Festival features auction, ice cream



Planning commission will hear 10 separate requests

A mini storage facility is slated for the John Brown tracts if approved Tuesday by the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Department.

Village planner Cleatus Richard approves Brown's plan provided that: a 25-foot entrance be paved, screen planting be provided on the chain link fencing and Brown petition the village council requesting village participation in construction of a 24-inch CMP across Gavilan Canyon Road.

Richards, who makes a recommendation for the Planning and Zoning Commission to consider before making its official decision on such requests, said an alternative drainage plan will be submitted if the request is denied by the village council.

The planning commission will hear 10 other pieces of business at the 2 p.m. meeting including:

—a request by Kenny Haynes for replat of Lots 2 & 3, Block 4, of Cree Meadows Country Club. Haynes wants to sell a lot and needs a lot line adjustment and plat provisions for maintenance of a common driveway easement.

—a replat request from Trueman Auld for Lots 22 & 23 of Block 11, Ponderosa Heights, to consolidate into one lot.

—William Schumpert request for a replat for Lots 2 & 3, Block 7, of Forest Heights Subdivision, to consolidate into one lot containing 36,000 square feet.

Planner Richards recommends approval if Schumpert prepares a

plat with new lot designations, area calculations and contain approval block for private utilities and lienholder, Ruidoso State Bank.

—a side yard variance request by Robert Hollis of Lot 3 & 1/2 of Lo' 4 in C.E. Webb Subdivision does not receive Richards' recommendation to build a carport.

Hollis said the site was the only feasible place for his carport and no structure would be changed.

Richards said no site conditions have been disclosed justifying variance consideration.

—a front yard variance request from Robert McAtee for Lot 18, Block 2, of Cree Meadows Heights, 3rd Addition. McAtee wants to construct a 20 x 20-foot carport within two feet of the property line.

Girl injured in 'Zozo shooting

A seven-year-old girl was shot Sunday while watching an Independence Day softball game at Carrizozo Park.

Adriann R. Zamora was listed in stable, but serious condition at Eastern New Mexico Medical Center Hospital, deputy sheriff Ken Jones said Monday.

"The details are still somewhat sketchy, but apparently, three boys ranging in age from 10 to 16 were in the area hunting rabbits with a 22 caliber rifle," he said.

Around noon, the weapon apparently was discharged and the bullet entered the girl's left side, may have punctured a lung and then lodged near her spine on the right side, Jones said.

Witnesses told **The Ruidoso News** when the girl screamed "they thought she had been bitten by a bug, but when they pulled her hand

away, there was blood everywhere."

"The boys were apprehended by some citizens who had seen them in the area," Jones said. "Once they realized the little girl had been injured (by gun shot), they went over and stopped the individuals and detained them until (deputy Charlie Engleking) and I arrived. We questioned them. At this point appears it was an item."

Jones said the girl is being stabilized before physicians operate to remove the bullet. Her parents, Leroy and Francis Zamora are with her in Roswell at the hospital.

Sheriff James McSwane said the names of the boys are being withheld until the investigation is complete.

"At most, one of the suspects may be charged with negligent use of a firearm," he said.

State takes a look at LCSWA books

No special audit of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority is warranted, according to a report from the State Auditor.

Steve Archibeque, audit manager of the Santa Fe office, said he visited Ruidoso last month to review criticisms in the authority's audit in the wake of revelations that checkbooks hadn't been balanced for nine months.

Archibeque met with the new general manager of the authority, Joe Lewandowsky, and came away with the impression that he was instituting the necessary corrections and had a handle on the problems.

"The auditor had pointed out that the filing system was a mess and accounts receivable were not up to date," Archibeque said.

"But they hired a consultant to set up the system properly. They have a new accounting system up and going," he told **The Ruidoso News**.

"The hourly rate they paid the consultant seemed reasonable and they have been training new people. They hired part-time employees and a new office manager to help."

"Overall, the new manager seems to have a lot of experience in the area and is taking corrective action."

The State Auditor's office usually does not get involved in special audits unless there are indications of fraud, waste, abuse or illegal acts going on, Archibeque said. "But if it is more a lack of manpower and they can't afford to hire more, we tend not to stress."

The office depends a great deal on the local auditor who performs the yearly audit to alert the state when there are significant problems.

"If he's alarmed, we'll hear from the local auditor," Archibeque said. "The State Auditor rules require local auditors to report directly to us in a separate letter if they suspect or uncover illegal acts."

Other criticisms contained in the annual audit (by local auditor Ron Hemphill) for 1991-92, which only covered a few months of operation, included that:

—financial statement preparation was being left to the auditor.

"This probably will be the same situation next year until the new staff is trained and learns about government reports," Archibeque said.

