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"We still don't have definite costs. So how can we make a decision?" Shaw asked.

Wicker said he didn't go out and get official prices, that he relied more on what Porter provided.

"I don't feel comfortable with the labor-equipment costs," he said.

Wicker said he didn't think the tie-on to Carrizo Lodge would be any problem as far as water was concerned. He said the work load of his crews would be impacted.

He said he presented the council with a work plan that outlined projects to be accomplished for the rest of the year.

"If we commit to this, the council has to realize adjustments in that whole process," Wicker said. He said to install the water line would mean other projects, previously approved by the council, would have to be rescheduled.

James asked Vie if 100 percent of the homeowners had been contacted and approved of the annexation.

Vie said he had sent letters. He said homeowners that responded were most favorable of the water line installation. He said water was the top concern with the homeowners contacted.

"To answer your question, Mr. James, I do not have in writing, 100 percent," Vie said.

Vie said the homeowners association has 28 of the 93 condo units.

The rest are owned by C-Net or Pioneer Savings," Vie said.

Wicker said when the committee to negotiate with Porter was formed, a councilor was supposed to be appointed to that committee. Apparently, Mayor Victor Alonso did not make that appointment.

"Hopefully, in the future, if we get back into this posture, someone from the council will volunteer to meet with us," Wicker said. He said he thought Porter or someone from Carrizo Lodge should ask for another meeting.

To annex Carrizo Lodge into the village, Wicker said Carrizo Lodge owners would apply by petition for their property. He said the private property along Carrizo Road to the Lodge would be annexed by the village through another method requiring public hearings.

Planner Cleatus Richards said that method would be by a municipal boundary commission.

The municipal boundary commission consists of three members appointed by the governor. Each member is a resident of a separate county of New Mexico. One member shall be a practicing attorney and no more than two of the members shall be of the same political party.

The municipal boundary commission shall publish a notice, of a public hearing, once each week for four consecutive weeks.

Last year the squad picked up fourth place and one award for excellence.



Lawyers exchange opinions during unscheduled hearing

A lengthy and vigorous debate left two attorneys redfaced Tuesday, when it was discovered the village council agenda item argued, had not yet been legally scheduled.

For over an hour, State Representative H. John Underwood (D-Ruidoso), acting as attorney for developer Jeffrey Smith, bantered with village attorney Patricia Ortiz who was defending a planning and zoning commission action.

Smith was asking the council to overturn a planning commission denial for a zoning change from commercial, C-2, to multifamily, R-3, in order to obtain financing to build apartment houses in Ruidoso. Smith has built other successful apartment houses in the area.

Members of the planning commission denied Smith's request for a zoning change at their last meeting. Their position was that the four-acre piece of property in question, just off U.S. Highway 70 near Miner's Mountain Castle (the old Camelot theater), is one of the few flat prime pieces of commercial property left in the village.

Planning director Cleatus Richards told the council that the planning commission is required to uphold the land use master plan and that the master plan designates that property for community business development.

Smith could have applied for a

conditional use to bypass the C-2 zoning at the time, but Underwood said that Smith's financier, Housing and Urban Development (HUD), would not make the loan under C-2 zoning.

Underwood appealed to the village council to use common sense, assess the financial impact to the community and overturn the planning commission's decision to allow Smith to build the apartments.

Underwood said that Smith was ready to build 40 units at the cost of about \$1.5 million dollars. He said that Smith had a waiting list for renters. He said the property had not sold in six years, and that most of the surrounding property was residential.

Village attorney Ortiz said the planning commission had not erred in its deliberations, and therefore the council should not hear arguments other than mistakes made by the commission. She said the intent to stay within the Master Plan and keep the area open for a commercial venture was appropriate.

Underwood said that a master plan was to be used as a guide and not carved in stone.

After much discussion, it was learned that the appeal had not been officially scheduled and advertised.

The attorneys, better versed on each other's arguments, will butt heads again at the public hearing scheduled for April 27.

The council heard complaints from Ken Hosmer who lives near a small village park just up the road from Two Rivers Park.

Hosmer said he has repeatedly called for police help in curtailing late night drinking and parties at the park. He said the police have been of little help and that to his knowledge, no citations had ever been issued.

Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor acknowledged that the park and many other places throughout the village are problem areas that a thin police force could not adequately patrol.

On the recommendation of Swenor, the parking area will be blocked in a manner that automobiles will be unable to drive on the park grounds.

Swenor said he is hopeful the new budget will help with his enforcement by adding several officers to the department.

