## Council splits on hotel deal

Deadlocked at three-to-three, the Ruidoso Village Council's motion to allow racetrack owner R.D. Hubbard an extension on his \$100,000 deposit to hold a hotel site failed Tuesday.

Around midnight, the council returned from a two-hour closed session split on how to approach Hubbard on his extension request.

Unless a compromise is effected, the village's only commitment to build a convention hotel appears to serious jeopardy.

Councilor J.D. James made the motion to extend the lease agreement and provided for village approval in the event of gambling is allowed in the state with a percentage of the gross to be negotiated. The hotel would be downgraded

from 200 rooms to 125 to 150 rooms, designed for immediate expansion.

Attorney Don Dutton, representing Hubbard, said hotel representatives visiting the village suggested downsizing the hotel at this time.

Councilors James, Jerry Shaw and Frank Cummins voted for extending the lease. Mayor Pro-tem Barbara Duff and councilors Ron Andrews and Bill Karn voted against the extension.

Andrews made a second motion for Hubbard to pay the \$100,000 as consideration for the granting of the extension, downsizing to 125-150 rooms. His motion called for the village to get a two percent gross of the gambling revenue. Karn asked to amend the motion to

## Teachers pay gets a boost from state

In the last four years, the total budget of the Ruidoso School District has increased by more than 40 percent from just under \$11-million to \$15.5-million.

But the portion of the budget designated for operations has grown at a more modest rate of about 10 percent from \$7.3-million to \$8.1-million.

The difference between operations and the total budget represents special funds, debts and grants.

Teacher raises account for some of the increase, but are offset, in part, by a more generous per full-time student equivalent reimbursement from the state.


The state also mandated that beginning teachers be given a one-time shot at a starting salary of \$22,000, up from \$18,344.

Teachers making under \$32,000 end up with a 6 percent raise through the combination of a 3.5 percent boost and a step up on the salary matrix. Those earning more than that amount would receive 4 percent.

"I can't stress enough that this increase is a one-shot deal" unless money to pay for continued salary increases comes down from state and federal sources, said board president Ron Hemphill.

Finance Officer Caron Snow said the amount of operation dollars

## Recycling program is big success

If community support carries any weight, the survival of the recycling program in Lincoln County is assured.

Since opening its doors 22 months ago on Second Street in Ruidoso Downs, the recycling center of the Solid Waste Authority has seen the number of customers dropping material there increase from 90 cars a month to 300.

"In the last 13 months, from May 1992 through May of this year, 5,123 people came to our recycling center," said recycling coordinator Kerry Krumsiek. Six area schools, more than 60 businesses and several service organizations also are using the center on a regular basis, he said.

Last summer, when igloos were set up at our high traffic areas throughout the county, the first site at Furr's filled up within a few days, Krumsiek said. Before the igloos, the center was taking in 10,000 to 15,000 pounds per month, but since the igloos were placed, the volume has jumped to an average of 41,000 pounds per month.

By comparison, we have one of the highest per capita rates of recycling in our state. Roswell, with a population of 44,654 and an igloo system, receives 62 tons per month. That computes to 2.8 pounds per

## Performing arts center on hold

Some things are worth waiting for, and that's definitely the case with the Spencer Theater for the Performing Arts.

Plans for the performing arts center are on hold for a year because of funding.

"We intend to do this in about a year," said Jackie Spencer, whose private foundation is developing the multi-million dollar center. She and her husband, Dr. A.N. Spencer, are continuing with their commitment to develop and open a theater.

"It won't be long," said Mrs. Spencer. "I hope to have this by 1996. We think we can do that."

But for now, funding has put the project on hold.

The Spencers still have the same property allocated, and a sign will soon be placed to indicate where the theater will someday sit. The land is between the Village of Ruidoso and the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

"We've had our architect work-

ing on the plans," said Spencer, noting that the concept is pretty much finalized. The center will seat 800 people.

"I am particularly anxious to have perfect acoustics because I love classical music," said Spencer.

An acoustics consultant with Artec, from New York City, already has visited the site and worked with the architect, Spencer said. Artec worked at the Myerson Concert Hall in Dallas, Texas, whose management recommended them.

Early plans included an outdoor amphitheater, but the final plans instead include a bandstand and a landscaped park area around the center.

"We decided against the outside amphitheater," said Spencer. "We will build the bandstand and have park all the way around where people can have picnics and enjoy music on Sunday afternoon."

Spencer said she had a wonderful experience at a concert back

east on the Charles River in Boston.

"That was a wonderful night, and that's where I got the idea I had the most delightful afternoon."

Spencer said she and her husband are excited about the project and are looking forward to the day when the center will be a reality.

It will be so delightful, she said, picturing family picnics and friends sharing wine while listening to a wonderful music.

"We're putting in musicals from New York," she said. Spencer said the center will be suitable for all kinds of musicals, concerts and performances except opera.

"I don't want to beat the bushes for funds," said Mrs. Spencer. "But, we think in a year, we'll be in a position to build."

"We anticipate being able to rekindle the program unless our new president restructure the tax system to make such a project prohibitive.

## Solid waste group pinpoints top five director candidates

Five applicants have been picked for personal interviews out of 11 who sent in resumes for the position of Lincoln County Solid Waste manager.

