Fort Stanton employees allege abuse, nepotism and favoritism

As the staff of Fort Stanton
Hospital gears up for the changes
that will take place at the institu-
tion in the next few years, some
wonder if old problems will be
resolved with the shift in direction
from developmentally disabled resi-
dents to long term care patients.

During periods within the last
two years, employees who contacted
The Ruidoso News contend that
staffing levels dipped dangerously
low, exposing both patients and em-
ployees to possible injury.

One employee complained that
after reporting a possible case of
abuse, he was ostracized by others
at the fort in retaliation.

Inequity in pay, lack of evalua-
tions on which to base raises and
existence of family-tie favoritism
within the center also were among
concerns cited.

Abuse procedures

Fort Stanton's record on abuse
reports is good, said Steve Dossey,
director of the Developmental Dis-
abilities Division of the State De-
partment of Health.

During the calendar year of
1992, only 13 reports were received
through the various channels avail-
able. One report was substantiated,
he said. The types of alleged abuse
ranged from as mild as someone
shouting at a client to someone
striking a client.

But a former employee of the
fort complained that after telling
administration officials about a
possible minor incident of abuse, he
was frozen out by other workers.

"There is a real reluctance to
report any abuses," the person said.
"I had several come back at me and
tell me, 'You just made a mistake
and you're out of here now. We're
going to make life so rough for you.'
That they'll get rid of me for report-
ing abuse.

"That's what scared me. That's
when the light went on and I said
man, oh man.

"I may have been over-reacting
(about the possible abuse), but it
was something that they should
have known occurred."

The employee said because of ex-
tra meetings scheduled at the fort
during that period, people were
being pulled away from their regu-
lar duties and programs were un-
derstaffed.

"With fewer people in different
areas, things tend to happen," the
employee said. "People get over-
worked and are more impatient."

Dossey said retaliation for

reporting abuse is absolutely
prohibited in state policy.

"If it ever comes to our attention,
the employee retaliating would be
disciplined," he said.

Fort Stanton administrator Er-
vin Aldaz said he is very concerned
about his staff's reaction to report-
ing abuse.

"I want people to feel like it is a
positive to report abuse. We want
them to report it without blinking
an eye," he said. "If they do not,
they are as guilty as the person
performing the abuse and the same
disciplinary action can go to them
as the person who did it.

"I can't help it if people ostracize
a reporting person. What I will do if
I know that, I will meet with the
shift or the group of people involved
and say I get the feeling such and
such is occurring and it makes me
sick that anyone would hold any-
thing against an individual for
reporting what they saw. That
leads me to believe that you all may
be hiding something and I will not
condone that and you will be in as
much trouble as the person that we
just took action against. I want it to
stop and if it continues, you may
not be working here.

"But it's a hard nut to crack."

Dossey said abuse investigations
normally are handled by Adult Pro-
tective Services in the state Chil-
dren, Youth and Families Depart-
ment. Because Fort Stanton has
federal standing, an internal inves-
tigation also must be conducted, he

said. Lennie Grieg, with the state so-
cial services division said 99 per-
cent of the abuse reports received
by the state are unsubstantiated.

A special team is sent out to in-
vestigate and recommends action,
she said. The department follows
up to ensure the recommendations
are followed.

"It's not a process that can be
gone through in 24 hours," she said.
She characterized the number of
reports from the fort as "low, very
low."

Depending on the severity of the
type of abuse reported, the state
can send down representatives
from the Licensing and Certifica-
tion Bureau. Law enforcement offi-
cials also may be called into a case.

"Every employee at Fort Stanton
has been trained on this (abuse
reporting procedure) three times
this year," Aldaz said, showing the
procedure outline.

Quarterly meetings are con-
ducted to look at trends and a hu-
man rights committee comprised of
people from outside the facility also
review the data, he said. A quar-
terly report is sent to Dossey.

Staffing levels

At times, teaching staff at the
fort have to juggle an immense
amount of paperwork, as well as
supervise clients, sometimes
without aides to help, according to
employees.

"I didn't keep up on my paper-
work because I spent time on the
classroom work," one teacher told
The News. "I was told when hiring
there would be paperwork, but I
didn't realize it would be another
job."

"She often feared for her own
safety, as well as the safety of
clients when supervision was at a
minimum, the teacher said.

On actual sign-in sheets pro-
vided by the fort, at times only two
employees were present in a cot-
tage with as many as 32 clients.

"That's a very legitimate con-
cern," Aldaz said about the staffing
levels.

"Like anyplace else we do have
people call in sick and can't make it
for legitimate and non-legitimate
reasons. What we do, we substitute
somebody in their places. If some-
body has a concern that there is an
unsafe condition, I wish they would
come talk to me. I have never had
one person do that.

