## Midtown consultants overspend by \$74,268

Officials of MainStreet's consulting firm told the Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday they allowed expenses to cross the line of their contract by a whopping \$74,268 without written authorization.

Brian Burnett, vice president of Bohannon-Huston, said his company acted in good faith and at no time stopped work on the project.

He said although no written authorization was in place once the cost exceeded the contract amount, prior verbal input and the

uninterrupted schedule to complete the project constituted a binding commitment for the village to seriously consider increasing their fee.

He said the scope changed when federal dollars entered the picture requiring more paperwork. He said an extraordinary effort was required to deal with impacted property owners and the project demanded more detail in preparing the construction plan.

He spoke of past letters and conversations with MainStreet officials enlarging the scope, which he inter-

preted as authorization to proceed.

On a question asked by Councilor Bill Karn, Burnett admitted that village officials were the third choice in communication behind Mary Maul of MainStreet and Alan Whitesel of the New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Department.

The original MainStreet contract was for \$66,440. As of March 1, Burnett said Bohannon-Huston had incurred \$140,708 in costs, which, according to Burnett, didn't include profit.

Burnett wrote to deputy man-

ager Alan Briley in early April that his company was willing to limit a total fee increase of \$48,000 in overage and would absorb approximately \$27,000 in overage.

Briley said correspondence regarding the project was included in the council's March 9 agenda packet.

Newly elected MainStreet president Tom Battin offered to examine the detailed overages of the consulting firm and come back to the village council with information that would allow them to make a decision on the adjustment.

The council accepted Battin's suggestion and volunteered deputy manager Briley's aid in assisting with the examination.

Under reports from municipal officials, Briley requested a study to assist the village in phasing in Town and Country North for sewer lines and other utility considerations.

Briley said the section under consideration would be about 40 percent of the subdivision, but would take in nearly 90 percent of

## Lawmakers boost state teachers' pay

A big portion of the increased taxes and fees approved in the past session of the New Mexico Legislature will be passed directly to school districts and into the pockets of their teachers.

Mike Gladden, Ruidoso school district superintendent, said Tuesday that things are picking up financially for schools across the state and for Ruidoso in particular, because of its growing enrollment.

New lower maximum teacher-pupil ratios will be put into effect, he said. And the legislature mandated that no teacher in the state will make less than \$22,000 a year. That will require changes to

the salary matrix, he said.

Teachers earning \$32,000 or less are to receive a pay increase of six percent and those earning above that figure must show an average increase in a district of four percent.

Last Monday and Tuesday, the staff attended a special budget workshop in Albuquerque where they got the final information regarding the budget building process," Gladden told school board members Tuesday.



## ETZ says "no" to mobile homes plan

They delivered their message and convinced zoning officials that Paradise Canyon subdivision and mobile homes just don't mix.

About 10 residents and property owners showed up at the Extraterritorial Zoning (ETZ) Commission meeting Monday to voice their opposition to a proposal to rezone their subdivision for mobile homes.

"I own three lots," Daniel Rivas told the ETZ commission. "I'm against mobile homes. There's no water or sewer facilities and that hinders high density. The streets are not paved and more traffic would add dust pollution. Our cabin is 10-feet from the street and we are smothered with dust now in the summer."

"The houses on my street are well constructed. The proponents said trailers look better than some of the houses. None look better than my cabin or the other houses there. I don't want to see my property value go down."

A few of the lot owners stayed to be sure the ETZ Authority, which meets right after the other board, followed the advisory commission's recommendation to deny the rezoning.

The issue emerged when multiple owner Henry Scott requested a variance to place a mobile home on Carleen Lane.

County manager Andy Wynham explained that the ETZ commissioners felt allowing mobile homes was too significant a change to be considered a variance. They decided the correct approach would

be to notify affected property owners and to advertise rezoning for that portion of the subdivision lying within the ETZ zone.

The one-mile ETZ zone was created to give officials with the Village of Ruidoso input in the development of the area around the village limits, but within the unincorporated portion of Lincoln County Wynham noted that the zone benefits the village, because it is the municipality that would annex property, not the county.

The commission is comprised of non-elected representatives from the village and the county.

The authority, which hands down the final decisions, consists of one village councilor, J.D. James, and two county commissioners, Monroy Montes and Wilton Howell, ETZ chairman.

After his board's unanimous vote to reject the rezoning, Howell said members try to keep in mind that the decisions they make impacts everybody in their property values.

"It's not fair to people who have built their houses there to allow mobile homes after the fact," he said. "Many built there because mobiles were not permitted. There are other more acceptable sites for mobile homes already in existence."

Wynham told the ETZ commissioners and spectators, "We got lots of interesting letters. Some were offended at the action they thought the board was going to take, but it was the proper action to address the issue, not a drive to change your way of life or overrun the subdivision with mobile

# Annual area cleanup campaign kicks off next weekend

With summer just around the corner, now is the time for the area to spruce up for itself and its visitors.

Ruidoso Downs will be participating in a joint clean-up effort with the Village of Ruidoso and the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) on April 24-25 and May 1 and 2.

Village clerk Leann Weibrecht told Downs trustees during a meeting Monday that if residents have large items to get rid of they need to take them to the Free Parking

lot, owned by Ruidoso State Bank, in Ruidoso.

If people want to get rid of items other than those times, they need to put them beside the dumpsters and then call LCSWA to arrange for pickup. Weibrecht stressed the authority will not pick these up on the cleanup days.

Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce executive director Joan Bailey, who attended the meeting for another agenda item, said the chamber will have nuisance complaint forms from Ruidoso and

Ruidoso Downs so people can get items such as abandoned cars removed from the community.

She also has the applications from the state highway department for groups or individuals to adopt-a-mile of highway to keep it clean year-round.