—procurement regulations had been violated.

"I talked to them about that and (Lewandowsky) said he is well aware of the code and how to comply."

MRS project director to present update for Ruidoso councilors

Ruidoso councilors can look forward to a complete update Tuesday, July 27, on Mescalero's efforts to host a nuclear waste disposal site.

Fred Peso, Mescalero Tribal Councilor and MRS project manager, has accepted an invitation from Mayor Pro-tem Barbara Duff to speak during the last regular council meeting in July.

"I have delayed responding while we waited on the Department of Energy and the Clinton administration to clearly signal their commitment to the voluntary siting process for an MRS," wrote Peso.

"Following the nomination of former Congressman Richard Stallings as Nuclear Waste Negotiator and several direct communications with the Department of Energy, we are now confident that applications for additional MRS feasibility grant monies will be considered," he continued.

The Mescalero Apache Tribe has received two study grants totaling \$300,000 for studies and education about siting the highly radioactive spent fuel rods from nuclear power stations. The federal government has obligated itself to take custody

of the nuclear waste, and has been seeking a volunteer to provide a home for the rods.

Peso is apparently encouraged by the Clinton administration's choice for secretary of the Department of Energy and its continued support for the Nuclear Waste Negotiator's Office. He has agreed to speak to the same Ruidoso council that has openly and strongly opposed the placement of nuclear waste in or near the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation.

"At this time we feel that our communication with the Village Council should be kept on a strict government-to-government basis," continued Peso.

"There will be ample opportunity for general public hearings in the months ahead.... Therefore, I respectfully decline your suggestion that questions be taken from the audience on the 27th, since it has been our experience that this can only lead to a circus atmosphere which obstructs, rather than fosters meaningful communication between our governments."

Public hearings and dissemination of information are important, and even required, in the next

stage in the MRS siting process, explained Peso.

"Should the Mescalero Tribal Council decide to apply for Phase 2, Stage 2 funding in the near future, a significant portion of this grant application would be earmarked for a public hearing and information process in which Ruidoso and all other potentially affected communities would participate," said Peso.

Peso wrote to Lake Barrett, acting director for the Department of Energy's Office of Civilian Radioactive Waste Management, asking about grants for neighbors to MRS sites.

Barrett's associate director, Ronald A. Milner, wrote back saying that the Nuclear Waste Policy Act makes no provision for funding for surrounding communities to assess impacts of siting an MRS facility.

On the other hand, the Department of Energy would be favorable to a grant application provision which earmarks a portion of funds for redistribution to neighboring communities in order that they might conduct their own public participation programs.

County checks out Bonito receipts

Lincoln County may have been losing out on lodgers tax money from the Bonito Lake Campground, which is owned by the City of Alamogordo, but lies inside the county boundaries.

Commissioners will hear a report on the situation during their regular meeting at 9 a.m. Tuesday, July 6, in the county courthouse in Carrizozo.

"If they haven't been paying and we determine they are not exempt (as a government entity), we have to decide how to handle it," said Commissioner L. Ray Nunley. "Can we go back and collect for prior

years? We have some questions to answer."

Also up for discussion is a request by Twelfth Judicial District Judge Richard A. Parsons to ban weapons from the courthouse.

Officials with the Village of Ruidoso are asking for help with their senior citizens meals program, because they lost out on expected financial help from the State Legislature.

"I expect their program also may be hurt if Ruidoso Downs joins the Zia Senior Citizens program," Nunley said. "They've requested that

action, but it will have to wait until the next legislative session."

Ruidoso is the only village that is not part of the Zia senior citizens program in the county.

Commissioners also will consider approval of a change in wording in the county's anti-litter ordinance. The change would eliminate the requirement for a trash heap to be no more than 200 feet from an occupied dwelling for the ordinance to be enforced.

Deputy sheriff Charlie LaBelle, who has been trying to crack down on violators, requested the change.

County proposes running Downs senior center

Initial plans for a Lincoln County-operated senior citizens center were welcomed by Ruidoso Downs residents last week, but only under certain conditions.

The senior center was the major topic of discussions during the Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees meeting last Monday.

The board heard from Lincoln County commissioners L. Ray Nunley and Wilton Howell, county manager Andy Wynham and Zia Senior Center program manager Cheryl Labelle on the county's preliminary ideas for the center.

The group told how the other programs around the county that are run by the county are organized.

The main feature for the center would be providing reasonably priced lunches, around \$1.50 to \$4.50, five days a week for seniors and anyone else. There would also be an opportunity for the center to

take the meals to seniors who are unable to get out.

But the opportunities for the seniors wouldn't just stop there.

"The center would have an entire program," said Howell. "We would not just be providing meals."

That program would include various activities and programs for its users, but those details will be decided as the project progresses.

