

State sends money south

When State Representative H. John Underwood (D-Ruidoso) arrived back in Lincoln County after the 90-day legislative session, he was carrying a suitcase full of financial commitments for his constituents.

The Democrat from Ruidoso said one of the big winners in the Legislature's own version of a lottery was Ruidoso Downs, which will see \$200,000 for the construction of a new village hall.

Another significant recipient will be the Lincoln County fairground, which was allotted \$100,000 for remodeling.

The work will be part of the sprucing up effort of Capitan and the county for the year-long celebration of Smokey Bear's Fiftieth Birthday.

The final figure approved was \$50,000 lower than requested, but still a big boost for the county-owned fairground.

The Division of Tourism will receive \$10,000, about \$40,000 less than requested, to advertise and promote the birthday bash.

The division fared better concerning a project at the Museum of the Horse in Ruidoso Downs. The legislature allocated \$20,000, the full amount requested, to help advertise a multi-cultural exhibit at the museum.


The village of Corona was given \$90,000 to move a donated senior citizens building and complete the necessary improvements.

Although the Ruidoso Village Council had requested some money for kitchen equipment in the Civic Events Center, nothing was allocated by the legislature, Underwood said.

The Lincoln County Commission is in line for some free work by the State Highway Department, if commissioners commit to taking over maintenance on the road leading to Fort Stanton Hospital and Training Center and a portion of State Road 48 to Sierra Blanca.

In exchange for accepting that responsibility, the state would spend about \$200,000 in each year of a two-year project to improve, seal and repair the roads.

Spring breakers have fun in sun

Sunny weather and plenty of snow on the mountain kept conditions great for spring break in Ruidoso.

Thousands of college students and families flocked to the village to enjoy skiing, shopping and just savoring the gorgeous weather last week. The smiles on the faces of visitors were matched by those of local business people catching the last large wave of skiers.

"We had great weather, great snow and a lot of happy skiers, and we still have two weeks of great spring skiing ahead," said Patricia Morrison, Ski Apache's director of marketing.

Joan Bailey, executive director for the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, said in her recent visits with members in the business community the news has been good. She said businesses have seen an overwhelming increase in business recently and some retail shops are reporting a 50 percent increase from last year.

She asked the business owners if it is a different type of skier, but they said it was the same type of skier but they are just spending more money. They seem to be

spending more because they feel a little better about the economy.

"The crowds of people were obvious to everyone, but the great thing was that they all had sacks of merchandise in their hands," Bailey said.

She said the businesses not immediately involved in tourism, such as those in the service industry, are also doing well, which shows that money has trickled down.

Lisa Storey, coordinator of the visitor promotion and services, said since the beginning of the month the chamber has had 1,400 people as walk-ins and close to 2,500 phone calls. She said right after Christmas the inquiries started on spring break, when usually inquiries drop off.

"The main difference I saw was the high amount of inquiries as early as that," she said.

Most of the people who came in were families, but also some younger people, and many were here to ski. They also wanted to find activities in the village for their kids to do, she said.

"I think this is an indication of how great the summer will be," Bailey said.

County switches health fund plan

Officials with the Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) were caught off guard last week when county commissioners decided to look at a different way of financing medical care for indigents.

Last year, commissioners had agreed that if it became necessary to send the state money for a federal four-to-one dollar Medicaid match, that money probably would come from a portion of the special local property tax levy that helps support the hospital.

But then last week, commissioners began talking about either imposing a one-sixteenth of a cent gross receipts (sales) tax to pay for the match, or cutting as much as one mill from the hospital levy to cover the cost.

That could amount to \$86,000 more than hospital officials anticipated and could be a real blow financially.

Hospital board chairman Dub Williams said the first he knew

about Senate Bill 549, the most recent legislation requiring county participation, was when he read it in The Ruidoso News.

"I'd had no opportunity to study the bill," he said Wednesday. But he's optimistic that by sitting down with the commission, the hospital will be able to remain in solid financial condition while continuing to provide good health care.

Hospital administrator Valerie Miller said she did not know in advance that the indigent issue was going to be discussed during a special commission meeting March 15. The item was added the afternoon of the meeting, prompting Commissioner Wilton Howell to vote against a motion to advertise for a public hearing to impose a one-sixteenth of a cent indigent care gross receipts tax.

"I don't like stuff being added to the agenda at the last minute," Howell said. "I didn't had time to talk to my constituents or research the item."




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The motion passed four to one and a special hearing is set for April 1.

Miller said Wednesday that she also knew nothing about Senate Bill 594 until she read about it in *The News*.

