## Trash group lands a landfill

Things are looking up for the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

A new general manager, with years of garbage collection experience, is at the helm. And members received word last week that the purchase of a regional landfill site south of Alamogordo had gone off without a hitch.

The 622.5 acre landfill parcel was picked up for \$30,000 from the office of the State Public Trust Lands Commissioner. No other bidders showed up, although one from Ohio had sent money to qualify for a bid.

Authority attorney J. Robert Beauvais told members Monday the group should be aware of the effort on the part of the commissioner's staff.

"We had talked about possibly having to pay \$300,000 for a site," he said. Although about \$200,000 has been invested in testing on the land, the final price tag will leave \$270,000 that can be applied toward interim financing.

Still under discussion is whether it may be less expensive to lease-purchase the landfill equipment instead of floating a bond issue to buy the equipment outright, Beauvais said.

To complete the purchase, the authorities in Lincoln and Otero counties will have to exchange mineral rights they own on other property for the mineral rights on the landfill site.

"They don't want the liability in case the landfill turned into a hazardous site requiring cleanup," he said. "Yet that can't divest the mineral estate, only trade."

Nothing but gravel and brackish water lies under the land, tests have shown, he said.

In making an initial report to the board, new authority general manager Joe

## State land boss visits

State Land Commissioner Ray Powell Jr., appointed in May to fill out the term of Jim Baca, told Lincoln County Democrats Tuesday that he'll be a candidate for that office in 1994.

Powell chose southeastern New Mexico for his first official trip as land commissioner. He specifically chose Ruidoso, and told the group of Democrats why.

"The Democrats in Ruidoso are real Democrats and we appreciate you," said Powell, who served as an assistant to Governor Bruce King from 1991 until this May. He advised King on environmental issues.

Powell noted that it's easy to be a Democrat up north where they're often in the majority, but not so easy in Ruidoso.

"I think you folks demonstrate what it means to be a Democrat — I come down here for some inspiration," he said.

Powell, the son of state Democratic Party Chairman Ray Powell Sr., is a practicing veterinarian who specializes in rehabilitation of wildlife.

Before talking about his job as state land commissioner, Powell lambasted Republicans, saying that when President Jimmy Carter, a Democrat, left the White House, with a \$74 billion federal deficit and \$800 million national debt.

Just 12 years later, when President George Bush, a Republican, left office, the deficit had ballooned to \$350 billion and the national debt to \$4.2 trillion.

Quoting Republican Senator Robert Dole, Powell said: "President Reagan's supply side economics are a river boat gamble."

Powell agreed with Dole that the 12 years of Republican leadership were a river boat gamble — and the American people lost.

"These are the same folks that are beating up on our president of just 100 days," said Powell. He said, in spite of what is being said in the national media, President Bill Clinton's plan will cut the deficit by \$500 billion over five years, half through reduced expenditures and half through taxes.

Powell said 80 percent of the new taxes are proposed for the six percent of the wealthiest people who enjoyed the boon during the Reagan-Bush years.

Also during the Democrat's meeting, county chairperson Cece Griffin announced that vice chairman Fred Hansen has been appointed to the governor's commission on organized crime, and Sunny Hirschfeld has been appointed to the pharmaceuticals board.

Griffin was headed Wednesday for a meeting of the Democratic National Committee.

## Art's out, tan's in on dumpsters

In the case of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority, monotony means efficiency.

Board members voted Monday to reaffirm a previous directive that all dumpsters owned by the authority will be painted the same tan color.

The hassle over color was revived last week when fruit and vegetable market owner Frank Cox balked at changing the color of the containers he had painted red, white and blue.

He took his case public by placing radio advertisements touting his patriotism and urging residents to contact their county commissioners.

Authority member Wilton Howell, who also is a commissioner, told other board members Monday that he thought Cox had agreed to wait until a new authority director was hired to see if a compromise could be struck. But when Cox jumped the gun, Howell howled.

He and Commission Chairman Monroy Montes went to the market to talk to Cox. While there, they witnessed an employee giving an authority garbage truck driver a free watermelon.

Howell later found out that Cox had been receiving twice a week collection on four dumpsters, although he was paying for once a week collection on fewer.

"Not only that, but while we were there, the driver emptied four dumpsters and then waited while they filled up two more and emptied those," Howell said. "The truck sat there for 30-45 minutes."

If that scene is repeated twice a week and at some other businesses, it could explain why the authority is having trouble keeping up, he said.

Part of the problem with Cox revolved around his claim that he owned at least two of the containers. Cox said he bought them more than a decade ago.

But new authority director Joe Lewandowsky said the dumpster styles and units have been changed since then.

What's sitting there now is ours, he said.

Authority attorney J. Robert Beauvais pointed out that when the solid waste group purchased the dumpsters and other equipment from the town of Ruidoso Downs (where the Cox market is located), all the containers were inventoried. (The authority is a coalition of five towns and the county, which joined to provide garbage collection service and a regional landfill.)


"The burden of proof shifts to Cox to prove we don't own them," Beauvais said.

Howell offered a motion to require a uniform color on containers and that the authority would not service private dumpsters.

Authority member Ron Andrews said approval of Howell's motion would put the responsibility on the solid waste group to repaint dumpsters now being maintained by the school system and Ruidoso Downs racetrack.

"It decreases our maintenance costs if someone else is painting and maintaining them," he said. "They sit in front of a business and if we won't let them maintain them, we must ensure they don't become

rusty and unsightly.

"I'm not willing, until I see it (Lewandowsky's proposal) fails, to jump in and deny."

Andrews was referring to a proposed container maintenance policy submitted for board review by Lewandowsky.

Howell pointed out that the colors at the school and race track are just shades off from the authority's choice, not significantly different. But even if the authority has to take over the responsibility, that's its job, he said.

Board member Ron Wicker, Ruidoso village manager, said the authority is way behind in the painting and maintenance of dumpsters. He opted to go with allowing some private maintenance and individual colors.

But Al Junge, a former authority member and village councilor, said deviations shouldn't be allowed.

"We own them, they are supposed to be a certain color. It may be a great public service, but it's something we don't have to get into," Junge said.

"I agree with Al," said member Dave Dale. "I think simplicity is the key. We don't want to wind up with a coat of many colors."