Bailey said she is encouraging everyone to participate in the cleanup and will also be challenging the schools to clean their areas. She said the area should actually have a cleanup at least two times a year, if it doesn't do it continuously.

Trustees also hope everyone will do their part in cleaning up the Ruidoso Downs community, but beyond that they would also like code enforcement officer Tom Armstrong to continue to make residents comply with health and safety ordinances in the village.

In a written monthly report from Armstrong on code enforcement, trustees Ray Hayhurst and Charlotte Craig both said it seems that little is being done in several violators' cases when they have been given more time. The board

agreed Armstrong should track down on these people and other violators as quickly as possible to get the village shaped up.

The group also approved monthly reports from the maintenance department, animal control department, fire department, municipal court and the police department. The fire department responded to two rescue calls and one fire in March, all of which were out of the village's district.

The police department had just one driving while under the in-

fluence arrest, three accidents without injuries, five domestic disturbances and 13 assists to other agencies, including the county, state police and Ruidoso police.

Armstrong also picked up 10 dogs and 12 cats and was only able to return one dog to its owner. The village has now completed its own animal shelter for impounded animals, but licensed animals can only be kept five days, while unlicensed animals are euthanized after 72 hours.

the residents living in that area.

He said to install sewer lines throughout the entire subdivision would cost more than \$1-million. He said the village was considering about one third of that cost during the first phase. The council approved the cost of the study.

The council conducted two public hearings.

David and Graciela Jimenez were granted a beer and wine license for Terraza Campanario located at 1611 Sudderth Drive.

Village Civic Events Center rental rates were boosted by 25 percent as of last night's council meeting. The rates and the operational policy of the center, Resolution 93-6, passed with minor alterations.

Council action on the regular agenda items included:

—the vacation of a right of way on Mountain View Drive to cure an encroachment of an existing garage owned by John Schuller.

Schuller will pay the village \$463.40 for the 926 square feet.

—voting down a request by Hazel Haynsworth of the Upper Canyon Homeowners Association to install a sign near the entrance to Upper Canyon that would indicate when the Indian reservation campground was closed.

Main Street, the narrow road that winds through the Upper Canyon, deadends at the Mescalero Apache Indian Campgrounds, a

popular area during the summertime.

Haynsworth complained of heavy traffic and unlawful camping during certain times of the year when the campground was full and campers searched for a place to stay. She said they park on residential property.

Clark Carpenter, representing the business interest of Upper Canyon, said campers and tourists may get the impression that Upper Canyon is closed if such a sign is installed. He said that would impact businesses already struggling to survive.

Members of the council agreed it was a picturesque road that tourists appreciate and that a sign probably would not have the desired effect Haynsworth wanted.

—authorization of the sale of a 1982 van ambulance to the Sandoval County fire department for \$4,995.

—an agreement that the Ruidoso Municipal Code concerning lodgers tax should be consistent with state laws.

The council noted it was not making an endorsement, but merely approving to amend its ordinance to include "welcome centers, tourist information centers and museums" as provided in the New Mexico State Statute 3-38-21.

—an agreement with C-Net Inc., and Carrizo Homeowners Association for a water line installation.

The agreement ties the water

line installation with annexation of Carrizo Lodge.

The village will go out for sealed bids for labor and material to complete the project. Bid deadline is 2:30 p.m. on May 3.

—council approval of the appointment of Bob Carey, manager of the Villa Inn, to the Lodgers Tax Advisory Board.

Consent agenda items approved, lumped together for a single vote were:

—authorization to advertise bids for various materials to be used by the water department.

—approval of easements for access and disposal of sludge from the Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant.

—a bid award on to Horton Emergency Vehicles for \$66,720.70 to purchase an EMS ambulance.

Village manager Ron Wicker said the study and survey of portions of Two Rivers Park is continuing.

The council has received complaints recently about loud parties in the area and the village is creating buffer zones to control parking in that area.

Village attorney Patricia Ortiz reported contacting several labor relations unions, but no new action in forming a Collective Bargaining-Labor Relations Board.

The council moved into a closed to discuss threatened or pending litigation, limited personnel matters and the sale of real property.

homes."

The board advertised the zoning change "to see what would happen," he said.

Out of 331 owners in the subdivision, 13 letters of protest, representing at least twice that many lots owned, were received in advance, Wynham said. At the meeting, several more were handed to the board in addition to a petition.

"That's a significant number of people to respond," Wynham said. "There's no magic number. Our ordinance refers to 20 percent, but that's an old carryover and was done away with by state law four or five years ago."

The ETZ ordinance should be reviewed and updated, he said. Conditions have changed since it originally was drafted.

Based on the lot owners' response, Wynham recommended that the board reject the rezoning from R-1, residential, to R-MS, mobile home, designation.

He cautioned the ETZ commission to be careful it does not recommend approval of any requests for variances that would violate the zoning ordinance. He then suggested a more aggressive approach to violations.

He proposed that the staff be directed to check existing mobile homes in the Paradise Canyon subdivision to determine whether they

were there before the passage of the ordinance in July 1982, or were placed in violation of the law.

Then the board must decide what to do with the illegal mobile homes.

However, Wynham also added a practical note. Although empowered to hire staff, the ETZ boards have no money and must rely on county employees to carry out any directives.

"We (the county) enforces no zoning except for the historic preservation zone (around the settlement of Lincoln)," he said. "ETZ may tell me to go out and cite people, but my county commission may say don't send out anyone. You could call on the village attorney or district attorney, but, unfortunately, zoning issues rate low."

T.K. Neergaard said he's lived in the subdivision 17 years during the summers and in a conventional home, but he doesn't believe mobiles would damage the value of his property. He's put in two mobile homes himself and owns 11 lots, but has bought and sold 25 in the last 15 years, he said.

"It should have been zoned for mobile homes from the beginning," he said. "The lots are too small. I'd like to see restrictions (on construction and maintenance)."

