said he prefers the personal holiday because it gives individual recognition of employees.

—after a lengthy closed-to-the-public executive session, the commission went back into open session and Nunley offered the motion "to reappoint the county manager."

"That sounds good," Montes said

with a grin. "Do you have anyone in particular you want to appoint?"

When the laughter died down, Nunley motioned Wynham's name to the action and it passed unanimously.

—agreed to ask the Village of Ruidoso to swap maintenance responsibilities on Airport Road for Gavilan Canyon Road. Much of Gavilan lies within the village already. The county currently is improving sections of the airport road to Fort Stanton.

Former county commissioner Bill Elliott asked the board to move cauciously.

"In the event you trade ownership, will this affect the area of extra-territorial zoning?" he asked. That zone extends for one mile around the village as a transitional area affecting both the county and Ruidoso.

"What we're asking for now is an agreement on maintenance, but eventually, annexation may be involved," Wynham said. "That would extend the extra-territorial zone."

"That might not be a good idea," Elliott said. "I live on Gavilan Canyon and I'm extremely pleased with the quality of road care. We might not get that with the village. I urge you not to go into this."

Road manager Bill Cupitt said the existing situation is difficult on Gavilan because there are portions that belong to the state, the county and the city.

"The state never does anything," he said. "We've been doing the city and county portion without any agreement."

Significant improvements to the unpaved portion of the airport road and would like to have an agreement in place, Cupitt said.

—denied a request from James Sanchez to maintain a 5.5-mile connecting road from Baca Canyon to Arabela.

Spencer said the request should go to the forest service since the road primarily serves hunters and forest users.

Cupitt said three ranchers have property along the road. Beauvais said to meet legal requirements, the commission must receive a petition with the signatures of 10 property owners requesting county maintenance.

Cupitt said not all the owners are interested.

—voted to send out requests for proposals for attorney services and extended the county's contract with Beauvais for another 60 days.

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residents be allowed more input in whether or not the village needed a mass transit system. He said lodgers, business owners and other residents should be given a forum to express their viewpoints.

Councilor Ron Andrews said complaints he heard were against subsidizing the system with tax dollars.

He said a number of local business people, most of them lodgers and restaurant owners, would pay the village some fee for the service.

"Let's quit talking bus," Andrews said. "Let's talk shuttles van."

Andrews said that it was never

discussed what portion the village would have to pay for the system as far as the grant was concerned.

"All it says is that the village has to provide 20 percent in the case of purchase, and in the case of the operation, 50 percent," he said.

But any grant money from the State Transportation Authority (STA), will not be available to the village until October 1994.

Josette Padilla of the STA said that all grant applications for 1993 would have to be preceded by a letter of intent required to be in her office by December 31, 1992.

"There are no exceptions," said Padilla. "It cannot be waived."

She said she did not receive any

letter of intent from any transportation board or authority from Ruidoso.

Padilla said in missing the deadline, the next opportunity to submit a letter of intent would not be before the deadline of December 31, 1993. She said an application then could be submitted for consideration sometime between January and April of 1994. She said the next transit grant money would not be available until October 1994.

Although grant money will not be available during the term of the present village administration, private enterprise or the village council could use private money or village taxes to buy into a transit system.

Before this year's town hall meeting was set, councilors Barbara Duff and Andrews tried to save the study during the November meeting. Duff made a motion to create a special selection committee to evaluate the proposers of the study for approval or denial. Andrews seconded the motion.

However, councilors Jerry Shaw, Kara James and Frank Cummins voted against appointing the committee. The council then voted unanimously to conduct the town meeting scheduled for Monday at the Civic Events Center.

The session will be moderated by Joan Bailey, director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

very close, they are decided by the people with the vested interests that are there, that are watching these bills from day one all the way through to the end of the session.

"It's time for people in the community to get together and to go up to Santa Fe in a block or to talk to us personally and say, 'Pete, you're making a mistake.'"

"When we hear from enough of these people in our own district, the people who either vote in or vote us out, then we'll start to go ahead and take a closer look at it. It keeps getting back to that. We hear from the lobbyists on a daily basis, but I may only hear from you tonight and not again until I come back a year from now. I would like to hear from more of you on a regular basis."

# GOP head confronts new commish; questions Howell's loyalty to party

A newly-seated Lincoln County commissioner says he's upset with the heavy-handed, political muscle flexing of the local Republican party chairman.

