Clock ticks away on hectic legislative session

The current session of the New Mexico State Legislature has been non-stop since it started, with 16-hour days, six to seven days a week, according to an exhausted State Representative John Underwood.

The Lincoln County Democrat told *The Ruidoso News* Sunday that everyone is getting tired and that he hopes they will pull together to finish out the session with some solid action.

"I'm carrying 26 bills and one memorial," Underwood said, during a telephone interview.

"Of course, the biggie is the governmental ethics bill, which sailed through all the House hearings and passed 66-0. Then I spent seven hours in a Senate Judiciary

hearing on the bill and it passed unanimously with one amendment.

"They took out the requirement for financial disclosure of spouses and children. It still has to go through the Senate Rules Committee and the provision may or may not be added back into the bill."

Underwood expects the bill to pass early next week.

He is scheduled to appear on "A Question of Ethics," with Tom Udall to be broadcast over Channel 3 Wednesday evening.

On the endangered species bill, which would require local hearings and economic impact studies in areas impacted by proposed listings of endangered species, Underwood voted in favor.

"It's important for the ranchers and farmers in my area," he said.

He also voted in committee for a bill that would require the state to honor gambling contracts negotiated with Native American tribes, even if Governor Bruce King refuses to sign the contracts.

The legislature also is considering a bill that would expand the legislative sessions. It already passed out of the Voters and Election Committee, he said.

"We're talking about expanding the 60-day sessions to 90 days and the 30-day sessions to 60 days. We also may limit the number of bills introduced each session," Underwood said. "It's being redrafted and should be back in front of us next week and then on the floor."

"Part of the problem is that with a citizen legislature, the members must make a living. The question will be is it

necessary to be here longer to do the job.

The DWI (drinking while under the influence of alcohol) bill (calling for tougher penalties, enforcement and treatment) and the gay rights bill (against discrimination) just overwhelmed the session this time."

Money and More Money

"They've given me a nickname around here (because of the numerous bills requesting financial help for his constituents). They call me Smokey the Pig," Underwood said.

The verdict on those requests won't be rendered until the last four or five days of the 60-day session that started January 19. That's when members of the Committee of Taxation and Revenue try to reconcile re-

quests with actual dollars.

Some of the bills introduced by Underwood included:

—House Bill 391, in reference to purchasing more equipment for the Ruidoso Civic Events Center.

"It will be the end of the session before we know anything on this one," Underwood said. "But bear in mind that the state already has put \$600,000 to \$700,000 toward the project, including \$150,000 last year for equipment."

—House Bill 390, regarding improvements to the road from Sierra Blanca Airport to Fort Stanton Hospital and Training Center.

"We have a very good possibility of getting that done," Underwood said. "It's looking good."

Parking problems plague planners

Kawliga's, a store specializing in southwest merchandise, seeks an amended commercial site development to enclose a covered porch area and add 10 feet by 10 feet in floor space.

According to village planner Cleatus Richards, he cannot recommend approval based on plans submitted.

Although plans submitted by owner Judy Trumble show 17 spaces, Trumble is expected to go through the same hassle other business owners are subjected to because of inadequate parking down town. Richards said the 17 spaces does not meet code standards.

If parking is improved as required, notes Richards, the applicant will be four or five spaces short. A variance of parking requirements will be required to consider proposed expansion.


He said parking, grading, drainage and landscaping plans are not submitted as required.

The village, by law, does not have to meet the same guidelines or standards that they enforce.

Danny and Peggy Fenton filed an application for site development for Lot 23 and Part of Lot 27, Block 1, in Ruidoso Springs Subdivision.

Fenton proposes a two story and part one story structure containing 2,200 square feet with four parking spaces accessed from Texas Street and on Lot 23, a parking lot with graveled surface for eight vehicles is being proposed.

Richards recommends approval of the commercial site development plans.

Bienvenidos Ads target Mexican visitors

If residents of Juarez, Mexico, and the surrounding area didn't know about Ruidoso before February 1 they should know now.

The white, blue and green Ruidoso logo stands out crisply against a ski background as the 30-second spot ends on Channel 26 KINT. Ruidoso is running three commercials each day, five days a week for two months to entice visitors here from the northern part of Mexico.

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce advertising committee had developed the idea of a television campaign in Mexico and

received funding from the Ruidoso Lodgers Tax Advisory Board to go ahead with it. The chamber board saw the actual product Wednesday at its monthly meeting.

Lee Prins of KINT showed the two commercials, which are in Spanish, that they have produced for Ruidoso. Jack Muhn, contract accountant for the chamber who speaks Spanish, translated the commercial into English with the assistance of director Joe Gomez for them to understand.