The interviews will begin at 10 a.m. today at the recycling center on Second Avenue in Ruidoso Downs. They will be closed to the public.

Those chosen by a screening committee include only one person with a background in solid waste management and all had local con-

nections.

That could be because the advertisements for applicants were placed only in five newspapers in New Mexico, and not in any professional journals or in newspapers of larger cities in other states.

Those scheduled to be interviewed are:

—Harld Mansell, currently comptroller for Lakeside Corp. and municipal judge in Ruidoso Downs.

—Joe Lewandowski, formerly with Southwest Disposal and self-

employed for the past year as head of Southern Oasis Investments.

—Kerry Krumsiek, recycling coordinator for the authority.

—Maurice Gudgel, an instructor at Eastern New Mexico University in psychology, and a former clerk with the town of Ruidoso Downs.

—Neil Selman, formerly general manager with Bell Gas in Lubbock, Texas, and owner of Popular Vending Inc. of Lubbock.

The authority board fired former manager Gene Green last month.

person per month. Lincoln County, with a population of 12,219 and averaging 21 tons per month, computes to 3.4 pounds per person per month."

While some members of the solid waste authority have expressed doubts about the program, because it requires some subsidy, it is enthusiastically supported by others, who see state recycling mandates just around the corner.

Even though the authority is going through some lean budget times, those members are fighting to keep the program in operation, buoyed by the public support.

Krumsiek received some special buoying himself recently when a letter arrived from Judy Kowalski, director of recycling programs for the State Department of Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources.

Kowalski wrote that she was in Ruidoso vacationing and took the time to visit the authority's recycling center and igloo locations.

"I was extremely impressed with

everything I saw," she wrote Krumsiek in a letter dated May 28.

"The recycling center ... was also very clean and well organized. Anyone who is concerned about having a recycling facility as a neighbor would have their fears allayed if they were to visit your center.

"You have done an excellent job and you obviously are dedicated to your work."

Kowalski also gave a pat on the back to Ruidoso residents and visitors who recycle.

"The areas around the igloos were very clean," she noted. "At the Ruidoso site, I looked into each igloo and I was thrilled at what I saw. There was virtually no trash in any of the igloos, and all recyclables appeared to be perfectly sorted into their proper bin."

Her letter isn't the only one Krumsiek has received praising the program. Back in January, Jumi Gadzia, New Mexico manager for the Southwest Public Recycling Association, commended authority chairman Frank Warth "for devel-

oping an excellent recycling program."


"The association is attempting to develop more markets for recycled and recyclable items.

Gadzia wrote she was extremely impressed by the facility and that "the program you have designed is also one of the more efficient in the state."

Recently, the authority board approved the purchase of a more efficient baler for recyclable items with grant money set aside for that purpose in the budget.

Krumsiek also is combing state and federal publications and agencies for other grant programs to take as much of the financial burden off the authority as possible.

He said with the continued support of the community and the authority board, he's confident the program will grow as more businesses, churches, schools and organization join the effort. The fact that grants have been available to get the recycling program started indicated the government's commitment.

a two percent minimum.

That motion also failed by a three-to-three tie vote, Andrews, Duff and Karn voted "yea"; Cummins, James and Shaw voted "nay."

When questioned after the meeting, Dutton said he did not believe there was enough information available to pinpoint a percentage. He said when and if a constitutional amendment passes that would allow gaming, and if Ruidoso was included in those select cities where gaming is permitted, provided the entire state is not, many factors had to be determined. He said the type of gaming, the proposed tax structure, the cost of equipment, the ability to pay negotiated wages, a question of union, non-union and state employees or a combination thereof would have to be considered.

"When we get all of these costs involved, then we would have numbers we could negotiate. Now we're negotiating in a vacuum," he said.

Dutton said the price of a hot dog at the racetrack is controlled by the New Mexico Racing Commission.

"If there is that kind of regulation on that form of gaming, don't we expect that there will be as strict or as cautious regulations on video or some other form of gambling that might grow out of the constitutional amendment," he said.

"Whether to buy a blue or pink outfit," Dutton said.

Karn said two percent of the gross was a figure gleaned from persons knowledgeable in gaming and casino-hotel business.

He said that he is optimistic that a workshop meeting could clear up some details with the lease that concerned him and that the two percent seemed fair.

Questioned by The Ruidoso News about the closed meeting,

Dutton said the matter had an urgency and importance to the present and future of Ruidoso and should be discussed in the early evening hours at a specially called open meeting or a regular council meeting.

Dutton answered critics of the village's arrangement with Hubbard on the municipal golf course he operates.

He said in fiscal 1991-92, the village received about \$27,000 of the \$56,000 paid in gross receipts tax. He said last year the village benefited by \$36,000 in the \$70,000 plus collected in gross receipts tax.

He said a quarter of a million dollars was paid in salaries the first year and that didn't include contractors and construction crews, who built the course.

The golf course employs approximately 40 persons, including full and part-time staff.

Although disappointed at the vote Tuesday, Dutton thanked council members for their attention and courtesy on the matter.

### Chamber of Commerce gets praise and money

A lengthy, confusing, often rambling discourse between chamber of commerce officials and the village council ended with the council approving a chamber budget operational request for \$34,000 from lodgers tax.

Council members said they need time to explore areas for additional money to complete a revised budget request for another \$15,000 more or less.