Former Ruidoso Mayor Dan Swearingin reiterated the Sign Ordinance Review Committee's prior position that if the council is not serious about enforcement of the ordinance, it should do away with it.

"There's no sense of the sign committee and the council putting in their time with a sign ordinance that you're not going to enforce," Swearingin said.

In other action, the council: —approved unanimously a transfer of ownership of a dis-

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at least 40 percent of the amount needed.

Tuesday, it was clear the council had dis-entertained the thought, except for septic tank owners with available village sewer lines to their homes.

Shaw said it may be illegal to charge people for services not available.

Frank Cuzmins said it was just a proposal by Molzen Corbin, showing the village a method of financing. He said he agreed with James, but if a service is accessible, he thought those residents should be charged a fee.

Andrews suggested that dumping fees should be looked at because of the high concentration and difficulty on the sewer system.

Wastewater experts have said septic tank pumpage is extremely concentrated and that most sewer treatment plants, unless they're large, will charge a good-sized fee to pumpers because it can destabilize the sewer treatment process.

Andrews said availability fees are everywhere, but questioned the ethics of charging a fee for a service not available.

He amended James' motion by adding, "We should review very closely the costs associated with this dumped sewage by the commercial pumpers."

Councilor James said he wanted Molzen-Corbin to be aware of the village's position on septic tank impact fees so the consulting firm would not factor in those costs as a consideration in the overall sewer system renovation.

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with the attorney general's staff and have been open and forthright with the lawyers in his office.

"Frankly, I was confident that once the attorney general (AG) knew the facts of the case (involving a client who pled guilty to driving while under the influence of alcohol), he would understand there was nothing improper about the conduct giving rise to his questions.

However, I was told on Thursday, March 25, that the AG's office would charge me with felony charges that might include bribery and/or solicitation."

In his statement, Hoggard denied any wrongdoing and said he was shocked when he found out District Attorney Bert Atkins and Udall were investigating a local DUI (driving under the influence of alcohol) case.

The investigators "were accusing me of bribery and other criminal acts for my actions and claiming I had in some way worked with attorney John Underwood to commit a criminal act," the chief said.

"That is the furthest thing from the truth and the facts."

Hoggard said when he spoke to investigators, it appeared they "tried to misinterpret the facts and attempted to make me reach certain conclusions. It certainly appeared to me that they were trying to figure out some way to make a criminal case against Mr. Underwood. Since February 17, I have lived under this cloud and it has caused me great anguish. I am not a secretive person and due to my position, feel that the public should know what is going on."

Udall was out of his office Wednesday, but his public information officer Kay Roybal read the following statement:

"It is the policy of the AG's office not to confirm or deny an investigation. However, since Representative Underwood has brought the situation to the attention of the media, we will confirm the existence of an open investigation."

Underwood and Hoggard said they will be represented by Ruidoso attorney Gary Mitchell, who is in the middle of a trial and could not be reached for comment. During the press conference, University of New Mexico law professor Robert Desiderio, who served as counsel to the Governmental Ethics Task Force that Underwood co-chaired, stood at the legislator's side. He said he would be one of Underwood's attorneys.

Underwood said the charges stem from his handling of a DUI case last year.

He was hired December 22, 1992, by a John R. Fraire, 58, who had pled guilty to driving while intoxicated and was in jeopardy of losing his driving license because he failed to properly blow into a breathalyzer.

"During our meeting, my client explained that his driving record was spotless. He never even had a parking ticket," Underwood said. A handyman and janitor, Fraire had been called out on a job the evening of December 17 and had some wine with a customer while working, according to the Ruidoso Downs police report filed by arresting officer Ray Montes.

After a reported three glasses of wine, the customer contended she had difficulty getting Fraire to leave. She called her husband, who contacted the police. Montes wrote in his report. As the police arrived, they observed Fraire's car weaving down the road and stopped him.

"My client was unable to blow into the breathalyzer machine and

was accused of violating the Implied Consent Act," Underwood said. "My client maintains that he was simply too upset and nervous to take the test."

The offense report stated Fraire twice unsuccessfully attempted the test and then refused to try a third time.

"It immediately appeared to me that my client was an honest man who had made an honest mistake," Underwood said. "By the time he hired me, he had pled guilty to driving while intoxicated and had been fined and ordered to pay court costs of more than \$180.

"My client explained that if he lost his driving license, he would be unable to keep his job."

Underwood decided his client should "resist" the revocation of his license at an administration hearing by the Motor Vehicle Division (MVD).