"If someone came to me and said
I think I am in an unsafe situation,
I would immediately call a meeting
with the supervisor and depart-
ment head, and meet with (the
client advocacy staff called QMRPs)
to decide what needs to be done to
make it safe for the residents.

"In some cases, individuals have
been hurt. We deal with clients
that are very difficult, but also it's
the responsibility of this facility

Advisory board stresses using lodgers tax funds to attract tourists

The ability to draw tourists from outside Ruidoso was the emphasis for special events money set aside this year by the Lodgers Tax Advisory Board.

In a meeting last week, the board agreed that other organizations will have to come back for round two. Final approval for all funding will be voted on by the Ruidoso Village Council.

The Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally, a for-profit event owned by Councilor Ron Andrews was approved for \$1,500. The event is in its second year of the new approved funding method and will require a dollar for dollar match.

Hampfest, a not-for-profit venture operated by the Sierra Blanca Ham Radio Club, is also in its second year and asked for \$2,300. Chairman Bob Carey said a dollar for dollar match of \$1,150 was the most the board could approve.

Rocky Mountain Music, a blue grass festival run by Jerry Perry, asked for \$3,635. The second year event will have to match dollar for dollar, the \$1,500 maximum the board will allocate.

Not passing on the first go around was the only village board

request from the Ruidoso Arts and Film Commission. Paul Westbrook asked for money for an old-fashioned Fourth of July concert and picnic.

Commissioner Ed Hyman said he had a problem with events that weren't designed to bring people from out of town.

Other members of the board agreed, saying it was more of a community celebration of Independence Day. Board members said it would be fun, but indicated it didn't meet the spirit of the lodgers tax funding.

"A few years ago, they had the Spring Fling, Wing Ding, Crash Bash Dash Party and they wanted \$5,000 to put it on from the lodgers tax," said Hyman. "That wasn't going to bring one person from out of town, purely a local operation. Boy, did we have a squabble over that one. It all boils down very simply. If it's not bringing people to town, why are we doing it?"

Board member Patricia Espinosa told Hyman of huge sums of money spent in the past.

"Just for your information, until last year, lodgers tax gave \$10,000, \$20,000 for, like, The Museum of the Horse, or the track, All Amer-

ican Festival or whatever, I don't know," Espinosa said.

Hyman agreed that large sums were spent.

"The money was there. There were no limits, and to help them get started, we did these things," said Hyman. "But we can't continue forever."

"Does this meet the criteria for the lodgers tax funds to be spent? According to the budget, they're spending \$3,235 for advertising," Carey said.

Tammie Maddox, village clerk, said the purpose of lodgers tax is to encourage marketing and advertising that promotes tourism, travel and development.

Hyman said the town already is full on the Fourth of July.

Espinosa asked that the Fourth of July concert be set aside.

Another request from Paul Westbrook was to promote the Ruidoso Pops Concert No. 6, by Ruidoso Friends of the Arts.

Hyman said he was familiar with the operation of uplinking the Pops Concert (paying a company to feed a program to its affiliates on a non-guaranteed basis).

He said if a program, (from Ruidoso) was uplinked in Philadelphia, it would have no impact for

an educational channel in Philadelphia and he said it wouldn't remotely impact Ruidoso.

"It's possible it could be put on," said Hyman. But if I were running the station in Philadelphia and had a hundred different shows I could put on, this would be pretty far down the list. And they get inundated with these things."

Uplinking was compared to vanity publishing, where the author pays the publisher to print his work instead of the publisher paying the author for his work.

Councilors who contacted an uplinking contractor in Denver last year were given a list of towns where the program could be picked up, but the contractor said there were no guarantees.

The commission set that program and a request for \$1,500 aside. Another \$1,500 lollipop concert was canceled by the Westbrook.

But Westbrook also asked for an allocation for a play, "Citizens Revenge U.S.A.," a musical comedy-farce, to be presented election year, January 22-23, at the Civic Events Center.

The commission questioned the sketchy advertising plan and said

the local applications may disqualify it.

Espinosa said she wanted to invite the people back to more clearly explain their program.

Hyman said he didn't believe in financing advertising on a gamble that it may or may not be shown on some educational television station.

Artfest U.S.A. owned by Cindy Breedlove asked for \$5,000.

Espinosa said she didn't like the concept of spending lodgers tax for an ongoing promotion. Carey expressed the same reservations.

Hyman said people were coming in from all over the country for exhibits. He said \$1,500 to get them started may be a wise decision.

