## EDCLC locks Ruidoso hotel with airline service

Searching for hotel developers not in Ruidoso's backyard is proving difficult.

Councilor Jerry Shaw said a letter sent to the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDCLC) in response to hotel development query indicated that such a hotel would not be feasible unless airline service was provided to the area.

vided to the area.

Shaw said Karen Kopp, director of the EDCLC, reported she had sent 15 packages to major hotel chains including Westin, Marriott and Hyatt.

In her letter to the council, Kopp wrote that all the respondents had the same thing to say. They are not developing at the present time, however, if a hotel was built, they would like to manage it.

One of the more enlightening letters came from C.W. Bill Weaver of the American Breco Corporation in Texas.

Weaver wrote that he had examined the possibilities of a 200 bed hotel in Ruidoso and submitted an appraisal.

"I have been advised that the general characteristics of Ruidoso in terms of tourist traffic and adequate infrastructure are not con-

ducive to provide for the necessary return for this type of investment," he wrote.

"For example, the absence of a regular scheduled airline indicates tourist and convention traffic would not support the proposed venture to the extent required to recover the initial investment in a reasonable period of time, if at all.

"We feel the operation of a 200 bed hotel could be successful, how-

ever, the recovery of the investment, along with the debt service, would likely abrogate the business opportunity by creating an occupancy rate as well as room cost that would not be competitive in the marketplace. With this added burden, we are unwilling at this time to further consider the venture from an investment possibility."

Mayor Victor Alonso recently was critical of the village subsidiz-

ing Mesa Airlines two years ago, saying that the move was led by potential hotel developer R.D. Hubbard.

Hubbard also owns and operates the golf course adjoining the village's hotel site.

In an issue related to attracting tourists and conventions, Alonso said that speakers at the AARP

Seeing is believing. That's why Miller Hudson, MRS. coordinator for the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe, organized a tour of nuclear facilities for a group of area elected officials, business people and the press.

Hudson and his entourage have traveled by car, bus, train, plane and even the Jamestown Ferry, to visit two nuclear power plants with on-site monitored retrievable storage (MRS) facilities.

"I'm not here to brainwash you or spoon feed you...this is an opportunity for you to educate yourselves," said Hudson during an orientation session at Keowee Kee, South Carolina, Sunday.

Ruidoso village councilor Bill Karn represented his town on the information-gathering trip. Karn heads up the village's MRS Advisory committee.

Also on the trip are Bill Hirschfeld and Barbara Willard, both of the Ruidoso Board of Realtors and Frankie Jarrell of The Ruidoso News. Lincoln County Commission Chairman Monroy Montes, county manager Andy Wynham, Carrizozo Mayor Cecilia Kuhnle, Tularosa Councilor Jeni Alexander, Alamogordo City Commissioner Jerry Poole and Otero County Sheriff's Deputy Robert Sanchez are in the group.

Reporting on the trip are Ward Mathews of Roswell KBIM-TV 10, and Beverly McCutcheon of the Alamogordo Daily News.

Mescalero tribal administrator Sarah Misquez, tribal member Ed Little and Museum of the Horse development director Frank Potter made the trip.

U.S. Council on Energy Awareness and the Edison Electric Institute provided transportation and lodging for trip participants, with

## Commission to carry heavy road load

Lincoln County Commissioners decided last week they'll take all of the heat for decisions involving roads.

For several years, past commissions utilized groups of citizens to physically review and recommend action on roads that residents request to be opened or closed.

Last year, commissioners decided to turn the "on call" group into a standing committee. But with the board now enlarged to five commissioners, they changed their minds last week and abolished the road review committee.

"Road committees are not used in many other counties," county manager Andy Wynham said. "Often, the commissioners review

the roads once a month themselves.

"It seems there's an extra layer of bureaucracy that could be eliminated. It's a very antiquated law that needs to be reviewed," he said referring to the committee and a requirement for the signatures of 10 property owners along a road before it can be opened for county maintenance.

"The policy is not working for the people with a standing committee," Commission Chairman Monroy Montes said.

Commissioner Stirling Spencer offered the motion to disband the committee and for the commissioners to accept the responsibility.

"Do you really think that's prudent," Commissioner William Schwettmann asked. "That gets so

political. I'm not sure the committee isn't a good buffer zone. I'm not sure we want to abolish it until we see how it works."

But Commissioner L. Ray Nunnley said, "It's part of our job to represent the citizens and I don't feel it's necessary to build a wall around us with a citizens' committee. If we have to take a little heat, we should have been aware of that when we ran for office."

County Attorney J. Robert Beauvais said some commissions only review roads once a year or on a quarterly basis.

"But if you take on the function, you must physically go out and come up with a report to yourselves," he said.

The motion passed with Commissioners Schwettmann and

Wilton Howell voting against it.

Spencer said road manager Bill Cupit will go with commissioners when roads are to be inspected to give technical advice.

That action also clears the way for Cupit to decide school bus route maintenance requests. Earlier in the meeting, commissioners approved a resolution allowing Cupit, not the review committee, to handle that job, since his department would be doing the work.