Although the council appeared bogged down in details mixed in several reports with a variety of line items, the council unanimously agreed that the chamber is in better shape, producing more and better results than ever before.

Andrews said the chamber and its advertising programs are work-

ing.

"When something's working, I don't tend to want to fix it. I tend to want to let it keep working," Andrews said.

Councilor James said there has been more accountability from the chamber than there has been for the past five years. He thanked chamber director Joan Bailey and her staff.

Councilor Shaw and Mayor Protem Duff agreed with James, praising Bailey and her staff's efforts.

### WPS plans picnic

Win, Place and Show's Eddie Fowler Jr. requested a special dispenser permit application to allow for the traditional free downtown barbecue in the lounge's parking lot. Fowler said 700 pounds of beef brisket will be prepared.

The event is an appreciation of village support that draws friends and families throughout Lincoln County.

Although no liquor will be served in the parking lot, village attorney Patricia Ortiz cautioned the council that people could walk out the bar door and into the parking lot carrying a drink.

Ortiz also told the council that there was conflict with village ordinances regarding the special event.

The council then approved the permit.

Councilor Andrews voted "no," saying he didn't like to vote against a village ordinance.

Ruidoso police chief Richard Swenor corrected Ortiz and the council. He said the discussion before them didn't apply to a special event.

"We haven't had a special events permit asked for," he said. "What you're working on is a dispenser's permit for state licensing."

The council then passed a motion for Ortiz to create an ordinance

to allow flexibility in council decisions regarding special events.

The free picnic is scheduled for Monday, June 21, starting at 5 p.m. Fowler said this is the sixth year for the barbecue and five free hamburgerfests have been held in the fall.

### Parks & Rec setback

Little has been done in the past few years in the way of capital improvements for the village's parks and recreation department, and that department suffered another setback Tuesday when a very low bid for the Hall/Brown property near Grindstone Dam was rejected by the council.

The council has tied the sale of real property to any park improvements.

The Hall/Brown property, a 5.4-acre tract with a 1,700 square-foot cabin was purchased by the village in an out-of-court settlement several years ago for about \$240,000.

In an effort to obtain money for parks and recreation, the village council decided to put that tract and other property up for sale, and listed its projected sale in the 1992-93 budget as \$158,000 in revenues.

That inflated the 1992-93 budget for parks to \$459,374. The actual dollars spent the previous year in parks, 1991-1992, was \$210,255.

However, the property didn't sell last year. The village staff, in fact, didn't obtain an appraisal to sell the tract until this June. The fiscal year ends June 30. The recent appraisal valued of the property is \$110,000 and that line item again has been placed in the new parks 1993-94 budget under revenues.

Wicker told the council Tuesday he received one bid of \$61,987 for the property from Chisholm and Taylor in Hobbs.

The council passed a motion by Andrews not to accept the bid, and to start request for proposals to let

local realtors attempt to sell the property within six months.

Councilor Shaw said she would prefer using the property for village purposes such as a senior citizens center. James said he was not in favor of selling the property and cast the single "no" vote.

### Humane Society

Calling the Humane Society of Lincoln County a bargain, the council approved a 50-year lease of the property to allow the humane society to begin a capital improvement expansion project.

"I would hate to think the Village of Ruidoso would ever have to take that over again," said village manager Ron Wicker. "They provide an excellent service."

### In other business

In other agenda action, the council:

—approved a beer and wine liquor license for Pizza Rio, a downtown eatery.

—approved Ordinance 93-08 that will return any gross receipts tax in excess of actual needs of the airport to the sewer department.

For several years, the village council erroneously has been moving money collected from one-half percent airport gross receipts into the general fund. Councilor Shaw first discovered the error and brought it to the attention of the council. Bonding company officials recently told the council that the one-half percent gross receipts collected at the airport must be spent, by law, on airport needs.

Apparently, in approving the ordinance, the majority of the council is convinced the excess money can be put to better use in the village sewer department.

—Ordinance 93-09 which would require all wrecker service operators within Ruidoso to obtain a

state Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity was tabulated on the June 29 meeting. Several council members said Ruidoso Downs would not pass such an ordinance and the two villages need to be consistent.

The council wants more information to see how the two villages could function under the five-mile center zone dictated by state statutes, and a further clarification on "tow for hire."

Attorney Alan Morel, representing four wrecker services with certificates, said he will discuss the matter with Downs officials.

—heard Cleatus Richards discuss enforcement and prohibition of non-rated wood shake shingle roofing in the extraterritorial zoning jurisdiction. He said rated wood shake shingles are acceptable.

—discussed renaming Sierra Blanca Regional Airport with no action other than to vow to discuss it again.

—awarded janitorial service to Aetna Building Services for \$2,234 per month. A motion by Councilor Andrews passed that each department affected would have to find money within its budget to pay for the service.

—appointed Bill Scurry to the planning and zoning commission, LeRoy Nowell to the extraterritorial commission and Randal Widener to the personal board and utility dispute advisory committee.

—in reports from village officials, voted to send a resolution to U.S. Senator Pete Domenici (R-NM) and U.S. Senator Jeff Bingaman (D-NM) asking for relief from the new energy tax.

—passed a motion by Councilor James to start workshop sessions at 6 p.m.

—heard the village attorney explain new legislation concerning open meetings and public records. She told the council it could no longer charge for research.

budgeted is only a few dollars different from last year.

