Driver dies in crash

A local man was fatally injured Saturday after he lost control of his speeding car and it smashed into several structures before rolling and landing upside down on Carrizo Canyon Road.

According to Ruidoso police reports, Thomas J. Lester, 25, and a passenger Frederick Blalock, 20, both of Mescalero, were traveling southbound on Carrizo Canyon Road at a high rate of speed when the 1984 gold Ford Lester was driving came out of a sweeping curve.

Apparently, Lester oversteered and applied the brakes, skidding 58 feet. At that time, the report states the car swerved sideways for another 129 feet before hitting a metal fence post on the drivers side of the car. The vehicle continued another 15 feet and impacted a second metal fence post and at the same time struck a concrete curb.

The car then turned over one time, slid into a second curb turning the vehicle upside down and coming to rest on its top.

On arrival at about 7:45 a.m., police found the two males trapped inside the vehicle. It was necessary for the Ruidoso Fire Department to mechanically extricate them.

Police said Lester was intoxicated and driving on a suspended license. Both Lester and Blalock were transported to the Lincoln County Medical Center by the Ruidoso EMS.

Lester was then taken by EMS to Eastern New Mexico Medical Center South in Roswell with extensive head injuries. He died shortly after arrival.

Blalock suffered severe lacerations to the right arm.

Police said the scene was decontaminated by the Ruidoso Fire Department due to the large amount of blood and oil.

Last Tuesday responding to a call about a lost camper, the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department found Kyle Gillespie (no age or address available), who apparently was suffering from hypothermia and was hallucinating, according to Sheriff James McSwane.

"He was with a group from El Paso and had been out about 20 hours," McSwane said. "He was told his friend was dead in the river."

"We searched the river, but later found his friend safe with the camping group. They were reunited prior to him being taken to the medical center in Ruidoso."

Dream comes true for boy who loves Billy

He went home to Wisconsin as a Lincoln County Deputy, with a badge, a cowboy hat, a range slicker and the knowledge that he's gathered a bunch of new friends in New Mexico.

Jason Peterson, a fan of Billy the Kid who dreamed of riding over the same trails as the outlaw, was able to live that dream this past week. The trip became a reality compliments of the Make a Wish Foundations of Wisconsin and New Mexico, the Billy the Kid Outlaw Gang and many other people who donated food, clothing, material and lodging.

The 17-year-old Peterson was diagnosed six years ago as suffering a form of muscular dystrophy. While his mother, Diane Rusch, said doctors expected him to be confined to a wheelchair, Peterson still gets around on his own, sometimes with the help of his best friend, Ken Behrent.

Traveling with his mother, stepfather Tim Rusch, six-year-old brother Andy, eight-year-old sister Bobbi Jo and friend Behrent from his hometown of Kaukauna, Wisconsin, Peterson arrived March 21

at the Lamy Train Station.

He had little idea the itinerary and activities that Marilyn and Joe Bowling, founders of the non-profit, 3,500-member Outlaw Gang, had planned for him.

The couple was contacted in January by Diane Bunger-Thomas, who represents a 10-county area in Wisconsin as Wish Granting Director.

Make A Wish foundations across the nation are dedicated to helping children up to the age of 18 with terminal and life-threatening diseases, to live out their special dreams.

Bunger-Thomas asked for help and the Bowlings delivered big time. Peterson and his group were greeted at the Lamy station south of Santa Fe by a posse of Gang members.

The next day, they toured the historic Grezelachowski Mercantile and home in Puerto de Luna south of Santa Rosa, where William Bonney enjoyed his last Christmas dinner in December 1880.

Arriving in Taiban later that day, Peterson became part of a reenactment of the gunfight and sur-

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Village reaches out to annex Carrizo Lodge

Annexation may be the best or the worst thing for many residents along Carrizo Road to Carrizo Lodge.

The question is, will that decision be left to the people or a handful of politicians and a developer?

The developer, James Porter of C-Net Corporation, is pressuring the Ruidoso Village Council to hurry the annexation and water line construction so that his condo rental season will not be interrupted.

The village council expressed no reason for a deadline other than to facilitate the developer. Some residents express a concern that municipal services currently are not being delivered and that the council should rethink its priorities to take care of those services before annexing any new territory.

The Ruidoso News learned that many home and condo owners who would be impacted are unaware of any impending attempts to annex, an action that would raise their property taxes and water rates.

Several condo owners were contacted by The News Friday. None had received a letter regarding the water line or annexation.

The developer has given an end of June deadline. Public hearings will be set, but the timing would give little chance for property owners to weigh all the information, even if they are provided all the information.

The annexation is being requested by Porter because C-Net

and the Carrizo Home Owners Association need to correct a problem concerning well water with high mineral contents. A solution to their problem, according to Porter, is to install a 7,400-foot water line from the village to the Carrizo Lodge property.

The village already maintains sewer service to the property, although Carrizo Lodge owns the lines.

The annexation would include a contiguous piece of land from the village to the Carrizo Lodge property. The deal would include shared costs and village ownership of the sewer and water lines in exchange for utility credit (water and sewer) to the developer, an estimated \$15,000.

The village council emphasized there would be no pockets in the property annexed from the village to Carrizo Lodge, thereby including many new residents along the mile and one quarter stretch of road.

As new residents, Carrizo condo owners, as well as homeowners on either side of Carrizo Canyon Road, will be entitled to new services requiring more taxpayer dollars.

Maintenance of Carrizo Road has been handled by the village through an agreement with the county, according to county road manager Bill Cupit. Snow removal and road repair could be moved to a higher priority by the Ruidoso street department.

Side roads off Carrizo Road currently are maintained by the county.

Porter said he now calls the sheriff's office with problems. If the

property is annexed, that responsibility would become the Ruidoso Police Department's.

Police Chief Richard Swenor prefers four police officers on duty for the village, but often only two are available for village protection. The Carrizo annexation would spread police protection even thinner, unless there is a budget increase.

Today, the Ruidoso Fire Department will respond to emergencies along Carrizo Road to the lodge as a courtesy. With annexation, it becomes a duty.

Costly planning and zoning requirements also would apply, if the property was annexed. The council recently has turned down requests to add another building inspector.

In an attempt to save money, the village is considering not placing fireplugs along the water line because of associated costs ranging from \$20,000 to \$30,000. On a suggestion from Porter, village officials may wait until annexation and then, at a later date, install the fireplugs.