"I didn't know it existed," she said Wednesday. "What we've been doing (for the past two years through three previous legislative bills) was to look at methods of supporting the state's effort to get (Medicaid) matching money and to meet the needs of Lincoln County as a whole. We've been discussing the best ways to do that without raising taxes and we (the commission and hospital officials) had come to the conclusion that (the required one-sixteenth of a cent indigent care tax) could be funded out

of the (3.25 mill) levy fund."

In a memorandum to the commission dated January 20, former county attorney J. Robert Beauvais summarized that position:

"The argument put forth by Ms. Miller is that the net operating revenues which will become available to Lincoln County Medical Center will actually increase under the proposed funding formula (in the amended County Indigent Funds Claims Act and the Statewide Health Care Fund Act). Under the current proposal, county matching money will be used to leverage 1-to-4 Medicaid money for certain eligible activities. If, in fact, Lincoln County will realize the proceeds of those newly available funds in proportion to its contribution, Ms. Miller feels like the financial effect to the hospital will be positive by its voluntary contribu-

tion of the funds equivalent to the 1/16th required to be raised by the county. That money will directly augment the funds available for hospital operations."

"It would be my recommendation that the county take advantage of the willingness to cooperate by the (LCMC) by its pledge of our proportionate share from the mill levy. Inasmuch as this entire issue will be greatly clarified in the 1993 legislative session, we will have an opportunity to better ascertain the legality of such use. If the use of the mill levy funds is not allowable, we will still have the ability to pass a gross receipts ordinance, which must be effective July 1, 1993, dedicated to the county supported Medicaid fund. In the alternative, we can earmark undedicated ad valorem millage, as suggested."

The movement toward a gross

receipts tax or slicing the hospital's millage support was a surprise, Miller said.

From her reading of the new senate bill, neither is necessary.

Under its conditions, the county commission could serve as the indigent care board, but the hospital could continue to administer the indigent program, submitting bills to the commission for approval or denial. Every dollar approved could be used toward the state's four-to-one federal match.

The county would like to avoid setting up a separate indigent fund because it could take away some of the latitude in allocating help. The county traditionally has been more liberal than Medicaid in setting income levels.

"The higher the approval level, the more we will be able to replace

the outflow (of money), but that's strictly up to the county," she said.

In the past, as much as \$1.1-million of the hospital budget has gone to provide care for the medically indigent.

"The people need to know that the county and the hospital are working closely on this," Miller said.

Howell noted that, "The Senate Bill says we can use money from any existing source, which supports what I said earlier. I strongly oppose a gross receipts tax. There are a lot of other sources rather than a sales tax."

"I agree with Valerie that a more common sense approach to those who need help is the best and she has a good grasp. A medical bill can devastate some families. It's a sad situation when quality medical care is guided by income."

Planners approve four requests

Ruidoso Planning and Zoning met Monday, March 22, to discuss the agenda of the Monday, March 15, meeting cancelled because of a lack of a quorum.

George Davis' request for a replat of Lot 21B, Block 8, of Cree Meadows Country Club Subdivision was approved subject to a vacation of right away approval by the Ruidoso Village Council.

A replat request by M.E. Banks for Lots 436, 437, 438 and 439 of skyland Addition was approved.

An amended commercial site development for lots 27 and 28 of

Block J, Ruidoso Springs Subdivision was approved on the condition that the amount of new storage square footage would remain constant regardless of the area in the building.

The commission allowed no change in parking, because storage was not used for sales.

Recently, another retail outlet wanted to add retail space and because the owners had parking available, the commission took a more code oriented role.

The commission has been granted flexibility by a recent or-

dinance created because of the variety of downtown parking problems. Although each parking problem is dealt with on an individual basis, some residents and owners feel consistency in enforcement is suspect and too subjective.

A commercial site development for Dan Smith was approved as recommended by planning director Cleatus Richards. Solid fencing and landscaping were two conditions that have to be met. Smith was given 180 days to complete the project.

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County road manager Bill Cupit has warned that, depending on what type of surface is applied, that responsibility could be financially staggering to the county.

Money requested for Ruidoso's MainStreet project may be coming from the Senate side, Underwood said.

"I transferred it there because (State Senator) Pete (Campos) said he had some extra money there."

Campos, a Democrat from Santa Rosa, said \$125,000 was delivered by the Senate for the next phase of the MainStreet project in Ruidoso.