On the program, I think it might be a little premature to start on the specifics, said Howell.

The plan was taken well by the board and the citizens present at the meeting, but there was an area of concern.

Shirlene Fitzner, president of the Ruidoso Downs Ladies Auxiliary, said the commission members that the Auxiliary has put \$32,000 into the current Senior Citizens Center and members are concerned that it will become closed to other members of the community.

The current senior building will be used when and if the county

takes control.

"There are a whole lot of other people in the community that you need to be concerned about," said Fitzner.

She added that the group is hoping to make some kind of agreement to allow the building to be used by any group.

The Downs Auxiliary conducts an annual art festival, and all of the proceeds go to improve the senior citizens center.

Labelle said the other centers in the county allow groups to use their facilities for a \$25 donation.

Other community members urged the county commission and the Board of Trustees not to forget the contributions that the Auxiliary has made.

The county would lease the current senior citizens center from the Village of Ruidoso Downs for \$1 per month, and in return the county would take care of the center's expenses and utilities. Operating expenses for the center for a year

ly. They are getting competitive bids from anything in excess of \$500 and three quotes for items under that. They seem to be heading in the right direction," Archibeque said. "I told him about using the state purchasing division on some items."

The state obtains a bid for large quantities of items, which generally provides the lowest price available. Other government entities may purchase through that system.

—official board minutes were not signed,

"Mr. Lewandowsky simply went back to the members who needed to sign," Archibeque said. "The minutes already had been approved and the members still were on the board."

—lack of a physical inventory list, including fixed assets.

"They now have a new computer system with the capability and they conducting a complete physical inventory," Archibeque said. "I went through the rules of the Department of Finance and Administra-

tion with him, such as items costing more than \$500 should be capitalized. It looked like they will get that done."

Lewandowsky was hired three weeks ago after the authority board fired the former manager.

The authority is expected to have a new treasurer right away, too. Ron Andrews, who resigned Tuesday from the Ruidoso Village Council, has been authority treasurer since shortly after former councilor Al Junge resigned close to a year ago.

With a toast of Champagne to their outgoing president, the Cham-

ber of Commerce Board of Directors held its final meeting of the 1992-93 fiscal year.

With the toast, the group said

goodbye to past-president Paul Crown, who had served 18 months as the group's president. Crown was presented an engraved putter by the chamber staff for his year and a half of service.

During the meeting, the board approved the chamber's 1993-94 budget.

The budget plans for \$115,000 in revenues from members and new member dues, the annual art festival, the oktoberfest celebration, the connoisseur classic and the circus. The chamber also expects to put out \$104,600 in administrative expenses and operating expenses.

The board agreed that any dues that were billed for the 1992-93 year, but were collected after July 1, will be included in the 1993-94 revenue. Previously, any billing done for one year but collected in the next was credited to the first year.

Bailey announced that the Village of Ruidoso had approved fund-

ing to renew the service contract, but that the funding was only enough for half a year. The chamber will now go back to the village in early January and seek approval for funding for the rest of the year.

"Now it makes it twice a year that we have to go and beg for money," said Crown.

Incoming president Tom Rigby was given the floor at the meeting to announce his selections for ex-officio board members. His selections include Jim Miller of Eastern New Mexico University, Don Miller from MainStreet Ruidoso, Karen Kopp from the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County, Frank Potter from the Museum of the Horse and Sally Burkstaller from the Ruidoso Valley Greeters.

Rigby added that Potter will serve as the board's appointment to the EDCLC board of directors, and Burkstaller will represent the chamber on the MainStreet board.

Abandoned pets are waiting for new homes

They share a story that unfortunately, is too common at the Lincoln County Humane Society animal shelter.

Along with their siblings, Goodness, the terrier mix, and Snuggles, the calico kitten, were abandoned by uncaring owners, persons will-

ing to let them die rather than accept responsibility for not spaying their pets.

Goodness, who has wiry short hair, was picked up last month as a stray with her sister, Mercy, who looks more like a golden retriever.

Snuggles and her four brothers and sisters were left on a woman's doorstep in Ruidoso. She brought them to the shelter. Goodness is about 2 1/2 months old and Snuggles is only six to eight weeks, she said.

"The shelter has been overwhelmed with abandoned kittens already this summer," Harper said. "I can't understand how people continue to allow their cats and dogs to breed when all this suffering and, in some cases, destruction could be eliminated if they would only spay and neuter their pets."

"The argument that a female should have at least one litter is nonsense. The female will have fewer health problems once

spayed." In the outdoor section of the shelter, a big boy named Bud anxiously searches for an owner who has the means to provide for him and the strength to play with and control him.

Bud, an 11-month-old gray German shepherd, is big, playful and powerful.