Muhn said he was pleased that the commercial was originally written in Spanish, instead of written in English and translated to Spanish, which would not have

sounded as smooth to the Mexico listeners. The commercial ends with an address and phone number of the station in Juarez so people can call to get more information.

KINT has one of the strongest signals in the area, which was part of the reason the committee selected the channel. It broadcasts to El Paso, Las Cruces, Juarez and almost to Moctezuma, Mexico.

The commercials are on during a popular novela, or soap opera, a morning show and also during a family-oriented show to get a varied audience.

Prins said they have information

County brings government to the people

If Ruidoso residents want to see Lincoln County government in action, but have hesitated to cruise down to Carrizozo, Tuesday will be their chance.

The County Commission will meet at 10 a.m. in the council chambers at Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center, 313 Cree Meadows Drive.

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley suggested changing meeting places occasionally to bring government close to residents throughout the county.

He wanted to start in Ruidoso. County manager Andy Wynham said when the news circulated about meeting in Ruidoso, an old paranoia surfaced in Carrizozo, the

county seat.

"When I first arrived, there were a lot of rumors that because I was from 'the big city,' I was going to advocate moving the courthouse (to Ruidoso), but that's not the case."

"There is no on-going organized effort to move the county seat and if anything, that's 100 percent contrary. My push has been to expand down there at the permanent structure in Carrizozo. I'm not in favor of temporary quarters, even for the sheriff. I feel by meeting occasionally in Ruidoso, we will defuse (the efforts of those who do advocate moving the county seat), because folks have more access to their government. It's a conciliatory move."

Wynham pointed out that the only requirement in law is that the

commission meet quarterly in Carrizozo.

"We could do it in Capitan, but not in Ancho and small settlements, because there are no places with adequate seating," he said.

In visiting with Commissioner Bill Schewettmann on the issue, Wynham said the commissioner estimated the county would have to spend \$5 million to duplicate the facilities in Ruidoso that already exist in Carrizozo "and it wouldn't be beneficial to the taxpayer."

He noted that a State Constitutional provision requires that the county seat be on a rail head and Ruidoso doesn't fit that criteria.

In connection to government access, Cindy Lynch, representing the Board of Realtors, is on the agenda to discuss keeping the county sub-

office in Ruidoso a viable operation and other issues of interest to the real estate business.

"We're very concerned about a couple of things, Lynch told *The Ruidoso News*. There is no effective planning and zoning in force in the county and we feel that's integral to the growth of the county in the 1990s.

"We have formed a committee to work with the county in putting together a workable approach."

The Realtors also are concerned about the future of the county sub-office in Ruidoso.

"We are trying to go on line with direct access to county computers so that we can do title and other record searches," Lynch said. "The closing of (the suboffice) here upset us. We hope to talk about the ser-

vices we'd like to see the elected officials, such as the county clerk and assessor, provide."

Patsy Sanchez, who previously staffed the suboffice, was moved into a full-time position on the county manager's staff and no one has been hired to replace her in Ruidoso.

"We're glad to see representatives on the commission from Alto and Ruidoso since those areas pay the bulk of the taxes in the county," Lynch said.

The Realtors will host a luncheon for the commissioners during the meeting break Tuesday as a chance to get to know the elected representatives on a social basis, she said.


"Small Fries" earns superior

DARE equips kids to say no to drugs

Learning to say no to drugs and alcohol and making good decisions in life are just part of the lessons Connie Hopper teaches her students across the county.

Hopper, a Lincoln County sheriff's deputy, is the Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) officer for the county. Her area covers five school districts, Carrizozo, Corona, Capitan, Hondo and Ruidoso.

The DARE program for Lincoln County began last fall after it received a grant for the salary of an officer. All other costs are paid through donations or contributions, which the program is in need of to pay for expenses, give-away items, supplies and the graduation ceremony.

Hopper said she applied to be the officer through county sheriff James McSwane and when she was selected she had to go to a DARE school for two weeks of training. She said it was the hardest school she ever attended, but it was also the most worthwhile.

She began to give lessons in classes in Carrizozo, Capitan and Corona in September and completed those in December. She is now working with students at Ruidoso and Hondo. Each Monday

at Hondo she spends a day with students in kindergarten through sixth grade. On Tuesday she is in Ruidoso with the fourth graders and then she goes to Nob Hill or White Mountain Elementary on Wednesday. Thursday she works with the fifth grade students.

The DARE lessons are dependent on the children giving input and interacting in the sessions and Hopper said they do. She not only gives the lessons but also eats lunch with the students and spends time with them on the playground to get to know them better and to let them get to know her.

