

Underwood denies charges; calls for review by his peers

Lincoln County's state representative may become the subject of the first legislative corruption investigation since he helped guide the passage of a new government ethics law last month.

Reacting to a written request from State Representative H. John Underwood, a House subcommittee may launch an investigation of allegations that Underwood used his political influence to push for dismissal of a client's driving license revocation case.

The 16-member Legislative Council is scheduled to meet today to adopt procedures outlining how to handle ethics issues when the legislature is not in session and to appoint an interim ethics committee.

Members also are expected to discuss whether to proceed with the Underwood request.

A Democrat and two-term legislator who had been testing the waters for a run at Congress, Underwood practices law in Ruidoso.

Last week, he denied that he vio-

lated any law by calling Ruidoso Downs police chief Will Hoggard to suggest his client, accused of driving under the influence, deserved a break and that the police officer involved should not attend the hearing.

The revocation action against the license was dismissed when the officer didn't appear at the administrative hearing. The Village of Ruidoso Downs subsequently received from the legislature

\$200,000 of a \$400,000 request for construction of a new village hall.

Underwood contends he did not use that allocation as leverage in trying to convince the police chief that the officer, Ray Montes, should not appear.

Montes could not be reached for comment Wednesday.

Underwood called a press conference last week to announce that he was under investigation by Attorney General Tom Udall, a Democrat. Underwood said he had been told he would be charged with felonies that may include bribery.

At that time, Underwood called for investigations by his peers, the legislature and the disciplinary board of the Bar Association.

House Speaker Raymond Sanchez (D-Albuquerque), co-chairman of the Legislative Council, told reporters Monday that he is not sure how he will respond to Underwood's request, because he hasn't seen anything to indicate the legislator has done something that warrants an investigation.

However, he said the request from Underwood is official and it

will be up to the Legislature to decide how to proceed.

Virginia Ferrara, chief disciplinary counsel for the State Supreme Court, said Tuesday that she is not permitted to comment on particular cases or even to confirm whether a case is under review.

"I can tell you that if criminal charges are pending, we usually

don't become involved until those are resolved, because of the danger

of prejudicing the outcome," she said.

Underwood has maintained that his actions were in line with those of most attorneys trying to help a client retain a driving license. The client already had pled guilty to a drunken driving charge and paid a fine. The only remaining issue was whether his license would be revoked. The man needed the license to hold onto his job, Underwood said.

On Monday, Underwood released affidavits from three lawyers who said they also have negotiated with police officers to persuade them not to appear at similar hearings or to withdraw their testimony in the cases. Both actions usually result in case dismissals.

Records of the Motor Vehicle Division show that officers fail to appear at about 20 percent of drunken driving-related license revocation hearings.

Local attorneys contacted by The Ruidoso News this week gave mixed opinions about the ethics of Underwood's approach.

Some said they would never sug-

gest an officer should not attend an administrative hearing. Others said that often, in the course of interviewing an officer while preparing a defense, they might discuss special circumstances and try to convince the officer the case should not be pursued.

Several said that to make a blatant request for an officer not to appear may be unethical, but certainly is not illegal.

city taxes," Councilor Karn said. "So I don't think we can count on \$17,000 from the rest of the canyon in property taxes right away."

Two Carrizo Canyon Road residents said they were anxious to be annexed into the village.

Rich Witherspoon said he would rather pay another \$150 in property taxes and be annexed than continue to pay \$400 a year for water softening equipment.

"My savings would cover my taxes," he said. "If you're going to run a water line, I want to be able to tap in and be part of the city. I don't want to pay double the rate (for water and sewer users on municipal lines outside of village limits)."

He said he already has hooked up to the sewer line and is paying \$12.60 a month, twice the in-village rate.

He said the area also lacks law enforcement protection.

Lou Day, who said she owns a business on Sudderth Drive and lives on Carrizo Canyon Road, said she has her own well, but believes the annexation will be good for the community.

She seemed worried that the village would try to undo the annexation after the busy summer season.

Wicker assured her that annexation is permanent.

"You're going to have better representation," Alonso said. "Now you don't know who should be solving

your problems."

As part of the annexation process, the village will need to show that it can deliver the necessary services, Karn said. The water line is part of the equation, but the city also needs to own the sewer line.

During a break in the meeting he negotiated Porter down to \$9,000 from a requested \$15,000 in utility bill credits in exchange for ownership of the sewer line.

Alonso earlier suggested \$10,000 as an option to researching the actual number of homes that already have connected to the line. Karn preferred \$5,000, but settled for the \$9,000 compromise.

"But C-Net has a time line that we can't meet," Andrews said. "If we go out for bids, we're not going to be starting until we're halfway through summer."

Councilor J.D. James was adamant that he only would support using a contractor.

"I've seen these so called temporary deals before," he said.

Karn asked whether additional staff could be added to Sanchez' department to handle the job. Andrews said they could stay on board over the summer and fix many other leaks. He figured the additional money needed for Sanchez' budget at \$34,000.

But Sanchez emphasized his crew is backed up with projects and cannot spare the time for the Carrizo. It would slow down other projects even if temporary workers were added, he said.

"If we go out for bids, it will be 45 days before we let a contract," Andrews said.

"The only way you could do it is let Porter handle everything," Sanchez said.

Porter came to the podium to make a statement, responding to a characterization of him in the newspaper as a developer.

He's been a home owner in Ruidoso for 25 years and in the export business for 30 years, Porter said.

"I am not a developer," he said. "I am only one of C-Net stockholders."

He read two letters from residents along Carrizo Canyon Road who favor annexation of the entire area. He said the idea originated at a meeting of the homeowners association by Rick Evans because of problems with water wells.

"I apologize to the council for any undue pressure I put on you," Porter said, apparently referring to the June 1 deadline he proposed for the water line installation.

"I made the first proposal last fall and another last spring," he said. "I'm not saying it couldn't be done in July, but I think it would be a problem having to shut off water."

"It's your decision, but if you plan to annex and wait, the price of pipe is going up each week and if you wait, it will be the city spending the money, not C-Net or Carrizo Lodge, except our pro-rata share."

"If there's any way that Richard

Sanchez can do it, you can do it at half the price. If it is not done in the time frame, you're looking at the city spending two to three times the money we're looking at now."

Last May 2, the homeowners initiated the proposal. He volunteered to contact the village last June to see what it could do, Porter said. A letter was sent to every homeowner on August 6 outlining what might be done. Some of those people may not remember receiving the letter, he said. Not one negative comment has been received about the proposal, he said.

"This is a homeowners request, not a developer who is trying to feather his own pockets," Porter said.

Alonso said one way of minimizing the impact at the lodge would be to start the installation project

there and move down the road toward the village.

"We wouldn't have the water, though," Porter said.

"You'd be running on your own water until they get everything ready and then they would just have to change over," Karn said.

Wicker suggested that as an alternative in the bid specifications, a June 30 deadline, giving the council a choice of paying more for a contractor to move faster.

"Are you willing to accept the risk of running into your busy season with this project?" Alonso asked Porter, who answered "Yes."

"If he is denied the appointment, then it is apparent to me that he plans on contesting (in the next election) whoever the governor appoints. His effectiveness right now as commissioner shouldn't be too much of a concern at this time, but if he is not appointed, then he has declared his position and candidacy, and district one (Spencer's commission district) should not be subject to two agendas for the rest of this year and all of next year."