"He was an owner release," Harper said. "The woman said she just couldn't afford his upkeep. She said she originally adopted Bud as a pup from the shelter, so it's his second time around."

Sponsors can help a pet's chances for adoption by paying the cost of the sterilization. A generous Ruidoso Downs/Texas resident stepped forward last week and has sponsored Kiko the shepherd pup and Sugar the lab with cropped ears, who were featured in last Monday's newspaper.



To date, TNP One is the largest generating station in the world to successfully implement the environmentally superior CFB technology, continues the release.





Fourth of July memories go back to early Mescalero hospitality


June's Last Day
This is being sent to you just after sundown on the last day of the best month of June we have seen in a long time. The day dawned with cool mist blowing in from the east and a solid cloud cover of light gray. It was cool — one of the coolest days of the entire month — almost like a day in early fall. About noon the mist began to drift away, and the clouds overhead began to take the form of billowy white thunder heads, and you could hear the thunder sounding over the hill to the east where purple-gray clouds were gathered just over the horizon. More white-tipped clouds moved in from the north, through the blue sky, and the mid-day sun began to bring up the temperature to 90 degrees. This did not last long, however, for the clouds to the east moved in with cool sprinkles of rain.

Throughout the day all through the mountain land, the clouds moved calmly from east, south and west through the sky with streamers of light rain and rainbows cooling the land below and bringing a refreshing breath of moisture to the air. Now while the sky is still bright with the colors of the sunset, here is the round golden moon, almost full, over Sunrise Mountain. Twilight fades into dusk, and early night. By the light of the moon you can see a great white round-topped mass of clouds to the east. Behind these clouds you see a lightning display — not jagged spears or zig-zag flashes. Instead the entire giant cloud is lighted up for an instant like a monster light bulb — silvery and golden and crimson flashes make clear to your sight the shape of the cloud mass. A cool breath reaches you from this cloud pageant — a message from dry June of the approach of rainy July.

The First Day of July
This is being sent to you on the first day of July, the eve of our mother's birthday; and my mind is drifting back to 1926 when we arrived at the Mescalero reservation on July 2. The Mescaleros welcomed us on this the first day of their four-day celebration, honoring both their sacred traditions, which go back to the time out of mind, and the Fourth of July. We played all sorts of games; race with egg in a spoon, three-legged race, sack race, watermelon-eating contest, baseball and foot racing. Brother Mark came second in the boys' foot racing; and the boy who won first place later set the high school record in the 100-yard race for the state of Arizona. Brother Lynn, then age ten, had heard of Indian trading, so he took a can of beans over to trade for something. A kind

lady let him keep his can of beans and gave him a beautiful blanket. The melodies of the sacred chants handed down by word of mouth since time immemorial echoed in my mind of days afterward. Among the things that impressed me then about the Mescaleros was the way they talked perfect English, their devout nature, their patriotism and their sense of humor and their love of children and reverence for their elders. **The Mountain Spirits** The Mescalero ceremonies are the traditional heritage of a great people, and people come from all over the world to be present at the four days. A feature of the days is 'The Dance of the Mountain Spirits around the fire at night. Long ago the Mescaleros were traveling in a great hurry as the result of a dire emergency. Two of the band, one

lame and the other blind fell behind. Night fell in the mountains, and these two were all alone. The mountain spirits came and took them to their home, fed them and cared for them and helped them rejoin their people. **Safe & Happy Fourth of July** While I write this at noon on the first, I am looking ahead, hoping and praying that you will have a safe and happy Fourth of July season which lasts several days after the Fourth itself. Now at high noon the American flag is floating against a background of the green mountain with clouds gray and white moving in overhead to the South. Be careful driving remembering that the rivers can flood suddenly this time of year. Let us thank God for the arrival of July, the patriotic month, and all our other many blessings.



Deceptively wins the \$233,043 Rainbow Derby on Sunday

The amazing filly Deceptively picked up where she left off as a 2-year-old when she flashed her blazing speed out of the gates and cruised home much the best to win the Grade I \$233,043 Rainbow Derby Sunday at Ruidoso Downs.

The 3-year-old daughter of Runaway Winner broke sharply from the #10 post position and had a 2 1/2-length lead midway down the stretch. Nearing the wire, the Bruce Bell-charger kicked into another gear to cross the line a length in front of runner-up Super Duper Couper. The time for the 440-yards

was :21.66 into a stiff headwind. Deceptively became only the third-horse in history to sweep the Rainbow Futurity and Derby. She joins the elite company of Turf's Best who accomplished the feat in 1987-88 and Dash For Speed in 1987-88.

"All I had to do was hold on," said Jeff Williams who rode Deceptively for the first time Sunday. "She took a deep breath midway down the lane and after that she just kept going. She is as much a pleasure to ride as she is to watch."