Espinosa said it was like the Museum of the Horse, although she said the Museum was not for profit. She said if anyone was allowed to advertise, other than a special event, everyone would advertise.

Maddox said at this time, the board should be concerned about special events.

Artfest is planned in the Fantasy Mountain area of Ruidoso Downs.

Hyman said Rocky Mountain Music's blue grass festival was being booked into the Artfest area, and would also help that company.

Espinosa said it was an on-going for profit business and questioned the use of lodgers tax funds. She said "if they were talking of advertising a special event within that business, that would be different."

The annual Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium, a multi-day celebration of the old West tradition, passed for \$1,500.

Museum of the Horse, a not-for-profit business in its second year, passed for \$1,500. The museum holds weekly free events for area citizens.

The All American Festival, a not-for-profit venture profitable for many local charitable organizations, passed for lodgers tax funding. The festival is a weeklong event.

A request from Bonnie Maddox to promote the annual Christmas Jubilee passed.

The Chili Cookoff, a not-for-profit venture staged during Aspenfest by Paul Crown, passed for lodgers tax funding.

Maddox said representatives from the Arts and Film Commission, the Friends of Music and the Arts and Artfest U.S.A., will be invited back to further explain their advertising programs.

and the Department of Health to make any adjustments we need."

"The fort does not have a high accident rate for either clients or employees, he said.

"We have the lowest workman's comp rate of all the five state hospitals under the Department of Health," Aldaz said. "If I did not have good workman's comp rates, I would have to reconsider and say you know they're right."

"The last thing I want is for somebody to be hurt. The last thing I would tell you, too, is that I didn't want more staff, that would be crazy, as long as it is legitimate, because I also have a responsibility to the taxpayers."

"The reason I know we are covering some of that is that my overtime has doubled and tripled. So that shows me when I have someone call in, I'm literally calling others in to take their place."

"That does not mean that I am not willing to continue to look at different areas to see where people are calling in when they shouldn't and where we can improve."

Dossey said the fort has experienced a couple of lean years in staffing, but that the situation has improved recently.

"We don't require staffing ratios, but there must be enough staff to adequately deliver the service," he said. "The number of accidents reported at the fort is not at a level of concern, he added."

A staff utilization study is being prepared, which should point out critical areas that may be short of personnel, Aldaz said. An accident trend analysis is being put together on a cottage by cottage, shift by shift, incident by incident basis on the residents' side.

"If anybody has 10 or more incidents of accidents within the quarter, we do a special analysis by an unusual incidents coordinator central records lady who is trained in investigations to go in and literally diagnose, investigate and analyze those incidents and tell us if they are of a severe nature, medium or minor nature," Aldaz said.

"From here on our staffing ratios just get better. This year alone I've added six positions, a lot are QMRPs to do the advocacy work (and handle most of the paperwork) and a psychiatric technician, whose job mainly is to gauge the benefit of the medication compared to behavioral outbursts."

"On my last audit (by the state) in November, I did not receive any deficiencies. In fact, I did not receive a staffing deficiency until 2 1/2 years ago. I added 20 residential staff in one shot. I was overjoyed."

Aldaz said the state has required one employee to eight clients in the morning and evening, and one to 16 during the graveyard shift.

"That's still acceptable staffing, but they threw in a catch 22 a few years later," Aldaz said. "They now say whatever is needed to carry out

each program. So when they audit, they don't look at whether have five staff, three staff or two staff. They look at that program plan for that individual. If you say from eight to ten, you're going to do tooth brushing, face washing, getting dressed and you can't meet it, because you don't have enough staff, you get a deficiency."

"One of the requirements of the Jackson litigation (which resulted in a 1990 court ruling to relocate developmentally disabled clients to community programs and to change the direction of care at the fort), was to have full time QMRPs and a psych tech."

"All the paperwork that took staff away from their client work is how I was able to convince the state to give me the QMRPs in December," Aldaz said. "My staff was crying to me and I have to work with them. I try to be fair."

"I see better patient care and that's what it's all about. The QMRPs are full time here and they are advocates for the patients. Their job is to be coordinators of the individual plan for each resident and to make sure it gets carried out on all levels."

"It's an extremely important position. They have to be either a certified teacher, a social worker, a psychologist, a physical therapy occupational therapist, anybody in the clinical area that has three to four years in DD."

When aides are not available to help in a school setting, cottage supervisory personnel are assigned to help teachers.

"A lot of people don't want to recognize that, but they are full time employees," Aldaz said. Temporary replacements also often are hired to fill in, he said.

"I have temporary employees in this place all the time just to substitute so these places won't be left void," Aldaz said. "I gain nothing by having vacant positions. I try to keep zero vacancies because they state will take vacant positions away from me."