Porter said he hopes that the 7,400 feet of water line can be completed by June so his busy season would not be interrupted. He said if the project was not completed by that date, he may have to renegotiate.

If water lines were installed without annexation, the utility bill of a person outside the village limits would be twice that of a village resident, according to an ordinance passed last year.

The Carrizo property has five

Council moves public hearings to top of agenda

The new Ruidoso Village Council meeting format begins this Tuesday, with public hearings leading the agenda items to conserve time for visitors.

At 6:30 p.m. the council will hear the first public hearing regarding a transfer of ownership and location of a dispensers liquor license.

Miriam B. Kotkowsky has applied for the transfer to be used at the business known as Enchantment Inn Hotel and Screaming Eagle Lounge.

The second public hearing is a continuation of Resolution 93-6 concerning the operational policy at the Civic Events Center.

Regular agenda items that follow in order include:

- a presentation of an award to the Ruidoso Police Department.
- complaints concerning Two Rivers Park. Residents complain of drinking, loud parties and litter.
- a request for authorization to

sell real property. The Library Board wants to sell a Mark condo in Upper Terrace with an estimated value of \$18,000.

—an appeal of planning commission denial to rezone from C-2 to R-3. Planning and zoning had denied the rezoning request for over four acres of commercial property to multi-family off U.S. 70 and near Camelot Theatre. Jeffrey Smith of Columbus, Missouri, wants to construct an apartment complex.

—vacation of right of way approval for Lot 21B, Block 8, of Cree Meadows Country Club Subdivision. Planning commission recommends vacating Buckner Drive where it adjoins the George Davis property. Davis proposes to dedicate turnaround property in exchange.

—a change order, final, for Bradley Construction Inc. regarding construction on the Civic Events Center.

—final payment to Bradley Construction, Inc., for the Civic Events Center.

—bid awards for furniture and equipment for the Civic Events Center.

—bid awards for roof replacement for village hall and police-courts building.

—scheduling public hearing of Ordinance 93-5, an ordinance establishing rules and regulations for Grindstone Lake.

—selection of lodging vendor to be audited.

Two vendors should be selected to be audited for the 1991-1992 fiscal year pursuant to the Lodgers Tax Act. The vendors names will be drawn from a box by lot. The audit is specified in the guidelines provided in Resolution 93-9.

—annual boards and commission appointments.

—Carrizo Lodge annexation and water line negotiations.

—Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County update.

Consent agenda items include:

- an annual application for airport aid from the state for herbicide to control weeds adjacent to runways, taxiway and crash fire rescue building.
- a Chamber of Commerce request for approval of an advertising plan.

The monitored Retrievable Storage Advisory Committee will give a report.

Councilor J.D. James will speak on septic tank assessment fees.

Information items include:

- boards and commission meeting reports.
- monthly departmental reports.
- chamber of commerce notification of a request for funds to renew the contract with the village.

The council will retire into closed session following the regular meeting.

Sid Apache will remain open through April 11, Easter Sunday.



render of the Kid to Sheriff Pat Garrett at Stinking Springs east of Fort Sumner.

"Jason's friend, Ken, is more than just a pal," Mrs. Bowlin said. "He carried Jason on his back to the gunfight staging area. He was always there for support. He was absolutely terrific."

The gun battle was followed by a cook-out and sleep-out. Optional accommodations were available for the less hardy in the picturesque ranch house that is part of the Little House on the Prairie Bed and Breakfast operated by Gang members, Jenean and C.W. Grissom.

One of the most memorable moments for Peterson came the next day, Tuesday, when he stood on the gravesite of the Kid in Old Fort Sumner. He told the Bowlins that he felt a strong force, a free will

that exhilarated him.

That afternoon in Roswell, Hubert Quintana of the Diamond A Cattle Company provided a demonstration of skills required to operate a ranch, such as roping and branding.

He also guided a visit to the Old Chisum Ranch southeast of Roswell.

A tour of historic Lincoln, where Billy once engineered a bloody jail break, rounded out the day. That night, the family stayed at the history-steeped Wortley Hotel in Lincoln.

After a black powder demonstration Wednesday, the group headed out to Capitan and the Smokey Bear Historical Park, then to the ghost town of White Oaks and on to Fort Stanton, a frontier fort later used as a tuberculosis center.

Thursday, Peterson stopped at the Museum of the Horse in

Ruidoso Downs, where Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane swore him in as a deputy, and the Old Dowlin's Mill, where Bonney in the late 1870s hid in a barrel to avoid detection.

From there, the entourage left the supervision of the Bowlins and drove to Mesilla Valley outside of Las Cruces, where Billy spent a lot of time, some of it in jail. On Friday, they visited Silver City, the site of the Kid's boyhood home and his mother's grave. The last stop before heading back to the train in Lamy was Socorro, where Peterson had a chance to visit the university.

A basket of munchies was waiting for the family at the train station, compliments of the New Mexico Wish group.

"Scores of tourism officials came together to help make Jason's wish come true," Mrs. Bowlin said.

wells. One of the wells is commercial and it belongs to Porter's C-Net Corporation.

Porter said Carrizo's water is tested regularly and it is good drinking water, but high in mineral content.

Owners of the condos have complained about red water or black water smelling of sulfur.

Many condos are vacation homes. Porter cited the example of water heaters that may be left for weeks without use as a major cause of the problem.

He said the water was pure and safe, but many of the vacation homes do not get regular use.

"Once you let the hot water run for 10 minutes, everything is OK," Porter said. He said when the hot water first comes out of the tap, it smells like sulfur.

The new water line is expected to remedy this problem for Carrizo Lodge condos. Owners contacted by The News were highly supportive of the installation. However, those contacted said they were not aware of the new minimum village utility charge of \$26.80 per month per unit that would be imposed. That charge contains water, garbage and sewer. Their information was limited, mainly from hearsay.

Porter said through quarterly fees, owners were already paying about \$15 to \$16 per month for sewer and garbage pickup. He said the village's \$26.80 includes those charges. He said other costs (such as well repairs) defrayed with the new water line would make the additional cost to the home owners negligible.

In a letter dated Thursday, March 25, Porter wrote Mayor Victor Alonso that he wanted to renew and update recent proposals to annex.

"We are agreeable to purchasing the pipe and fittings as required by village specifications and can have them delivered within one week of council approval. The cost will be approximately \$35,000 for 7,400 feet of the 8-inch pipe and gates and tees, of which C-Net and Carrizo Homeowners Association will pay the entire amount with the village of Ruidoso giving us credit toward future utility bills for all of the amount in excess of \$20,000," Porter wrote.