More than 90 percent of the budget revenue for the district come from the state, less than two percent from property taxes and less than 8 percent from federal sources.

In other business at a meeting Tuesday, the school board:

—heard a report from Special Education program director Paul Wirth on a program for kindergarten through third grade running this month in Mescalero on the Apache Reservation. It involves parents and is aimed at improving the students' academic skills and use of the Apache language.

—also heard from Wirth about the full year-around special education program in the district to decrease the amount of skill loss that some students experience over the summer when not working with teachers.

—were told by district superintendent Mike Gladden that a

summer school program was offered at White Mountain Elementary and Intermediate schools, but not enough parents indicated an interest at Nob Hill Elementary. Mathematics and English courses are being offered at the high school, in addition to driver's education, for which 115 students registered.

—congratulated Ruidoso Middle School principal Paula Papponi and sixth grade teacher Kim Graham for special writing projects promoted at that school. Books were produced by the sixth and eighth grade students showing off their writing and artistic skills.

Graham said seven of her students wrote material selected for publication in the American Academy of Poetry.

—awarded the 1992-93 audit contract to Joseph Monet of Las Cruces for \$8,021.

—awarded the Driver Education instruction contract to low bidders Dean Hood, Clifton Neal and Doyle Howell.

## Care Inc. kicks off fund drive for meals program

Ruidoso Care, Inc. kicked off "Campaign Ruidoso Cares" on Monday at the Ruidoso Senior Citizens Center.

Ruidoso Care, Inc., a non-profit charitable organization, provides need-based home meals for qualified elderly, handicapped and shut-ins in the Ruidoso Valley area at least three days each week.

With 100 percent participation from the board itself, and a variety of generous individual and group contributions, the campaign begins with a total of about \$4,500 in cash and pledges, according to Scott Roser.

Achieving the campaign goal of \$40,000 will fund the meal program through July 1995, and ensure that 40 to 50 needy people receive the supplementary nutrition essential to their health, well being and quality of life, said Roser in a news release.

Unlike many supplementary feeding programs, this one has been funded exclusively through contributions of individuals and local organizations.

In order to continue the Ruidoso Care Program, those kind and generous contributions must continue, and in the short-term, increase, said Don Zick, president of the board of directors.

"At the beginning of May, the program had less than \$250 in assets and only a few regular contributors," said Zick.

"But already, this campaign has begun to challenge the community to help meet future needs, and the community is responding."

The volunteers who manage the program and distribute the food now have the means to continue this vital program, at least for the immediate future.

The campaign runs through July 31, with volunteers distributing additional information through the Ruidoso Valley.

**Progress reported on E-911**

Progress is being made toward the implementation of the enhanced 911 system for Lincoln County, according to the county E911 coordinator Dr. Bernard Reimann.

A grant application for two primary Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP) for Ruidoso and Carrizozo, and one remote PSAP in Ruidoso Downs has been forwarded to the state Department of Finance Administration (DFA) in Santa Fe, according to Reimann.

He said an agreement draft was received from GTE West for an enhanced emergency number service.

Reimann said it is screened by DFA and Lincoln County legal advisers and awaits signature by county representatives.



## Area fishing is good to excellent

How's fishin'?

Would you like to know?

Well, here is the fishing report from the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish.

Of course this information isn't set in stone, but it is gathered from some of the best information available from state officers and anglers.

For the week of May 15 through May 21, 74,816 rainbow trout were stocked in state lakes and rivers. Of those fish 44,816 were nine inches or larger. This is the stocking issue that is included in this week's report.

Here are the most recent conditions for our area:

**Alto Lake**—Fishing at the lake is fair using green power bait. Crews stocked 3,418 11-inch rainbow trout.

**Bonito Creek**—Crews stocked below the dam with 511 10.5 inch

and at the north fork with 102 10-inch rainbow trout.

**Bonito Lake**—Fishing is fair using corn or green power bait. Crews stocked 2,770 10-inch rainbow trout.

**Grindstone Reservoir**—Fishing is fair using green power bait.

**Ruidoso River**—Fishing is good using salmon eggs and worms. Crews stocked 1,251 10-inch rainbow trout.

**Tularosa Creek**—Fishing is excellent using worms.

**Elephant Lake**—Fishing is good in the early mornings and evenings using crank baits and water dogs in brushy coves for black bass, sassy shad and minnows in Monticello Canyon and north for white bass, and cutbait for catfish. Fishing is slow at the river below Elephant Butte.

## State tax boss stops off in Ruidoso

In an appearance for the governor, the head of the Taxation and Revenue Department spoke Tuesday at the Inn of the Mountain Gods to a meeting of the Manufactured Housing Association.

Dick Minzner of the Taxation and Revenue department spoke on behalf of the governor at the meeting. Governor Bruce King was unable to make the meeting due to national media coverage in Santa Fe because of the mystery disease in the four corners area.

In an interview with The News, Minzner said he is going to start a push for renewed efficiency in government when the legislature reconvenes in January.

"The current statutes for managers almost mandate inefficiency," said Minzner.

The first step Minzner mentioned would be to ask the legislature to carry over budget funding from one fiscal year to another for his Taxation and Revenue Department.