In early February after the State Legislature was in session, Underwood received a notice that Fraire's hearing would be conducted on February 19. He asked his law office partner, attorney Mike Line, to handle the case because he couldn't get away from Santa Fe. However, on the day before the hearing, Underwood said he called Hoggard to see if he could persuade him "as prosecutor in the administrative hearing" to drop the case.

"This is a common practice, especially in cases in which the driver has pled guilty," Underwood said.

Underwood was adamant that he identified himself to Hoggard as acting in the capacity of an attorney. The chief did not agree that the case should be dropped, he said.

However, the arresting officer didn't show up for the administrative hearing. Line offered to set a

new date, Underwood said, "but the hearing officer declined and dismissed the administrative case against my client."

Underwood said he learned about the AG's investigation on February 19.

"The allegation was that I had persuaded the police chief to persuade the police officer to skip the hearing because I was sponsoring legislation authorizing money for a new city hall," Underwood said. "The allegation is laughable, nonsensical and groundless."

"I have supplied the AG's office with affidavits from defense attorneys, prosecutors and hearing officers supporting my position that I did nothing more than vigorously represent a client."

"I believe I have properly balanced the requirements and duties of being a citizen legislator. I will continue to represent my clients without misusing my public office and I will continue to represent my constituents without trading their needs for those of my clients."

Hoggard said since the investigation began "they have kept my family and me in constant turmoil.... They have not made the allegations public and have been attempting to get me to plea to a criminal charge."

When Fraire appeared in municipal court, the judge noted the "tragic circumstances of the case" and conferred with Hoggard. The chief said he looked into the man's background and family situation and learned that Fraire's job required that he be able to drive. His wife was not a good driver and the man was too old to walk far, he said.

"We assisted in helping him send the proper letter requesting a hearing on his driver's license,"

Hoggard said.

When Underwood called him, it was to find out if someone from the police department would be at the MVD hearing, Hoggard said.

"Mr. Underwood did not make any accusations, nor threats, nor promises," he said. "He was extremely polite, kind and considerate."

After thinking about the case that evening, Hoggard said he contacted Montes.

"He did not have any opposition (to not showing up for the case) and in fact, felt some of the same compassion for the gentleman," Hoggard said. "The officer had a conflict with the hearing (radar school). I suggested... that attendance at the radar school was a priority, but that the final decision was his."

"No one from the department attended the hearing and Fraire retained his license."

"We, as law enforcement officers, had acted to protect all our citizens and had acted with compassion," Hoggard said. "I did not think in any way that we were doing anything wrong and certainly never felt and do not feel to this day that we did anything criminally wrong."

"If the AG's office and/or the district attorney's office feel that I have done something wrong, I respectfully request that they proceed with prosecution so I may be judged by the people and not be manipulated," Hoggard said.

Officer Montes could not be reached for comment.

Ruidoso Downs Mayor Joe Hayhurst said the chief notified him and the board of trustees about the investigation the first day Hoggard was contacted by the AG's office. He agreed with Hoggard's characterization that the board supports his position 100 percent.

Kent Sparks finished in second place in the 1600 meter run in a time of 5:35.74. Bryan Moore took

sixth place in the 100 meter dash in a time of 12.92 seconds. He also earned fifth place in the 400 meter dash in a time of 1:06.34.

Tommy Richardson had a throw of 94 feet 2 1/2 inches in the discus to earn sixth place. Guadalupe Garcia was fifth in the pole vault at seven feet.

The 800 meter relay team of Cruz, Rojas, Moore and Craig Baldrige took third place in the event at 1:50.66.

In the girls division, Jenny Ritter earned fifth place in the long jump with a leap of 13 feet, 11 inches. She also came in sixth in the 100 meter dash in a time of 14.74 seconds.

Ritter, along with Cindy Scott, Shbryn Williams and Amy Coble, finished the 400 meter relay in 1:00.15 for sixth place.

Scott, Ritter, Williams and Somer Paxton teamed up to complete the 800 meter relay in fifth place in a time of 2:26.32.

The Braves will compete in Capitan Saturday before hosting one here on April 8.

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Future Farmers chapter competes statewide

Future Farmers of America chapters at Ruidoso High School and Ruidoso Middle School were officially chartered on Wednesday night, February 24.

The chapter, the newest in New Mexico, is also the second largest in the state with 155 members.

Presenting the charter was state FFA president, Shelly Vaughn of Las Cruces.