Jobs and wages

The pay scale at Fort Stanton represents one of the best in Lincoln County.

Certified teachers, supervisory and administration officials top the ladder. In the 1992-93 budget, Administrator Ervin Aldaz' salary was listed as \$53,653.

A former four-year employee and union representative said requests for salary schedules often went unanswered and raises frequently appeared to be set more by whim and personal preferences than by documentation.

"I encountered nepotism and favoritism while I worked at the fort," the former employee said. "I personally was selected for a job before it was posted."

"There's preferential treatment. If you're timid, they'll tell you no raise," he said.

One contract employee complained that she received no

evaluation for two years. She was disturbed to learn that a colleague received a raise several thousand dollars higher than any other contract staffer.

Instead of offering new employees what they are worth, administrators look at the lowest salary a person will take, she said.

State officials told The News several avenues to address wage gripes are open to both classified and contract employees. They were unsympathetic with the complaints detailed, however.

"There always are going to be disgruntled employees," Dossey said. "Just because there are three or four doesn't mean their perspective is valid."

Unlike classified employees who are fit into a state designed pay scale by job description, teachers negotiate their own contracts, Dossey said.

"They agree to a certain salary," he said. "It's their commitment and frankly, it's none of their business what other teachers are paid. They are not protected under the state system."

If gross inequities appear in certain job groupings of classified employees, the state may come down and take a look at an entire division and revamp it, said Anthony Legits, human resource administrator supervisor for the state.

If an employee believes jobs are not being posted correctly or honestly, they can dispute or challenge anything that appears contrary to regulations, Dossey said.

"There is an internal due process and then, if it is not resolved at the local level, it goes to an independent state board."

A grievance process also is available to employees, although state officials told The News no complaints have been filed in reference to wages.

Aldaz said he is not aware of any job being promised before posting.

"It's illegal in my mind," he said. "If I've found out it's done, I probably would take action against the supervisor and re-post the job. The exception might be if no one else on the list qualifies. A lot of times we get sour grapes, but they didn't react in time or didn't qualify."

Eligibility for hiring also is handled by the state, which compiles the job descriptions and reviews the backgrounds of applicants and determines whether they are qualified for a position, Dossey said.

"If they (applicants) are not on the list of eligibles, we can't hire them," Aldaz said. "We send their job applications up and the state tells us what they are qualified for."

Some of the problems cited by former and current employees may be covered in labor contract negotiations this year, he said.

An advisory committee of non-management people representing the different areas of the fort and Aldaz meet about every quarter, especially since the transition began, he said.

"Under labor management negotiations, we came up with a labor management committee meeting on monthly basis and share information with each other and get it out to all other employees," Aldaz said.

"I try to have at least once or twice a year, a meeting with all of the employees at one time. Usually, we can get 75 percent together to go over what's happening to Fort Stanton, to their jobs."

One or two teachers at the fort complained about the salary schedule and, in response, it was updated in February, Aldaz said.

"We have a totally new updated salary schedule that was finished (in February), because we're going into contract negotiations with our teachers. We try to average it out with some of the local communities. Elliott Topper (who supervises the teachers) worked on that."

Looking over the 1992-93 budget for the fort, wide ranges in pay are evident under similar job titles. Some workers received higher increases from one year to the next along with reclassifications.

Aldaz said evaluations only recently were reintroduced.

"I have 30 evaluations sitting in front of me right now that will be directly associated with raises," he said.

"The reason we stopped giving evaluations in a lot of state facilities, they encouraged us to, but we were not mandated, because the evaluations no longer gave a raise."

"A year ago this July, that would be July 1992, they started in and said you will get a three percent increase if you get a satisfactory or above evaluation. So all of that was reinstated on a statewide basis July 1992. You always had the evaluation process available to you, if you wanted, for two reasons; one on the negative side so if someone was not performing good to let them know, or in a positive sense to give someone a stroke on the back, but no longer equated to a raise."

"Had they been equated to a raise, there would be no way on earth that we would have allowed anybody to go without one."

During the period without evaluations, there also were no (discretionary) raises, Aldaz said.

"If you look back at state government, they were giving one to two percent across the board. So come July 1, everybody got that," he said.

"But (there were) no merit raises. They went out the window two or three years ago. They do not exist. Even now they do not exist."

When asked about the teacher who received the big jump in salary, Aldaz said he was an exception.

"The exception that somebody can have is a school teacher. They are the exceptions, because we sign a contract with them every July 1, and we do have the flexibility to maybe give them an increment increase," Aldaz said.