Lewandowsky said he agreed the color should be uniform in residential areas, because many homeowners use the same containers. But responsibility can be pinpointed with commercial users and he has controlled similar situations in the past when running his own collection company.

"We had 4,500 containers in Alamogordo and less than a dozen were painted differently," he said. "It was not a big issue."

"What happens when the business across the street objects to the

colors?" Howell asked. "With all the problems we have with this authority, we don't need to put applications for colors on his shoulders, too."

The majority of the board agreed that the authority already has enough problems. Howell's motion passed 6-3 with Andrews, Wicker and Bill Schwettmann, a county commissioner, voting against it.

Dumpsters that are privately owned should not be serviced by the authority, Howell and Lewandowsky agreed.

"We will not sue ourselves if there is damage to the container," Lewandowsky wrote in a summary. "Also, if the container is not properly maintained, it can become a health and safety problem."

If Cox elects to reject the three uniformly painted authority dumpsters when the four red, white and blue ones are hauled away, he will have to show proof that he contracted with another company to handle his garbage, said Beauvais.

"He generates a lot," he said and he reminded board members that collection is mandatory. Schwettmann said if the authority doesn't make sure Cox has made the necessary arrangements, "We'll see the garbage down the road in next dumpster spilling over."

Lewandowsky told *The Ruidoso News* Tuesday that Cox is out of town for a few days.

In a related matter, he said he will be sending out new agreements to commercial accounts to make sure they are paying for the service they are receiving. The agreements will be signed by the owners or the managers verifying that they know the level of service they are getting for the charge.

"We're drawing the line on that (commercial accounts receiving twice a week collection while paying for less)," Lewandowsky said. "Everybody in Ruidoso Downs has been getting twice a week in the summer...for that price."

He has talked to the drivers and has put a stop to the gratuities such as watermelons. But it has been going on for years, he said.

"The drivers just continued what they've been doing for 14 years or more," he said.

"I don't know where Ruidoso Downs got two pickups a week," said Joe Hayhurst, an authority member and mayor of Ruidoso Downs. "It was not in our agreement when I came on the board."

"It was the driver's policy, not the administration's," Lewandowsky said. "One driver talks to another, because the administration was not."

Schwettmann said the authority also must devise a system to pick up newly constructed houses in the quarterly billing cycle, about 100 in the last 12 months in the Alto area alone.

If the group waits until the houses appear on the annual property tax roll, it will lose out on nearly a year of revenues, said chairman Frank Warth, who is mayor of Capitan.

"We have to look into the new residential customers, the commercial we have under control," Lewandowsky said. "I think there's lots of money there that we should be getting for the service we're providing."

Lewandowsky said quite a few places have been billed and the letters have come back that the person is no longer there.

"Please get it to us ahead so we can study the information," said member Bill Schwettmann, a county commissioner.

"We will know what each truck produces in income," Lewandowsky said. "It should be about \$1,900 a truck. If I see one produce \$20,000 and another \$15,000, I'll be taking a look."

In other action, the board:

—on a recommendation by Lewandowsky, approved the purchase of a new trailer and can flat-tener for the recycling department. The equipment should free up more time for the staff, which then can help with repair and reconditioning of the dumpsters, he said.

Lewandowsky also recommended the board hold off on buying a \$32,000 baling machine until he has a better idea of the revenue situation.

"If they can cut down (with the new equipment) what I have to haul out, it will be a plus to us on the garbage side," he said.

The cost of the equipment will be reimbursed by the state, but there will be a lag time of several weeks. "The department still needs the bailer, but I can't dedicate \$32,000 for six weeks until I know where the money is," Lewandowsky said.

He told the board a recent load of recyclable material was sold for \$5,000.

—received a vote of confidence from former authority member Al Junge, who had come to the meeting to suggest approaches to dumpster repair and cleanliness in garbage and trash collection.

After listening to Lewandowsky's plans, he said, "It appears to me at last you have someone who knows something about management."

However, Junge said board members should not push off on former authority director Gene Green all of the responsibility for the financial, bookkeeping and other problems the authority has been facing.

The members "have not been watching the nitty gritty of what's going on," he said. "To go eight to nine months and not know that your books were not balanced shows just how much you were not keeping track."

Junge told Lewandowsky that the transfer station and compacter on Gavilan Canyon Road need to be cleaned and kept in better condition.

—heard from Lewandowsky that a representative from the State Auditor's office came down and reviewed the authority's past audit and current financial/bookkeeping situation.

"He said he's not going to recommend any further action," Lewandowsky said.

—clarified that the policy on Saturday at the Capitan debris landfill is that all county residents may dispose of yard waste and household items free all day long. They do not have to present water bills to show residency. Commercial contractors must pay full price.

Warth said the landfill is running out of space and it will cost \$30,000 to \$40,000 to dig a new cell.



## Planners pave the way for annexation

Annexation of tracts belonging to Carrizo Lodge Condominiums sailed through the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission Monday.

Agreement has been reached between lodge owners and the village regarding a utility extension, utility ownership, water rights and future services as required in the Municipal Code.

Owners are petitioning for Initial Zoning as required under the code. Zone classification requested is C-2, Community Business, which is comparable to C-1 Commercial under existing ETZ zoning designation.

Notification responses to Annexations and Initial Zoning will be tabulated at a public hearing according to Cleatus Richards, planning department.

In other commission business: —a replat request of lots 15, 16, 17, 18 and 19 in Paradise Canyon

Subdivision was approved for Charles Beene.

Beene intends to expand his existing residence and by combining the lots into a single lot, several setbacks and lot lines will be eliminated.

—a replat request was approved for B.H. Buchanan out of his 200-acre tract was approved.

The two tracts in question total about 15 acres and are zoned R-1, single family residential. The tracts are being sold to Councilor Ron Andrews and are adjacent to another five-acre tract he owns that runs along Hull Road.

—O.B. Stephens III and John D. Morris had their replat request approved for Lots 29 and 30 in Central Subdivision.

The replat eliminated lot line encroachment.

—The request for a replat for lots 19 and 20 of Lakeside Estates was approved for Roderick Fraser.

Fraser's property is located in the one mile extraterritorial zone district and is zoned R-1 single family residential. The replat combines two lots into one containing a little over one acre.