Wally Hesse asked the board to consider the condition of the economy and be realistic.

Young couples can't afford high mortgages. A nice mobile home is better than "a ratty house," he said. Barring mobiles would be discriminatory, Hesse contended.

Charles Beem, who owns eight lots, said the term "mobile home" is a misnomer.

"Once they're there, they stay until they rot," he said. "I recently purchased those lots and it was with the understanding the land was not for mobiles, or I certainly would not have bought it. This seems like a step back."

In another matter, Wynham advised Collins that he probably needs to receive approval on replat (layout design changes) of subdivisions from both the village and the county, if they fall within the ETZ zone.

Collins said he was advised about two years ago that only ETZ approval was needed and action by the other zoning boards would be a duplication.

"The ETZ covers zoning and I think it should review the plans, but a replat (which amounts to a change in subdivision plans) is outside of its authority," Wynham said.

"I can't guarantee that those done in the last two years won't be challenged."

He suggested Collins sit down with Ruidoso planning and zoning administrator Cleatus Richards to work out a procedure for review and approval of future replats.

unit. Next year, the figure will be nearly \$1,000 more at \$1,927.

"That's quite an increase," Gladden noted.

It appears that Ruidoso will be doing better than most districts because officials projected a three percent increase, but that figure probably is low, he said. A 40-unit housing development is being built in the Palmer-Pena section of the Mescalero Reservation and Gladden said the staff is trying to figure a safe impact projection on enrollment.

The budget must be delivered by May 18 to the state for review.

"They'll tell us if there are any necessary changes and then the board will vote on it in a public meeting," Gladden said.

"Some nice things are happening for education for a change."

In another issue, special education coordinator Paul Wirth and Dorsey Grover, as part of the Guidance and Counseling Task Force, reported on the results of a survey sent out to help determine the future direction of guidance and counseling in the district.

The top six areas of concern were identified by parents and staff. In order, they are values, drug/alcohol use and abuse prevention, self-awareness and self-protection, positive self-esteem, greater involvement of parents, and programs for potential school drop outs at the earliest possible grade.

Out of 263 responses, 49 came from staff members.

"Now we need to get together and work out the kind of program the district needs to enact," Grover said. One of the major thrusts will be for a kindergarten through twelfth grade intervention approach, instead of crises reaction. To that end, the task force would like to see an additional guidance person at the elementary level, because early intervention is very important, Grover said. Focus also will be placed on education and vocational areas.

Scott Stafford with the Albuquerque firm of Greer/S.J.C.F. Inc. was elated over the bids received by the district on its new elementary school construction project.

"I'm very excited," he said. "We hit a very favorable bidding climate finally, and there was lots of interest."

Seven contractors submitted bids and, although Bradbury and Stamm out of Albuquerque had the low base bid, \$1,945,884, the board followed Stafford's recommendation and went with John C. Cornell Construction from Clovis.

By going with the first four of six alternates and Cornell's base bid of \$1,948,800, the best price will be realized, he told the board.

Stafford said Ray Ward & Sons from Anthony, has filed a formal complaint. However, in reviewing the specifics, it appears Ward followed the same procedure he is complaining about in other bids.

The alternatives eliminated, a parking lot and driveway, will be

submitted to the state for possible financial help. The total project price was \$2,251,963.

"The good news is that now we get those two extra classrooms," said Board Chairman Ron Hemphill.

Stafford wasn't quite as pleased with the progress on finishing up the existing intermediate school construction and work on the administration complex.

"The students have moved in and are using the classrooms," Stafford said of the addition to the intermediate school at White Mountain.

"We hope to finish the maintenance yard (on Gavilan Canyon Road) this week."

"The central office originally was slated to be completed (by Thursday). As soon as the maintenance yard is finished, the contractor will put a whole 12-man crew on the administration complex."

He said the slow removal of a

power pole and weather problems have held up work on the complex.

He estimated six to eight weeks for completion.

Meanwhile Stafford and Gladden earlier this week toured the science labs at Ruidoso Middle School to discuss renovations.

Bids should be submitted on that project by the end of May, Stafford said.

"That only leaves three months or less to build all of it," he said. A roof on the school's art building is sagging and also may have to be replaced.

Gladden said money has been set aside for the middle school improvements, which included new bleachers added earlier in the school year.

In other business, the school board:

—approved rehiring of all personnel with two exceptions, a custodian and a teacher's aide.

—heard reports from Wirth on

the Los Ninos bilingual program and on the Bilingual Education program, which has charted new directions to comply with a change of perspective by the state.

Nob Hill principal Roger Sowder and teacher Pat Hamilton reviewed some of the multi-cultural approaches at that school. Wirth said Shirley Neuhaus has put together programs for the White Mountain schools and has helped tackle the needed approaches in other schools.

—announced an open house April 27 at the tribal center gymnasium in Mescalero. The event will begin at 5:30 p.m. and each school will give a presentation with their students. Bus service will be provided to pick up parents.

The get together was suggested during a meeting earlier in the year with representatives from Mescalero.

—viewed a videotape on a space shuttle program previously organized in another school district.

# White Mountain Task Force takes aim at grant funds to fight drug trafficking

White Mountain Task Force Region 8 is an undercover drug enforcement agency with roots state wide.

Seldom seen and seldom heard from, nevertheless, they add an invaluable service to the community at a large cost that isn't hidden.

It's the best investment Lincoln County has ever made in law enforcement, according to Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane.

Instrumental in bringing the task force to Lincoln County two years ago, McSwane has reason to brag.

Arrests of cocaine and other drug dealers have skyrocketed by 500 percent. Drugs, money and real property confiscated in busts are

turned into working tools for the department in the fight to control substance abuse.