He acts on the recommendations of supervisors. In the case of the teacher who received a large increase, the man handled two programs for a by-himself for a long period," Aldaz said.

"He handled two programs, staying late, doing the paperwork and keeping up with the QMRP notes and doing all of this," Aldaz said. "The reason we upped him, he was one of the lowest paid teachers to begin with, but he was not only doing what the other teachers were, but more and for a long period of time."

"If we ever get into a money crunch, he could handle two or three programs. He's already shown that. That's the rationale for it."

With most employees receiving minimal raises of a few percentage points, some questioned why the fort in previous years has budgeted an item called "refund" to the state.

Paul Minogue in the finance division of the health department told The News that for the past two years the hospital has returned "virtually nothing" to the state at the end of each fiscal year.

"In fact, in both years, we added money from other hospitals to its budget. It had to keep fully staffed while undergoing changes," he said.

Minogue said the refund item covers late Medicare payments, Aldaz said it also may include the sale of lunch tickets.

Nepotism

A brief review of a list of Fort Stanton employees shows more than a quarter are related and the breakdown includes many of Aldaz' relatives.

"A lot of people see it as a real problem," he said. "I do not. I have been associated with all five state hospitals in New Mexico for the last

20 years. All five have exactly the same situation I have here, because many times it's a community that feeds into the employment."

He tries to avoid problems by not having relatives work in the same area. If that's not possible, he attempts to transfer them as quickly as possible. If two employees in the same section marry, Aldaz said he encourages one of the duo to try for advancement or a new position.

"If someone comes to me with complaints of nepotism or favoritism, then it's my job to reassign people to ensure that situation does not occur," Aldaz said. "But with as much potential as it has for happening in any of our facilities, I'm surprised how little it occurs."

"If someone gets into trouble, everything under the sun is a problem all of a sudden. It's nepotism, discrimination, harassment. Some are legit. A lot are not."

"The reason I left here in 1976 was because my father and mother were working in the same facility. I did not want any undue pressure on my parents. They were here before I was. When I came back, my dad passed away and my mom stopped working. It's not an easy thing, but if you use common sense and managerial discretion, you can live with it very easily, because it's a hard thing not to have."

Whether Aldaz' explanations are valid or inequities do exist will be up to the state and the employees to hash out, if they decide to file grievances or take other action.

Aldaz said he understands the pressure under which the staff has been required to work the past two years and how that may intensify any already existing feelings of dissatisfaction.

"We've had many meetings dealing with the uncertainties during this transition period, but I will not allow anyone to take it out on the residents," he said. "We try to set up support groups to discuss things. That's why we set up an advisory committee. We have to come to grips with the decision made."

"Of course, the tension is there. I go to court and listen to people say 'Your place is no good, it's isolated. We hate institutions. They are snake pits.'"

"If you saw a snake pit out there today, I'd be shocked. We do the best we can with our environment."

Shelter is crowded with dogs, dogs & more dogs

Compelling ice blue eyes draw Lincoln County Humane Society shelter workers to Blizzard, but it's his calm temperament and appreciation for affection that keeps bringing them back.

He bears the coat markings and texture of his Malamute ancestors, but at about two years of age, it's

evident Blizzard won't attain the full physical size of that breed.

Taken from his previous owner because of abuse (including not feeding him enough), Blizzard needs a home where his beauty and devotion will be appreciated.

He loves to have his stomach rubbed and is a cuddler, according to volunteers who care for him.

"He'd be good with children," said shelter secretary Kathy Tetreault.

A little more lively companion and one who is a lot smaller is Muffy, a terrier release who's about six months old and white.

"She is shy at first, but warms up quickly and loves to show off by dancing in her cage," Tetreault said.

Although small bodied, she has long legs and interacts well with children.

"She's young and trainable," Tetreault said. "She's not a barker

and her pen is clean each morning, so if she's not completely housebroken, she's close to it."

Both Blizzard and Muffy would have to be sterilized, a requirement for all adoptions from the shelter as spelled out in the legal contracts each new owner signs. Ruidoso also has a mandatory spay and neuter law, and in July, a similar state law takes effect.

To see why the law is needed, take a look at the 30 puppies now housed at the shelter. Many will have to be destroyed, because there are not enough homes for them, yet irresponsible pet owners continue to allow their animals to breed.

For every human born, 15 dogs and 45 cats are brought into the world. Unfortunately, the same negligent owners who allow this reproduction also often refuse to accept responsibility for their actions and expect the taxpayer and supporters of the society to take care of

their mistakes. They don't seem to care about the pain and death they cause the helpless, blameless and loving animals they leave behind.

Stop the ugly legacy caused by ignorance, shelter workers urge pet owners. Help eliminate the need for euthanasia, except in cases of severe injury or illness.