Trainer Bruce Bell who saddled Deceptively to win in the Kansas and Rainbow Futurities last year, seemed relieved to see his prize filly return to her winning form. The filly had been suffering from a foot abscess earlier in the meet, but was given a positive report from numerous veterinarians before the June 17 Derby trials.

"She was struggling earlier in the year, but the last week we began to see a different horse," said Bell. "She bled in the trials about 150 yards from the wire, but her

other problems were gone by then. I wasn't worried about the distance because last year when she won going 400 (yards) she looked like she could go 550."

Deceptively has won six of eight career starts, with three coming against Grade I company. The win was worth \$96,229 to owner Roger Knight Jr. of Madisonville, Texas. Her career bankroll now stands at \$295,228. Prior to today, her only win of the year came in the May 15 Kansas Derby Trials. In the May 31 finals, she struggled to run third behind First Down And Ten. Deceptively qualified to the Rainbow with the eighth fastest time of :21.64 after running a close second to longshot Silver Treasures.

Kansas Derby winner First Down And Ten was sent off the 8-2 favorite in the ten-horse field; but was bumped twice at the start and finished a distant ninth.

"The ground broke out from under dash him out of the gates, but they (Dash Thru Traffic and Im Next) hit him from both sides and it just took all the race out of him," said veteran rider Jacky Martin.

Fastest qualifier Super Duper Couper rallied in the final 100 yards to get up for second, a half-length in front of Specially Fast.

Super Duper Couper who hails from the Carl Draper-shedrow, earned \$43,990 as runner-up. Steve Fuller rode the Coup De Kas call for owner Fredda Draper of Ruidoso Downs.

Six G's Stable's Inc.'s Specially Fast will receive \$22,545 for third. The gelded son of Dash For Cash is trained by Dwayne "Sleepy" Gilbreath and had Alex Balducci Jr. aboard.

White Tail is just a memory

Some of the most spectacular scenery in the Southwest lies within the boundaries of the Mescalero Apache Reservation.

Although most of the tribe on the reservation are concentrated in the Mescalero settlement, at one time, several scattered communities existed.

When the Chiricahuas were uprooted from a prison holding center in Oklahoma in 1913, many chose to move to White Tail, 8,000 feet above sea level on the Mescalero Reservation. Over the next three decades, the community prospered in a green valley thick with wildflowers, protected by a rim of towering peaks.

"It was a good place to grow up," said Virginia Comanche. "Everybody knew each other."

The only amenities were a school house and a church.

The school house still stands, violated by vandals and time. Gutted of all of its educational equipment, debris and discards have been dumped into its basement through broken windows.

The stripped walls indicate the outlines of blackboards. Cracked sinks were left behind in the bathrooms where chattering children once washed their hands before eating lunch.

Abandoned houses, crumbling from the unrelenting battering of the elements, are clustered in two or three groupings. Barren foundations jut from patches of weeds.

A few families spend weekends in the valley, either in the old structure that used to be home for the teacher, or in one or two mobile homes off the road.

But Comanche, who graduated from Ruidoso High School in the late 1950s, remembers the valley as "beautiful," where families used to ride horses and pile into wagons to visit each other. Comanche and her husband grew up together in White Tail.

"You could hear the church bells ringing all through the valley," she said.

"The problem was jobs," Comanche said. "The people had to move for jobs."

Even today, the trip to White Tail requires more than 10 miles of travel on a dirt road that lies several miles outside Ruidoso off U.S. 70 as it heads into Alamogordo.



One of the neat little four-room homes with galvanized iron roofs built at White Tail during the early 1940s stands alone.

Besides Mescalero and White Tail, Apache families created settlements in Carrizo, Three Rivers and in Mud Canyon at Elk Springs. Her niece still lives in Lower Elk, Comanche said.

Pleasant days

Dorele Kazhe met her husband in high school in Phoenix. She married into the tribe in 1936 and moved to the reservation in the 1940s.

"When I first arrived, I wasn't sure how I would be received since I was from another tribe," Kazhe said. After all, historians say the Apache were named by the Zuni with their word for "enemy." The tribe, although comprised of many subgroups, was known for sticking together against outsiders.

"But they welcomed me," Kazhe said.

The couple first lived at the main agency in Mescalero with her mother-in-law.

"The reservation was divided into districts, and we moved to White Tail. Around 1940, about 50 families lived in White Tail," Kazhe said.

"A church was established by the Reformed Church of America, descended from the Dutch and Quakers. I was a Presbyterian and it was a very similar form of worship, so I joined. The church had a little white chapel and we would gather there for ladies aid, sewing and potlucks.