Currently the system is designed to take away any leftover money. But the problem with that is the money that is taken back at the end of the year does not return to the budget. Therefore, if a department has \$5,000 budgeted for one year

but spends only \$3,000, the next year that department's budget will be \$3,000.

That sounds good on the surface, according to Minzner, but in reality it turns out to be the worst case scenario for the taxpayer.

The department may not need all of the budgeted money for the first year, however it may be necessary for the following, so it would be beneficial to leave the money at the department level.

Since the department heads know that the unspent money will be taken away at the end of the year, they spend the money any way they can, therefore wasting a lot of money on extra supplies and other items that are not needed.

"Now you can spare yourself the budget cuts if you just spend it," said Minzner.

Minzner also would like to be given a chance to experiment with the number of employees in his department.

"I would like to ask the legislature to make a deal with me," said Minzner. "I want them to let me deal with vacancies in my department in an experimental fashion."

Currently, if a departmental employee leaves and a position is left open, the department must decide whether or not to fill the position.

However, if the position is not filled in three months, according to Minzner, then the position is considered by the state to not be needed.

That encourages managers to fill the position regardless of whether it is truly needed or not, just so it won't be taken away.

"You can't leave a position vacant to find out if it is needed because it will be taken away," said Minzner. "The system is not designed to have experimentation."

Minzner may have the clout in the legislature due to job he has been doing with the Taxation and Revenue Department.

Minzner's department has brought an increase to the revenues collected through taxes. Minzner has specifically gone after individuals who are currently delinquent in their taxes.

"Subsequently the State's general fund revenues will be \$60-80 million better than projected," said Minzner.

That extra money may help encourage lawmakers to let Minzner experiment with the budget.

Minzner also said that Governor King is interested in a similar plan to encourage efficiency.

Minzner said that King is planning on starting a task force or committee to work on the changes.

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

## Hubbard Art Collection on display

Visitors to the Ruidoso area will have the unique opportunity to view the Hubbard Collection of Western Art now on display in the Ruidoso Downs Turf Club throughout the summer.

This is the final year that the remarkable collection, which includes rare works by Charles Russell and Fredric Remington, will be open to public viewing in Ruidoso.

The vast collection also includes masterpieces by such legendary artists as William R. Leigh and Henry Farny.

The new summer hours for the extraordinary exhibit are 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Monday through Wednesday, Thursday through Sunday, when the track is open for racing, the exhibit will be open to the general

public during the hours of 8:30 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. and 11 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. for Turf Club patrons only.

Two pieces of the collection are murals done by Charles Russell called History of the West Part I and II.

Originally commissioned in 1925, they are considered by many authorities to be Russell's most important works. They were executed in the last year of the artist's life and measure 30' by 20' and 24' respectively.

Other works by Russell in the collection include a 23 1/2' by 35 1/2' oil entitled "The Wolf and the Beaver", painted in 1921 and a large bronze called "Meat for Wild Men". The bronze was cast in 1924 by the Roman Bronze Works of New York and there are only three

other castings in the world.

The sculpture is one of the few multi-figured bronzes that Russell did and also one of the largest.

The piece by Remington is an oil called "The Navajo Raid". It was commissioned in 1908 and measures 27" by 35 1/2".

Leigh's pieces include "The Happy Hunting Ground" painted in 1917 and "Sentinel of the Plains" done in 1924.

Two recent acquisitions to the Hubbard Collection include a 11" by 8" gouache on paper by Henry Farny entitled "Over the Trail" done in 1901 and a 27" by 40" oil called "Navajo Ponies for Comanche Warriors" by Frank McCarthy.

## Stakes performers return Friday in the Norgor trials

Amandas Nice Boy, a New Mexico-bred gelding by Brave Lad, battled for the early lead with Saint Patties Lucy, but could not keep up with her and had to settle for the place position.

Tornado Laddy, also by Brave Lad, came from off the pace to finish seven lengths behind his stablemate. Tornado Laddy's performance was even more impressive considering that before the race he broke free from his handlers in the paddock, jumped the rail onto the track and after a five

El Paso Special, from the John Jamison shedrow, won his trial division for the Riley Allison and has yet to finish out of the money in three career starts.

Leonard Monti's Last Don B. who set a new 7 1/2-furlong track record with an impressive 2 1/2-length win in the May 29 Governor's Handicap, heads a classy field entered in the \$10,000-added Mescalero Apache Handicap Saturday at Ruidoso Downs.

The six furlong handicap is open to 3-year-olds and upward and will be run as the 12th event on the 14-race program.

Last Don B. was Ruidoso Downs' Thoroughbred of the Meet last year and lived up to his reputation with a convincing win in the Governor's Handicap in his first start here this summer.

The Lynda Tanner-trainee took the lead along the backstretch under jockey Manuel Ortiz Jr., held off a stiff challenge from Dashing Forbes in the turn, then cruised

home in a time of 1:31. The clocking broke the 7-year-old track record of 1:31.1 set by Forever A Ruler in 1986.

Last Don B. also set the one mile track record of 1:37.4 last year. The versatile gelding won four stakes at three different distances here in 1992 including the Mescalero Apache. Last Don B. also won two six furlong stakes at Turf Paradise this spring.

The gelding will carry high-weight of 124 lbs. Saturday as he breaks from the #7 post position. Ortiz will ride.