The Ruidoso Senior Citizens Center received \$25,000. Street improvements in Capitan

and Corona each were allotted \$12,800, Campos said. Carrizozo also received \$50,000 for sidewalks, but in the shuffle, a sidewalk project for the settlement of Lincoln lost out.

The legislature reserved \$391,800 to renovate a cottage at Fort Stanton as part of the hospital's change from serving the developmentally disabled to becoming a long-term-care facility, he said.

Lincoln County also is among 17 small counties that will qualify for money from a \$3.1-million compensating tax. The counties can use \$150,000-\$200,000 each to help with projects such as culverts and road improvements, Campos explained.

The two legislators also were pleased that their area of represen-

tation will benefit from projects to be financed by one cent of the gasoline tax.

"It will go toward the improvement and widening of U.S. 54 from El Paso to Santa Rosa through Corona and to four lane U.S. 70, which goes through Ruidoso," Underwood said.

"This means over a period of time, the major highways running through Senate District 8 will really be updated," Campos said.

He concluded with a comment about Underwood. "John and I work as a team and because of that, we have been able to get money for many projects," Campos said. "I'm happy to have someone there with his experience and ability."

Downs trustees dole out lodgers tax funds

Two area attractions received the thumbs up sign plus a little money from the Ruidoso Downs board of trustees Monday night.

Trustees said the Museum of the Horse and the Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium are doing a great job and need to keep up the good work. To help them continue their efforts, the trustees approved a \$5,000 each on a recommendation from the Lodgers Tax Advisory Board.

Before taking the vote on the two amounts, representatives of both groups gave a presentation on their attractions.

Laura Doth, marketing director for the Museum of the Horse, said since the museum opened in May it has had 15,000 visitors and this summer should be better than ever. Several events are planned including an anniversary celebration with the grand opening of a new multi-cultural exhibit showing the influence of Hispanics, Native Americans and the cowboys in the old west.

In June, 10 of the best watercolor artists in the country will participate in the Santa Fe Watercolor Society show and sale. The show and museum will be highlighted in an article in a Tucson, Arizona and a Los Angeles, California, newspaper, as well as several art magazines, Doth said.

She said they are also getting more school children in each day, including 120 children from Juarez, Mexico, earlier this week. They are seeing some tour buses and would like even more, such as those on familiarization tours, to let people know about the southwest.

Doth said she has a budget of about \$50,000 but they have already committed about \$20,000 to print 125,000 brochures on the museum. The \$5,000 from Ruidoso Downs will allow Doth to do more advertising.

Frank Potter, president of the Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium, said the symposium has been very successful but it takes a lot of hard work to put on.

The cost to do that is about \$110,000 with a minimum amount of it going to the more than 80 performers.

The symposium brings many people to the area during an off-time, but it has some stiff competition from other events across the state. Potter said to get a good turn-out they have to advertise for a specific type of people, which costs more money.

For the past three years the group received funds from R.D. Hubbard and R.O. Anderson, but will no longer receive that money because they said they would contribute for the first three years only. Potter said they have been thankful for Hubbard's and Anderson's assistance to get them started.

The group also receives money from the National Endowment for the Humanities and will be asking for lodgers tax funds from Ruidoso and the county.

Lincoln County's event has become the second largest symposium in the United States and with the national exposure it is receiving through Ray Reed, one of the organizers for the event, it could become the biggest. Reed has been on the television show Nashville Now and will be at the Smithsonian Institute in Washington D.C. next month.

Last year's event drew 6,000 people, but Sunny Hirschfeld, secretary-treasurer for the event, said that doesn't include the volunteers and all the family members that came with the performers. She said the chuckwagon segment of the event is expanding, and she has already received a call from a chuckwagon outfit in Wyoming wanting to participate.

Hirschfeld pointed out that the scheduling of the activities was good because it kept people there until the last minute of the event Sunday. They should be able to do that again this year because it will be the second weekend of October and will allow people a Monday, Columbus Day, to drive home.

Trustee Charlotte Craig asked Potter and Hirschfeld if they could

change the map in their brochure because it shows the miles from the event to Ruidoso, not to Ruidoso Downs, which is closer. They said they would make that change and also add the Ruidoso Downs logo to it.

Potter commended the Ruidoso Downs village employees and police officers for the assistance they give the people who come here for the event.

Mayor Joe Hayhurst said both are doing a good job, and they are always willing to support any group promoting Ruidoso Downs. He and the trustees also agreed the employees and police department have done an excellent job with the people who come to town.

Both attractions received \$5,000 last year, too.

In other action the board re-appointed trustee Margie Morales to represent the village at the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County meetings and proclaimed the week of May 9-15 as small business week.