Porter said he was hopeful ditch dirt and sand would be satisfactory for a base material, but if necessary, he would pay up to one half of the cost for base material up to a maximum of \$8,000 with the village paying a like amount.

"The village will supply labor and equipment for complete installation of 7,400 feet of pipe, to be completed as soon as practical within the next two months," Porter wrote.

Village manager Wicker estimated the labor cost to be about \$8,600.

"As discussed previously, be-

cause of the summer tourist season, it will be impractical to try to connect the Carrizo complex to the village water system when we have a large number of guests, therefore we feel the urgency in connecting as soon as possible. That is also the reason for our proposal to buy the pipe and if for any reason we are unable to connect before the summer season, then we prefer to withdraw our offers and re-negotiate at a later time."

Porter's remarks didn't indicate whether future negotiations would be higher or lower for the village.

Acknowledging that water rights, by ordinance, are to be deeded to the village on annexation, Porter amended a previous offer. He now requests an amount of \$10,000 to \$15,000 be credited to his operation's account for future water usage in exchange for title to the sewer line.

"This sewer line, which is about 6,500 feet long, was installed at village specifications with no cost to the village for labor or material and is adequate for the entire Carrizo Canyon sub-divisions," Porter wrote.

The sewer line, built in the early '80s, has been maintained by the village. Sewer costs in the village are \$7.35. Outside the village limits, by ordinance, charges should be about twice that amount.

Garbage collections outside of the village limits cost \$5.25 each month per unit. For units within the village limits, garbage costs are \$6.30 collected for the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

Porter said he wrote a letter to all Carrizo condo homeowners.

"In regard to the Carrizo Condominium Homeowners Association, there has been no formal vote taken of the homeowners as of this date, however a letter has been previously sent to all owners stating the possibility of annexation and requested objections, but there were none," wrote Porter.

Condo owners contacted by The News as late as Friday, March 26, said they had not received such a letter.

Porter said he was sure that a large majority was in favor of annexation.

"I'm not sure we can make it official without a vote," he added. "At any rate, C-Net Resorts formally requests annexation of its 30-plus acres while the request from the Homeowners Association is informal at this moment."

There are three methods of annexing territory to a municipality: arbitration, the boundary commission and the petition method.

During the village council's special meeting on March 17, village manager Ron Wicker recommended that the owners of Carrizo Lodge petition the village council for annexation and that the village proceed with annexation of the property along Carrizo Canyon.

It would appear that the village would have to annex canyon prop-

erty owners first in order for Carrizo Lodge's petition to be contiguous territory. If pockets of unannexed land are created, the territory can't be contiguous.

Carrizo Lodge's petition, after being signed by the owners of a majority of the number of acres in the contiguous territory, is to be submitted to the council with a map of the territory to be annexed and its relationship to the existing boundary of the municipality.

After this is presented to the village council, the council by ordinance (which requires an advertised public hearing) expresses its consent or rejection.

If the ordinance consents, a copy of the plat is filed with the county clerk. After the filing, the contiguous territory is part of the municipality.

Within 30 days after the filing of the copy of the ordinance with the county clerk, any person owning land within the territory annexed to the municipality may appeal to the district court questioning the validity of the annexation proceedings. If no appeal is made or if the court renders judgment in favor of the municipality, the annexation shall be deemed complete.

Regarding the property to be annexed between Carrizo Lodge and the village limits, the council did not determine whether it would follow the petition plan or one of the two other options.

According to the village planning and zoning office, no correspondence from the village has been sent at this time alerting the canyon property owners of the annexation possibility.

Minutes from that special March 17 council meeting indicate Carrizo Lodge officials had contacted their property owners and most were willing to be annexed.

New residents annexed into the village will become the beneficiaries of all Ruidoso services and they also will be taxed to pay for those services.

Lincoln County Tax Assessor's office collects all property taxes in the county and then disperses them to the proper taxing entities such as schools, hospital, state, county and then the municipality.

The 1992 tax rate for Ruidoso is \$38.15 per thousand dollars. Outside Ruidoso, the tax rate is \$23.14 per thousand.

The difference in the property tax rate, about \$15, goes to Ruidoso.

A rough breakdown of percentages shows 3.5 percent of property taxes goes to the state (bond issues usually voted on during an election); 21.3 percent goes to the county; 39.3 percent goes to Ruidoso; 25.5 percent goes to the school district; health offices, hospital and college is about 10.2 percent.

The debt service of Ruidoso out of that \$15 (bond issues that residents have approved) is \$9.19 according to the Lincoln County Tax Assessor's office.

County hears from BLM officials

Officials from the Bureau of Land Management are scheduled to attend a special meeting of the Lincoln County Commission on Thursday, April Fool's Day.

The 9 a.m. meeting at the county courthouse in Carrizozo will replace the commission's regular session, which would have convened the following Tuesday. It was called to ensure that whatever course the commission decides to pursue as a means of paying for indigent medical care, it is in place by an April 1 deadline.

In line with that decision, a public hearing is set for 9:15 a.m. on a proposed health care gross receipts tax to be used toward the state's Medicaid match for federal dollars on a 1-4 ratio.

The bureau (BLM) representatives will at the meeting to answer questions about the Resource Management Plan for the Roswell District that includes Lincoln County. The plan covers property proposed for acquisition and already acquired by the bureau along the Rio Bonito near the historic settlement of Lincoln.

One of the commission's early objections to the acquisition was that no specific plans had been developed for use of the land.

They also will be following up on a negotiation session with commissioners Stirling Spencer and Wilton Howell last Thursday in Santa Fe. The commissioners and county attorney Dan Bryant traveled north to try to work out a mutually satisfying settlement of the county's federal suit against the bureau.

The suit was filed after former Interior Secretary Manuel Lujan dismissed the commission's protest of a swap of 1,115 acres of the Rio Bonito private land in the county to the federal agency in exchange for 36,000 federal acres outside the county. Although BLM officials had agreed to several of the commission's conditions, the issue of land parity, a balance of public and private land ownership in the county, still was unsettled when the suit was filed in federal court.

The negotiating session Thursday was heavily attended by federal officials and their attorneys, as well as representatives of the Lincoln Valley Land Company, which owns the private land the bureau wants to acquire. However, the company and its principals already have been dropped from the suit and did not participate in full meeting, which lasted about three hours. Spencer told The Ruidoso

News all he could say was that the two sides still are negotiating.