William Clifton's Capitalimprovement and Gould Groves' Dashing Forbes, both recent stakes winners, should also be primary threats in the full field of 12 in the Mescalero Apache.

Capitalimprovement, a regally-bred son of Dixieland Band, has been facing top company at Louisiana Downs and Oaklawn Park this year under the guidance of trainer Bill Leach.

Capitalimprovement won the Old Rosebud Stakes at Oaklawn and placed in the prestigious Lafayette Stakes at Keeneland as a 3-year-old. The colt made his career debut here as a 2-year-old in 1991 and also ran third in the Norgor Futurity.

Dashing Forbes battled for the lead with Last Don B. heading into the stretch in the Governor's Handicap, but could not keep up with the eventual winner and finished a well-beaten fourth.

The Ted Levy-trained gelding won the El Paso Herald Post Hand-

icap at Sunland Park going 6 1/2-furlongs and should take to the shorter distance Saturday.

The Saturday program is also highlighted by the simulcast of the Grade I \$242,250 Remington Park Derby and the Grade I \$150,000-added Milady Handicap from Hollywood Park.

The Remington simulcast showcases top 3-year-old quarter horses including Luxurious Dreams, King Khalid and Disco Del Rey.

The Milady Handicap should attract a quality field of some of the nation's top older fillies and mares. All wagers made on Hollywood Park simulcasts are common pooled which allows local handicappers access to the large mutual pools and exotic wagers offered at the Los Angeles-area track.

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

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

Summer rodeo season bucked and bounced into full gear last weekend, but more arena events are scheduled for the upcoming months.

The last two rodeos in the Lucky Seven Series sponsored by Bill and Jo Bennet are set for 6:30 p.m. Friday, June 11 and 6:30 p.m., Saturday, June 19.

Each of those evenings, jackpots will be awarded for the winners of each event. In addition, at the end of the series, seven high point scorers will receive buckles.

Tate Pruitt and Rusty Silva will clown around for the bulls, broncos and steers on the two weekends.

Competition events will include bull riding, junior bulls, steers, open 14 and under barrels, fourteen and under goat tying, team roping and open 14 and under break away. A special jackpot is reserved for the Mormon team roping event, an "on-

foot," instead of on hoove, confrontation with a calf that's sure to provide some hearty laughs and good fun.

A benefit team roping romp for Bill Bennet, who suffered injuries and accumulated hospital expenses when a horse fell on him, is also set for June 19-20.

The activity will start at 10 a.m. at the Lincoln County fairground in Capitan. For those who prefer to sit and watch all the effort, a barbecue lunch will be on sale at 11 a.m. with brisket, bake beans, cole slaw, bread and tea, coffee or limeade.

Cattle will be provided by the TT Cattle Co. Entry fees for steers run

from two for \$16 to four for \$20.

The Lucky Seven Series Rodeo at 6:30 p.m. June 19 will be followed by a dance featuring Lone Star Express from 8 p.m. to midnight. Admission is \$3 per person, \$5 a couple and \$10 for a family.

On Saturday, sign up for team roping begins at 9:30 a.m. with roping at 10 a.m. On Sunday, June 20, sign up begins at 10:30 a.m., with roping at 11 a.m.

Rodeo Club Playdays are set for June 27, July 11 and August 1. Entry fees range from \$50 for bull riding to \$10 for Mormon team roping.

The grand entry parade will move into the Capitan fairground arena at 1 p.m. Events scheduled for the afternoon include breakaway, barrels, flags, poles, goats and steers. All events are 50-cents.

Mormon team roping costs \$10 a man. Breakaway and steers are \$3. Classes range from lead to 18 years.



"While the primary aim of Masonry is to promote fraternity and fellowship, an even deeper fundamental goal is to help members become better men in building character which aids them in their daily lives, in practicing their faith in God and patriotism."

According to a news release, Masonry further teaches living and working together in cooperation and harmony which incorporates sharing of time and resources for the welfare of the community, state and country.

Masons in the United States collectively contribute more than \$2 million daily — more than \$750 million each year, continues the release. Freemasonry works to help people of all races and creeds.

The Shrine Crippled Children's Hospitals, the Burns Institutes; the Knights Templar Eye Foundation and many scholarships given by local lodges contribute to a better life for everybody.

Freemasonry is the world's oldest and largest fraternal organization with members of virtually every country in the free world. Composed of men of various political beliefs, many national origins,

and religions, Masons are taught to have faith in and respect for one another, as well as for every human being.

According to L. S. Mitchell, Master of the Ruidoso Masonic Lodge, the first lodge in New Mexico was chartered in 1841. There are now 65 lodges located throughout New Mexico with approximately 8,900 members.

Some of the world's greatest men have been and are Masons: George Washington, Benjamin Franklin, Franklin Roosevelt, Harry Truman, Norman Vincent Peale and many others. Each of them would say, "Masonry has but one aim, the improvement of mankind."

While Masonic lore has its roots in antiquity, thus Freemasonry's claim at the oldest fraternal organization in the world, nobody knows just how old it really is.

"Free" was prefixed to the name "mason" during the Middle Ages "because possessing knowledge and skills not found elsewhere, these stonemasons were 'free' agents rather than bond servants, and thus were permitted to travel from one country to another without restriction." These freemasons constructed many of the renowned cathedrals and other structures of Europe and the British Isles.

The Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons have traces of written record prior to 1717, the year which saw the establishment of Masonry as we know it today. After organization of the first Grand Lodge of England, the Masons began using the tools of the building trades, like the square, plumb, level and trowel.

Mitchell refutes the notion that Freemasonry is a secret society and that Masons can't talk about Masonry.

Masons might ask non-Masons to read Masonic literature, but will not ask them to petition for membership. Anyone interested in seeking membership must make his interest known to an active member of the fraternity entirely of his own free will.

Now it is twilight, turning to dusk and clouds are forming all in the west, bringing to a close a perfect day in June.

During the last few days of May, the yucca buds appeared on their long stalks in light green clusters looking as though they were not ready to begin blooming. They usually send out their blossoms a few at a time.

### So, you want to build a hotel in our village?

If there's a line of people waiting to build a resort hotel here in Ruidoso, I haven't seen it. So, why do we want to add more hurdles in the way of the ONLY person who has ever had the interest (and ability to finance) a hotel.

R.D. Hubbard entered into an agreement a few years ago with the Village of Ruidoso — he was to build a hotel next to the Ruidoso Civic Events Center, and that agreement was detailed, well-researched and approved by the Hubbard group and the council. When the bottom fell out on hotel financing, Hubbard asked for and received an extension on his agreement.

And so, now comes Hubbard with a plan to start construction on a hotel next year. Granted, it will be smaller than the original plans (125 to 150 rooms), but he's ready to go forward under the original agreement. We have an enormous Civic Center, we need a place for conventioners to stay, we need a hotel — we should be happy, right?

No, half the members of the Ruidoso Village Council want to add some more requirements to the agreement and make it a bit more challenging to build that hotel. Mayor Pro Tem Barbara Duff and councilors Ron Andrews and Bill Karn say the old agreement isn't good enough — they want to renege on the old extension and require Hubbard to pay \$100,000 even if he goes forward with the hotel. And, with a pie-in-the-sky attitude that has been so prevalent with this current administration, our leaders say that someday there may be some kind of gambling somewhere in the state — maybe even in this hotel. So they want to put a hard and fast percentage in this agreement that deals with some nebulous future gambling deal. Sound ridiculous? You bet it is.

It's time for our elected officials to quit dreaming and get their heads out of the clouds. These same folks have donated thousands of dollars to the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County to attract some industry from somewhere. But when it comes to working with a real live hotel developer, they want to slam the door in his face.

### AG is wasting tax dollars with grand jury

TO THE EDITOR:

New Mexico is a poor state, with limited income and a regressive taxing system that funds the budget by its gross receipts tax on just about everything — including the food that poor people need to survive, the already inflated medical and dental services no one can live without, and the high-priced prescription medicine essential to good health. To justify or make sense of any of this, such obscene taxes should at least be wisely conserved and distributed.

But lo and behold, this state has no problem with convening a grand jury investigation for the most trivial matters — when it could save hundreds of thousands of dollars of taxpayers' money by airing both sides of the matter at a simple hearing to determine if there is even a case. I am referring to the recent action take by Tom Udall, our present attorney general, in the

case of State Representative John Underwood.

An attorney's job is to give his client the best shot at retaining his license, when its revocation means you lose your job and your family loses support, and it is common legal practice for an attorney to call in advance to ascertain whether the police officer will be present. It is most unusual for an attorney to be accused of "using political power" to pressure the officer not to show up — which attorney Underwood and (Ruidoso Downs) Police Chief Will Hoggard both vehemently deny.

If our attorney general is a dedicated public servant, acting in the state's best interests, he should appreciate the fact that John has been one of our most effective and honest representatives, who, among other things, initiated and pushed through and Ethics Bill in this last legislative session. A man so concerned about ethics, who worked

diligently to make our legislators accountable, would be the most unlikely to do anything that could be remotely construed as unethical.

Maybe his popularity and success made his political future look too promising, especially to those with ambitions of their own.

In spite of Underwood's openness, and his request for a fair hearing where he could present evidence of his innocence, he was shut out by the attorney general's demand for an expensive and often long-drawn-out grand jury — where only the prosecution is allowed to present evidence. For those of you who love justice, I give you our great, illogical, democratic tradition!

On June 1, the jury convened briefly, and will reconvene on June 14; the members have the option to meet only once a week for as long as it takes, which could keep Underwood under a black cloud, un-

vindicated — personally, professionally and politically — for many months to come.

The expense of a grand jury investigation into this fairly minor matter is a use of taxpayers' money that could have been better spent in the fight against drugs or violent crimes — something this attorney general might do well to focus on more aggressively.

Don't judge John Underwood in advance. Remember: he got things done by skillfully and ethically accessing the political system; he listened to the people he represented; he kept them abreast of his political agenda; he fought hard for their interests, getting much of the required funding for community projects long ignored by our legislators. In return, I hope his constituents will stand behind him as firmly and loyally as he stood behind them.

### Freedom of the press is central to democracy

TO THE EDITOR:

I can sympathize with the "stated" purpose of the petition to get The Ruidoso News to print only good news, but I question if the "stated" purpose is the "real" purpose. I, too, have an investment in Ruidoso and want very much to see it prosper, but I have been around here long enough and have observed small town politics closely enough to smell a hidden agenda at 50 paces.