Commissioner Wilton Howell, who was sworn into office Monday, said he met with party chairman Mike Kakuska and vice chairman Robert Nys in a late night session a few days before the New Year holiday.

The confab was requested by Kakuska to discuss rumors concerning Howell's party loyalty.

Howell said he was asked whether a coalition had been formed with the other commissioners-elect, fellow Republican Bill Schwettmann and Democrat L. Ray Nunley, to put Howell or Schwettmann in the commission chairman's seat.

A second rumor brought up by Kakuska was that once Howell was in the position of power, he would switch political parties and become a Democrat.

## LOYALTY ISSUE

Even though five years have passed since Howell changed his voter's registration from Democrat to Republican, some party members apparently still question his sincerity.

"I told (Kakuska) that the first time I responded to that rumor (about switching parties), I regarded it as a question, but this time I considered it an insult," Howell told *The Ruidoso News*.

The first time occurred during a candidate night as a kick-off event

during the campaign for the November election. Howell assured members of the party at that function that he had changed his affiliation because of his philosophical alignment with the Republican national movement and had no intention of returning to the Democratic party fold.

Howell claims that at the late night meeting, Kakuska contended the Republican party was responsible for his election success.

"I reminded (Kakuska) that I was elected to represent the people, not a party," Howell said. "I told him if the Republican party was that strong, he (Kakuska) would have been elected."

Kakuska lost his bid for a position on the county commission to Democrat Nunley.

"I asked Kakuska if Schwettmann or I were named chairman, what would be wrong with that. Was there any reason we shouldn't serve as chairman. Were we deficient?" Howell said.

On Monday, Republican Monroy Montes was elected unanimously by the other four commissioners as chairman of the county commission, setting that issue for the next year.

Howell said, "I also reminded (Kakuska and Nys) that I had been a Republican longer than either of those two have lived here. I told them that I didn't understand their questions since in 1988, I went to the Republican convention as an honorary delegate. It was my choice."

## KAKUSKA'S SIDE

Kakuska's version of the meeting is much milder than Howell's

impression. He told *The News*, "I'm really sad to hear Will said something like that."

He had heard rumors that needed to be confronted directly with Howell, Kakuska said.

"As party chairman, I would do the same with anyone," he said. "We wanted to meet face to face with Will to dispel the rumors if they weren't true."

"(Howell) was correct in what he said, rumors were abounding that he and others were doing things against the party, that he really was not a Republican."

"He denied that and I said great."

Kakuska contends he never claimed the party was responsible for Howell's election or that Howell jabbed him about losing his personal election bid.

## NYS RESPONDS

Nys told *The News* he considered the hour and a half meeting friendly.

"As far as we were concerned, it was friendly," he said. "We wanted to find out if the rumors were true and to get (Howell's) point of view. We were looking for his help to clear up these issues."

"He was not real happy, but it was not confrontational."

"As far as the Party helping get him elected, (Howell) ran as a Republican, not as an Independent."

"I don't know that we were disturbed about the chairmanship, only that if there was an alliance with Nunley (a Democrat) that when (Howell) became the chairman, he might switch back (to being a Democrat)."

Howell said he wanted to know who was spreading the rumors.

"If they don't have enough guts to ask me face to face and the (party) chairman believes the rumors, that's a heck of a way to foster party loyalty," he said.

Howell contended that he also told Kakuska if he did decide to change his party affiliation, "I wouldn't do it in the dark of night. I'd let him know personally."

"If I change my affiliation, I'll be the one to suffer any consequences."

## PURGE PARTY

One remark that Howell said particularly bothered him was when Kakuska "said something to the effect that he would hate to have to purge the party. I said, what are you going to do, burn my voter's card. Hitler didn't win World War II."

As Kakuska remembers the meeting, there was no discussion about who started the rumors and he denies using the word "purge." Nys also said he doesn't recall the statement.

Nys said Howell apparently misunderstood the reason for the meeting. Kakuska's primary interest is to unify the party, he said.

Kakuska confirmed that assessment, saying, "As party chairman, I will continue to help our candidates and to make the party stronger."

But Howell said it will be difficult for him to enthusiastically back Kakuska's efforts in the future by attending party functions.

He said he told Kakuska, "I'm not going someplace where I feel uncomfortable."