—the commission tabled a variance request for J.R. Coats in Golf Course Estates.

Coats wanted a variance to add a 2,000 square foot room. Village staff recommended and the commission agreed that Coats could reduce the addition and should come back to the commission with new plans.

—John Houghton asked for an amended commercial site development to increase the occupancy of his riverside restaurant located off Eagle Drive.

The request was tabled because no one representing Houghton appeared before the commission.

—A side yard variance request for Douglas Brown was tabled indefinitely.

# The buck stops where? at village hall

Who's on first?  
Who's calling the shots for the village? The majority of the council? The village manager? The village attorney? All of the above? None of the above?

Councilor J.D. James was asked about the big end run last week.

Councilor Ron Andrews had asked Councilor Frank Cummins to set up a meeting with R.D. Hubbard, after Andrews voted against Hubbard's hotel extension request in a public meeting. Neither James nor Councilor Jerry Shaw knew about the secret meeting.

James said it seemed to him more like a "quarterback sneak."

During the last regular council meeting the village attorney, Patricia Ortiz, advised the council to enter into closed session to discuss the Hubbard request for an extension on his contract.

The council entered the closed session under pending litigation. The Ruidoso News asked village manager Ron Wicker what was pending litigation about the Hubbard contract.

Wicker said the discussion of the contract, the lease, was interpreted as pending litigation.

Attorney Betsy Glenn of Attorney General Tom Udall's office said, based on the information The News gave her, there didn't appear to be pending litigation. Glenn was given limited information. The News was not privileged to be in the closed session; however, the subsequent public meeting that again discussed the subject, also contained no pending litigation.

For a number of months, the council has entered into closed sessions under pending litigation, and for a number of months, councilors have complained that no pending

litigation was involved once in that closed session.

Furthermore, conversations had moved to other issues.

In spite of councilor complaints, the vote to enter closed session is always unanimous.

During former Mayor Victor Alonso's last closed session, entered under pending litigation, action was taken by the council in closed session. Alonso, in violation of the open meetings act, adjourned the meeting from that closed session, without returning to the open meeting to vote on the action.

The new version of the open meetings act calls for some specificity in entering a closed session and the council is to stay within those specifics.

However, if the attorney general's office has allowed past open meetings violations to occur with no penalty, then it is likely Udall and his legal staff will turn their heads in the future.

To date, the attorney general's office could give no example of any council having to pay a fine for an

open meetings violation — ever.

With no penalty, it is expected to be business as usual as far as closed meetings and violations of the open meetings act.

That also sets up the kind of government that allows the type of end run Andrews pulled last weekend.

Last week, a resident called The News to complain of a new ordinance that will charge residents a septi tank fee.

Calling the village receptionist, she was referred to attorney Ortiz.

The News has been told that all information had to be provided through Wicker, with Wicker's approval.

The News called Wicker about the ordinance and when it was learned he was out of his office, called second in command, deputy manager Alan Briley. Only it appears Alan Briley is not second in command, and knew very little about the situation.


The ordinance to be brought up at the next village council meeting will introduce a \$15 waiver fee to

septic tank owners who have no village service available to them.

The council had voted unanimously in a previous council meeting that no costs would be charged to residents where no service was available. The spirit of that vote had changed to a yearly waiver charge.

As Briley talked to The News, he informed the reporter that Ortiz had entered his office and asked if the conference could be opened on the speaker phone. The reporter said fine, but Ortiz declined to enter the conversation. Instead, Ortiz gave Briley a note to read to the reporter that said, "We always have to just glean consensus." There was nothing more to add and Briley had nothing more to give.

The current chain of command for the village appears to be the majority of the council — Andrews, Duff, Cummins and loosely, Karn — calling the operational shots for Wicker and Ortiz. Councilors Shaw and James, as well as deputy manager Briley are generally excluded, except when something comes up that demands all the council to vote. Then it winds up, first, in pending litigation, out of the public's eye.

# Nosker tosses his hat in the ring for judge

Former Lincoln County commissioner Ken Nosker announced Wednesday that he'll be a candidate in the Republican Primary for the Ruidoso magistrate bench.

"I intend to make a hard run for the magistrate job," said Nosker in a telephone interview.

Nosker has lived in Lincoln County all his life except while serving as an Air Force pilot during World War II.

He served 12 years as a county commissioner, and eight years as probate judge, and after a few years off from public service, he's ready to jump back into the political arena.

"While serving as commissioner, one of my top priorities was to guard taxpayers' money," said Nosker, who also served on the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission that secured millions in federal airport improvement funds to develop and build a safe replacement airport for the old Ruidoso airfield.

Working on airport development wasn't new to Nosker. After his ser-

vice in the air transport command during World War II, he headed home and joined with another veteran, Dewey Gann, in developing the original Ruidoso airport in 1947.

Nosker's Air Force unit, which later became the Strategic Air Command, followed the action from Australia to China, so he saw a big chunk of the world — from the air.

But, when he came home to Lincoln County it was to stay.

The Nosker family had been farming here since 1919, and Ken Nosker expanded the family business into a meat packing company with a retail outlet on Highway 70.

Nosker was first elected to the Lincoln County Commission in 1962, and it was during that term that the county built the new courthouse in Carrizozo.

Nosker is proud of his past accomplishments as an elected official, but is realistic about the rewards.

"Sometimes what you consider to be your best work, gets you the

most criticism," said Nosker. The Sierra Blanca Regional Airport is a good example.

"I just believe that I did the right thing in the airport," said Nosker, who was serving during the time that the Ruidoso airport was considered the most dangerous in the Southwest.

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission brought \$13 million into the county that didn't cost the taxpayers, recalled Nosker. That money came from a fund that is derived from airline ticket sales.

Nosker's wife, Irene, drives a school bus.

"Since 1925, one of the Nosker family has been driving a school bus either to Ruidoso or Hondo," said Nosker.

The Noskers have three children. Their sons, Dennis and Ralph, both live and work in the Hondo Valley, and their daughter, Rene McCoy, lives in Roswell.

Nosker said he waited until he was sure Governor Bruce King was going to appoint someone in Magistrate Judge J.R. "Jim"

Wheeler's place before making his final decision to run.

"I'm very serious about running," he said.