"Even now, it may have influenced his decisions and votes on land issue and possibly could influence his decisions and votes on future land issues."

Commission Chairman Monroy Montes said Spencer would be a good choice for the state position.

"I hope he understands it's a long shot," Montes said. "I'd be more concerned about who the governor would appoint if he disappears from the commission. I know he can handle the job. He's a fair and honest man."

Spencer said if he is not appointed, he hasn't made up his mind to run for the office in 1994.

"I'm not prepared to commit to run until I see who the governor appointed instead and that person's philosophy," Spencer said. "If it's a good person, why should I try to push them out? I won't make that decision probably until late fall or even January."

EDCLC reschedules election of officers

If the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County has a quorum at its meeting tonight, it will likely vote on new officers to get the board going for the new year.

The meeting is scheduled to begin at 7 p.m. at the group's office in the Stroud Building. The election of officers was on the agenda for a March 25 meeting, which was postponed to today because it was not going to have a quorum. The group has not been able to meet consistently for the past year because of the missing directors, which has delayed major projects.

Other items on the agenda for the meeting are an update on the fundraising project, which will help the group get more funds from the private sector, the hotel search, a direct mail campaign and a relocation magazine.

Executive director Karen Kopp

has sent out letters to hotel corporations asking if they would be interested in placing a hotel in Ruidoso beside the Civic Events Center.

She and Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce executive director Joan Bailey have met with one representative and are continuing to search for other interested companies.

Kopp has also gotten information on a direct mail campaign to encourage particular types of businesses to relocate here. The group had decided a direct mailing could be less expensive than advertising in a large newspaper or magazine.

Directors will also need to take care of routine business of minutes from the past few meetings and financial statements for January and February.

be effective upon the department letting a contract to resurface and re-stripe," Basler wrote. "We have not specifically identified a funding source at this time, but would hope to do so within the next 18 months."

"At this time the department is requesting the council's concurrence in re-striping a portion of Sudderth, approximately 1200 feet in the vicinity of the Cattle Baron Restaurant providing a decelerating lane for West bound vehicles. This work would be accomplished by the district in conjunction with the new permitted restaurant access."

Village manager Ron Wicker said Tuesday this is the first step for re-striping from the "Y" to Carrizo Creek Road.

Wicker told councilors the Old Mill and Allen's Auto Supply have no off street parking.

Wicker said he was concerned that people will have a right to discuss this with the state. He said he heard of a comment by state officials that they "could do it anyway."

"That may be true, but we need to be sure we are involved in looking out for vehicular traffic, but also the people who have businesses along there," Wicker

said. Councilor Ron Andrews objected to the state's method of informing people of its action.

"Anytime a business starts to do anything on these streets, they require the business people to go to the expense of a traffic impact analysis with all new studies and hire engineers," Andrews said. "All of a sudden, we get this dropped in our lap cold, a five-lane highway all the way to U.S. 70, with dedicated turn lanes and ... no public hearings, no public input, nothing. There's something wrong with that."

Mayer Victor Alonso said he believes the state highway department has learned the will of Ruidoso residents has to be taken seriously.

"They might have the power and the authority, but we can make life uncomfortable for them," Alonso said. "I think they found that out with their proposal of the five lanes on Mechem."

Bailey said that state traffic engineers will come before the village council with a presentation during its meeting on April 27. The property owners are to be notified before that date so that they can attend the meeting. Alonso said public hearings would be set after that presentation.

ETZ considers proposal

A controversial proposal to rezone tracts of property along Paradise Canyon Road to allow mobile homes will be considered Monday by the Extraterritorial Zoning Commission.

The meeting will begin at 1 p.m. at the Lincoln County suboffice on Kansas Road off Cree Meadows Drive in Ruidoso.

County official Patsy Sanchez said the lots proposed for change primarily lie north and east of the

road. One row fronts the heavily-traveled artery.

"Lots of protests are coming into the office," Sanchez said.

The commission is composed of representatives from the Village of Ruidoso and the county. The commission recommends zoning action in a one-mile area around the village limits.

The commission's recommendations are passed to the Extraterritorial Zoning Authority.

said. Some people contacted me over 40 days ago to get involved. I was afraid it would overshadow the BLM negotiations (over a land swap in Lincoln County). But they kept calling me from around the state.

"I was asked and after I was asked, I was glad to do it."

Those supporters started a petition drive 10 days ago to convince the governor to pick Spencer.

"When the petitions went out around the state, I said, here we go," he said.

The county commissioner said he hopes the governor can look beyond partisan concerns and weigh character and qualifications. An engineer, Spencer has experience in the oil and gas industry as well as ranching and banking.

He has run a corporation dealing on an international market. He knows the histories and operations that drive the industries that use the land and could put in place long term programs of more benefit to the state, Spencer noted.

He also has viewed the office from the side of the permittee.

"I guess I've always been interested in becoming the state trust lands commissioner," he said. "My great grandfather was governor and I heard stories and I always wanted to be involved. My approach has been different, though. I

don't like the bureaucracy. I like to bring it back to the people."

John McKean, spokesman for the governor, said Spencer's name will be added to a long list of people who have expressed an interest in the position.

One of the front-runners for the job appears to be Ray Powell Jr., a consultant to the governor. Powell's father once ran for governor and is chairman of the state Democratic Party.

During his appearance in Roswell, Spencer said he would advocate a balanced approach to the use of state trust land, "recognizing the fragile nature of our environment and the fragile nature of our economy."

The lands managed by the commission generate money for public schools and other state institutions.

"Many competing interests are involved," Spencer said. "A balanced approach calls for fairness in fee administration to assure that competitive entrepreneurs remain viable and interested in keeping our state lands productive, thereby generating the money that is the resource needed to provide for the educational futures of our children."

Locally, Spencer is known for his financially conservative approach.

"I wish to assure the people that the administration costs of the office would be guarded and minimized and used for the greatest

benefit," he said.

If appointed, he would strive to educate residents about the office and its duties.

"It's not public land, it is land held in trust for designated beneficiaries," he pointed out.

He also would try to bring land users and protectors together.

Commission Reaction

Spencer was re-elected to a second term as county commissioner last November.

Lincoln County Commissioner L. Ray Nunley said that although he is a Democrat, he probably would support Spencer's bid for the position.

"He didn't talk to me about it in advance, but I think Stirling has the capacity to continue to serve well as a county commissioner while pursuing the post," Nunley said.

Commissioner Wilton Howell, who often finds himself on the opposite philosophical end of debates with Spencer, said he wished him luck on his bid.

Commissioner Bill Schwettmann said he wasn't surprised to hear that Spencer was interested in becoming lands commissioner.

"The surprise is that he is a Republican and is asking a staunch and loyal Democrat to appoint him to the position," Schwettmann said.

Range fire burns 50 acres near here

A fire of suspicious origin burned approximately 50 acres on Bureau of Land Management (BLM) property near Fort Stanton Tuesday.

BLM law enforcement officials are investigating the origin of this, the fifth fire in the same area within two weeks.

Smoky Bear Hot Shots from the United States Forest Service (USFS), as well as fire departments from Fort Stanton, Capitan, Lincoln, Bonito and the BLM, responded to the fire reported about 10:15 a.m. Tuesday morning.