"We were known as the best of all the little communities (on the reservation). We were considered the leading community and I attribute that to the teachers who were there at the time. They introduced us to a lot of things."

Another favorite pastime for the women of White Tail was to get together in each other's homes for a bit of socializing and gambling.

"I asked if we could form a sewing circle and we found the women had a great deal of talent in crocheting and quilting.

"For the men, there was the rodeo club."

Kazhe, who turned 79 in February, also remembers victory gardens during World War II.

"The school teacher made us all plant one," she said. "We did the canning and made jerky."

"The school always was the headquarters. We were very close knit and thought of ourselves as a family, and still do even today in Mescalero. We recall what we used to do and the jokes we played on each other and what Mrs. Webb (a teacher) had us do. Only a few of the White Tail people still are

living today."

For nine years, Kazhe worked at the White Tail Day School as a temporary employee, a substitute.

"When they found out I was steady, they gave me a job as housekeeper," she said. "I cooked the noon meal for 26 to 30 kids."

But then the school was consolidated with Tularosa and Ruidoso.

"It was a sad thing when the school was abolished," she said. "The last day of work, I scrubbed the floors. I left the school clean. There's nothing out there now. It's hard to see it in shambles."

After the state took over the school system, she worked one more year in Mescalero, suffered a stroke and began working for the Bureau of Indian Affairs as a custodian. After 40 years of working, she retired.

"We used to plant oats, barley and wheat," Kazhe said of the life in White Tail. "Everyone was united in helping one another. The men harvested the grain from field to field as the women worked to feed the men. There was a lot of love and understanding. We all stayed at one house (during the harvest), depending on how long it took."

Some of the women earned money by killing with poison carrot baits the gophers that dug up the planted fields. They collected \$1.50 an hour. "That was a lot of money," Kazhe said. "We would share our lunches with each other as we worked."

"We came to church as a place to see and meet one another, because it was steady, a good thing. The missionaries came on Sunday afternoons."

"I remember the days in White Tail as being very pleasant."

The teachers helped the adults as well as the children, she said.

"They invited the adults in to see what they were doing. They were very strict with the kids," she said. "The only means of going into town (Mescalero) was to sign up in advance and let the teacher know. We took turns."

"Many thought Mescalero was the only big city in the world. They had never been outside. I'd lived in Phoenix."

"I used to take in a lot of kids on the weekends when their parents went away. We had no store. I don't know how in the world I did it."


Kazhe said the best teachers she remembers were Mr. and Mrs. Claude Webb.

Mrs. Webb organized the women to create handiwork for an Annual Indian Fair. Prizes were awarded and the effort gave the women pride and a good feeling about themselves, she said.

"They taught us a lot and encouraged the women to keep their homes clean," Kazhe said.

She already was well acquainted with the sanitary standards of the white community.

"I was orphaned young and spent 12 years in an Indian school and then was a dorm attendant, so I knew all about cleanliness and sanitary conditions," she said. "I only had a high school education. I tried to go to junior college night school. It cost 20-cents round trip to take a street car and I didn't have the means."

"In those days, no one had ever heard of federal grants. I see a lot of kids wasting their time now and not taking advantage of it."

"I'm sorry those days are past. The young kids don't seem to have initiative. We used to be eager to learn."

History's view

The force that brought the different Apache groups together was the government's drive to consolidate all Apaches in Arizona at San Carlos and those in New Mexico at Mescalero.

According to the writings of Apache historian Eva Ball, the late Asa Daklugie, son of Juh the Nednhi chief and nephew of Geronimo, pushed for the release of Apaches from Fort Sill in Oklahoma. Two relocation sites were proposed, Mescalero and Warm Springs, which is northwest of Truth and Consequences.

Only five sections were available at the latter, around Ojo Caliente, while Mescalero could offer nearly 500,000 acres.

In August 1912, the U.S. Congress authorized the release of the Apaches from Fort Sill, where many had been confined since 1894, appropriated \$200,000 dollars for their resettlement and granted a supplemental appropriation of \$100,000 dollars a year later.

Representatives from the Chiricahuas, including Daklugie, traveled to Mescalero, where the prospect of a large group of new Apaches was viewed as insurance by the Mescalero against the loss of their reservation to New Mexico mining and ranching interests.

According to D.C. Cole in his book, "The Chiricahua Apache, 1846-1876. From War to Reservation," published in 1936, the Mescaleros felt that an increase in their population would help them keep their lands.

"A faction led by Chief Magoosh argued forcefully on behalf of the Chiricahuas in obtaining permission from the other Mescalero headmen for the resettlement," Cole wrote in his book.

Ball wrote that Daklugie came back to Oklahoma enthusiastic about Mescalero, calling it a cattleman's paradise with "good grass, water, wood and brakes for shelter."