Gonzalo Cordova and Paul Wersich are the two task force officers for Lincoln County. They often enlist certified officers from other counties or states to assist them as undercover agents.

Everything that goes into an undercover operation costs a lot of money, according to Cordova.

Friday, Cordova will turn in a grant application to the state for \$100,000 for next year's operation. That money will cover salaries, equipment, buy-money, informants and everything between to successfully run an undercover operation. The department also would like to add another officer.

Any grant money awarded to the

task force will go to the sheriff's budget that feeds the special unit.

Ruidoso Police Chief Dick Swenor said he will ask the Ruidoso Village Council during budget hearings to supply a man to be on the task force this upcoming fiscal year.

"The task force is invaluable," Swenor said. "We exchange information with them daily."

More than 80 percent of the task force's work is within the Ruidoso area.

Local law enforcement officers contacted are consistent in their praise of the task force efforts.

"They are a continuous operation and, because of their undercover work, few people get to know all the good things they have been doing in the county," said one unidentified

Ruidoso officer.

Village and county officials also extolled the value of the young department.

Ruidoso Village Councilor Bill Karn said he has followed the movement of the task force with great interest.

"You're never going to stop drugs completely," Karn said. "But the task force has done a good job of controlling and even lessening drug deals in the county. If the dealer doesn't know if he's selling to an undercover agent or not, he probably won't deal. That is a deterrent."

Karn said the list of drug busts printed in the paper last year was quite impressive.

"This type of enforcement is vital to the community," Karn said.

# MainStreet meets to mull over finances

Finishing out the year and planning for the coming one will be major items of business for the MainStreet Ruidoso board of directors when they meet at 4 p.m. today.

A year end financial statement will update the group on where it stands now before it discusses the fiscal 1993 budget in new business. MainStreet receives 83.2 percent of its funds from the village of Ruidoso but would like to work on getting more from the private sector in dues.

The biggest expense for the group is personnel at 62.8 percent. The group has a project manager, Don Miller, who directs the organization on a day-to-day basis, and a project consultant, Mary Maul, who works in Santa Fe with the state and federal highway department to make sure the streetscape improvement plan moves smoothly.

A budget committee has been working since the beginning of the month on a financial plan for the coming year. If the budget is ap-

proved today it will go on to the Village of Ruidoso for funding during the council's budget meetings.

The group will also make committee appointments for the coming year so work plans can begin for projects.

Also on the agenda for the meeting are status reports on the streetscape project and the market survey. The streetscape project is out to bid now and a contractor will be selected by the end of the month. Miller had said actual construction could begin by mid-May, but will

stop work July 1 until after Labor Day so visitors will not be turned away from the area.

Market surveys have been sent out and returned by the business community and visitors to the area. Miller is now compiling that information and is preparing to send out surveys to residents. He said the surveys will help determine what projects the group should work on to improve the midtown area and meet the needs of all who use it.

# The Kid captures publicity in car magazine

Information on Lincoln County has shown up in an interesting publication, Car and Driver magazine.

The April issue has a story on a new test vehicle, the Ford Taurus Sho Wagon, that they are calling the Billy Wagon, as in bad or boss, after Billy the Kid, said Joan Bailey, Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce executive director.

The magazine has a circulation of about 935,000, and the article included a map of the entire region

related to Billy the Kid.

# Ute Mountain Indian Tribe applies for federal grant to study hosting nuclear waste disposal

Uncertainty is still the key word in the world of high-level nuclear waste disposal.

Since President Bill Clinton took office in January, nuclear utility operators and nuclear waste disposal protesters have been wondering about the future of the Nuclear

Waste Negotiators Office.

Department of Energy Secretary Hazel O'Leary hasn't drafted a new policy yet, and meanwhile, the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe is waiting for the next step in its series of grants and studies that could lead to the development of a dry cask storage system.

Early this week the Denver Post

reported that another Indian tribe, the Ute Mountain Ute Indian tribe, wants to study the possibility of constructing a nuclear waste dump on its reservation in southwestern Colorado.

According to the Denver Post, the tribe has applied for a \$200,000 federal grant to look into the feasibility of storing highly radioac-

tive spent nuclear reactor fuel.

Like the Mescalero grant, this agreement with the Ute nation carries no commitment to build the site.

Nine tribes have applied for the \$200,000 grants, and the Mescalero and Skull Valley, Utah tribes have been approved, according to the published report.





## Turkey fever strikes New Mexico hunters

For some hunters it is an extremely contagious disease. At this time of year these hunters may be found closed up in an office at odd hours of the day with a mouth or box call practicing yelps, clucks and kee kee runs.

What am I talking about? The spring turkey season is almost here and for many hunters it is the high point of their year.

Spring turkey season begins on April 17 and runs through May 9.

Areas open for turkey hunting during the spring are listed in the Big Game Proclamation. One change this year is that the bag limit for the spring season is two turkeys each with a visible beard in all open areas.

Spring turkey licenses may be obtained from license vendors located throughout the state at a cost of \$10.50 for residents of New Mexico and \$76 for nonresidents. In addition, those hunting on federal lands, either U.S. Forest Service or Bureau of Land Management, anywhere in the state will need to have a \$5.25 Wildlife Habitat Improvement stamp. Revenue generated from this stamp will be used to improve all types of wildlife habitat in the state.

Turkey hunters also have a fall season that runs from September 20-26. The fall hunt does require a different license than the spring sea-



son. The bag limit is also eased to any one turkey for the fall hunt. The bag limit is outlined in the Big Game Proclamation is wrong, but new areas open for the fall season are correct in the proclamation.

By the way, did you know that at one time the future of the wild turkey was in jeopardy?

In the 1930s there were only small, scattered groups of turkeys remaining, mostly in the deep south. The cause of the decline was the clearing of hardwood forests by pioneer settlers combined with subsistence hunting by these same people.