When a former student from the three completed schools sees her, Hopper said she usually gets at least a hug. She said she tries to get back to these schools once a month, and the kids there are willing to talk to her about any problems they may be having.

Hopper said the lessons concentrate on alcohol and marijuana because that is what these students will face first, but these principals can be applied to the rest of their lives. Making decisions and good decisions will always be important.

"The lessons help me and I apply them to my own life," she said.

Hopper gives a pretest on the

first day of the class and then gives a post test. She said there is a marked difference in the score, as most of them get a 100 on the post test.


When fifth grade students complete the program they get to participate in a culmination or graduation ceremony. Hopper said the kids think it is great to graduate from the program. For the last ceremony, a local business person bought T-shirts for all the graduates, which also made it special, and she is looking for someone to help again this semester.

The DARE program has been used nationally since 1983, but it wasn't until two or three years ago that Lincoln County began to consider it. Hopper said law enforcement usually gets involved with some of these kids after they are already in trouble.

A lot of her interest in the program came from being in law enforcement for so many years. Hopper said she has seen three generations of families become involved in the legal system.

"We have to intervene before the next generation gets involved. This is a positive way to do it," she said.

Roswell has done the program for several years and there has

been a slight decrease in crime, Hopper said. In the same time there has been a marked increase in juvenile crime in Lincoln County, she said.

Hopper also gives speeches on such topics as parenting to any organization or group interested. She also works with the Region IX program and the Drug Free Schools and Communities program. She said she tries to attend as many of their activities as possible because they reinforce the principals of

DARE. Kathy Echols, director of the Drug Free Schools and Communities, said DARE is probably the most comprehensive drug education program available. It also has high standards for its officers, she said.

If people would like Hopper to speak to their group or they have questions, they can contact her at the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office or through Echols.

packets about Ruidoso ready at the station to send out to the people. They also plan to put the packets in a gas station chain from Mexico City to Juarez.

So far about 50 people have called in to the television station to get the packet, which station representatives were amazed at. Prins said. He said they usually don't get that good of a response immediately unless they are giving something away, which will be the next step.

Joan Bailey, executive director of the chamber, said she has sent a letter out to the membership to ask for donations of gift certificates and prizes to give to people that call in. Prins said the station could talk to area merchants about an advertising package that would strengthen the Ruidoso message.

Although the signal does not reach into the depths of Mexico, many people along the border have friends and family in the interior who will ask them where to go in

New Mexico. People also stay in Juarez before they cross the border and watch television before they go.

If Juarez residents didn't know of Ruidoso before they should know now with all the commercials, Prins said.

He said it is the right time for someone representing Ruidoso to do the morning talk show on the channel. The show is the most popular at that time and would have a good audience, he said.

After watching the commercial, which showed nature scenes, homes, recreation activities, the change of seasons, several businesses and the downtown area, the group discussed the project.

Director Ron Wicker said he was concerned that one of the shots was of a large business that is not a chamber member. Bailey said they can't discriminate against non-members because the money used for the advertisement comes from the lodgers tax fund.

Wicker said the business doesn't

contribute to lodgers tax either. Directors James Hobbs and Valerie Miller said they agreed in principal with Wicker but the commercial goes so fast it would be hard for anyone who had never been here to recognize what the business is.

Miller said the shot is the most dramatic view in the area, and visitors would have to know exactly where they were going to use that business.

Prins said they could change the shot, but the main purpose of it was to get the change of season and it may be too late to get another shot with heavy snow. The packets that they send to the people are also full of membership brochures, so people would be more likely to follow up with one of those, he said.

Muhn said the wording of the commercial at that time also connects with what the scene is showing.

Bailey said they also want to consider the fact that the chamber has picked up memberships from

referrals they gave to non-members, and this may be a way they can show the business what they can do for it.

The group decided to leave the commercial as it was produced.

Prins told the group the chamber is also sponsoring a ski report during the nightly newscast. It will tell the new snow, total accumulation and skiing conditions at Ski Apache.

The station also has two radio stations in the area and the chamber is sponsoring the ski report on those too.

Muhn recently returned from a trip to Mexico City to represent Ruidoso, along with two other people, at a trade show for travel agencies. He said they will get a few people from this trip but they will have to do a lot of work to develop that area as a market.

He said he was amazed at the number of people in that area who knew of Ruidoso already. He was concerned that people would not

want to visit Noisy, New Mexico, which is the literal translation of Ruidoso, but they already recognize it as the community of Ruidoso.

To develop a market in the interior they would need to deal with transportation. Mexico City has many charter flights out of it but they are by-passing Ruidoso at this time. Muhn said they need to get more people familiar with the area before they will get one to stop here.