Winds with gusts reported up to 48 miles per hour fanned the blaze first across 20 to 25 acres of brush, piñon and juniper between New Mexico road 214 and U.S. Highway

380. There the fire jumped highway 380, burning another 20 to 25 acres.

"Our biggest problem at that point was traffic," said Tom Guel of USFS. As the fire jumped the highway, smoke covered the road, blinding fire crews as well as motorist traffic.

Shortly thereafter the USFS air tanker based in Alamogordo dropped fire retardant, stopping the fire before it reached Salado Dam.

By noon firefighters contained the blaze. Crews remained on scene the remainder of the day to monitor hot spots fanned by continual winds.

Spring winds also contributed to a range fire that burned 400 acres south of Hondo Monday.

Witnesses said a controlled burn on the Circle Bar Ranch became out of control.

"It was a bad combination of wind, dry fire fuels and low relative humidity -- not a good day for a controlled burn," said a firefighter.

USFS, New Mexico State Forestry, Hondo Fire Department, Mesalero Hot Shots and others responded to the fire that kept crews out all night and into Tuesday.

A USFS official verified that the party originating the fire could be cited and held responsible for suppression costs which could amount to several thousand dollars.

Fire officials remain concerned about current high fire danger.

"It's still early in the season, yet we've been out on many fires. We're

experiencing an unfortunate combination: dry, fine fuels such as grass, high winds and low relative humidity. As temperatures warm up, things can only become worse."

Fire officials urge the public not to burn trash, brush or grass while these conditions exist.

Additionally, no outside burning of any kind is permitted within Ruidoso village limits. For those living outside Ruidoso, when conditions again become favorable for controlled burning, those individuals must notify local law enforcement or fire agency as well as the Environmental Improvement Division (EID) for a burning permit.

PSC approves new pipeline for Zia Gas; customers benefit with lower utility rates

Customers of Zia Natural Gas Company in Ruidoso could realize a benefit of up to \$142,000 as a result of the construction of a natural gas pipeline approved Monday by the New Mexico Public Service Commission.

A drop in rates should be seen on customer bills by summer, said commission spokesman Tom Halpin.

Savings of \$65,000 to \$70,000 will be realized immediately, he said. The agreement approved by the commission between Zia and Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association should save Zia transportation costs associated with delivering gas to the Ruidoso area.

The commission approved the purchase of the association's existing transmission lines by Zia based on an agreement struck between the two entities on August 1, 1992.

An additional savings of \$72,000

should occur when Zia constructs 25 miles of eight-inch transmission line from El Paso Natural Gas Company's transmission line, allowing it to bypass a compressor station.

The actual dollar savings to customers will be passed through the Purchased Gas Adjustment Clause, and ultimately could be as high as 24 cents per thousand cubic feet.

"It became apparent to us that Zia needed the additional capacity to meet growth in the Ruidoso area," Chairman Lawrence Ingram said. "It looks like everyone can benefit from this transaction."

After completion of the 25-mile line by the end of the year, Zia official expect to construct an additional 17 miles of line in three to four years, he said.

Since Zia can complete the project in two phases, company offi-

cial told the commission they hope to finish construction without future rate increases, Halpin said. The estimated cost of the entire new system is about \$2.25-million.

"No one anticipates that an increase will be necessary, but there is nothing in the order to preclude one," Halpin said. "Investment is paid through rates and the second phase is tied to growth, so if that did not occur, they would have to come back and ask for a rate increase."

The transmission line being purchased by Zia consists of a four-inch, high pressure, natural gas transmission line, about 44 miles long. It connects the interstate natural gas transmission system of El Paso Natural Gas to the distribution lines of the association and Zia.

Zia acquired the transmission system and related assets for \$424,235, which includes transmis-

sion line, metering and regulating equipment at three town border stations, three regulator stations and a tap and metering facilities.

Zia also is to transport gas on El Paso's mainline on behalf of the natural gas association and over the purchased line at a fixed rate.

In approving the agreement, the commission noted that the transmission system has insufficient capacity to serve Zia's growing peak requirements.

Zia has maintained a compressor station to meet peak demand, but that demand now has reached a level that even with the compressor, the construction of additional pipeline capacity is necessary, the commission stated in its order.

Purchase of the system will allow Zia to maintain an adequate supply of gas for current customers and for potential new customers.

Warrior tennis team begins busy month with Artesia today

Kelly's B&B gives guests a bit of Scotland

The house provided many weekends and summers of pleasure, a refuge for her family from the heat in Wichita Falls, Texas.

When Catherine Kelly Grantham died in 1990, her family decided to turn the beloved retreat into a bed and breakfast as a tribute to their mother and her native Scotland.

Amanda Tudor, who manages the comfortable home and its two guest suites, knows the story of its namesake by heart.

Catherine was a native of Glasgow and was transported to the United States in 1945 after her marriage to N.C. Grantham of the U.S. Army Air Corps during World War II.

Described as a "short, feisty lady and typical Glaswegian with a sharp tongue, sharp wit and noble heart," Catherine became famous for her cooking, hospitality and outgoing personality. For a time, she

served as a postal clerk at the Ruidoso Downs Post Office, gathering many friends and admirers in the Ruidoso area.

The home is located on the main street of the village of Capitan, using the rugged terrain and mountains of the Lincoln National Forest as a backdrop for the touch of Scotland and European hospitality.

Catherine was the mother of C. Pat Westbrook of Albuquerque and Butch Grantham of Dallas. Mrs. Westbrook oversaw the remodeling of the house for the comfort of visitors, but the emphasis remained Scottish, including heraldry and family photographs. Roses are featured in paintings by Catherine, on china, clocks and lamps in her memory.

Each suite is separated from the main house by French doors.

But guests still awake each morning to the scent of fresh baked bread, part of a generous continental breakfast served each morning in the Rose Dining Room.

Unlike many others bed and

breakfasts, this inn caters to parents and children.

"At Catherine Kelly's, the decor is comfortable, homey and unpretentious," Westbrook said in a release handed out by Tudor. "Your stay will provide you the opportunity to travel as a family, and with child care services available, you will also be able to spend some time alone, knowing your children are well care for and occupied with toys, books and videos."

Each suite has a separate entrance from the outside, two bedrooms and a full bath, which is equipped with all the little necessities guests may be used to at home, such as a curling iron and blow dryer.

Catherine's suite sleeps four with one bedroom sporting a king size bed and the children's room, a twin trundle combination. Handicap accommodations can be provided.

The furnishings are simple, but comfortable with rocking chairs, a television, and even stuffed animals for the children.

The "Mr.C" Suite, which costs slightly more and is named after Catherine's husband, covers two floors with two bedrooms and a full bathroom upstairs, and a sitting area and kitchenette downstairs.

The children's room upstairs is engagingly decorated complete with books, toys and a window seat, offering one of the best views in the house.

The large bedroom provides a queen size bed and a comfortable recliner for late night reading. The suite can sleep up to six using the queen sleeper sofa in the sitting area. The kitchenette is equipped with a microwave and refrigerator.

If guests prefer to congregate in the main living room and enjoy a roaring fire in the evening, Tudor will accommodate them.