## History buffs gather to consider museum

Lincoln County is crammed full of history and it goes well beyond Billy the Kid or the settlement of Lincoln.

The history encompasses the pioneer settlers who trekked from the East to the desert, plains and mountains of southern New Mexico. It is wrapped in the Hispanic traditions traced back to early explorers and the Mesalero Apache before their arrival. And more recently, the county's history is entwined with the fortunes of the mining industry, the railroad, ranching, gambling and horse racing.

John West and the Lincoln County Historical Society would like to see each community in the county cull old attics, government archives, family albums and deserted farms to create their own unique collection of artifacts.

The eventual goal would be to establish museums in Corona, Hondo, Ruidoso-Ruidoso Downs, Carrizozo and Capitan.

The first brain-storming meeting for the Ruidoso area is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Monday, January 11,

at the Ruidoso Public Library. "Each area would have autonomy," West said. "But to get things off the ground, it would be easier to work through the society, which has its tax exempt status. It's a good place to start."

Now membership chairman for the society, West formerly served on the planning and zoning commission in Santa Fe and was active on projects in the historic settlement of Lincoln.

"But many people could care less about Lincoln or Billy the Kid, yet they still love history and have items and photos they'd be interested in donating," West said.

"First the people have to be lined up and then they must decide on a theme. They don't want to be locked into a building prematurely. We want to encourage people in the various areas to come up with their own theme."

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

# Warriors nipped by Wildcats, 51-53

A more experienced Ruidoso Warrior boys basketball team traveled to Tularosa for the second meeting of the two rivals, but it wasn't quite enough to earn a victory.

In the first match-up the Warriors were entering their first game while Tularosa had already taken the court once. Tulie dominated in the first game with a 19-point win.

The Warriors were ready for a different outcome and almost captured it Tuesday night there. Although the team got off to a slow start and was behind 11-20 at the end of the first quarter, Tularosa put on a strong defensive press causing several expensive turn overs.

The second quarter went to the Warriors 16-7 as they tightened up their own defense and moved the ball well on offense. The squad was within one by half, 26-27, but it wouldn't get any easier in the second half.

Both teams scored 11 points in the third quarter to keep the game exciting for fans and players alike. As time dwindled down the Warriors kept within striking distance and worked to take the lead. Coach Norman Wright said the team probably played its best game of the season and showed a definite improvement from the first game.

He said the game was good because it also gave them something to measure their improvement with. It was an especially strong showing considering how tough it is to play there.

The top scorer for the game was junior Jeff Chapman with 16 points. Raul Davis made 18 points, including five of six on the free throw line. Casey Kearns scored 10 and Comanche earned six.

Wright said he is encouraged about how the game went because it shows that they are getting better. The players are working hard and putting a lot of emotion into each game.

"I'm proud of how they played and how they handled themselves under pressure," he said.

Every Sunday and Wednesday from 10 Am until 2 Pm on the Smokey Bear NASTAR course, test your skill by racing against the

clock. If your time, handicapped for age and sex, falls within certain limits, you'll be awarded a gold, silver or bronze medal.

NASTAR, an acronym for National Standard Race, challenges child and adult skiers at nearly 200 ski areas in the United States, Canada, New Zealand and West Germany.

Each area selects a pacesetter

whose race time is compared to that of a US Ski Team Member. As individual skiers race at their areas, their times are compared to their area pacesetter to determine medals.

Thus, an individual skier is really comparing his or her performance to that of a US Ski Team member.

That's part of NASTAR's appeal. So, if you want to find out how good you really are, sign up at the Ski School Desk or at the course any Sunday or Wednesday, weather permitting.

Cost is \$5 for the first two runs and \$1 for each run thereafter. All racers receive a souvenir race bib.

### NASTAR Tips

1. Preview the course. No one should ever race without examining the course first, noting where the gates are, how far apart they're spaced, etc. If you can't ski beside the course, check it from the lift.

2. Stretch at the starting gate, warming and loosening leg, waist and back muscles.

3. As you wait your turn, note how other racers start, then approach each gate. Visualize yourself making smooth turns.

4. In the course, look two gates ahead of where you actually are.

5. As you streak for the finish line, either tuck or extend a pole to "break" the light beam that stops the clock. You'll see better racers lift a foot, trying to break the beam with their ski tip.


About 25 students are active in SADD but all students are considered members because of their support of the idea of not drinking and driving. Sponsor of the group is Gerald Ames.