Turkeys had disappeared in Connecticut by 1813, were gone from Ohio by 1860 and no longer existed in Iowa by 1907.

Fortunately, the decline of the wild turkey was reversed when wildlife biologists invented

a net trap. The trap allowed for the capture of whole flocks of wild turkeys that could then be restocked into new areas of suitable habitat.

In less than 50 years such transplant programs have restored wild turkeys to healthy numbers in 41 states. The birds now exist in some areas where they could not be found in the days of the Indians. What an amazing success story.

In New Mexico, the Department of Game and Fish is still trying to increase turkey numbers around the state with transplants. This winter, turkeys were captured in the northeastern part of the state and relocated to the Jicarilla Division of the Carson National Forest and the Manzano Mountains. Another operation resulted in the transplant of wild turkeys from the Bosque Del Apache Refuge to the Black River near Carlsbad and to bosque areas near Los Lunas.

Hopefully, these efforts will continue to expand their range and numbers within the state.

This is good news for the hunter that comes down with a bad case of "turkey fever." You guys keep practicing on those calls, the season is right around the corner.

# Champions head back to Ruidoso Downs for 1993 meet

1992 World Champions Refrigerator and Deceptively are just a few of the many top caliber horses and horsemen expected to return to Ruidoso Downs this summer.

The stable area at the mountaintop oval opens April 19 with the track opening for training April 21.

Starting gates will be up the following week on April 26.

"Our quarter horse program will be strengthened with the purse increase and the inaugural running of the Ruidoso Quarter Horse Futurity," said Racing Secretary Norm Amundson.

"Since Trinity Meadows isn't running quarter horses until August, more horses should be coming here this year," Amundson said.

Quarter horse purses were

boosted \$400,000 for the upcoming season through a joint effort by Ruidoso Downs President R.D. Hubbard and a group of prominent horsemen.

The increase makes races for older horses such as the Grade I World's Championship Classic and Grade I All American Derby \$150,000-added. The Ruidoso Quarter Horse Futurity will debut as a \$50,000-added event with the Rainbow Futurity becoming a \$100,000-added stake.

Trainer Dwayne "Sleepy" Gilbreath is expected to have World Champion Racing Quarter Horse Refrigerator in his barn by mid-summer for the Grade I World's Championship Classic Trials.

The five-year-old gelding dominated his competition last year

with four wins from five starts while campaigning exclusively in California. Refrigerator, winner of the 1990 All American Futurity, made his last start at Ruidoso in the 1991 All American Derby.

World Champion Two-Year-Old Deceptively, the impressive winner of the Kansas and Rainbow Futurities last year, is expected to make a full recovery from the injury that prevented her from winning the Quarter Horse Triple Crown last year.

The Bruce Bell-trained filly should make her sophomore debut in the Kansas Derby Trials in mid-May. Bell also trains Champion Three-Year-Old gelding Femmes Frolic who captured both the World's Championship Classic and All American Derby last season.

A young horse to watch from the Bell shedrow is the filly Femmes Whim, a half-sister to both Deceptively and Femmes Frolic. The Coup de Kas filly was a \$200,000 re-purchase by owner-breeder Roger Knight, Jr. at the Ruidoso Yearling Quarter Horse Sales last September.

Trainer Jack Brooks, winner of the All American Futurity for an unprecedented sixth time last year, will bring a powerful stable stocked with two-year-olds in search of his next All American triumph.

Among the highly-toured juveniles Brooks trains is Six Kix, winner of the West Texas Futurity and West Texas Consolation winner Good Bye Norma Jean.

In addition, Brooks has some talented juveniles that are scheduled to debut in the Ruidoso Quarter Horse Futurity Trials on opening

day. The older horses in Brooks' barn should also make some noise this summer. All American winner Dash Thru Traffic will try to continue his success at the mountaintop oval after being named champion two-year-old colt in 1992.


Mr Eye Opener and Choctaw, both successful in their freshman campaigns, are also expected to threaten as three-year-olds.

The husband and wife team of Arnold and Nene Simmons will bring back last year's Distance-Horse-of-the-Meet Pullastreak who won three 870 and 1000-yard stakes in 1992. The six-year-old quarter horse gelding has dominated the "hook" races at Ruidoso since being converted from a sprinter in 1991 when he also captured three stakes.

Ruidoso Downs' thoroughbred program should once again live up to its' reputation as one of the finest in the Southwest with many top stables returning to the grounds.

"The competition for thoroughbreds is tougher than ever with Arapahoe (in Denver) and Trinity racing when we are, but we should have a very solid program," Amundson said.

Last Don B., the 1992 thoroughbred-of-the-meet after winning four stakes and shattering one track record, will be back to defend his title for trainer Lynda Tanner. The versatile five-year-old gelding won stakes going six furlongs and a mile last year. His mile performance of 1:37.4 in the Ruidoso Budweiser Breeder's Cup bested the old track record by near-

Roberts won five stakes last year, all with different horses, most of whom will return this season. Among Roberts' best campaigners are A Bit Of Style, Hatchetta, Valeme and Lt. Roberts.


Bill Leach should once again bring a well-bred stable of thoroughbreds this year to contest the stakes ranks.

Celadon increased his lifetime earnings to nearly \$80,000. He recorded his 11th career win from 31 starts on Sunday.



"All I'm trying to do is get a policy established so we don't do this thing hastily and that we have guidelines for planning and zoning to go by," Ross said.

A 21-foot strip of Hollis Marcum's estimated 6,000-square foot lot already lies within the village limits. He wants the remainder included, too.

But that situation is not unusual, said James Service, chairman of the zoning board.

A similar situation exists with 64 other pieces of property and 32 owners have the exact circumstances.

"If they all requested annexation, the cost to the village would be more than it could bear," Service said. "The (demand for) water alone would increase 256,000 gallons, which would increase the amount of water rights the village would have to purchase."