Bailey said Ruidoso is first trying the border market to see how it goes and then go from there with continued advertising. Chihuahua and Juarez are beginning to compare to the West Texas market and that has been Ruidoso's bread and butter for years, she said.

Ruidoso will have an opportunity to inform its Mexico market in another way. Bailey said they will host nine travel writers from Mexico this week.

In other businesses Muhn gave a

short report on the chamber's Connoisseur Classic IV on February 19-21. He said he had originally budgeted a \$3,000 profit but they aren't going to make that. The group had a large investment in decorations after not having the event last year, but will now have some basic items ready for next year.

They also have quite a few posters left over because they ordered more than needed. Muhn said the attendance was down at some of the events but he has not completed his financial statement on the event.

Director Tom Rigsby, presiding in the absence of Paul Crown, thanked the staff and the Connoisseur Classic committee for all the time and effort they put into the event. Committee chairperson Karen Kopp said directors should especially thank committee member Betsy Muhn who worked hard on the event.

ing good." House Bill 352 for \$10,000 to maintain the Fort Stanton cemetery has gone through a hearing in front of Appropriations and Finance.

House Bill 393 asking for money toward the construction of a village hall complex in Ruidoso Downs.

"It looks very good," Underwood said. I was encouraged by the attitude of the committee. It really helps when there's a substantial contingency that comes up. Those village trustees have been working very hard.

House Bill 394, which asks for \$50,000

for the Department of Tourism to advertise and promote the 50th anniversary of Smokey Bear planned for May 1994 and HB886, requesting \$150,000 for improvements to the Lincoln County fairground in preparation for the big celebration at Capitan. The improvements would include handicap access.

The mayor and some trustees came up and they were well received," Underwood said.

House Bill 395, which asks for \$20,000 for the Department of Tourism to help advertise a special multi-cultural exhibit at the Museum of the Horse in Ruidoso Downs.

"Frank Potter and Bill Hirschfeld both came up to testify before appropriations and finance and we had a good hearing," Underwood said.

two bills for Corona. House Bill 397, which would funnel \$10,000 to \$20,000 into street repair in Corona, has gone through a hearing and House Bill 939 for money to refurbish the senior citizens center is advancing.

two bills in reference to Lincoln, one (House Bill 751) dealing with sidewalks goes to two hearings in a week. The other (HB635) focuses on the renovation of the old Montano store into a Hispanic Cultural Museum, something lacking in the

southern end of the state, Underwood said.

House Bill 636, asking for financial help to complete the next two phases of the MainStreet project in Ruidoso.

"MainStreet Mary Maul came up and put on an excellent show," Underwood said. "That woman knows how to lobby. She found federal money when no one else has and that's why we did so well in the past. The project needs \$1.5-million to finish phases two and three, but the state will only be looking at \$200,000. My hat is off to Mary."

House Bill 887 on exotic wagering. "If the lottery passes, the race tracks have estimated they will lose 15 percent in gross receipts at the track," Underwood said.

"They have something called a mega-fecta, a keno kind of game that can be played in between races to pick up some of that lost revenue."

"I expect it to go the floor of the House this week."

House Bill 940 for the Hondo school district, which would exempt small school districts from a provision that prohibits members of school boards from taking staff jobs until the period of their terms run out, even if they resign before that time.

House Bill 941, which would allow the Sierra Blanca Airport to try to take advantage of federal money that may shake loose for small airports under the Clinton administration.

Polite pets wait patiently at the shelter

Polite and well behaved, Bria displays the elegant conformation of the Doberman breed with a special accent of deep brandy coloring.

Brought to the Lincoln County Humane Society animal shelter two months ago as a result of a court order, the one-year-old female has been waiting for owners to reclaim her, but they haven't come.

"She was removed from the owners until they could afford to get her spayed, licensed and vaccinated," said shelter manager Randy Basch. "I told them I would work with them and they assured me they would be in by February 2. Apparently, she's not one of their priorities."

Basch said Bria is a very sweet dog and is good with other canines and kids.

"She's had some obedience training and sure would like to settle into a new home where she would be loved and cared for properly," he said.

Several predominantly shepherd puppies are now in residence at the shelter.

"They didn't come in from a litter," Basch said. "They're from a variety of places. I have both males and females, but they're all about three months old."

Saber is a female, who exhibits all of the good traits of her ancestors.

"It's been said that whatever a shepherd can do, another dog can do better, but that no dog can do as many things as well," Basch said. "After a Husky and (Alaskan) Malamute, a shepherd is the closest descendant to the wolf."

"They are extremely versatile and make loyal family pets. They learn quickly and adapt to just about any living situation. As long as they can be close to their masters they usually are content."