Seventy-eight Chiricahuas stayed at Fort Sill, many were the younger, more progressive members of the tribe who had accumulated property and some wealth. They were given a portion of the appropriated money to buy vacant Kiowa and Comanche allotments.

But 183 who turned their hopes to the West were sent in April 1913

by special train under a military escort to New Mexico.

Cole wrote that a few families simply disappeared, taking advantage of their release from captivity, but choosing not to go to Mescalero. Some headed to Nebraska.

Ball wrote about the train trip to Mescalero and how the Chiricahuas smuggled their dogs to New Mexico with them:

"A train was secured for the Indians conveyance to New Mexico and one absolute order was issued: they could take no dogs. The Apaches boarded it with their personal effects, saddles, guns, household goods, clothing, bedding and food for use en route. Not a dog showed up."

"Practically every Mescalero who owned a wagon took it down to meet the train and transport new members of the reservation to the Agency. The train slowed to a halt and the doors were opened. Before an Indian left the coaches, dogs simply poured to the station platform. Where they'd been concealed, nobody knew. Even today, older members of the tribe laugh when those dogs are mentioned; and they keep still."

To help pay for the relocation, the property amassed by the Chiricahuas during their years of captivity, including houses, reservation fencing and more than 6,000 cattle was sold. The goods generated about \$165,000.

The Chiricahuas also sold some of their personal effects and received contributions. All told, the average available per individual for relocation was \$1,800, according to Cole. A healthy sum in those days.

The Chiricahuas immediately took a prominent place on the reservation by means of their wealth, education and political unity. The Mescaleros' gamble paid off, when their new reservation partners aggressively opposed Senator Albert B. Fall's attempt to seize the Mescalero reserves for his own use.

Although only a few of the Chiricahuas belonged to the tribe, the Mescaleros granted them shares in the goods and land of the reservation.

According to C.L. Sonnichsen in his 1958 book entitled, "The Mescalero Apaches," in 1912 and again in 1916, Senator Fall of New Mexico, who owned the Three Rivers Ranch at the western edge of the reservation, introduced a bill to turn the Mescalero Reservation into a public park. Although he never mustered significant support for the idea, Fall persisted until 1922.

"During all those years, the Apaches lived in fear and were glad

to have the weight of the Chiricahuas on their side," Sonnichsen wrote.

He said that explains why the Mescalero tribe today is a mixture of Mescaleros and Chiricahuas, with some Lipans (from Mexico) in the background and a few relics of Comanche and Mexican blood.

During those decades after the turn of the century, some Jicarilla Apaches, who had been north and east of Santa Fe, settled at Tularosa, Three Rivers and on Carrizo Creek, Sonnichsen wrote.

Historically, Mescalero bands, preferred the high country. They previously had concentrated in the Sierra Blanca area, the Guadalupe Mountains and the Davis Mountains.

Gila Apaches had gravitated west of the Rio Grande and the Lipans were in Mexico.

With the government resettlements, two famous Apache leaders, Geronimo and Nana, died in Oklahoma. But Naiche, often called the real power in the tribe, ended his lengthy life at Mescalero.

Only a few other families were living at White Tail when the Chiricahua Apaches arrived.

The new reservation residents found what had been promised in nature's gifts was waiting for them.

Writing about the first cattle roundup in 1914, Ball noted that the gramma grass offered ample feed:

"Ted Sutherland, who was the first superintendent of livestock, asked friends from neighboring ranches to help with the branding of calves."

Expert Mescalero cowboys also pitched in. Each had 10 to 12 ponies, which had been roped out of the wild herd and trained.

Before the group started out for number one cow camp (there were seven) near Pajarito Springs, Asa Daklugie joined them on "one sorry horse." Sutherland later found out that Daklugie was there to ensure they didn't cheat the tribe, Ball wrote.

An old Ford Model T carrying agency officials gave out at White Tail, but the roundup proceeded without them.

"This prodigious task was performed in five days and ever since, the Mescalero Reservation has had cattle," Ball wrote. "Each October and November, sales are held at the Number One Camp. From the 2,000 original heifers, 1,984 calves were produced. All were accounted for and from then on, Daklugie and Sutherland were good friends."

When an energetic Indian Affairs superintendent named E.R. McCray arrived nearly 20 years later, he was determined to put the Reservation in order, Sonnichsen wrote.

Anyone with no actual business at Mescalero was moved out.


"Neat, four-room houses with galvanized-iron roofs were put up for them whenever a patch of land in the bottom of a tree-lined canyon could be turned into a farm," wrote Sonnichsen. By 1942, every family had a house.

Until he left three years later, McCray, "saw to it that timber was cut and houses built, and that the Indians actually moved into them and went to work on the land."