The action will set a dangerous precedent, he warned.

"There are no set guidelines and this could lead to charges by property owners of arbitrary and capricious behavior by the town council.

"These types of charges unfortunately lead to accusations of corruption which would be difficult to disprove if there are no standards or guidelines for this decision making process," Service wrote the board in a summary letter.

In the meeting, he added that annexation of property on the periphery of a town historically puts a strain on infrastructure.

"As development gets farther away from the infrastructure core, the costs of providing services increases," Service said. "You get development on the outside at a cost to those inside. That's our main concern, to develop as well as we can inside of the community before doing the outside."

In another matter, the board approved hiring as the contractor for the wetlands sewage treatment project, Drew Engineering of Ruidoso for \$316,000.

"He has a good reputation," Mayor Frank Warth said. "He just finished the Nogal-Alamogordo (water) pipeline."

To stay within the budget, the board removed a \$4,000 alternate covering fencing and a pipe leading to an arroyo. The village already received \$295,000 from the Community Development Block Grant program and put up \$36,069 from its water account as its matching portion.

The wetlands concept, promoted by Dr. Bernie Reimann as a volunteer effort for the village, is based on the concept of using

plants for natural filtration of waste.

In other business, the board: —awarded a contract for gravel to Pat L. Huey, the only bidder at \$11.50 a yard for state cooperative projects. The amount was higher than anticipated and the state transportation department will have to agree.

—created a planning and zoning board of from five to seven members who are property owners in Capitan.

—was told by village clerk Deborah Cummins that about \$1,000 has been collected on liens placed against property for overdue water bills. All but \$100 of any late fees were removed to help people pay off the debt faster, she said. Five were past the four-year state limit and cannot be collected.

—reviewed a proposal to increase fees for residents to dump sewage at the village treatment pond. The charge would be \$12.50 for a 500 gallon tank and would up in increments to \$37.50 for a 1,500 gallon tank. The charge for installing and removing water meters, which hasn't been updated since 1980, also would be increased, Warth said.

—heard a report by village attorney J. Robert Beauvais that the town is taking a more aggressive position regarding local grievance boards under collective bargaining regulations. He said it appears the state is trying to discourage local boards by making them cost prohibitive.

## School board hands out bonus bucks

It doesn't have to be snowing to be Christmas.

Capitan school district employees, on staff before that merry holiday in 1992, will receive a \$600 present from the School Board in June.

Board members last Thursday approved a budget increase, reflecting a higher per student reimbursement from the state and a jump in enrollment.

On a recommendation from superintendent David Lock they passed a chunk of that extra money along to their teachers and non-instructional staff.

"We had two very significant factors that resulted in increases," Lock said. The number of students went up from 506 to 535 and the state reimbursement increased from \$1,845 to \$1,868.

That extra money allowed the administration to look at either awarding a one-time increase or to work the money into the pay schedule. Lock opted for a one-time check in June and the board agreed through its approval of the budget adjustments, which included boosting any other line items in need of financial infusion. The additional money totalled \$207,499.

More good news, athletic gate receipts were \$3,850 above the amount projected, Lock said. Add that to the \$1,303,850 school con-

struction bond issue and the budget was enlarged by \$1.5-million.

**New middle schools**

Construction could begin by September 1 on Capitan's new middle school, according to a schedule presented by Larry Oldrup and David Martin with Architect Plus Ltd.

It may take nine months to complete the school and the project should be wrapped up by June 1, 1994, they said.

With only a short discussion primarily centered on trying to solve the problem of bus parking and pickup areas, the board approved preliminary plans for the school.

Construction was estimated at \$1,072,950 at \$69 a square foot and 15,500 square feet.

Fixed equipment was projected at \$25,000, site work at \$29,000, 10 parking lot spaces at \$8,000, professional fees at \$82,900 (minus a credit of \$7,500), movable equipment (270 desks) at \$13,500, taxes of \$66,700, soil tests and surveys at \$6,000.

In other action, the board: —heard from Lock that State Department of Education officials are pleased that the Capitan cafeteria has been self-supporting for the past three years and does not pull from the district's regular budget.

—accepted the resignations of Kathy Chamman and Lois Coons as HeadStart bus drivers and hired Elizabeth Montes as a driver.

—on a recommendation from Lock, approved the contract renewal of all current instructional staff members.

—approved Laurie Griego as the recipient of the Jessie E. Fay Memorial Scholarship. Her list of accomplishments and credentials was impressive, board members noted. Griego was selected as the 1991 Hugh O'Brien Youth Foundation candidate, to the United States National Honor Achievement Academy, and as the New Mexico State University Honor Roll Student. She served as class treasurer in ninth, tenth and eleventh grade and was class president her senior year.

—was told that Tammy Payne, a Capitan senior and daughter of newly-seated board member Beverly Payne, was recognized by the New Mexico State Department of Education in cooperation with ACT as an ACT scholar for 1992-93.

—recognized The Ruidoso News and the Hubbard Foundation for providing newspapers to students in the sixth grade classes. The program is aimed at showing students that reading has relevance in their daily lives.

—heard Board President Tom Frost read a letter from U.S. Senator Jeff Bingaman, (D-NM) in response to a board resolution requesting the local offices of the U.S. Soil and Conservation Service remain open. Bingaman stated that the prospect of that occurring was good.

## Calendar adopted for the 1993-94 school year

The school calendar for 1993-94 approved by the Capitan School Board includes holidays on Labor Day, September 6; Columbus Day, October 11; Thanksgiving, November 25-26; Christmas, December 20-31; President's Day, February 21; Spring Break, March 14-18; Good Friday, April 1, and Memorial Day, May 30.

Final examinations are scheduled for December 16-17 and May 23-24.

Teacher in-service days are planned for August 17 and February 22.