Puppies and more pups

An exceptionally attractive group of puppies in the six to seven-week-old range now are available for adoption from the shelter in a variety of breeds and colors.

When they are six months old, they too must be sterilized.

The selection includes a perfect pair of ivory-colored cocker spaniels, three German shepherds, one female dubbed Zodiac with blue eyes and a most serious expression, several Australian shepherds, a few labradors and many, many com-

binations of husky, retriever, Rotweiler, soft-coated griffon and unknown, but adorable breeds.

Shelter workers also want to highlight a seven- to eight-year-old sheltie who was brought to the society as a stray.

"He's in excellent condition with a good coat, but walks slowly," said assistant manager Cindy Propser.

"He can do tricks and obviously was well-cared for at some point in his life. He is housebroken and doesn't have any destructive behavior like chewing.

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

units. All units will be for sale to qualified applicants under the Housing Authority guidelines.


"This is an excellent opportunity for low to moderate income persons to now own a residence in Ruidoso," said Ortega.

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
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
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

RHS grad returns as a coach

A Ruidoso High School graduate will return home to take on the challenge of coaching the Warrior boys basketball team next year.

Paul Kirkwood, a 1980 graduate of Ruidoso High School, will be recommended to the Ruidoso School Board for the position at its next meeting. High school principal Don Weems introduced Kirkwood to his future players, assistant coaches and school board members at a meeting at the high school Wednesday.

Kirkwood received his degree from Eastern New Mexico University in 1985 and student taught at Roswell High School, where he got his first coaching experience. He said he was anxious to coach so he volunteered to work with a group of sophomore players.

He has been teaching and coaching at Roswell ever since, but was excited to be coming home.

"Ruidoso is a great place to live. I went to high school here, and I want my children to graduate from here, too," he said.

Kirkwood told the group of players that the year he graduated, 1980, was the first year Ruidoso was in district 3AAA. That year Ruidoso graduated 98 kids, while Deming graduated 250, he said. Being the smallest school in the district many people thought they would never be able to compete, but the next year the team proved them wrong, as the Warriors picked up the district championship.

In the state competition that year, the Warriors knocked off St. Pius in a surprise win and were then defeated in the semi-finals.

"It can be done again. You are the start of it," Kirkwood said. "It's not fun to lose and sports are supposed to be fun."

Kirkwood warned the kids he is very enthusiastic, and he may seem a little wild on the bench, giving the kids bear hugs as they come off the court. He said he hopes that enthusiasm rubs off on the players and through the whole school and community because he wants to fill the stands.

Regardless of whether they win or lose, if fans like what they see they will come back game after game. Kirkwood said the home gym is supposed to give the team a 10-12 point advantage, but that hasn't been happening for Ruidoso.

He told the athletes that they have to get more students involved not just in athletics but in clubs and activities. Involvement should also help the students grades go up, and grades are important to him, Kirkwood said.

"Basketball and athletics mirror life. Sometimes you win, sometimes you lose, and you have to deal with that," he said.

Kirkwood said he wants to make the team into a family, make all one. He said he wants every ethnic group to work together and learn to get along, which will help the players as they go on with life.

Discipline will also be an important part of the program.

"If you can learn self-discipline now it will help later down the road," Kirkwood said.

He said in all of his years coaching he has had only one player get a technical foul. There will be times when players mess up and they will get upset on the court. Kirkwood said he hopes they can learn from these experiences.

Kirkwood and his wife, Brenda, have two children, four-year-old Klayton and two-year-old Kayla.

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

Deceptively goes for 6th straight win in Kansas Derby

Roger Knight Jr.'s undefeated filly Deceptively seeks her third career stakes triumph as she goes to post as the overwhelming favorite in the Grade I \$122,333 Kansas Derby, Memorial Day at Ruidoso Downs.

The 400-yard Derby features some of the top 8-year-old quarter horses in the nation including stakes winners Choculo and First Down And Ten.

Deceptively captured both the Kansas and Rainbow Futurities last year and could have become only the second horse in history to win the Quarter Horse Triple Crown if not for a leg injury which sidelined her the remainder of the year.

The daughter of Runaway Winner made a triumphant return to the races two weeks ago in the Kansas Derby Trials with an easy 1/2-length victory and posted the fastest qualifying time of :17.765. Deceptively broke sharply from the #10 post in the trials and was never challenged en route to a wire-to-wire win.

The speedy filly has yet to lose in five career outings and has compiled earnings of \$186,000 for owner Knight of Madisonville, Texas. The Bruce Bell-trained has beaten her foes by an average margin of 2 1/4-lengths and seems to be in top shape to continue her

dominance as a 3-year-old.