All dogs and cats adopted from the shelter must be spayed or neutered to ensure they do not contribute to the pet over-population problem that results in more than 200,000 abandoned pets a year being destroyed in New Mexico alone.

All animals at the shelter can be adopted with a \$20 deposit, the balance to be paid in 60 days. The adoption fee includes the cost of sterilization.

Sponsors, who would like to improve an animal's chances for adop-

tion, may donate the cost of sterilization. The contribution may be earmarked for a particular animal or for use as needed at the discretion of the manager.

Good news! The mandatory spay and neuter Legislative bill for animals adopted or reclaimed from shelters statewide has passed the Senate and is on its way to the House Consumer Affairs Committee. State Representative John Underwood (D-Ruidoso) will be carrying the bill through his side of the Legislature.

The hearing is scheduled for March 9 and the committee chairman is State Representative Thomas Atcitty (D-San Juan, call 1-986-4414 in Santa Fe).

Shirley Hendrixson of the Albuquerque Animal Humane Association said the bill has been amended slightly to allow an exception for special cases.

"I thought it was pretty cut and dry the way it was written before; that they would forfeit the deposit if the pet was not sterilized, but then all sorts of exceptions came up," she said. Ironically, it was animal control officers around Albuquerque who pushed for the amendment. Albuquerque spent more than \$784,000 in 1990 to kill 21,000 animals. Just the Albuquerque shelter alone is forced to kill 55 unwanted animals every day.

"To keep city animal control from squashing it, I agreed to an amendment," Hendrixson said. "A person has to sign a sterilization agreement to get the pet sterilized within 30 days or they will obtain a

breeders permit or its equivalent."

It also would allow shelter managers to waive the requirement, if strong extenuating circumstances were proven.

"It's something to give a person a chance to have their day in court," Hendrixson said.

Some of the opposition came from one senator who argued children might be denied pets because of the price.

"This won't stop anyone from getting a pet," Hendrixson said. "Unfortunately, there's always a free kitten or puppy from a neigh-

bor. And frankly, if a person can't afford to pay an adoption fee even if it was spread over a period of time, then they won't be able to afford to take proper care of the pet with annual shots, daily food and other needs."

Hendrixson said the Senate bill passed 25 to 12, nearly straight down party lines with Democrats for and Republicans opposing.

"It's hard to understand politics being involved in this type of issue," Hendrixson said. "I have real high hopes for getting it through the House."

Downs gets the OK for four more racing days

The New Mexico State Racing Commission awarded Ruidoso Downs Race Track an additional four days of racing for the 1993 race meet.

Those additional days, May 20, 27, June 3 and 10, will bring the total to 70 race days. Ruidoso Downs ran a 74-day meet in 1992.

"We originally asked the commission for 66 race days for the 1993 meet," said Max Johnson, general manager.

Johnson said inquiries from horsemen increased dramatically when Trinity Meadows dropped its mixed meet.

Tourist inquiries also are up by 50 percent at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

"In the final analysis, we figured that it would be in the best interest of both the track and horsemen if we added those four days," said Johnson.

Ruidoso Downs' 70-day meet will open on Friday, May 14, but will run on a Thursday through Sunday thereafter. Races will run on three special Monday holidays: Memorial Day, May 31; on July 5; and the traditional closing day, Labor Day, September 6.

According to a news release provided by Ruidoso Downs Racing, Inc., stakes and conditions books and stall applications are now available, with stall applications due back by March 22.

The barn will open April 19, with the track opening for exercising on April 21.

Taxes vary on cigarettes, booze & gasoline

New Mexico smokers pay the lowest tax on cigarettes among seven southwestern states included in the New Mexico Tax Study.

Beer drinkers are better off in Colorado when it comes to tax rates.

But, if you're looking for the lowest tax on wine among Arizona, California, Colorado, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Texas and Utah, head west to California where the rate is 0.0396 for wine.

An analysis by New Mexico Progress shows that New Mexico tax rates are pretty much in the middle when compared with neighboring states.

But, when it comes to cigarettes, New Mexico's rate, at 0.15 (per

pack of 20 cigarettes, weighing less than three pounds per 1,000), is at the bottom.

Cigarette taxes are highest in Texas at 0.41, followed by California at 0.35, Utah at 0.265, Oklahoma at 0.23, Colorado at 0.120 and Arizona at 0.18.

Colorado's lowest tax rate on beer, at 0.0450, is followed by Arizona at 0.0900, with New Mexico at 0.1012, California at 0.1125, Oklahoma at 0.2268, Texas at 0.1089 and Utah at 0.1996.