Commissioners also asked Beauvais to determine how much latitude exists on the requirement for 10 signatures of property owners. In many cases involving rural roads, 10 people may not live within the certain area.

## Community grades school code

A committee, representing the school administration and parents with school-age children, will be in charge of reviewing questionnaires about the current athletic code of the Ruidoso school district.

District superintendent Mike Gladden told Ruidoso School Board members Tuesday that 475 questionnaires were mailed to parents whose children are in extra-curricular activities.

"I thought we could share the results with you tonight, but only 92 have been returned" and he would prefer an independent group to handle the review, Gladden said.

"I don't want the people to think the school district is trying to sway the results."

He invited an anonymous caller who contacted the central office complaining about possible tampering with the results, to join the 10-member committee.

"We're not looking at a quick fix this year," Gladden said. "We want to get all the input from the community, parents and educators to put together an effective athletic code. Our aim is to do what's best for our kids."

Questionnaires will be mailed to other people who call and request them, he said.

A review and possible revision of the athletic code was proposed last month after the father of an athlete who was punished under the existing rules, contended they violated his son's right to due process.

The code, without a procedure for appeal, calls for the removal of an athlete from a sport for the season on a first offense, if that athlete is caught or admits to drinking or using drugs. A second offense would see the student removed from sports for the rest of the year. If the offense took place during a school activity, the removal would be for the calendar year.

Board Member Susan Luteran suggested that some of the representatives for the review group be picked from the membership of the Blue Ribbon Committee, which helped with the recent school construction bond issue.

Board Member Mike Morris said he would like to see the majority be parents with children in school "because that's what it pertains to."

The final composition picked was six members from the community and four from the school system.

"Once the results are tallied and we have a synopsis, we'll give you the results," Gladden said. "Probably at the next board meeting."

Board president Lynn Willard said several people had just received their questionnaires and he's expecting many more to be returned.

"We included a stamped, self-addressed envelope, so I hope we will," Gladden said.

"That's quite an investment," Board Member Ron Hemphill said.

In another matter, Gladden said he would like to remedy the misuse

## Cemetery cries out for care

Forest Lawn Cemetery in Ruidoso has an imposing iron gate entrance, behind which is a pastoral setting on the side of a mountain in a grove of trees.

Directly inside the gate is a designed garden area and a bench to sit and meditate. All the trap-pings to command respect.

Some people believe a cemetery is more than a final resting place; that it is a solemn place, worthy of dignity and above all to be treated with respect. It's also a place marked with history, frequently visited by out-of-towners.

Ruidoso's Forest Lawn is filled with character.

Thoughtful phrases are accompanied by a Teddy bear at one child's graveside. A tribute to a fiddler with his boots form another headstone. Caring individuality marks the graves throughout the cemetery.

But also directly inside of the

gates is a dilapidated dumpster with bags of trash that have been sitting for more than a month and a lidless silver trash can stationed among the headstones. Markers are missing. Driving lanes are poorly repaired. A pitiful looking grounds, woefully neglected, flanks a weed filled garden area that is a community disgrace. On the back lane, a maintenance building with doors hanging from hinges is surrounded by empty buckets and other debris.

Forest Lawn is the responsibility of the Ruidoso Parks and Recreation Department.

Councilor J. D. James has long been an advocate of a better maintained cemetery. About two weeks ago, The Ruidoso News received a call about weeds and garbage piling up in the cemetery dumpster. James said he would ask for a cleanup at Tuesday's Council meeting.

But some Ruidoso residents feel that a once a year cleanup is another bandaid approach to an ongoing

cleanliness problem brought out recently at an American Association of Retired Persons meeting.

They feel that respect for the dead should be shown 365 days a year, not once a year.

Village councilors said they would look into a new piece of equipment that doesn't tear up the gravesites.

LaGrone funeral director Danny Sisson said he has tried for five years to convince the village to set up a maintenance program. He said responsibilities have been divided between parks and recreation and the street department.

Sisson said the cemetery is not a high priority for the parks department in the summer time, and the street department will not move the dirt when it's excessively mounded. He said the parks department could move the dirt, but doesn't have the equipment.

Some of the shoulders of the cemetery streets have been broken down by equipment crossing the cemetery and entering the streets at an angle.

Sisson said about six months ago the cemetery board asked village officials for a part time employee. The board thought possibly some retired person could be a part time caretaker, perhaps four hours a day. The person could pick up the trash, run the lawn mower or weedeater and in the winter, keep the grounds maintained.

He said the board was told no money was available.

Sisson said, although he hasn't a large staff at the funeral home, they still take periodic trips to pick up trash when the mess becomes too much of a distraction.

He said a part time caretaker with a small tractor and trailer also could handle the job of repairing occasional grave site cave-ins.

"Put a little dirt in the trailer, transfer it to the site, no big deal," Sisson said.

Former Ruidoso Councilor Al Junge's wife, Esther, is buried next to two tall pines on a beautifully maintained site.

Junge was asked his opinion of the current cemetery maintenance program.

He said he didn't expect anything as expensive as perpetual care demands but, "It should be somewhere between perpetual care

and complete neglect."