Nine-weeks end on October 15, December 17, March 11 and May 25.

Parent teacher conferences are set for October 22 and March 25.

The only early dismissal day listed is November 24.

The calendar also will include four half days of in-service on afternoons of the school ski program days.

# Ruidoso Downs trustees track results of promotions plan

An investment in a partnership in October seems to have paid off for the Village of Ruidoso Downs.

Downs trustees said they are pleased with the results of a contract with the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce to help pay the salary of a part-time person to respond to visitor inquiries. When the trustees agreed to contribute \$5,800, they required that the chamber be able to show some positive impact for Ruidoso Downs.

Chamber executive director Joan Bailey showed the group those results at its meeting Monday.

"I can't tell you how appreciative we are of how you have helped us," she said.

In memberships, the chamber now has 17 members from Ruidoso Downs, compared to 10 when the contract started.

Bailey said the chamber had been averaging 150 relocation in-

quiries each month, but in March an advertisement was placed in the "Mature Outlook" magazine. From that the office received more than 600 inquiries and another ad will be run in June.

A guide on Ruidoso Downs, produced by The Ruidoso News, is placed in each of those mailings for inquiries, Bailey said. They also have just one person doing all of the relocation mailings to make sure each packet has all of the information, she said.

During the time of the contract, the chamber had a 24 percent increase in walk-in traffic, a 96 percent increase in phone calls and a 195 percent increase in visitor mailings compared to the previous year, Bailey said.

When the chamber receives inquiries for specific needs such as for lodging and dining, the people are first referred to chamber members, but if these are full then they are referred to non-members.

In cooperative projects with Ruidoso Downs groups, Bailey said she has been working with the Museum of the Horse to attract tour groups to the area and has also done a video with them. She said the older people that go on these tours love to spend money.

She is also placing a full-page advertisement with the Ruidoso Downs Race Track through the New Mexico Press Association in May, which will appear in all New Mexico newspapers.

Bailey has helped arrange radio interviews for the museum, the race track and Blue Grass Festival at Art Fest U.S.A. on "Neighborhood New Mexico" on public radio to promote tourism in the state.

The chamber is now doing a television show on community channel 11, which originates from On Track Inc. of Ruidoso Downs, called "Lincoln County Conversations." The show promotes activities and projects from the entire county.

Bailey is also representing Ruidoso Downs interests on the newly formed Lincoln County Tourism Board. She said it was established through a grant being administered by the Hospitality Studies Department of New Mexico State University.

The board is eligible for funds from the grant to create a map of attractions for the entire county, Bailey said. The map will also be translated into Spanish so it can be of more use in drawing visitors from Mexico to the area.

Trustee Margie Morales said Bailey is doing a good job to help Ruidoso Downs. Mayor pro tem Charlotte Craig, who voted against the proposal when it was first recommended, said Bailey had convinced her the money spent was well worth it. The trustees agreed and thanked her for what she has done.

In other business trustees approved the hiring of Marilyn Kite

for deputy clerk and finance officer to replace Barbara Kilough, who resigned in March. An employment committee rated all applications, without knowing any names, and selected the top three to interview. Kite then scored highest in the interviews.

Although the board had originally planned to send only village clerk Leann Weibrecht to the municipal clerks and finance officers meeting, Morales suggested the meeting may also be good for Kite to attend. The meeting will be April 28-30 at Las Cruces, and Kite will have been on the job a week at that point.

Weibrecht said the meeting would have seminars and workshops that would help Kite learn about her position. The cost to send both will be \$710, but Weibrecht said they could afford to do it since the trustees wanted both to go.

The group also adopted an annual Open Meetings Act resolution and approved the hiring of Dan

Francis as a full-time dispatcher to replace Chris Condon who is now a police officer.

The police department will be getting three new radios to replace ones that have begun to cost too much to maintain. The old radios, which were purchased before 1989, will be traded in but the total for the three new ones will be \$1,305.50.

The radios will be paid for from the Law Enforcement Protection Fund, an allocation from the state that must be used each year.

The board also accepted a written quote from Wit Enterprises of Ruidoso Downs for pipe for the top rail of the baseball field. The cost will be 63 cents per foot for 1,500 feet and they will deliver it to the site. The two other bids were from out-of-town businesses for 65 cents per foot, and \$1.27 per foot.

Mayor Joe Hayhurst was out of town and unable to attend the meeting.

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## Memories mark brother John's birthday

The Birthday of our Brother John

John Whippo Storm, eldest of the Storm Brothers, was born in Denver, Colorado, April 15, 1907, to Lynn Whippo Storm and the former Bertha Catherine Kennedy.

He was named for his grandfather, Captain John Calvin Kennedy, a captain in the thirteenth Illinois Cavalry, during the Civil War and James T. Whippo, notable pioneer of Pennsylvania, who was prominent in the abolition of slavery.

When a little past the age of two years, he and our mother left Seattle in the deep of winter on the steamship Yucatan.

On the first page of a small Episcopal prayer book, a family treasure, are some childish attempts at writing, together with a notation by our mother:

"Written by John W. Storm January 19, 1909, in midocean on the steamship Yucatan."

Our father had gone up to Valdez, Alaska, a few months before, where he worked as a government surveyor, mining engineer and prospector.

John and mother arrived in Valdez in late January 1909, during one of the coldest winters on record up to that time. One of the many family treasures is a photograph of John and mother in front of our little house with snow piled up to the windows and higher still where it had been shoveled away from the door way.

**My Guardian Brother**

The following October 27, I was born. When I was a little more than one year old, I remember John bringing me Jelly Beans and Taffy. One time, our parents tell me, he made the trip through the deep snow "to get candy for Dan."