The agriculture education program and the Ruidoso FFA were added in the Ruidoso schools last year when the district received a \$55,000 Federal Perkins Grant.

Mike Gaines and Shawn Dennis were hired to serve as teachers and FFA advisers in the program. Sixty-one members joined the FFA last year.

This year the district received an additional \$48,000 to extend the program into the high school.

More than 215 different students are enrolled in agriculture education classes at RHS and RMS.

In addition to the charter ceremony, 155 members received the FFA Greenhand Degree. This degree is the first of four levels of membership which a member can attain. The requirements for this degree are based upon a student's participation in an agriculture class.

The FFA Creed is a five paragraph explanation about the ideals of agricultural life and recognizes the sacrifices made by those who came before.

The guest speaker for the evening was Dr. Leon Wagley, professor emeritus in the Agriculture Education Department at New Mexico State University.

Dr. Wagley challenged the students to continue to learn more about agriculture careers and develop strong communications skills.

He also challenged parents to fight for education funding in our schools to help provide the best education possible.

He commended the school board and administration for their insight in providing this program to the students in the Ruidoso school system.

Officers were also installed during the ceremonies Wednesday night.

High school FFA officers are John Crawford, president; Jolene McGee, vice president; Teri Hall, secretary; Corrina Reed, reporter; Betty Hobbs, treasurer; Jeremy Heavington, sentinel; Mike Gaines, adviser.

Middle school FFA officers are Billy Rogge, president; Reynaldo Lopez, vice president; Jazmin Fleharty, secretary; Megan Garrison, reporter; Raquel Reiman, treasurer; Brian Phillips, sentinel.

Twenty-five Ruidoso FFA members participated in the FFA judging contest in Socorro Saturday, February 27.

The students entered competition in four areas, including horse judging, land judging, agriculture mechanics judging and wildlife judging.

The agriculture mechanics team consisted of Steve Minner, Jeremy Turner, John Crawford, Jeremy Heavington and Shane Melton placed first.

Steve Minner received the second highest score overall in the contest with 528 points out of a possible 600.

The agriculture mechanics contest consists of three separate skill areas: a tool use and identification section, a 20-station problem solving exercise and a 25-question written exam. The skill areas include arc welding, electrode selection,

machine adjustment, set up, safety and performing a variety of welds in the downhand, horizontal and vertical position.

This was the first competition for this season.

The Ruidoso High School and middle school Future Farmers of America members traveled to Roswell Friday and Saturday to compete in the District V FFA Judging Contest.

After 15 hours of hard work on each day the results were tabulated and several Ruidoso teams came out in great shape.

The Meats Evaluation Team placed second overall with the skills of team members John Crawford, Heath Battles, Corrina Reed and Luke Koerner. The middle school meats team placed seventh with members Dusty Silva, Darcy Hibner, Megan Garrison, Lawrence Dominguez and Clarissa Campbell.

The meats contest consists of meat cut identification, quality grading, yield grading, carcass pricing, placing classes, written test, formulation problem and questions. It is designed to give students a well-rounded look at the meat industry.

The Wildlife Judging team placed third overall. Jolene McGee, Joe Brooks, Jeremy Heavington, Chris Carusona and Mike Galarito worked together on that team. The wildlife contest consists of wildlife species identification, written test and a practicum. The practicum features various specimens from New Mexico wildlife including things like antlers, skulls, furs, wings, feet, traps and teeth.

The Agriculture Mechanics team of John Crawford, Jeremy Turner, Shane Melton and Steve Minner, placed third overall. Two middle school members, Kevin Hoyt and

Chase Hampton, judged as alternates on this week's team. The agriculture mechanics contest consists of tool use and identification, electric motors and motor control wiring, welding, small gasoline engines, written test and a 20-station problem solving exercise.

The Farm Management team placed fourth overall. Team members are Teri Hall, Colelinda Stokes and Shane Melton. Farm management features a 50-question test that is derived from a 550-question bank of agriculture economic problems. Students must learn formulas and be able to solve each of the problems. The second part of the contest requires students to complete budget sheets, compute depreciation, determine interest rates and make future marketing decisions.

The middle school Horse Judging team earned fourth overall. Team members are Dan Roller, Reynaldo Lopez, Jazmin Fleharty, Dominique Rue and Brian Campbell. The high school did not field a team this week because of a schedule conflict. The horse judging contest consists of placing classes of halter and performance horses and oral reasons from the members as to why they placed them in that particular order.