"I would like to have the job. I am qualified; I have the background and the education, and I certainly have the interests of the people of Lincoln County at heart," said Nosker.

"My intentions would be to have an even-handed court," said Nosker. "I get a little upset once in awhile by some of these people who do drugs, but most of the time they're not in magistrate."

"When you break the law you ought to realize it and be cognizant of the fact that you should pay for your mistakes."

"A lot of it has to do with the person's personality, if they're contrite, they ought to deserve some extra consideration."

"If they're one of these hardliners, they ought to have to face some hard consequences."

Nosker will sign up next April for the Republican primary.

### Fort Stanton worker arrested

An instructor at Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School has been charged with fondling a 14-year-old girl, according to records at the Lincoln County Jail.

Sheriff's Deputy Larry Cearley said E.J. "Joe" Switzer, 33, who heads the woodworking school at the fort, was arrested June 12 on charges of enticement of a minor and criminal sexual contact of a minor.

He posted bond for the require \$50,000 bail two days later and was released from jail.

Fort Stanton administrator Ervin Aldaz said state policy follows the premise that a person is innocent until proven guilty and Switzer will continue in his role at the fort.

"Of course, we always are cognizant of how the case progresses," Aldaz told The Ruidoso News Friday. "If someone is judged guilty, we will be notified and the person would be dismissed."

Aldaz emphasized that the alleged incident June 8 did not involve any of the clients at the fort.

Cearley said Switzer, who is married and has three children, was arrested at his home. He was arraigned in the court of Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean in Carrizozo. Switzer and his attorney, Gary Mitchell, could not be reached for comment Friday.

### Skeen set for back surgery

Congressman Joe Skeen (R-NM) entered the hospital Wednesday to undergo back surgery designed to relieve pressure on his vertebrae, according to a news release provided by his office.

"This conditions has caused me to suffer near-unbearable pain for some time," said Skeen, a Lincoln County rancher. "The pressure on nerve roots in my back has pinched the sciatic nerve, which runs down my left leg. It even got so bad that I've been forced to walk with a cane in the last week to relieve the pain and pressure," said Skeen.

The surgery, described as "tedious and microscopic," was expected to last three to four hours, and Skeen is scheduled for limited physical therapy after a short stay in the hospital.

Skeen's doctors are unable to predict how long he will be away from his duties in the House of Representatives, but Skeen said he will coordinate regularly with his staff.

Lincoln County has been approved for the Emergency Livestock Feed Program due to the drought that has been in existence since August of 1992, according to Fred Pfingsten, chairman of the Lincoln County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Producers who have suffered at least a 40 percent loss of their normal feed for livestock and are presently having to feed in excess of normal, are eligible to file for assistance in buying feed to maintain their livestock until they receive sufficient moisture and forage production.

The present feeding period ends August 31.

Applications can be filed at the ASCS office located at 1909 Cuba Avenue #3, in Alamogordo.

homa, Kansas, Maryland, Mexico, Michigan, New Jersey, Florida and the Netherlands have also made appearances.


"There will be numerous divisions for all skill levels," Villescas said.

Here is this week's installment of the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish fishing report.

This information is by no means infallible, but it is some of the best available from officers and anglers.

The most current stocking records in the report are from the week of May 29 through June 4.

In this stocking 57,271 rainbow trout were stocked from state hatcheries. 32,809 of them were nine and a half inches or larger.

Here are the conditions for the area this week:  
Alto Lake—Some fish are being taken on green/yellow power bait.

Bonito Creek—Crews stocked below the dam with 511, the north fork with 101, and Fort Stanton with 202 9 1/2-inch rainbow trout.

Bonito Lake—Fishing is fair using green/yellow power bait. Crews stocked 2,771 9 1/2-inch rainbow trout.

Ruidoso River—Crews stocked 1,201 9 1/2-inch rainbow trout.

Tularosa Creek—Fishing is good in the early morning and late evening hours using worms and small spinners.

Grindstone Reservoir—Some fish are being taken on green/yellow power bait.

Elephant Butte Lake—Fishing is good for black bass lake-wide using crank baits; best times are late afternoon and early evening hours. Catfish are being taken on waterdogs, cut bait and prepared bait. The best area for white bass is at the north end of the lake, Monticello Canyon and McRay Canyon using minnows and Sassy Shad. Fishing is good at night using a light around the Marina.

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## Hondo school hires super

Candelaria was interviewed for the superintendent's position in early June and was notified June 10 that he had the job.

Candelaria and his wife, Hilda, have two children, a 20-year-old daughter who lives Las Cruces and an eight-year-old son.

## Feds dole out funds

Counties in New Mexico will receive more than \$1.6-million from the 1993 National Forest Service receipts, according to estimates from officials with the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

A projected total of \$309-million will be shared among 43 states and Puerto Rico.

Lincoln County's portion will be \$45,747, ninth out of the 22 New Mexico counties eligible for payments.

Topping the list in the state is Catron County, which will receive \$325,497, followed by Rio Arriba at \$318,962, Taos at \$105,149, Grant at \$96,366, Sandoval at \$94,685, San Miguel at \$90,626, Santa Fe at \$64,221 and Socorro at \$60,681.

F. Dale Robertson, chief of the USDA Forest Service, said the receipts are collected from land use fees and sale of resources on 191 million acres of national forests and grasslands. Federal law requires states to use their share of the receipts for public schools and roads.

The state receiving the most from the utilization of their forests are Oregon at \$130.8-million, California at \$55.8-million, Washington at \$31.1-million and Montana at \$12.1-million.

# Panamanian jockey is riding high here

Some of the world's greatest jockeys come from Panama and this year one of those jockeys, Roger Gomez, is battling for the leading rider title at Ruidoso Downs.

Gomez, 41, learned the basics of riding at a jockey school in Panama, which also produced such world class jockeys as Laffit Pincay and Jorge Velasquez. While enrolled in the one-year program, Gomez worked for a racing stable in the morning then attended classes in the afternoon.

He had to graduate from the school to earn his jockey license, then he was free to ride anywhere he chose. He rode in his homeland for a few years, but decided to move to the United States in the mid-70s.

"There is only one racetrack in Panama and since it only runs four days a week, it is hard to keep good jockeys there," said Gomez. "Fred Hooper was one of the first owners to bring jockeys to the U.S. when he got Pincay, (Jorge) Velasquez, and (Braulio) Baeza in the '60s."