Included in the comparison were taxes on wine, spirits, cigarettes, gasoline, motor vehicle, sales (gross receipts) and property. Corporate taxes also were included, with New Mexico's tax on corporation second from the bottom among those seven states.

Corporate income tax in New Mexico is 4.8 percent, just over the 4.5 percent rate in Texas. Corporations pay 9.3 percent in both Arizona and California, 6.0 percent in Oklahoma and 5.0 percent in Colorado and Utah.

In New Mexico Progress, a monthly business and economic report published by Sunwest Bank, edited parts of the New Mexico Legislative Finance Committee's report were published, along with a comparison chart (reprinted here).

Progress reported that the New Mexico Tax Study has three basic research goals: (1) analysis of the comparative state-tax burden on individuals in the states; (2) analysis of the comparative state tax burden on business; and analysis of issues in New Mexico with respect to state

and local tax authority, capacity and adequacy.

Among summary and conclusions listed was the finding that New Mexico ranks lowest, seventh or sixth, among the seven metro areas when property taxes are combined with corporate income taxes.

"Because it has a progressive corporate income tax, New Mexico's ranking with the other metro areas will change," according to the report. At the low end of taxable income, the state ranks fifth or sixth; at high taxable income it ranks second or third.

"New Mexico is the only state with a progressive corporate income tax. However, its highest rate, 7.16 percent, is well below rates for Arizona and California, both at 9.3 percent."





Warriors begin post-season tonight at Silver or Cobre

Saving the best for last, the Warrior boys basketball team played its best district contest in the final regular season game Saturday night against Silver City.

The Fighting Colts still came out on top in the contest but the Warriors came within six points of the team, which has seven wins and three losses in the district and is ranked sixth in the state. The final score was 50-56.

The Warriors will now begin the first round of the district tournament at 7 p.m. today at either Cobre or Silver City. Since both were tied for second they flipped a coin to see who would be seeded third to play the last seed in the district.

The outcome of Saturday's game may well have been determined in the first five minutes of the contest, instead of the last five minutes. The Warriors came out slow and hadn't scored a single shot when Silver City had 14.

Coach Norman Wright said the boys came out and played poor defense against the taller, quicker team which easily took advantage of it. On offense the blue and gold

did make some good shots but they just didn't go in.

The Warriors won the second quarter 13-6 but were still behind by six at halftime 17-23. The third quarter became a little closer but the Warriors still put more points in than the Colts to take it 13-12. Both teams poured on the points in the final period, but Ruidoso earned it too by a 21-20 score.

"It would have been so easy on the last game of the season after having lost 20 games to quit when they got down early, but they played the best district game all year," he said.

The team had patience on offense and retained the ball as long as it could before shooting to give Silver as few chances at scoring as possible. The group also did a good job handling Silver's press and only turned the ball over 15 times.

Casey Kearns led the Warriors in scoring with 14 points. Raul Davis and Rex Comanche each popped in 10 points. Jeff Chapman added seven and a junior varsity player off the bench, Gabe Aguilar, scored five points in the last four minutes, including a three-point

shot.

In the last meeting of the two teams in Silver City, the Warriors played a fairly good game but lost 45-72. Wright said this game was quite an improvement from that performance and he was really proud of the players' attitude.

The junior varsity also made a great effort to conquer the Colts but were stopped short in overtime. The young Warriors were defeated 62-65 in the extra period. Wright said the contest was probably this team's best game of the year too and it came against one of the top JV teams in the district.

Zack Turner turned in the top score with 15 points, while Aguilar hit 14. Malcolm Pierce earned 13.

The C-team was also defeated by the Colts 42-50. Byron Soules led with 18 points and Randy Randolph scored 11.

Friday night's battle with Cobre was a different story for the varsity Warriors. They were knocked out 45-90 by the Indians who are also 7-3 in the district and 18-4 overall.

The Warriors stayed fairly close in the first quarter, 10-16. The second quarter was a little more out of

control as the Warriors scored 13 points to 20 points for Cobre for a halftime score of 23-36.

In the second half Cobre poured on its power to score 25 points in the third quarter and 29 in the final period. Cobre played with its top seven players to the last seconds of the game, which helped its 6-7 player, Jess Howard, pump in 28 points. Sonny Villegas also scored 25 points after blatantly hitting Ruidoso's Davis in the mouth.

When Davis pushed him back he received a technical and Wright took him out of the game to prevent anything else from happening, but Cobre's coach left Villegas in.

Chapman scored 12 points for the Warriors and Davis had nine. Aguilar again came into the game in the last few minutes and picked up seven points.

The JV picked up its first district win against Cobre, 59-49. Turner earned 21 points, while Aguilar had 15. LeMuel Rocha scored 10.