Junge spoke of the sensitivity and respect of former village deputy manager Gary Jackson, who notified him when a site was being excavated next to Junge's.

"To excavate, one of the wheels of that big machine would have dug into my property," Junge said. "Jackson rented a smaller machine, not to intrude on my property."

The cemetery is marked with ruts from heavy equipment passing through the lots. In some cases, excess dirt has been piled high on gravesites three years old.

On some fresh gravesites, rather than contain the dirt in an orderly fashion around the site after a burial has been completed, dirt has been allowed to spill in a wide arch, creating a mess on surrounding gravesites.

Junge said the paved roads seemingly appeared overnight at the courtesy of Bill McCarty.

"He did it for free," Junge said. "It didn't cost the village a dime."

The Woman's Club also created the once proud flower garden near the entrance.

Junge is convinced the cemetery needs an operating procedure, which he claims has never been initiated during his more than 15 years in Ruidoso.

He talked of dirt piled inordinately high, rather than disposing of it.

While on the grounds, Junge pointed out a dented silver garbage container sitting next to several graves.



Some graves have lost their identification markers. One small child's grave with only a Madonna statue still intact, not only had the name missing, but tire tracks were visible over one end of the site.

Discarded black plastic bags, soft drink cans, broken window glass, and weeds can be found in most areas.


Three bags of weeds next to the dumpster, have been there since Christmas. The dumpster has been emptied, but the bags remained.

Sisson said the cemetery has made money for the village, but it has been dropped into the general fund.

He said last year's cemetery revenues were \$10,583 and expenses were only \$4,728.

# New White Mountain School plans mid-April start

A contract for construction of Ruidoso's new elementary school could be awarded in mid-April.

The School Board Tuesday reviewed the site plan of the 20-classroom building that will be built immediately to the east of the intermediate school.

A driveway designed to run behind the new school, which will serve first and second grades, will connect it to the older White Mountain complex.

The total estimated cost of the school, including site work is \$2,380,000.

The district will realize \$3-

million from the sale of property tax revenue bonds. Expenses such as taxes, furnishings, contingencies, architect fees, testing and printing will run \$511,000, leaving a balance for construction of \$2,489,000, about \$109,000 leeway. Asphalt paving around the new building is estimated to cost \$82,000.

Four alternates totalling \$502,500 also were reviewed by Scott Stafford with the Albuquerque firm of Greer/S.J.C.F. Inc.

In addition to the 20 classrooms in the 13,450 square foot structure, the school will contain a small multi-purpose room where children can be served and eat lunch in

shifts, Stafford said.

"The committee was very cooperative to get the 20 classrooms and have less frills," he said. Although classrooms with 900 square feet were the board's preference, they were cut to 840-square feet to lower the price. The estimated price per square foot is \$71, Stafford said.

Preparation of the boggy ground and putting down a foundation that will not be damaged by the wet soil underneath it, may prove to be one of the biggest challenges, Stafford said. The level drops eight feet from one end of the school to the other.

In a related matter, the board heard a report by finance officer

Caron Snow on how much money student enrollment generated from the state.

Superintendent Mike Gladden said this was the first year the State Department of Education used a floating figure. Districts weren't sure until earlier this month what the final unit reimbursement figure would be, he said.

"We planned on \$1,845 based on the state's floating figure," Gladden said. "One day, they called and said it would be \$1,879, then called back the next day to say they made a mistake and it would be \$1,867 (per full time student equivalent)."

District officials over-estimated the growth in the schools, even

though it still was healthy, Snow said.

"We estimated a 5.5 percent increase and the actual was 4.51 percent. It's positive, but lower than estimated," she said.

Under the early childhood category, they had estimated 170 students and only 140 were registered at the 40 day count. That's the figure used by the state. In seventh through twelfth grades, the district estimate was 872 and 829 was the actual total.

In first grade, the estimate was 182, but in this case 208 showed up.

"We did reach budget and that's the important thing," Snow said.

"We should see \$6,235,316 from the state equalization (reimbursement) formula," she said.

Local property tax income was estimated at \$63,149 and is right on track with 82 percent received, Snow reported. Federal impact was projected at \$600,853, but \$640,334 already has come in and another \$100,000 may follow.

Gladden said 35 new students registered after the Christmas break. Although the Mescalero Apache Tribe is building a 40-unit housing area and predicted as many as 100 more students would attend in Ruidoso, that impact has not materialized, Gladden said, adding, "I really don't anticipate it."

meeting recently felt the village was not as neat and tidy as other villages.

At that AARP meeting, members complained of discarded cars, weeds, unsightly business buildings and inferior road repair.

Alonso, who enters his fourth year as mayor, appeared very concerned and said he has heard the complaint before. He said when you lived in the village a number of years, it becomes easy to overlook some of the things others feel are less attractive.

The mayor was open for suggestions, but none of the council provided ideas, such as routine maintenance by village departments.

Wicker spoke of a community in Texas where he worked that received federal money to build community awareness with a beautification program. He talked of community awareness and help through schools, civic clubs, boy scouts and girl scouts.

"The awareness situation and getting the people that live here is really going to be the solution to the problem," Wicker said.