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

# Chamber of Commerce welcomes new director

The Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce welcomed a new director on to the board at its meeting on December 30.

Dave McIntosh replaces Ron McWilliams who resigned at last month's meeting because he will be moving out of the area. McIntosh was selected because he received the next highest number of votes; after the filled positions, during the past election by chamber members. He has been involved in the chamber's advertising committee.

The board quickly covered agenda items including a financial report which showed they are right on budget, and a inquiries report. Inquiries by mail, phone and walk-ins have all seen increases from last year's activity. The mail-outs were 101.5 percent higher than last year and the total activity was 40.8 percent higher.

### Unusual Warm Wave Awakens Leaf Buds

Every day since Christmas has been unseasonably warm except New Year's Day, when the world was filled with a freezing mist, and the temperature did not rise above 34 all day.

Here it is already at the beginning of what we call the deep of winter — January 5 till February 15 — and we have had days of wind out of the southeast carrying a warm wave from the desert lands away to the lower country, day and night now for two days this wind has been blowing through the mountain land, melting away most all the snow in the land below the mountain, and even some of the snow on the sunny side of the mountain itself.

This constant warm wind is awakening some of the leaf buds from their winter slumbers. Down at Conley's Lakes you may see the giant willows turning a shade of green, and the Weeping Willow and Globe Willows, first to leaf out — are turning that golden color

that they show before starting out with their leaves. The Chinese elms have already put out their little spangles that appear before the leaves.

All this is about a month and a half early. Winter weather began a month early this season, at the beginning of true winter.

More than likely the weather spirits are just catching their breath, and giving us a little time to prepare for more snow.

A large flock of ducks came out of the north and landed in a pool at the bend of the river here at Storm's Crossing. Perhaps they are letting us know there is a little winter weather headed our way.

## Downs board conducts a record 10-minute meeting

In an incredibly short meeting on December 28, the Ruidoso Downs board of trustees gathered for about 10 minutes to take care of business before the new year.

The group approved the last meeting's minutes, the agenda and accounts payable before heading into regular business. The first item on the agenda was also quickly dispensed with as trustees approved a mobile home variance for Steve Smith to bring in a mobile home older than 10 years.

The group also gave village clerk

Leann Weibrecht permission to publish amendments to the sewer and water ordinances. Trustees voted last month to increase the sewer and water rates, beginning January 1, 1993, to build a reserve fund to be able to do necessary repairs and maintenance.

The minimum charge for sewer will be \$8 per month with a \$1 increase for the next three years. The minimum water rate will now be \$14.50 per month for 4,000 gallons of water consumed. This rate will also increase \$1 per year for the next three years.

Trustees were also scheduled to hear a report on the village's 1991-1992 audit from Don Wingfield of the city's auditing firm, Woodard, Wingfield and Cowan of Roswell. Wingfield was unable to attend the meeting and will come to the January 11 meeting to give his report.

# Cleanup progresses at Capitan landfill

Improvements are under way at the debris landfill in Capitan operated by the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

A November visit by an inspector with the State Department of Environment resulted in two citations against the landfill. At the same time, complaints mounted about nails littering the road to the facility, flattening tires.

The inspector noted that piles of abandoned appliances, called white goods, have accumulated at the landfill and that scavengers roam through the property, exposing themselves to potential injury.

Authority manager Gene Green said he has called an Artesia company "and it will pick up a load in February, or it will be moved earlier if we can haul it ourselves before that."

"I haven't sent any (metal goods) out since we started operating the landfill. We were considering handling them ourselves, but the process (of dismantling for salvage) is too labor intensive," he said.

Some residents also expressed concern about doors left on refrigerators or other large appliances that might trap small children or animals.

Green said he checked the pile of white goods and only found one freezer chest that might pose a danger. He said while waiting for the items to be hauled away, he will take a banding machine to the landfill and close that appliance and any others he finds with locking doors.

He has stopped the random

scavenging at the landfill, Green said.

"But I may work out an official salvage agreement with an individual or company that also could involve taking care of the white goods and used lumber," Green said. "We would have to require sorting of material into certain areas to accomplish that, possibly giving a tipping fee break. Whatever can be removed, means less to go into the landfill."


The mound of accumulated brush is going to be a harder problem to solve.