A year or so later John and I would go down to Mr. Hunt's combination candy and drug store. Before we left, John would fill his overcoat pockets with coal to throw at the malamute sled dogs if they did not get out of the way. John led the way shouting, "Mush," at the malamutes who would then get up out of the middle of the street and lie on the snow

banks next to the sidewalk. In their sled harness, they lay watching us with friendly curiosity at such small people passing by. They looked as large as horses to my young eyes.

At the store, we bought two large striped bags of strawberry-pink, chocolate-brown and vanilla-white taffy for a nickel. On these trips and everywhere we went, John was my guardian brother.

**Back to Alaska**

When I was four years old, we went to the "States" to visit the grandparents and then later back to Alaska — this time to Juneau. Later we went to Oregon and then the little town of Copala, Sinaloa, Mexico, where our father worked for a silver smelter. Here John learned to speak, read and write Spanish.

Since early childhood, John was of a devout nature, serving as acolyte and later as lay reader. He studied for the Episcopalian priesthood at Kenyon College in Gambier, Ohio.

At the University of Texas at Austin, he studied architecture. During World War II, he served with the Army engineers.

On these sunny and flowery April days, I feel the spirit of our brother John very fondly near as he visits me from Heaven at this season of his birthday.

# DECA students take top honors at state convention, head for a national leadership conference in Orlando, Florida

The Ruidoso High School DECA chapter continued its winning tradition again this year at the state convention in March.

Several chapter members will be taking their outstanding projects to national competition April 30 through May 2 in Orlando, Florida.

Before that time they will be revising their manuals and preparing for the toughest of interviews.

The public relations team of chairperson Mario Sanchez, Katie Graham and Faustino Miranda earned first place at state with their project, a membership drive for the Anne C. Stradling Museum of the Horse.

The group called on local residents to tell them about the museum and ask if they would be interested in being a member.

They raised more than \$2,000 in new memberships.

For the state competition, the team submitted a manual with all the details of the project and then had an interview before three judges. They gave a presentation and were then ready to answer any questions and the judges had plenty.

The Learn and Earn project members also went through the same process for their first place finish. Chairperson Melissa Currin, Jason Shaw and Scott Stricklin developed a money raising project to decorate and sell pine cone and bean pod Christmas decorations.

The group sold the decorations for one week in December at Wal-Mart. Currin said they appreciated Wal-Mart letting them set up there because it was such a high traffic

area, and they probably couldn't have been as successful anywhere else.

Since the project had such low expenses the group made about \$700. They also had baskets for sale, but found they had priced them too high and raffled them off instead.

They got the idea for the decorations from the Spiegel's catalog but were able to sell them at one third the price, Shaw said.

The project allowed the students to go through each step of a business venture, from planning to analysis of success. The group described that process in its 40-page manual.

At the state competition the group had an intense 30-minute interview with very tough questions, which were good to help the group prepare for what it might be like at the national meet.

Sponsor Eddie Parker said this was the second year in a row Ruidoso's teams have won first place in the state in these categories, which is a major accomplishment for a small school. No other school had two first place winners in the competition divisions, he said.

Between now and the end of the month these students will be revising their manuals and preparing for the interviews with mock-up situations.

About 80 entries from across the nation will be competing for the top spot. If the students do well in the preliminary interview they could have one of the top projects in the country.

## Honor and gentleness missing in Congress

Viewing the current session of Congress through the television C-SPAN, the viewer is faced with a mixed bag of emotions running a full gamut of disbelief, awe, laughter, humor, frustration, consternation, fright and lastly — anger.

To witness a bunch of overpaid elected representatives consume hours of what is called a debate is simply not to be believed.

Were it possible to erect a giant television screen in cities and towns over this vast country in order for all taxpayers to witness their Congress in action, the reaction would have millions of those taxpayers marching on Washington, D.C., not to discuss issues but rather to close the doors on Congress, to hang those in Congress who had not fled the scene and to burn whatever remained. Witnessing actual events that take place in Congress would be too much to bear.

As proposals and/or amendments are introduced and the pro and con speeches begin, it is immediately evident how the final vote will be decided. Votes are decided on a strict partisan bias — Democrat versus Republican. Cross-over votes are rare. Long-winded speeches do nothing to change the vote whose outcome is predetermined. It appears that each Congressman is jealous in seeing that his vote is recorded by an electrical device — a tote board. While a simple "yea or nay" vote would save a lot of time, the individual's vote would be unrecorded so he insists in a record vote for the folks back home. So, we waste time and money and accomplish nothing.

Bill Clinton campaigned to make specific reductions in governmental spending and has chided the Republicans to the same.

The Republicans obliged, and the Budget Committee ranking Republican, John Kasich (Ohio), presented the Budget Committee a list of more than 150 specific budget reductions for the committee's consideration. The committee, largely Democratic, listened and then accepted none of the Republican recommendations which had been requested by Bill Clinton.

The news made little mention of the ram-rod job performed by the Democrats.

There are a number of newly-elected members now in Congress all eager to do what the folks at home are demanding — reduce governmental expense and the deficit. These

Bill Clinton, in order to improve the economy, has developed what is called an "Emergency Resolution" costing somewhere between \$15 and \$30 billion, depending on the conception of several sets of figure estimated. The problem here is that the present economy is on a rebound, and there are those who say that this money will simply add to the deficit and should not be spent.

It is very interesting to examine just how the Clinton plan is to be spent. This is an emergency request which includes several projects which would stretch the imagination to qualify as emergencies — consider: a sports complex, a swimming pool, a golf course, a movie theater and a parking garage.

Objections by the Republicans went unheeded. In fact, none of these non-emergency projects were explained or discussed. All remained in the emergency package — pure pork, nothing but pork.

So, we have a Congress, backed up by more than 40,000 assistants, voted into office by you and I who go to Washington to vote us into an ever-increasing debt which will outlive all of us and many of our grandchildren. Someday — perhaps.