However, residents of Ruidoso

on a side with less snow buildup.

In addition to the 20 classrooms when dumpsters were still a responsibility of the village last year, former deputy manager Gary Jackson proposed a plan that could inexpensively do away with the ugly containers on Sudderth and Mechem drives. That plan was submitted to Wicker and died without further presentation. Wicker said it would have taken an extra worker.

"I don't want to let the ball drop," Alonso said. He told the village manager to research plans and submit names that can help turn the village appearance around.

While the mayor has opted for periodic cleanups in the past, AARP members have stated they want the "ongoing" routine maintenance for which they pay their taxes.

Councilor J.D. James said that MainStreet's facelift this year would inspire many people to take a second look at the village and correct any appearances of blight.

"It's going to be amazing how beautiful downtown is going to be when that project is completed," James said.

Shaw said planning and zoning has a responsibility to enforce such items as signage restrictions and building demolition regulations.

Planning director Cleatus

Richards once again said he was short staffed and didn't have the time to "fully enforce any of those ordinances."

James reminded the council of signs that should have come down as long as 11 years ago.

Alonso suggested that perhaps a committee could help the town by doing some of the leg work in areas where Richards suffers time constraints.

Councilor Ron Andrews said much of the enforcement depends on the cooperation of the owner. Lack of cooperation could be expensive and take a lot of time.

Andrews indicated sharper teeth are needed in enforcement to prevent costly litigation.

Alonso said his inclination was to appoint the people who complain the loudest that the village needs cleaning.

"They have the interest. They notice it. Maybe that's a subject they would like to undertake," Alonso said.

## PAVING

Alonso said another concern among the residents is paving and how the streets are selected.

The mayor spoke of a council meeting last year where representatives from Town and Country

subdivision asked for their roads to be repaved and said they would agree to an assessment district.

"The engineers have come back and have given us an estimate and we have not resolved to do anything about that. I've asked (village manager) Ron (Wicker) and (deputy manager) Allen (Briley) to bring it to this council. There's some downsides to an assessment district. That may be that we spent so much money on somebody's lot, we might wind up spending more than it's worth, thereby incurring lawsuits. However, I just don't want this issue to fall between the cracks," Alonso said.

Briley said the assessment to some lot owners would be \$10,000.

Alonso suggested a meeting with the owners detailing costs.

Alonso said Town and Country North may have a good argument for the village picking up a 60 percent portion of the construction since they are taxpayers as well.

The village staff will come back with suggested methods for financing such a project and a date for a meeting with Town and Country residents to answer specific questions.

## WATER AND SEWAGE

Finance Director LeeAnn Bos-

well gave a report in answer to a letter by former councilor Al Junge.

In a comparison with 20 other New Mexico towns, Boswell said that Ruidoso was about average in its monthly water and sewer charges.

Junge has contended that huge water rate hikes instituted in 1982 were supposed to be short term. Instead, he said administrations have used the water rates to bail them out of other department shortfalls, including sewer.

Boswell said at this time, there is very little surplus water money and the village could not reduce water rates without increasing sewer rates.

Junge told The Ruidoso News that other issues he wrote to the council were not addressed.

"I've watched the council meeting on Tuesday in which they talked about water rates and sewer rates. This is a culmination of a request that I made over the years since 1982.

"Since that 1982 water rate increase, I wrote the council in March of 1991, with a specific request to remove some of the inequities in the water rate structure. Not just high rates, but inequities.

"The presentation Tuesday by the finance department was very informative, but not definitive. It

would appear that water rates developed in 1982 have increased the water fund to a large degree, but by co-mingling the water and sewer operations, the water fund did not have the surplus that I had predicted. It was simply a matter of too much water surplus used to operate the sewer department, along with other deductions taken out of the water department.

"That the mayor stated that I would pursue this further is entirely correct."

Junge said he had not asked for a water rate reduction, but merely an investigation of some of the inequities in the existing water rates.

"This was thoroughly overlooked in the report presented to the council," Junge said.

Indeed, two paragraphs by Boswell in the report seem to bear out Junge's contention. The water department has shown a profit eight out of the last 11 years. Conversely, eight out of the last 11 years, the sewer department has reported a loss.

A similar occurrence was reported recently by Shaw, who pointed out that airport tax money designated for airport improvement was instead transferred to the general fund to help correct budget deficits.

# Surplus sales accountability sought

Clever maneuvering could not dissuade Councilors Jerry Shaw and J.D. James from demanding accountability for suspect surplus purchasing practices by village officials.

Village manager Ron Wicker supplied the council with some records concerning the auction-sales village officials have attended since he was hired two years ago.

The practice came to light late last year after The Ruidoso News discovered a street department littered with government surplus purchases.

Complicating matters, the village manager admitted to requiring no inventory list and to allowing trades to take place between employees.

The News was not furnished with a copy of Wicker's surplus sales presentation to the council Tuesday or with the historical data he was told to collect for the mayor.

Councilor Jerry Shaw, also responding to Mayor Victor Alonso's wishes, asked that her letter on the issue to the mayor, village council and the village manager be part of public record.