Howell said by Thursday's meeting, commissioners should know whether an agreement can be struck. With BLM officials at the meeting, any questions from the other members of the board can be posed directly to those representatives.

"I feel good," Howell said Sunday. "If it goes according to what I think will happen, the county will come out in good shape, probably because the previous commission took a tough stand on the issue."

Several other interesting items also are listed on the agenda, including:

—approval of an application through the office of Sheriff James McSwane for a DARE, Drug Abuse Resistance Education, grant.

—a request by the Glencoe-Palo Verde Fire Department for a loan to construct a fire substation.

—a request to advertise for a public hearing on an ordinance to impose a penalty clause for late payment of solid waste collection bills in unincorporated areas of the county. The action was suggested by Commissioner Bill Schwettmann, who is one of the county's representatives on the Solid Waste Authority.

Shotgun is quick to latch onto his rescuers



He's only 10 to 11 months old, but Shotgun has experienced some rough moments in his young life.

Fortunately for the shepherd/yellow labrador mix, his path crossed a couple of people who cared and have tried to ensure the rest of his life is happier and safer.

Shotgun was brought to the shelter after he was found dodging cars on a Ruidoso downtown street by Adrienne Ames, 16, the daughter of Dagmar and Tony Ames.

"She took him to the (Lincoln County Humane Society) shelter, but came home in tears, because she was afraid he would be put down," Dagmar Ames said. "We're a cat family, but her father took pity on her and we went back to the

shelter and brought him home, hoping the owner could be found. He obviously had been well-taken care of by someone."

Adrienne decided to name the dog Shotgun, because when she first found him and opened the door of her car, he jumped straight inside and wouldn't budge, Mrs. Ames said.

"He loves to go for rides. He's very people-oriented," she said.

The family kept him several days before receiving a telephone call from shelter manager Randy Basch, who had been contacted about a lost dog matching Shotgun's description.

The family called the man and learned that he had found Shotgun wandering in the Alto Lakes area and was trying to find the owner. But his original owners apparently don't want him back, because they have not contacted the shelter or animal control.

Shotgun is back at the shelter in

the hope that someone will give him a loving home. The Ames have paid for his neutering, the major cost associated with adoption. They have bought him a collar, leash and identification.

"He's great with kids," Ames said. "I think he would be a wonderful companion for someone with the time to play with him. He wants to be loved and to be with people."

A brother-sister Bernese Mountain Dog duo called Trekker and Tracker also still are available for adoption. They were featured in a story last week, but not pictured. The male has been neutered and the female has been spayed, which would indicate an owner who cares, but no one has contacted the shelter, Basch said. Their adoption costs will be less, because they already have been sterilized.

In the cattery next to the canine shelter, Chopsticks is looking for a patient and mature owner.

The Siamese mix is more than one year old. Shelter workers especially want to find her a home, because she has been abandoned too long and needs a caring person to give her attention.

Although the humane society acknowledges that some dogs brought to the shelter must be destroyed due to irresponsible pet owners who fail to sterilize their pets and allow them to run loose, Basch's philosophy has been sensitive to the life issue.

Under his management for the past five years, dogs and cats are destroyed only if they are ill or the

shelter becomes crowded. If an animal is sponsored for sterilization or already is spayed or neutered, he will hold them indefinitely to give them a chance of finding new owners.

People interested in enhancing a particular animal's chances for adoption may sponsor them for sterilization or leave it up to Basch to apply the sponsorship when it can best be used.

Unfortunately, Basch recently submitted his resignation and the humane board is searching for someone with a similar approach to take his place.

The board rejects the idea of killing animals on a set schedule based on the date of arrival at the shelter. Members recognize that some animals are more adoptable and deserve an extended chance.

But when crowding threatens to compromise the health of the shelter population, the manager is compelled to make some tough choices. Often those destroyed first are the puppies and kittens, because the survival rate for young animals in a shelter is very low.

Basch has used foster homes, families willing to care for the young animals for about two weeks while protective shots take effect, to improve that rate. The stay in a home also tends to socialize the animals, making them happier, healthier and better candidates for adoption.

Economic Development Corporation reschedules another board meeting

Group plans to elect new officers April 8

In a continuing trend from last fiscal year, the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County had to postpone its meeting planned for Thursday.

The EDCLC had its annual meeting on March 11 and was planning to take care of February's business before that, but didn't get around to it. The board set the Thursday meeting to cover that business, plus items for the month of March.

The group was scheduled to elect new officers, to discuss a fundraising project and a direct marketing campaign as well as the regular items of minutes and financial statements for the previous two months.

Executive director Karen Kopp said she had contacted all the board members about the meeting, but several were going to a solid waste

authority meeting in Tularosa and two others were out-of-town. Two others were not sure if they would be able to make it, and instead of letting directors come from out of town for a meeting when it was likely to lack a quorum, she decided to postpone it.

Kopp said she has rescheduled the meeting for 7 p.m. April 8 with the same items on the agenda. She said she has talked to all of the directors and they understand how important attending the next meeting will be.

The most important item for the group to accomplish will be to elect officers, which could provide the direction for the organization. Kopp has also gotten the information needed to start a direct marketing campaign, which would be less expensive for the group than advertising in a large newspaper or magazine, but she would need the ap-

proval of the board to go any further.

Also important for the organization is the fundraising campaign, which the group has been discussing for more than a year. Past president of the organization, Ronnie Paulger, had introduced the idea and had anticipated getting it off the ground by April of last year.

Kopp said to get the project going they have had meetings with people who will serve as team captains for a variety of industries in the community. These people will then organize a team that will meet with businesses within their industry to talk about the EDCLC.

Paulger and the group had wanted to get a long-term commitment from the community to establish a larger support from the private sector instead of almost complete reliance on the village of Ruidoso for funding.

Since the 1992 annual meeting of the organization in February 1992, the group has met with a quorum six times and twice the members discussed items, but did not have a quorum. It did not vote on officers last year until August 6,

when the former president Paulger was re-elected.

The group did not meet or did not have a quorum in June, July, September, November and December.

The corporation is made up of representatives of each community in the county and several elected members. The current directors are John Van Tussenbroek, Richard Mound, Joan Bailey, Lee Griffin, Glen Crane, Scott Shafer, Jim Miller and two newly-elected members Frank Potter and George Schultz.