A laundry with a couch where they can relax is available for guests at the back of the main house.

Tudor said the breakfast buffet consists of two to three different types of fresh baked breads, muffins, bagels, fruit according to the season, juice and coffee. Guests may use the kitchen facilities to store their own favorites. Several different types of teas also are available.

Lunches and dinners are not served, giving visitors a chance to get out and explore the Capitan and Sacramento Mountain ranges and Lincoln County's settlements and villages.

Tudor, who has managed the house just a few months, moved to the Capitan area with her husband, Eddie Tudor, who is with the State Forest Division in Capitan.

She said the heaviest drawing area for the inn since it opened in November appears to be Dallas/Fort Worth area in Texas. Holidays, weekends and summers are the busiest time.

Extension focuses on food



Trustees face lengthy agenda

A discussion about adding a vendor to the village's list of business licenses is one of the last items on the agenda of the Capitan Board of Trustees for its meeting Monday, April 12, but the issue may take the longest to discuss. The board meets at 7 p.m. in village Hall. The agenda starts with proclamations declaring May 2-8 as Clerk's Week and May as Fair Housing Month. Four resolutions will allow a budget increase by moving money from the water construction account to the sewage treatment, wetlands project Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) account; will institute a sewer dumping fee; will set up membership of the planning and zoning board to handle the zoning part of its jurisdiction; will approve a budget increase of \$20,000 by taking money from the water fund and moving it to the wetlands project to pay for taxes on the work. A report will be presented on water bill late fee liens. The board is expected to approve a contractor for the sewage treatment wetlands project and is scheduled to open a proposal submitted for gravel on a cooperative road project with the state. The board also will consider the annexation of property owned by Hollis Marcum. Members will discuss a draft of an excavation ordinance and a draft of an amendment to the village's sewer, trash and water ordinance. Wrapping up the meeting will be a discussion on collective bargaining.

State citizens push through mining bill

The celebrating among members of the Rio Grande chapter of the Sierra Club started March 17 when the New Mexico Legislature enacted a Hardrock Mine Reclamation Law as part of the new state Mining Act.

Once signed by the governor, the state finally will have a hardrock mine reclamation law, said Susan Gorman, chapter contact official.

"Passage of the law is gratifying for two reasons," she said. "First, and most importantly, the law provides the legal structure for New Mexico to regulate hardrock mining operations."

"Second, the passage of this law resulted from the determination of a coalition of grassroots community groups and environmental organizations to make a commitment to focus on an issue, to work to reach consensus, to develop a strategy and action plan and to work together to accomplish exactly what they set out to do."

Club member Sue MacIntosh said she was grateful for the cooperative effort and work that went into getting the law passed, "particularly, the legislators who stuck with us through a challenging summer and a very difficult legislative session."

The club especially thanked State Senator Shannon Robinson (D-Albuquerque) and State Representatives Gary King (D-Moriarty)

and Cisco McSorley (D-Albuquerque).

MacIntosh said New Mexicans have been especially vulnerable to mining operations that create deep pits, mountains of mine wastes and rivers of cyanide and acid mine drainage. Until now they had no law to specifically regulate hardrock mining.

The new law will be a strong piece of legislation, that received strong support from Governor Bruce King. The state's Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department provided both support and technical expertise to draft a strong and workable law, she said.

"The result of all this work and commitment is a good law which sets the stage for development of a good regulatory program to be developed during the next 12 months, creating a workable balance between mining operations and the fragile natural resources of the state."

New Mexico already collects money for mineral leases on federal public lands within its borders. According to the Department of the Interior's Mineral Management Service, for 1992, the state received \$111,490,646.

The money represents the state's share of bonuses, rents and royalties. The shares are distributed on a monthly basis as the revenue is collected.

Downs animal shelter is almost ready

A new animal shelter is just about complete in Ruidoso Downs and impounded dogs and cats will be kept there until owners take the responsibility to pay fees and keep them under control.

The shelter, which will have six cages for dogs, a cattery and a quarantine area, is located at the southeast edge of the village hall complex. The whole building was made in-house by Downs animal control officer Tom Armstrong and the maintenance department.

Armstrong will have a small office at the building, but people will have to pay fines at the village hall

and bring a receipt to the shelter to get their animal out.

Animals in Ruidoso Downs are required to have a city tag and current rabies vaccination.

If Armstrong picks up an animal, he will keep it at the shelter five days for licensed animals and 72 hours for an unlicensed animal. After that time he will have to put the animals down or people may adopt the animals if they pay the fees.

The cost for licensing an unaltered cat is \$5, a neutered or spayed cat \$3, unaltered dogs \$10 and neutered or spayed dogs \$5.

Senior citizens in the community are charged half price.

The area will also have outdoor pens for the dogs and pens for livestock, such as horses. Livestock is impounded if an owner does not meet the requirements of the village ordinance of one eighth of an acre per animal and proper cleaning and maintenance of the pens as well as other regulations.

Armstrong picks up 15 to 25 dogs and just a few cats each month. That number increases, though, with the influx of visitors and part-time residents for the summer racing season. His busiest

time will be in the fall when those people leave the area and don't take their animals with them.

If it needs to, the village can build onto the shelter fairly easily, he said.

The village decided to build its own shelter in January after the Lincoln County Humane Society decided to increase its fees from \$300 a month to \$750 per month for providing the service.

Armstrong said having its own shelter should save the village money. They will also receive the impounding fees, which will help with costs, he said.

Coronado and "Seven Cities of Gold" take center stage at museum program

Searching for something to do with all those friends and relatives this Saturday evening?

Search no more, because the Museum of the Horse in Ruidoso Downs has a special program designed to entertain and educate.

At 7 p.m. Saturday, April 10, the Museum of the Horse will present a

free chautauqua program, "The Life and Times of Francisco Vasquez De Coronado."

Everyone is welcome to attend. On September 2, 1539, Fray Marcos de Niza reported to Mendoza, then Governor of Mexico, about his findings in what is now New Mexico. He exaggerated

reports about the wealth of the local Indian tribes.

In search of glory, Mendoza dispatched Francisco Vasquez de Coronado to the north. Instead of finding the "Seven Cities of Gold" Coronado came upon seven little pueblos all within a radius of four leagues. This was the beginning of European contact with the native peoples of the area.

The legendary Coronado is portrayed by actor Larry Torres for the Chautauqua Program of the New Mexico Endowment For The Humanities. Drawing on such diverse sources as Herbert Bolton's "Coronado, Knight of Pueblos and Plains, Pedro de Castaneda's "Relacion de la Jornada de Cibola...del Año 1540" and selected letters from Coronado to Governor Mendoza of Mexico, Torres re-enacts Coronado's historic 7,000 mile journey. He traveled from Mexico into the despoplados and Indian villages of the great American southwest in his search for a "glittering new Tenochtitlan" or a "new Peru" to conquer.

The actor spins a tale of the first American odyssey of exploration and failed colonization which paved the way for the subsequent settlement of New Mexico. He explains the cultural encounters, both peaceful and violent between the Spanish explorers and the Native Peoples in 1540-1542.

Larry Torres is a native of Taos. He has been a teacher of Spanish,

Russian and French for the past 16 years. He currently teaches at Taos International High School where he is chairman of the Department of Foreign Languages.