Her written conclusions are, in part, as follows:

"The report given us by the village manager certainly shows evidence of sloppy record keeping ... It seems a better way would have been to send those items through purchasing.

"There seems to be a total disregard as to what has happened to all of these items. Therefore I would like to see a list showing the disposition of these purchases along with the inventory when the inventory is finished. Perhaps this would dispel the rumor that some of this merchandise has been taken home by employees.

"I oppose any kind of trading with other employees, or any one else for that matter. I think that a

complete inventory should be made regardless of value ... the total amount of purchases shown is a little over \$15,000, but that does not count trips involved ... to pick up the merchandise. It also does not account for the time (street department manager) Charlie Armstrong had to spend away from the street department. In fact, the amount of money involved does not matter, because I have a concern for tax payers' money no matter how small."

Wicker said the street department has made an inventory of the hundreds of items in question.

He said equipment not needed at the street department will be transferred to the general warehouse. He also said the village is in the process of acquiring a good inventory software program.

Councilor Shaw said she was sure, in the future, purchases and inventory would be handled in a different way.

Councilor J. D. James also agreed that the inventory should contain all items, even though they may be under \$250. He cited 15 pliers as an example and an upright vacuum cleaner that was purchased for \$27.

"I want some accountability," James said. "I know from my experience as a warehouseman, that you can have a lot of money tied up in knick-knacks. If you don't have a control of it, it will walk off."

Shaw said there were rumors that items were taken, "that's why I made my motion."

For about twenty minutes, councilors discussed what should and shouldn't be inventoried. Several councilors failed to understand Shaw's basic motion, which was to match items with the inventory list compiled by the street department while they were still at the street department.

Shaw said later, that if the street department purchased the items, stored the items and in-

ventoried the items, then the street department should be accountable for the items. She said the matching process should be done before any items were moved to purchasing's general warehouse.

Some councilors were in favor of moving the items to the warehouse before any accountability, other councilors seemed confused as to what they wanted or what the discussion entailed.

Wicker also wanted the items moved to the warehouse, and seemed uncomfortable in the hot seat.

"We've wasted a bunch of time with this," Wicker said. He said the village in the future shouldn't buy surplus unless they can use it. He promised to be more selective.

In spite of Wicker's reluctance, the council passed the motion to check items on the street department's surplus sales inventory list and to provide a disposition of those items.

In other business, the council: —heard Civic Events Center Charles Nolan gave an update on the finishing of the center. Nolan asked for about \$50,000 to be paid to the contractor, withholding about \$10,000 for final payment.

James said he was disappointed in the carpet and felt it would not hold up to a reasonable life.

Andrews said that the village staff should provide written recommendations to the council on Nolan's proposals. Andrews said he would not be in favor of voting for final payment of the center without written assurances from the staff.

The council voted to approve Andrew's motion to hear from staff before any money is paid to the contractor.

—approved a motion to form a committee to negotiate with C-Net Corporation and Carrizo Lodge Condo Homeowner's Association on providing a water line and to examine possible avenues of annexation of an area contiguous to the village.

Mayor Alonso said this has been a 15-20 year issue. "We need to get on with it," he said.

—heard Councilor J. D. James read a letter from the attorney general that told of 305 alcohol related deaths of New Mexicans in 1990.

The cost of these deaths in medical expense, lost income and property damage was an estimated \$550 million. James said that cost, passed to the average New Mexican, came to the \$363 in extra taxes, medical and automobile insurance.

He suggested residents contact State Representative John Underwood (D-Ruidoso) at 986-4242 or Senator Pete Compos (D-Santa Rosa) at 986-4518 to support the stringent DWI bill now before the State Legislature.

—heard James report that the cemetery board has recently provided for 284 new burial sites.

James then launched into a discussion on the condition of the cemetery where a dumpster is stationed just inside the entrance and is being abused by passing motorists.

He also complained of trash on the burial grounds.

He made a motion for the village manager to hire temporary employees to institute a cemetery cleanup.

The council passed the motion unanimously.

—approved a priority list for the street and water department. Deputy manager Briley said neither department had developed a written list.

—rejected an appeal of rezoning denial by Johnny Mobley for townhouses in the Cree Meadows Country Club subdivision.

—scheduled a March 9 public hearing on an ordinance concerning non-smoking in municipal owned buildings.

—voted to enter a closed session.

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# Parents to hash out high school guidelines

Parents and students who are concerned about aspects of the current operation of the Ruidoso public school system are invited to attend a meeting at 7 p.m. Monday, February 15, in village hall.

The meeting is being organized by attorney Gary Mitchell and Rick Evans, whose son transferred to an Albuquerque school in his senior year to protect his chances for an athletic scholarship.

Even after his son transferred, Evans urged the school board to change the existing athletic code,

contending as written it violates students' due process. The board recently sent out questionnaires to parents, asking for input on the code.

"We will moderate the meeting," Evans said. "The purpose is to measure public opinion on the local school system, to identify problems that may exist and to come up with some possible solutions.

"We want to survey attitudes on whether some sort of parental organization is needed to present a unified voice to the board when un-

resolved problems occur. Whether that would take the form of a PTA (Parent-Teachers Association), an advisory council or discipline review board or whatever, I'm not sure. It would just be to find out if the public feels there's a need."