Frank Cummins represents Ruidoso, while Margie Morales sits in for Ruidoso Downs. Eileen Lovelace is the designated person for Carrizozo and Gordon Ross represents Capitan. Daniel Luarez is Corona's director.

The county commission has also recently named commissioner Wilton Howell to sit on the board, after choosing not to have a representative for more than a year. The organization did receive a mill levy from the county for about two years but the past commission decided the group's results were not substantial enough for the kind of funding it received from the county.

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Warrior's Legacy opens in Midtown

A new business, The Warrior's Legacy, has opened in the Village Plaza in Midtown Ruidoso and will offer the finest hand-made Native American creations.

The owner, Toby G. Christopher, was born May 9, 1934, at Wichita, Kansas. His Native American heritage comes from his mother, a full blood Choctaw from Idabel, Oklahoma.

Christopher's training in the arts and crafts came from his family and also from many years of study with the people of the various Plains tribes with whom he lived and associated during his early youth and adolescence.

His interest in the arts and crafts of the Plains people was stimulated by study and research that revealed that the old ways were vanishing rapidly.

Christopher began creating his own works as a part of research into the methods and materials utilized by the Plains people prior to 1850.

Interest in his crafts by others motivated an ever expanding variety of arts and crafts which now include stone and wood sculpture, oil and watercolor painting and lectures and workshops in addition to the old style artifacts in which he specializes.

Christopher has been featured in two week-long exhibitions at Allard's Gallery Picadilly, Fresno,

California; a two artist, six-week exhibition at Clovis Community Bank, Prather, California; and many juried shows limited in scope to western and Native American art. He has received numerous first place awards in juried shows for individual pieces and also for overall presentation.

Christopher is currently represented by Allard's Gallery Picadilly in Fresno, Suma Sil Gallery, Cambria, California, and Columbine Arts, Shaver Lake, California.

In addition to traveling the powwow circuit on the west coast during the past five years, Christopher has presented lectures on Native American art to the Ruidoso in November 1992 in order to find a

more traditional way of life and to pursue his art. In February of 1999 he and his wife, Marian, who also creates items such as dresses, opened the small shop in Ruidoso, which features his work. The shop was called "The Warrior's Legacy," which is the title of one of his most popular pieces.

Survey will rate need for vocational-ed

Determining the interest in forming a regional vocational school associated with the college campus here is one of several goals of a new survey being sent out.

Dr. Jim Miller, Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso campus director, said questionnaires are now being sent out to four different groups in Lincoln and northern Otero County to help obtain data on the concept.

The surveys will be sent out to sophomores and juniors in the high schools, the students' parents, people in the education field including teachers and administrators and also to the business community.

All of the surveys will essentially be the same and will ask questions such as what vocational-technical programs should be continued, what new programs should be developed and what basic skills and vocational skills are most important.

The one major difference will be in the business survey, which will ask how many people it plans to employ in the next six months, 12 months and beyond.

The specific programs and classes are based on past survey information and state and national trends. Miller said vocational courses could allow people to train locally for jobs here or be able to relocate.

The South Central Mountain Resource Conservation and Development Council has also recently decided to participate in the program as part of its community development project, which includes education as one of its priorities.

Howard Shanks, council coordinator, and Bob Hemphill, who is also an instructor at the college, will be in charge of it.

The survey will also help the group find out what the current vocational training needs are for older high school students and what the vocational needs are for working adults.

The results will be distributed back to the schools and also be used by the college to apply for federal grant money to get a vocational center.

If people are interested in filling out the survey, they can come by the college office at 1400 Sudderth Drive to do so. Miller said the university will try to wrap-up the surveys by April 9.



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

Progress is our most important product...

Remember when a national company used "progress is our most important product" as its slogan?

That manufacturer really had something, and it's even true for a busy little tourist area like Lincoln County.

Progress is important, and in the hustle and bustle of working hard, it's important to slow down now and then and take a reading on that progress.

That's what this special section is all about.

Our customers report that 1992 was a good year, and 1993 started off with a bang. Business is on the upswing and this is a good time to take a deep breath and pat ourselves on the back — just before the boom hits this summer.

Lincoln County has a population of 12,219, according to the last census. Within this county are five incorporated municipalities: Capitan, population 842; Carrizozo, the county seat with a population of 1,075; Corona, population 215; Ruidoso, population 4,600; and Ruidoso Downs with a population of 920.

Carrizozo is the county seat, home of the courthouse and headquarters for county elected officials, but it's in Ruidoso that the bulk of Lincoln County business is transacted.

Ruidoso is the largest village in Lincoln County, and is its business center. It's a village that continues to grow and evolve.

The village has suffered some ups and downs over the past five to 10 years, but this past year village leaders and citizens had good reason to celebrate with the opening of the Ruidoso Civic Events Center.

It's the biggest, and we're thinking the best, such center between Dallas and Denver, and over the next few years will enhance the tourist economy by drawing meetings and conventions to the area.

A hotel is in the master plan for the resort area where the civic center and municipal golf course, The Links at Sierra Blanca, are located. So far, that hotel project is on hold, but this optimistic little village isn't giving up.

A performing arts center will soon be built in the Alto area. Philanthropists

A.N. and Jacqueline Spencer are developing the center as a donation to this area, and they're working with designers and architects now.

MainStreet Ruidoso, a public-private partnership, is the moving force behind a revitalization effort in Midtown Ruidoso.

Plans are under way for a streetscape that will include sidewalks, lighting and parking. MainStreet, in partnership with the Village of Ruidoso, also is working on a river walk project.

Ruidoso schools are on the move, with one building project starting right

on the heels of the last as the school board and administration work to stay ahead of growing demands on school buildings. Ruidoso Municipal Schools voters continue to be supportive of bond issues that pay for these projects.

A new school is being added to move the sixth graders out of the Mid-school and cluster three elementary schools on the White Mountain property.

Eastern New Mexico University, Ruidoso Instructional Center, is in its second year in Ruidoso and already has beat its own projections and goals with 500 or so students enrolled for credit.

Besides giving locals the opportunity to further their education and earn college credits, the community college is contributing to the area in other ways.

An Adventures in Learning program offers recreational and information classes for non-credit, and the school also has several literacy projects under way.

Churches, clubs and service organizations make contributions, too, to this busy village.

And, while the business center may be in Ruidoso, the tourism center is much more spread out.

The Village of Ruidoso Downs is home to two of the biggest tourist attractions in Lincoln County.