Gomez, 41, grew up with Hall of Famer Pincay in Panama City and credits his fellow countryman with helping him get accustomed to riding in the United States when he arrived in California in 1975 to ride for trainer Barney Willis.

"He (Pincay) is one of my idols. When I was riding in California I would watch him and ask him questions about improving my style," said Gomez. "He always gave me good advice and introduced me to trainers. He helped me a lot."

With the help of Pincay and Willis and a lot of hard work, Gomez developed into one of the top riders in California. In 1980, Gomez was the regular rider on the Willis-trained colt Doonesbury who ran second in both the California Juvenile Stakes and California Derbies in Northern California to become one of the early favorites for the Kentucky Derby.

"We went to the (Grade I)

Bluegrass Stakes at Keeneland and ran fourth. After the race he got a quarter crack and missed the Triple Crown, but he was one of the best horses I ever rode," said Gomez.

Gomez moved his tack to the East Coast in the mid-1980s and rode in New York, New Jersey and Florida where he had the opportunity to work for the some of the nation's best stables.

Fred Hooper, a two-time Eclipse Award winner, and Bob Levy, owner of Atlantic City Race Course were just a few of the owners who called on Gomez to handle their top quality horses.

When Remington Park opened in 1988, Gomez decided to try his luck at the Oklahoma City track.

"My wife (trainer Mindy Willis) took 20 head of horses there and we haven't left since it opened. We liked Remington and decided to stay the last five years," said Gomez.

While at Remington, Gomez won numerous stakes including three turf stakes in 1989 aboard Merlin Of York, trained by his wife. His biggest win on Merlino of York was in the \$100,000 Budweiser Breeders' Cup.

The horse earned Champion Older Male and Champion Turf honors at Remington that spring.

Gomez' success continued in 1991 when he won two stakes including the \$50,000 Autumn Classic Breeders' Cup and the \$50,000 Oklahoma Thoroughbred Association Derby.

In the summer of 1992, Gomez ranked among the top riders at Canterbury Downs near Minneapolis. He won five stakes during the meeting including three on Minnesota Champions Day.

Gomez primarily rides thoroughbreds, so during Remington's summer quarter horse meet, he needed to move his tack elsewhere. He was interested in New Mexico and decided to move here after talking

with former Ruidoso riding champ Glen Murphy who is now at Louisiana Downs.

"Glen recommended Ricardo (Garcia) as an agent and since he knows so many people, everything is working well so far."

The Gomez-Garcia combo has been very successful in the first six weeks at Ruidoso this summer. Gomez ranks a close second in the standings with 17 wins from 116 mounts riding for most of the top trainers including Bill Leach, Bob Arnett and Fred Danley.

"I really like New Mexico, I enjoy the people because they are so helpful and the horses are racing well for me. I might go to Sunland this fall since things are going so well. I'd like to keep it that way," said Gomez.

The veteran rider credits his success to a good work ethic and a keeping his body in top condition.

Gomez, who weighs in at around 108 lbs., gets to the track at 6:15 a.m. every morning to work horses.

"When I breeze a horse in the morning I get feelings for the horse which helps me when I have to ride him in a race. Once I get used to a horse I know how to keep him happy to get the most run out of him," said Gomez.

Gomez has been riding for nearly 20 years, but doesn't plan on retiring anytime soon.

"This is the only thing I've done in my life since I got out of school and I expect to keep going as long as I can. So far everything is OK and I feel good for my age."

# Rich Breeders Cup attracts a fine field

A classy field of older horses will go to post in the \$75,000-added Ruidoso Budweiser Breeders' Cup, Saturday at Ruidoso Downs.

The one mile route is the richest thoroughbred handicap offered during the 70-day summer meeting.

The full field of twelve features numerous stakes winners and nearly half the runners will make their first start at Ruidoso this year.

James Furgason's Dart, winner of the Sunland Park Handicap and a respectable second to Last Don B. in the Governor's Handicap here May 29, heads the evenly matched field.

The 6-year-old Kentucky-bred gelding by Copelan most recently ran a dull sixth in the Kit Carson Handicap at Albuquerque, but

should rebound for trainer Cliff Lambert on Saturday.

Dart has excellent early speed, but also has shown closing ability and must be considered a double threat.

Louisiana Downs shipper Spancil Hill rates as one of the top contenders making his first start at Ruidoso Downs. The regally-bred colt by Alydar comes off a strong third place finish against allowance company at the Bossier City oval.


The Donrita Laverty-trainee has run consistently throughout his career which has included starts at Saratoga, Belmont and Churchill Downs.

Two other horses that merit attention in the race include the consistent stakes performers Gee

Ryder and Capitalimprovement. Mike Weatherly's Gee Ryder won the 1991 Ruidoso Derby Prep and also ran a solid third in last year's Ruidoso Sprint Championship.

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
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

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# County considers care and maintenance of fairgrounds

Private individuals who use the Lincoln County Fairground and earn a profit should pay a fee that will at least keep the arena in good condition, County Commissioners said Tuesday.

During the special meeting, commissioners fired some questions at Fair Board president Gordon Barham about the condition of the facility and about county road equipment being used by an individual without permission. They pushed for the board to come up with a better approach to maintaining and improving the fairground.

Commissioner Chairman Monroy Montes said the commission and road department, which has built a solid reputation, received a black eye, because an individual took some equipment from the fairground to use it on his own arena.

The tractor had been left at the fairground to be used as needed on the public arena.

"The tractor is back at the yard now," Barham said. "We are officially requesting its use to rework the arena between performances (over the July Fourth weekend) under (road manager Bill Cupit's) supervision."

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley said he could see lending the equipment for the event, but questioned if it was necessary to use county employees to operate it to avoid what previously happened.

"I have a real problem taking road people off a job, but if you have to use a specialized piece of equipment, I would prefer someone qualified was there," he said. "I certainly don't want 14 year-old children (driving it). As far as the tractor, I prefer it was left there through the fair."

Cupit said whoever drives the tractor is insured as long as it is on county property such as the fairground.

Commissioner Wilton Howell said residents of the county own the fairground and arena.