The filly drew the #4 post position in the finals and was posted as the 4-5 morning line favorite.

First Down And Ten and Choculo, both stakes winners as 2-year-olds, also seem to have returned in good shape this year. The Jack Brooks-trained duo combined to qualify for eight futurities last year and each won one.

Choculo won the Grade I Sun Country Futurity at Sunland Park and First Down And Ten won the Grade 3 Ruidoso Sale Futurity and also ran third in the All American Futurity. In the trials, First Down And Ten qualified with a time of :19.915 with a place effort behind

Super Duper Couper.

Choculo ran third behind Deceptively with a time of :20.30.

Second fastest qualifier Cream To The Top won the first trial division with a time of :19.786 and could be a sleeper as an 8-1 morning line longshot in the finals. The filly resides in the Fred Danley shedrow and most recently placed in the Southwest Derby in Albuquerque.

The remainder of the ten-horse field is listed by qualifying time: Desert Orchid (:19.840), Specially Fast (:19.875), Super Duper Couper (:19.915), All Americancash (:19.965), Time Bender (:20.025) and Perfect Sign (:20.035).

The Memorial Day co-feature is the \$30,000-added Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity for 2-year-old New Mexico-bred thoroughbreds going five furlongs.

The competitive field of ten is headed by the Simon Buechler-charged Saint Patties Lucy who is undefeated in three career starts. The filly won her Ruidoso debut in style with an impressive 3 3/4-length score in the May 21 trials.

The daughter of Tilt The Odds ran the five furlongs in a quick :58.3 seconds.

The 14-race holiday program also includes a simulcast of the

Grade I \$500,000 Metropolitan Mile from Belmont Park, New York. The race should attract a quality field of the nation's top older handicap runners including Bertrando, Ibero, Alydeed and Fly So Free.

The live program is concluded with three simulcasts from Hollywood Park. The featured event is the Grade I \$500,000 Hollywood Turf Handicap. Expected in the classy field is Best Pal, Val Des Bois, Leger Cat and Bien Bien.

All wagers made on Hollywood Park simulcasts are common-pooled with the Inglewood, California, track.

Before introducing guest speaker James Sanchez, an appointed member of the State Board of Education, Griffin was asked to comment on the resignation of Magistrate Judge J.R. "Jim" Wheeler.

"I have asked the governor to appoint a good Democrat," said Griffin, who stressed that she won't use her county office to try to influence that choice.

Guest speaker Sanchez, who lives in Lincoln and recently retired from New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell, gave an overview on the State Board of Education — a state board that still has policymaking authority.

Sanchez said his board sets policy and direction for primary and secondary schools in New Mexico, and is responsible for accrediting private schools.

The state board, with some elected members and some appointed ones, is responsible to the people of the state, and also works with local school boards.

Public education in New Mexico works with a budget of more than \$1 billion — about 48 percent of the general fund — but there's more to it than money, said Sanchez.

He said his board's major concern is the children of the state, who need an education and don't even have a vote. His board, also is working to get educators' salaries up to keep good teachers in New Mexico.

Sanchez, a Hondo High graduate who has spent years in education, encouraged parents and others to get involved in the schools.


He was born May 31, 1922, in Bogota, Texas, to William Henry Parker and the former Bennie Hill.



Logo contest is a terrific idea

What a great idea for the village to invite the community to participate in its search for a new logo and flag. Community events director Kathleen Michelena is soliciting entries to be used in the design of Village of Ruidoso decals and promotional items.

It's good to see the village do something so positive for the image of the community, and we applaud Kathleen Michelena and her staff. We hope many artists participate, and we hope the village treats their artistic endeavors with respect. For instance, most artists would not want their winning design used on trash cans and dumpsters, but they would be proud to have their work affixed to flags, brochures and informational signs.

The Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority conducted a successful logo contest. Artist Debbie Jones won that contest, and her creative graphic is used wisely on letterhead and in advertising materials. Jones' art, to the authority's credit, has not been placed inappropriately on trash receptacles.

Some people might think twice before entering this contest, especially in light of the last such contest. Just a few years ago the village, under a past administration, asked the community to name its newest park. That park, Wingfield Park, has never been opened to the public, and it is now being offered for sale.

Wingfield Park, purchased through a court settlement, includes a lovely little log cabin at the base of Grindstone Lake. When it became village property it was in good shape, surrounded by beautiful lawns and trees with a creek running right by the house. It could easily have been opened as a party house and park to be used for picnics and family reunions and such. After spending more than \$200,000 to acquire this park, the village leadership at the time did nothing. The cost to open this park to the public would have been next to nothing. Revenues for renting the cabin would have quickly covered the cost of any needed remodeling.