All the team members are now headed to the state FFA judging contests this week in Las Cruces. In addition to these contest areas the high school FFA members have put together a team in the new agrimarketing contest. It requires a team to create a business for the purpose of marketing agriculture products. Students must do a feasibility study and determine a market for their product.

In a campaign designed to give real meaning to the name, Aspenfest, and turn the town golden during the annual fall celebration, the newspaper in conjunction with United New Mexico Bank will be offering 10 aspen seedlings for \$5.

The trees will be between about 10 inches high and will arrive in containers.

Greg Fancher of Plant Propagation Technology in Las Cruces, advised home owners to look at the overall layout of their property and design a placement plan before digging. It will save a lot of energy. Envision the seedlings as mature trees.

If the trees are to be used to define a boundary or as a wind-break, two rows would work the best, although aspen are not particular good for breaking up wind, Fancher said.

"The trees in the first row should be between 10-12 inches apart and then there should be about eight feet between the first and second row," he said.

ing on the weather. **DO NOT** let the top two inches of the soil dry out. Using mulch (wood chips) on the surface of the soil around the seedling will reduce evaporation and enhance establishment.

6. **DO NOT** forget to water the seedlings during the fall and winter months, especially during the first two years after planting.

7. **DO NOT** use fertilizers or herbicides around the trees during the first two years.

"The trees in the second row should have the same 10-12 inches between, but in a pattern where they fill in the spaces in the first row, sort of an overall zigzag look."

He offers these planting tips:

1. Dig a hole eight inches deep and six inches in diameter.

2. Loosen the soil removed from the planting hole and separate any sod, rock or sticks from the soil.

3. Plant the tree no deeper than the top of the root plug.

4. Pack the soil firmly around the root plug, making sure there are no air pockets around the roots. **DO NOT** tamp with a bar or stomp the soil with your foot.

5. Water the seedling once every two or three days depend-

State reclassification plan leaves RHS at AAA

The athletic programs of both Ruidoso and Capitan school districts will benefit from changes approved last week by members of the New Mexico Activities Association.

Athletic directors and coaches from the state's 133 schools resoundingly defeated a proposal, 77-35, to enlarge the number of competition classes from four to five.

If the measure had passed, 20 percent of the schools would have been placed in each classification, 5A, 4A, 3A, 2A and 1A.

Heaviest support for enlarging the number of classes was generated by 3A schools, some of which have significantly smaller enrollments than others in the same class.

Coaches have complained that sitting on the bottom of the enrollment list made it nearly impossible to be competitive with schools at the upper end that had twice as many students.

Ruidoso with 568 students is at the low end of 3A, which ranges from an enrollment of 401 to 1,200.

Ruidoso football coach Mike Gaston said the defeat of the proposal will keep Ruidoso in the same 3A district as Oñate and Deming for the next year. Santa Teresa also will be coming into that district with Cobre, Silver City and Socorro.

If five classes had been approved, Ruidoso would have been thrown in with Lovington and Artesia.

"Maybe this is better for us," Gaston said.

Referring to a recent suggestion by one coach and some parents that Ruidoso should go independent to give students a better chance at winning, to build their spirits and foster a more positive attitude, Gaston said, "As far as I'm concerned, our kids are going to start competing and we will never be independent."

"We'll play to win and for a championship."

"Ruidoso is one of six teams to win a state championship in football. It has one of the best records in the state."

"I'm real happy with our kids. I

want them to know I believe in them. We've had a couple of lean years, but every school goes through cycles. I'm not going to have them playing to win and not be able to be champions."

A measure that will allow Capitan to stay 1A in football, but move all other sports into the 2A category should give a big boost to its high school football program, said principal Darrel Stierwalt.

The provision increased the enrollment figure in football single A competition from 150 students to 200 students.

"That gives us a reprieve for a couple of years and will allow us to build our program," he said. "We will be double A for everything else and I feel at this point, that's OK. We feel we can hold our own in 2A for the rest of the sports. Football is the one area that has been hurting. When enrollment gets to 200, we'll be kicked into 2A."

Capitan's regular student enrollment this year is 150, but six special education students pushed that figure to 156, six students over the limit for 1A.

The association's members also

voted overwhelmingly to move the official enrollment count year to the second year of a four-year time block, shortening the period by one year.

Gaston said that proposal was necessary because of situations like Oñate.

"Four years ago when they were counted, they were just under 1,200. (The 3A enrollment limit is from 401 to 1,200.) Then the second year, they went well over 1,200," he said. "They wound up three years in 3A with a high enrollment. If this rule had been in effect, they would have been pushed into 4A."