Ruidoso Downs Race Track is the largest area employer during the racing season, from May through Labor Day each year.

The race track continues to invest in improvements and upgrades to ensure that the summer season is healthy.

The Sports Theater, just down the road from the racetrack, extends that season all year with simulcast wagering in a comfortable auditorium where spectators can watch races from all over the United States via satellite.

Racetrack owner R.D. Hubbard and his wife, Joan Dale, have developed the other major tourist attraction in Ruidoso Downs, the Museum of the Horse located in the old Chaparral Convention Center.

Already, the museum is drawing thousands of visitors a year to see the largest collection of horse-related items in the world.

A brand new enterprise, Artfest U.S.A., is coming to the Village of Ruidoso Downs this summer.

Long-time area residents Cindy and Pat Breedlove will present a series of art events at the old Fantasy Mountain amusement park property across U.S. Highway 70 from Ruidoso Downs Race Track. First up at Artfest U.S.A. will be the Bluegrass Festival.

Lincoln County's tourists mainly come by car, and most of them drive from Texas to enjoy the cool mountain climate. That trend had a devastating affect on the tourist economy when the Texas oil industry went bust.

But a recovery brought them all back, and the past two winter seasons have sweetened that recovery with great snows.

Ski Apache is at the center of the winter tourist season. Ski Apache, a Mescalero Apache Indian enterprise, and the ski industry combine to make up the largest pool of employment during the winter, from Thanksgiving through Easter, depending on the snow.

But tourism is a fact of life all over Lincoln County, as well as in Mescalero, the home of the top-ranked Inn of the Mountain Gods resort hotel.

Visitors flock to historic Lincoln, the old stomping grounds of Billy the Kids; Capitan, the home of Smokey Bear; and the Lincoln National Forest.

Although Mescalero is not in Lincoln County, it's such a close neighbor that its enterprises are a great boon to this area.

Among the newest enterprises at the busy Inn is the Apache Casino, with its room full of video gaming machines. Mescalero also operates Bingo of Mescalero on the reservation.

Golfers can play on five courses in Lincoln County — the Inn of the Mountain Gods, The Links at Sierra Blanca, Cree Meadows Golf Course, Alto Lakes Golf and Country Club and the Carrizozo Municipal Course.

When tourism and recreation suffered some years ago, Lincoln County leaders didn't just sit back and wait. Private business owners and operators formed partnerships with government agencies to turn things around.

The successful MainStreet Ruidoso is just one of those partnerships.

The Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County was formed to attract businesses to the area, with a primary goal of diversifying and enhancing the tourist economy.

Volunteers continue to work through the private corporation that has been funded for the most part through a county mill levy and membership.

EDCLC is directed by Karen Kopp, who was just hired this year; and she'll soon be joined by new officers when the recently elected board meets to select new officers.

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce is also under new leadership, with Joan Bailey just ending her first year as director.

Bailey has spent her first year in contacting members, soliciting members and continuing the special events that are the lifeblood of this chamber.

The village has taken over some of the promotional tasks that once were delegated to the Chamber of Commerce. The Convention and Visitors Bureau is directed by Kathleen Michelena, who heads up the new Civic Events Center.

Businesses come and go, but the village retains a solid core of shops and enterprises that includes three malls and a handful of unique shopping centers.

Customers have a wide choice among grocery and convenience stores that provide the basics and staples for residents and visitors.

Real estate, a mainstay of the economy, is on the rise, with a core of successful offices and agents serving the needs of sellers, buyers and renters.


Full-service banking is easy to find in Lincoln County, as well as mortgage companies and savings and loans.

Car dealers, insurance companies, cleaners and laundries all are located conveniently for Lincoln County residents.


Art is another major industry, with Lincoln County nipping at the heels of Santa Fe.

Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso



Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso Instructional Center lives up to its slogan: More than you ever imagined...

It took years and several false starts, but Ruidoso now is home to a thriving, dynamic community college.

Enrollment, compared to the spring semester last year, has grown by 30.5 percent at ENMU-Ruidoso.

"Last year, the enrollment for the same semester was 389 and this year, we have registered 508 students for classes," said campus administrator Jim Miller.

In addition to the steady growth, Miller has seen some changes in the composition of the student body.

"This semester, 113 students are attending with some form of financial aid," he said. "We have 61 Native Americans, up 151 percent from a year ago."

College enrollment for spring 1993 also includes 95 Hispanic students, an increase of 39.7 percent, for a combined minority enrollment of 30.7 percent.

Residents from Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Alto account for 66.5 per-

cent of the enrollment.

"The rest of the county and northern Otero rounds out the total with 165 students," said Miller. Some ENMU-Ruidoso students travel from as far away as Corona. But, thanks to the age of technology, at least one student is able to stay in Corona and earn college credit by taking a class via computer.

The university education center employs 37 part-time faculty members, three full-time administrative staff members, one part-time clerk and three work-study aides.

Women comprise the major portion of the enrollment, 67.7 percent, with 344 registered this spring.

Computer courses continue to be the favorite, with heavy enrollment, but they are leveling off, Miller said. Spanish also is popular.

More full-time students also are attending the center, with more than a 170 percent increase in the category of students taking 12 hours or more in a semester.

The center will celebrate its first commencement exercise May 15 with

two graduates who have completed their associate of science degree programs. Already the college has celebrated its first People's Law School graduation ceremony.

The university also has approved a master of arts degree to be offered in the fall semester that starts in August. The focus will be on education and school administration, including early childhood education and Headstart, not just kindergarten through 12th grade. The main university will send the faculty for that program.

"The university is taking a new direction," Dr. Miller said. "They're in the process of hiring a full-time teacher to travel the region and conduct classes, not stay in Portales. They are recognizing the fact that everybody can't drive to or live on campus. I expect to see more of this over the next few years."

Yes, ENMU-Ruidoso is more than this community ever imagined.



After several years of laboring to make it a reality, the group is excited to announce construction will begin the first of May on phase one of the streetscape improvement plan for the midtown area of Sudderth Drive.

The plan, which has received funding from state and federal sources, calls for widened sidewalks, handicap access, well-designated crosswalks, increased lighting and better signage.

Phase one will cover the main section of Midtown from Fern Street to Country Club Road. MainStreet is now working on earning funds from the state legislature and federal grants to continue engineering and construction of phases two and three, from Fern to Mechem Drive and from Country Club to Carter's Lane.