Torres was brought to national prominence recently when the Walt Disney Corporation singled him out as the Outstanding Foreign Language Teacher of the Year at the Annual Disney Salutes the American Teacher Awards program in Los Angeles, California.

Torres is internationally recognized as a speaker and presenter in the field of global education in foreign language teaching.

Equally skilled as a writer, Torres' first 100 essays written in Spanish were recently compiled into a book titled "Yo Seigo De Taosi."

This year, he was named Outstanding Young New Mexican for the state and will represent New Mexico next January in the 1994 Outstanding Young Americans competition.

RHS ag students head for FFA contests

The Ruidoso High School Agri-Marketing team is on its way to national competition after earning first place at the New Mexico State Future Farmers of America Judging Contests Friday in Las Cruces.

The team members of the newest FFA judging contest, Agri-marketing, are Colelinda Stokes, Matt Harshey and Teri Hall. It consists of selection of a new and innovative agricultural product to sell in a community. A business plan is written with an overview of the community, feasibility study, marketing plan, action plan, budget and evaluation. An oral presentation to three judges is then presented and questions asked of the participants.

The topic chosen by the RHS team was the raising of catfish in a closed recirculation system to be constructed by the high school agricultural structures class. The students will design and construct a

system which consists of two 800-1,000 gallon tanks with a settling basin and nitrification basin. The system will be set up like a giant aquarium but its main purpose will be to produce a food fish instead of being for looks.

"Aquaculture", as it is called, is the fastest growing segment of agriculture. It is "farming in water." The Ruidoso FFA's selection of this business plan centers around the lack of fresh catfish available in our area.

Catfish is a warm water fish and few are harvested in our geographical area. As a result most purchasing is done at grocery stores or restaurants and only a fraction of that product is fresh. Some reason for Aquaculture being a fast-growing segment of agriculture include the fact that our supplies in the wild are being threatened by pollution, mercury and other harm-

ful chemicals; fresh supply is dwindling, consumers are more health conscious about eating red meats and fish consumption has been increasing steadily during the past 10 years.

The FFA members believe that if they can raise a fish in a closely monitored system and guarantee a healthy, fresh, safe product they will have a market. The team will now represent New Mexico at Kansas City in November in national competition.

Judges at the event were New Mexico State University professors Connie Falk and Bill Gorman and Jed Fanning, executive vice president of United New Mexico Bank. The Ruidoso Agriculture Mechanics team consisting of John Crawford, Steve Minner, Jeremy Turner and Shans Melton tied for second place at the state contests. Turner finished third high overall in the con-

test. The team missed first place by 19 points, 1,425 to 1,406. There were 24 teams entered in the agriculture mechanics contest this year.

The RHS chapter also entered the meats contest placing eighth, the land contest placing 12th, the farm management contest placing 12th, the horse contest placing 31st and the wildlife contest placing 12th.

The state competition drew 1,258 students from 58 schools for the three-day event.

Adviser Mike Gaines said this was a very successful judging season for the Ruidoso FFA'ers and it would not have been possible without the cooperation of all the teachers, parents and staff and the financial help from the school district. The members thanked all these people for their help and encouragement.

WIC helps women & infants

The WIC program, a special supplemental food program for women, infants and children, provides services throughout New Mexico to eligible pregnant women, breastfeeding women, post-partum women, infants and children up to the age of five.

To qualify for WIC, a person must: 1. fit into one of the women, infant or child categories; 2. be within the income guidelines and 3. be at risk for a medical or nutritional problem.

People who meet all three of these criteria receive specific nutritious supplemental foods, nutrition education and referral to other health and social service programs.



C of C members pick five new directors from field of 10

Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce members should be getting their ballots soon to fill five slots on the chamber board for the coming fiscal year.

Of 10 candidates, the five receiving the highest vote totals will take the positions of Paul Crown, David Sailor, Bob Dolgener, L.J. Jameson and Clark Carpenter. Dolgener and Jameson, who were appointed to finish out terms this past year, will be running again. Dolgener is the owner of Eagle Creek Construction Company and is a member of the Lincoln County Homebuilders Association. He is active in the First Christian Church and was a past deacon.

Jameson is the owner of Ruidoso Ice and Water Company and is active in Little League sports and the Warrior Booster Club.

Other nominees for the positions are Glen Crane of Lela Easter Real Estate. He is also a board member of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County, a member of the Lincoln County Person-

nel Board and an ex-officio member of the chamber.

Jackie Glover is the manager of Mortgage Plus and is involved in the Ruidoso Ski Team.

Bill Kennedy is the minister of First Christian Church and had also served as president of a chamber of commerce in Brookfield, Missouri, where he was also the mayor. He has served as president of a park board in Sallisbury, Missouri and is involved in Rotary International.

Linette Moore is the owner of Upper Canyon Inn and is on the President's Club of the Ruidoso chamber and the Village of Ruidoso Lodgers Tax Advisory Committee.

Karen Morris of Ruidoso State Bank is also the president of Altrusa and the Democratic Women. She is a member of the Crisis Center Board, the parade committee for Aspenfest, the chamber art festival and the chamber Connoisseur Classic.

Scott Muhn of Ruidoso Printing Company is a member of the Rotary International and a chamber volunteer for the art festival, Ok-

toberfest, Aspenfest, Chili Cook-off and was chairman of the Connoisseur Classic decorating committee.

Laura Reynolds, sales and marketing director of the Enchantment Inn, is a member of the chamber Mexican promotion committee, coordinator of the chamber tour operators development group and organizer for the chamber's "Tourism Day" in May.

Rick Riddle, owner of Noisy Water Artwear, was a member of the Connoisseur Classic committee, chairman of the "Poor Man's Wine Tasting" event and the chamber's volunteer of the month.

Along with the ballots, a survey also will be sent to the members to get their ideas on the chamber, said Joan Bailey, executive director.

She has been spending Tuesday and Thursday mornings meeting with members, the survey will allow them to tell specifically what projects they would like to see the chamber sponsor.

She asked directors to encourage any members they speak to to vote and to fill out the survey. The bal-

lots will be due back April 21.

Crown and the board congratulated Bailey on completing her first year as executive director on April 1. He said, based on the executive board's criteria when Bailey was hired, she could receive a 10 percent salary increase at the end of the first year, with five percent based on membership and five percent on regular chamber business, and since she had improved those areas she will get that increase.

When she started a year ago, the chamber had 280 members and now has 361, including five new members this month. Bailey said her goal, though, is 400 members by the end of the fiscal year. Revenues from the new members are becoming an important part of the budget for the group.

A financial dip in February was not unexpected and could continue for March, too, Jack Muhn, contract accountant, reported to the directors. He said at the end of February the cash position was rather weak because the chamber has collected most of a large November dues bill-

ing. It is likely March and April will also look slow until another large billing goes out in May, he said. "I'm not as optimistic as I have been in past months, but I am not really that concerned," he said.

The visitors services center is holding its own except for in salaries, which was more than expected because of the extra work required for the tremendous number of visitors. That budget was benefited by an \$8,000 amendment from the village to provide for the increased use of the 1-800 number and postage for mailing information out.

Muhn said the Connoisseur Classic IV, which was a chamber event in March, is showing a loss of about \$2,600. He will give a complete report on it at the April meeting. They had expected the event to have a \$2,500 profit.