Evans could have backed away after his son transferred to West Mesa, where he has been competing successfully in basketball and track.

"But I looked at Eric's situation and how it was handled," he said. "The basic constitutional right to

due process and equal protection under the law are not guaranteed to parents or students under the existing system. It's not just in athletics.

"We hope for some positive changes, protecting the students, the parents and their rights."

Evans said people who are reluctant to come to the podium for fear of retaliation by school officials against their children will be able to submit unsigned written statements for informational purposes.

each traveler on their own for meals and incidentals.

The schedule has been fast-paced, but all the New Mexicans say they've learned so much it's worth the early wake-up calls and many changes of location.

Hudson provided some background for the tour members before they visited the World of Energy at the Oconee Power Plant. By Thurs-

day, they'd also visited a nuclear power plant at Surry, Virginia.

"Congress is having a tough time making decisions," said Hudson Sunday.

He described how the federal government established a nuclear policy in 1982, but has had problems meeting its own deadlines.

According to that policy, the feds will take responsibility by 1993 for the safe storage of all high-level nuclear waste generated at nuclear power plants. The feds required the

power companies to pay for that disposal through a surcharge.

Since 1982, the federal government has been collecting one-tenth of a cent per kilowatt hour from wholesale customers of nuclear power plants. That cost has been passed down to customers and the Nuclear Waste Fund has collected \$8-billion.

With the assurance that the government will take care of their deadly by-products, utility companies, with 110 reactors at 70

sites, have continued to produce low cost electricity. At Oconee it sells for seven cents a kilowatt hour and at Surry for eight cents, about half the cost of electricity in the Ruidoso area.

Information gathered during this tour will be used in a series of informational articles to be published in The Ruidoso News.

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

## Warriors host district tourney

The win-loss record won't count for much on Saturday when the Warrior wrestling team stages the district tournament to determine who will continue on to state competition in Albuquerque February 18-20.

The top four wrestlers in each weight class will advance to state, while the rest will wait for next season for their chance. Warrior wrestlers will have their work cut out for them as they square off with opponents from Cobre, Deming, New Mexico Military Institute, Oñate and Silver City.

Matches will begin at 1 p.m. Saturday at the Ruidoso High School gymnasium, and continue until the last champion is crowned at about 6 p.m. The finals begin at about 4:30 p.m. and will be wrestled under the spotlight.

Coach Gerald Ames said he expects Cobre to earn first place in the tournament, while Silver and Oñate will likely battle it out for second and third. NMMI has several strong kids and could also be in contention. Deming and Ruidoso will be the underdogs in the district.

The Warriors performed fairly

well in the district quadrangular on Saturday in Alamogordo which will determine seeding for the district tourney. The team defeated Deming 36-29, but was beaten by Cobre 18-54 and by Silver 18-43.

An outstanding performance came from freshman Jose Prieto who defeated all three of his opponents in the 112-pound weight class at the meet. Ames said he was proud of Prieto's performance, and he is looking good for a chance at one of the top four spots at districts.

At 103 pounds Julian Flores compiled a 1-2 record. Johnny Flores went 1-2 at 119 pounds, but he did beat his Deming opponent, Gab Madrid, who had defeated him earlier in the season.

Gunner Johnson, 126 pounds, won a match and lost two as did Beau Jarvis at 130 pounds. Sean Gleason was 0-3 for the day at 135 pounds but wrestled fairly well and is continuing to improve. Dylan Carusona put in his best performance of the season but couldn't get a win at 140 pounds.

Scott Stricklin was 1-2 at the meet in the 145-pound weight class.

At 152 pounds Matt Bates was 0-3, while Sergio Guerrero was 2-1 at 189 pounds. Heavyweight Robert Murry was also 2-1 at the meet after a tough loss.

The junior varsity team had its last tourney on Saturday at Belen, and James Flores picked up a third place finish.

The varsity also dually Mayfield on February 3. Although the Warriors started strong, they lost the match 30-34.

Julian and James Flores, Prieto and Johnson each won their matches and seemed to have the team on a roll. Jarvis and Gleason lost their matches, and the team had to forfeit at 140 pounds.

Stricklin picked up a win, but Bates was defeated in his match. The Warriors also had to take a forfeit at 160 pounds. At 171 pounds senior Poncho Portillo pinned his man in 55 seconds. Guerrero and Murry were also defeated in their matches.

Portillo has been injured most of the season from football, but Ames hopes he will be able to compete on Saturday for a chance to repeat as district champion.

## Knights drill Warriors 52-107

Possibly the best AAA boys basketball team in the state came to town Tuesday night but whether its in the top spot or not, the Oñate Knights definitely got the best of the Warriors.

The Warrior team, lacking in size and experience, but not in heart, made the first basket but never caught up with the Knights again. The Knights pushed the score over 100 points with about a minute left and took the game 52-107.

In the first quarter the Warriors picked up 11 points to 27 by the Knights. The Knights were equally impressive in the second quarter as they sunk 28 points to the Warriors nine. Knight team members barely seemed to break a sweat before a substitute came in with same precise execution.