MainStreet is moving beyond the streetscape, though. All the planning for the new year will be based on two important projects, the completion of a market survey and a long-term

strategic plan. Don Miller, MainStreet project director, said the results of the survey will help determine what course to take for a successful future.

The survey was sent out to businesses, local residents and visitors to find out what needs are not being met in the downtown area. The information will be compiled and analyzed this coming year and will be presented in a public forum to make everyone aware of what challenges face the community.

The strategic plan, which will also draw from information received in survey results, will help the group decide which direction it will go.

"If we don't know where we are going, we don't know what steps we need to take to get there," Miller said.

A long-range plan can help tie everything together and help solve the area's known concerns, such as parking, downtown maintenance and the development and completion of the River Trail. The group will be working with the village to solve these problems for the benefit of all involved.

Another project the group will be developing is business retention, recruitment and education programs. These

programs could be developed based on the information found in the market survey. As far as retention, Miller said the survey will tell what additional goods and services are needed that a business could add as a compliment to a current inventory.

"We want to add to their ability to stay in business," he said.


The survey data can also point out needed goods and services that a new business may be interested in providing.

To help businesses on an educational basis, Miller said they would like to work together with an organization, such as the Small Business Development Center, to provide training for area business people. They may also draw on Miller's expertise in teaching in the retail profession on production preparation and the art of selling, which informs owners and managers on how to present merchandise and how to understand people and their buying habits.

The group recently hosted a technical service consultant from the National Main Street Center who reviewed the group's progress and questioned what its role is for the future. As board direc-

tors continue to answer that question they will be standing by the new slogan, "MainStreet, a Sense of Community and a Place of Public Celebration."

"Our role can be as big as we want to make it. Our job is to provide the chamber (of commerce) with something to promote and the EDC (Economic Development Corporation) with something to sell," he said.




STREET INTERSECTION ELEVATIONS







The Ruidoso Sertoma Club is small in numbers, but large in its efforts to assist citizens of Lincoln County.

Through the Charity Bingo Project, Ruidoso Sertoma can assist many charitable organizations and even individuals needing specific help.

The brightly lighted and comfortable Sertoma Bingo Hall is conveniently located at 2160 Highway 70 East in Ruidoso Downs. It's easy to find and there's plenty free parking.

Under the leadership of Robert Battin, Roy Seay and A. D. Powers, the Sertoma Club and its Bingo operation have progressed from an idea into a reality.

Walter Merchant, a Sertoma member, is the game manager of the Bingo operation with high ideals of making the Sertoma Bingo Hall a home away from home for citizens of Lincoln county and visitors who come to Ruidoso.

New computerized equipment, six new monitors, new tables and chairs and non-smoking room, combined with the latest in associated supplies, were added last year to make the Sertoma Bingo Hall a pleasant experience for all.

Ruidoso Sertoma received a gambling license from the state on June 24, 1991, and initiated the Hall which is an exact duplicate of all other Sertoma Bingo Halls in New Mexico. Sertoma has 10 employees with a payroll of \$4,500 a month which equates to a \$36,000 a month impact on the local economy.

Organizing and operating a Bingo Hall doesn't just happen, and the many hours of hard work donated by Sertoma members is for one purpose — Service To Mankind — the Sertoma Club motto made real through its members.

Sertoma was founded April 11, 1912, in St. Louis, Missouri. Its founders were

medical doctors concerned about the welfare of patients with speech and hearing difficulties. Even today, speech and hearing is the major charitable project of Sertoma clubs, with the Ruidoso club regularly helping people who need hearing aids, speech therapy and such.

Ruidoso Sertoma, chartered in 1979, regularly screens pre-school children and regular students every year through the schools, using a commercial van equipped with soundproof hearing test equipment.

Ruidoso Sertoma Club was the founder of Little League basketball and Lincoln County Youth Soccer. Other local projects include donations to Meal-Care, Home Health Services, scholarships and school and youth activities.

Since opening Sertoma Bingo last year, the club has been able to help many people, including a ferrier who was hurt and needed help getting started in another vocation. The club, using funds raised through charity Bingo, gave him money to help him train as a speech therapist. He intends to practice in Ruidoso.

The club also has provided a closed caption machine on a television for a girl who is deaf.

It takes money to provide the kind of Service To Mankind which Ruidoso Sertomans are dedicated to giving. That's where the Sertoma Bingo Hall fits in.

Officers of this year's Sertoma Club have continued this commitment for a long time. This year's officers are all charter members with at least five years membership in the club.

Ruidoso Hondo Valley Park Cemetery



Ruidoso Hondo Valley Memorial Park Cemetery is an endowment care cemetery, owned and operated by Stormy Edwards.

Knowing that someone will be there in the years to come to take care of a family burial plot can relieve the stress on those family members responsible for the care, says Edwards, who is proud to own and operate one of fewer than 20 in the state. It's the only such facility in Lincoln County.

Edwards said that a large portion of the cost of each plot and all gifts and contributions go into a trust of perpetuity from which these investments are made. This special fund assures the family that years into the future the family plot will still be cared for.

"No longer is it necessary for family or friends to pay \$50 to \$100 a year for upkeep of their loved one's gravesites or to try to find the time to do it themselves," said Edwards.

"And no longer is it necessary to worry about the appearances of nearby sites or the grounds," he said.

Edwards said people can be certain of a permanent memorial cemetery, dedicated to preserving and enhancing the beauty and serenity of the countryside.

The memorial park, located just a few miles east of Ruidoso on U.S. Highway 70 on the Ruidoso River, is avail-

able to serve you or your family members.

He said the memorial park is designed to accommodate the needs of Lincoln County residents for years to come. Plots for individuals, families, infants and urn memorial are also available.

"The beauty of the cemetery is ensured by regular maintenance and care of the lawn and plantings, watered by a new sprinkler system and protected by secure water rights. A flower placement service is offered for those

who wish an expression of remembrance on special days," said Edwards.

Edwards has engaged Tim Rich as sales manager to help your family through a difficult time or to assist you in prearrangement details.





Although the kitchen isn't in place yet, Michelena has been able to help civic center users find ways around that by bringing in caterers from local restaurants for various parties and meetings.



Rhoten intends to continue combining entertainment with shopping (a concept she brought to the village), by presenting live bands, Indian dancers, modeling and other special events as

she has in the past.

But, she is expanding that tradition. Inspired by her three lovely gazebos, she's inviting people to plan weddings, receptions and parties at the Gazebo. One couple already chose the Gazebo for their wedding, shoveling the snow off the top Gazebo to have the beautiful Sierra Blanca as a backdrop.