He said the chamber invested a lot of money in posters and decoration sets for the event that will be used again next year.

He also has several bills out so there will be money coming in before the April report.

After Muhn's report, director Ron Wicker said he was again concerned that the consolidated balance sheet for the chamber looks like it is losing ground. He had questioned the group's losses at past meetings, especially when the group ended the last fiscal year with \$16,000 less than it started the year.

He said the month of January showed a loss of \$3,600, but Muhn pointed out year-to-date the group shows a net revenue under expenditures of \$26. The group has also been trying to overcome a major loss from about two years ago and has shown an improvement since that time, Bailey said.

Wicker said as long as they can see daylight at the end of the tunnel then he wouldn't be as concerned.

Crown said Muhn and he will be meeting with the consent of the executive board, to do a cash flow projection through the end of the year. The main objective will be not to spend money raised from the annual arts festival in July, which has been done for the past few years.

Chamber gears up for Art Festival

With only about four months left before the biggest fundraiser the group has, the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce is working out the final details of the annual art festival.

President Paul Crown said plans for the festival on July 23-25 are going well. The event will be at the Civic Events Center for the first time instead of in outdoor tents, which should cut expenses.

About 130 artists will all have booths inside, including the 10 artists who won best of show at last year's event. The chamber received 262 applications and those were juried to select the ones who will show.

One change from last year's procedure will be to allow only a 50 percent refund after June 1 for artists who can't make it and no refund for those who call after July 1. The group also has a stand-by list of the next highest juried artists to fill the booths of those who drop out.

In other business during the chamber's regular meeting on Wednesday, directors decided to have their annual retreat on May 15 at The Lodge at Cloudcroft as they did last year. President elect Tom Rigsby, who is organizing the event, said one item that will be important to discuss is the annual banquet.

Each year it seems to get scheduled for a different time of the year,

so it has no continuity, he said. By making it the same time each year the community would remember it better.

The group also heard a presentation from Jess Shendo and his daughter on hosting a pow wow here in 1994 at the Civic Events Center. It could draw thousands of performers and visitors to the area and would really showcase the Native American history, Bailey said.

Shendo had first suggested Memorial Day weekend, but board directors said it may be hard to find lodging for all those people when the town is fairly full already. The board was very supportive of the concept and Bailey will keep in contact with Shendo on coordinating and promoting the event.

Bailey said one disappointment many visitors to this area have is that there is a lack of things to see and do regarding the Native American culture, and this would offer at least one opportunity. She said an event like this could also draw Mesalero and Ruidoso closer together.

In Bailey's monthly report to the board, she told the group that she will be the host of a new show on the community television channel. The first show of "Lincoln County Conversation" will be at 6:30 p.m. Thursday.

Bailey said she was approached by On Track, Inc., the company that produces a community program, to see if the chamber would be interested in hosting a reformatted show. The executive

board and board of directors were both receptive to the idea and said she should go ahead with it.

The shows, which will be done live in most cases, will cover activities and concepts about the whole county and will sometimes go beyond county lines for interesting concepts, Bailey said. She said it will be very relaxed and informative as well as entertaining.

Bailey said the program will not only be about tourism but about the community as well. She said she will be going into the schools at all levels to do shows on programs the students are doing.

She said the show will be replayed on Saturday, which will give weekend visitors an opportunity to see it too.

Bailey has also been working with Karen Kopp, executive director of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County, on prospects for a hotel near the Civic Events Center. They have met with an agent for hotel interests in the south and have several other possibilities.

In old business, Bailey said director James Hobbs, who was absent from the meeting, wanted to thank the board members for participating in a volunteer program to help the chamber staff and to get a better understanding of what goes on at the office.

Also absent from the meeting were Jameson, David Sailor, Jim Bassett, Jim Miller, Joe Gomez and Lara Johnson.

Some of the ways the state will tap into family budgets include (but are not limited to) adding eight cents to the cost of a gallon of automobile oil and 60 cents to the cost of an oil filter; increasing the cost of a drivers' license from \$10 to \$16; charging 25 cents for every tire of a vehicle you are registering (that goes to 50 cents next year) and charging three cents for every 1,000 gallons of water sold by utilities. There's more, and if our state leaders have missed anything, their cohorts in Washington D.C. will take care of that.

It used to be the only things you could count on were death and taxes, but these days you can count on a lot more — like surcharges, user fees and rate adjustments.

The free trade agreement isn't really free

We've got a few rules at our house — some of them are the same ones that apply in most civilized homes — you know, the please and thank you kind of stuff you learn in kindergarten — you don't wear a hat in the house and you wash up for dinner (but not at the kitchen sink).

At our house some other rules apply. For instance, you don't cook or eat eggs if mom's home; you tell somebody where you're going and when you'll be back and you never say "JUST" before any amount of money.

Since cost is relative to the need, use, time and place, those jeans that Bethany thinks are a bargain at "just \$45" don't sound like such a good deal to old folks who used to buy Levi's for \$10!

The best bargains are on the feature-length television commercials that purport to be entertainment, or maybe even education. That's where you can buy just about anything for three easy payments of \$19.95!

Those parenthetical statements in TV ads are kind of like the small print in contracts and agreements — the buyer had better beware.

The same holds true for the highly-touted North American Free Trade Agreement, the one that New Mexico politicians think is the best thing since pockets. When you read the fine print, it's no bargain.

A Socorro attorney, Patsy D. Reinard, who ran unsuccessfully for the Joe Skeen's seat in the U.S. House of Representatives, suggests that the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) is not free, and it isn't even free trade.

"Those who believe in the ideal of free trade will be offended by NAFTA's double standard,"

says Reinard in a press release. "Real free trade means that both capital and labor freely travel across borders in both directions.

"Yet Mexico, while lobbying for American factories to come south of the border, has lobbied for stronger immigration laws in the United States. It is now illegal for hardpressed American farmers to hire Mexican workers at \$25 a day, so that Mexican workers are corralled in the sweatshops of the Mexican maquilas at \$7 a day," she continues.

Well put, Patsy! "Mexico is the sweatshop for America both under Maquiladora and NAFTA," continues Reinard. A maquila is a factory located in Mexico, foreign owned and financed, but employing Mexican workers for a fraction of what the same job would pay in the United States.

When I lived in El Paso I learned that the executives of those maquilas live on the U.S. side of the border — usually on the West Side or in Santa Teresa, areas they could well afford on their six-digit salaries.

Several areas of the U.S. have suffered the loss of factories whose owners have moved South of the Border where there are no unions, no workers comp, no environmental watchdogs and no minimum wage. Manufac-

turers can pay workers less in a day than they used to have to pay for an hour.

The U.S. loss to Mexico — in the neighborhood of 1,000 factories and 500,000 jobs under the Maquiladora Program over the past decade — has only just begun. If NAFTA is ratified, those figures will double within the next few years.

If you work in manufacturing, and you make more than \$5 an hour, you can bet your job is in danger of moving south if President Bill Clinton signs NAFTA, a measure Reinard calls President Salinas' blueprint to industrialize Mexico with foreign capital without calling it foreign aid.

And, to make matters worse, the United States government has even provided some financial incentives and help for factories to move. NAFTA is a bad deal for U.S. workers and consumers, and in the end it's not that great a deal for Mexico.