"It's in bad shape because of the use by a rodeo promoter," he said. "What kind of fee does he pay, because I know he charges a gate fee."

Barham said the promoter Bill Bennet only pays for the utilities he uses.

He is allowed to use the facility "so we could open up usage of the arena and encourage others to use it," Barham said. He conducts practices there and bull riding clinics there.

Other than Bennet, the arena stands empty much of the time.

"It's something we can address whether we should continue with someone using it for gain and we get nothing," Barham said.

"It's costing us money for him to use it, because the county pays the insurance and he's raking in the bucks," Howell said. "We're not covering expenses and it's apparent he didn't maintain it."

Livestock was left overnight at the fairground, Howell said.

"What if it had gotten out. Would we have been liable? Why should we be the brunt of it?"

Barham said the insurance stays the same no matter how many events are staged.

"How do you determine who uses it? How'll asked. "Do you go out for bids?"

"He's the only one," Barham said. "And the Grady Lee Memorial by the Cowbells. It's a non-profit group, but the event makes money."

"We're concerned that it's a jewel of the county with \$165,000 to be pumped into it over the next six to nine months and it's up to your board to be sure the money is spent wisely," said Montes. "A year from now, I don't want to see the road department on standby to take care of your arena. I couldn't tolerate that. Long range, I would like to see your board generate enough money to buy a tractor."

Barham said the facility never has been profitable.

"This man does pay his bills and we want to encourage use," he said.

"I didn't realize the amount of compaction that had occurred with it being used four to five days a week. I didn't realize the impact."

Spencer said Bennet is not making a big profit on the endeavor. The arena has been a broke operation. It's there for the kids," he said.

"But if someone is charging, I agree he should leave it in as good condition as he found it."

"It's the kids learning to rope (that's important)," Nunley said.

Cupit said several employees have volunteered to help on their own time to run the equipment, "because everybody is devoted to the fairground."

On a motion from Commissioner Bill Schwettmann, liaison commissioner to the fair board, the commission approved helping with preparation of the arena for the holiday weekend.

Cupit said at some point before the 1994 Smokey Bear Fiftieth Birthday celebration about two feet of sand needs to be added to the arena after reworking the ground. The cost in labor will be about \$12,000, he said.

Barham said the board is planning long term improvements for the 1994 event, not a quick fix like that being sought for this year's July Fourth weekend.

Spencer expressed his support for the all volunteer board.

"Insurance and liability was my only question," he said. "It's an asset and is for the people of the county. Show it off, fix it up."

However, other criticism of the fair board came from one of its own members.

In a letter to the commissioners, Mollie Mason asked that she not be reappointed when her term expires in August.

She said the major concern of most Fair Board members is the "livestock, rodeo facilities and outside improvements. The inside of the building and it's operation is the last thing on the list of priorities."

In 1991, about \$8,000 was spent on sheep pens, she wrote. In 1992, about \$7,000 went for pig pens.

"Now they want to spend thousands of dollars on the rodeo arena and stands and equipment. Isn't it about time some money is spent on the inside?" she asked. "The inside displays and entries have declined every year for the past four years."

"Three of the departments have no one in charge, no planning has been done, no ribbons ordered, no judges contacted, no preparations on building..."

Suggestions from her about hiring a "building superintendent" were ignored, Mason said.

"I thought I could do some good by being on the Fair Board," she said. "I felt like they needed someone interested in the inside part of the Fair. But...I'm by myself and I can't take the stress of not getting things done."

In other business, the commission:

—approved a resolution covering a budget adjustment required by the state auditors in reference to the sheriff's department. The auditors wanted line items created for sheriff's seizure money for drug enforcement operations.

"The auditors recommended it be handled as all other county money, with the sheriff still having control," said county manager Andy Wynham. "But he wanted each expenditure listed."

Sheriff James McSwane said he was somewhat disappointed with the ruling, since the money has been handled the same way for years.

"If it simplifies and they prefer it this way, no problem," McSwane said. "I don't want to lose the money in the shuffle. The money never is under my control entirely. I have to ask the commission."

While reviewing the \$16,281 in drug enforcement expenses, commissioners asked about \$2,000 budgeted for a drug sniffing dog.

McSwane said the full cost to maintain the dog for one year is \$25,000. This way, the county kicks in \$2,000 toward upkeep and someone else has to care for the dog and carry the liability.

Other expenses listed included \$1,000 clothing allowance for agents, \$7,781 in wages for the White Mountain Task Force, \$5,000 to the district attorney, \$500 as contribution to the school drug program called DARE.

—approved a resolution that states if a personnel policy adopted by the sheriff's department conflicts with provisions of the county's personnel policy, the latter prevails.

McSwane said he and county attorney Alan Morel are working out any areas that appear to conflict. He said even under state statutes, law enforcement officers have additional rights and the policy merely details those rights.

—noted that under new state law, which took effect June 13, commissioners may not take action on items that do not appear on the advertised agenda.

Called the Howell amendment during an earlier meeting in recognition of the commissioner's previous opposition to adding items to an agenda, the regulations does not prohibit discussion.

In line with other new requirements under the open meetings act, commissioners read a new statement after adjourning a closed executive session and reconvening the open meeting. The statement affirmed that only items relating to the stated exception of pending litigation were discussed during the closed session.



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# Museum presents June program

help people understand how historians learn about different societies, and how historians believe Southern New Mexico developed.

Dr. Jeffrey Brown was born in Chicago, Illinois, in 1950. He attended the University of Illinois at Urbana and received his doctorate in American History there in 1979. His studies emphasized the development of the early American frontier.

After teaching at the University of Northern Iowa and Lake Forest College, Dr. Brown came to New Mexico State University in 1984 as Director of that university's Public History Program. He and his students have studied many aspects of New Mexico history, particularly

during the period 1865-1932, and have prepared museum exhibits, audio visual productions, and brochures about a number of topics.

Dr. Brown served as acting associate dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at New Mexico State University in 1991-92, and is currently associate dean.

He is an active member of the National Council on Public History, the Oral History Association and the Society for Historians of the Early American Republic. He is also currently president of the Rotary Club of Las Cruces.

### Public servants are gambling with their people's future

Let's not forget: elected officials are public servants, not dictators, and when they fail to respond to the will of the people, then it's time to throw the bums out. Municipal elections will take place in March.