Gaston said other new regulations approved included that schools wanting to move up a class in one sport, would have to move up in all sports; and that a school that goes independent must stay in that classification at least two years.

Under the present four classes, schools with 150 students or less compete in Class A; with 151 to 400 in 2A; with 401 to 1,200 in 3A and with 1,201 and above in 4A.

Governor signs mandatory spay and neutering bill into state law

Last week, Governor Bruce King signed into law a mandatory spay and neuter requirement for all animals adopted or reclaimed from shelters across New Mexico.

The action is a significant step toward controlling the population of unwanted pets. Sponsored by State Senator Ann Riley (D-Bernalillo), the legislation is an attempt to reduce the number of animals killed each year because of owners who fail or refuse to sterilize their pets.

Present at the signing ceremony with King and Riley were the senator's legislative aides and Shirley Hendrixson, with the Animal Humane Association of Albuquerque, who originally proposed the law to Riley and State Representatives Max Coll (D-Santa Fe) and John Underwood (D-Ruidoso).

"I brought my Boston terrier, Bobby, with me to watch it become law," Hendrixson said.

By the time the bill had worked its way through the House side of the Legislature, a provision inserted on the Senate side had been

removed. The provision would have watered down the law by allowing shelter managers to make exceptions.

"They took out the part that gave shelter managers some latitude in applying the provision and it passed 53-1," Hendrixson said. "All reclaims and adopted animals must be sterilized. It's state law and carries all of the penalties and fines."

"The great part about it is that we had nothing to do with the removal of the provision. The representatives saw the need on their own."

Ruidoso is ahead of the state already. Village councilors last year passed a mandatory spay and neuter ordinance for all dogs and cats over the age of six months. However, enforcement since it was implemented in April has been confined primarily to animals picked up running loose by animal control or who end up in the shelter by other routes. Owners also can purchase breeder's permits and pay more for their pets' annual licenses, if they choose not to sterilize them.

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The Ruidoso-Lincoln County Crime Stoppers will pay up to \$1,000 for information that leads to the arrest and Grand Jury indictment or Magistrate Court Bindover of the person or persons who committed this crime or any other unsolved felony crime in Lincoln County.

In search of good news

News reports are only as good as the sources. And, the toughest sources seem to be the ones who should be the very easiest.

For instance, two talented young women from Ruidoso High School were named to all-district in basketball this year. Cicelée Makowski and Sarah Dix were honored at the state level for this talent and performance as members of the Ruidoso Warriors. Sophomore Raul Davis earned honorable mention for all-district. Good news? You bet! It's too bad the local coaches didn't think it was important enough to tell the community newspaper. Those coaches are this newspaper's only source for that good news, and if they don't tell us, we have no way of knowing.

A diligent reporter happened to read of other schools' honorees and kept digging and asking (she finally called the district representative at Oñate) until she found out those names. This is not an isolated incident, but it's a good example of a serious problem in gathering school and sports news. Sure, reporters have a job to do in covering their beats, but there's absolutely no way to know about all-district, DECA state wins and such without teachers' and coaches' help.

At a recent meeting of parents and others interested in the youth of this area, at least one man battered away at the newspaper for not reporting enough good news about young people. Questioned after the meeting, the man was complaining that the Ruidoso High School band wasn't photographed when it marched in the Aspentest parade last year. Well, that's just the way it goes when covering a parade, but his complaints brought home the fact that news reporters and the newspaper are blamed by parents and the community when school officials fail to provide information on school events.

On the other other hand, some coaches and sponsors go that extra mile all the time. Golf coach Kent Beatty writes up every golf tourney with every kids' name and score, and keeps the community well informed about the golf team. Cheerleader sponsor Rebecca Durham was so proud of her young people's second place win at state that she called *The News* as soon as they got home. It didn't take a lot of time, and it surely showed that she cared enough about her talented crew to make sure the whole town hears about their success.

There's not some secret tom-tom that sends out such news to newspapers — it's up to coaches and teachers to notify the media. Kent Beatty and Rebecca Durham are exceptions rather than the rule, but they could teach their colleagues a thing or two. We've tried having a student reporter, having a box for information to be left in at the high school. We pay a freelancer to be our eyes and ears at the mid-school, and she, too, has problems getting information.

Maybe some pressure from parents would remind coaches and teachers to notify *The News* of sports scores and stats, honors and awards and such. The community likes to read about young people who excel in academics and sports, and we like to write about them.

It shouldn't take an investigative reporter to keep up with school news.