The remnants of those "neat, four-room houses with galvanized roofs," primarily are what still stand at White Tail today.

Is this how our senators cut back on federal spending?

Senator Pete Domenici announced, proudly, this week that he has introduced legislation to increase the size of an already overfed federal bureaucracy.

Domenici, recognizing the very real problems facing Indian women today, wants to establish an office within the Bureau of Indian Affairs — the Office of Women and Families — that would work to improve the BIA's policies and programs as they relate to women and children. The Senator has hit on a very real problem, but he's missed the mark in reaching for a solution.

In true bureaucratic style, Domenici said: "While the BIA is the theoretical center of our country's efforts to improve the daily lives of 2,000,000 American Indians, there are too many uncoordinated federal agencies serving the same target population." So why establish and fund yet another such agency?

"The idea is to identify those problems that require new policy attention, better programmatic effort or enhanced coordination with other federal programs," he said. Did anybody ask any Indian women what their problems are and how they're dealing with them? Does he mean another government study? Did anybody ask tribal leaders how to empower their members within the framework of their traditions and cultures?

The BIA is just one of hundreds of federal agencies that have grown and grown and grown, eating up more and more and more tax money. During that grow-and-spend period, the very people the BIA is supposed to serve have seen a decline in their resources and their standard of living. Domenici is exactly right that Indian women are the "poorest of the poor," and he's right to be looking for a way to right that wrong.

But, expanding the agency that has overseen this increase in poverty and suffering, is not the right answer. The end result would be more government with very limited (or no) results.

Money that would fund a department administrator, deputy administrator, administrative assistants, secretaries, clerk typist and so forth down the oh-so-familiar government office hierarchy, could be put to better use by current staff making grants and allocations directly to the women and families.

Education is the key — education that is provided close to home in a non-threatening environment at flexible times to fit the needs of the women and children. Education is needed at all levels for all ages — from a "toddler house" to a community college with GED, vocational and associates programs. Good quality childcare is a must, too, so that women with children will be free to take advantage of educational opportunities.

Let's put federal dollars into education instead of bureaucracy. The last thing this country needs is another government department.

It was on the playground at George R. Bean Elementary School in Lubbock, Texas, where I first learned that life isn't always fair.

I couldn't believe it then, and I have a hard time with it even now, close to a half century later.

You might well ask who said life would be fair, and I'd be hard pressed to say what made me believe so strongly in justice and fair play. But I did and I do, and I know I'm not alone.

As the second smallest first grader at that little Texas school, I got my first taste of injustice when I tossed an orange peel and was accused of throwing rocks. Miss Collier, my first grade teacher, pressed her thumbs into my eyes to show me just how it would feel to be hit in the eye with a rock.

Too bashful to state my case and too ashamed to cry in front of my classmates, I gritted my teeth and got my first glimpse of a world where you don't always get what you deserve.

Mrs. Cross taught us that "bull" is a bad word. We could be mama cows and papa cows but we'd be punished for saying "bull."

While we were running and prancing, mooing and neighing, Mrs. Cross was hearing something that we didn't even know enough to say. If Mrs. Cross spent any time in a school yard these days, she'd sure learn a thing or two about bad words.

I remembered Mrs. Cross and her "no bull" policy when Dick Weber called me the other

day. Dick's name was included in an opinion piece by Chuck Stallings, and he didn't think he had received fair treatment.

Dick said the column, which listed some people who had signed the petition against The Ruidoso News, made it look as if he opposed the Hubbard hotel. He said he's all for the hotel and complained at his treatment in The News.

It was a perplexing complaint because Weber wasn't named in the column as a hotel opponent. His only mention was as a petition signer, and that was true — we had it in black and white.

"For Better or for Worse" Five Couples Keep the Flame Alive

The five couples profiled in "For Better or for Worse" are still together after more than 50 years, and what they have to say about love, sex, fidelity, and growing old as a team may surprise anyone who has been, or wants to be, in a relationship. David Collier's engaging documentary premieres as part of P.O.V., the award-winning non-fiction film series.

Inspired by his grandparents, who have been together for 67 years, and by his parents, who divorced when he was five, filmmaker David Collier went in search of the meaning of long-term commitment. After talking to more than 200 couples, he found five who have somehow kept the flame alive: Dan and Sophie Trupin, married 60 years; Paul and Inez Jones, married 57 years; Chet

As the couples go about their daily lives at home, they recount the stories of their first meeting and then move on to the topics that affect every long-term relationship: togetherness vs. personal independence; monogamy vs. open marriage; conflict resolution; love and sex; and aging, death, and the prospect of living alone. Their comments and stories, tinged with both joy and sorrow, are often eye-opening, remarkably frank and surprisingly open-minded.