This village is still in shock over the actions of its public servants. The people spoke and half the council — Mayor Pro-tem Barbara Duff and councilors Ron Andrews and Bill Karn — thumbed their noses at the very people they were elected to serve.

Most meetings of the Ruidoso Village Council are not very well-attended, but the issue of extending the lease on R.D. Hubbard's resort hotel brought business leaders out in force last week — they spoke, they reasoned and they nearly begged the elected officials to clear the way for the hotel. But Duff, Andrews and Karn smiled benevolently on their people and voted down the best hope this village has for continued economic prosperity.

Do they know something that the rest of us don't? They may have thought so since they have such a propensity for closed and private discussions. If the trio looked smug, it could be because each of them thought they had an ace up their sleeve. The lease had been discussed behind closed doors at the last village meeting, and these three seemed anxious to remove their public service from the scrutiny of so many voters.

During that special meeting, Duff was holding a plan that she never introduced at the open session — why didn't she share her thoughts with the council?

Andrews, who had a last-minute legal question over the lease and extensions he had helped approve, apparently had plans for a maverick maneuver where he could dictate terms on his own with a negotiator of his own choosing. The day after the meeting he went to Councilor Frank Cummins and the two of them told Ruidoso Downs Race Track manager Max Johnson that they wanted to meet and negotiate with Johnson and Hubbard Museum employee Frank Potter. Cummins confirmed that Andrews didn't want to negotiate with Hubbard's attorney, Don Dutton.

Karn, the councilor who may have known full of discussions even started that Hubbard would puff out if pushed to negotiate, went to Councilor J.D. James the day after the special meeting, saying he was ready to change his vote.

Now these three councilors, with their backroom plotting and power plays, have halted the hotel, saying in their various cagy ways that, yes, they're really for the hotel, BUT — and go on to list their litany of smokescreen questions. But we aren't buying it this time, and we hope the voters aren't either.

You don't expect your public servants to shoot you in the foot.

### Somebody needs an attitude adjustment

Remember former Mayor Victor Alonso? I do.

I remember when the civic events center was being built how he knew the future was in trade shows and conventions.

I told him he was wrong, that meeting rooms was the name of the game. How little I knew.

Corporations would come to the hotel next door, I told him, and use the meeting rooms or banquet facilities. After the meeting and banquet was over, they would go back to their hotel rooms or head for downtown, horse racing, golf, skiing, whatever.

As it turns out, Alonso was right. Corporations aren't going to beat a path to a Ruidoso hotel that isn't there, and so far, trade shows have dominated the center.

How did the man know? It must be pure genius.

Original civic events center plans called for a smaller center, that better benefited the size of the hotel to be next door.

The village council did it bigger to accommodate trade shows and conventions the village would bring. They even talked about all the electric outlets needed for the floor, some 10-20 feet apart, to accommodate booths.

I wrote that it sounded like they were going to hold a bunch of flea markets. I caught hell for that one. Trade shows are not flea markets, thank you very much.

It was no secret that with a hotel and civic events center, transportation was a mighty important consideration, whether for trade shows or meetings.

Mesa Airlines was given a trial shot at a regular schedule service to and out of Sierra Blanca Airport.

But Mesa couldn't get their act together. Sure it brought in a few high rollers at the Ruidoso Downs Race Track, but who did that help? R. Dee Hubbard? What about the skiers? Between Hubbard's hotel and Ski Apache, not enough pickins.

No sir-ree bob, we could bump Mesa and get another airlines somehow. Hell, if we could subsidize Mesa, we could subsidize someone else. Maybe locals. Maybe make a few bucks, who knows?

And by golly, we came close. Council appointed transportation board chairman Dick Weber, also a lodger, collected enough money

to secure a few pilots and draft up a neat logo. Ze plane! Ze plane! It was the only thing missing.

I mean, pilots can stand at the end of the runway with logos on their backs and flap their wings, but they ain't goin' anywhere.

We don't have a hotel next to the center either, but we have plenty of lodging in Upper Canyon and other areas. Who needs a hotel? We could shuttle people to our lodgers through a mass transit system.

Yes, a mass transit system. Alonso was right again.

We could revitalize those plans to make a run from the Swiss Chalet, to the "poor people in the Downs." Then we could have a shuttle bus to take people to the trade shows and back to their motel rooms in Upper Canyon and other areas. See, we don't need a hotel.

Let's have a little different attitude said petition signers Dick Weber of Shadow Mountain Lodge, Jay Francis of Swiss Chalet, Bill and Jackie Rawlins of the Ruidoso Lodge, Clark and Anita Carpenter of DanDee Cabins, Rex and Teresa Beatty of Forest Home Cabins.

Wait a minute. I don't want to give the impression the petition was all lodgers. Friends and family of the lodgers and others also signed.

OK. So it looks like a lot of lodgers were

burned at The News. Coincidence, I say.

Yes, conventions and trade shows are very much the village's future. Why even the Inn of the Mountain Gods is sending business our way, according to civic events center director Kathleen Michelena.

The Gods are renovating out there for something big I guess.

The sign along U.S. 70 that marks the turnoff to the Inn used to read "Bingo" underneath. Now it reads, "Casino Apache."

It's hard enough to fill out a card with B-I-N-G-O. Now you have to play C-A-S-I-N-O. It'll never work. But that's what I told Alonso about the center and the trade shows.

In fact, I now think trade shows are an excellent idea for the center. We should have one trade show every weekend called Taco America. Hundreds of booths selling sopapillas and tacos and burritos at cut rate prices.

On alternate weekends we could have Beds R' Us. Fill the massive center with bunk beds for cheap lodging. Hell, we could even bring out those army surplus tents village manager Ron Wicker bought for the center and spread them out on the lawn for the tourists.

Alonso was right. Give the man credit.

### Our village is up a creek without a hotel

The ship of state — the Ruidoso Council — has lost a rudder and the crew cannot be found. A sorry situation indeed at a time when the economic future of Ruidoso is at stake.

At a special called meeting on June 15 a plan to extend an agreement to allow the Hubbard interests to consider downsizing the planned hotel more in keeping with local needs the extension was scuttled by the council on a three to three vote. It is doubtful that the council was aware of the disastrous affect of their "no action" decision would have on our economy now and into the future.