The C-team also defeated Cobre, 58-40. Randolph scored 15 points and Soules had 13. Danny Schrader added nine.

The Ruidoso Lady Warrior basketball team came a long way from its 0-7 start coming out of the Christmas break and ended the season with one of its better district rankings in years.

The girls finished fourth in the district after one win and one loss in the district tournament last week. They earned six wins and received 14 losses overall this season.

Monday night the girls won their first post season game 38-24 against the Oñate Knights here. Coach Dennis Davis said they started out slow and seemed to play very tight and nervous. The first quarter ended with the team being 4-8.

They loosened up a bit in the second quarter and took it 10-8, but the Knights took the lead into the locker room at halftime. The girls were much improved in the third and put up a strong defense to take

the third quarter 11-1. They earned the fourth 13-7 for the victory.

Sarah Dix was the high scorer for the team with 13 and she also grabbed nine rebounds. Cicelee Makowski tossed in 12 points and had 10 rebounds. Michelle Morris scored seven points and picked up five rebounds. Robyn Hursh, Mandy Parker and Kristie Ryan each scored two points and Ryan had seven rebounds.

Wednesday night against the Silver City Fighting Colts was a different story for the Lady Warriors. The girls got behind early and couldn't seem to pull anything together. They seem to get a lot of close shots but couldn't take them all the way to the basket because of offensive fouls.

The officiating was not quite as accurate as it should have been and it didn't seem Ruidoso got many calls its way. Davis said that made the girls hesitate because they

knew if they made a shot and Silver fouled it wouldn't likely be called.

He said the officiating did not cost them the game, but it caused a mental problem the girls couldn't overcome. They knew they couldn't react to the fouls the Silver team was giving them.

Even with the loss Davis said the girls did accomplish a lot they wanted to do on offense and defense. They just seemed to lose hope in the second half and made many mistakes they shouldn't have.

Dix and Morris each contributed nine points and nine rebounds. Kim Floyd picked up five points and Makowski had two. Parker and Ryan each hit one point and Ryan had nine rebounds.

Davis said he was pretty happy with the progress the team made toward the end of the season after starting with seven losses. He said

the fourth place finish was as good as the team has done in several years, so being able to come on strong for the district competition was good.

The team is losing four seniors, Makowski, Morris, Floyd and Hursh, but will have three strong returning players. Dix, who was the top scorer and rebounder for the team, will be back next year as will Parker and Ryan to help in the interior. Many of the other girls didn't get to play as much on varsity so it will be quite a job next year, Davis said.

One problem will be finding a someone to step in at the ball-handling position, since the four seniors were all experienced guards. It will likely be a player who takes some extra time this summer to work on those skills so she will be ready when the season starts.

Twenty teams, each consisting of a Ski Apache Handicapped Skiers Association (SAHSA) student plus two local business people, vied for trophies and honors in a race that benefits the handicapped skiers program.

SAHSA student Gould skis every week with a group from the New Mexico School for the Visually Handicapped (NMSVH) in Alamogordo. Her time, 18:76 seconds, was the second fastest of the day.

Capa is an architect and partner in A-Frame ski shop and Davis owns Casa Blanca Restaurant. Their combined team time was 61.07 seconds.

Second place in 86.72 seconds combined went to SAHSA student Perfecta Sanchez of Capitan and her business teammates, Realtor Joe Zagone and Alto emergency medical technician Penny Mayo.

SAHSA student Jamie Martinez,

also a student at New Mexico School for the Visually Handicapped, teamed with Alto Ski Shop owner Don Damron and Ruidoso Ski Team coach Tim Royer for third place. Their combined time, 69.81 seconds.

Claiming fourth place, SAHSA student Erika Solis of NMSVH teamed with Ruidoso businessman Tom Rigby and Fort Stanton teacher Jane Tarrell in 77.85 seconds.

Jovian Smith of Mescalero skied the fastest individual time, 18.73 seconds.

SAHSA racers represented a variety of disabilities: blind, cerebral palsy, partially paralyzed and developmentally disabled. Some skied with specialized equipment such as mono-board walkers or a ski bra. Others used ordinary skis and poles. Many, such as skiers who are blind and partially paralyzed, skied with SAHSA guides.

Adding a challenge was the businesspersons' traditional "handicap" — skiing on one ski only and using outriggers instead of poles. Outriggers are forearm crutches with short skis attached.

with several pieces on the theme of "The Lamb of God."


A free-will offering will be taken to help cover the expenses of the choir.

Henson said the program has proven successful in the Las Cruces school system. Council members viewed a film that gave an account and endorsement from the administration and the students. The response was significant and tangible success was realized by seeing students attend school more regularly.