Is your reporting about government misfeasance really hurting our economy? Not our tourist industry. Day tourists neither know nor care about our local government. It may, however, be affecting real estate sales and attracting new businesses to the area. Folks who have the money to buy property or found businesses are more apt to seriously consider investing in an area with a stable, fair and honest government rather than in one where every government action is perceived to be either under the table, backhanded or ethically questionable.

Ruidoso has an image problem to be sure, but that problem is caused by factionalism — there has always been a conflict between fast buck tourist businesses, those property owners who want the town to retain its sleepy little village character, and real estate developers and salespeople who profit

handsomely with a continual turnover in property ownership. Whichever faction controls city hall gets to establish its own system of cronyism and "good ole boy" networks. When the "in" faction is threatened in some way (such as by your reporting), it immediately tries to suppress the source of its distress.

Most of those who run for public office in Ruidoso are inexperienced businessmen who have no idea of the technical and administrative details of running a government, don't have the knowledge or skills to properly oversee their appointed officials and rely upon their equally untrained friends, special interest groups and business associates for advice. They then make the fatal mistake of believing that they know as much or more than the experts they have appointed and try to micro manage rather than be the town's board of directors.

The result is political meddling, inconsistent policies, confused and unhappy employees (the ones who really make a town work), an open door for illegal practices and/or corrupt officials, and the need for damage control when errors or illegalities are exposed. In a word, bungling. And bungling should be reported.

I happen to know of what I speak because I used to hold at

least a minor position in local government and lost my job (during one of the oft reported and protested ... executive sessions) after falling from favor with a couple of our former politicians and their cronies. I don't regret losing my job (after all, all it meant to me was my livelihood, retirement income and self respect), but one thing is deeply troubling to me — all in all, I have spent almost my entire life in uniform, defending our country, its citizens and our laws, and I feel like I've wasted much of my life protecting the rights and freedoms of an unappreciative society. The very folks who benefit the most by our freedoms are often the first to advocate restricting them.

This petition business is a perfect, flagrant example of trying to control the press. Throughout history, every nation that has controlled the press has collapsed into a fascist or totalitarian state. Is that what we want in America? I'll be damned if I do!

Anyone who wants to control what information is disseminated, for whatever reason, is either naive, ignorant of history or an advocate of "big brother" government — they can wrap themselves in whichever classification they choose.

I often dislike or disagree with what I read in The News, and oc-

asionally also believe some the stories are biased. But, just like the TV has an "off" switch, when I no longer have any interest in what you publish, I will quit buying the paper (quite frankly, I wouldn't buy it at all if it wasn't for your editorials and coverage of the latest screwups at city hall — the rest of it is a total non-event).

I can assure you that if a misguided minority can force Raljon to change its coverage, I will quit buying The News anyway. Until then, go for it!

Apparently 90 percent of the citizenry either agree with your coverage or don't care either way. The 10 percent who signed the petition might even see that the way to get you to stop reporting the ugly is to eliminate it rather than restricting your obligation to the public to report it.

Freedom of the press is one of the freedoms guaranteed by our Bill of Rights that we most cherish and one of the quickest we must protect if we are to remain a democratic republic.

Anyone who advocates restricting any of our guaranteed freedoms is suffering from a bad case of "cranium pre rectum" and has no business pretending to be a loyal American!

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


### Home school goes on the road

## Storyteller tells traditional tales in a summer program at Hondo

Estefanita Martinez of the San Juan Pueblo, will bring tales of some of her special friends to the Hondo School library June 25.

Martinez learned these traditional stories from her grandfather, and she'll share tales of the rabbit, coyote and other wily creatures.

Her native language, and the original language of these tales, is Tewa. She was well into middle age, however, when a linguist studying Tewa taught her how to write the language. That, in turn, led to linguistics courses and a career change from being a custodian at one school to being a teacher at another, the San Juan Day School, where she established a bilingual program.

The native language and the native stories had both long seemed invaluable to her. Her concern for the language resulted in the "San Juan Pueblo Tewa Dictionary."

Martinez love for the tales led to her documenting and, eventually,

translating them in three Tewa/English readers for children.

There is even some "culture swapping" in the readers with the inclusion, in Tewa, of old standard fairy tales such as "Goldilocks and the Three Bears."

"Television has taken over," Martinez has said; and these stories are a way of trying to right the balance, to get back something of what her own childhood was like, listening to her grandfather's stories during the long winter nights in the pueblo.

A child is supposed to have once said that he liked radio better than television "because the picture is better."

According to a news release, that, too, is one of the lasting charms of these stories, such as the endless adventures of crafty rabbit and always hungry (and always frustrated) coyote among the prickly pear and sage along the Rio Grande.

In an afterword to her book, "The Naughty Little Rabbit and Old Man Coyote," Martinez wrote:

"My grandfather taught me all the stories I know. He always said, 'You should give of yourself whatever it is you have, whether it's material things or some kind of knowledge.' Because of my grandfather, story telling has always been a part of my life. Each time I tell a story, I pass on to others a little bit of the gift I received from him. I hope you will do the same.

Take the story that I have told you and tell it again, even though it means changing the location or adding something extra to juice it up a little. Then you, too, will be sharing the gift with others."

Martinez' friend, Ellien Carroll, is very pleased to accompany her on these visits, believing that "we are our memories and that Estefanita will be a part of the stories that others tell in the years to come."