But it never happened, and this village — with an economy based on recreation and tourism — is now selling what could be a lovely little park. Selling Wingfield Park is a dreadful and short-sighted mistake.

Dan Swearingin complains about editorial

TO THE EDITOR:

I was pleased to read the editorial of May 20 in The Ruidoso News ("News") that "folks have a right to voice their beliefs ...". The statement that "... we would defend their right with the same vigor that we protect our own First Amendment rights" is very heartening.

I am proud to say that I played a small part in the petition by signing it and preparing the cover letter....

The petition reads "Raljon, Inc. is respectfully requested to institute changes in the publishing, editorial and reporting policies and practices of The Ruidoso News so as to accentuate the positive attitude in Ruidoso's governance, business community and citizenry." If this is a "big change," so be it.

The contention of The News in the May 24 editorial that the petition "... demands changes ... in PERSONNEL ..." is not what the petition says. How could the unnamed writer of that editorial possibly interpret "is respectfully requested" to mean "demand"?

If The News considers the petitions to be of so little importance, which the editorial writer seems to be indicating, why all the niggling over the verification of signatures, the number of signatures which "count," the length of time the petition were circulated, the diligence used in obtaining signatures, and whether some husbands/wives have signed for the other... ad nauseum.

The only requirement to sign, as the petition states, is that "the undersigned citizens have invest-

ments and interests in Ruidoso ..."

No other requirement is evidenced. The News has contacted some petition signers in an attempt to obfuscate and eclipse the stated intent of the petitions. The basic fact is very clear. At least 322 people are respectfully requesting "... changes in the publishing, editorial, and reporting policies and practices of The Ruidoso News ..."

We assume that the invitation to come down to The News office and remove your name from the petition also includes the invitation to come down and add your name to the petition.

Assault on the free press is very dangerous

TO THE EDITOR:

This is a response to a recent letter to the editor which I would like you to consider for publication.

I was appalled by the letter of Dan D. Swearingin, The Ruidoso News, Thursday, May 20. I was appalled by its tenor. I was appalled that people which I hold in high esteem had underwritten the so-called "petition."

Allegedly the so-called "petition" contains 322 signatures, not many. That amounts to about 10 percent of the residents in Ruidoso, perhaps less. But already 10 percent are too many!

You have to excuse me: Twice in

my life I have experienced similar actions, i.e. the attempt to dominate the press by a political persuasion. The first one I grew into without noticing it. Everything the members of this persuasion did not like was suppressed. It ended in a terrible disaster.

Not half-true as alleged in Mr. Swearingin's letter.

If our elected officials make a fool of themselves that is good to know. The news media have the right to report that, and The Ruidoso News has done so in ver-

bal quotations.

If Mr. Swearingin does not like The Ruidoso News, why does he read it? He does not have to. Nobody forces him to do so!

But to try to force, with his so-called "petition" of a minority, to change the editorial direction of a newspaper toward his own, narrow, more right-radical points of view is dangerous. It deprives the free press to say what it wants to say and how to say it. This, Mr. Swearingin, is dangerous, very dangerous.



Programs this month will include the following:

Brainstorm: The Truth About Your Brain on Drugs, a 3-2-1 Contact Special will present a complex subject like the effects of drugs on the brain and nervous system in a way that eight- to twelve-year-olds can understand. The program is presented by the Children's Television Workshop, producers of Sesame Street.

Victims at Birth reveals the reasons that the number of babies born with very low birth-weights and other serious life-threatening health problems are on the rise, while **Drug Babies** addresses the problem of children who are born ad-

dicted to heroin or crack cocaine. The half-hour documentary, narrated by a teenager, features interviews with mothers who have taken drugs or alcohol while pregnant and medical professionals who work with the babies and their mothers.

We Never Talked About My Drinking examines the national crises of alcohol-related deaths, and the increasingly apparent relationship between alcohol and hospital-admitted illness and injury.

Next month, two more outstanding series will begin. In **Wasted**, some answers are provided for parents who want to know what causes a young person to begin experimenting with drugs, and what the chances are for rehabilitation. **Wasted** tells the stories of three teenagers—Mike, Mai-Lin, and Kim—in their own words, without narration or adult intervention.

Bradshaw On: The Family, a ten-part series starring lecturer and Family Systems Counselor John Bradshaw, focuses on the dynamics of the family. According to Bradshaw, research shows that 96 percent of all families are to some degree emotionally impaired. He defines it as one of the most serious problems of our day, one deserving national attention.