# Street paving picked for Capitan community block grant project

Street repaving in the heart of Capitan was picked Monday as the subject for the village's Community Development Block Grant 1993 application.

Mayor Frank Warth told the Board of Trustees he sees the project as a three year process covering Fourth Street, Third Street and then Second Street.

"Streets and roads are the next priority in the village's development plan," Warth pointed out. "Our capital improvement plan identified this project, which is another criteria."

During an earlier briefing on the block grant program, Curtis Schrader of the Southeastern New

Mexico Development District, noted projects contained in long range development plans are viewed favorably in evaluating applications.

The project would start with Fourth Street because it has the worst drainage problems, Warth said. "All the water comes off the high school and this will help take it to the arroyo. If everything was level and it had no drainage problems, it wouldn't matter where we started."

"We've had flooding and drainage problems."

Warth said the cross streets also would be improved. He figured the entire program would cost about \$1-million and the village would have to apply again in 1996 to finish.

The block grant program now has a cap of \$400,000 per application. The improvements would include asphalt paving, curbs and gutters.

The block grant program has been in existence about 20 years and is administered by the Department of Housing and Urban Development. Within New Mexico, the Department of Finance and Administration allocates the money. Applications are reviewed by a committee comprised of the governor, lieutenant governor, other cabinet members and one representative from each of the seven planning districts in the state.

More than 90 percent of the applications are submitted under the categories of community infrastruc-

ture, housing and public service capital outlay.

The state has \$12.7-million available this year, up more than \$3-million from the previous two years. Capitan falls under the rural, small town designation and qualifies because a significant portion of its population is low-income or elderly and on a fixed income.

The village could have to come up with a 5 percent match and some additional in-kind services, Schrader said.

The hearing on regional applications will be conducted in late April or early May, he said. The tentative date for a decision is June 11.

Trustee Alfred LeRoy Montes questioned whether the village's ranking would be hurt by the fact

that a wetlands sewage-treatment block grant project has not yet been completed.

"It's been four years and still nothing," he said.

Warth corrected him, "Going on three years. It was 1990."

The last time bids were requested, they came in too high, he said.

"Can we ask for more money?" Montes asked.

"We have to do it for the money we have," Warth responded. "We've got a new set of drawings and specifications. We'll open bids again March 12. It had to be streamlined. All the whistles and bells were taken off, the park area. Now, it's only a wetlands as originally planned."

In other business, the trustees listened to a request from Elaine Copeland for a public library. She suggested that it could be combined with the existing Capitan school library to benefit the entire community. That system has been used successfully in Carrizozo, she said.

Grants are being pursued, but the village may have to act as the lead agency.

Police officer Lance Zink reported that a narcotics dog went through the school complex last week, stopping at lockers, the agricultural building and cars, as well as the regular classrooms.

"Nothing was found," he said.

The board approved a budget amendment to reflect \$4,740 donating for cemetery improvements.

of sick leave by teachers.

He recommended:  
—the board remove the cap on the number of personnel leave days that can be accumulated.

—approve a figure such as \$25-\$30 to buy unused sick leave days when an employee leaves the district as an incentive not to abuse the system.

—instead of designating 10 sick leave days and one personnel leave day, combined them into 11 leave days, so that teachers are not put in the position of lying if they need to use one of the days and are not sick.

—set a minimum number of years before an employee would be eligible to collect on those days if they left.

"As it is, there is no reward for a conscientious effort to be at work as much as possible," Gladden said. The committee reviewing the situation also leaned toward docking employees who have no accrued days left and take off for illness or other reasons, he said.

To ensure that the sick leave bank to help employees with long-term illnesses is not depleted, Glad-

den suggested asking employees if they each would donate one day a year. Even if only half comply, it would keep the bank alive, he said.

During the review of board policies, Willard questioned a discrepancy under health requirements. In the portion dealing with "communicable diseases," the policy states that any employee infected with a communicable disease dangerous to public health will be excluded from all schools and gatherings of children during the recovery period.

But under the section on Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS), the policy states the employee will be evaluated for continued employment by a team of physicians.

"It seems like a conflict between the first and the second," Willard said. "The first says the employee would be excluded from all schools and gatherings of children. AIDS is a communicable disease. We need to change one or the other. Ask the doctors to take a look at it. What is the panel going to do, limit the person's access even more?"

As the last piece of business before going into a closed session on

Gladden's contract, Gladden presented outgoing board members Willard and Rod Adamson with plaques of appreciation and a brass life pass to all school programs and games.

Willard had served 10 years on the board and Adamson had served five. Neither ran for re-election.

In other business, the board:  
—heard a report from Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso director Jim Miller that enrollment grew by 30 percent. Unfortunately, funding from the state is not keeping pace and two programs planned to be initiated this year (one for licensed practical nurse training), will have to wait.

—heard a report from Paul Wirth about the bilingual program, which targets Native American students, kindergarten through fifth grade. The program in preparation for the full project was financed by a \$140,000 grant this year. The district has been notified that it will receive another \$140,000 next year.