Extending the Hubbard agreement could have been a simple procedure — a motion to extend a vote — and then on to plans to build the long awaited hotel.

But — not so! A simple solution became impossible when it was suggested by a councilman, almost at the twelfth hour, that the original extensions of the Hubbard agreement might be considered illegal. A black cloud took over the council proceedings spreading doubt and confusion among the councilors. The result was a three-to-three split vote which, in essence, killed any

plans by the Hubbard interests to build a hotel for the taxpayers of Ruidoso.

The fact is, Mr. Hubbard, in separate conversations with several of the council members had disclosed his desire to build a downsized hotel within a reasonable time frame.

However, promises to this effect, not withstanding, did little to influence the council decision to extend the agreement which would have guaranteed the hotel construction.

Then — the bombshell!

At the conclusion of the meeting a mysterious new proposal appeared on the mayor pro-tem's desk. Apparently members of the council were not aware of the new develop-

ments which added to an already confused council.

The Ruidoso News obtained a copy of the new proposal which was published in the June 17 edition of The News.

An analysis of the proposal revealed a startling conclusion — demands made to another party in the manner made in the proposal were in bad taste, unbusiness-like and to the point of being insulting to the Hubbard interests and the result was obvious.

Mr. Hubbard has stated that he has no further plans to build the proposed hotel.

Would that Ruidoso have an organization composed of local business men and the like with a wealth of experience to act as a buffer between the council, and, in this case, the Hubbard interests, to face the problem head on and to accomplish what is best in the interests of Ruidoso.

Extending this contract would be beneficial to Ruidoso. The Ruidoso Village Council appears incapable of making the proper decision, and it appears that some persuasion is necessary that the will of a visible majority be protected in this case.

Now is the time for all brave men.

## Eagle Ranch Gallery & Gift Shop presents a special exhibit of works by area potters

Works by eight area potters are on exhibit from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. seven days a week at the Eagle Ranch Gallery on Highway 54-70, five miles north of Alamogordo. "Pottery, Pottery, Pottery," will showcase the talents of professional potters located in the Sacramento Mountains and the Tularosa Basin. Patti Fish of Wayside Pottery is coordinating the group exhibit. "I have been amazed at the number and quality of the potters working in the area," said Fish in a news release. "I thought it would be a wonderful opportunity to show our best works in a gallery setting," she said. "While many people are familiar with the different potters through craft fairs and by visiting shops, we have never displayed as a group." The show will highlight the quality and the diversity of the potters' work. Each potter has developed his or her individual style. As an example, many of the participants will have a place setting of dinnerware on display. "I think it will be interesting to see how a potter can take something as basic as a plate, bowl and cup and come up with an original design that will be quite different from another potter's work," commented Fish. The participating potters in the show are: Patti Fish of Wayside Pottery. She opened for business in 1982 in the historic Wayside Inn building in Cloudcroft. Started in a back porch area, the

pottery has grown to include a showroom and the studios and galleries of three fine artists. Fish's work involves the weaving of clay strips to form baskets, and some pieces incorporate reed basketry as accent rims and handles. She also specializes in terra cotta platters painted in florals using bright reds. The primary outlets for her work are the Cloudercroft shop, Canyon Gallery in Ruidoso and one or two art fairs a year. Al Potter more than 20 years ago established his pottery and home in the village of La Luz. The first studio potter in the area, he has worked in his adobe studio, producing pots, and he has a loyal following of collectors. Known for his beautiful glazing, Potter has sold his work from his studio, through galleries and art fairs throughout the southwest. This summer Potter will be taking a new path in his career as he is planning to move to Tucson where he will establish a new studio. Roy Brown and Joy Brown are partners in pottery and in life. A Texas native, Roy Brown obtained a graduate degree in ceramics in Texas and worked as an artist in residence in Oregon. He returned to the southwest in 1981 and located his pottery studio in his home in Tularosa. In 1983, he was joined by Joy Brown. She had completed her degree at New Mexico State University and started her business in Las Cruces in 1979 and later worked in

Colorado. Together they created Tularosa Old Town Pottery, their showroom and studio. Since each was a potter before joining forces, each continues to produce his or her own distinctive style. Joy is known for her functional ware that is thrown on the wheel and then altered to form various shapes. Roy's specialty is vases with intricately textured surfaces. They sell their work from their Tularosa shop and travel to art fairs in Arizona, Utah, Texas as well as New Mexico. Ed and Pat Rooney are unique because they work as a team to produce their ware. Ed forms the clay on the potters wheel to make the pots, then Pat decorates the surfaces. Together they have created the successful White Sands Pottery that is now sold at shops nationwide. They have been producing pottery for 15 years — eight years at their present home/studio in an adobe located in High Rolls. Recently they have expanded to include the Fresnal Canyon Gallery, located on Highway 82 just above the tunnel. The gallery sells the White Sands Pottery as well as the work of other artists. Alan Day, a native of New England, completed his MFA in New Hampshire and started his first pottery business on the east coast. Almost 20 years ago he moved his home and studio to a ridgetop off West Side Road in High Rolls. Day markets his pottery at art

fairs as far away as Kansas City, Omaha and Dallas and sells his pottery locally from an open-air showroom at his studio. Day's pottery is intricately decorated in soft pastels. He specializes in hand-built platters in unusual geometric shapes. Don Ellis divides his time and energies between his Cloudercroft Pottery located on Burro Street in Cloudercroft and Abilene, Texas, where he is chairman of the Art Department at McMurry College. He took over Cloudercroft Pottery while Don works on the potter's wheel on the front porch or in his log cabin studio that he built two years ago behind the shop. Large decorative vases using the raku firing technique are one of his specialties. He has recently been granted a sabbatical and will be able to work at his pottery in Cloudercroft on a full-time basis through January. Wes Brownfield was raised in Alamogordo and a graduate of New Mexico State University in Las Cruces, he left the area for several years and returned in 1987 to start his pottery business. He has learned his skills through apprenticing with a potter in Montana and still works with other potters on a part-time basis. His current studio is on Cottage Row in High Rolls. His work is sold through shops in New Mexico and Arizona and to visitors to his studio. His specialty is distinctive pitchers in the style of traditional British folk pottery.