"The shops at The Gazebo are each unique, providing merchandise and service you can't find anywhere else."



The Ruidoso News

A walk through the pages of *The Ruidoso News* is like a trip down memory lane.

This community newspaper is still proud to present a living and evolving history of Ruidoso and the surrounding area. It's the one complete source for community and county news.

It was on May 17, 1946, that the brand new weekly first hit the stands in the little village of Ruidoso.

It was a bargain, even then.

In 1946, Cokes were just a nickel and so was a single copy of *The Ruidoso News*. A year's subscription was \$2.50, the same price as a pair of khaki pants at the Tony Lama General Store.

That price was just between the cost of a lunch or dinner at the Noisy Water Lodge where a complete luncheon was \$2 and dinner cost \$3 to \$3.50.

Those may have been the good old days, with Stetsons for 10 bucks and boots less than \$20, but salaries were proportionately low. The village attorney made \$50 in August 1946, and the village clerk, garbage collector and its one police officer were paid \$175 each that month.

It was in 1946 that the Village of Ruidoso got into the garbage business, taking on collections for the village. That step was taken with great pride.

And, in 1992, with just as much pride, the Village of Ruidoso got out of the garbage business, selling off its collection system to the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

Lloyd P. Bloodworth was owner and publisher of the brand new community newspaper. Bloodworth and the owners and publishers who have followed him all have shared a commitment to local news. That's the hallmark of *The Ruidoso News*, where readers turn to find out what's happening in their town and to their neighbors.

That commitment remains the same today. *The Ruidoso News* is still a community paper in the finest tradition, covering area events and writing about people who live and work here — one-of-a-kind news that you don't read in the regional papers.

For years *The News* was a family-

owned and operated paper, but when it joined the corporate world in November 1988, the new owners made a commitment to continue the long-term history of providing Lincoln County residents with local news. The newspaper has always been a forum for diverse views.

Ken and Walt Green sold their small chain of newspapers to Jack Kent Cooke as part of his new chain, Raljon Publishing, Cooke, owner of Cooke Media Group, also owns the Los Angeles Daily News, a 170,000 circulation daily, and the Washington Redskins. He had already purchased the Steamboat Pilot, a Raljon paper.

The Greens had purchased *The Ruidoso News* on October 13, 1975, from Al and Glo Lane. Their father, James Green, already owned and operated the Artesia Daily Press. They were a newspaper family whose members provided progressive leadership for their growing chain of papers.

In 1981, Walt Green became publisher of the Deming Headlight, a newspaper of the Green family had an interest in, and in 1982 Ken, Walt and Keith Green (Keith isn't related to Ken, Walt and James) purchased the Socorro Defensor Chieftain. The Greens purchased the Valencia County News Bulletin in April 1988, and Raljon acquired the entire group later that year.

Change and growth have been the norm for this newspaper, just as they have been for this tourist town.

Editors have come and gone, with many Ruidoso residents remembering editor Cale Dickey's caustic columns about village government.

Tim Palmer and Darrell Pehr followed Dickey, both covering the village beat before taking the reigns as editor. Al Stubbs, already retired from several New Mexico newspapers, was editor for a few months in 1988.

Publisher Green named Frankie Jarrell editor on Friday, February 10, 1989, and she has led the paper through a period that has included growing circulation numbers and the addition of a weekly publication, *The Reporter*.

Sammy Lopez was named publisher in November 29, 1989, and was later

appointed regional manager of the Raljon group. Lopez, who makes his home in Ruidoso, also is publisher of the Deming Headlight.

Lopez named Jarrell general manager in November 1991, and the newspaper reorganized its entire office, adding a full-time artist to serve advertising customers with ideas and graphics.

Community news is a top priority for Lopez, too, who started his career at the Valencia County News in his hometown of Belen. He went on to work for the Taos newspaper and owned and operated a newspaper in Fort Sumner for several years.

Besides publishing *The News* each Monday and Thursday, and *The County Reporter* on Wednesday, *The News* has the contract to publish the Holloman Air Force Base Sunburst.

The News prints several other publications, including the Ruidoso High School Totem Post and Eastern New Mexico University at Ruidoso's schedule of classes.

Over the years, *The Ruidoso News* and its staff members have been consistent winners in the New Mexico Press Association's annual contests. Last year was no exception, and the winning tradition continues.

The News provides employment for 28 people, not counting the crew of young people who hit the streets to hawk newspapers each summer.

The Ruidoso News and its employees are proud to be a part of the progress of Ruidoso and Lincoln County.

The News has always been a big booster of Ruidoso and the tourist industry. Two major projects each year are the winter and summer visitors guide, each with circulations of around 50,000.

This winter and this summer, 10,000 copies of each season's visitors guide were inserted in a Spanish language newspaper in Mexico. After those insertions, this town recorded record numbers of visitors from South of the Border.

With circulation that varies a bit according to the season, *The Ruidoso News* distributes as many as 6,000

copies on busy weekends during the summer. Mail subscribers number more than 2,000, many of them Texans who just can't get enough of this land of enchantment.

The News is involved in the community, and supports charitable organizations in a variety of ways including a special section the last two years on Literacy, co-sponsoring with MainStreet Ruidoso the Community Update and sponsoring, with the Hubbard Foundation, a three-month Newspapers in Education project.

School classes and scouts visit *The News* for tours, and members of the staff visit the schools to cover events and to speak to classes.

Throughout the year *The News* publishes a series of special sections that includes a tax supplement, Easter on Parade, an opening edition to commemorate the horse racing season, the Ruidoso Art Festival section, All American Festival tabloid, Aspenfest tab and holiday gift guides to name just a few.

The newest project on the horizon at *The News* is a "Paint the Town Gold" project, co-sponsored by United New Mexico Bank.

In an effort to extend the golden foliage of aspen trees throughout the village, *The News* and United New Mexico Bank are offering aspen trees for sale at below wholesale costs.

Area residents will be able to order aspen trees at 10 for \$5.

The Ruidoso News continues to present all the news as its mission to inform the community.

To make the most of the present, one has to look to the future and remember the past. A lot of that past is chronicled in *The News*. If you like memories, you'll love retracing history through the pages of *The Ruidoso News*.

All the old editions are available on microfilm at the Ruidoso Public Library. Stop in and view 46 years of history; remember the past while you plan for the future.

That's what this progress edition is all about.