—heard a report from Gladden on pending legislation affecting public schools, including bills that would require more school nurses, look at alternate ways of assessing

qualification for the gifted program to accommodate minority needs, would set a 6 percent salary increase for all licensed teachers, and another that would allow teacher salaries to be raised to the national average, without designating a source for the needed money to cover the raises.

One bill that would benefit the district calls for kindergarten students to be counted as full time equivalent students instead of one-half, in figuring reimbursement from the state.

—agreed on a motion by Adamson to reserve four parking spaces per school to ensure access for parents. Too often, all spaces are used up by staff members at the same time parents are encouraged to visit schools.

Wirth noted that some changes also will be required in the size and location of parking spaces for the disabled under the Americans with Disabilities Act.

—renewed the contract of Gladden as superintendent for the 1993-94 school year after coming out of a closed session. His salary will be determined at budget preparation time.

Beauvais explained that the signatures were tied to proof that maintenance would serve a public need and to ensure that all property owners affected agreed with the move.

In other action, the commission approved new boundaries for the Glencoe and Hondo volunteer fire departments that includes a four mile overlap zone. In that zone, either department will respond, depending on which has the best access at the time.

Commissioners gave a vote of

confidence and thanks to Dr. Bernhard Reimann for serving as chairman of the Expanded 911 emergency telephone project committee.

Nunley said he would like the county to take the lead in helping Reimann bring the system to completion by the summer. Only Corona, Carrizozo and the county have contributed financially to Reimann's effort and the expenses. The actually 911 system will be paid for through a surcharge to telephone customers.

Nunley cited a recent example of a woman whose husband appeared

to be suffering from an embolism. She called 911 twice and received a busy signal, because the number is not working. She then called the hospital and unfortunately, reached someone unfamiliar with emergency procedures, who referred her to the police.

"This lady watched her husband die while she made four phone calls," Nunley said. "The whole country is geared to 911. We need to get this system in place."

The expanded 911 system will utilize computers that can pinpoint the location of a call in case the caller is so upset, he or she fails to

make the information clear.

Reimann said during February, the five phone companies that serve the county will give presentations on their equipment. The State Department of Finance and Administration will handle the purchase.

"I'd like to put a word in for the Sheriff's Office to get help to rearrange the space so it can handle the system, combined with Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs," Reimann said.

Howell said he didn't think it was necessary for the villages to pay for Reimann's expenses.

"The last time I looked at the map, all the towns were in Lincoln

County," he said. "It's not a situation where if they don't pay theirs, we won't pay ours. It all comes from the same place and that's double taxation."

"Why don't we take the lead. The phone companies are slow and we need the county to start pushing them."

Wynham assured commissioners that progress is not tied to money from villages.

"We should," Howell said. "It's something that will benefit everyone in the county."

"And in Ruidoso," Wynham added.

Reimann said he was asked to come up with a budget on his estimated expenses. He was unsure of the exact relationship of the 911 board with the county and villages.

"If we lean on the county, it's fairly easy," Reimann said. "If not, we would need a phone, an office..."  
"It's not an independent authority," Wynham said. "You need to have in mind what budget you need for next year. We need the budget whether we fund it or not."

# Heritage of Honest Abe alive today

### Lincoln's Birthday

This is being sent to you a little before high noon on February eight and will reach you on February eleven, the eve of the birthday of our sixteenth president, Abraham Lincoln.

He was born in a log cabin in Kentucky, February twelve, 1809. Although he grew up on the frontier and had very little schooling, he rose to become not only one of our greatest presidents, but also a giant on the scene of world history.

It is said that more words of praise have been written about Abraham Lincoln than any mortal man. He was beloved throughout his neighborhood, his nation and the world.

He was a giant in strength, requiring three blows with the axe to split a log three and a half feet thick into four fence rails.

Like George Washington, he was the champion wrestler of his region.

To match his physical strength he was blessed with high intelligence, abiding honesty and compassion for all life.

### "Honest Abe"

His honesty was widely known and admired, and earned him the nickname of "Honest Abe." The story is told of how he walked several miles in a blizzard to return a few pennies he accidentally overcharged a widow who had bought something in a store where he was working.

One of the guiding traits in his character was compassion. One time while he was riding through the countryside he saw a baby bird which had fallen from its nest. In his Sunday clothes he dismounted and put the infant bird back in its nest up in the tree.

### Taught Himself to Read and Write

From earliest childhood Lincoln had shown an inborn deep desire for learning. Many

paintings and drawings have been made showing the young Lincoln doing sums in arithmetic on a board with a piece of charcoal for a pencil, by the light of the fireplace.

Books were rare on the frontier, and Lincoln would walk miles to borrow a book. Among the books which influenced his life are the Bible, Pilgrims Progress, Robinson Crusoe, Aesop's Fables, the Poems of Robert Burns, Mason Weems' Life of Washington and the Autobiography of Benjamin Franklin.

Lincoln's Gettysburg Address is universally recognized as one of the greatest utterances of all time.

The territory of New Mexico came very close to being named "Lincoln." The original Lincoln County was the largest in the union--the size of the state of Indiana--comprising seven present-day counties.