The group also accepted the resignation of police officer Bobby Angermiller. Chief Will Hoggard presented Angermiller with a plaque and thanked him for his work the past seven years.

Hoggard then asked the board to approve dispatcher Chris Condon to take Angermiller's place as a police officer. He said Condon will be graduating from the police academy this week as a certified officer. The open position was advertised and Condon was the only candidate.

To take Condon's place, the board also approved the hiring of Dave Perkins as a part-time dispatcher.

The group also accepted the resignation of Barbara Kilough, deputy clerk treasurer.

Village attorney J. Robert Beauvais reported to the group on its labor relations board ordinance and what is happening on the state level. He said he is still comfortable about the way the village is pursuing the formation of a board.

He will file a letter with the state labor board to let it know the group has passed its resolution by

the April 1 deadline. Legislation last year gave local governments the option of forming labor boards or allowing the state board to settle labor related problems that come up.

The group may need to do some clean-up work on the ordinance later as the issue becomes clarified on the state level, he said.

Trustees approved a resolution on travel and per diem expenses with an addition from past years of covering actual expenses instead of the set amount. Village clerk Leann Weibrecht said the set amounts for per diem are based on state rates, including the 25 cents per mile for mileage.

A tabled item from last meeting, the possible trade for private land near the village dirt pit, was put on hold again at this meeting on the advice of the village's attorney and insurance company. Downs resident Robert Beavers had asked the village if he could trim trees on village property by his roping arena, but the board wanted to look into the possibility of trading that piece of property for a piece Beavers has near the dirt pit.

In business not on the agenda, Pat Breedlove, who recently leased Fantasy Mountain across from the race track, said he wanted to introduce himself and let the community know what he is planning to do. Art Fest U.S.A. will feature arts, foods and entertainment for the whole family Thursday-Sunday from July through Labor Day weekend.

He said they hope to have 60 to 75 artists displaying work and a few thousand visitors each week. They are currently working to clean the area up and get prepared for the opening event, Springtime in the Rockies, a bluegrass festival.

The festival, which is in its third year, will be June 11-13, and they expect a minimum of 1,000 people per day. Breedlove said they are also trying to plan a jazz festival for this fall.

He also had good words to say about the village.

"I have never worked with a municipality where the work got done so well," he said.

That's one parent's opinion of the Prater Cup, a junior race championship for 11- and 12-year-olds held last week in Crested Butte, Colorado.

Locals Michael Kelly, Austin Koontz and Shannon Conley represented the Ruidoso Ski Team (RST).

The Prater Cup drew top competitors from the three states that form the Rocky Mountain Division of the United States Ski Association (USSA) — New Mexico, Arizona and Colorado.

In addition to medals and ribbons for top finishers, young racers could win prizes for sportsmanship, team spirit and fun events, said Vicki Conley, Shannon's mom and avid junior race supporter.

"That makes it fun for kids, that even if they're not the fastest, they have a chance to win something.

To foster spirit and cooperation among nearly 200 pre-teens from three states, kids and coaches found themselves randomly assigned to teams named after different countries.




"Come out and walk around The Links Golf Course for this worthy cause. Everyone is welcome, and we need everyone's support for MS," says Patty Frazier, chairperson.

Your house may be home to poisonous substances

This week has been declared National Poison Prevention Week, and Governor Bruce King joins President Bill Clinton, in asking the public to beware of the hazards of some common household products to adults and children.

In New Mexico, about 20,000 people are exposed to poison each year. This year more than 12,000 children will be victims of accidental poisonings. A typical poisoning scenario involves a child between the ages of one and four who accidentally swallows a medication, household product or plant left within his or her reach.

Adults, especially older people, also are exposed to poison. Some confuse one medicine for another or mix medicine with alcohol or other substances. Common substances, such as drain cleaners, bug killers and liquid bleach, can be dangerous if they are handled incorrectly, swallowed, inhaled or splashed on the skin or in the eyes.

The most common substances involved in accidental poisonings are acetaminophen; alcohols; cold and cough products; cosmetics; fumes, gases and vapors; hydrocarbons such as gasoline; plants; aspirin products; sedatives and sleeping aids.

Many accidents involving poison and household substances could be avoided by proper storage — out of the reach of children — and correct labeling to avoid mistakes.

But, when a mishap occurs, the New Mexico Poison Center is available to all New Mexico residents 24 hours a day. The poison center toll-free phone number should be posted along with other emergency numbers so that help can be reached quickly. For emergency aid or poison information call the center toll-free at 1-800-432-6866.