The female-dominated workforce in maquilas introduces a whole new set of societal problems into the Mexican culture.

The U.S. loses jobs, payrolls, benefit packages and property taxes on the factories that will soon sit idle. The economy loses manufactured products that boost a strong gross national product.

But we gain, too. The U.S. will gain unemployed people waiting in line for benefits, Food Stamps and Medicaid. The country gains homeless to sleep in shelters and dine in soup kitchens. But most important, our government gains an opportunity to inflate the bureaucracy even further by designing a job retraining program to put those displaced workers back in the labor force.

What a deal!

Unofficial greeter shares her love for life at Ruidoso Care Center

A cheerful "Hi, honey, how are you?" greets you as you enter the door at the Ruidoso Care Center; and it does not matter whether or not you know Frances Supina, the unofficial greeter with the warm welcome and twinkling eyes.

This may not be startling to those of us who live in the village or nearby where friendly waves and greeting from all are the usual.

To someone else it might be difficult to understand why the petite lady confined to a wheelchair would bother.

"I like people," she explains. "All kinds of people, and it does not

matter their color."

Greeting you is a way to let her love show.

Born in Albuquerque at the quarter-century mark and the

oldest of five children, she found the Duke City confining at 17 so she left for Carlsbad to find her fame and fortune.

What she found was a job driving a city bus and a husband. When asked if she had difficulty handling the large transport, she replies in the negative.

"A job worth doing is worth doing right."

Were any of her passengers trouble makers? Only one, she states — a young woman a few years younger than she.

"I asked her to quit talking so loud, and she just kept it up. So, I let her off at the next stop."

She hastily assures me, though,

that most of the time people were nice.

There was more to life than driving a bus, however.

A storybook romance developed when she met the dashing Czechoslovakian, John James Supina, who worked in the potash mines outside of Carlsbad.

You should fall in love, get married and stay together in spite of your problems, she advises. Marriage should have staying power, a factor that contributed to her and John's being together until his death 10 years ago.

When she wasn't working, she was enjoying their son, David, cooking and reading. She wistfully sighs

and says she wishes that she could read now — now that so much has changed.

Some time during the 1960s son David lost contact with the family, her husband died after a long illness and there was that tragic auto accident near Vaughn that nearly claimed her life.

"I was driving too fast, and you can see what it did to me."

For more than three weeks, she was in a coma. Her fate was uncertain. Even the doctors did not know if she would make it. Then as quickly as life had been reduced to a standstill, it returned. Almost.

Supina awoke to discover that she was paralyzed on her right

side. Her eyes would not focus correctly making reading very difficult. She would need full-time care.

She has been at the Ruidoso Care Center since 1985, and she and her son have been reunited.

Do not feel sorry for her. Just let that enthusiastic smile of hers draw you in, and you will hear again and again, "Just love all people; and when you do a job, do it right."

If this sounds like advice your mother gave you when you were young, you are probably right. Maybe it is one of the secrets to a happy life, especially when you are hit with a defour.

After viewing the arts and crafts and the result of the judging, Terry White taught a class on how to make carnation flowers. Door prizes were presented to



Please note that several local scholarships are not listed because the awarding organizations have not yet contacted the school.

Financial aid comes in several forms other than purely scholarships: student loans, parent loans, Pell Grant, work-study and institutional grants through the individual college. In order to qualify for most forms of financial aid, the student must wait till after January 1 for the graduating year.

The parents must then furnish income tax information for the prior year and fill out the Federal Student Aid application which is available at the high school. The applications are sent by the individual family to the government computing agency. Results are tabulated, the student is sent a "Student Aid Report" and that, in turn, is sent to the college of choice.

The college then compiles a financial aid package for the individual student. The very best source of financial aid is, and has always been, the college of choice!

Ruidoso High School has a computerized college/career/scholarship guide called the **Guidance Information System**. Personnel are available at any time to students and parents to access the information and give printouts. The system is located in the counseling office area.

Also, there are many institutional scholarships from schools such as UNM, NMSU, Adams State and others that we have not listed. If the student is interested in a specific school and a specific major, the best plan is to contact that school and the department of studies in which the student is interested.

The myth is that millions of scholarships go unclaimed. This is only partially true. Many scholarships are so specific in their requirements that the number of potentially qualified applicants is limited by the very nature of the requirements.

In addition, students during the senior year are very busy and fail to take note of scholarship announcements and deadlines, in addition to the very real fact that many of the applications require essays, letter of recommendation and some very lengthy paperwork. Many students do not feel that they have the time to complete such lengthy applications.

It's a lot like entering the lottery or Publishers Clearing House. If you don't try, you most certainly won't get a dime!!!





"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul and mind. This is the great and foremost commandment. The second is like unto it. You


shall love your neighbor as yourself." Matthew 22:37-39

First Presbyterian Church

The First Presbyterian Church of Ruidoso is located on Nob Hill overlooking the community it has served for more than 40 years.

The Presbyterian Church, organized in 1948 with 18 charter members, is a congregation of the Presbyterian Church, U.S.A., and the Presbytery of Sierra Blanca.

The first meeting place was the American Legion Hall, and later the congregation met in the Woman's Club building. In 1955, the present building, which sits on a knoll at the junction of Sudderth and U.S. Highway 70 just to the east of the hospital, was completed.

"Ours is a relatively small, but very active church," says the Reverend Bill Scholes, interim minister.

"We try our best to reach out with a sincere welcome to seasonal visitors," adds Reverend Scholes. That's in keeping with the church's mission statement which says, in part, that the church aims to maintain sensitivity to the needs of seasonal visitors and share its Christ-like loving support of various agencies in the region.

The Lincoln County Food Bank is a major local mission of the First Presbyterian Church. The Food Bank, staffed with volunteers and operated with donations, has its headquarters in the church.

The Food Bank is open from noon to 4 p.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday. A community food co-op also uses the First Presbyterian Church as its distribution point.

We believe in the full use of our building as a part of our ministry, explains Scholes. The second floor of the educational building is carpeted and made available for youth retreats and meetings. Sleeping bags are unrolled upstairs and meetings are held in front of the fireplace in the church's combination dining and fellowship hall.

The Presbyterian Church is a member of the Ministerial Alliance and extends its ministry through visits to the hospital and the care center.

The congregation meets for worship at 11 a.m. each Sunday, with Communion celebrated the first Sunday of the even months and on Christmas Eve and Maundy Thursday. A nursery is provided.

Visitors are always welcome to join the congregation for the monthly potluck fellowship luncheon the third Sunday of each month.

Church school for children and adults is at 9:45 a.m. Choir rehearsal is on Wednesday, and a women's luncheon and Bible study is conducted at noon the second Tuesday at the church.

The community is invited to all church activities, including the Maundy Thursday service of Communion at 7 p.m. today (Thursday), April 8.

This Easter Sunday, worship will begin with a sunrise service at 6 a.m., followed by breakfast, with Sunday school and morning worship at regular times.

The children will join in an Easter egg hunt at noon following the worship service.

Interfaith families celebrate Passover, Easter

The Barnes-Schwartz family gathered at their home in Montclair at sundown today to observe the Passover seder. Six days later, the family will have breakfast Easter Sunday with a meal similar to the one Mrs. Barnes-Schwartz remembers from her childhood.