Council members agreed to start becoming more involved in the local school system by signing up to be available for students after school. This would be the first phase of help for students for tutoring or just to listen, Henson said.

Future phases might be to sponsor a lunch at the high school, help a teacher with a special project, present information on a mem-

ber subject of expertise or get involved with a particular student to help he/she achieve their potential.

The next step will be Las Cruces to explore the mechanics of setting up a Renaissance Program and to be ready to implement it by the start of 1993 school year, Henson said.

Anyone interested in helping with the organization, may call Steve Hightower or Don Weems at the high school, 258-4910.

The next meeting is set for 6 p.m. Tuesday, March 2, in the high school meeting room. The principal of Mayfield School in Las Cruces will bring a film on the Renaissance program and how it can elevate the level of education in a system.

A report also will be presented on the results of adults being at the school for student assistance from 3:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.


Longer state sessions could be costly

were visiting the Surry Nuclear Plant the casks were reportedly leaking? Do you think that might be why you and the rest of the touring group were not allowed within a certain distance? Those of us here at home who understand the dangers of radiation exposure certainly hope that you and the rest of the group were not exposed to cancer causing radiation. Remember, Ms. Jarrell, one of the evils of nuclear waste is that you can't see it, smell it, feel it or taste it. You probably didn't even realize you were experiencing possible exposure. Just in case you are doubting this bit of information the source of information on the leak is "Don't Waste Us" which is currently cited by the Nuclear Waste Negotiators Office as a credible source of information regarding the nuclear industry.

I realize you were invited on this trip by Mr. Miller Hudson on behalf of the proposed Mescalero MRS Project. I also realize after reading your article, that you are confused. You think you visited an MRS. As I already stated, the sites that you visited are experimental dry cask sites. The reactor sites also use water storage pool areas. Your statement "seeing is believing" is puzzling to those of us who have been working on this project (keeping MRS out of our beautiful state and local area). After careful study of the proposed MRS, it is obvious that the financial cost of building, maintaining and operating such a site is not beneficial. The Government Accounting Office (GAO) has also printed a report stating this—

have you read it? We are in agreement that maintaining the current system of pool storage is feasibility for the next 50-80 years. It is already in full operation and can be expanded to accommodate future storage needs. It is obvious that this type of storage will cut down on transportation accidents (like the one I-40 last week at Cline's Corner), and will allow the government and private industry to use funds to study how to safely store this deadly waste. Remember the casks they are using at this time are reportedly leaking so maybe we should be concerned about the proposed casks to be used at a real MRS site.

The information you printed about how the rates are assessed and paid for by the utility companies is misleading. You did not inform your readers of the current status of the operating fund. When the fund was first put together a total of 33 utilities were to be contributing to the fund. At conception 16 plants started contributing — those dollars have since been applied to the national debt. Of the remaining 17 companies the Inspector General's report states that the 3.1 billion dollars of fees and interest they owe are at risk. The Inspector General's report also states that the risk of not collecting will run counter to the Nuclear Waste Policy Act causing the taxpayer to pick up the cost of operating. I don't think there are many residents in the state of New Mexico who are willing to pick up the tab of operating an MRS by paying higher taxes to pick up the tab for the private nuclear industry. This scenario sounds like the savings and loan scandal? It is also important to remember that New Mexico does not use nuclear power, so why should we store some other state's waste? I really hope there are enough of us in the state and local area who cannot be bought by the high dollars, the nuclear industry has to offer.

In closing, I hope that the residents of Ruidoso ask themselves how and why the people who went on the trip were selected. I don't think most of the people who accompanied Mr. Hudson on this trip had any background or working knowledge of an MRS, the Nuclear Waste Policy Act or the Health and Safety issues associated with this type of project. I realize that Mr. Bill Karn, a member of the Village MRS Advisory Committee, was allowed to attend and should have attended. Other members of the committee who requested in writing to attend were not permitted to go. I wonder if this was because they have been so vocal in the past and are so well studied on the issue? Did Mr. Hudson fear their involvement in this arranged visit? I also wonder why there were no people with science and engineering backgrounds invited. I personally do not feel comfortable with Realtors, journalists and business owners deciding the community's fate in regards

to nuclear waste storage.

I would like to close with a compliment to Mr. Wilton Howell, County Commissioner on calling this trip for what it was and declining to not participant in a "dog & pony show" paid for by the Nuclear Power Industry. We appreciate you sticking to your campaign promises — and the voters will remember!

There are those who are not interested in learning the facts as observed by their friends and neighbors. This newspaper continues to be interested in all sides of this and other issues.