"I'm still looking for the best method to handle the brush," he said. "It's accumulated over the years before we took over the landfill and it won't be a simple thing to get rid of. We've considered burying it, but that would take up valuable space in the landfill cell. It's going to cost us some dollars to get rid of it no matter what route we go."

Green said the size of the chipper the authority uses to create mulch is too small for the huge piles of material at the landfill. He would have to use a tub grinder, which costs about \$20,000.

"I'm looking to rent one or have someone demonstrate on that big pile," he said. "I'm giving it priority to move the material out. It's gotten too dry."

By now residents should be experiencing some relief from the nail problem. A county road department worker was dragging a magnet machine over the road to the landfill Tuesday, picking up scattered nails. The authority purchased the device and it will be used periodically to police the road.

People in this district have a voice in Santa Fe.

State Representative H. John Underwood (D-Dist. 56) is seeking input from the people of his district before he heads to Santa Fe for this year's 60-day legislative session. He's conducting public meetings throughout his district and meeting with individuals who have particular issues to discuss.

Underwood — joined by Senator Pete Campos, whose senatorial district includes Lincoln County — hosted a meeting Monday in Ruidoso. Underwood and Campos listened attentively to a handful of people who gathered in council chambers of Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center, and assured those people that they'll keep their concerns in mind when they get to Santa Fe.

Perhaps the most important thing that came out of Monday's meeting was a reminder to keep in touch. Campos reminded the small audience that their concerns have been listened to and noted, but when he and the other state lawmakers convene in Santa Fe they'll be seeing more than 600 paid lobbyists every day whose job it is to push for their more than 900 special interests. Both Campos and Underwood said they want to hear from the people back home when they get to Santa Fe, but usually most of their contacts on upcoming votes are from lobbyists.

"Call us," urged both Campos and Underwood, and if their past actions are an indicator, they'll be willing to listen and consider each and every viewpoint. As soon as their telephone numbers are assigned for this session, we'll pass those on in the newspaper. Underwood can be reached in Ruidoso at his law office in the Stroud Building, 258-9090.

This district is lucky to have two elected officials who are so firmly committed to represent the views and beliefs of the people who live here. It's good to know that our elected officials care what we think.

For a native of New Mexico, I have probably traveled a disproportionate amount of public transportation miles. At the early age of five I traveled with my family to California and back on a Santa Fe passenger train (yes, there was life before Amtrak).

I've ridden Amtrak cross country, have ridden it past the finger lakes of New York State and into Boston South Station, and — most exciting for me — right into Grand Central Station.

However European trains can't be beat; they have luxury and meet their schedule with such precision that you could set your watch by it.

As with most of us, I've traveled here and there in the air and with each flight am both amazed and awed that I can really be where I'm at with so few minutes gone from the clock.

Buses, yup, I like them, too. Someone else drives; I read. For a period of time I commuted into Rochester, New York, and all around the city — great fun, great fun.

The best bus rides in the world are England's double decker — up the stairs and right up front, right where the tree branches smack the glass that my eyes are glued to. Of course there are others in other cities — San Francisco and Seattle come to mind — and, yes, they had the trolleys, too. I love the clatter of the trolley.

However, I must admit my first love in mass transportation lies with the subway.

New York City subways with

their beautiful graffiti and that slight element of fear of being mugged.

BART in San Francisco sometimes goes where you want to go but, who cares? sometimes you just want to ride a round trip for a thrill.

Munich's underground has no ticket takers or turnstiles; you buy your tickets in a machine and then the honor system takes over. And they are so clean — so clean.

Paris subways run on rubber tires — 125 miles per hour, smooth as glass.

My first order of business in Boston was to go underground and ride every train to everywhere. Once you go down and pay, transfers are free 'til you come back up. Most fun I ever had for a quarter. There's the Green Line to the theater district and China Town, the Red Line will get you fast to Harvard Square, the Blue Line to

Logan Airport and the Orange Line is old but pretty much goes everywhere else.

Yes, I could go on and on about my love for the subway — the snap of the doors, the squeal of the breaks, and of course the violin player with the case open playing for change down there at the station.

So, yes, Ruidoso; and, yes, council, I am 100 percent for mass transportation in our mountain village and wholeheartedly hope you would look into the merits of the subway — my favorite you know — (snow doesn't effect it).

And please, please put a subway stop right close to my front door as I am totally convinced that with this rhetorical sidestepping of intimate real village problems that my muddy road will never, ever get fixed.