The Barnes-Schwartz family is among a number of interfaith families, who celebrate the traditions of both faiths.

"We have a seder here at our house, and have been doing this for years," said Marion Barnes-Schwartz. The family also "will have a traditional Easter breakfast which goes back to my family's traditions."

"I encourage people to see the common elements of the two (religions)," said the Reverend Robert Morris of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark. "Agreement is not the most important thing, respect is. An interfaith family is a lab of tolerance for diversity."

"If (the families) were not supportive, it would be the old tug and pull as to what faith to worship, what to celebrate and how to raise the kids," Mrs. Barnes-Schwartz said.

Jennifer Jogodnick agrees. While the 26-year-old Voorhees woman has no children, she and her husband have en-

joyed the support of both families in making their Jewish-Christian alliance work.

Jogodnick's father, an Episcopalian priest, and a rabbi officiated at her marriage two years ago to her husband, Benjamin.

"We'll probably go to the Easter vigil service Saturday night, and his family will come to Easter brunch," Mrs. Jogodnick said.

In past years, the couple spent "the first night of Passover with his grandmother, and the second night with his father," Mrs. Jogodnick said. This year, the Jogodnicks will try to have the seder at their own home, inviting both sides of the family.

Kathryn Kahn is outreach coordinator for the New Jersey-West Hudson Valley Region of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations.

She says it is often easier for interfaith families to combine the experiences of Passover and Easter.

"There's a natural teaching element in the seder which acts as a way to explain Jewish traditions, history and what we feel is important," Kahn said. "Easter is very holy, very church-related, and has much less commercialism (as opposed to Christmas) to confuse the issue."

Angus Church of the Nazarene

Angus Church of the Nazarene has been part of Lincoln County since 1916, serving the county from several locations.

It began just south of Capitan on the road to Nogal. At that time it was called Providence Church. Then in the early '20s, it moved to Capitan. Here the church enjoyed many years of exciting ministry, especially among the children.

Then in the mid '70s, the church moved once again, this time to the Angus area. Bonita Park, the Nazarene District Conference Center is there. With this move, it became known as Angus Church. There, in Bonita Park, the church meets in various Conference Center facilities.

This location, midway between Ruidoso, Capitan and Nogal, conveniently allows families from all of these areas to attend with only a short drive. Since moving to the Conference Center, a common misconception has been that the church is only for the groups using the Center.

In reality, however, Angus is a typical church made up of people from all around the area. The groups using the Center for camps, retreats, etc., meet in the many other facilities in the Park.

In the months ahead they plan to build their own church building on Highway 48 near the front gate of Bonita Park. This will provide the

church with better visibility, more parking and more space for their growing attendance.

In addition to the new facility, Angus Church is developing plans for taking church to the people by starting small Bible study/support groups or branch Sunday school classes in the surrounding communities.

Once again, children are a key focus of the church, offering two age level children's worship services in addition to Sunday school, musicals and other activities.

The pastor of Angus Church is Charles Hail. A native of New Mexico, the Reverend Hail has been here for more than six years, making him one of the longest-term ministers in Lincoln County at this time. His preaching is positive, easy to understand and practical. One of his members says, "I like his preaching because he doesn't yell at us, and all week I can remember what he said."

Whatever the location and whatever the name, a few things have remained the same. Angus Church is a place where people are accepted, where people find they can have peace with God through a personal relationship with Jesus Christ and the helpful support of a church family who are making their way along the same pathway together.

Many return to church

More than two-thirds of people surveyed say they will go to church on Easter, but only a small percentage more know what Easter celebrates, according to a poll released recently.

The poll also found a large majority plan time with family and friends on Sunday, and most plan to hunt for Easter eggs, decorate Easter eggs or give Easter baskets.

The poll also found less than half of those polled attend church at least weekly.

The poll interviewed 409 adults by telephone between last Monday and Wednesday for the Associated Press.

The poll found 69 percent of participants say they will go to church on Easter, including 80 percent of college graduates.

Most likely to skip Easter services are high school dropouts, 39 percent, the poll found.

But what does Easter celebrate? The poll found:

- 78 percent say the resurrection of Jesus.
- 8 percent say the death of Jesus.
- 5 percent say the birth of Jesus.
- 7 percent did not know or did not answer.
- Two people said the beginning of

spring.

—One person said the arrival of the Easter Bunny. (The poll identified this believer as a poor, single, older woman who lives in northcentral West Virginia.)


Women, 86 percent, are much more likely than men, 66 percent, to know Easter marks the resurrection of Jesus, according to the poll.

The poll also found 83 percent of those called plan to spend time on Easter with family and friends, 59 percent plan to participate in holiday activities like Easter egg hunts, and 11 percent plan to go out of town on vacation.

When the poll also asked about church attendance throughout the year, it found:

- 47 percent say they attend once a week or more, including 58 percent of senior citizens. Women, 56 percent, are more likely than men, 36 percent, to attend church this often.
- 19 percent say they attend about once a month, including 25 percent of young adults.
- 10 percent say they attend on holidays and special occasions.
- 22 percent say they have not attended in the past year, including 32 percent of high school dropouts.





Welcome spring with brunch

Now that spring has arrived, why not plan a brunch to celebrate the new season?

Brunch is a flexible meal. It can be breakfast, lunch, or a combination of the two, traditionally served anytime between 10:30 a.m. and 2 p.m.

If your plan leans toward luncheon fare, think about a boneless leg of lamb as the entree. Boneless and butterflied — it's so easy to prepare and serve, and it cooks quickly, too. Ask your meat retailer to butterfly it for you. The lamb can be broiled in the oven to the doneness you prefer.

Brush the lamb with a zesty orange marmalade, ginger and lemon glaze during the last few minutes of cooking. It is a tasty complement to the flavor of the lamb. Reserve part of the glaze to serve as a sauce.

Carving is a cinch with the boneless leg, too. Arrange the sliced lamb on a platter or board and complete the buffet with a basket of assorted bread sticks and rolls, wild rice pilaf and a mixed green salad.

Butterflied Lamb Leg with Orange Sauce

3 1/2 to 4-pound butterflied lamb leg.
2-3rds cup orange juice 1/2 cup orange marmalade 1 tablespoon butter
1/2 teaspoon grated fresh ginger
1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1 tablespoon cornstarch

Thread two long metal skewers through butterflied lamb leg to secure and facilitate turning roast. Place on rack in broiler pan; broil 5 to 6 inches from heat source 40 to 60 minutes to desired degree of doneness; 140 degrees F for rare; 160 degrees F for medium; and 170 degrees F for well done.

Meanwhile combine orange juice, marmalade, butter, ginger and mustard in a small saucepan. Cook over medium-low heat until marmalade is melted, stirring occasionally. Combine lemon juice and cornstarch; stir into orange juice mixture and cook until thickened. Remove from heat; reserve.

Turn leg several times during cooking, brushing with 1-3rd cup reserved sauce during last 10 minutes of cooking time.

Remove skewers and separate leg into three sections along the natural seams. Carve each section across the grain into thin slices. Serve remaining sauce with carved lamb.

Note: A butterflied lamb leg will yield four 3-ounce cooked, trimmed servings per pound.
